# INSPIRING THE NEXT MILLIA

Mickey McShane first met his Tyrone players on April 20, and just three months later he leads them out at Croke Park.

Breakthroughs are nothing new to the Ballycastle native and, fresh from leading Slaughtneil to Derry and Ulster club hurling successes, he is now getting a sweet tune from his Red Hand County troops.

Damien Casey, the star man in the forward line, was one of those who tasted glory at Nickey Rackard Cup level against Fingal in 2014, and McShane recently hailed his "captain and leader".

"Sometimes Tyrone hurling can be talked of as a one-man show and it certainly isn't," adds McShane, "and Damien is the first to admit it. He's our talisman but there are some very good hurlers around him.

"We have introduced five or six young lads this year who are 18 or 19 and in their first year, learning their trade at this level. They have been impressive and are naturally good hurlers.'

The likes of Cian Ferguson and Bryan McGurk will need to hit the ground running at Croke Park against a Mayo side that operated in a division higher (2B) this

The Connacht side won by 17 points when these sides met in this competition on Halloween last year, and they've since recruited four-time football All-Star Keith Higgins on a full-time basis.

The dual star has led the line in the scoring stakes, Cathal Freeman gives them power and drive, while their defence has conceded just two goals in three games up to this stage.


Still smarting from last year's final defeat to Donegal, Mayo got a measure of revenge in the opening group game when winning by three points, before comprehensive wins over Leitrim and Armagh.

Cathal McErlean, manager of Monaghan and a former Tyrone star, explains how big a day this would be for either county. "At the end of the day, this is their Liam MacCarthy — it's the highest medal they can win at their level.

"After the final whistle last Saturday (against Donegal), the boys were celebrating and there are kids out on the pitch pucking with Damien Casey beside them.

"They'll be looking up to them and finding inspiration from that. All these counties will be trying to get that win and inspire the next generation to pick up a hurl.

"It's not about winning and losing, it's about picking up the hurl and playing the best game in the world."

# ULSTER GAA Charity Partner

Ulster GAA is delighted to be "Supporting Prostate Cancer Research" with the Patrick G Johnston Centre for Cancer Research at Oueen's University Belfast, for the third year.

Over 4,500 men in Irel<u>and are</u> diagnosed with prostate cancer every year. In the UK, prostate cancer deaths have exceeded breast cancer deaths for the first time, with over 11,000 men per year dying of aggressive forms of prostate cancer. At present, 1 in 8 men will develop a clinically significant prostate cancer in their lifetime, with an increased risk for those aged 50 or more (the majority of cases are diagnosed in men aged 65+) or with a family history of prostate cancer.

# How does prostate cancer

Prostate cancer is often diagnosed when men present to their GP with urinary symptoms, such as getting up more frequently at night to urinate, having an inability to empty their bladder completely or going to the toilet more frequently. It is important to note that whilst these symptoms can prompt investigations, more often than not, they indicate a benignly enlarged prostate. Many men are diagnosed with prostate cancer following routine checks in the absence of symptoms, most commonly, a routine blood test called Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA).

**How is it treated?**Patients with localised disease within the prostate have a number of curative options available to them including surgery, radiotherapy, brachytherapy (seed radiation) and, in some instances, active surveillance whereby the cancer is low risk but monitored closely for signs of change. For some men, prostate cancer can spread to the bones and other parts of the body, leaving the disease incurable. However, even at this stage a number of newer treatments enable men to live with the disease for many years beyond diagnosis. If you have concerns about yourself or a family member, consult with your GP for further advice.

# Prostate Research at Queen's

The Prostate Clinical Research Team at QUB comprises a team of Clinical Research and NHS Consultant Oncologists, coupled with expert scientific research from the Patrick G Johnston Centre for Cancer Research. The team's ethos is to improve patient care through world-class clinical trials of new treatments. In addition to improving education for patients and healthcare workers, the team supervise research from medical students, scientists, physicists and clinical doctors to sustain a culture of ongoing excellence in prostate cancer research. The team is dedicated to ensuring that our patients and their families have the best treatments at the correct time and that survival rates continue to

improve for men diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Ulster President, Oliver Galligan, said "I am delighted to choose prostate cancer research as Ulster GAA's charitable cause for 2021. COVID has disrupted our ability to promote our Charity Partner as we would normally have done over the past number of years. I would encourage anyone who can donate, to do so, as these much-needed funds will go directly to world-class research being undertaken by Queens University, Belfast.'

# **CROKE PARK SPECTATOR CODE OF CONDUCT**

To help protect you and your fellow supporters, and to assist our staff and stewards, you are kindly requested to follow the guidelines below in relation to the management of Covid-19 in Croke Park Stadium. This Spectator Code of Conduct is in addition to the existing Ground Regulations. Where a person is in breach of any of these quidelines, such person may be refused entry to, or ejected from the ground.

