



MONAGHAN V DONEGAL

Monaghan have a special incentive to go all the way in this year's Ulster u-21 Hurling Shield Championship. It was in last year's decider that the Farney county fell to an Armagh side who raised their game on the day to lift the title. Today Monaghan are ready to pursue their ambition against a Donegal side that overcame Fermanagh in rather emphatic fashion, driving home the message that there is a new wave of under-age talent emerging in the north west county.

For their part, Monaghan defeated Cavan last weekend in fact, the real surprise is that they did not win by a much greater margin than 0-12 to 0-3 even though they were without a few regulars for a variety of reasons. It was that victory which has added considerable impetus to today's game and if Donegal can rightly feel that they have an injection of fresh talent, then Monaghan can take heart from the fact that several players who helped the county lift the Ulster Minor Hurling B League last year are already beginning to make an impact at U-21 level.

And Monaghan are suddenly finding that the 'dual factor' is beginning to surface although happily it is not impacting too severely on their resources. Among the talented players who are currently excelling at both hurling and football at U21 level are Paul Meegan, Padraig Dowdall and Darren McGill - a trio who can provide the spark to enhance Monaghan's status at U21 level, perhaps in both codes.

Donegal, too, have their quota of stars and none is shining brighter than Jamsie Donnelly, one of their most consistent performers in the under age bracket. Donegal have been placing considerable emphasis on nurturing new talent and already the signs are that in the next few years the county will achieve progress in the under age sphere.

In both Monaghan and Donegal such progress is only possible because of the hard work being done by coaches and team mentors and the self-sacrifice on the part of the players themselves.

Obviously the visionary Burt club is giving a lead in Donegal and their efforts are being complemented by those in the clubs where hurling is now being given a higher profile.

Both the Monaghan and Donegal County Boards are helping to nurture the sport even more at grassroots level and it is no coincidence that there is now a much greater awareness of the sport within the various schools in both counties.

It is certainly encouraging to note that today's game offers the players from the competing sides the opportunity to parade their skills in front of a much bigger crowd than might otherwise be possible and the commitment of the participants and their back up teams is in sharp contrast to that of say, Kerry who were unable to fulfil their All Ireland series game against Down simply because of apathy - and that's at senior level too.

Long may hurling continue to flourish in Ulster - we may not be the very best but at least we are prepared to turn up!

THREE TYRONE VICTORIES OF THE 'FIFTIES.

1953:- Tyrone 0-12, Donegal 0-6.

This was a first round meeting of the counties and they clashed at Ballybofey on Sunday 14th June 1953. Unfortunately, a steady drizzle persisted throughout the game and the standard of play suffered as a result, but both sides still deserve great credit for serving up a very clean and very sporting encounter. Refereed by TJ O'Reilly of Cavan, Donegal were in the lead at half-time on a score-line of - Donegal 0-5, Tyrone 0-3, but it was Tyrone who were much the better side in the second half and they confined the opposition to a single score during that period.

1954:- Tyrone 1-7, Donegal 1-5.

This was a reversal of the previous year's meeting when the sides met at Dungannon on Sunday 13th June. The home side ended up with a winning margin of two points, but this hardly represented their territorial superiority throughout the game. Tyrone had the backing of a strong breeze in the opening half and led at the half-way stage by 1-4 to 0-4. There was little between them with only five minutes remaining, but Iggy Jones, playing a captain's part, sent over the winners and put Tyrone through to a semi-final meeting with Cavan. The game was refereed by J.O'Hare from Down and the attendance was 3,000.

Tyrone defeated Armagh, 3-5 to 2-9, in the opening round at Lurgan, only two weeks after their

Tyrone defeated Armagh, 3-5 to 2-9, in the opening round at Lurgan, only two weeks after their return from New York, the first team from the Six Counties ever to have been invited across the Atlantic. Donegal overcame Down, 3-2 to 0-3, also in the first round, and so the two counties met in the semi-final at Breifine Park, Cavan, on 14th July. Tyrone started in whirlwind fashion and were 1-2 to nil up after only ten minutes, but then Donegal staged a remarkable come-back and had two goals in the space of three minutes to give them the lead. The sides went to the dressing rooms for the half-time break on level terms - Tyrone 2-2, Donegal 2-2. In the end it was Tyrone's superior speed and fitness that won the day, and they went forward to their fourth Ulster Final, in which they would retain their title by defeating Derry, 1-9 to 0-10.


This game is often referred to as the 'Eddie Devlin Semi-final' as he was the most outstanding player on the field and gave an exhibition of Gaelic Football as how it should be played.

And yes there was a certain logic to that particular argument for after all they had won the last two All Irelands.

But then along came Fermanagh and Cavan and on successive Sundays they left Tyrone and Armagh respectively both shaken and stirred.

Not only did they go so close to defying the odds, but they unwittingly offered fresh hope to Brian McEniff's Donegal who experienced few problems in disposing of Antrim at Ballybofey. If Tyrone and Armagh are as good as has been suggested then a very good case can also be made for Donegal, All Ireland semi finalists 12 months ago and quarter finalists the previous season. They seem to reserve their best football for this time of year and on their day with the sun on their backs they are more than a match for most championship hopefuls.



