

Bua Stairiúil Nua-Eabhrac

le Mártan Ó Ciardha

s tráthúil an rud é go bhfuil peileadóirí mionúir Nua-Eabhrac ag imirt ar Pháirc an Chrócaigh an deireadh seachtaine seo mar anseo beagán os cionn 60 bliain ó shin bhuaigh foireann as an gcathair sin an tSraith Náisiúnta Peile don chéad uair ariamh nuair a fuair siad an lámh in uachtar ar an gCábhán sa chluiche ceannais 2-8 in aghaidh 0-12.

Ba é sin an chéad uair ag Nua-Eabhrac a bheith páirteach sa tSraithchomórtas Náisiúnta Peile. Bhíodar san iomaíocht arís an bhliain dar gcionn agus arís ar feadh formhór na seascadaí, tráth ar bhuaigh siad cluiche ceannais na Sraithe Náisiúnta i 1964 agus i 1967. I gcluiche ceannais '64 bhuaigh siad ar Bhaile Átha Cliath 2-12, 1-13 agus comóradh á dhéanamh ar lubhaile Órga Bhord Nua-Eabhrac. Trí bliana dar gcionn bhuaigh siad ar Ghaillimh 7-8, 1-16 i gcluiche ceannais ina raibh dhá bhabhta. Ba i Nua-Eabhrac a himríodh na cluichí ceannais sin ar fad.

Ach ba é bua 1950 i bPáirc an Chrócaigh an ceann ba stairiúla, cluiche a himríodh i lár an tsamhraidh, ar an 30ú Iúil. Bhain foireann Nua-Eabhrac Aerfort na Sionna amach 10 lá roimhe sin agus sular thugadar aghaidh ar Bhaile Átha Cliath, d'imir siad cluiche dúshláine in aghaidh Chiarraí ar Pháirc an Ghearaltaigh i gCill Áirne. Ar na peileadóirí ba aitheanta a bhí acu bhí Bill Carlos, a bhí ar fhoirne Ros Comáin a bhuaigh Corn Mhic Guidhir i 1943

agus i 1944 agus 'Big' Pat McAndrew as Maigh Eo. Bhí an bheirt acu siúd gaibhte ar imirce tar éis dóibh gaiscí a dhéanamh lena gcontaethe dúchais , mar a bhí 'Gega' O' Connor a bhuaigh trí bhonn uile Éireann le Ciarraí, ach nach raibh ar a chumas siúd taisteal go hÉirinn.

Measadh go mbeadh an bua ag an gCábháin gan stró agus go gcuirfeadh an fhoireann iontach seo Sraithchomórtas eile leis na Craobhacha a bhí buaite acu i 1947 agus '48. Ní raibh a fhios go raibh Nua-Eabhrac chomh tapa, oillte agus a bhí agus nuair a tháinig an lá mór, bhain McAndrew lánúsáide as a airde, 6' 4" i lár na páirce agus bhí líne leath-thosach na n-imirceach, an captaen Micí Ó Súilleabháin, Jack Hughes agus Frank Quinn cumasach – an Súilleabhánach (a rugadh agus a tógadh i Nua-Eabhrach) agus Quinn a d'aimsigh na cúil. Laistigh dóibh bhí Paddy Holley thar a bheith cruinn agus bhuaigh Nua-Eabhac 2-8 in aghaidh 0-12.





Five League Finals to Remember

Denis Hurley delves into the archives and recalls five of the most memorable finals in the history of the Football League.

MAYO 5-9 MEATH 0-6

May 14, 1939

This was the final league win of Mayo's amazing six titles in a row between 1933-'34 and '38-39, a period in which the Westerners played 41 matches in the competition, winning 37, drawing two and losing two, though just one All-Ireland was claimed in the same timeframe.

While a close match had been anticipated as Meath sought to avenge their defeat at the same

Meath sought to avenge their defeat at the same stage in 1937, shouted on by a large home crowd in Ballina, Mayo got off to a great start, captain Paddy Moclair finding the net early on.