# **BEFORE ARRIVING TO THE STADIUM:**

- Do not attend the match if you or any member of your household or social bubble have, or develop any symptoms of Covid-19, or, if you are self-isolating.
- You should self-assess your health based on your own age and susceptibility to infection and clinical vulnerability and those in your household or bubble. Please make yourself aware of the HSE guidelines here
- Download and install the free Covid Tracker App on your phone, to assist in contact tracing.
- Familiarise yourself with stadium policies and procedures available on the Croke Park website crokepark.ie/welcomeback. Share this information with people who are attending the match with you.
- Tickets are not transferable. You must not pass on or sell tickets to any other individual or group.
- Plan your journey to and from the stadium, for information on transport routes see crokepark.ie and transportforireland.ie
- Allow adequate time for entry procedures and familiarise yourself with your colour-coded entry route and entry times. This information will be on your ticket.
- Please do not congregate with other friends or fellow supporters on your way to, or outside the stadium. Always comply with the current Government Covid-19 health advice and measures.

# AT THE STADIUM:

- The use of face coverings is required for all spectators over the age of 13 (including those who have been vaccinated) and must be used in all areas of the ground. If you are exempt from wearing a face covering, exemption lanyards are available at the Customer Care Points.
- Please observe social distancing of at least two metres and avoid close contact with others.
- Bring your own hand sanitiser and practice good hand hygiene. Adequate hand washing facilities will be available onsite
- Please observe good respiratory etiquette; always cover your mouth / nose if needing to cough or sneeze.
- Remain in your allocated seat and keep movements around the stadium to a minimum.
- If you need to leave your seat, wait for a time when the aisle is clear and follow the signage and instructions of stewards.
- When accessing the facilities, please ensure you comply with stadium signage and instructions of the stewards. Please be patient and maintain a distance of two metres while queuing.
- Avoid hugs, handshakes and any close contac with those who are not in your social bubble.
- Be mindful of others when cheering, or celebrating.

## **AFTER THE MATCH:**

- You will be instructed to exit in a phased manner, please follow the instructions of stewards, big screen, and PA
  announcements.
- Do not congregate with other friends or fellow supporters outside the stadium.



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# Building Capacity in Coaching and Games in Our Clubs

Get your club involved in the programme

In 2020 Ulster completed its Club Audit with a huge response from 98% of clubs. Given the times that we are in, the challenges identified in the Audit have been amplified. We had already moved to give more support to our clubs and in 2021 over eighty-six clubs and two thousand five hundred volunteers had received bespoke Club Coaching Plan support. The club coach the coaches programme offered bespoke support across the player pathway from nursery to senior team. Club support will continue.

With the new player pathway framework in place, there is an even bigger drive to bring the support that goes into our Academies, to a wider audience in schools and clubs. The welfare of a young club player is equally important to that of a player in an academy. The challenge is there to ensure all our stakeholders take responsibility for delivering the right messages in their environments. We want to work with all agencies to support this delivery.

As a sports organisation we work closely with other external agencies to tie our programmes and initiatives into government policy in the north and south. The next policy document from government places an emphasis on Fundamentals, Physical Literacy, PE is Schools, Competitive Sport and Sports Development, as well as Performance Sports and Physical Activity and Sport in middle and Older ages.

We have worked to cover these bases in our clubs. Strong physical literacy programmes are in nurseries for over fifteen years and reinforced by ongoing nursery workshops. Schools coaching is strong and embedding a strong school to club link remains a priority. Our clubs encourage lifelong involvement and although not embedded widely, half paced hurling and football is growing and master's handball very popular. Inclusion in all capacities is at the front of our programmes. Our engagement with Ulster Ladies Football



and Camogie is strong. Our challenge is to nurture and manage this diversity in our clubs. As a community sport we want young and old to have a sporting choice at their club. Football has been our strongest sport, but equal attention to hurling and handball is required by our units. Activity in further and higher education ensures continued participation after post- primary. Our county representative teams have well embedded performance pathway programmes.

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# Ulster GAA Volunteers Play a Key Role in

Covid-19 Vaccination Programme Holl-Out

Since the start of the year GAA Volunteers from across Ulster have been to the forefront of a coordinated volunteer response within the mass vaccination centres.

Ulster GAA in partnership with Volunteer Now and British Red Cross provided volunteers to assist in the safe roll-out of the vaccine in an effort to combat the Covid-19 pandemic and protect those most vulnerable.

Ulster GAA took the lead role in the vaccination centres in Enniskillen and Omagh while also providing volunteer support in Derry City and Craigavon. Ulster GAA staff were instrumental in the initial response and were able to integrate club volunteers into the key roles. A call out to local clubs proved really successful and from January 2021 approximately 160 GAA volunteers signed up and contributed nearly 10,000 volunteer hours towards this vaccine rollout.

The main roles undertaken by our volunteers were around meeting and greeting, queue management and directing people within the centres. They also provided welcome reassurance and a friendly face for those elderly and vulnerable who were apprehensive about leaving their homes during lockdown.

