

Kildare - Donegal clashes

In Division One, round 4 of the Church and General National Football League, sees Kildare in Ballybofey today in search of their second victory in the current campaign against a Donegal side who are unbeaten to date. Donegal's list of victories is quite impressive. In the opening round they defeated Down on an 0-8 to 0-7 scoreline in Newry. It was a classical game between the counties who have won three of the last four All-Irelands between them. Both Down and Donegal lined out with only eight players who had gained All-Ireland medals on the field.

In Round 2, Donegal continued their good start with a deserved three points victory over Derry at MacCumhaill Park on a scoreline of 0-15 to 2-6. In round three, Donegal were visitors to Croke Park and with new manager, P. J. McGowan, Donegal played very impressively, defeating the All-Ireland finalists on a scoreline of 0-12 to 1-8, after Dublin had led at the interval by 1-6 to 0-3. The game was looking likely to end in a draw until Manus Boyle set up Tony Boyle for the winning score.

Kildare in their opening game took on a largely new look Kerry team in Tralee. It was goals scored in either half by Conor O'Donnell and Genie Farrell that put Kerry on the road to an impressive 2-12 to 0-8 victory. It was a disappointing performance by Kildare.

In their second game in the League under manager, Dermot Earley, Kildare showed great elegance and style and a much improved performance against Meath at Navan. Kildare won as much possession as their counterparts but the visitors recorded twelve wides, six in each half and on three occasions in the first thirty minutes the woodwork deprived them of scores. The Royal County went on to record a 0-12 to 0-7 victory.

In their first game at St. Conleth's Park under the new management, Kildare were pitted against Laois. Coming into the game, Laois were undefeated having accounted for Derry and Down in a most impressive fashion. Kildare, playing with style and conviction, gave their supporters great hope with an outstanding display to record their first victory in the current competition and end the O'Moore county's unbeaten record since gaining promotion to the top flight. It was a goal by Noel Donlon in the opening half which enabled Kildare to lead by 1-4 to 0-2 at the interval.

Eight minutes into the second half Laois had narrowed the gap to 1-4 to 0-5. Leixlip man, Brian Fahy picked up a Laois clearance 50 metres out and lofted the ball goalwards. The ball dipped at the last moment and deceived the despairing dive of the Laois 'keeper to put Kildare on their way to a 2-7 to 0-7 victory. That victory means that Kildare are now in joint third position, sharing with Down and Derry.

In the most recent meeting between Kildare and Donegal, Kildare recorded victory at St. Conleth's Park on a 1-10 to 0-7 scoreline.

In a memorable game played on April 21st, 1991 at Croke Park before an attendance of over 30,000, Kildare and Donegal thrilled the large attendance. Kildare showed great character by coming back after conceding a goal to full forward Tony Boyle, 22 minutes into the game that helped the then Ulster champions to a lead of 1-5 to 0-3. Kildare battled back bravely in the second half with two excellent points by Darragh McKevitt in the last five minutes which ensured a memorable victory. Nevertheless, it still took a tremendous catch right on his own line by the high fielding Martin Lynch virtually on time to prevent Donegal from securing a last gasp equaliser.

Kildare's successes now in the distant past

With four All-Ireland senior titles and eleven Leinster titles, Kildare's name is always held in high regard within the GAA, but most of their successes are now but a distant memory.

It is now nearly nearly forty years since they won their last Leinster title away back in 1956, and you have to go back to 1928 for the last time they were All-Ireland champions.

That was an historic time for the Lilywhites as their last All-Ireland success coincided with the first time the Sam Maguire Cup was presented to the All-Ireland champions, with goalkeeper Willie 'Squires' Gannon going down in history as the first man to be presented with the now-famous Cup.

That was the era when the Lilywhites were supreme in Leinster, winning six titles in-a-row from 1926 to 1931.

Their All-Ireland successes came in 1905, 1919, 1927 and 1928. Their 1919 success came after Wexford had won four in-a-row titles.

Since their six-in-row Leinster titles, Kildare have been successful just twice in Leinster — 1935 and 1956 — and since 1956 it has been a frustrating time, being defeated eight times in the provincial decider, the most recent setbacks being against the Dubs in 1992 and 1993 when hope was very high in Kildare under the management of Kerry-great, Mick O'Dwyer.

