



On behalf of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael, I welcome you all to Páirc an Chrócaigh today for what promises to be three highly entertaining games. I welcome in particular the Players, Team Mentors and County Board Officials from the two participating counties plus the Players, Team Mentors and Officials from the four participating Colleges and the Officers from the Second Level Schools Council. I wish all the teams well in their endeavours. I also welcome our Match Officials and hope they also have an enjoyable and successful afternoon.

Cumann Lúthchleas Gael is grateful for the generous support of our sponsors and I especially welcome the representatives of Allianz who sponsor the National Hurling and Football Leagues.

Reaching the All-Ireland Colleges Final in a major achievement for today's four finalists, but the opportunity to play the finals in Croke Park will significantly enhance the occasion. I am delighted to see the two games in Croke Park this afternoon and I have said on many occasions that such finals deserve to be played on the biggest stage in the land.

The hurling final is a unique pairing with the Waterford side looking for a first title. Their opponents from Kilkenny came through the "back-door" route and will be looking for their second title, having won their only title in 1981. The hurling final in recent years has thrown up some great contests and I expect today's encounter to reach a similarly high standard.

Both Omagh CBS and Tralee CBS will be chasing a first title at this level this afternoon and with the rivalry so intense between Kerry and Tyrone sides today's final will surely deliver the same high intensity encounter that we have become used to when the senior intercounty sides meet. Last year's final between St. Pat's from Navan and Abbey CBS from Newry was a classic and showed the exceptional standards that are now reached in this grade of football. Like the hurling final, I have no doubt we will witness many of the stars of the future in both of today's games.

It is fitting that the two most consistent teams in Division 1 of the Allianz National Football League should contest today's final. Both Mayo and Donegal have impressed right from the start of the year and, despite some tight encounters along the way, they both displayed admirable character to set up today's encounter. Mayo had to dig deep to get the better of their neighbours Galway last Sunday, while opponents Donegal also had a tough encounter with a gallant Kildare. Mayo are second to Kerry in the National League roll of honour with eleven titles, with the last in 2001, and they will no doubt be hoping to capture a twelfth title this afternoon and build a high level of confidence in the side as they start their Connacht Championship in a few weeks time against Galway. Donegal have yet to capture a National Football League title, but the county has experienced much frustration at this stage of the competition. Although the side has a vital championship outing against Armagh in a few weeks time, they too realise that winning a league title would give the side a big confidence boost as they set out on the Ulster championship trail.

I gave the recent G.A.A. Congress an update on the planned renovation programme for the Croke Park pitch. The programme will commence next Monday and will be finalised in time for the Leinster S.F.C. games on the 20th May. An on-going maintenance programme will continue during the summer. The pitch has experienced a lot of activity since the beginning of the year and with little natural grass growth during that period until recently, it needs more attention than usual at this time.

I wish you all an enjoyable afternoon and I thank you for travelling to Croke Park. I appeal to you all to take great care on the roads today as you drive home from Croke Park. We must all play our part to eliminate or at least lessen the level of tragedy on our roads.

AN RÉITEOIR

JOHN BANNON (AN LONGFORT)

John somewhat surprisingly referees his first Allianz National Football League Division I final today. His big refereeing ambition now is to take charge of an Ulster senior final for the first time.

Bannon is no stranger to big games at Croke Park. He refereed the All-Ireland senior finals of 1998 and 2002 and the AIB All-Ireland club summit six years ago. He has been refereeing at intercounty level since 1992.

A member of the Legan Sarsfields club, John is a former player and won county championship medals at Senior "B", Intermediate and Junior.



THE BIG GAP

Kerry currently top the list of National Football League winners with a massive 18 titles - seven ahead of their closest rivals Mayo, but remarkable to relate the Kingdom experienced a long period of frustration when the honours remained tantalisingly beyond their grasp. The 'wilderness year' began in the wake of their four-in-a-row success of 1928-1932, and though they were often the team to beat in the late thirties, forties and early fifties, they were still in pursuit of a fifth title when they faced Derry in the 1959 decider. The 27-year gap was bridged in style with a 2-8 to 1-8 win in a great final.

