* Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon, have won the Donegal Senior Football Championship 12 times: 1929–Aodh Ruadh 0-7, Killygordon 0-5. 1932–Aodh Ruadh 1-7, Dungloe 0-1. 1937–Aodh Ruadh 3-8, Gaoth Dobhair 4-2. 1939–Aodh Ruadh 3-8, Gaoth Dobhair 0-2. 1942–Aodh Ruadh 0-6, Gaoth Dobhair 0-2. 1943–Aodh Ruadh 2-8, Glenties 1-4. 1943–Aodh Ruadh 1-9, Convoy 2-1. 1951–Aodh Ruadh 1-6, St. Eunan's 1-5. 1986–Aodh Ruadh 1-8, Red Hugh's 0-5. 1987–Aodh Ruadh 2-10, Kilcar 1-7. 1994–Aodh Ruadh 0-10, N. 1998–Aodh Ruadh 1-11, N. Columba 0-11. They have lost 5 finals (1940, 1945, 1956, 1957, 1989). They contest their 18th final today.

* St. Eunan's Letterkenny, have won the Donegal Senior Football Championship 7 times:

1948–St. Eunan's 1-7, Gaoth Dobhair 2-1. 1956–St. Eunan's 0-8, Ballyshannon 1-2. 1960–St. Eunan's 0-11, Gaoth Dobhair 0-3. 1967–St. Eunan's 1-13, St. Joseph's 1-9. 1969–St. Eunan's 0-10, St. Joseph's 1-4. 1972–St. Eunan's 2-12, Clanna Gael 1-8. 1983–St. Eunan's 0-8, Ardara 0-3.

St. Eunan's have reached the county final on eleven other occasions: 1944, 1946, 1947, 1949, 1950, 1951, 1952, 1955, 1958, 1974, 1997. The 1950 final was not played and the 1997 final was lost following a protest.

* Letterkenny Rovers won the 1927 County Championship and contested the 1926 and 1930 finals.

* St. Joseph's (Ballyshannon-Bundoran) were County Senior Football champions on 7 occasions - 1965, 1968, 1970, 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976. It could be said, therefore, that the Dr. Maguire Cup has come to Ballyshannon on 19 occasions.

* Leading the Donegal Senior Football Championship Roll of Honour are:

12–Gaoth Dobhair and Ballyshannon.7–St. Eunan's, St. Joseph's, Dungloe.

* St. Eunan's and Aodh Ruadh have met three times in County Senior Football Championship Final - 1951, 1956, 1997.

* Sylvester Maguire is the only player to have played in Ballyshannon's last five successful finals.

* It would seem that Jimmy White is the first referee since 1957 to referee a Donegal County Senior Football Championship Final having already won a Senior Championship medal. Peadar McGeehin refereed the 1957 final.

Other senior medal winners to referee the senior final include: John McDermott (Ballyshannon), Owenie McFadden (Gweedore), Tom Gallagher (Ardara).

It's a chance to redress the saga of 1997-Houston

There is a saying in football that if your not on a mantle from Seamus Temple in 1994. team in a major final the next best thing is to be in management. That's the position. St Eunan's boss. Michael Houston finds himself in again for the second time in three seasons and if his charges pull off a win today. Houston admitted this week it would be " a dream come true"

Two years ago the St Eunan's college schoolteacher watched his side defeat Aodh Ruadh (Bally-shannon) by just a single point to capture the Dr Maguire Cup. The Cathedral town men had been reduced to fourteen men early in the second half and endured an astonishing seven minutes of injury time to lift the title for the first time in fourteen years.

The players, management, and supporters revelled in the glory and the town celebrated for days. However the title was taken off St Eunan's in the boardroom after Ballyshannon successfully lodged an objection over the eligibility of Leslie McGettigan.

The saga has been well documented but is still a bitter pill to swallow. Houston believes Sunday's final offers his players the opportunity to redress the painful memories of the 1997 final.

"The final gives the players the chance to show how good they are. They are a great bunch of players and it is every manager's dream to lift a county title. I am quietly confident we can take them but the hunger has got to be there to do it. It's a goal we set ourselves at the start of the year and hopefully we can pull it off," Houston said.

