

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

It is a great privilege for me to be able to welcome you all here to Croke Park today for the second quarter-final double header in the GAA Football All-Ireland Senior Championship.

After the stunning events at Croke Park last weekend we have a hugely entertaining finale in store and I expect plenty more quality footballing fireworks this afternoon.


It's hard to put your finger on why such sporting moments are so aesthetically appealing to the human eye. Perhaps one of the reasons is that the human body is designed to move. As a feat of physiological and biochemical engineering, it's without peer. The above players will have


honed their movement through years of practise and performance. At times, they will reach that perfect place known to sports psychologists as 'the zone' or 'flow'. It brings with it an indescribable sense of achievement and wellbeing. We mere mortals can experience welcome benefits by developing a closer relationship with our bodies and minds too. One of the evidence-based recommendations included in the HSE's #littlethings wellbeing campaign reminds us that 'the more you move the better your mood'.

The recommended physical activity levels for adults in Ireland is at least 30 minutes of moderate exercise five times a week, For

children it's at least 60 minutes' exercise at a moderate to vigorous (sweating, some loss of breath) every day. This can be accumulated in blocks of 10 minutes, and can include taking the stairs instead of the lift, active transport to and from school and work, gardening, dancing, and of course sport.

Maintaining optimum health — physically and mentally — doesn't take that long but it does require a little effort. The payback, however, is considerable. Benefits include: a greater sense of wellbeing and reduced risk of depression, stronger bones, muscles, and heart, greater mobility — right into old age, and less likelihood that we will have to put another hole in our belt! 



DID YOU KNOW?

Mayo played more qualifier games this year (three) than they had in the previous eight years (two). During the period 2008 to 2015 inclusive, largely due to their dominance of the Connacht Championship, Mayo played and lost two qualifier games (Tyrone 2008 and Longford 2010). This year alone, the Red and Green have beaten Fermanagh, Kildare and Westmeath in the back door.

MAYO-BY THE NUMBERS

- 6: The number of graduates of Mayo's All-Ireland winning U21 winning side from 2006 still involved in the panel 10 years on - Ger Cafferkey, Keith Higgins, Chris Barrett, Colm Boyle, Barry Moran and Séamus O'Shea.
- 6: The number of years Mayo have reached the quarter-finals of the All-Ireland series in a row. The Westerners' current run of reaching at least the last eight of the championship began in 2011 and was helped significantly by winning five Connacht titles in succession.
- 7: The number of competitive games Mayo have won this year. Stephen Rochford's side won three of seven games in the Allianz League and then four of five in the championship so far. Mayo 2016: Played 12, Won 7, Lost 5.

CILLIAN O'CONNOR RELIANC

Statistics gathered by the Iris Times earlier this year showed that Cillian O'Connor had score an average of 41 per cent of Mayo's total in each of the las three championship campaign

In Championship 2016, that reliance has dropped significantly to just 23 per cent or 2-18 (23) of Mayo's total of 9-74 (101). Crucially O'Connor was black carded aft six minutes against London, but Mayo's reliance on the Ballintubber man remains dov on previous years.



PATH TO THE OUARTER-FINAL

Mayo have played five matches to reach their sixth successive All-Ireland quarter-final. The last occasion that the wearers of the green and red failed to make the 'last eight' was in 2010 when they lost in Round 1 of the Qualifiers to Longford at Glennon Brothers Pearse Park.

Mayo scored 9-74 (101) on their way to the quarter-final for the concession of 3-61 (70) giving them a scoring average of 1.44. Captain Cillian O'Connor is their top marksman with 2-18, of which 12 points came from frees, four from play, and two from 45s with both goals coming from the penalty spot.

This will be Mayo's second time to face Tyrone at this stage of the championship with the Westerners winning that 2004 game by 0-16 to 1-9. Indeed, Mayo has never lost to Ulster opposition at this juncture as they also recorded two wins over Donegal and one over Down.





PATH TO THE QUARTER-FINAL

Tyrone have played four matches to reach their 12th All-Ireland quarter-final. The most recent occasion the Red Hands failed to make the 'last eight' was in 2014 when they lost to Armagh in Round 2 of the Qualifiers at Healy Park.


Tyrone scored 8-61 (85) on their way to the quarter-final and conceded 5-47 (62) giving them a scoring average of 1.37. Peter Harte was the Ulster Champions top scorer with 3-7 with all but a point of that total coming from play.

ANYTHING CAN HAPPEN

o what do we make of Ryan McMenamin's recent radio interview, in which he was asked of Tyrone's chances of winning an All-Ireland in 2016?

Of course, a refresher.

