



VALUING VOLUNTEERS

CORMAC MAC GAIRBHIGH





Is beag a shíl Cormac Mac Gairbhigh nuair a d'fhág sé Rann na Feirste agus thug a aghaidh ar Londain in 1988 go mbeadh sé ar ais ag a chlub dúchais mar chathaoirleach chór a bheith fiche bliain níos moille.

A distinguished player in his time, Cormac tasted success twice as a county player. In 1984 he was part of the All-Ireland winning Vocational team. Three years later Cormac was at college in Limerick and making the twice weekly trip to Donegal for training as part of the U-21 team. The same team that defeated Kerry in Dr. Hyde Park in 1987 to claim our second All-Ireland title at that grade.

That game went to a replay and having started in the first game Cormac was very unlucky not to start the second day. He was involved in a crash on the way to the replay and didn't feature because he arrived late. As we know the likes of JJ Doherty, John and Barry Cunningham, Tommy Ryan, Barry McGowan and Manus Boyle from that team went on to be part of the team to take Sam to the hills for the first time.

A married man and father of two young children, in 1996, Cormac headed for the hills again and wasted no time linking back up with his native club, Naomh Muire. Having been involved with the club in the early years during the 80's Cormac was back in the groove swinging that left foot and captaining the club to the Intermediate title for only the second time in 1998. The same year the club were promoted to Division 1 but Cormac suffered a bad knee injury which would end his playing days.

This did not halt his dedication to the club as Cormac soon took up the role of manager at a time when the club was rebuilding again. He guided the club to a Junior Championship Final in his first year narrowly losing out to Milford after extra time in a replay. Completing his term as manager after two years, Cormac handed over the reins to John Joe Doherty and moved into the position of Chairman.

The following nine years saw massive change at the Banks with the installation of match standard flood lights, a new training pitch and a considerable extension to the clubhouse. Cormac was not only Chairman at this time but was more than happy to get his tools out and help out with the manual labour, the same as so many others within the club did during this development. During his tenure as chairman the club picked up the Division 3 Reserve title in 2006 and were promoted to Division 2 in 2007.

Gaeltachta. Sa bhliain 2009 bhain foireann faoi fiche haon an chluib craobh na Condae B. Dhá bhliain ina dhiaidh sin bhí níos mó cupaí ag teacht na Méillte agus Comórtas Peile na Gaeltacht buaite arís, an t-am se oar an Crois Bhealaigh, igCloich Cheann Fhaola, faoi cheannas Danny Ó Domhnaill.

In 2013 the club were crowned Intermediate champions and Cormac was to sign off in his tenure as Chairman by having the honour of hosting Comórtas Peile na Gaeltacht at the Banks.

As with many other volunteers that give their time to our games, Cormac has not finished his involvement with GAA and is currently the club's County Board Delegate, a position which he relishes and is excellent at and for which the club is extremely grateful. You will also see Cormac fulfilling the other duties that are the life-blood of any club from umpiring at games to tráth na gceist at Scór. Today keep your eye out for him as he is one of our stewards.

MINOR PREVIEW

Ryan McCann

When Mickey Donnelly gives his Tyrone side a team-talk before this afternoon's game in Ballybofey, the Aghaloo clubman could be doing so for the last time.

For the last five years, the former Ardboe and Mayobridge boss has been in charge of the young Red Hands and after guiding them to the 2012 Ulster Championship and an All-Ireland Final appearance in 2013, he has decided that this will be his final season at the helm.

With the help of long-serving assistant Kieran McHugh and three-time All-Ireland winners Ryan McMenamin and Brian McGuigan, Donnelly plans to leave on a high.

In truth, the 2015 Ulster Championship draw couldn't have been tougher for Tyrone and the experienced managerial unit will need to etch a tactical master plan if they are to topple the reigning provincial champions today.