Despite that boost for the hosts, the opening 20 minutes were a close affair and frees from Tony Donnelly helped Meath back into contention at 1–1 to 0–3 before Moclair's second goal.

By half-time, Mayo's lead had extended to 2–4 to 0–4, the midfield partnership of Colm O'Toole and Henry Kenny (father of the current Taoiseach) helping them find supremacy.

Another goal followed from Paddy Munnelly early in the second half and only for Hughie McEnroe in the Meath goal, Mayo would have been well out of sight long before the end.



As it was, late green flags courtesy of George Ormsby – direct from a '50' – and Jackie Carney put further gloss on the scoreline, but Mayo did not get a chance to win seven in a row as they refused to take part in the 1939-'40 competition due to grievances over the events of the 1939 All-Ireland semi-final replay against Kerry.

DOWN 0-12 CAVAN 0-9

May 8, 1960

While the League champions have not always gone on to claim Sam Maguire the following September – it has happened 20 of 78 times – from 1958-'60 this was the case, the only occurrence of it happening three times in a row.

Of course, none of the 49,451 present at Croke Park for this first all-Ulster final (a record attendance at the time for a League final in either code) would have known that this win for Down over their Ulster rivals would lead to them going on to become one of the game's dominant forces in the 1960s.

At the same time few would have expected Cavan to still be waiting for a Senior All-Ireland title but that was what panned out, so this game could be seen as a turning point in the game's history. The game itself was far from a classic – there were 54 frees awarded over the 60 minutes – but the Mourne Men did enough to claim victory. In captain Kevin Mussen they had an inspired leader, with Seán O'Neill and sub Kieran Denvir very impressive. In contrast, Cavan free-taker Jim McDonnell was not his usual reliable self from frees but still contributed a lot.

Afterwards, jubilant Down supporters chaired their heroes from the field. It would not be the last time that it would happen in Croke Park that year.

ROSCOMMON 0-15 CORK 1-3

May 13, 1979

While Down's 1960 victory led to greater things for the county, unfortunately for Roscommon, the win of 1979 did not prove to be a similar springboard, coming closest to an All-Ireland in 1980 only to lose to Kerry.

That should not diminish the achievement of steamrolling Cork here, though, when midfielder Dermot Earley put in an immaculate performance at midfield, scoring seven points.

He was not the only hero, though, as Roscommon were on top throughout the pitch, wing-back Danny Murray and centre-forward John O'Gara prominent as Cork were limited to just two points in the first half.

A Jimmy Barry-Murphy goal gave Cork brief hope but further chances of green flags were wasted and despite the loss of the influential Tony Heneghan to injury, Roscommon took the honours.

DUBLIN 1-9 KILDARE 0-10


May 5, 1991

As surprising as it may seem, Dublin have won just one league title since this victory over a Kildare side in its first year under the stewardship of Mick O'Dwyer. In front of a Croke Park crowd of just under 45,000, Dublin looked like easy winners for long stages, Paddy Cullen's side leading by four points at half-time, Vinny Murphy with a sixthminute goal.

Two fine John O'Leary saves – from Jarlath Gilroy after 17 minutes and Johnny McDonald nine minutes later – ensured that the Dubs were in a good position at the interval, but as the second half progressed the Lilywhites came back into the game more and more.

At midfield there was a fine battle between Dublin's Dave Foran and Paul Clarke and their opponents' pairing of Martin Lynch and Seán McGovern, but while Kildare were doing well, the Dublin half-back line of Tommy Carr, Keith Barr and Eamonn Heary were commanding in the face of strong pressure.

Dublin suffered a blow when Barr was sent off 13 minutes from time for a second booking, but Jack Sheedy could have had a decisive goal for them only to tip a Charlie Redmond delivery over the bar.



Instead, Kildare pressed and reduced the lead to one, but ultimately they could not reel the Dubs in fully.

CORK 0-12 DUBLIN 1-7

May 9, 1999

This was the third time that today's protagonists met in the final after the deciders of 1952 and '89, and the Rebels made it three out of three against the Dubs in front of a small crowd at Páirc Uí Chaoimh.

