New-look Donegal are easily beaten by Fermanagh

A foggy Brewster Park in Janaury seemed a million miles from Croke Park in September as Donegal's All-Ireland champions blew off the cobwebs of winter in their NI Power Dr McKenna Cup opener.

Jim McGuinness and members of the panel who had just returned from Dubai the day beforehand wore bronze reflections on a bleak night in Enniskillen and an eight-point loss.

The Donegal manager started with an entirely different XV to that who had beaten Mayo in September. Only when Dermot Molloy appeared at the start of the second half did Donegal have a man involved who made the hallowed turf that day.

McGuinness's record as Donegal manager is exemplary for the most part but in his two years in charge, he had won just the one Dr McKenna Cup match from six. That came against University of Ulster, Jordanstown on his first day in office. With the U-21 side due to take on Tyrone in March in their Ulster championship opener, Maxi Curran was the liveliest of those on the sideline for Donegal.

At one point nearing the end of the second half, Donegal hadn't scored in half an hour and trailed 2-12 to 0-4. Two late goals, though, put a better look on the final scoreboard.

Fermanagh, who fielded a stronger team from the off, opened the scoring in the fifth minute when Shane McGowan saw an intended pass intercepted and Paul Ward nipped possession. Ward fed his partner at full-forward, Darryl Keenan, who drove underneath Michael Boyle in the Donegal goal.

McGowan, at the other end, opened Donegal's account with a well-taken score before Kane Connor pointed for Fermanagh, which left the score 1-1 to 0-1 for the home side. Donegal rallied for a spell with Gary McFadden scoring a brace, while Stephen Griffin was also on the mark.

Ward, with a free, was the only man from the hosts to score in this little spell of Donegal dominance.

However, it was Fermanagh who finished the half much the stronger as the fog finally began to lift. Ward, corner-back Johnny Woods, substitute Marty O'Brien and centre-fielder Shane Lyons made for a 1-6 to 0-4 interval lead.

Fermanagh pressed ahead as the second half took shape. Another substitute, Sean Quigley, pointed from a free with his first touch and then Ward was on the money again, also from a placed ball. Quigley then added a second point as the Fermanagh experience began to tell.

Whatever lingering nopes Donegal might've harboured of getting a result on the road disintegrated 12 minutes into the second half when the three-pronged Fermanagh forage manufactured a second goal. Tommy McElroy had options left and right as he broke through the non-too resistant yellow blanket. McElroy fed Ward, who immediately played in Thomas Corrigan for a simple goal, making it 2-9 to 0-4.

Donegal's attacks were sporadic and they were well off the pace. Keenan scored a simple free, Ward was again accurate and James Sherry came from the bench to notch a point. Gary McFadden, with an effort that clipped the top of Chris Snow's crossbar on the way over, scored Donegal's first point of the second half, 21 minutes in. The Glenswilly captain added another, just moments later.

Ward, though, was having a fine game, scored his fifth of the day before Donegal, to their credit, did try and muster something of a comeback. With 10 minutes left, Adrian Hanlon got the slightest

of touches ahead of Snow following a booming ball in from Luke Keaney to pull Donegal from the floor, 2-13 to 1-6 down.

Then, just two minutes later, Snow, whose uncle, Gary, played minor and U-21 football for Donegal, was beaten again when Molloy drove under him. The Naomh Conaill U-21 captain then scored a late free and although Donegal did well to make a game of it late on.

Fermanagh deservedly won. Marty McGrath and Quigley sealed the seven-point win with the last scores of the day.

IT was a day when the priorities of Malachy O'Rourke and Jim McGuinness were laid out in Ballybofey.

Although Monaghan coasted to a seventeen-point win over a shadow Donegal team in MacCumhaill Park yesterday, there were few quibbles from camp Tir Chonaill, which again bore both a youthful and an inexperienced exterior.

O'Rourke fielded a strong Monaghan side by the Finn with Conor Mc-Manus, Darren Hughes, Kieran Hughes and Dessie Mone in a team that showed ten changes to the side that had beaten St Mary's last weekend.

As O'Rourke patrolled the soaking touchlines with intent, Jim McGuinness watched over his fledgling flock from the top deck of the press box alongside his assistant Rory Gallagher.

Maxi Curran, the under 21 manager, again called the shots on the line for a Donegal team that just didn't have a cutting edge in attack, which was punished by the more experienced Monaghan.

Second half goals by debutant Keith McEneaney, sub Dermot Malone and Darren Hughes gave Monaghan a landslide win, but manager O'Rourke wasn't getting carried away by the scoreboard's face at the end.