The Department of Health, the Public Health Agency and the Health and Social Care Trusts have all been extremely appreciative of the commitment by volunteers to the vaccine rollout

Health Minister Robin Swann said; "I cannot praise all those involved in the vaccination programme highly enough. It has been a massive logistical undertaking and has seen over one million people receive at least one dose of vaccine in just five months. Volunteers have played a key role within the vaccination teams and they should all be very proud of the contribution they have made. As Health Minister, I would like to put on record my sincere thanks to all of them."

Today (31st July 2021) is the last day that volunteers will be involved in this role, and we leave happy in the knowledge that the GAA and its volunteers have played a vital role in this vaccination programme. Ulster GAA are delighted to have been involved in this unique volunteering partnership with Volunteer Now and British Red Cross. The response to our call for volunteers from our grassroots GAA club members has been fantastic, and from January they have all been instrumental in the safe roll out of the vaccination programme. GAA clubs have been to the forefront of localised community responses since the start of the pandemic, and it is no surprise that club members put their hands up to volunteer as part of this collective effort.

Ulster GAA would like to thank all the GAA volunteers involved over the last seven months and the staff that helped throughout, in particular to Sharon Haughey-Grimley and Pierce Caherty who worked tirelessly to coordinate volunteer shifts and provide effective communications to the GAA volunteers.





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# **ULSTER GAA TRIBUTE**



I woke shortly after 7.00 am on the morning of Saturday 17th July and, as I do most mornings,' checked the smartphone to learn of any overnight developments.

One WhatsApp message hit me hard! Disbelievingly, I read it a second time....and a third. It was from the Monaghan County Chairman Declan Flanagan. It read: "Just home from our U-20 captain's home. He tragically lost his life in a traffic accident last night! May he rest in peace."

Numbed, I checked the RTE news app. 'A 19-year-old man had died in a traffic accident in Co. Monaghan,' it read. The 8.00 am 'Athlone' news (as my father would have called it) confirmed what I already knew.

I didn't know Brendan Óg Ó Dufaigh but from what I've learned of him over the past couple of weeks, that is my loss. A son, a brother, a teammate, a friend, a colleague, a motivator, a leader, a captain. That was 'Ógie.'

I remember him raising aloft the Father Murray Cup when Monaghan defeated Derry in the Ulster Minor Final in 2018 and who will forget how agonisingly close they came to dethroning Kerry in the All-Ireland semi-final in Croke Park, with Brendan, as always, to the fore.

Writing in 'The Irish Independent' on the Monday Following his death, Monaghan footballing legend Dick Clerkin referenced the many qualities of 'Ógie', stating how he was idolised by his own children, who also play with Monaghan Harps. Dick also told of the maturity of Brendan and how he declined the invitation to join the county senior panel, preferring to remain with the U-20's until he was prepared to face the physical challenges of senior inter-county football. His father Brendan also spoke of this when I visited the family home the following evening, along with other officers from Ulster GAA.

Visiting the Ó Dufaigh house was a humbling experience. From listening to his parents Esther and Brendan it's not hard to explain where his leadership qualities and sense of purpose in life came from.

The GAA family united in grief with Brendan's passing. The Monaghan Harps grounds became the epicentre of GAA affairs for a few days as people from right across the GAA family came to pay their respects. Representatives from the Down U-20 team, who will play Monaghan in the Ulster Final, and the Donegal U-20 team, who Monaghan defeated earlier on the evening of Brendan's death, with thousands of others lined the road as the funeral cortege made its way from his home to Monaghan Cathedral.

In his 19 short years 'Ógie' made a lasting contribution to the GAA in Monaghan. He will be missed by many but most notably by his loving family. On behalf of Ulster GAA, I extend our deepest condolences to Esther and Brendan, his sisters Claire and Áine and to the entire GAA community in Monaghan, especially the U-20 panel members and his club colleagues at Monaghan Harps. You may be gone but your legacy lives on. Sleep well 'Ógie.' Ar dheis Dé go raibh a anam.

# David Gough (On Mhú)

David is a member of the Slane GAA club in County Meath and is the GAA Education and Development Officer on the DCU St Patrick's Campus. This is his ninth year on the GAA National Referees Championship panel.

A Hogan Cup winner with St Patrick's Navan in 2001, David's first All-Ireland Final was the U21 Football decider between Cork and Galway in 2013. The following year he was the man in the middle for the National Football League Division 2 Final when Monaghan defeated Donegal. In 2018 he refereed his first All-Ireland Senior Club Final between Corofin and Nemo Rangers.

The Meath man had to bide his time to referee the biggest game of all. He had refereed two All-Ireland Senior semi-finals in 2016 and 2017 before taking charge of the 2019 All-Ireland Senior Football Final between Dublin and Kerry, which ended in a draw. His most recent outing in the Ulster Championship was the 2019 semi-final game between Donegal and Tyrone at Breffni Park.

On duty with David today are his reliable team of umpires; Dean Gough, Eugene Gough, Stephen Gough and Terry Gough.