With the Cork defence in miserly form, they limited the visitors to just two points from play, Owen Sexton putting in a commanding performance at centre-back while Joe Kavanagh orchestrated the forward division from number 11 and captain Philip Clifford gave Shane Ryan plenty of bother. To emphasise just how solid Cork were in defence, Dublin were held scoreless from the ninth minute until the 25th, and again from minutes 33 to 46, and even when the rearguard was breached, the Dublin forwards were then frustrated by the heroics of goalkeeper Kevin O'Dwyer. At half-time Cork led by 0-5 to 0-3, a lead which would have been even more commanding but for two Declan Darcy frees.

Cork had a good start to the second half, extending their lead to 0-10 to 0-4 and things got worse for Dublin when sub Jason Sherlock was shown a red card. A late Darren Homan goal for Dublin did cut the Rebels' lead to 0-12 to 1-7 but Cork were not going to be denied.

A Fitting Finale to the Allianz Leagues

Today's finals in Croke Park bring the curtain down on what has been one of the most competitive campaigns in the history of the Allianz Football Leagues.

t has been remarked upon a number of times in recent years how the Allianz Football League has tended to start with a bang and end with a whimper, but today's double-header at Croke Park should quickly dispel such talk. The meeting of the reigning All-Ireland champions and the game's biggest crowd-pullers ensures that the 2011 competition enjoys a fitting finale.

This afternoon's curtain-raiser will also grab the attention as Donegal and Laois meet just a fortnight after their final-round clash at O'Moore Park, where a sublime performance by MJ Tierney (1–10) helped the hosts clinch their final berth with a four-point winning margin. However, the visitors were all but assured of their final place before that meeting and may well reverse that result.

Can Cork do likewise against Dublin after their 0-16 to 3-13 loss in Round 2? Perhaps, but Dublin were just one of two unbeaten teams in this year's group stages (Roscommon were the other) with their ability to plunder goals a major factor in that run. Betting against the holders of both major titles seems foolish, but the suspicion is that the Metropolitans may just edge it.





Today's Referees



MARTY DUFFY (SLIGEACH)

Marty helped to usher in the GAA 125 celebrations as referee of the Tyrone-Dublin Allianz Football League tie at Croke Park in January of 2009. That was the start of a great year for the Enniscrone/Kilglass clubman. He went on to referee the Allianz Football League final between Kerry and Derry and joined the ranks of All-Ireland Senior final referees when he controlled the Kerry-Cork summit. Duffy, who received the Vodafone Referee of the Year award for 2009, added another All-Ireland final to his record last season - the Cadbury GAA U21 summit between Dublin and Donegal.

This year, Marty has taken charge of the Dublin-Kerry Allianz Football League clash at Croke Park, and was also on duty when Kildare played Meath in Division II last month.



JOE McQUILLAN (AN CABHÁN)

Joe is in his sixth season on the inter-county panel. He was on duty in Croke Park last year when he refereed the All-Ireland quarter-final between Kerry and Down and the GAA All-Ireland Qualifier Round 3 match between Dublin and Armagh. The Kill Shamrocks clubman has refereed Senior Championship games in all four provinces and his impressive CV also includes All-Ireland final engagements. He was the man-in-the-middle at the Cadbury GAA All-Ireland U21 final in 2006 and the AlB GAA Senior Club Championship decider two years later. Joe was also in charge of the Allianz Football League opener between Dublin and Armagh on February 5.

Pundits' Predictions

SEÁN MEGOLDBICK SUNDAY WORLD



Dublin v Cork: Dublin's need to win a national title is far more pressing than Cork's. Provided Dublin keep their discipline and don't present Daniel Goulding with simple chances from frees as they did in last year's All-Ireland semi-final they will prevail.

VERDICT: DUBLIN.

Donegal v Laois: This will be an interesting tactical battle between two of the country's newest bosses, Jim McGuinness and Justin McNulty. Perhaps Michael Murphy will shade the shoot-out against Michael John Tierney. VERDICT: DONEGAL.