"You'd like to think they could (win the All-Ireland), but there's one team I'd be wary of: Mayo. I've watched them. They remind me of what happened us in '08. They're sticking to the system. Slowly but surely you can see the confidence coming back into the team. They're probably one team I would be wary of."

Mayo. Not Dublin. Nor Kerry.

Or even Donegal nursing a well of hurt, but Mayo.

There are three caveats to be inserted here. Won't take long. Routine procedure.

The first is that by 2008, Tyrone had winning in their DNA. They had scanned the landscape from the summit twice over. They were facing a Mayo side that were only peering above the wreckage of All-Ireland disasters of 2004 and 2006.

That Saturday, they beat Mayo without giving it too much thought, leaving themselves primed for Dublin in the quarterfinal, when they brought shock and awe.

Second caveat. The comments were made after the Kildare game, with Diarmuid O'Connor top-

scoring with 1-5 of their 2-17 tally. At that point, their system was nestling into a nice groove.

But along came Westmeath.

Mayo were far from mediocre, but similarly far away from formidable at the same time.

Final caveat, and this is possibly where McMenamin was coming from. Mayo are one of 'those sides'. The ones you cannot trust. In the history of Championship meetings between the teams, Tyrone have only won that 2008 encounter.

They are two very different sets of characters, two different managements.

Right now, Tyrone players are loving life. Mickey Harte is in spectacular form and with Peter Donnelly having such a dramatic effect on the torsos, legs and wellbeing of the playing staff, along with that elusive Ulster medal, there is a unity of purpose there.

When it comes to the mentality of winning, the Tyrone squad are now onside. Their backroom team is deliberately kept smaller than most. They don't bring in outsiders for no reason, least of all to be seen to be ticking a box.

In his earlier days, Harte once introduced a sports psychologist to the group. Peter Canavan recounted recently how that went; "My head was fried and I could see all around me boys were tearing their hair out. After about the third session, the players and (Brian) Dooher, as captain, went to Mickey with a plea for the talking to stop.

When Mickey was told, he didn't like it one bit, but he relented and we go our way.

"What Mickey didn't realise that it was him we wanted to hear and not anyone else, regardless of all their qualifications. As far as I was concerned, Mickey Harte is the bes sport psychologist I've ever listened to

It cannot be said that Mayo are as happy a family. They had a bloody winter, ousting the joint-ticket of Pat Holmes and Noel Connelly from the management role, before getting Stephen Rochford in. There has been some continuity with Donie Buckley still in his role, but at the same there has been a need for nametags at training sessions for a while now.

Aidan O'Shea suffers from Joe Canning (or even Conor Mortimer? syndrome with some people believing that Mayo will not win an All-Ireland with him, but as Mortimer once memorably answered that particular viewpoint "They won't win one without me either."

And for all that, Mayo can win this game. Their best chance of victory is to almost dispense with the notion of Kevin McLoughlin as a sweeper and revert back to a formation pulled from the pages of the James Horan playbook.

Get their speed and athleticism going. Express themselves. Have a cut and rope Tyrone into an old-fashioned slug-fest. Leave the scoreboard operators with calluses on their thumbs from tallying up a stream of goals and points.



Let's see what they might have aspired to in the early meetings of the Rochford-Buckley-McEntee meetings and shared philosophies.

The only thing with that is Tyrone's cuteness to not engage on those terms. You can't imagine the sight of Croke Park would make them sufficiently giddy to try a little freestyling.

Or, they might study the first 64 excruciating minutes of Mayo up against their neighbours Fermanagh - how they sucked them into a central channel before turning ball over, and breaking forward.

Tyrone can do what Fermanagh did in Castlebar. And they can do it better, with faster players, more aggression and finishers at a level Mayo have not met before.

Then again, if Mayo decide to put the tracklist on shuffle, anything can happen. Isn't this why we turn on, tune in and cop out?

DARING TO DREAM

or a game oft vilified,
especially by those
deemed amongst its most
celebrated exponents,
Gaelic football remains
resolutely enthralling.

Week after week it takes a battering, it's image woefully skewed in the critical reflection. No sport is more brutally assessed; individuals are branded, teams are derided and words like "useless" and "pathetic" are deemed acceptable in analysis of amateur sportsmen.

Yet this evening, Croke Park is filled to its 80,000 plus capacity, one of the biggest audiences for any sports event anywhere in the world this weekend, including the Maracana Stadium in Rio de laneiro.

Dublin's presence and their substantial support base undoubtedly boost the attraction. And it could be argued that their clash with Donegal alone would have had the 'full house' signs erected.