It is of interest to note that by the time Kerry secured their fifth triumph, Mayo, their closest rivals in the current roll of honour, had already amassed nine titles.

IN THE PROVINCE

The first-ever National League final (1926) involved two teams from the same province - Dublin and Laois, and Munster followed with the 1932 decider between Cork and Kerry. However, it was to be a long time before these provinces would be joined by an Ulster or Connacht pairing. Down and Cavan provided the first all-Ulster decider in 1960, but there was a wait of another 21 years before Connacht achieved such a feat with the meeting of Galway and Roscommon in 1981.

But, although Connacht and Ulster have been slow to provide the final two, they have been less reticent in providing all four semi/finalists. Ulster managed it for the first time in 1985 when the 'last four' were Armagh. Down, Monaghan and Tyrone, while in 2001 Galway, Sligo, Mayo and Roscommon constituted the penultimate round.

NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE FINAL



history could be made on the double in this appealing Allianz National Football League Division I final.

 This is the first final between Donegal and Mayo and the North-Westerners are bidding for a first title.

Donegal are appearing in the final for the fourth time, although this will actually be their fifth appearance in the showpiece game. They made their final debut in 1993 when, as All-Ireland champions, they played a draw at 0-9 each with Dublin. The Metropolitans won the replay by 0-12 to 0-8.

 Donegal lost to Derry in their next final appearance in 1995 and a year later contested their last final—again with the Oak Leaf County as the opposition.

A goal by centre half forward Noel Hegarty after twenty-eight minutes helped Donegal to turn over just two points in arrears at the break—1-7 to 1-5.

The issue was still finely balanced after fifty-two minutes with Derry ahead by 1-11 to 1-9. However, Derry had the better of the final-quarter and five unanswered points left them good winners by 1-16 to 1-9. Hegarty was Donegal's leading marksman with 1-1. Brian Roper lined out at right full forward.

 Mayo, in sharp contrast, are second in the winners list with 11 titles. Their last success was in 2001. They beat Galway in that final at Croke Park by 0-13 to 0-12 at Croke Park before an attendance of 22.623.

Midfielder David Brady had an outstanding game, while James Gill was Mayo's top scorer with three points.

James Nallen went into the team at the start of the second half. The Mayo team also included Trevor Mortimer and Marty McNicholas who, like Nallen, have appeared in the current campaign. Mayo's 2001 final win was the last recorded by a Connacht county.

- The last final that failed to produce a goal was the meeting of Tyrone and Cavan at Clones in 2002, when the O'Neill County triumphed by 0-16 to 0-7 to capture their first title.
- Tyrone retained the title the following year—the
 last county to make a successful defence of
 the crown. The did not score a goal in their
 final success over Laois—the last occasion a
 county won a final without raising a green flag.
- The last year a new name was inscribed on the Roll of Honour was 2005 when Armagh beat Wexford for what now also ranks as the last title win by an Ulster county.
- Clones was also the venue for the last final replay. Derry and Meath each scored 1-12 in the 2000 summit at Croke Park and the Oak Leaf County won the replay by 1-8 to 0-9.

The schools around the corner are not the same

hose of us who remember the late Paddy Crosbie's groundbreaking television programme on RTÉ in the 1960s will instantly sing the catchy jingle which was associated with The School Around The Corner.

Ironically, that same decade coincided with the truly heady days of colleges' GAA when crowds in the region of 15,000 were commonplace at the Hogan Cup and Croke Cup deciders. Nowadays, while undoubtedly every young boy's ambition to be part of a team which wins the All-Ireland final in football or hurling remains undiminished, much of the glamour associated with the two great competitions has gone. The cheer leaders: 'two-four-six-eight, who do we appreciate?' etc. is confined to the past as boarding schools become fewer and fewer. The huge buzz which games brought to schoolboys, for whom an 'away' game in the Harty Cup or whatever was often their only escape' from school for weeks/months on end, is no longer the case.

The corollary to this (do students still learn theorems and corollaries?) is that day schools are now more and more prominent in the latter stages of the competitions, a great and welcome transformation. Today new champions will be crowned in football for the third year in-arow. There is a 50/50 chance of new hurling kingpins and, should Kilkenny CBS triumph, it will be only their second title (1981 was their only success to date).