GORDON MANNING, THE IRISH SUN



Dublin v Cork: Just like Cork did last year, Dublin see League success as a route to Championship glory.
Cork will not want to lose to Dublin again. But Dublin are the form team and winning it will mean more to them than Cork, VERDICT: DUBLIN

Laois v Donegal: Injury problems could hamper Donegal's chances but the Ulster men will have revenge on their minds after losing to Laois in the last round of group games. VERDICT: DONEGAL

GONOR MCKEON, EVENING HERALD



Dublin v Cork: Dublin's return to densely populated defence could frustrate Cork and if their inside snipers fire and –vitally – they get close to break even in midfield, Gilroy's men should prevail. VERDICT: DUBLIN

Laois v Donegal: Donegal must vanquish memories of their last visit here while MJ Tierney has been perhaps Ireland's best forward this spring. Laois mustn't fall into the trap of over-reliance. VERDICT: LAOIS

CIAN MURPHY, GAA CORRESPONDENT



Dublin v Cork: Just as Cork used the 2010 League title as an important step on the path to their Sam Maguire glory, Dublin must look on a first Allianz League crown since 1993 in the same sort of psychological vein. Whatever happens, they cannot afford a collapse like Mayo suffered

here last year. VERDICT: DUBLIN

Laois v Donegal: Jim McGuinness kept the Donegal

players back for a talking to after their recent loss in Portlaoise and with their Championship match with Antrim looming up on May 15 they'll feel under pressure to go into that on the back of a win here.

VERDICT: DONEGAL

MICHAEL FOLEY SUNDAY TIMES



Cork v Dublin: A satisfying League campaign for both teams. Dublin carry the greater momentum into the final, but Cork are building steadily towards Championship pace. It's a day to lay down a marker. VERDICT: CORK

Donegal v Laois: Donegal might have seen too many promising League campaigns followed by poor Championships to invest too much stock in today. Laois, though, haven't won a national Senior title since 1986. VERDICT: LAOIS



Dublin v Cork: Dublin's highoctane performances and the significance of winning a national title should edge it here. Cork have made it to the final playing well within themselves. This is an opportunity for Dublin to atone for last summer's late slip-up against Cork.

VERDICT: DUBLIN

Donegal v Laois: Donegal appear blighted with injury ahead of this game. They ought to have learned more than Laois from their recent League game and their senior players have the experience of winning the Division 1 title in 2007. A tight game in prospect. VERDICT: DONEGAL

Shooting Star Burning Brightly Again

One of the stars of Laois' most celebrated underage teams, MJ Tierney is in the form of his life and back enjoying his football.



ften, one of the unwanted consequences of being an underage prodigy is the burden of pressure that stalks the rest of your career.

Laois has sent forth more talented footballers than a pond might tadpoles over the last 15 years.

Ever since 1996, when the county won a breakthrough All-Ireland Minor title and added a second a year later for good measure, the expectation in the O'Moore County was that success at Senior level would follow as naturally as night follows day.

The stars appeared to be aligned when a first Leinster GAA Senior Championship title in 47 years arrived in 2003, and a trophy-laden future seemed assured when a second wave of underage talent supplemented an already golden crop, yielding a third All-Ireland Minor title the same year.

Despite reaching Leinster finals in four of the next five years, there has been little more in the way of a tangible return at Senior level. Best laid plans and all that.

One of that gilded generation, MJ Tierney, the star turn of the 2003 All-Ireland winning Minor team, has been at the heart of the recent revival of Laois' fortunes, which sees the O'Moore County go in search of a first national title at Senior level since 1986 when they take on Donegal in Croke Park today.

Tierney reflects on that celebrated Minor team and points out that only four of that side were involved in the 1-15 to 1-11 defeat of Donegal two weeks ago, a win that guaranteed their passage to today's final.

