O'Toole Goal Clinches 77 Final As Royal Challenge Fails

A crowd of 46,044 saw Dublin retain their provincial title with a score of 1-9 to 0-8 in the 1977 Leinster Final, played at Croke Park on July 31st.

It was a dour, tough game. The marking was close, the tackling by both sides was good and there was little room for free movement. The close marking led to 48 frees and a few bookings for minor incidents.

The day was warm and sultry and there was little breeze as Dublin played into the canal goal in the first half. They were led for just four minutes from the 13th to the 17th when Jimmy Keaveney brought the scores level for the second time in the game.

Eight minutes later, Meath should have had a goal when Ken Rennicks and John Gibbons combined to put Peter Cromwell clean through. With only Paddy Cullen to beat, Cromwell shot well but Robbie Kelleher appeared from nowhere to deflect the ball for a '50'.

Dublin went on to lead, 0-5 to 0-3 at half time but it was a tribute to the Meath defence that Dublin had to depend on Jimmy Keaveney for three of those points from frees.

Dublin were 0-5 to 0-4 in front when Brian Mullins initiated the only goal of the game, finished to the Meath net by Anton O'Toole.



Anton O'Toole - the Dublin goalscorer.


Between that and the finish, Meath had chances to get on terms but inaccuracy from placed balls cost them dearly.

That goal seemed to drain the heart out of Meath but their defence stayed resolutely firm and denied Dublin the avalanche of scores that was expected following the goal.

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



The 1964 Meeting

Meath Slam All-Ireland Champs To Bridge 10 Year Gap

196

Meath 2-12 Dublin 1-7

The Leinster Senior Football Championship Final played at Croke Park on July 26th, 1964, saw All-Ireland Champions Dublin unceremoniously knocked from their proud perch by a superbly fit Meath team that went from strength to strength and had gained complete mastery long before the final whistle. In fact, the margin of eight points only faintly represented a marked superiority that brought the Leinster crown to the Royal County for the first time since 1954.

McNamee opened the scoring with a Meath point in the fourth minute and ten minutes later Shanley punched a point from a free by Carty. Dublin drew level with scores from Coen and Ferguson but Meath regained the lead when Shanley added points before a cross by Coen was punched to the Meath net by McDonald. Coen added a point from a free and Carty replied for Meath before Casey had a Dublin point in the 25th minute. Walsh (Meath) and Coen (Dublin) exchanged points to leave the half time score, 1-6 to 1-5 in fayour of Meath.

In the first minute of the second half, Walsh pointed a Meath free and McDonald replied with a punched point for Dublin. Meath, however, then hit the high spots and points from Walsh and Shanley were followed by a goal from substitute Mulvaney. McNamee added a point and after McDonald had pointed for Dublin, Meath finished with several

wides and points from McNamee and Walsh (free).

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5 Five Goal Rout In '55

Dublin Dethrone Champions Meath

Five goals in this Leinster Senior Football Final, played at Croke Park, on July 24th, 1955, brought All-Ireland title-holders, Meath, toppling from their throne. The attendance of 48,360 witnessed what could only be described as a rout - enlivened only by the quality of Dublin's football.

Meath were first to score - a point from Duff but Olly Freaney and Tom O'Brien exchanged points before Dessie Ferguson equalised. O'Boyle pointed Dublin ahead again and dreams of a close struggle collapsed and Meath's All-Ireland crown began to totter when Kevin Heffernan blasted home the first of the goals.

Duff replied with a Meath point but this was followed by Dublin's second goal, scored by O'Boyle. Both sides exchanged points before Cathal O'Leary took a pass from Kevin Heffernan and blasted the ball to the net. Dublin led 3-5 to 0-4 at half time.


Meath had points from Duff and Smith immediately after the restart but Dublin replied with points from Haughey and Freaney before Dessie Ferguson booted the ball to the net. It was Dublin all the way after that and Meath could do nothing to stop the rampant challengers who went on to win by 20 points, and take the title for the first time since 1942.

Meath were once Leinster Football Champions for 20 minutes. At 1.45 p.m. on October 22nd, 1911, there was no sign of the Kilkenny team, so the match was awarded to Meath. At 2.15 p.m., Kilkenny turned up and the match went ahead. After some heated discussion, a replay was ordered which Kilkenny won with a score of 2-4 to 1-1.

OFFALY CLAIMS TO FAME

Offaly went through the Leinster campaign in 1971 without conceding a goal, having beaten Longford 1-7 to 0-3, Laois 2-12 to 0-10 and Kildare 2-14 to 0-6 in the final.

Offaly is the only Leinster county to have beaten Kerry in a replay in an All-Ireland Final. Over the years Kildare, Wexford, Louth, Dublin and Laois all succumbed to the Kingdom's replay "magic", but in the 1982 All-Ireland replay, Offaly finally shattered Kerry's dominance in this respect.

Clara in Offaly was the first club affiliated to the GAA. They earned this distinction on December 15th, 1884.