# Darren Hughes

Though he would never warm to the tag, Darren Hughes is entering the veteran stage of his intercounty career with Monaghan. The Scotstown farmer insists that retirement never crossed his mind over the winter months, and his performances in 2021 to date have shown a player who is a central block around which manager Seamus McEnaney is building.

Hughes has quite literally seen it all in a Farney jersey, from collecting two Ulster Championship medals in 2013 and 2015 to lifting National League titles in Division 2 and 3, all since wearing the Number 1 jersey in the Ulster Championship back against Armagh in 2010. He has been there for the highest of the highs and the lowest of the lows.

So if Monaghan are to get back on the crest of a wave in Croke Park this afternoon, they will need the Scotstown man to be on top form around the middle of the pitch. His running power was something Armagh failed to contend with in the last round, as Hughes was instrumental to the four first half goals which helped to set up victory. With Tyrone fielding a relatively inexperienced midfield duo of Brian Kennedy and Conn Kilpatrick, they may have to come up with an alternative plan if they are to stop the Scotstown man from having a major say in todays outcome.

# Kieran McGeary

An epitome of the modern day footballer, McGeary is one of the most energetic players in the game, and Monaghan will have to be at their best to curb his influence. Against Donegal in the semi final, the Pomeroy Plunkett's man was a constant thorn in the side of Donegal, popping up all over the pitch to help carry the ball from defence and launch wave after wave of Tyrone attacks.

Kieran was captain when Tyrone defeated Tipperary in the U21 All-Ireland Football Final back in 2015, and made his Senior debut the following year in a Dr McKenna Cup tie against Queen's University. A substitute appearance against Derry in Celtic Park during the 2016 Ulster Championship was his first taste of championship action, and he has been a mainstay of the Tyrone team ever since.

His inter-county career since then has been the proverbial rollercoaster. Red Hand fans will remember his last gasp point against Donegal in the 2016 Ulster Final to seal victory, though an All-Ireland Final appearance in 2018 was cut short by a harsh black card. The job of thwarting McGeary's influence today may well fall to Ryan McAnespie, who will try and use his own attacking threat to turn the tables, a move which may suit the Tyrone man just fine.



If today's Ulster Senior Football Championship final produces the same drama, excitement and quality witnessed in the competition's previous round a fortnight ago, Monaghan vs Tyrone at Croke Park this afternoon will be a classic.

Both teams came through a sweltering semi-final weekend of epic proportions. Monaghan scored three injury-time points to earn a memorable victory over Armagh in a thrilling 4-17 to 2-21 win at Páirc Esler on the Saturday.

Seamus McEnaney's side led by seven at halftime after scoring four first half goals, with Conor McManus, Jack McCarron, Micheal Bannigan and Darren Hughes all getting through to find the net in the opening half.

The inspirational Rian O'Neill helped Armagh roar back into the game in the second half and incredibly they lead by two in the late stages, Orchard substitutes Conor Turbitt and Tiernan Kelly both hitting the net while O'Neill brothers Rian and Oisin and Rory Grugan kicked vital scores.

In a thrilling finale though, the ever-reliable McManus stepped up to send over two clutch frees before Stephen O'Hanlon tagged on an insurance point as the Farney reached their first final since 2015.

In Enniskillen on Sunday, Tyrone got the better of Donegal 0-23 to 1-14 in a semi-final that didn't quite match the previous day for high scoring and late drama, but nevertheless was a pulsating encounter in its own right.

The first half was closely run with Tyrone leading by one at the interval, but a defining moment came minutes earlier when Donegal had captain Michael Murphy sent off, having missed a penalty in the 27th minute that would have put the Tír Chonaill five ahead at that point. Donegal had also been rocked by the loss of Neil McGee with injury inside the game's opening few minutes.

Caolan McGonigle's goal early in the second half ensured Donegal remained in close contention despite their numerical disadvantage, however Tyrone's bench made a telling impact in the final quarter, with substitutes Tiernan McCann, Conor McKenna and Cathal McShane all scoring key points to drive them home to victory.

A black card dismissal to man of the match Kieran McGeary late on did no harm to Tyrone as they closed out the win to book their place in a first Ulster final since 2017.

Both these teams have fairly recent Anglo Celt Cup glory to recall - Tyrone in 2017 and Monaghan in 2015 - but how they would love to recapture provincial success once again today in Croke Park. Here's hoping another thrilling Ulster encounter is in store.

# SAVOURING THE CHANCE TO RECAPTURE GLORY IN MONAGHAN'S EXCITING NEW DECADE

All Ryan Wylie wants to do, and has ever wanted to do as a Gaelic footballer, is to win silverware with the teams he has played on.

The Monaghan captain, like many other players who have reached the top level of the game, has felt the highs of success and the lows of loss. One of those options is clearly preferred, especially when it comes to occasion like today, the Ulster Senior Football Final.

