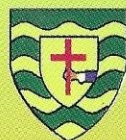

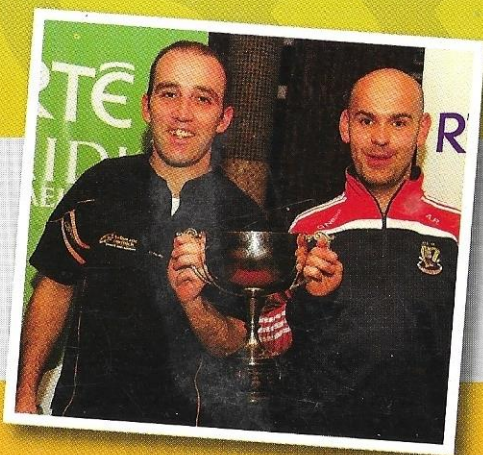

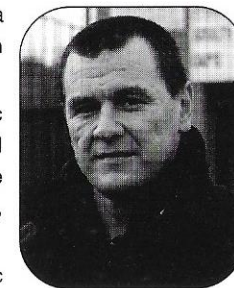

## GROUND REGULATIONS

02. Fireworks, smoke canisters, gas-horns, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground and any person in found to be in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground
03. The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
04. The unauthorized climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in this ground strictly forbidden.
05. Unnecessary noise from the use of radio sets, gas-horns and behavior likely to cause confusion Of nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
06. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object the pitch.
07. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
08. Any person who fails to comply with the instruction from a Garda or Steward may be ejected from the ground.
09. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
10. The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochána.
11. Any person who remains in or obstructs a gangway or circulation area may be ejected from the ground.
12. The Ground Management reserve the right for it's servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligation under Section 18(3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to anyone using the grounds.

## CLG Gleann tSúilí - A Brief History

What a fantastic occasion it is for the players, management and supporters of Glenswilly Gaa Club to once again be here in Pairc Sheain Mhic Cumhaill in Ballybofey on County Final Day. It is an amazing achievement for this group of players to be taking part today in their fourth Senior final in 7 years.

Glenswilly Club is located in the centre of County Donegal on the outskirts of Letterkenny. This area is contained within the Letterkenny and Stranorlor electoral areas and covers part of the Donegal Gaeltacht area. C.L.G. Gleann t-Súilí is in a rural area with Glendowan and Glenswilly national schools being the local schools and Churchill being the only village.

The club, founded in 1982 has had proud successes both on and off the pitch. The club moved down to its current location at Pairc Naomh Columba in Foxhall around 1995. We now have a large clubhouse, dressing rooms, a flood lit Prunty pitch, gym and a large multipurpose community hall which caters for all kinds of social events such as indoor sports, plays, concerts and dancing.

C.L.G. Gleann t-Súilí has teams representing the club at all age levels and their successes are a great reflection of all the work that is put in at underage level in the club. Our Ladies teams have had success down the years and 2014 saw a return of Ladies football once again in the Glen. Our third team is going from strength to strength and played in the Final of the Junior B championship earlier this year where they were defeated by Ardara. This

team continues to attract players back to the club, getting people involved again in the life of the club and local community as well as developing younger players before moving on to the Reserve and Senior squads.

Today we meet St Eunans for the second time in a county final. The first meeting took place back in 2007 in only the club's 2nd year at Senior Championship level. St. Eunans proved much too strong for us on that day. The club have moved on a lot from their defeat that day and tasted victory in 2011 when we met St Michaels and won our first ever Senior championship title, followed by our second title defeating Killybegs in the 2013 final and capped off the club's finest year to date with a run all the way to the Ulster Club Final where we were narrowly beaten by Ballinderry Shamrocks. This followed the great successes down the years winning its first Junior B Championship in 1984, Shield in 1991, Division 4 in 1993, U21 B in 1994, Division 4 in 2000, Intermediate Championship in 2005, Division 1 B in 2007, County Senior finalists 2007 and the county Gaeltacht Championship in 2011, Division 2 and Division 2 Reserve in 2013 and Division 5 in 2014.

