

Conor (25) from County Cavan will oversee today's Minor Championship tie between Donegal and Monaghan. Hailing from the Ballinagh club, Conor joined the Ulster Panel in 2013 and has been on the National Support Panel for the past three years.

He has refereed at all levels in Cavan, taking charge of the Intermediate Championship Final in 2015 and the 2016 U21 Championship Final. To date in Ulster, Conor has handled several Minor League fixtures as well as McKenna Cup and Ulster Club ties. In 2016, Conor represented the province on International duty where he overseen the Scotland Senior Championship Final in Glasgow between Glasgow Gaels and Dunedin Connolly's. Last summer Championship seen Conor take charge of the Ulster Minor Football Championship Quarter Final between Derry and Tyrone.

Conor has also dawned the white coat having umpired at three Ulster Senior Football Finals and the 2015 All Ireland Senior Final in Croke Park between Dublin and Kerry.


DAVID GOUGH (AN MHÍ)

Welcome to the 2018 Ulster Senior Football Championship. We face into a much more condensed format this year with the Ulster Final scheduled for 24th June. 8 games over the next 6 weeks as our players, officials and spectators await another championship season.

This year's Preliminary Round fixture sees Donegal and Cavan meet here in Páirc Mac Cumhaill, Ballybofey. Changes are to be introduced to the Ulster Senior Football Championship format from 2020 as decided by the Ulster Competitions Control Committee recently. Nine counties will be included in the draw for the 2019 Ulster Championship. The two counties which are drawn to play in the Preliminary Round will not feature in the Preliminary Round draw for the 2020 and 2021 Championships. Seven counties will be included in the Preliminary Round draw for the 2021 Championship and from the 2022 draw onwards just five counties will be included in the draw for the Preliminary Round game.

Donegal will be disappointed with their league campaign resulting in relegation on the final day although they will take solace from the fact that they introduced a number of young players to their starting line- up. In contrast, Cavan's young squad coped admirably in Division 2 and consequently, will ply their trade in Division 1 in 2019.

It is also a day for the stars of the future to enjoy the admiration of their parents and spectators in today's arena. Cumann na mBunscol children will display their skills at half time while the minor sides from both counties are competing for a place in the Ulster Championship Round 3 Qualifier.

In Ulster, we have an extremely competitive inter-county championship and as evidenced today again, every team can take to the field in a given game with a well grounded hope of success in that fixture. It is testament to our county panels that such a focus and drive underpins their participation and their quest for success.

In 2018, Cancer Focus has been chosen as the charity for Ulster GAA. Cancer Focus is a local cancer charity working since 1969 to reduce the impact of cancer on people's lives. They provide care and support services for cancer patients and their families.

I acknowledge and thank all the Ulster Council and Dún na nGall GAA personnel involved in hosting today's games. Everyone plays their part; supporters and stewards, medics, medics officials and players, sponsors, local authorities, media, County Boards and Provincial Council.

I also wish all four teams, their County Boards and management every success in their respective outings today and the match officials whose role should never be overlooked.

Finally, to you the supporters. Your support, attendance and attention is highly valued and we hope the experience of today will encourage you to join us again at some stage over the summer before the 2018 winners of the Ulster Senior Football. Champions will be confirmed.

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MARY KELLY CLG ARD AN RÁTHA

Mary Kelly is one of Donegal GAA's hardest working individuals who has served her club CLG Ard an Rátha with distinction from a very young age.

She first became involved at Pearse Memorial Park in the mid eighties. She has served in a variety of roles including PRO, Treasurer and Secretary. And while her work in an official capacity is well recognised, her efforts behind the scenes, on a daily basis, are simply immeasurable.

For that reason more than most, Mary has been the recipient of multiple 'Club Person of the Year' awards.