"Fortunately, I've been lucky enough to experience winning the Ulster Championship twice, but I've also been on the unfortunate end of losing them, so I know which side I'd rather be on.

"It would be very special to win. The last few months that everyone has been through, with Covid and being locked away and things, just for supporters and young families it would be nice to have something at the end of the year to look back on. That's our motivation, but Tyrone will have the same motivation."

Wylie was a youngster fresh onto the panel when Monaghan won their first Ulster title in 25 years back in 2013. Another Final appearance came the following year for the Farney, before they landed a second Anglo-Celt in three years the next season in 2015.

However, that would be their last Ulster triumph and appearance in the provincial decider. While reaching the 2018 All-Ireland semi-final was undoubtedly another highpoint, Monaghan's decade of glory would tail off with Ulster SFC defeats to rivals Cavan in 2019 and 2020.

This year though, revitalised and renewed by an influx of new, up-and-coming players such as Micheál Bannigan, Aaron Mulligan and Killian Lavelle, Monaghan are back in the hunt for the Ulster crown once more.

The vibrancy of the new wave is exciting for Ballybay clubman Wylie, and that conveyor belt of talent from a county famously identified with having a small pick, is grounds for enthusiasm.



"There are a few younger players who have really pushed on. They've promised at minor level, and sometimes it's difficult to break into a senior team, but testament to players like that, they kept patient and they kept working hard and it's paying off for them now.

"The way football has gone, you need all your players. With some of those players on the bench, it's probably testament to the some of the players that are starting now. A couple of years ago they'd have been the ones on the bench, and they've worked hard to get a starting place. Everyone here, they're champing at the bit to try and get one of those 1-15 jerseys.

"I know in 2013 when we won our first Ulster in 20-odd years, 2015 we won another one, they were two great teams. 2018 was the first time we got by the All-Ireland quarter final mark. But we have a completely fresh team, and we're lucky enough to get to the final this year.

"However, it's a very similar team that played against Cavan last year, and we probably weren't getting the best headlines after that. As the saying goes, 'You're only a foot away from a pat on the back and a kick in the arse'."

"This game will take a whole life of its own, both ourselves and Tyrone have different management teams. Hopefully we'll be able to get the result."

Becoming Tyrone senior team captain filled Padraig Hampsey with pride when he was entrusted with the role earlier in the year.

The Coalisland Fianna man is ardent about the number of suitable candidates present across the team, so to be marked out by incoming managers Feargal Logan and Brian Dooher as the man to lead the Red Hands in 2021 was a "huge honour".

"Before we'd got the season off and going, Feargal and Brian approached me and we spoke about a few different things. They named me as captain there and then.

"There's plenty of players on that team who probably could have got that role, plenty of leaders, so it was a nice thing to receive. It shows over the last number of years you're keeping your head down and working hard, to get your place and to keep your place, so it's a huge honour to be captain of such a great bunch of lads.

"The likes of Mattie Donnelly, Petey Harte, Tiernan McCann, Niall Sludden, we've all been playing together this last number of years, we've built that close bond, we all trust each other so much.

"In the 2016 Ulster win, I never played much part, but in 2017 I sort of made my place in the team, and it was a massive day for Tyrone supporters and Tyrone people. Going down to captain us into another final is massive."

Tyrone's chastening defeat to Kerry on the last day of the League hung over them like a storm cloud in the four weeks running into their Ulster Championship opener with reighing champions Cavan.

Serious questions were raised about their credentials as contenders for silverware this season as the concession of six goals in Killarney forced Hampsey and his defensive unit to rectify the faults before Championship time came around.

A month of work on the training ground though helped restore some solidity at the back that was vital for their wins over Cavan and Donegal in previous rounds.

"We were being questioned about how good we'd been in our National League games, and in the defeat to Kerry. We as players took it on board. We had to ask ourselves a lot of questions and strip it right back. That day, defensively we just got torn apart by Kerry. We had to address that and thankfully we did. Over the last two games we've brushed up on that. But I think there is more to be done."

Hampsey and co. will need to again to ensure that defensive structure holds firm again today against a Monaghan side who have shown to be rampant in the goals department of late, and no less stocked in terms of team character and resolve.

"Monaghan are a very strong side, they've shown that in the National League and in Ulster so far. They've went through a tough time in the past few weeks, and they showed that passion in the game against Armagh. They probably looked down and out at a stage, but that fighting spirit brought them over the line. We'll expect the same from them again.

#### Kieran Duffy v Darren McCurry

With Colin Walshe's calf injury limiting his game-time this season, a spot opened up for Monaghan's go-to man-marker and it's vice-captain Kieran Duffy who has filled the void. Conor Boyle and Ryan Wylie are likely to be attached to the likes of Conor Meyler and Kieran McGeary, leaving the Latton defender with an old fashioned one-on-one battle with the man known around Tyrone as 'the Dazzler'. Duffy was left fairly isolated in defence in the second half against Armagh and found the going tough, but it was that sort of game where forwards on both sides were well on top. McCurry has been in sensational form for Tyrone and was Man of the Match against Cavan and was superb against Donegal with four of his seven points coming from play. Given the form he is in, shutting the Edendork man out is probably impossible, but a wise head like Duffy could at least limit his threat.