THE HOGAN CUP

The cup, dedicated to Brother Thomas Hogan, was first played for in 1946 when St. Patrick's, Armagh, under the captaincy of future Armagh and Tyrone star, Pat O'Neill (still hale and hearty and a retired doctor living in Omagh) triumphed in their only final success to date, against the team which was to dominate the competition over the ensuing years with 12 titles, St. Jarlath's, Tuam. The original cup was last received by Pat Sheridan (St. Jarlath's) in 1960 and the 'new' cup, which is still played for, was presented to Larry O'Brien (St. Jarlath's) in 1961. Ironically, this was the Tuam college's only two in-a-row and the 'old' cup remains in the school to this day.

THE CROKE CUP

The hurling competition, dedicated to Archbishop Croke of Cashel and Emly, started two years earlier than the football equivalent, in 1944. St. Flannan's, Ennis were captained to the first of a four-in-a-row by Jim Minogue (a retired priest now living, fit and well, in Castleconnell). The county Clare nursery have 14 Croke Cups to their name but still trail their age-old rivals, St. Kieran's, Kilkenny (16 crowns). The 'old' cup was last presented to the late John Sutton (North Monastery, Cork) in 1960 and Pierce Freaney (St. Kieran's) received the 'new' cup the following year. The original cup is still used for an annual challenge between St. Flannan's and St. Kieran's (although word has it that Flannan's rest their 'Jamesies' and Kieran's hide their 'D.J.s' in anticipation of a championship clash!)

Good luck to all four finalists today and may you continue the wonderful tradition of sportsmanship and fair play which have been indelibly linked to the Hogan Cup and Croke Cup since their inception in the 1940s.

De La Salle Port Láirge reach the big stage



ne uniqueness of to-day's All Ireland hurling Final should not be understated for a number of reasons, least of which is the fact that one of the teams has never, in it's illustrious history, ever been at the table as the groom on the big day. Mar sin cuirfimíd fáilte uí cheallaigh roimh imreoirí, roghnóirí, agus locht tacaíochta chuig Páirc an Chrócaigh inniú. The proud College of De La Salle have earned their time in the sun. This is their defining moment on the big stage. This day will live long in the memory of many, who will speak with authority about the day the school played an All Ireland Final in Croke Park. Some might even think that the playing in Croke Park is nearly as important as playing in an All Ireland Final- nearly, but not auite.

When one writes about Colleges hurling – probably the purest sample of our beautiful game — one feels that it is somewhat discourteous to the players of the day to travel into the fadó fadó time.

On this great day, it matters not a pinch of snuff about who played, where, how, and when to the young lads racing out like Spring leverets, away from the despairing grasps of the hunting mobs. Nervous they are. "Bullin" to have a rattle they certainly are. Afraid of failure as a team or in an individual sense they are, but nevertheless, they have earned the right to be where they are, and they, quite rightly, feel that there is no apology to be made for it.

De La Salle have careered through Munster, winning the Harty Cup with style, discipline and verve. They have left the *crème de la crème* of Munster Colleges hurling in their wake. No St.Flannans, no St. Colmans. The ancients of Munster Colleges, North Mon, St.Finbars, Farrenferris, Limerick CBS, Thurles CBS, and the rest have been left in the wash of the good ship De La Salle. Strange how fortunes change over a short period of time. North Mon hasn't won a Munster for thirteen years. Farrenferris haven't collected for twenty-three years. Can you believe that?

Credit the Decies lads. They had no Munster pennant in their trophy room until Shane Power hammered through the St.Flannan's posts in Cashel on March 12th. On a day where you would not put ducks out, the Waterford college certainly deserved to capture their first ever Munster Championship. The post-match scenes of unbridled joy will long live in the memories of those present.

The Kilkenny boys have had a marvellous run thus far. With victories in Leinster over Dublin Colleges, and Good Council of Wexford, they lost the Leinster Final to the Community School, Castlecomer, before coming back to beat St. Flannans in the All Ireland quarter-final. Gort Community fell at the semi-final, just as the Community School in Castlecomer fell to the Waterford college.