Declan Bonner's regimented Donegal outfit appear to be just as prolific this term if their performances in the Ulster Minor League provides a reliable parameter. They sailed through Group B, winning all four games, before brushing aside Down and Derry in the latter stages en route to securing back-to-back Leagues for only the third time in the county's history.

"I think Donegal have a fairly successful template and it is reflective across all age groups," said Donnelly.

"A template is one thing but we seen first hand that they have immensely talented footballers on top of that. We know their pedigree but it is a challenge we are relishing. For myself and Kieran McHugh, this is our last throw of the dice as a management team and we don't want the journey to end on Sunday, that's for sure."

When the sides met six weeks ago in Strabane, Donegal trounced the Red Hands 1-16 to 0-7. They looked sharper, fitter and further on in their Championship preparations. Defensively, the Tir Conaill men are resolute with goalkeeper Danny Rodgers launching attacks as soon as the ball goes dead.

Kilcar sharpshooter Conor
Doherty missed the League Final
win over Derry through injury but
he is expected to recover in time
to spearhead the Donegal attack
this afternoon alongside
deadly duo Ethan and
Niall O'Donnell.

Michael Carroll - who starred in last year's All-Ireland Final loss to Kerry - will line out at midfield this year and Tyrone's

chances of progression could hinge on their ability to stop the Gaoth Dobhair man - who has already been earmarked as an inter-county star of the future.

For the neutral, this game is likely to be a war of attrition with both sides appreciating the need to be defensively sound in Championship conditions. Donnelly admits playing Donegal at their own game could be the key to a place in draw for the next round.


"I think both teams will set out to play a certain way because that is what suits their crop of players," he said.

"But in the All-Ireland Finals last year - in minor and senior - Kerry set about trying to replicate the defensive system that Donegal deployed and it worked out well for them.

The bottom line is that Donegal have had a system in place for a number of years and they are very efficient at carrying it out and it will be about disrupting that."

If Tyrone are to progress, they will rely heavily on the industry of Coalisland ace Cormac O'Hagan and the scoring ability of Tomás Carney from Derrylaughan. If Aidan Fullerton, Michael Corless and Edendork prospect Conn Kilpatrick can produce their best performances, the Red Hands might be in with a chance.




Uachtarán ar Fhó-chumann Ard a' Rátha



Cailleadh mac dílis de chuid An Cumann Lúthchleas Gael i gContae Thír Eoghain agus Contae Fhear Manach nuair a d'éag Pat King go tobann sa bhaile ar 13ú Aibreán i mbliana i ndiaidh dó tinneas gairid a fhulaingt.

Mar bhall de Chumann Naomh Mhic Artáin, Trí Leac, bhain Pat cúig Chraobhchomórtas Sinsear na hÉireann agus seacht Sraithchomórtas sa Pheil i rith ré órga an chlub idir 1973 agus 1987. Bronnadh Laoch na himeartha air nuair a bhain Trí Leac Cluiche Ceannais an Chontae sa bhliain 1980 agus trí bliana ina dhiaidh sin thug sé an fhoireann leis chuig bua dúbailte sa tSraith agus sa Chraobh. Ba é seo an buaicphointe a bhí ag saol fada imeartha ag imirt ag an leibhéal sinsearach, saol peile a thosaigh sa bhliain 1964.

Fuair Pat a chéad bhlaiseadh den pheil mar dhalta scoile i Scoil Naomh Mícheál in Inis Ceithleann. Lean sé ar aghaidh leis an pheil nuair a d'fhreastal sé ar Choláiste Oideachais Naomh Iósaf i mBéal Feirste. 



ULSTER GAATO HOST FÉILE NA NGAEL 2015

Following the hosting of a successful Féile na nGael tournament in 2014, Ulster GAA has been given the honour of hosting the event again over the weekend of 19th to 21st June 2015.

The event will bring a total of 192 teams together for a fun weekend of competition in Hurling and Camogie. A further 60 Handball clubs will also play in a tournament on Saturday 21st June. This will bring approximately 4,800 young people together over the weekend.