The Glenfin was appointed manager of St Eunan's in 1994. He spent four studying to be a Physical Education Teacher in Thomond College in Limerick from 1974-78

The highlight of his college days came in 1978 when Thomond participated and won the Limerick county club championship. They went on to win the Munster and All-Ireland titles in the 1977-78 season. Houston played at right full and right half back on the side which included players like Mike and Pat Spillane (Kerry), and Brian Talty (Galway).

He made his senior debut for Donegal in a National League match against Fermanagh in 1977 and played in the 1979 semi-final against Monaghan.

The call came back from Glenfin in 1984 and Houston won two Senior Shield medals and a Senior Gaeltacht medal. He rejoined St Eunan's in 1991, won a Junior Championship title in 1993 and acted as trainer to the senior squad before taking over the

"It's a great occasion for the club and an opportunity for the players to achieve something special. There is a great spirit in the club and an appearance in the county final enhances all the work that has been going on within the club over recent years. It's a vindication of the work that has been happening in the past three to four years," he said. Houston accepts his side got the championship off to a slow start but have made steady progress.

"We got off to a sluggish start in Glenties. That wasn't altogether that surprising because we hadn't got the lads together as a collective unit because of work commitments and others who were in Dublin. After a one point defeat in Glenties we got together and in the replay we were convincing winners. We played with much more fluency, cohesion and spirit in the second leg and that has carried since," he added.

"Against Ardara we had to work hard for the win but we came away in the second half and after a slow start to the semi-final against Four Masters we pulled away. The team has been well conditioned by our trainer, Sean Reilly who has made a very positive contribution to our success so far. He has applied a rigorous training structure and his training philosophy is very good," he said.

The St Eunan's manager believes Sunday's game will be won or lost at midfield.

"The midfield area will be crucial to the outcome of Sunday's game. If can break even in there and get the ball in directly to the forward line it could swing the game in our favour. Ballyshannon are the top team in the county and we will have to be at the absolute peak of our game to win" the team manager said.

Houston cast his eve over Ballyshannon in their semi-final win over Gweedotre and was impressed.

"They have some very good quality players such as Brian Roper and John Duffy and the midfield pairing is very strong. The defence don't give away many frees. It will take a good team to beat them. I feel we have the squad to challenge for this one and we will not be far away. it's down to how the players perform on the day." he said.

On a personal note the team manager said it would be a dream come true for him to lead to the side to victory.

"It's means everything to me to win this game. It would redress the saga of 1997. It's any manager's dream," he concluded.

Fiction, you might say, but whatever about whoever contests that final, one thing is assured, it will be well and truly filmed by video much more sophisticated than we have to-day.

Since then, Haran has been one of the highlights of this St. Eunan's team with inspirational performances in the centre of the field in the quarter and semi finals.

Ardara provided the

opposition for St. Eunan's in the Quarter Final. Given the fact that they had knocked out Dungloe in the first round, Ardara were certainly going to be no easy pushovers for Eunan's.

And that is indeed how events turned out in MacCumhaill Park in mid-August when the young Ardara side pushed their opponents right to the end.

St. Eunan's though were just that bit too strong and their greater experience and sheer strength in the right areas of the park saw them run out winners by 1-16 to 1-12, with Charlie Mulgrew getting their goal early in the second half.

The semi final against Tom Conaghan's Four Masters was a strange affair to say the least. The sides went in level at 0-6 apiece at the break but St. Eunan's ran out comfortable winners after a blistering second half performance.

Kevin Winston and team captain, Brendan Kilcoyne got the goals as the Leterkenny side won by 2-16 to 0-7.

That victory left St. Eunan's back in the final against Aodh Ruadh - a club who '97 aside, have not tasted defeat in a County Senior final in over 50 years.

Victory today would mean so much to both clubs, their towns and their supporters. Defeat is simply unimaginable.

The teams are very evenly matched - probably more so than two years ago when St. Eunan's won by a point. Would it be any great surprise if we were to find ourselves back here again for a replay? Best wishes to St. Eunan's from

Aodh Ruadh 90 years old

On October 24th next, the Aodh Ruadh Club will be 90 years old, having been founded in 1909. The club was founded after a public meeting was inspired by a call from the local branch of the Gaelic League "to consider the advisability of having some Irish games started in the town. Sen

The club was founded on Sunday, 24th and at the meeting the admission fee to the games was fixed at one shilling and a membership fee of one penny per week was levied.