"It was expected – and I know myself from being on that panel that I expected it – that those 15 players would turn up at Senior level two or three years later and stay winning." he says. "When you look at Cork, Dublin and any of the teams that I would have been playing in Leinster and All-Ireland finals against on the way up, a lot of the players playing in the games against me didn't make it through to Senior level.

"People were expecting a lot of us and I suppose that we presumed that because success came so easy to us at underage level that it was going to come at Senior level but I have learned that lesson harshly that it doesn't work that way. I suppose I have just enjoyed getting back to enjoying football and we are lucky to be in the position we are in."

Tierney, now aged 25, has blossomed under new manager Justin McNulty. Under the Armagh native, Tierney and his Laois team-mates have rediscovered the elemental joy that first drew them to the game. The focus has switched from results to performances and success has followed, he says.

"We have started enjoying playing football. That is the big thing really," the Ballyroan native says. "We got caught up in years gone by on having to win games, and obviously winning is important and that is the ultimate goal at the end of it, but you start playing football to enjoy it.

"I know myself, personally, I had lost the enjoyment and was caught up in how our results were going. People were caught up in how our results were going and it was affecting how I was playing.

"I am presuming it was affecting how I was playing as well. It made us look at why we are here, why we are playing. We play the game because we love it and lucky enough, because we are enjoying it, results have started to come our way."

Perhaps the most obvious manifestation of Tierney's renaissance in a Laois jersey was when he kicked 1-10 of Laois' total in the dress rehearsal for today's game against Donegal two weeks ago. It was a tour de force performance that grabbed all the headlines the next morning.

"The story tells itself to a certain degree," says

Tierney. "I would have been a lot happier to have had 10 scores from open play. A lot of people were patting me on the back, but I know myself that I am not happy with how I performed from play myself.

"I could have done a lot better on the day. I take the frees. If it wasn't me taking them someone else would have taken them and could very easily have kicked 10 points as well.

"I am enjoying it and that is one thing I will agree on. It's great to be able to take the frees for Laois and to be able to put up scores like that, but as I said before I could turn around in the League final and not kick one score. It's the way the luck of football goes. Donegal, I can guarantee it, won't be letting me score too easily in the League final."

Despite his relative youth, Tierney is blessed with a natural maturity and a capacity for self-reflection.

He relocated to Dublin last year, where he works with Topaz, and plays his Club football with Parnells, alongside inter-county team-mate Colm Begley. He makes the trip home to Laois for training twice a week and divides his time between his family home in Ballyroan and the capital.

As well as the demands of playing top-level football, Tierney is a proud new father after the birth of his first child at Christmas. He carries the burden lightly, though, and exudes the air of a man who is more than happy with his lot on the football pitch and on the home front.

Tierney's partner, Nicola, is Scottish and he jokes that she may not have realised what she signed up for when they first met.

"It was tough on her having to get used to going to a stadium that seated 82,500 and I wasn't getting paid for it. She's a Glasgow Celtic girl and she is well used to football and well used to sport, but she didn't really understand everything to do with the GAA and she was wondering why I was gone five nights a week!"




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



Tours of Duty with a Band of Brothers

hose of you that are reading this belong to the most heroic of all GAA categories: the League fans. Cork and Dublin have contributed richly to Gaelic Games since its earliest days but it is hardly any secret that neither county commands the most enthusiastic winter support. You would never mistake the Cork or Dublin away support for the festival crowd at Glastonbury.

Therefore, you, the small band of brothers who follow your teams around the country are probably the most loyal in Ireland. The chances are that you have made several or all of the trips to the remoter parts of Ireland to follow Cork and Dublin through this and many other league seasons. You are metropolitans who share a conviction that your own particular metropolis shines like no other and you might be right about this. You rarely feel the need to take leave of your city but if your football team is operating elsewhere, you are going to be there. With bells on.

You, the winter fans, are the lifers of the Association and you have discovered the rarefied pleasure of following your teams through the stormy and unfashionable months of the League. You know the truth: that the Championship, for all its glory and glamour, is for dilettantes.