"We have to take it in context. Donegal were obviously missing a lot of players, but we can only concentrate on ourselves. We're happy with where we are," said the former Fermanagh boss.

Jim McGuinness's record in the McKenna Cup is just one win from eight, though it's hardly a record to be concerned about.

"We trained just beforehand and it's about getting ready for the League. It's good for the players to stand back and watch a Donegal team playing from a different perspective," said McGuinness, whose All-Stars Michael Murphy and Neil McGee were among the sparse Ballybofey attendance.

"They won't take any part in the McKenna Cup. It is about focussing on our own training. We got Thursday night done and we trained again Saturday and Sunday this week. We'll do the same this week and keep it going like that until the Kildare game on the 2nd of February.

"It was tough today.

"We decided to focus on our own players after coming back from the holiday and we have three weeks between now and the League. We have three weeks to get the first team up to speed. We've got a couple of sessions under our belt now.

"We decided to put in as many of the under 21s and fringe players as we could and give a go to other players who maybe didn't get trials to see how they'd fare out."

Donegal made five changes to the team that lost to Fermanagh in Enniskillen on Wednesday night. Declan Walsh was captain for the day on his return, while Peter Boyle, Cory Gallagher, Caolan Ward and James Carroll also came into the team.

In the cases of Dungloe's Gallagher and Gaoth Dobhair man Carroll, their appearances marked their senior debuts, while it was a first start for Ward, who came on as a sub in Fermanagh.

St Michael's player Michael Cannon was handed a first senior appearance considerably earlier than he'd have imagined as he got the nod just five minutes in to replace club colleague Daniel McLaughlin. Cannon showed some flashes of good alertness, awareness and ability in an encouraging display.

Later in the game, cameo appearances in the dying moments marked first senior bows for Conor Gibbons (St Eunan's) and Adi O'Gara (Naomh Mhuire).

Donegal had to wait until the 28th minute for their first score; a goal. Kevin McFadden made ground down the left flank before Ciaran Cannon's delivery was superbly fetched by Willie Gillespie and the Newton man squared for Hanlon to crash into the roof of the net.

Gillespie, making only his second senior appearance, was very involved and made him self busy during the first half, with Walsh also influential in the opening period.

Donegal might well have had the perfect start when, just two minutes in, Monaghan 'keeper Mark Keogh failed to properly deal with a high ball in. Under pressure from Hanlon, Keogh seemed to be behind the line, but the umpire's flag remained grounded.

Hughes boomed over two expert scores to give Monaghan an early edge – and it was a lead they held for the game's duration.

An 18th minute free by Paul McArdle continued Monaghan's early dominance, before McEneaney and Conor McManus put the Farney county five up.

Hanlon's goal and a subsequent point by Gary McFadden brought Donegal to within a point, but Monaghan pulled three clear by the closing of the opening stanza thanks to converted frees by McArdle and Mc-Manus.

Donegal's hopes suffered a severe blow just 20 seconds into the second half when McEneaney scorched home after bursting in from the end line and side-stepping a defender before crisply finishing past Peter Boyle.

Stephen Griffin and Gillespie hit points for Donegal, but already the efforts of the home team were looking to be in vain as Monaghan, directed by the influential Hughes, clocked on scores

Hughes drilled over two superb points before debuting corner-back Owen Coyle got up to land a stylish point.

Ten minutes from time, Monaghan pressed home their dominance of the game when sub Dermot Malone riffled home after taking a pass by Kieran Duffy, Griffin curled over a delightful score and skipper Declan Walsh added another, but Donegal hopes had long since faded.

Just for good measure, Monaghan managed to breach the Donegal defence for a third and final time in the last minute as Malone centred for Darren Hughes to palm home into the unguarded net.





Murphyleaves Kerry'staring downbarrel'

Rampant Donegal pile pressure on as troubled Kingdom slump to yet another dismal defeat

THESE are troubling times in Kerry – and new manager Eamonn Fitzmaurice says that his team is 'staring down the barrel' after being swatted aside by Donegal in Ballybofey.

The warning signs were posted early on. Five minutes in, Ross Wherity was bundled over by Johnny Buck-

ley and Michael Murphy stepped up to slam home the penalty.

Murphy dispatched his kick beyond Brendan Kealy to the same side at which he had been denied by Tyrone's Niall Morgan the previous weekend.

The returned Patrick McBrearty was on a mission to impress and his sumptuous effort in the ninth minute had Donegal six ahead. Murphy's paws were all over anything that was good about Donegal.