The event will be officially launched tomorrow night, Monday 18th May at 6.30pm in Navan Fort, Armagh, when the Presidents of the GAA, the Camogie Association and the Handball Association take a break from a three day primary schools visitation programme throughout Ulster.

A fun art competition has been organised with primary schools throughout Ulster as Ulster GAA bid to get a design for the front cover of the Féile na nGael programme.

The draw to match the visiting clubs with their hosts for the 2015 Féile na nGael has been completed.

The draw identifies both the Hurling and Camogie sides involved in the Irish Pride Féile na nGael. As the visiting teams become identified, the draw will be updated reflecting all participating teams.

The Red Hands were relegated from Division One while Donegal reached the Semi-Final. There was an evident gulf in class when the sides met at the end of March. Perhaps most importantly, the Tir Chonaill players are entirely comfortable against Tyrone and are expected to secure their fourth success Ulster Championship win against them since 2011.

A glance at the league statistics would further bolster the argument of a Donegal success. Tyrone had the worst attacking record in Division One (3-76) whilst Donegal had the second best defensive record (5-70), with Dublin conceding a point less across the seven games.

In fact, if you took into account all 32 teams that played National League football in 2015, only Division Four outfits Carlow and Wicklow had a points per game total that was lower than Tyrone's. The caveat in all of this though is that throughout the league,

and in the six weeks since their draw with Kerry, Mickey Harte's main focus will have been on their Ulster Championship Preliminary Round tie.

A team's style of play can simply not be defined by attacking and defensive, and this season Harte has tried to install a different type of defensive organisation to the one we usually see from the Red Hands.

They get big numbers back, they attack in lines, It's extremely similar to what we have seen from Donegal under Jim McGuinness, especially in his first year in 2011.

Like Tyrone this season, McGuinness used the league four years ago to work on that plan, to allow mistakes in order to tweak the problems. The team that kept Dublin to eight points in an All-Ireland Semi-Final also conceded 1-14, 2-12 and 1-15 a few months earlier - against Division Two sides.

The period between their Division Two Final win over Laois and their Ulster Championship opener with Antrim was crucial. They would concede 0-7, 1-8, 0-9, 0-8, 0-14 (aet) and 0-8 in the championship that year.

Since their relegation was confirmed against Kerry, Tyrone will have set about perfecting the strategy they tried to implement in the league stages.

Training has been moved from Garvaghey – a place where their drills were open to the world to the see – to clubs around the county where they can plot in private.

Harte has been the master of the tactical surprise, but will the trick up his sleeve contain enough magic to see off a Donegal team that will enjoy home advantage?

The Tir Chonaill men are not heavy scorers themselves, but have been rather accurate this season. They have been taking the majority of their chances.

EVERY rational argument surrounding the Donegal and Tyrone match would point to a win for Rory Gallagher's side in today's clash.





LAST FIVE MEETINGS

March 29 2015, Ballybofey Allianz Football League Division 1

Donegal 1-13 Tyrone 0-06

Hosts Donegal made light work of sweeping aside Tyrone in what was a must-win game for both sides in their relegation battles. Michael Murphy was black carded on 59 minutes, but received a standing ovation as he left the field having kicked six points.

Ryan McHugh bagged the only goal of the game after 31 minutes, putting the ball beyond Tyrone goalkeeper Sean Fox who had been called in for his debut following an injury to Niall Morgan. It was the most toothless Tyrone display of all their recent clashes, managing just two points from play in the entire game.

May 27 2013, Ballybofey Ulster SFC Quarter-Final

Donegal 2-10 Tyrone 0-10

An attritional clash as the hosts struck for the goals at crucial times. The game was one to forget for Niall Morgan, the Tyrone goalkeeper's decision to cup his ears to the Donegal crowd coming back to bite him as he failed to register a score from any of his resulting free kicks.