Outside the parameters of her club, she's been actively involved with the Southern Board. In 1991 she became the first Secretary of the County Ladies' Board where her administrative experience become a vital asset to the then fledgling organisation as she became very active in the promotion of Ladies' Football in the county during those early years. A fluent Irish speaker,



she was one of the real driving forces behind her club's push to host the 2015 national Comortas Peile na Gaeltachta championships. Back in 2013, she also led the efforts that secured Ard an Rátha gold in their Club Maith application.

She has done trojan work with Scór na nÓg and Scór Sínsear over the years. When the club decided to publish their detailed and award-winning chronicle of their history – 'Idir Peil agus Pobal'; Mary was again one of the real driving forces.

The new facilities at the GAA grounds in Ard an Rátha are the envy of many. Mary's invaluable input there also means standards won't slip. Her various fund-raising drives remain an invaluable source of income in these ever testing times.

Stalwarts - the unsung heroes behind the scenes and away from the limelight - make a serious contribution to our games. Every club has them. But it's seriously remiss of us to not shine a torch their direction every now and then to let them know we appreciate that work.

MOST supporters in attendance with a vested interest in today's minor match will come with Donegal colours attached. They'll be tetchy enough about their qualifier clash with Monaghan following what transpired in their first round encounter against reigning All-Ireland champions Tyrone, which was also at Ballybofey. The Red Hand youngsters demolished Donegal's challenge with a five-goal rout, roaring to a 5-12 to 1-10 victory despite only having a handful of survivors from last year's team. Moreover, there has been some upheaval in the lead-up to today's clash as manager Gary Duffy has chosen to dispense with the services of coach Shane Ward in the aftermath of their 14-point trouncing.

Tyrone's physical superiority will have been disconcerting from a Donegal perspective, but something that may prove easier to fix is their unfortunate tendency to conceded goals. Whatever the ins and outs of Ward's exit, it isn't all doom and gloom at underage level in the county either as they won the Buncrana Cup for the first time in five years as the Under 16's overcame Tyrone by just a point 1-12 to 1-11. Since the turn of the decade, Tir Chonaill have won two Ulster Minor Championships, (in 2014 and 2016), but they are sixth on the overall leaderboard behind Tyrone, Derry, Armagh, Down and Antrim.

Monaghan, meanwhile, were hotly tipped to go all the way in this year's Ulster Championship having won the provincial league title, but they slumped to a shock defeat in the first round to Derry. Luckily for both sides, there's a backdoor in this year's competition, and Monaghan have already picked themselves up with the floor with their win at Antrim last weekend.

Seamus McEnaney's side were comfortable 3-13 to 0-7 victors against an out-of-sorts Antrim. They played more than half the game with 14 players after the sending-off of forward Aaron Mulligan, but it mattered not a jot as they overpowered their inferior opposition with goals from Lochlainn Power (two) and Seán Jones.


With the match good as over, Monaghan had a comfortable 2-4 to 0-1 advantage at the break and held on for an easy 15-point win.

Tid be foolish to read too much into that match as the Saffrons were dealing with a whole host of problems. Their manager Padraig MacLaibheartaigh was only appointed in late January, admitted his side lagged

behind the rest of Ulster, and complained about a lack of buy in from the clubs in the county.

If you're looking for some evidence as to how today's match may transpire, you could do worse than reflect on their meeting in Ulster League Final in April. After a close-fought first-half, the Oriel turned on the afterburners after the break and cruised to a 2-21 to 1-12 victory. While it was 'only' the league, the match was played at a fairly high tempo, and it was another instance when the Donegal defence could've been tighter.

Tir Chonaill will look to the likes of Padraig McGettigan, Nathan Byrne and Shane O'Donnell up front, while Monaghan have equally effective attacking players like Ryan Farrelly, Jason Irwin, Loughlin Power, Aaron Mulligan, Sean Jones and Donnacha Swinbourne. Monaghan have been the better team this year so we'll give them a hesitant nod on this occasion.