Finally, we wish to thank you all for coming to support the team today. We are indebted to our many sponsors both large and small who continue to help our club flourish both on and off the field. We wish the team and management every success today in the final and hope it can be another proud and memorable day for Glenswilly.

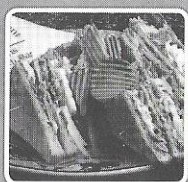
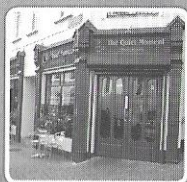
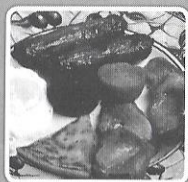

## Naomh Adhamhnáin - A Brief History

In 1917 two former Cavan men, Frank "Steve" Donohoe and Mickey McGovern, held a special meeting in McGovern's Public House, Lr. Main Street, to form a Gaelic football team. A club was formed and called the 'Fag A Bailes'. Other members of that 1917 team included two famous Letterkenny men, Fr. John McMonagle, Glencar, and Johnny McClean, who was the goalkeeper.

The first playing pitch where Gaelic football was played in Letterkenny was situated at the top of the Convent Road where Scoil Colmcille now stands. This club established the Gaelic code in East Donegal until the 'Black and Tan' war reduced their playing numbers to such an extent that they were forced to cease activities in the early 1920's. However, it was not long until the 'good old days', the real magical days of Gaelic football in Letterkenny emerged with the formation of two famous clubs, the Geraldines, formed in 1924, and Letterkenny Rovers

### St. Eunan's Begin

In 1930 saw the foundation of the present St. Eunan's Club. As the famous Geraldines and Rovers were fading from the scene, it was decided to form a new club embracing all interested G.A.A. people in the town into one club and team. They secured their first playing pitch in Glencar and entered teams in all county and local competitions. The first St. Eunans club officers and committee formed were: President, Chief Supt. Leahy; chairman, Supt. Patsy Cronin; secretary, Guard Walsh; treasurer, John Hourihan; committee: John Curran, John Crumlish, Guard Murphy and Guard Mulcahy.

Three of those founders were John Hourihan - the man who did so much in securing the

clubs present grounds, O'Donnell Park, and unpaid groundsman for years; John Crumlish, who with Hourihan played such a significant part in the setting up of the O'Donnell Park and the early development of what we have today in our club; and Johnny Curran (father of well known and respected Sean), whose dedication and shrewd managerial qualities guaranteed G.A.A. for Letterkenny forever.

### Opening of O'Donnell Park

It would appear that the first and foremost task these men of our foundation set themselves was the acquisition of a proper field and club headquarters. They set about and bought a field consisting of 7.024 acres at Sallaghagrane for £300 - a big price in those days - and called it O'Donnell Park. Their tremendous work rate and zeal was rewarded with the opening of the O'Donnell Park on Sunday 2nd May, 1937

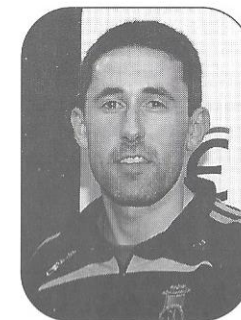
## A word from Naomh Adhamhnáin Team Captain Rory Kavanagh

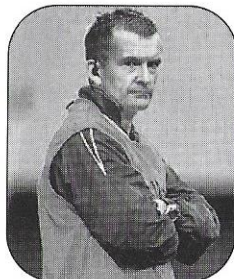

## A word from Glenswilly Senior Team Manager, Gary McDaid

## A word from Naomh Adhamhnáin Manager, Maxi Curran

It's a very proud occasion for me to be involved on the biggest day in the GAA calendar in Donegal. I attended my first County Final 25 years ago and remember well Kilcar defeating Aodh Ruadh, and find it pleasantly ironic that same Kilcar team will be present today. I have watched with envy of the players and managements involved in the many



finals in the intervening years and feel very privileged that the St Eunans club seen fit to allow manage their senior team in 2014 and I am delighted to have repaid that faith somewhat by reaching this stage and can hopefully go all the way now.