KEEP THE EYE ON THE BALL - SO TO SPEAK

With all the talk of Armagh and the Ulster final in Croke Park, Tyrone would do well to keep their eye on the ball, so to speak. Whatever about the players and management, too many Tyrone supporters are looking beyond a Donegal team which has banana skin written all over it.

The McKenna Cup has never been much of a yardstick but for what it's worth, Tyrone beat their north-western neighbours out of sight last time the sides met. Since then Tyrone have strung together some excellent league performances and have even managed to get the mandatory bad game out of their system (against Fermanagh last time out). All nicely poised, you might say, for a reasonably comfortable win today and that final showdown with

But here's two of a whole ream of reasons why Tyrone should tread warily. Firstly, reigning champions always run out of steam sooner or later. Best for the wheels to come off early in the spring when there's still time to carry out running repairs. Mickey Harte doesn't believe in slacking off, not even for the McKenna Cup, and Tyrone folk must be hoping that he can keep her lit for a few months yet.

Secondly - not that you need reminding - form goes out the window in Ulster, and this year's championship has been strangely short on surprises. Coming off the Fermanagh game, Tyrone will have been well warned, but all this loose talk of Armagh and boys playing for places can unsettle even the most focussed of teams.

Contrast that with Donegal where you can be guaranteed that nobody, not even the most ardent of optimists, is looking further than this afternoon. One game, one chance to dethrone the All-Ireland champions and make it a year to remember, regardless of what happens next.

Since last September Tyrone have shown tremendous character and resilience; they look like a side that hasn't been sated by that solitary All-Ireland win. But few outsiders know Tyrone football better than Brian McEniff and if there's any chinks - mental or otherwise in Tyrone's armour, the wily Bundoran man will gladly exploit them.



DONEGAL AND TYRONE IN THE CHAMPIONSHIP.

Donegal and Tyrone have met on thirteen occasions in the Ulster Senior Football Championship, and the Tyrone men are well ahead with nine victories to their credit as against four for Donegal.

Donegal's Successful Years:- 1919, 1972, 1974 and 1979.

Tyrone's Years of Victory:- 1924, 1943, 1953, 1954, 1957, 1973, 1980, 1989 and 1994.

FIRST AND LAST CHAMPIONSHIP MEETINGS.

First Ever Meeting:- 1919:- Donegal 4-3, Tyrone 2-0.

Donegal and Tyrone met for the first time ever in the Ulster Senior Football Championship in 1919. The counties met at Strabane on Sunday 25th May of that year and, before a crowd of some 1,200 spectators, the visiting side proved victorious on a rather unusual score-line of 4-3 to 2-0. Rarely, even in those early days, did a team score only goals and fail to raise a single white flag, but it happened on this occasion when the home side failed to get the ball over the cross-bar. Donegal led at half-time by 1-3 to 0-0 but all the excitement appears to have been reserved for the second half when no less than five goals were scored - three for Donegal and two for Tyrone.

The last occasion on which the counties met in the Senior Championship was in 1994, when they clashed at the semi-final stage at Breifne Park in Cavan on Sunday 26th July of that year. Donegal had beaten Antrim, 1-12 to 1-9, in the first round while Tyrone had overcome Armagh, 3-10 to 1-10, also in the opening round. On a dreadfully wet and windy day, Donegal received an early set-back when Martin McHugh was stretchered off injured. At half-time it was:- Tyrone 0-6, Donegal 0-4, while the game was marked by a marvellous individual display of defensive play by Tyrone's Fay Devlin. Peter Canavan was also in fine scoring form with six points to his credit. At the conclusion, Tyrone team manager Art MacRory was a very happy man, while the Donegal manager, Brian McEniff, announced his retirement. Tyrone later lost to Down (1-11 to 1-17) in the Ulster Final at Clones on 17th July.


He will note that they struggled for long periods against Fermanagh and he will be convinced his side can take the All Ireland champions. A talented Donegal team

THREE DONEGAL VICTORIES OF THE 'SEVENTIES.

1972:- Donegal 2-13, Tyrone 1-11.

Donegal opened their account with 1-8 to 0-8 victory over Down in the first round and then got the better of Cavan in a replay, 2-11 to 1-9, at the semi-final stage. They had drawn with the Breifne men, 0-12 to 2-6, in their first clash. Tyrone, in the other half of the draw, defeated Armagh, 0-13 to 1-7, in the opening round and then qualified for the Final with a 1-8 to 0-9 victory over Derry in the semi-final. Thus Donegal and Tyrone qualified for the 1972 Ulster Final to be played at Clones. In a very exciting and high scoring game Donegal took the title for the first time ever on a final score-line of:- Donegal 2-13, Tyrone 1-11. The teams lined out as follows:-

The sides met in the opening round of the 1974 Ulster Championship at Ballybofey on 16th June, but Tyrone, the reigning champions, went under to the home side on a final score-line of Donegal 1-9, Tyrone 0-8. In a very clean and sporting game, Donegal led at half-time by 0-6 to 0-2, and it was a late goal by Kieran Keeney that really decided the issue. The game had attracted much attention and a huge crowd of some 15,000 turned up to witness a thrilling contest.