Back in 1970, North Monastery from Cork beat Kilkenny CBS in the final. They were trained by Br.A.C.Minniter. The same good Brother came to Kilkenny CBS, and trained them to beat North Mon in the '81 Final. The great Ollie Walsh (RIP) was one of Br.Minniter's advisers on that historic day.

Both schools have produced some superb hurling men. John Barron, Fergal Hartley, Steven Frampton, the Brenners, Johnny Mullane, have all worn the Waterford blue with distinction. Latterly, people like Liam Griffin, the former Manager of the Wexford All Ireland winning team of 1996 was a student in De La Salle, as was Brendan O'Sullivan, one of Kilkenny's great servants.

This Final has all the hallmarks of a thrilling encounter. There is a litany of delightful stickmen in both camps. At the end of the day, there will not be the puck of a hayseed between them, but whichever team climbs those Hogan Stand steps as victors, they can be assured of two things. They will justifiably claim bragging rights as the best College hurling team in the land. They can be assured that their exploits will be spoken of when sparrows build nest in old men's beards. Unleash the lions, and let the game begin!

De La Salle Port Láirge

De La Salle College was first established as a Training College for Primary School Teachers in 1892. However, due to changes in national education policy, it was closed in 1939. It opened as a Boarding and Day school for boys in 1949, the Boarding section ceased in 1990, and it is now one of the largest secondary schools in the south east.

The Promotion of games, and in particular, the promotion of our national games has always been a hallmark of the College. Many county hurlers and footballers have learned their skills at the college down the years. Tribute must be paid to the many teachers and brothers who have



unselfishly give of their time to promote and coach hurling and football teams and other sports activities throughout the colleges' history. This saw the realisation of a dream for all associated with the College by reaching today's All-Ireland Final having won the Dr. Harty Cup for the first time. De La Salle College, now looks forward to further successes in College Championships in the year ahead.

Scoil na mBráthair Cill Chainnigh

Kilkenny CBS was founded in 1859 and has always been proud in advancing the cause of Gaelic games and Irish cultural activities. Kilkenny CBS has been a front-runner in producing top class performers on Kilkenny teams of all age groups. James McGarry, past pupil, is the present Kilkenny goalkeeper as was Michael Walsh before him. Jim Langton, Sean Clohosey, John Marnell, Dick O'Hara, John Hoyne, Joe

Hennessy, Dan O'Neill and Brian Barry, are but a few of the celebrated names to have passed through CBS.

This is the school's fourth appearance in the All-Ireland final. In its first adventure in 1970 CBS were narrowly beaten by the North Mon, Cork. These two schools met again in the final in 1981 and on this occasion Kilkenny CBS landed their first win. CBS reached the final again in 1983 only to lose at the

hands of an excellent St. Flannans Ennis team managed by Bishop Willie Walsh. The present team selectors are Paul O'Donoghue, who played Harty Cup hurling with Cashel CBS, Ger Morrissey, who was a staunch opponent of CBS for many years while playing for near neighbours St. Kierans College, and Sean Breathnach who has a link with all four CBS teams to reach an All-Ireland having been a selector on each occasion.



A tale of two counties– and two players!





oday's NFL final will surely be one of mixed emotions for two former players who managed to don the county colours with both Mayo and Donegal. Younger neutrals might know him as a Mayoman, but those old enough to remember the 1970s will recall that Martin Carney lit up the Donegal forward line throughout that decade, playing a vital role in securing Tir Chonaill's first Ulster title in 1972, and repeating the trick in 1974. He later went on to join the select club of six Mayo footballers to have represented their county over 100 times, but still managed to make the Donegal Democrat Millennium Team in 2000!

In the topsy-turvy history of Mayo's adventures in Croke Park, Pádraig Brogan's sensational goal in the 1985 All Ireland semi-final defeat to Dublin stands out as a peak amid the troughs. One of the greatest goals ever scored on the sacred sod, it seemed to indicate the rising greatness of a young man who played minor, under 21 and senior intercounty football in the same year when lining out for Mayo in 1983. That his intercounty career never reached those promised heights was a shame, but its path was fascinating as Brogan also spent a brief interlude playing for Donegal before returning to his native county.