Colm McFadden's 32nd minute goal sent Donegal in with a 1-06 to 0-07 interval lead, while substitute Ross Wherity palmed home a second goal on 49 minutes, and they finished strongly, holding Tyrone scoreless for 33 minutes.

March 3 2013, Omagh Allianz Football League Division 1

Tyrone 1-13 Donegal 0-12

Donegal finished a tempestuous affair at Healy Park with just 13

players as Tyrone secured a rare victory. Michael Murphy saw red for a second bookable offence to cap a miserable day for the Donegal skipper, who saw his penalty in first half injury time saved by Morgan.

Stephen O'Neill's second-half goal came against the run of play to put the Red Hands 1-7 to 0-6 ahead. Donegal reduced Tyrone's lead but without ever looking like getting on terms, with Donegal's Neil Gallagher dismissed late in the contest.

June 30 2012, Clones Ulster SFC Semi-Final

Donegal 0-12 Tyrone 0-10

In their closest clash, Martin Penrose eased Tyrone into a narrow 0-06 to 0-05 half-time lead after the sides had been level on five occasions in the first half.

But Donegal's massed defence squeezed the Red Hands out

of the game in the second half, and scores from Colm McFadden, Michael Murphy and Karl Lacey saw them home. However, Donegal needed a superb Paul Durcan save from a speculative Martin Penrose shot in stoppage time to deny the Red Hands.

June 26 2011, Clones Ulster SFC Semi-Final


Donegal 2-6 Tyrone 0-9

It was Dermot 'Brick' Molloy's injury-time goal earned Donegal a surprise win over Tyrone. The Red Hands dominated early on to lead 0-6 to 0-1 but Donegal hit three points in the three minutes before half-time.

The Red Hands led 0-8 to 0-6 after 56 minutes before Colm McFadden's goal put Donegal one ahead. Tyrone's Kevin Hughes was then harshly sent off and when Martin Penrose levelled a replay looked on, but Molloy had other ideas as his late goal won it.

DEFIBRILLATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Many GAA clubs in Ulster have put in place a piece of equipment which could help save lives. The equipment is an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), a portable device that checks the heart rhythm. If needed, it can send an electric shock to the heart to try to restore a normal rhythm. AEDs are used to treat sudden cardiac arrest (SCA), a condition in which the heart suddenly and unexpectedly stops beating.

In order for the AED to be effective, the heart must be in a 'shockable' rhythm, therefore not every casualty who collapses will benefit from the use of the defibrillator. In these instances, good quality CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation) is the best lifeline a first responder can offer until professional help arrives.

There have been many examples where AEDs in the community have saved lives which otherwise may have been lost, while the accompanying CPR bought time for others until emergency help arrived. GAA Clubs who have a defibrillator in their possession are to be commended for taking the step for the betterment of their community. In order to ensure that the equipment is in best working order and it's users confident should they be called upon, the following guidelines should be considered.

ACCESSIBILITY:

It is essential to properly store and maintain a club AED as the performance of the defibrillator may be compromised if the recommendations are ignored. It is important that your AED is accessible as every minute is critical for a collapsed casualty. Research has shown that the chance of its use being effective is considerably

increased if defibrillation occurs within 3 minutes. In order to prevent damage, wall mounting is preferable though not essential. To avoid difficulties accessing an AED in the event of an emergency, it is advised that the AED should not be kept under lock and key. However, if kept in an area which is locked, keys must be convenient to hand. Heated, alarmed cabinets are available for outside storage should it be required.

CHECKING:

Ideally the Club should appoint an officer/officers who will be responsible for checking that the defibrillator is in proper working order and that and the necessary components are present. Manufacturers will provide recommendations on this but as a guideline the following should apply:

On a daily (ideally) or weekly (minimum) basis, the battery should be checked along with the pad's expiry date. Additionally the following items should also be present to ensure the casualty has the best chance of survival; spare pads; paediatric pads; face mask. scissors, razor and towel.