AGAME OF 3 HALVES

'Game of 3 Halves' is a cross community event aimed at clubs and schools as part of the SEUPB Peace IV funded project 'Sport Uniting Communities'. Community Sports Development Officers (CSDO's) from Ulster GAA, Ulster Rugby and the IFA work closely together to promote close relations and community building through sport.

The 'Game of 3 Halves' is a joint initiative rolled out by the three sporting bodies, allowing participants to receive coaching in GAA, Rugby and Soccer in an environment where they are mixed with participants from other backgrounds and are encouraged to work closely and build relationships with people from all sections of the community.

The concept was first developed by Paul Brown, Youth Co-ordinator at Knock Presbyterian Church, together with PeacePlayers International as a cross-community initiative which would bring the three governing bodies together and offer children from both sides of the community the chance to experience Gaelic Games, Rugby and Soccer.

Each governing body invite young people from local primary schools or clubs from within 5 strategic areas and throughout the day participants receive top class coaching from CSDO's from all three sports.

The day is completed in a Blitz format where participants are divided into 'mixed' teams and play matches in all 3 sports.

Research conducted at events in early 2018 show that as little as 55% of participants felt very comfortable or fairly comfortable in engaging with people from other backgrounds prior to the event, increasing to over 90% on completion of the event. Only 11% of participants had regular contact with people from other sections of the community showing that events like this are a necessity in building positive relationships through sport in Northern Ireland and the bordering counties.

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





SENIOR PREVIEW:

CAVAN V DONEGAL

THESE two counties had contrasting league fortunes earlier this year, with Cavan gaining an impressive promotion to Division One and Donegal moving in the opposite direction into the second tier.

That they will ply their trade in Division Two next year will be a source of disappointment to Donegal, as they played some terrific football throughout the campaign. Most notably, their clash with Kerry in late January, when they lost by a single point in Killarney, was as exciting a game as one could hope

It is easy to see what new manager Declan Bonner is trying to do. Donegal, under firstly, Jim McGuinness and then Rory Gallagher, had become a team perhaps primarily associated with the defensive side of football. But when a county has at its disposal attacking talent of the quality of Paddy McBrearty, Michael Murphy, Ryan McHugh and Odhran MacNiallais, it is surely imperative that they are allowed to do what comes naturally.

Donegal have been in six of the last seven Ulster SFC finals, three of which they have won and two of which they lost narrowly. That marks them out as a formidable force in the province and although a number of key players have departed the scene over recent years - the likes of Karl Lacey, Colm McFadden and Paul Durcan for instance, they have been able to gradually introduce quality replacements.

And so, players such as Eoghan Ban Gallagher, Jamie Brennan, Nathan Mullins, Tony McClenaghan and Mark Anthony McGinley have all stepped up well.


Bonner was as obvious a choice for another crack at the senior job as anyone else, and successful terms in charge of the county minors and U21s means there is no-one better placed than he is to know what other young talent is available in the county. Donegal are many people's idea of potential Ulster champions this year, and it is not hard to see why.

But first they must overcome Cavan. and that will be no easy task. Terry Hyland had the Cavan senior team for four and a half years, with the suspicion being that although definite progress had been made, the Lacken man had taken the county so far, and could not take them any further.

The arrival of Mattie McGleenan in late 2016 was welcomed, and the Tyrone native will hope that his charges can take their league momentum into this championship opener. They certainly have the tools to get the job done this afternoon. From front to back, they are solid. Raymond Galligan is a top class goalkeeper, while in front of him, the likes of Conor Brady, Padraig Faulkner, Ciaran Brady and Jason McLoughlin are all, not just capable defenders, but excellent all-round footballers to boot.

The towering presence of the versatile Gearoid McKiernan, should he be deployed in midfield, gives Galligan the option to go long with his kick-outs, and up front they can boast the enduring quality of Cian Mackey and Seanie Johnston, alongside newer recruits such as Caoimhin O'Reilly and Oisin Kiernan. Captain of the side Dara McVeety is a significant miss though. In their last competitive outing, in the Division Two final, Cavan lost out to Roscommon on the astounding score line of 4-16 to 4-12.