But Mayo and Tyrone, with a rivalry as much in its infancy as that between Dublin and Donegal, have proven drawing power as well. An attendance of 65,345 was recorded when they met in the All-Ireland semi-final of three championships ago.

No one who queued for tickets earlier this week or who made plans for a second long distance journey in successive weekends to GAA HO seems bothered by the apparent malaise afflicting the sport. They signed up willingly to share in the pursuit of a dream. So have the critics got it all wrong? The answer to that lies in your individual perspective.

Throughout the evolution of football over a century and more, change has not been welcomed.

Even the history-making Down team of the 1960s, filled with great footballers, was derided for abandoning traditional positioning and introducing "mobility" to their style of football.

Mick O'Dywer and Kevin
Heffernan, now regarded as two
of the greatest managers in the
history of the game, had to defend
themselves against critics who
were aghast at the extensive use
of the handpass by their teams in
the 1970s and '80s. Indeed, the
rules were changed to restrict
the use of the hand such was the
outrage.

Clearly, those changes did not work.

Mickey Harte and Joe Kernan were next to fall foul of the protesting pundits as they created history by bringing the All-Ireland title to Tyrone and Armagh for the first time in the early years of the new millennium. That was the start of defensive football and it wasn't popular. But it was successful. Special opprobrium was reserved for Jim McGuinness when he changed everything again in 2011 with Donegal. Their All-Ireland

semi-final against Dublin is recalled as notorious. A scoreline of 0-8 to 0-6 tells it all.

"An abomination of a game" is how Eugene McGee described it. His colleague in the Irish Independent Martin Breheny agreed, writing "it was dismal to watch" but adding succinctly "but Donegal were in the business of trying to reach the All-Ireland final, not pleasing the masses."

That was a theme taken up in the aftermath of that game by former Donegal star and manager Declan Bonner. In his column for the *Donegal News* he wrote that he would not have liked to have played that system when he was a player. However, he then went on to defend McGuinness.

"To be quite frank the manager's job is to get results. Managers live and die on results. To be successful Jim adopted this system that was very hard to play against. A lot of people don't like the system but it has got results. Jim has got Donegal very competitive again – and that has been a success. If he can tweak the system, 2012 can be another big year."

McGuinness did tweak the system and Donegal did surely have a very big year in 2012 when they claimed Sam Maguire for only the second time in their history. And when Donegal and Dublin last met in the championship, the All-Ireland semi-final of 2014 which Donegal won, Jim McGuinness' tactics were described in the national media as "a masterclass".

Defensive systems are now de rigueur in football. As with all fashions, the attractiveness lies in the bearing. And some counties have been unable to execute the new system accurately and that has led to a number of poor

spectacles in recent championship campaigns.

Dublin have come up with a potent mix of the traditional and the modern and are holders of all the major trophies today. They were deemed almost unbeatable two years ago and will hope to have learned the harsh lessons of that day. They have, of course, been unbeatable since.

Of the four teams involved this evening only Mayo have not managed to win an All-Ireland title in recent times.


Their endurance, despite all the heartbreak associated with their endless quest has earned them respect; though that was challenged by the change of manager at the end of last year's campaign.

They have recovered from a shock defeat in the provincial campaign and the charge towards that elusive All-Ireland is gaining momentum. Their supporters have remained intensely loyal and passionate and that brings its own atmosphere to Croke Park today. And Tyrone return to what their supporters now quite properly refer to as "our second home".

Mickey Harte has created a new team based on the principles he has always applied. His teams have drawn the ire of the critics and will continue to do so. But since he became their manager, Tyrone have won three All-Ireland titles. And that is the bottom line.

Croke Park is full this evening of people who dare to dream. The game has changed and it will continue to evolve. That is the natural way.

Let the games begin.



DONEGAL CAN POINT TO HISTORY

ounger Gaelic football fans could be forgiven the assumption that the Dublin/Donegal rivalry was born on August 28, 2011.

Otherwise known as Year Zero, or "the game from hell" (copyright Colm O'Rourke), or the day a mass GAA audience got its first real, acrid taste of 14-man blanket defence.

On that particular day, Pat Gilroy's Dubs weren't paragons of Total Football either: maybe they were too befuddled to figure a way through the Tír Chonaill maze.

They did so, eventually, on that evocative score of eight points to six; so our two protagonists might even claim to have eclipsed Manchester United and Arsenal, who met that very day with Boring, Boring United squeaking home 8-2.

Acres of newsprint have been devoted to that watershed All-Ireland semi-final and we

don't intend adding to its carbon footprint today. But its significance is still worth stressing if only because this was the start of what we'll term the current, often spiky, invariably engrossing, Dublin/Donegal relationship.