Championship 2014 has been a very exciting competition to be involved in, such is the frequency with which the games have been played. Today is our sixth straight weekend of championship football, and while it makes for compelling viewing for spectators, its hugely draining for the players and a huge amount of credit must be given to the players from all teams, who have largely put their lives on hold for the last 2 months in the hope of progressing in this year's championship. A special mention should also be given our county players, who had to put their huge disappointment behind them and go and play for their clubs 6 or 7 days after the All Ireland final and indeed many of minor squad had to do the same. In the case of today's finalists, the county players will be playing their 7th straight championship game, and should there be a winner today, will play an 8th championship game in 8 weeks next Sunday in the Ulster Club competition. This is a huge demand placed on these players and its made all the more remarkable by the performance and hunger levels being produced by the likes of Rory Kavanagh, Michael Murphy and Neil Gallagher, who have driven their respective

teams to the final today, and in the case of Rory, his tenth final appearance.

They needed something from their final group game to progress to the knockout stages and they delivered an excellent performance to beat Killybegs by 13 points and progress to the next round.

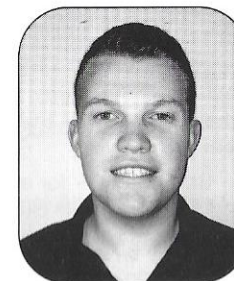

Stand well back and wait for fireworks.

The combustible elements involved in today's senior football final are pretty obvious. It's a derby for sure but there are other components that stand this fixture out from the crowd.

St. Eunan's – for so long the undisputed kingpins of Donegal club football – cast a long shadow that was probably darkest in the Glen. Not only are Glenswilly looking to claim a third senior football title in four appearances since 2007. They also went all the way to an Ulster club final last season and were unlucky not to beat Ballindery.

For a change, Eunan's have had to settle for being the ones on the outside looking in. County titles are one thing but making the purposeful strides the Glen did in Ulster in 2014 must also have stung in-and-around O'Donnell Park.

Across the divide

For Joe Gibbons the disappointment of 2007's loss to Sunday's opposition was a turning point. The occasion got to them. It had come too soon. Progressing quicker than their feet could carry them, that stumble was probably inevitable. But they've since found their stride in the most spectacular of fashions.

"2007 was really a learning curve," said Gibbons. "We learned an awful lot after that to be fair. I remember thinking just after the game that I'd only touched the ball maybe once or twice. It really passed us by that day.

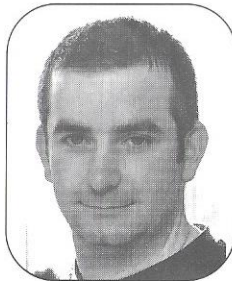
"That was a learning curve – especially for myself."

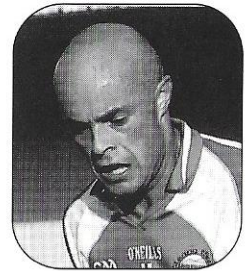

Maxi Curran, in his debut season as manager of St Eunan's, knew the town on the scale of Letterkenny would always provide a quantity of players. 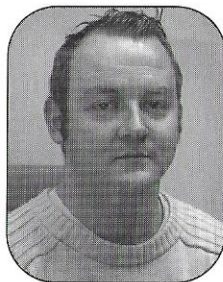
Sean Daffan began his campaign on the bench before progressing to first choice

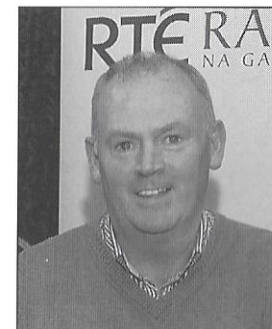

## Magic moment unlocks Aodh Ruadh defence

# McShane goal the key

23-year-old Roger McShane's opportunist goal in the 51st minute when he fisted a mis-hit James McHugh free to the net was the piece of magic wrapped up in good fortune that Kilcar required to unlock a close marking Aodh Ruadh defence in this otherwise unremarkable Senior County final.