Although this game is unlikely to be that open, both teams are managed by men who like their players to express themselves, and that should at least make for an entertaining game today.

THE WINNERS had stellar performers all over the field, in what would turn out to be a memorable year for the Breffni Blues. From goalkeeper Paul O'Dowd, who pulled off a superb double save from James Ruane, to the majestic midfield pairing off Stephen King and Dermot McCabe and the cutting edge of Larry Reilly and Ronan Carolan in attack, Cavan, after a laboured opening half, were irresistible in the second period. Man-of-the-match Carolan, in particular, was inspired, as he responded to being left out for the previous two games, by contributing a magnificent 1-7. It was a day of mixed emotions for Cavan boss Martin McHugh who watched some of his former teammates from the Donegal All-Ireland winning team of 1992 take a beating, which, but for wayward Cavan shooting, could have been decidedly worse.

MAY 12 2002

CAVAN got off to a nightmare start, when, with just three minutes on the clock, Brian Roper netted for Donegal. That lead became 1-3 to 0-0 with just seven minutes gone, and Cavan, managed by Mattie Kerrigan, never looked like clawing back the deficit. Gowna's Gerald Pierson finished the day with 0-10 alongside his name, and his coolness in front of the posts from play and dead balls was perhaps the only real positive from a Cavan viewpoint. A season that had began well – they reached the NFL Division One final, losing to Tyrone, petered out a few weeks later when Limerick dumped them out in the first round of the qualifiers. Donegal went on to lose the Ulster final to Armagh, and an All-Ireland quarter-final to Dublin

JUNE 12 2011

ULSTER SENIOR FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP QUARTER-FINAL

Breffni Park Donegal **2-14** Cavan **1-8**

IN A game played in desperately wet conditions at Breffni Park, Donegal destroyed a young Cavan side. The game was notable for two sendings off and the contribution of a Donegal schoolboy. In an attritional first 20 minutes, Cavan's Ray Cullivan was the first to walk – dismissed for leaving in a boot when contesting a high ball after just eight minutes, while eight minutes later, Donegal's Michael Murphy saw red after an off the ball incident. Patrick McBrearty was a late replacement for Michael Hegarty, and his inclusion reaped a rich dividend for the hosts. The Kilcar lad finished with 1-3. His 20th minute goal came after he was played in from a Mark McHugh line ball. From there he shrugged off his man before slotting the ball home.

MAY 20, 2012

DONEGAL began the defence of their Ulster title with another straightforward win against the Breffni men. Although Terry Hyland's men closed the gap from the previous year by three, the gulf between the sides was still apparent. That said, the home side did start the better, and the teams were still level after 20 minutes. However, when Colm McFadden converted a penalty on 31 minutes, Donegal were six up, and the game was effectively over. Eugene Keating had a fine afternoon for Cavan, hitting five points from play, off Neil McGee. Ultimately though, Cavan could not 'out-Donegal' Donegal. They tried to mirror their opponents game plan of packing their defence, leaving just two up, before counter attacking at speed, but found that Donegal, who would finish the year as All-Ireland champions, were the undisputed masters of that particular tactic.

A referee needs to run the length and breadth of the pitch throughout a full game so these checks are essential".


"These health checks give our referees a clear picture of their medical position at the start of the new season and the opportunity to get any health concerns checked out".





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CHILD PROTECTION LEGISLATION

SAFEGUARDING -CHANGES IN LEGISLATION

On 11 December 2017 the remaining provisions of the Children First Act commenced in full. The GAA published guidance on what clubs and counties must do in order to comply with Safeguarding legislation and Association policy.

VETTING

To comply with vetting legislation, all persons who have a regulated role with children, must be vetted prior to commencement of position.

APPOINTING A CHILDREN'S OFFICER

Club Children's Officer must be appointed and actively in membership of your Club Executive Committee.