A beauty from the shadows of the stand in the 20th minute came after Buckley and Tomas O Se finally broke the Kerry duck.

Murphy might have had a second penalty when he was taken down by Aidan O'Mahony, but Derek Fahy waved play on.

Donegal's penetrative bursts from deep, with Leo McLoone, Rory Kavanagh, Ryan Bradley and Ryan McHugh all making telling incisions, had Kerry in trouble and at the break Donegal held a 1-5 to 0-3 cushion.

"We were playing the game on their terms rather than ours," reflected Fitzmaurice afterwards.

Cork's second half purple patch

THIS will not go down as one of the more memorable nights of Jim McGuinness's tenure as Cork held sway in a scrappy, error-ridden League encounter at cool Paire Ui Rinn on Saturday evening.

Cork hit a seven points in a row in a 20-minute spell in the second half that took them over the line despite a game comeback from Donegal, who had led 0-5 to 0-3 after a largely wasteful first period from both sides.

A game that started at near-Championship feel, ended with an intense air that wouldn't have been amiss at the height of summer, but somewhere in between there was a significant dilution of quality.

Defeat leaves Donegal still needing a win to make sure of their safety, but there was no-one too distressed by the outcome here.

Relegation 'nota big issue' for Donegal

AT THE END, Jim McGuinness had the consolation that this was the league. And Donegal don't like the league very much, he proclaimed.

It's more a hindrance than a help in his eves

So at least their return to Division 2, two years after earning promotion in McGuinness' first season as manager, has a value in offering a better environment to calibrate future championship preparations.

The visit of Dublin to Ballybofey, eight weeks out from their championship opener against Tyrone, was badly timed.

Donegal had already 'pressed the button' for their defence on Tuesday last and, according to McGuinness, trained intensely three times in the week before this match.

Even Colm McFadden, he conceded. had to withdraw at half-time because of cramp associated with the consequences of 'lift off'.

So if relegation was a by-product of that schedule, then they would live

Paul Mannion's late equaliser for Dublin, coupled with away victories for Kerry and Mayo in Tyrone and Cork,

condemned Donegal to their fate in a dramatic conclusion to Division 1.

A big deal for the All-Ireland champions?

"It's not the end of the world. It doesn't make a difference to us because we don't really like the league to be honest with you," was McGuinness' frank admission, in perfect harmony with everything he has said over the last two months.

Balancing preparations with trying to winning games is a difficult tightrope to negotiate.

"We try to ease them down a bit and bring them back up and have them fresh for championship, and it's very hard to balance that with winning games in the league, particularly in Division 1, so it's not a big issue for us," he said.

REBUILDING

"We'll rebuild in Division 2, not that we'd be rebuilding, but it'll be easier on us in terms of the opposition that we'll be playing. It'll give us a chance to roll out our annual plan a lot easier than it would this year and last year.

"I have no problem with that and we have no problem with being relegated." McGuinness knows that the candle can't be burned at both ends.

There was a caveat however, a little glint of frustration in McGuinness, maybe even anger, lurking behind the veneer of acceptance.

His players, he admitted, were "shellshocked" at how it unfolded.

"They felt they did enough to win the game. A lot of stuff went on there that didn't add up," he figured.

McGuinness has a policy of not directly commenting on the performances of referees but he hinted at dissatisfaction here.

Could he elaborate? "You saw the game. You can report on it how you see

Referee Padraig Hughes twisted his knee so badly around the 43rd minute that he had to be stretchered off and was replaced by Michael Duffy, forcing a lengthy delay. Duffy did not endear himself to the locals in a crowd of around 8,000.

The most obvious point of contention was a challenge by Dublin substitute Jason Whelan on Rory Kavanagh in the 60th minute for which there were very strong penalty claims as the hosts led by 1-8 to 0-10. But it was deemed legit-

The most disappointing aspect for

Donegal, apart from some of those decisions, was that they had controlled the game for so long, albeit deep in their own territory. They led for all but the three minutes after Mannion's seventhminute equaliser from a free. Significantly, however, they didn't score from play in the second half.

McFadden's 10th-minute goal, courtesy of Paddy McBrearty's willingness to run at a vulnerable Kevin O'Brien, gave Donegal an edge on the scoreboard that they retained until Mannion's late kick.

It allowed them to absorb pressure, drop the numbers and apply the pressure in their own half that is normally associated with their summer activities. In effect, play the game on their terms.

On an arid, dusty MacCumhaill Park, far removed from the lush Croke Park

sward they have become so accustomed to, Dublin struggled for fluency.