To walk up the Jones's Road or to Páirc Uí Chaoimh on a fine June Sunday is all fine and dandy but those salad days of summer, with iced drinks and guests in glad rags watching the sport from behind darkened windows, require no real effort. To make it from Glasnevin or Bantry for a 2.30pm start in Inniskeen or Castlebar: that takes planning.

League fans take their business seriously. You like to leave early and often have a cartographer's knowledge of the back roads and short cuts to the destination. Nobody knows the country as well as



GAA League fans and no group of people are better equipped to explain the changes that the last ten years of prosperity have brought. You can point at the Michelin star gastro pub on the main street of a midlands town and reminisce about the magnificence of the mixed grill that was served there in earlier days. You know which petrol stations still have pump attendants, which town has the best newsagents and where the bad bends on the road are.

You will know which mountain range is interfering with the radio reception from Montrose and you won't mind anyway because half of the pleasure of driving on a Sunday morning is in the silence of it. When you get to the match town, you will leave the car on a side street and stretch your legs with a stroll through the main street, strangers in a strange land. League fans dress for all kinds of weather, often all at once. You tend to be umbrella fetishists, carrying all manner of size and colour in the boot of your cars.

League weather is notoriously changeable and its followers know that. Often, you will appear at the ground looking like Chris Bonnington in the old Bovril adverts in anticipation of driving winds and hail storms but by half time, you will stand in short sleeves enjoying the sudden and unannounced appearance of spring sunshine.

And if the rewards of a League match are more subtle than the all-consuming satisfaction of a Championship win, they can be just as deep. It is on League days that you might get your first glimpse of a once-in-a-generation wonder – a Canty or a

Brogan. It is on League days that some of the epic names of the game – Cooper or McGuigan or Joyce – might do something unbelievable on the field, gifting the crowd with some sleight of hand or foot that would look indulgent in the Championship.

In the League, you can happily attend a match while eating lunch, reading the paper and listening to several other games on the radio. At the League, you can hear the managers shouting instructions. If you want, you can stand outside the dressing room door afterwards so your kid can have a few moments with the stars.

You see the players wearing jerseys so crumpled that it looks as if Conor Counihan or Pat Gilroy just pulled them down from the clothesline before dashing off for the match. At League games, you sometimes see the corner back that you believed would never slow up realising that he doesn't have it anymore.

After most League games, you will hightail it for home but once in a blue moon you will stop into a pub and find yourself received like exotics and you will say to hell with Monday and you will book into a B&B and you will have a great evening. Funny thing is that you will remember it for years after big Championship days are forgotten.

You have followed your team through the League and you know exactly how they got here, to the final, today. And the perfect thing about a League final is that while a win may mark the beginning of something special, a loss does not mean the end of anything at all.







Patrick Kelly: Centre of Attention

In his third year as a recognised starter, Cork's Patrick Kelly has had to do some adapting over the spring as he has been chosen at centre-forward rather than manning either of the wings, as he has done since his introduction.



s well as the physical manifestations of the Sam Maguire Cup, the medals, the winter-long celebrations and the team holiday, winning an All-Ireland also seems to provide some intangible benefits.

It's a quality that's hard to quantify, but there is little doubting that a team's mental strength is increased by going the distance and climbing the Hogan Stand steps. It's a journey that makes other challenges seem trifling in comparison. For instance, before this year it would have been difficult to imagine a Cork side stealing victory in an Allianz League game in Tralee with two late points, while the win over Armagh to get to today's decider was a fine example of triumph in adversity, the Rebels playing splendidly in the final 20 minutes following Eoin Cadogan's red card. Having the tag of champions means that such things are expected rather than hoped for, and Cork half-forward Patrick Kelly agrees that the status change can be noticeable.

"It does ease a bit of the pressure," he says, "the last couple of years we've had people saying that it was 18, 19, 20 years without an All-Ireland. Finally getting there, all that talk is gone now, instead we've people saying how good we are and all that, but we have to ignore that now and get back to what we did last year."

The flipside of the coin, however, is that the champions are there to be knocked by everybody else, with opponents relishing the chance to take the scalp of the country's number one side. "Exactly, that's one thing we're well aware of this year," Kelly says.