APPOINTING A DESIGNATED LIAISON PERSON (DLP)

Each Club and County Board must appoint a Designated Liaison Person (DLP) who shall act as a resource, and is responsible for ensuring that reporting procedures within the Club/County are followed so that child welfare and protection concerns are referred as appropriate. The Club or County Chairperson automatically assumes the role of DLP unless another person is chosen and ratified to undertake the role. The DLP should be ratified on an annual basis by their Club or County and must attend the Association's DLP training in 2018.

CHILD SAFEGUARDING (PROTECTION) TRAINING

Child Safeguarding Training is highlighted in Children First as being mandatory and must be completed relevant to the role you play within the club as follows:

- Safeguarding 1 Child Protection in Sport Awareness Workshops relevant to coaches and others who work in a regulated role with children in the Association.
- Safeguarding 2 Club Children's Officer Training for Club Children's Officer
- Safeguarding 3 Designated Liaison Person Training for DLPS in Clubs

COACHING QUALIFICATION

GAA safeguarding codes have for a number of years promoted the practice that all coaches who work with children must have a minimum coaching qualification. Given the standards contained in Children First this requirement is even clearer now and it will also be referenced in our Child Safeguarding Statement. Confirmation of compliance shall be required by March 2018.

RISK ASSESSMENT

The Children First Guidance states that providers of relevant services to children must carry out a comprehensive risk assessment of their services and develop Child Safeguarding Statements thereafter. Each Club Executive shall be provided with a risk assessment template which must be formally discussed at an Executive meeting.

The Executive must minute and date the discussion. Following completion of this process they may then proceed to ratify a Child Safeguarding Statement for their Club and to display the statement as well.

CHILD SAFEGUARDING STATEMENT

The GAA Child Safeguarding Statement shall specify the services provided by the GAA and the principles and procedures to be observed to ensure, as far as practicable, that a child availing of our services is safe from harm. Reflective of our risk assessment procedure it shall be issued in poster format highlighting procedures such as Recruitment, the new Code of Behaviour (Underage), Safeguarding Training, Reporting Procedures, Children's Officers roles, DLPs etc. It shall be provided by the GAA for all of our Clubs.

NEW CODE OF BEHAVIOUR (UNDERAGE)

The GAA in collaboration with LGFA, Camogie, Handball and Rounders shall publish a new and enhanced joint Code of Behaviour (Underage).







ULSTER FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

FORMAT TO CHANGE FROM 2020

Changes are to be introduced to the Ulster Senior Football Championship from 2020. The Ulster GAA Competitions Control Committee have decided that from that year teams which play in the Preliminary Round will be exempt from playing in the province's opening fixture for two years. The change will mean that just five counties will be included in the Preliminary Round draw for the 2022 Championship and the championships thereafter.

Ulster GAA Provincial Secretary Brian McAvoy explained the rationale for the change saying;

"For many years the draw for the Ulster Championship has been conducted on the basis that all nine counties entered the bowl at the outset and the first two teams drawn played in the Preliminary Round. There was a time when the draw worked on a two-year cycle and there were indeed occasions when a county had to play in the Preliminary Round for four consecutive years."

"In my Annual Report to the Ulster Convention in January I highlighted the fact that Ulster was the only province that operated a 'straight' draw and that each of the other provinces had some 'conditions' attached to their Football Championship Draw.

"This in itself was not a valid reason for change but a close study showed how the Championship draw 'favoured' some counties over others when it came to Preliminary Round appearances. Cavan for example have played in the Preliminary Round on seven occasions since the millennium, while Derry have been drawn to play in it on just two occasions.

"While some may validly argue that this is just the lucthe draw, the statistics paint a picture which shows the teams which contest the Preliminary Round have a vepoor record when it comes to actually winning the Ulstitle. On only four occasions has a team that played in Preliminary Round gone on to win the Ulster title; Cava 1945, Armagh in 2005 and Donegal in 2011 and 2012."