Brian McEniff is Mr. Donegal himself, so it is no surprise that he has an intimate footballing knowledge of both men, but his formative influence on Carney astounded this writer. "I was player coach of the 1972 team, so I played with him and coached him at the same time, but I had also coached him at minor level, and we also won county titles together with the then St. Joseph's Bundoran club." Carney took a teaching job in Swinford, County Mayo, and began playing for the county of his father's birth. "He was a very talented footballer and an exceptional forward, so we were very sad to see him go, but he has a lot of roots in Mayo." His uncle Jackie Carney played on the All Ireland

winning team of 1936 and coached the victorious two in a row team in 1950 and 1951. Another uncle played on those teams — Padraig Carney, the famous flying doctor who returned home from the US for championship matches. "Martin went to college in Galway (attending UCG) and I suppose he got the Mayo thing into his system." reflects McEniff wistfully. "If we had him in 1983 (when Donegal lost by a point to Galway in the All Ireland semi-final), I have no doubt we would have reached the final."

Pádraig Brogan's time in Ulster was fleeting, but memorable in its own way. "He played for Bundoran for about 18 months, made the Donegal panel and came on as a sub in the Ulster final against Down in 1991." recalls McEniff. "He also scored a great winning goal for Ulster in the Railway Cup final in Newry,

but returned to play with Knockmore and Mayo after we lost the NFL quarter final to Dublin in 1992." When Mayo and Donegal crossed swords in the All Ireland semi-final that year, Brogan's introduction as a second half substitute for Mayo caused a bit of a stir. "We knew there was a possibility he would be playing against us, so we used that as a motivating factor. I think he got a good shoulder from four or five of our lads when he came on!" "They were lining up to say hello!" was how Brogan himself put it, "but they were a fine bunch of lads and I was delighted for them when they won the All Ireland."

Martin Carney is part of John O'Mahony's backroom team for today's decider, while Pádraig Brogan will surely be keeping an eye on his native county's fortunes from Castlebar. No doubt there will be a brief pang of sentimentality for both men when Donegal take the field but, as ever with the GAA, such sympathies will disappear the instant the ball is thrown in!




RALLIED


It has been an impressive march by Donegal to this stage and one that is bound to prove a real confidence booster as they strive to succeed where no Donegal side has prospered so far.


MAYO 0-13



The Connacht county have not looked back since losing by three points to Donegal at Ballybofey in round two back in February. They made it six wins in succession by seeing off keen Western rivals Galway in last Sunday's semi-final at Croke Park.

The kick was saved by the Galway goalkeeper, but Alan Dillon was on hand to finish to the net.


EDGED AHEAD

ohn Doyle has put himself in a very strong position to finish the top scorer nationally for Division I of the Allianz National Football League following his 1-6 for Kildare in their unsuccessful outing last Sunday.

He comfortably passed out the then leader, Steven McDonnell (Armagh), by four points. Doyle bowed out of the campaign with 1-43 (46 points) in eight games at an average of 5.75 points a game.

He failed to score on just one outing. However, McDonnell has fractionally the better match averages of the two at six points for a total of 4-30 (42 points) in seven games.

Doyle's closest rival as far as the forwards engaged in the final are

concerned is Conor Mortimer, but he certainly has an uphill task to finish in the premier position.

The Mayo scoring ace is ten points behind Doyle with 4-24 (36 points) in seven games, with an average fractionally below the leader of 5.14 points.

JOHN DOYLE ON TRAIL FOR SCORING DOUBLE

ohn Doyle, who is the leader in the nationwide chart for the League, is also the pace-setter in the individual match returns.

He lost no time in staking a strong claim for the premier position by opening his campaign with 0-11 in Kildare's winning start against Armagh at Droichead Nua in the first round in early February.

No player has bettered that return in the build-up to this novel final. Doyle recorded the highest individual match score in the semi-finals last Sunday at 1-6, the goal from a penalty, in Kildare's loss to Donegal.

Three footballers share second place in the review on ten points. James Masters scored 0-10, the second highest points total, as distinct from goals and points combined, against Fermanagh at Clones at the beginning of the month.