The goal proved all important — the game had become so tight, so much a tactical battle of wits with both sides white with fear of error that it was unsurprising that Lady Luck had so much to do with separating these two evenly matched sides.

It was always going to be a case of the side scoring a goal taking the title. Kilcar's McShane needed superbly to make something from nothing — it was, perhaps, the appropriate way of scoring, assuming as Kilcar's superb ability in getting the most from every player, every opportunity.

They showed their strength in depth — captain John Doogan fitted easily into the half-back line instead of John Carr whose hamstring injury failed to improve sufficiently to allow him field. Doogan was marking the Aodh Ruadh ace, Eamus Doyle. Doogan's performance, with that of his half-back colleagues, was one of the cornerstones for the Kilcar victory.

Conversely those same Aodh Ruadh half-forwards, Doyle, Eamus Gallagher and Gerry Curran played well below expectations — a tribute to Kilcar's superb marking and their tactical success in crowding this and the midfield sector.

Despite those below par performances Aodh Ruadh had crept to within a point of Kilcar, the score standing at 0-6 to 0-7 in Kilcar's favour with ten minutes remaining.

Gerry Curran was adjudged to overstep the side-line and the Aodh Ruadh impetus was lost. From the side-line, Roger McShane won a free near the side-line. Aodh Ruadh's Tusk protested and the ball was moved in. James McHugh's free, an effort for a point, fell short of the mark but McShane's moment had arrived when he punched the ball to the net.

Aodh Ruadh's lack deserved them seconds later when they carved Kilcar open, Damien Conlon's pass going to Eamus Gallagher but the centre half-forwards' shot cancelled off the feet of Michael McFadden.

It was one of three clear cut goal chances Aodh Ruadh created in the second half. After four minutes of the new half Brendan Martin got clear after a fine through pass from Gerry Curran but a Kilcar defender blocked Martin's effort.

In the 68th minute Eamus Doyle's effort at goal was deflected for a '45'. Ultimately, Aodh Ruadh's dependence on scores from the dead ball shows just how well contained they were. Only two of their scores came from play, Conlon and Doyle getting them. By contrast Kilcar notched 1-6 from play to underline their superiority.

Ciaran Tinney did an almost perfect man-to-man marking job on Martin McHugh, yet it mattered little in the final analysis as it was Kilcar's other forwards who did the damage, Mark and Roger McShane, in particular, while James McHugh picked up a lot of ball around the middle and started what flowing moves there were in the game.

The exclusion of Aodh Ruadh's Val Murray rubbed eyebrows; Kilcar players

said they were surprised that he didn't come on. Similarly John Duffy's play when he came on in the 26th minute suggested he should have been there sooner.

But possible and probable aside it was Kilcar's determination and hunger for victory that makes them deserving champions. The shadow of defeat in two previous finals hung over them and their search for each other — the poor excellence performance of Christy Gillespie in conceding out and containing the link men between Aodh Ruadh's defence and attack — Brian Tusk — typifies their commitment.

Tactics allowed them crowd out the highflying Sylvester Maguire and he seldom got to leap for a ball without one or two Kilcar men around him. In defence, Michael Carr's experience was critical.

Playing for the most part with a two man half-forward line, Kilcar used their speed to good effect, Roger McShane causing good in the final quarter and Mark McShane steady throughout but exceptional in the last ten minutes.

But the constant image in of Kilcar getting the breaks, Aodh Ruadh missing vital chances. Twice from scorable positions at a crucial stage in the game they trailed by two points, 0-6 to 0-4, Aodh Ruadh's Gerry Curran failed to convert from chances he normally scores. In the 41st he hit the post and Doyle was wide from the rebound and one minute later he was wide again from a '45'.

But Kilcar's Martin McHugh? He delivered the psychological killer blow two minutes later when he pointed from a '45' to stretch the lead to three points. This score, for some observers, was more important than the goal.