* * * * * * *

Eugene Mulligan (Rhode) was the first player to be nominated on his own for a position on a GAA All-Star team. This happened in 1971 and later that year he was selected as Offaly's first Texaco Award winner.



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Leinster Senior Football Championship 1994 Late Equaliser Earns Micklow Replay

Offaly 1-9 Wicklow 0-12

When Offaly and Wicklow met in the first round of the Leinster Championship at Aughrim on the second last Sunday in May, 1994, the game was regarded as a contest between two "no hope" sides in view of the recent form of the two teams; it was four years since Wicklow last won a Championship game, while Offaly had declined to Division 4 status in the N.F.L.

Yet the sides combined to provide as exciting a 70 minutes as one could wish for. Maybe the standard of football was lacking in real quality, but there was an abundance of incidents and a level of exciting tension that ensured that few of the estimated 5,000 spectators left before the final whistle.

Wicklow, although playing against a stiff breeze, dominated the opening 35 minutes, so much so that they were not in the least flattered by their 0-9 to 0-3 interval lead. Such was Wicklow's superiority during the opening half that one shuddered to think what the second half held in store for the visitors.

But what a change the second half brought, a couple of switches seemed to do the trick and suddenly Wicklow were dancing to the Offaly air. It helped of course that Wicklow were down to 14 men, Paul Allen getting the line after just four minutes of the second half. Substitute Padraig Dunne levelled the game for Offaly in the 49th minute and Vinny Claffey put them ahead in the 61st minute. It took an injury time point from Wicklow substitute Trevor Doyle to send the game to a replay in Tullamore six days later.

REPLAY OFFALY THROUGH AFTER REMARKABLE RECOVERY

The replay in Tullamore on May 28th followed much the same pattern as the drawn encounter, with Wicklow taking the game to Offaly from the throw-in and completely dominating for long periods, so much so that they led by 5 points with 10 minutes remaining. However, Offaly performed another Houdini act which produced an avalanche of scores to turn the 5 points deficit into a 6 point winning margin.

The first half saw scores level on numerous occasions. However, thanks to a

Vinny Claffey goal, Offaly went in leading by 1-5 to 0-7 at the interval. On the resumption Wicklow completely dominated proceedings and for 25 minutes they enjoyed the freedom of O'Connor Park as they mesmerised Offaly with some stylish passing moves, and even if their finishing was not all that impressive, they still appeared to have the game in safe keeping as they led by 0-14 to 1-6 after 60 minutes.

The first hint of a home revival came when Peter Brady placed his skipper, Padraig Moran for a thundering drive which came back off the crossbar. That was the spark that ignited the fire, for with super-sub Padraig Dunne being sprung from the bench and Jimmy Stewart coming into his own when switched to midfield, Offaly started motoring in earnest. Points by Claffey and Sean Grennan were followed by a cracking goal from Moran to leave the sides level 2-8 to 0-14. There was no way back for the visitors, who by now had become thoroughly demoralised and dis-

organised. Points by Brady and Claffey were followed by a Jimmy Stewart goal to complete one of the most remarkable recoveries seen at the venue for many a long day.


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
Dreaded Noughts

Offaly and Wicklow both have had the dismal experience of finishing a championship game without raising a flag. The Garden County's day of the dreaded noughts was in the 1891 semi-final with Dublin at Clonturk Park on October 25th when represented by Rathnew, they had no answer to the powerful Metropolitans, going down by 4-11 to nil.

Offaly went one better (or worse?) in that on two occasions they failed to raise a flag in a Leinster Championship game. The first was in 1901 when they were crushed by Louth (2-16 to nil) at Jones' Road in the first round, and 16 years later it was also in an opening round tie that the forwards failed completely as Laois romped home by 2-7 to 0-0 at Ballyduff Park.

wicklow's Internationals

The 1936 All-Ireland Junior Championship was notable for the fact that there was no entry from Britain which meant the "Home Final" between Wicklow and Mayo was, for once, the final proper. There was an interesting development from the non-appearance of the exiles in the final, as it was decided to stage "Internationals" between Ireland and Britain in both codes instead.

The decision brought further honours to Wicklow, as no fewer than eight of the All-Ireland winning team were selected to play against Britain at Croke Park on October 4th with Martin O'Neill being honoured with the captaincy.

The team which beat the exiles in this unique "international" was: J. Sexton, Kildare; A. Golden, Mayo; P. Nolan, Wicklow; W. Durcan, Mayo; R. Elliott, Wicklow; P. O'Brien, Kerry; M. O'Brien, D. Kerrigan, D. Dalton, all Wicklow; M. O'Malley, Mayo; P. Russell, Waterford; T. Tyrrell, Wicklow; P. Smith, Cavan; M. Keating, Wicklow; M. O'Neill, Wicklow, captain.

Sadly, this experiment in "international competition" was never repeated.