#### Conor McManus v Ronan McNamee

Padraig Hampsey has spent a bit of time tracking Conor McManus but the responsibility looks likely to fall back on the shoulders of Ronan McNamee at Croke Park today. It has been a feisty duel in the past, and McNamee will certainly try and bring a physical edge to it, but there is plenty of respect there too. Three years ago the Tyrone defender said that McManus was one of the top three players in the country on form while 'Mansy' no doubt is well aware of how difficult it is to get the better of this particular direct opponent. This may be the most important duel of the day with both viewed as players that stand up and be counted. Psychologically, it would be a massive blow for a team if they saw one of their main men being dominated – and with a big crowd in Croke Park today, relatively speaking, any ball swatted away or dummy sold will be met with a massive cheer. You won't be able to take your eyes off this one.

#### Rory Beggan v Niall Morgan

It's become such an important part of the Gaelic football fabric that it's impossible not to examine the impact respective goalkeepers can have on the outcome of a game. We all know the craic around Rory Beggan and Niall Morgan – both have super variation on their kick-outs and can kick long-range scores. The Monaghan goalkeeper seems to have evolved even further this season though. While Morgan, particularly earlier in his career, had a habit of soloing out from goals, Beggan has taken it to new levels this season, as witnessed when he fouled the Galway goalkeeper in a National League match. The Scotstown man has spent a fair chunk of games out the field, often playing around the half-back line and venturing further forward on occasion. Morgan has been cautious enough this season but is still such a vital cog to the team, although he is not called on for his shooting his much anymore and has just one point to his name in 2021. Beggan has 0-6.

# Seamus Mc Francy

CORDUFF native McEnaney returned for a second spell as manager of his native Monaghan when Malachy O'Rourke stepped down at the end of the 2019 campaign. O'Rourke delivered two Ulster titles and took the Farneymen to the brink of an All-Ireland final in 2018 – Monaghan lost to Tyrone by a single point in the semi-final in their most recent Croke Park duel.

This final pairing is a familiar one for 'Banty'. He guided Monaghan to the Ulster finals of 2007 and 2010 but lost both to the Red Hands and it goes without saying that he would love to end that run today.

Tactically astute and experienced, McEnaney has utilised the knowhow of a backroom team that includes David McCague, Donie Buckley and Vinny Corey, He also had spells in charge of Meath and Wexford and returned to the Monaghan dugout (after suspension for a breach of Covid-19 training regulations) this season in time to inspire his men to an unforgettable semi-final win over Armagh.

Monaghan's performance was all the more remarkable given that on the eve of that game the country in general and their county in particular was deeply saddened by the tragic news that Monaghan U20 captain Brendan Og Duffy had lost his life in a car crash on the way home from leading his team to the Ulster U20 decider.

An Ulster minor winner in 2018, McEnaney has introduced talented youngsters like Killian Lavelle and Micheal Bannigan into a team of proven performers including the Hughes brothers (Darren and Kieran), the Wylie's (team captain Ryan and Drew), goalkeeper Rory Beggan, Karl O'Connell and of course Conor McManus this season.



# Feorgal Logan & Brian Dooher

MICKEY Harte's 18 years in the Red Hand dugout delivered three Sam Maguires and taking over from a bona fide Tyrone legend was a formidable challenge for Logan and Dooher.

But Harte's successors have embraced it impressively in their first season and, without making wholesale changes, they have done things their own way. The style of the team has evolved from the trademark measured build-up out of defence into an increasingly front-foot gameplan that places much more emphasis on getting the ball forward quickly and supporting the full-forwards with fleet-footed runners breaking from the middle-third of the field.

Stewartstown clubman Logan was a member of the Tyrone team that lost out to Dublin in the county's second All-Ireland final in 1995. Meanwhile, Clann na nGael native Dooher was a pivotal part of the Harte sides that won All-Ireland's in 2003, 2005 and 2008.

Logan and Dooher combined with Peter Canavan to lead Tyrone to the All-Ireland U21 title in 2015 and they renewed their partnership at senior level this season with several members of that talented team including Padraig Hampsey, Kieran McGeary, Frank Burns, Cathal McShane, Conor Meyler and Mark Bradley.



# The Anglo-Celt Cup Corn Anglo Cett

Cheilteach an corn is sine acu. Tá Corn The Anglo Celt ag croílár CLG Uladh. D'oibrigh Comhairle Uladh go crua le linn na 1920í chun an CLG a láidriú, agus cé go raibh muid níos mó ná 30 bliain d'aois ag an am sin (i gcomhthéacs an CLG), ní raibh corn feiliúnach againn le bronnadh ar ár mbuaiteoirí féin i gCraobhchomórtas Uladh.