A week later Conor Mortimer and Steven McDonnell each reached the ten points marker. Mortimer helped himself to 3-1 (the top goal scoring return) in Mayo's win over Tyrone at Omagh, while McDonnell's 2-4 was a key factor in Armagh's win over Westmeath at Crossmaglen.

FINAL SCORING FEATS

TONY MCTAGUE STILL THE MAN TO BEAT

Ithough there have been some impressive individual match returns in the run-in to this unique Allianz National Football League Division I final, the game will rank as an extra special one if any forward sets a new peak for a decider since 1960.

After all, Tony McTague (Offaly), one of the outstanding score-getters of any era, set a superb target for forwards to aim at with 0-12 against Kerry in 1973. Eleven of his points were from frees.

Despite the excellent finishing of left half forward McTague, who was his county's captain, the Faithful County still went down by 2-12 to 0-14.


That particular final was something of a vintage one for individual match returns as Brendan Lynch played a major role in orchestrating the Kingdom win by scoring 2-3.

Back to the McTague scoring spectacular. He relieved Mick O'Connell of the top spot as the legendary Kerry man had led the way with 0-9 against New York in the second leg of the two-leg final of 1969 that went to extra time in boiling heat of the Big Apple.

O'Connell only took his place in the Kerry side after the interval in normal time. The Kingdom won by 2-33 to 2-24 on aggregate scores over the two games.

However, Steven McDonnell has since moved into second place as a result of his 0-10 for Armagh in their 2005 final win over Wexford for a first-ever title.


With Donegal engaged in this final, it is interesting that one of the top returns was recorded against the North-West County—1-5 by Anthony Tohill (Derry) in 1996.

THE LONG, LONG ROAD

he early decades of the National League were less than rewarding for Donegal and, in fact, through the late twenties, thirties and forties they toiled in the lower reaches of the competition.

The first mention of Donegal in the available records was in the 1930/31 season in what was described as a Northern section of Division Two where they beat Derry (2-6 to 1-4) and Fermanagh (1-5 to 0-2), but that appeared to be the sum total of their outings in that campaign.

For the next few years Donegal made little impression, though they did record an occasional victory over several Ulster counties. But the 1936/37 competition saw Donegal made a bid for the Division Two title, the final of which they qualified for by beating Antrim (4-8 to 2-6), Tyrone (2-5 to 2-4) and Derry (1-8 to 0-4). Prospects of making a winning entry in the record books were bright when they opposed Longford in the final at Ardara, but on the day the visitors emerged victorious by 1-7 to 1-4.

That was as close to gaining league honours at any level that Donegal came for a long time. When the leagues resumed after the Emergency break (1945/46) Donegal didn't appear until the following season when the campaign was blighted by the very severe winter. Donegal did have two outings in which they lost to eventual champions Derry and defeated Tyrone.

IMPROVED PROSPECTS

By the early fifties Donegal football had improved to a level where they could mount a challenge to the best and this was most certainly the case in 1951/52 as victories over Fermanagh, Tyrone, Armagh and Tyrone again in a play-off led to a further game against Sligo in what nowadays would be described as a quarter/final. The Yeats county were defeated by 2-6 to 0-4 at Glenties as Donegal qualified for their first ever semi/final.

In that penultimate clash against Cork, Donegal scored seven times to the Leesiders' six, but

goals win games and the Rebels triumphed by 3-3 to 0-7. Just to show how far Donegal had come can be gauged from the fact that Cork went on to take the title with wins over Dublin and New York.

As Armagh and Tyrone came to dominate the Ulster scene, Donegal experienced lean times in the league and it wasn't until the 1964/65 campaign that they were again in semi/final action. A great win over Derry had put them within sight of their goal, but Kerry proved too strong (3-10 to 1-8) as did Longford a year later when the knock-stages were again reached.

For the third season in succession (1967/68) Donegal reached the 'last four' only for a controversial refereeing decision to deny them against Galway and, when they qualified again a couple of seasons later, Offaly had too much firepower for them.

AN ULSTER TITLE

Although the seventies brought the long-awaited championship reward in Ulster, there was no joy in the league until 1989/90 when they reached the quarter/final stage only to come a cropper against Meath. The following two seasons saw Donegal lose to Kildare by a point in the semi/final and to Dublin by two points in the quarter/final.