"We know ourselves from going up against Tyrone and Kerry in previous years that when you're playing the All-Ireland champions you want to have a right good crack off them to know where you're at in terms of Championship credentials.
"I'm sure every team will want to do that against
us this year so it's up to us to deal with that and
produce the goods against them."

The first team to take the chance of putting one over on Conor Counihan's side were today's opponents, Dublin, who prevailed in the second round of fixtures back in February.

While Cork obviously want to win today, it's not necessarily a case of settling scores, according to Kelly.

"I don't think it's a case of revenge anyway," he savs.

"That was very early in the season, we weren't back that long after our holiday so we weren't totally upset by that defeat.

"The Allianz League final is a standalone fixture, it's great preparation for us for the Championship ahead, a big game in Croke Park is always a bonus."

That it's a game against the team regarded as the country's form side can be taken as a positive from the Rebels' point of view, a chance to evaluate their own standing ahead of their title defence.


"Dublin have been the form side of the League so far this season," Kelly says "they've won all their games bar the last one against Galway.

"They've been racking up big scores and I've been very impressed by them, in their own backyard it's going to be a very tough game but it's ideal preparation for the Championship in a month's time.

"We're looking forward to it and it should be a good battle."

At this stage last year, Mayo were going into the League final against Cork with more than an outside chance of victory. Instead, the Westerners failed to perform and were roundly beaten. While Cork went on to the League and Championship double, Mayo lost to Sligo and then Longford, their season over by early July. Regardless of who wins today, Kelly can't foresee a similar outcome for the vanquished. "I'd say not," he says. "At the end of the day, it's still only April, if we meet again later in the year, you're looking at August, or September hopefully, but it's a good guide for us to see where we're at at this time of year.

"It's not too often you get to play in Croke Park,



we haven't been there since the All-Ireland final so for us to get back out there, and for the newer lads to get a taste of it, is good too."

In his third year as a recognised starter, Kelly has had to do some adapting over the spring as he has been chosen at centre-forward rather than manning either of the wings, as he has done since his introduction.

It might not be much of a journey on paper from ten or 12 to 11, but the reality is less simple. "They're very different positions," he says. "The way we play, the emphasis these days is on wingforwards coming deep, there's a lot of work going back. Centre-forward is very much about holding the line on the 45, you've less running and tracking back but you're on the ball more and in more dangerous positions."


And he has tried to make the most of those dangerous positions, scoring a goal in the match against Down in March. Trying to increase the number of green flags has been a collective effort. "I suppose we all have been trying to get more goals," he says. "We're aware that we haven't been the most prolific team when it comes to goals, but at the same time we've put up good tallies in terms of points.

"We practice taking goal chances in training and thankfully a few goals have come this year in the League so hopefully we can continue that in the Championship."



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

Skills of the Game The Free Kick

The presence of an accurate and reliable free-taker is crucial to the success of any team. Two of the best exponents of the skill share their insights and thoughts on taking frees.



study of the statistics from the final round of games in the 2011 Allianz Football League on April 9-10, conducted by the GAA's Coaching and Games Development Department, showed that 27 per cent of scores were from placed balls.

While there is a huge degree of technical skill required to kick over from distance, from the hands or the ground, there are a number of factors that affect this ability and the GAA's OTú Coaching Model can help to identify those.

The model identifies six aspects of play and each has a role to play in taking a free kick for a score. Technical Proficiency refers to the player's ability to perform the required technique correctly while Tactical Awareness refers to the player's decision-making ability; would he be better to play it short to a team mate? If he does go short, Team Play is relevant as team-mates need to be on the same wavelength.

Physical Fitness is also relevant as the ability of the player to shoot from distance is directly related to the power they can generate in the kicking action. Psychological Focus is key and maintaining composure, particularly under pressure, is an attribute all the best free takers have. Participant Feedback should also be referred to; is the player better suited to shooting from the ground or the hand and what do his and the broader statistics say about this?