Because of their great tradition within the Association, expectation has always been high in Kildare when it comes to the fortunes of the county side. That expectation, as much as anything, has weighed heavily on the shoulders of the players.

The Kildare team which won the

first Sam Maguire Cup was: W. Gannon (capt.); M. Walshe, M. Buckley, M. Goff; Gus Fitzpatrick, F. Malone, J. Higgins J. Hayes, Joe Loughlin; P. Martin, P. Loughlin, P. Doyle; W. Mangan, J. Curtis, T. Keogh. Sub., D. Ryan.

The recent famine in Kildare Gaelic football is reflected in the All-Star selections with only Ollie Crinnigan and Martin Lynch being honoured since the scheme was introduced in 1971.

Like Donegal, success at National League level has also evaded Kildare with final defeats in 1928, 1929, 1958, 1968 and 1991 being the closest they came to making the breakthrough.

Three Kildare men have captained Leinster to Railway Cup success — Matt Goff in 1928, Bill Gannon in 1929 and John Higgins in both 1930 and 1932.

At U-21 level Kildare have just one All-Ireland success, the famous Pat Dunny captaining them to the title in 1965, the second year of the competition, defeating Cork by 2-11 to 1-7 in the final. The Kildare team was: O. Crinnigan; D. Wynne, S. Cash, J. McTeague; S. Reilly, P. Nally, J. Millar; J. Donnelly, P. Mangan; T. Carew, P. Dunny, K. Kelly; T. Walsh, P. Newins, M. Behan. Subs., T. Keogh, P. Harman.

The following year the Kildare U-21s were defeated in the final by a Roscommon team that contained their present manager, Dermot Earley. Since that they appeared in just one other final, being defeated by Kerry in 1966.

At minor level Kildare have won five Leinster titles but only once, in 1973, have they reached the All-Ireland final and in that game they were beaten by a Tyrone team powered by Eugene McKenna and Patsy Kerlin.



Every Success in coming season to our Donegal Team

T.V. or not T.V.?

A fortnight ago, Donegal travelled to Croke Park to take on the Dubs in the third round of the Church & General National Football League. For both sides this was a crucial game. Donegal needed the points which would all but rubber-stamp their qualification to the knock-out stages. Dublin, on the other hand, were desperate for league points. Having lost their opening games against Meath and Kerry, they were one of four teams rooted at the basement end of the table alongside Derry, Down and Kildare.

A crowd of 9,277 — most of which were supporting Donegal — attended what transpired to be a championship-like encounter. Yet, the country's national television network, R.T.E. didn't regard the fixture worthy of television coverage. (After all, the cost of transporting broadcasting equipment from one part of the capital to the other must be huge!). Indeed, the network didn't think any of the other 15 National League fixtures deserved coverage either.

Instead, the Sunday Game on Network 2 screened later that evening devoted most of the 90 minutes transmission to showjumping from Millstreet in Cork. They did, however, manage to squeeze in highlights of the weekend's Bord Gais National League Premier Division games. With all respect to lovers of showjumping, surely the coverage wasn't that exciting that they merited almost 60 minutes?

Áll this begs the following question: Why does the domestic soccer action feature every week, and the National Football League, played on every second Sunday,

and which begins a 14 week break after today, receive no coverage at all on the date in question?

Yes, it is only right and proper that League of Ireland fixtures should be shown, but is the National Football League not worthy of similar exposure?

That U.T.V. were able to show brief highlights of Ulster's leading teams in the league the following evening during the weekend's sports round-up of the week further questions the rational judgement of those who decide what should be televised.

For those at R.T.E. who might not be aware of the huge interest in gaelic football in Ulster at present, television audiences have risen annually and an estimated 180,000 watched the 1994 senior provincial championship ties.

But Donegal didn't need the R.T.E. cameras and staged a dramatic comeback to win the game in the final moments, thanks to an opportunist point from Tony Boyle who has thankfully discovered top form again.

Today, League leaders Donegal meet Kildare in what is their last competitive outing before the winter break. The only team in the top flight with a 100 per cent record, Donegal will be out for revenge against today's opponents after last season's League defeat in Newbridge. Will the table-toppers, or indeed any of the other 30 counties competing in the National Football League be figuring on R.T.E. tonight, or will the international tiddlywinks championship from Timbuktu take priority? The answer at around 10.30 p.m.