In the event of the AED being used or expiration of pads an immediate re-order should be placed.

TRAINING:

AEDs have been designed for use by laypersons who have received AED/CPR training. When in use, theu give clear audio and visual commands as to whether or not a shock is advised. It is important to have a group of dedicated personnel within the Club or Community who receive initial



training and are refreshed again at least once a year (although best practice would suggest ever six months). Training should be delivered by an accredited organisation or person and contents should be in accordance with recommendations as set bu the appropriate Resuscitation Council or Association

It is essential that the wider Club and Community are aware of who the trained users are and how to contact them in the event of an emergency. Posting names and contact details in appropriate places is important to ensure this happens. It is also recommended that a dedicated list of AED-trained individuals should be kept adjacent to the AED with phone numbers.

In the event of the AED being used it is important that the Club holds a debrief on it's protocols, prepare for a re-order of battery/pads and offer support as is required to the person or persons who used the equipment.

Prior to Dungannon returning to O'Neill Park as their home, the Clarkes used to play on a pitch at Barkers Field and Springfield, the present home of the Dungannon Golf Club. Before this the very first pitch used by the Clarkes was known as Doris's Meadow, on the Carland Rd which was owned by Paul's grandfather. Away from the football scene, Raul plays an active role in parish activities and having roped his long term friend Dessie Slater (R.I.P.) to assist him both were prominent in all Parish related events be it fund raising, or simply assisting the Monsignor in what ever role he required of them.

At County Administrative level Paul also excelled and his talents were quickly noticed and as a Drumragh clubman at the time Paul found himself elected to County Treasurer in 1982 a post he held until 1984, the Centenary year of the GAA. Paul held the County Vice Chair position for 10 years before he finally rose to the higher position of County Chairman and was in this post from 1996 until 1998.

Having served his County loyally Paul moved on to a position on the Ulster Council serving as Tyrone Delegate and at the same time assumed the role of Chairman of the Ulster Referees Committee.







From there Paul went on to serve on the National Referees Committee in Croke Park, Paul has been a loyal and trusted friend to Referees ight across Ireland. He continues in this role and today again, he will be on the sideline assisting our match officials.



ELUB MAITH

The Journey

As many clubs are aware Club Maith is an excellent means through which to improve the way your Club conducts its business. It is Ulster GAA's club accreditation scheme which is licensed by Sport NI and is relevant to all clubs in Ulster.

Although Club Maith will prove a valuable assurance-mark when applying for funding; the real value of Club Maith for your Club is the journey which it takes your Club on. This is something accredited clubs can testify to; with improvements being seen in many aspects of club life.

The beauty of Club Maith is that it asks clubs to assess themselves on all aspects of their club, not just those which grab the headlines. And increasingly we are seeing those clubs which have been on the Club Maith journey realising their potential both on and off the field.

This was reflected in the President's Awards held in November 2014 when eleven clubs were awarded with the prestigious Presidents' Awards covering aspects of club governance, membership welfare, community enhancement, culture & heritage, and coaching and games development.

Needless to say, some of the most innovative programmes known to Ulster GAA were being lived-out in our Club Maith accredited clubs. Castleblayney Faughs community physical activity programme "Operation TransFaughsmation" being one such example.

2015 has seen a review of Club Maith, which happens on a three yearly-basis. The



Club Maith Portfolio has been upgraded with some additional criteria being added-in, mainly to reflect progress in the areas of health and wellbeing, and coaching and games. While some of the policy documents have been consolidated to reflect advancements in the GAA such as the Respect Policy, and Recruitment of Volunteers Policy, overall it is hoped the Portfolio is once again made more user-friendly.

An ever transitioning Club Maith website and Club Maith Toolkit will act as a valuable support to all clubs with club development queries.