Dublin v. Meath THE OLDEST OF RIVALS

Today marks the Golden Jubilee of Dublin and Meath clashes in the Leinster Senior Football Championships, with Dublin holding a 12 game advantage over their neighbours from the Royal County, having won 27 to Meath's 15 with no fewer than 7 games ending level including that never to be forgotten saga in 1991 when they drew on three occasions before Meath eventually came out on top by a single point.



1898 THE FIRST ENCOUNTER At Jones Road

Offaly were seeking their first ever win in championship football in this game played in almost summer-like conditions on the third Sunday of November (1899) in the Championship of 1898. The midlanders, however, did not have much time to appreciate the setting as from an early stage they were under heavy pressure from a much fitter opposing 17. Still, with the slight wind at their backs, they just about held their own in the opening half hour and, indeed, managed to turn over leading by 0-4 to 0-3.

But the second half was almost totally in favour of the Wicklow men, and when the points registered by Jordan and Behan were supplemented by a goal from O'Neill, the game collapsed as a contest despite the sterling defence offered to the end by Downes. Flattery, Malone and Mullins.

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
An Historic Miss

A dispute about the venue led to the fixture being abandoned and deprived Wicklow of the distinction of taking part in what would have been the first ever Championship game in 1897.

How it came about is part of an intriguing scenario surrounding the draws for the first round in that inaugural year. Twelve counties entered the football competition and Wicklow and Clare were fixed to play their tie at Athlone on Tuesday, July 19th, five days before the next two games involving Waterford, Louth, Kilkenny and Cork, were down for decision.

But it appears that even at that early stage of the championship, there was a special glamour attached to playing in Dublin, although the GAA did not own any pitch in the Capital. Wicklow simply objected to playing down the country when the other ties had the setting of Elm Park on the South side of the city, and a statement issued by Wicklow officials complained that "... while Waterford, Louth, Meath, Galway, Wexford and Limerick are accorded the privilege of playing at Elm Park Merrion ... we must decline to ask any team to go to Athlone this season for a match ...".

No doubt the Wicklow decision to pull out of the Championship was made on perceived point of principle, but in retrospect it was a pity that they did so, thus missing the chance to make history.



Deep in concentration is Dublin's sharpshooter, Charlie Redmond.




While Wicklow's list of honours won may not compare with that of Offaly, the Garden County can still claim that in several ways they were ahead of Offaly. For instance, Wicklow contested their first Leinster Senior Final in 1897, ten years before Offaly made an appearance at this stage of the Championship.

Wicklow also won their first Leinster title (Junior 1906) 35 years before Offaly won theirs. And perhaps even more noteworthy is the fact that Wicklow won an All-Ireland football title (Junior 1936), 28 years before The Faithful County had their historic first success (minor) in 1964.

Events of recent years obviously reflect more credit on Offaly, but Wicklow can still claim some significant "first" visa-vis Offaly.

Step by Step

When Offaly set out in the mid-Seventies to rebuild their fortunes in the wake of the post 1972 slump, the rehabilitation proceeded literally step by step. In 1976, Offaly lost their first round to Meath. A year later they made it to the second round where Wexford sent them packing and in 1978 the end of the line came at the semifinal stage when Dublin won the clash in Portlaoise. Twelve months later, Offaly reached the Provincial final but that was as far as they went as Dublin's late flourish won the day.

Progress was maintained, however, and in 1980 their exit was at the All-Ireland semi-final stage (to Kerry) and it was to Kerry that the verdict was conceded in the 1981 All-Ireland Final.

But the final step in 1982 when Eugene Magee's persistence and patience paid off in the shape of the dramatic win over the "Kingdom". If it had been a long haul, it showed that a county willing to lay its plans carefully and take it a step at a time can make it to the top.

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

Dublin's longest spell without a provincial title was the thirteen years gap between 1942 and 1955.

Brian Smyth was the first Meath man to be presented with the Sam Maguire Cup - in 1949.

Peter McDermott, "The Man in the Cap" never played on a Meath team beaten in a Leinster Final.

When **Dublin** won the All-Ireland title in 1906, they fielded players from 10 different counties - but no native Dubliner.

Pat Reynolds was the first Meath man to be selected as an All-Star in 1971.

When Ireland travelled to Australia in October 1986, **Dublin** had four players on the tour - John O'Leary, Gerry Hargan, Mick Holden and Joe McNally, while Meath had two players, Mick Lyons and his brother Padraig.

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- 1. - 5. Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language is not permitted in any part of the ground.

- **6.** Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any objects on to the pitch.
- Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play and shall be ejected.
- **8.** Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
- The stadium management reserve the right of admission.
- 10. The stadium management reserves the right to refuse admission to or to eject any person who refuses to be searched by a police officer.
- 11. Any person who remains in a gangway or aisle may be ejected from the ground.
- 12. The G.A.A. reserves the right for its servants or agents to remove from the stadium any person who does not comly with the Ground Regulations or whose presence on the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.


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