To their credit, Aodh Ruadh came back from the goal to narrow the deficit to two points but again, when it mattered most, Martin McHugh slipped out from Tinney's shadow to boot a superb point from the wing.

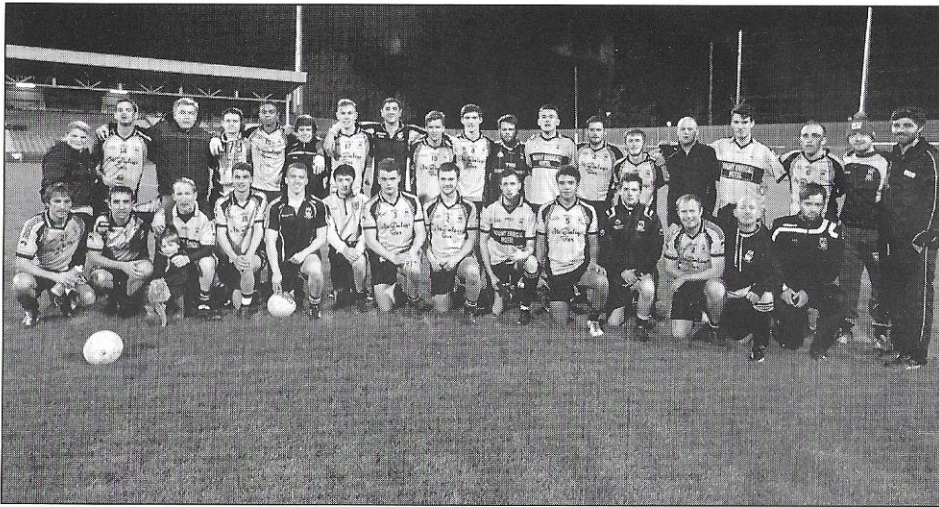
For Aodh Ruadh Diarmuid Keon, John Duffy and Ciaran Tinney were the most impressive while the McShanes, Michael McFadden, McHugh brothers, James and Martin, the half-back line for their marksmen job, and Christy Gillespie for his efforts at containment, deserve particular credit in a dedicated Kilcar line out.

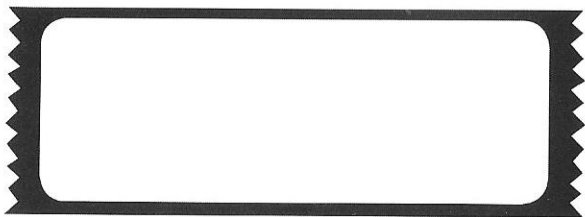

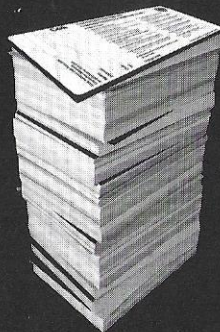

I acknowledge that it will be no easy game against a strong St Eunans team, but I believe if we play to our potential we can win the game.

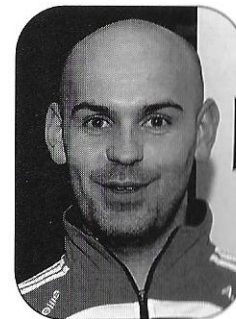

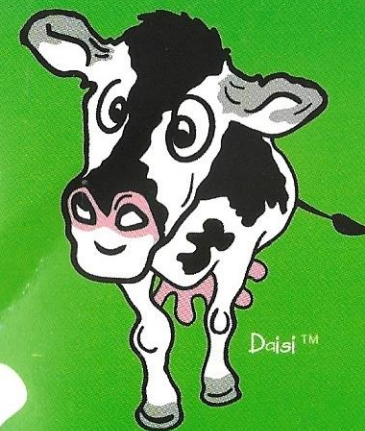

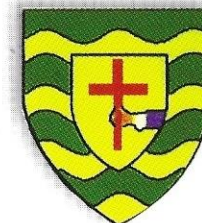