This rivalry has a famous antecedent: the 1992 All-Ireland final and the Donegal ambush to beat all. Pedants might argue that the origins of this current 'love-in' date back to the 2010 All-Ireland U21 final, when Michael Murphy's last-gasp penalty crashed against the crossbar to ensure that Jim Gavin's Dublin – not Jim McGuinness's Donegal – would take home the booty. And they'd have a point.

But, really, 2011 was where it all kicked off and the whole Gaelic diaspora was there to see the unfolding horror, peering out from behind the couch.

Looking back with the benefit of 20-20 hindsight, we get a sense


that Donegal took almost as much from that war of attrition as did their conquerors.

Jim McGuinness knew he would have to modify their defensive structure, not just the 'uber' versior unveiled for that semi-final. And they did evolve, leaking a tad more but scoring more heavily too: enough to deliver Sam in 2012.

Four years have passed and the sceptics will say Donegal are no longer genuine contenders; that the legs of too many stellar veterans can no longer hope to live with the Dubs in all their multi-faceted attacking glory.

And then you recall that people were saying the exact same thing about Donegal in 2014.

As contests go, that semi-final was light years removed from 2011: the scoreline of Donegal 3-14, Dublin 0-17 has a certain buccaneering ring.



Yet this was also a collision of managerial mindsets - between the defensive structure/counter-attacking strategy of McGuinness and Gavin's more cavalier instincts and trust in the primacy of expansive football.

What happened? Too many Dublin defenders got sucked out of position, lured into Donegal's web, and they were plundered on the counter

That, at least, is the distilled history version of 2014. We shouldn't forget the brilliance of Dublin's early longrange points, courtesy of Messrs Flynn and Connolly, or the two crucial goal chances that got away.

But here's the rub: that victory remains arguably the standout tactical triumph of McGuinness's four-year tenure but it failed to deliver any tangible glory because they went and lost a damp squib final to Kerry.

Whereas Gavin absorbed the harshest lesson of his senior managerial career (true, there haven't been many) and adapted his thinking accordingly. Cue a greater defensive pragmatism, crystallised in the redeployment of Cian O'Sullivan as sweeper: cue a second All-Ireland on his watch in 2015.

Now Gavin has a chance to make it three from four. And who's blocking his path to the semis? Only this time there's a different Donegal manager plotting against him, Rory Gallagher.

As numero uno, the Fermanagh native has faced Dublin in three league contests at Croke Park and lost the lot – by five points in 2015, by six last March and by all of ten in the subsequent Division I semi-final. But that was the league and there has always been the suspicion that Donegal aren't overly bothered about showing their full hand too early in the year.

For them, it is always and only about summer silver. But that explains why Gallagher will be under scrutiny in this most pivotal of weeks: as manager he has lost back-to-back Ulster finals and also last year's corresponding quarter-final, poorly, to Mayo.

What better way to emerge from the imposing shadow of his predecessor than by conjuring up a cunning plan to unravel what many perceive as this unstoppable Sky Blue attack?

Gallagher knows plenty about the capital from his playing days with Stabigid's of Blanchardstown, and he

never misses a chance to espouse the virtues of all things Dublin GAA.

But as throw-in approaches, Dubs of a nervous disposition will be wondering what Rory is about to unleash. After last week's relatively open fare against Cork, will he revert to the ultra-defensive alignment of that league game in March? Will his on-field leader go wandering, as per the Michael Murphy norm, or might he decamp to the square's edge, hoping to punish a perceived aerial weakness in that Rory-less Dublin full-back line?

Oh, and did we mention Paddy McBrearty, who shot the lights out last Saturday as a gentle warm-up for facing his native county? Yes, Paddy could have been a deadly Dub, not a citeog killer from Kilcar.

Questions, so many questions. You'll soon have an answer.

Dublin are 1/5 favourites for a reason. Make that lots of reasons. But as Brian McEniff told *The Herald* this week: "We're not going to be easy to beat. And that's the attitude. We have no fear of the Dubs."

Maybe he was talking the good fight but, as the managerial brains behind Donegal's most famous ever capital coup, McEniff can always point to history.



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

Donegal have played five matches to reach the All-Ireland quarterfinals for the sixth successive year. The last occasion that Donegal failed to reach the 'last eight' was in 2010 when they lost to Armagh in Round 1 of the Qualifiers at Crossmaglen.

The Ulster finalists scored 3-72 (81) and conceded 3-63 (72) en-route to the quarter-finals giving them a scoring average of 1.13. Patrick McBrearty is the county's top marksmen with 0-26 of which half (0-13) came from play with the other half courtesy of frees.