The decision of the Ulster Competitions Control Committee is not retrospective, so nine counties will be included in the draw for the 2019 Ulster Championship. The two counties which are drawn to play in the Preliminary Round will not feature in the Preliminary Round draw for the 2020 and 2021 Championships. Se counties will be included in the Preliminary Round drafor the 2021 Championship and from the 2022 draw onwards just five counties will be included in the draw for the Preliminary Round game.

Brian McAvoy said; "It will come as no surprise that counties prefer not to be playing in the Preliminary Round and while some counties will in all probability continue to be 'favoured' by the draw more than others this change will hopefully add some measure of equilibrium to the statistics. While there is no ideal figua two-year exemption strikes the correct balance as a one-year exemption was unlikely to bring about much meaningful change, while a three-year exemption wou result in just three counties being in the Preliminary Round draw and this would significantly increase the prospect of repeat pairings."

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LOOKING BACK

CAVAN V DONEGAL 1997

The Ulster Championship of 1997 was one of the most competitive provincial championship in recent memory - 11 games in total, three of them replays, with plenty of drama throughout. Donegal scrapped past Antrim in Ballybofey, with goals from Brian Murray and Tony Boyle needed to secure a two-point victory.

Cavan needed a replay to see off the challenge of Fermanagh, with Peter Reilly and Fintan Cahill notching 0-3 each in a 0-14 to 0-11 win.

That brought together the clash of Cavan and Donegal in the first semi-final and the game drew much intrigue, with former Donegal All-Ireland winner Martin McHugh lining up as manager of Cavan. Over 20,000 supporters packed St Tiernach's Park and were treated to a virtuoso performance from Cavan fullforward Ronan Carolan.

The Cuchulainn's clubman weighed in with a personal tally of 1-7, ably assisted by brothers Peter and Larry Reilly who helped themselves to 1-2 and 0-4 respectfully. Donegal battled gamely and kept themselves in touch with goals from Tony Boyle and Brian McLaughlin, but it was to prove in vain as Cavan ran out winners by six points.



And finally, I want to thank our wonderful supporters for all their support: we are proud to represent you. Dún na





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ULSTER SCHOOLS BAILIEBOROUGH COMMUNITY SCHOOL

Two years later, when Cavan regained the Anglo-Celt Cup for the first time since 1969, Peter Reilly.

Gerry Sheridan and Paul O'Dowd were joined on the panel by Peter's brothers, Michael and Larry, the latter being arguably Cavan's best forward of the last 30 years.

Other BCS alnumi who progressed to the senior team included Raphael Rogers, Brian Sankey, Michael Argue, Conor Gilsenan and Alan Clarke from Kingscourt, who captained the team for a period of time.

At underage, the school, along with the clubs, have helped provided a steady stream of talent to Cavan underage teams. In more recent times, Brian Sankey, Michael Argue and Billy O'Mara were on the minor team in 2011 that bridged a 37-year gap between titles. Also, Cavan's four in a row of under 21 titles from 2011-14 was assisted by BCS alumni who included Alan O'Mara, Conor Gilsenan, Brian Sankey, Michael Argue, Conor Tierney, Shane Gray and Barry Tully.

Bailieborough Community School have had many successes at county vocational school level, although an Ulster title for the boy's teams has remained elusive. Highlights over the years have included a very successful period in the mid 90s, and also a three in a row of u14 from 2002 to 2004. In recent times, the school won the senior Cavan title in 2015, going on to lose in the Ulster semi-final in a replay. U14 and U16 titles followed last year, with the U14s losing the Gerry Brown semi-final at Ulster level. This year's U16 team also won a Cavan title and again fell at the penultimate stage. The ladies did bring home Ulster silverware with an U14 title in 2013.

As a school, we have welcomed the move from Vocational to Post-Primary competition, and we relish the challenges that are to come.