The first hurling and football practices took place in the 'Workhouse Meadow', now known as Munday's Field at West Rock on Sunday, October 31st, 1909.

Capitalising on the local talent available and particularly on an established hurling tradition, the club since its inception has met with significant success in both hurling and football and has the following successes:

The development of Fr. Tierney Park culminated in the opening in 1954, and in the eighties further progress was made with the erection of the first ever stand in the county. Other major development in recent years has been the purchasing of Munday's Field (where the club played its first games) and the building of modern dressing rooms and tunnel onto main pitch.

Recently a further development has taken place with the building of a press box and dressing rooms, which will be ready for use soon.

The club was also the first in the county to have a club shop from which all club gear, etc., can be purchased, along with other Gaelic games literature, flags, county jerseys, etc.

Over the years numerous players from the club have represented the county at all levels, while at administration level, the club also has a very high level of involvement.

Eunan's - Distinguished 69 year history

St. Eunan's GAA Club was formed in 1930 and in its first year of existence, the senior team reached the championship final which they lost to Dungloe, 3-2 to 2-3.

The first task the officers of the club set themselves upon its formation was the acquisition of a proper site for its activities. Little time was wasted in this regard and they purchased a field of just over seven acres at Sallaghrane on the outskirts of Letterkenny for £300 and named it O'Donnell Park.

The official opening of the venue took place on May 2, 1937. The double header that day consisted of a hurling match between Donegal and Antrim and a football match between Donegal and Armagh. 1-7 to 2-1 to capture their first senior crown. St. Eunan's qualified for the inals of 1949, 1950, 1951 and 1952, but they had to wait until 1956 to be

St. Eunan's next appearance in a county final came in 1944. However, they were denied championship glory in 1944, and in their subsequent two final decider appearances in 1945 and 1946 by the famous Gweedore team. Two years later, they

eventually made the breakthrough and defeated the four in a row winning Gweedore side by

2-12 to 1-8 was the winning margin over Clan na Gael (now Four Masters) in the senior final of 1972. In 1974, they met St.

Joseph's and again, the Cathedral Town got the upper hand, winning 1- to 1-4.

Nine years elapsed before Eunan's were back in the big time and in the low scoring final of 1983, they beat Ardara 0-8 to 0-3.

While the club's senior side failed to make an impression in its golden jubilee year of 1980, they did lift the junior championship title and thus secured the one accolade which had eluded them up until then.

1980 was also the year St. Eunan's were winners of the All-Ireland Club of the Year in their category.

In recent years, the club has made tremendous strides in relation to hurling, the senior ladies have earned a reputation as the best and most consistent group of players in Donegal, while the camogie team made a winning return to competition when winning the county title recently.

In its distinguished 69 year history, the club has also won the under-21 football title twice, the minor football championship eleven times and eleven under-16 football crowns.

Since the draw for the 1999 Senior Football Championship made it obvious that reigning champions Aodh Ruadh and St. Eunan's could only meet if both reached the final, the general feeling throughout the county was that it was likely that both teams would come through to contest what will be hopefully a cracker of a game today.

Today's final contains all the ingredients for a super game. There is little between these two fine teams and apart from their football skills other things like nerves, commitment and determination will also be factors on that pitch today.

For some reason, and I am not at all sure why, my head has been telling me that Aodh Ruadh should be favourites and can overcome the pressure to win another title. However, as a Letterkenny man, first and last, it is no surprise that whatever the head is saying the heart believes that this St. Eunan's team will win today, and again it is hard to say exactly why, except perhaps that despite what some might say it does no harm at all to sometimes let the heart rule the head. We shall see!

Down mastered at second attempt

1974 saw the coming of age for Donegal football with another milestone, after mastering Ulster kingpins Down at the third attempt in an Ulster final.

That should probably read, the fourth attempt, as the 1974 decider went to a replay. Donegal had lost Ulster finals in 1963 and 1966, but at last they got the better of the Mourne men after two very close encounters.

There are many memories of the two games, and then of failing to the Johnny Tobininspired Galway in the All-Ireland semi-final, after losing Seamus Bonner through injury in the first half.