Two of Gaelic football's finest dead ball strikers are in action in Croke Park today. Dublin's Bernard Brogan was the second highest scorer in the 2010 All-Ireland Championship, while MJ Tierney of Laois demonstrated his skill with a haul of 0-10

from placed balls in the defeat of Donegal on April 10.

Here, MJ and Bernard share some of their insights on the art of free-taking.

ROUTINE: MITIERNEY

MJ Tierney, who kicks from the ground, has been following the same routine since he developed his individual style aged 16.

"The most important thing is to concentrate on the steps and the breathing involved," he says. "That's just a relaxation technique. I studied Sports Psychology towards the end of my college term and the more reading I did, I got a better understanding of it.

"I also have a very specific routine, and the boys on the team always slag me about it, because I lick my thumbs before I take the frees. To be honest that came from Charlie Redmond when I was 16. But I have kept it in it and it has always been part of my routine."



ROUTINE: BERNARD BROGAN

Footballer of the Year Bernard Brogan has been forced to kick from the hands because of a cruciate knee injury he suffered earlier in his career, but he also follows the same routine every time he addresses the ball.

"I take a couple of bounces and a couple of deep breaths to settle myself. I then step over for three steps and sling it."

VISUALISATION: MI TIERNEY

"The easiest way to explain it is that before I strike a ball, even the way I place the ball, I know how the kick is going to look and how the ball is going to look when it is travelling through the air because I have kicked it so many times before.

"The whole thing people say about the routine taking the pressure out of the kick and out of the stadium is because you have practiced it so many times outside the stadium that you have seen that kick outside the stadium."

BREATHING: BERNARD BROGAN

"I think if you take a couple of deep breaths and slow everything down it alleviates all the pressure. You put the crowd out of your head, pick your spot where you want to go and do what you have done before. Think of it as if you are in your back garden kicking balls."

LEARNING FROM THE BEST: MI TIERNEY

"Jonny Wilkinson was one of the references in the Sports Psychology thesis I did for my final year of study. I read extensively into what he does and I followed a bit of Ronan O'Gara, even David Beckham, people that take kicks and strike it off the ground to see how they approach it."

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT: BERNARD BROGAN

"Once the clock goes back and with the longer evenings I go out on my own with Ray Boyne from the Dublin backroom team and I bang over about 100 balls on the nights that we are off training. I read Jonny Wilkinson's book and he practiced religiously and was hugely demanding of himself. That's why he was so good. If you want to follow his lead you really have to put in the hours."



Croke Park Safety and General Information

REGULATIONS Páirc an Chrócaigh

- 1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Rules (which are designated to protect the Health and Safety of all entrants to the ground). Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all of these Rules.
- The management reserves the right of admission
- The instructions of the stewards must be obeyed at all times.
- All persons entering the ground agree to be searched by a member of the
- Every person (including infants) entering the ground must have a ticket. The following are not permitted:
- 6.1 Entry upon the pitch or engaging in conduct that causes or is likely to cause injury or harm to, or otherwise interferes with, disrupts, hinders, or distracts a person playing in, refereeing or otherwise having a role in a match at this around
- 6.2 Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.3 The climbing of floodlights or other pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behavior constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.4 Throwing of objects onto the pitch. 6.5 Remaining or loitering in any gangway
- 6.6 Behaving in an offensive or indecent
- manner
- 6.7 Bringing of alcohol into the ground. 6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
- 6.9 Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
- If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any
- Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that

Safety and General Information

Supporters are asked to respect the fact that they are entering and leaving the stadium through residential areas.



Safety Notice

In the interests of safety, patrons will not be allowed to enter the playing area after the games.



The policy to prohibit such encroachment in the future has been taken to avoid further injuries and possible fatality and has been taken on the advice and promptings of the safety authorities, namely the Gardai, Dublin City Council, Fire Brigade and the HSE. The full co-operation of supporters is requested to avoid serious injury and to ensure that games can be enjoyed without resource to fencing or avoidable obstructions to seeing action from all vantage