The semi/final barrier was finally breached in 1993 with a five-point win over Clare, but the title went to Dublin on a replay. Two years later Donegal were back in the final, but again they came up short as Derry took the honours, and there was a repeat twelve months later as the same finalists provided the same result.

Since then the best Donegal have mustered is a semi/final loss to Offaly in 1998, a Division 2 semi/final loss to Down in 2004, and a Division 2 Final defeat on a replay to Louth twelve months ago. Few counties can have experienced the frustration to which Donegal have become accustomed, but today could see the turning on a long, long road.

MAGNIFICENT SEVEN

ayo's eleven National League titles may be somewhat short of Kerry's 18, but the green and red's early success embraced the remarkable achievement of seven titles in eight years.

Mayo may have been slow to make a mark in this competition, but even before the breakthrough came in 1934 the Connacht outfit provided stiff opposition for the best as they pushed the big guns of that time to the limit with teams like Kerry, Kildare and Meath struggling to subdue their challenge.

The 1933 semi/final in which Mayo lost to Meath at An Uaimh was a prelude to the most glorious period in the history of Mayo football. Reversing the An Uaimh result in the opening round of the 1933/34 campaign was the ideal opener – 2-4 to 1-5 at Castlebar. A draw with Cavan (1-6 all) at Breffni Park further boosted Mayo's stock and a 2-8 to 0-3 win over reigning Connacht champions Galway left them poised for a place in the final, which was duly gained with a 4-3 to 1-3 win over Louth.

With no semi/final to contest, Mayo took on Dublin in the final at Castlebar, but had to settle for a 2-3 to 1-6 draw with the visitors. After a long delay the replay was staged at Croke Park and though there was little difference between the sides, Mayo took their first league title on a 2-4 to 1-5 scoreline. The team that recorded that historic triumph was drawn from six clubs and lined out – Tom Burke, Paddy O'Loughlin, Paddy Quinn, Purty Kelly, Danno Ryan, Henry Kenny, Patrick Collins, Patsy Flannelly, George Ormsby, Jackie Carney, Peter Laffey, Gerald Courell, Paddy Moclair, Patsy Munnelly.

THE TILE RETAINED

It required six games to qualify for the following year's final. Five of those were victories with Dublin, Louth, Laois, Galway and Meath their victims, with only Kildare at Athy getting the better of the champions. Mayo then defeated Tipperary and Fermanagh in the final at

Castlebar with something to spare.

With the authorities searching for a new format, the 1935/36 league was run on a strictly league system and wins over Cavan, Galway, Louth, Laois, Kildare and Tipperary ensured the title was secured for the third time in succession.

The Mayo cavalcade swept on. A revised format saw Mayo win their group the following season with an unblemished record as Tipperary, Laois, Clare, Offaly, Galway and Kerry were banished to qualify for the final (there were no semi/finals) in which Meath were dispatched by 5-4 to 1-8. Kerry's four-in-a-row had been equalled.

But Mayo's hunger for success had not been sated and the 1937/38 campaign was embarked on with undiminished enthusiasm. The path to the final was almost perfect as Longford, Clare, Laois, Galway and Offaly were defeated, with only Kerry upsetting the champions. Mayo, however, defeated the Kingdom in a play/off (2-8 to 0-7) at Castlebar and the title was retained on the same ground with an easy victory over Wexford (3-9 to 1-3).

SIX-IN-A-ROW

A three-team group provided a short route to the 1938/39 semi/final in which a 3-7 to 0-6 win was recorded over Wexford at Wexford Park. The final was won even more comfortably as Meath were hammered at Ballina by 5-9 to 0-6. A seventh successive title looked a distinct possibility but Mayo withdrew from the league after a dispute arising from the All-Ireland semi/final loss to Kerry and thus ended the most remarkable run in the history of the competition.

Despite the break Mayo returned to action for the last league before the Emergency closedown to record wins over Roscommon, Donegal, Sligo, Cavan, Down and Dublin in the final by 3-5 to 0-7. Seven titles in eight years and it could well have been a clean sweep; it is still a record for league or championship...truly a magnificent seven.