However, Donegal needed a late pointed free from Neilly Gallagher to get a second chance at the Ulster cherry. In the second game they were staring defeat in the face, trailing by nine points, but staged a remarkable recover, thanks in no small way to expertly taken Seamus Bonner penalties, and a matchwinning late goal from Kieran Keeney.

FIRST GAME

In the first game, which ended Donegal 1-14, Down 2-11, had a dramatic opening with a goal at either end, Hughie McClafferty for Donegal and Cecil Ward for Down. At halftime, Down held a narrow advantage, 1-7 to 1-5.

Donegal switched Martin Carney to centrehalf back with Anthony Gallagher going to midfield, buy they were hit with a second Down goal by Peter Rooney to trail by 2-7 to 1-6. Donegal brought in Paul McGettigan and Michael Carr and slowly whittled away the Down lead to one point with four minutes left. Peter Rooney increased the lead but Michael Carr pointed a free before Neilly Gallagher's equalising score.

REPLAY

Donegal snatched victory in the replay by 3-

9 to 1-12. They trailed by a point, 0-6 to 0-5, at the break, but the second half started with a whirlwind of Down attacks to open up a 0-10 to 0-5 gap after only four minutes. A goal from Sean O'Neill opened the gap further to 1-12 to 0-6 and Donegal looked dead and buried.

However, substitute Gerald McElwee was only minutes on the field when he won a penalty for Seamus Bonner to goal. A Neilly Gallagher free was followed by a second penalty, this time Bonner being hauled down. Again Bonner made no mistake to reduce the margin to two points.

Paul McGettigan pulled another point back and then Seamie Granaghan equalised. With two minutes remaining a Finian Ward free arrived in the square via Joe Winston and sub. Kieran Keeney fisted the winning score to the net.

Noel McCole had replaced the injured Alan Kane in goals for the replay and one of the features of the game was a remarkable save from Sean O'Neill in the first half.

MINOR CHAMPIONSHIP FINAL

A refreshing pairing

Like the senior final, the two best minor teams in the county have made it all the way to this year's Minor Championship Final

Gweedore, who captured the last of their seven minor titles back in 1987, are appearing in their first minor showpiece in twelve years.

And while Ardara are bidding for their third minor crown of the '90's and ninth in all, there is still a refreshing look about today's pairing.

This afternoon's opponents who share twenty eight minor final appearances equally between them, are meeting only for the third time on minor county final day.

Gweedore won the first clash in 1958 by a single point 2-5 to 2-4, Ardara avenged that defeat seven years later with a 1-9 to 0-7 victory. Ardara emerged victorious once again in the low scoring 1983 minor decider - the men from the South West coming out on top, 1-3 to 0-2.

Both teams have been most impressive on route to this afternoon's final. In their opening round Gweedore dispensed with Cloughaneely over two games with considerable ease.

It was not just as easy for Packy McGinley's men in the quarter final clash with St

Michael's. A late goal sealing the 1-15 to 1-11 victory for the Gaeltacht men. In the semi final the well oiled Gweedore machine hit Aodh Ruadh for 2-7, conceding a mere four points for a most impressive victory.

Ardara's route on the otherhand has proved a little more hazardous, though it could be argued that they have come through the much tougher side of the the draw. It took three games to separate them and their great rivals Naomh Columba although highly fancied Four Master's proved no match for James McHugh's side in the quarter final.

Their semi final encounter

with Glenfin proved Ardara's stiffest test. In a thrilling contest, it took a replay plus extra time to see them through to today's showdown.

Both of today's teams have their share of county minors and U16' players. Gweedore have four of Anthony Molloy's minor squad - Sean Sweeney in goals, Joseph Duffy in defence Kevin Cassidy and Paul Rua McBride in attack.

Also in the forward line is Patrick McGarvey a young man who has carved out quite a reputation for himself in senior championship football already this season.

Irish compromise rules international Brendan Boyle, along with county minor defender Aidan McHugh are the more experienced members of the Ardara side. McHugh has been hampered by injury in this campaign and has been reduced to a substitute role in most games to date.

Derek Boyle younger brother of Brendan, Stephen McHugh, Johnny Herron and John McGill are all part of Martin McHugh 's county U16 squad.

Given both club's proud tradition combined with the talent on display in this tie has all the ingredients to be a really super Minor Final.