Currently there are 55 clubs accredited through-out Ulster, with every county being represented. While 120+ clubs are registered with Ulster GAA as currently going through the process.The "Open Season" for submission of completed Club Maith Portfolios remains, whereby clubs can submit their Portfolios between the first Monday in August and the first Monday in December each year.

All clubs working on a Portfolio currently should be working

SPORTS SCIENCE

Increasing the Efficiency of Training

Frequently the finger is pointed towards management teams. More specifically, sport scientists have been viewed as an unnecessary luxury, causing the problems.

The truth and reality of sport science is the complete , opposite. Sport science helps skills coaches, strength & conditioning coaches and physios get most benefit from sessions in the most efficient manner possible.

Fitness Testing

Measuring fitness regularly helps coaches check what needs to be improved. Rather than blindly planning sessions and programmes, S & C coaches can target specific aspects of fitness based on the results. It allows coaches to measure effectiveness of training. If a player has not progressed, the plan can be changed to ensure no sessions are wasted and progress is made.

Heart Rate Analysis

During games, heart rates average 160 - 190 beats per minute for most players. This allows us to focus on training activities, and measure how 'intense' training is, relative to games. For many years we have heard coaches saying they want training at match pace. Matching training heart rate to match heart rate does exactly that ... ensures training is at match pace. If something is not at match pace, the coach can make changes to raise the intensity, again, making sure no session is wasted.

GPS Analysis

GPS is similar to heart rate analysis. It focuses

on distances, speeds, rest times, impacts etc. Heart rate measures what is going on internally, and is not visible to the eye. GPS measures everything we can see the body doing. Rather than leave that to subjective judgement, GPS allows us to put numbers to player performance.

Statistics

Manu people fear numbers and point towards the scoreboard as the only important statistic. True! However, to win, there are many incidents within a game that contribute. Understanding what is closely linked to winning. we can identify more accurately what needs development in training to increase chances of success. Knowing statistics helps identify a focus for subsequent training sessions. For example, if we lost 9 possessions in the tackle, we identify that as an area for development, and plan our training to develop this.

Video Analysis

Video analysis links closely with statistics, but provides more information, and perspective on the stats. Using the previous example, we could discover the 9 possessions lost were all unnecessarily carried into contact. Therefore, rather than planning a session to improve strength in the tackle, we plan a session focusing on the ball carrier avoiding contact when there are other options.

All Together

Sport science can provide coaches with information and evidence to plan and execute sessions that 'tick all the boxes'. Skill and tactical focus is led by stats and video work, while the drills and games planned can be pitched at an intensity to replicate match pace. Players can develop their skills, tactical awareness and fitness through the same activity, maximising the efficiency of the training session.

Donegal has the second highest rate of farm fatalities in Ireland*

Last year 30 people lost their lives on Irish farms and Donegal has the second highest rate of farm fatalities in the country*. To highlight the paramount importance of farm safety and to raise awareness of farm safety across the county, the Donegal's Senior Footballers will wear a specially commissioned jersey in their first Championship match against Tyrone on Sunday the 17th May in Mac Cumhaill Park, Donegal. The logo of their jersey sponsors, 'Donegal Creameries', a consumer foods brand within Aurivo Co-op, will be replaced for one game only with the 'Stay Safe on The Farm' logo.

This Aurivo jersey initiative is also supporting FBD's farm safety campaign, by including

its 'Champions for Change' logo on the reverse of the Donegal jersey. The Champions for Change campaign calls on agri organisations and farmers to stand up, stop taking risks and become a champion for change when it comes to cases of farm safety.

Aaron Forde, Chief Executive of Aurivo said: "One death on a farm is one too many. It is our job as a large dairy co-operative to ensure that we raise the awareness of the importance of farm safety amongst our milk suppliers because 58% of fatal

farm accidents happen on dairy farms. We are confident that the strong 'farm safety messages on the Donegal GAA jersey will help to highlight the importance of farm safety across the county to those watching the game in the stadium and at home."