Cups named after newspapers are not uncommon in the GAA: we have the Irish Press Cup (All-Ireland Minor Hurling), the Irish Independent Cup (All-Ireland Junior Football). But the oldest of them all is our Anglo-Celt Cup.

The Anglo-Celt was and remains an important building block in Ulster GAA. After the turmoil of the previous decades, the Ulster Council worked hard in the 1920s to get the GAA here on a firm footing. Although then in its thirties in age terms, the Ulster Senior Football Championship still had no suitable trophy to award to its winners.

The cash-strapped Council faced a dilemma until John F. O'Hanlon, the managing director of the Anglo-Celt newspaper, stepped forward in 1925 and donated a Cup. A much smaller Cup than the current substantial version, the new Anglo-Celt Cup was, very appropriately, first won by Cavan who would go on to lift it another 23 times over the following 37

That original Cup was lost after the 1962 Final and when Down won their fourth Ulster title in 1963. against Donegal in front of a huge crowd in Breffni Park, it was George Lavery who had the honour of being the first Captain to receive the new Anglo-

Such is the strength of the Ulster Championship, the Anglo-Celt remains welcome and prized wherever it goes. Today Ryan Wylie hopes to become the first Monaghan man since 2015 to lift the trophy. Meanwhile Padraig Hampsey will be aiming to repeat his walk up the steps when he captained Tyrone minors to an Ulster title away back in 2012.

Colm McFadden chipped in with 0-4 while James Kielt also hit 0-4 for the Oak Leaf county.


## 2001

Larry Reilly spun Mickey McGee early on and his goal bound shot whizzed past the outside of the post and this proved to be a massive play in the final outcome. Shortly afterwards, Cormac McAnallen punched a Eoin Mulligan pass to the net to put the Red Hand county in the ascendancy. Team captain Sean Teague went off injured and Jason Reilly hit the net to bring the Breffni men back into contention. With the teams tied late on, Gerard Cavlan and Eoin Gormley hit great points to see Tyrone collect their first title since 1996. In a twist of fate in the maiden year of the Qualifier system, Tyrone lost out to Derry in the All Ireland Quarter Final, whom they had already beaten in the Ulster Semi Final.







## 1991

#### An Domhnach, 28ú Iúil i gCluain Eois An Dún 1-15 Dún na nGall 0-10

The lyrics of the great song proclaimed "The Boys in Red and Black are Back" and this was certainly the case in St Tiernach's Park on Ulster Final day. This was the fourth decade in a row that Down claimed the Anglo Celt in a year ending in '1. Mickey Linden flew onto a long delivery to round Gary Walsh and hit the only major of the game. Down held the lead for the duration of the game and a Neil Collins save from Barry McGowan when there was only four in it at the three quarter stage proved vital. Paddy O'Rourke lifted the Anglo Celt for the first time in a decade as Down were on the crest of a wave en route to claiming their fourth All Ireland Senior title.

## 1981

Armagh were backboned by 9 starters from the All Ireland final in 1977, including Brian McAlinden, Jimmy Smyth, Paddy Moriarty, Colm McKinstry and Peter Loughran. However, a youthful young left half forward by the name of Greg Blaney announced his arrival on the senior scene with an early left footed goal. Two goals from Down full forward, John McCartan, including a beautiful chip saw the Mournemen ease to a eight point victory. Brian Hughes scored the Armagh goal while Burren's Tommy McGovern captained the winning side from left corner back.

#### Ulster Championship Semi-Final Monaghan v Armagh

Monaghan qualified for their first Ulster Final since 2015 with a nail-biting encounter which produced 44 scores over the course of the game. Those spectators lucky enough to be inside Páirc Esler, witnessed a total of six goals and 38 points and the 8th highest scoring game in Senior Championship history.

As we look at this game in more detail, both teams were evenly matched for most parts and Armagh actually excelled Monaghan in various sectors, but as the old saying goes, 'Goals Win Games', and Monaghan used their four goal advantage as a major stepping stone in putting one foot in the Ulster Final.



From looking at the statistics it would be hard to see how Armagh let this one get away. They generated more attacking efforts into the opposition 45, got more shots away from play and scored more times from play. Even from frees, Monaghan only outscored their opposition 6 points to Armagh 5. However, the variation of scorers across the Monaghan team, and the reliability of Conor McManus from dead balls had a huge impact in securing their final position. A measure of how close these teams were at the end up was characterised by the turnover/free count. In a game that was nip & tuck the whole way the teams had the same number of turnovers and conceded the same amount of frees during the game. The difference, and as it turned out one of the most pivotal points in the game, was that Monaghan had 9 shots from frees (scoring 7 of these). Ultimately it was McManus who stepped up to hit 2 of these in injury time to seal victory.

A more efficient Tyrone against Donegal, set up their first Ulster final appearance against Monaghan for 11 years with Darren McCurry top scoring for the Red Hands with 0-7 in total (0-3 frees).

Overall, Tyrone had a wider spread of scorers on the day which helped their cause. Of the 23 points, Tyrone had 10 different scorers with five points coming from their bench (McCann 0-3, McKenna 0-1, McShane 0-1f). Donegal's lack of efficiency up front cost them dearly only converting 67% of their shots from play and 62% of their shots from frees.



#### **Kickout Analysis**

In recent years the goalkeeper's kickout has been one of the skills under most judgement due to its importance in regaining possession and being used as a catalyst for attacks. As such we are seeing a trend of goalkeepers opting for shorter kickouts in favour of long ones. With goalkeepers such as Morgan, Patton and Beggan being able to find teammates with such precision all over the pitch opposition teams are now offering up the short kickout to retreat an extra man back into the defence in anticipation of the opposition attacks. Tyrone's kickout retention of 89% against Donegal is the second highest in this years Ulster Championship beaten only by Armagh's Man of the Match Blaine Hughes v Antrim (91%).



Both Morgan and Patton opted to go to the wings as their preferred option in the Semi final with a total of 39 kickouts being placed wide and only 10 kickouts down the middle. Both keepers opted for shorter options more often than not. Morgan successful with 12/12 short and 5/7 long, Patton successful with 19/21 short and 6/7 long. With two of the best goalkeepers and free takers on show in this year's Ulster final, we may see an exhibition of dead ball kicking from both Beggan and Moran.

If Tyrone are to overcome the Monaghan opposition they will need to bring the same intensity in their play that they shown against Donegal as they turned over their opposers on a count of 14 to 9. However they conceded 8 scoreable frees against Donegal of which their opponents scored 0-5 from and with the accuracy of McManus and Beggan from distance on scoreable frees this may be an area where discipline in the tackle could be of the utmost importance in retaining the Anglo-Celt cup for the 16th time.

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












#### A chara,

Ten years ago, what seemed to be the final straw was placed on the back of Cavan hurling.

South Down had rolled into Ballyconnell for the final Division 4 clash of the season, and cantered to a 41-point win. With 26 goals conceded in five heavy league defeats, spirits were low in Cavan.

The following month, in April 2011, the decision was made to pull the side from the 2011 Lory Meagher Cup, and not long after the team was disbanded altogether.

For six long years, the Breffni went without a representative in the ancient game. The only county in the country without a senior hurling side.

It didn't happen overnight, but people like Séamus Hughes and Eoin Morrissey put their shoulder to the wheel, while Cavan native Aogán O Fearghail took up the role of GAA president in 2015 and was keen to see their return.

Between the jigs and the reels, Tipperary native Dinny Cahill spearheaded a management team that took them back onto the field for the opening round of the 2017 Lory Meagher Cup. Warwickshire won the game with plenty to spare, but the wheels were turning once more, and they rolled on until the season ended with a group win over Fermanagh.

Jump forward four years and these two counties now meet in the final of this competition. Joe Baldwin led the Ernesiders to this stage on November 28 last year, but it ended in defeat.

Having won it once before, in 2015, Fermanagh will fancy their chances of regaining the crown. Baldwin estimates that they have added eight or nine players this season, including Barney McCauley (a club All-Ireland winner with Loughgiel in 2012), Ruairi Bannon and Kevin McGarry (a 2013 Christy Ring Cup winner with Down), alongside youngsters Darragh McPhillips and Peter Rafferty.

Danny Teague has county football experience with the Erne County, they have a reliable scorer in Seán Corrigan, while John Duffy, Ryan Bogue and Luca McCusker provide quality across the pitch.

Cavan will fancy their chances, however, and their cause has been helped by recruiting Cuala trio Cillian and Colum 'Specs' Sheanon, alongside Brian 'Breezer' Fitzgerald.

All three have two All-Ireland club medals from the 2017 and 2018 runs under Mattie Kenny, with Fitzgerald finding the net against Liam Mellows in the semi-final of the latter season.

Ollie Bellew has buttressed his midfield and attack line with the three Dublin natives, while also working tirelessly to improve every player on the panel.

With both panels flying high, the prize on offer today at Croke Park is massive.

## REFEREE

#### REGULATIONS Páirc an Chrócaigh

- 6. The following are not permitted:
- 6.1 Entry upon the pitch or engaging in conduct that causes or is likely to cause injury or harm to, or otherwise interferes with, disrupts, hinders, or distracts a person playing in, refereeing or otherwise having a role in a match at this ground.
- 6.2 Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.3 The climbing of floodlights or other pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behaviour constitutes a trespass to property.
- 6.4 Throwing of objects onto the pitch.
- 6.5 Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.
- 6.6 Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.
- 6.7 Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
- 6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
- 6.9 Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
- If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any trespass.
- Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that purpose.

#### **Safety and General Information**

Supporters are asked to respect the fact that they are entering and leaving the stadium through residential areas.



#### **Safety Notice**

In the interests of safety, patrons will not be allowed to enter the playing area after the games.