Some tried too hard, others eased the level of effort in a wind-assisted first half - and it amounted to their poorest 35 minutes of the campaign.

The two players that Jim Gavin has given leases of life to were the exceptions. Johnny Cooper made a sufficient nuisance of himself against Michael Murphy, restricting Donegal's captain to just three frees, while Paddy Andrews had the composure in a headless attack to put over three points in the first half.

But Diarmuid Connolly, drafted in late for Bryan Cullen, Paul Flynn and Michael Darragh Macauley were among the members of the establishment who struggled. All three were eventually replaced, with Cullen adding some badly needed direction.

Clinical Donegal sweep away Tyrone challenge

WHEN this game was in the melting pot, it was Donegal who rolled their sleeves up and got to work in style.

The Ulster and All-Ireland champions lowered Tyrone's colours in sending out a huge note of their intentions for 2013 with a dominant second half display.

Colm McFadden and Ross Wherity scored the goals as Donegal defeated the Red Hands for the third year in a row.

It was billed as being a grudge match of sorts and this was confirmation, if indeed it were needed, that Donegal are very much Ulster's top dogs right now.

They took everything Tyrone threw at them and, as they have done through Jim McGuinness's tenure, pressed the button in the third quarter.

The teams were level five minutes into the second half, but by the 53rd minute Donegal moved five clear.

The defining score came in the 49th minute. Patrick McBrearty, who was excellent throughout, surged past Dermot Carlin and a weak effort by Martin Penrose to stop him was navigated. McBrearty slipped the ball across the square for Wherity to palm home.

The St Eunan's man was introduced as a sub for his Championship debut and with his first touch he was on the mark in style. It was the perfect way to celebrate his birthday weekend having turned 25 the previous day.

Wherity was sent on along with Karl Lacey in the 47th minute.

The 2012 Footballer of the Year didn't start, but came on to a thunderous reception and his presence here was key as Donegal turned the screw. Right after the second goal, Donegal added quick fire points from McBrearty and Michael Murphy.

Tyrone fell to pieces and Donegal kept the Red Hands scoreless for a thirty-minute spell. Their discipline went too and they had Joe McMahon sent off when he was booked for the second time in the 63rd minute.

Donegal had prepared for this game since the pairing was made. The squad assembled at Mac-Cumhaill Park on Saturday and spent Saturday night in the Sandhouse Hotel in Rossnowlagh.

This was a game they did not want to lose and a day on which they were determined to lay down a marker. This, they did. With Lacey and Mark McHugh in as subs. Donegal could Neil McGee at full pelt. The Gaoth Dobhair man was barely put off his stride. As tough as the face of Errigal, a clash with McGee meant O'Neill was on his rear end.

Or there was the sheer ferocity of Paul Durcan's reaction at the final whistle; a moment that outlined what this game meant to Donegal, the Four Masters man howling into the rain-soaked sky after an emphatic win by his team.

It was a day when McBrearty was very impressive, the 19-year old having had to endure a difficult few weeks after the incident that led to Croke Park launching a probe into allegations that he was bitten during the League meeting with Dublin. 'Head melting,' McBrearty called it post-match - but it was Tyrone heads that melted here on an afternoon of Donegal delight.

even afford to be dominated at centrefield, where Conor Gormley took a couple of excellent fetches.

Declan Walsh and David Walsh were the men to come into the starting XV, in place of McHugh and Lacey. What had been a tight battle opened up when Donegal began to take command in front of a packed house as the rain teemed down.

The game was one of several seminal incidents. Not least of them was that moment in the 24th minute when Stephen O'Neill thundered into Colm McFadden again demonstrated his prowess as a Champiouship player, the St Michael's man stepping up with a clinical 1-3. It was McFadden who swung over the game's first point from a free in the second minute and it was he who netted the opening goal in the 32nd minute.

McBrearty batted down a Murphy free and McFadden got away from Cathal McCarron before sliding past Niall Morgan with his right foot.

It was not a day that Morgan will wish to remember.

The goalkeeper's place-kicking was predicted as the key for Tyrone. Morgan would rue his gesturing to a crowd that had jeered an earlier miss when he scored one in the 19th minute.

Six times, Morgan stepped forth but just once he scored. Four of them he shot wide and one he dropped short into Durcan's hands.

Morgan's short effort was from around 55 metres and right after Mc-Fadden's goal Murphy came up from a similar distance and sailed it over the black spot to give Donegal a 1-6 to 0-7 interval lead.

Donegal were 0-4 to 0-1 up after just seven frantic minutes with Mc-Fadden (2), Murphy and David Walsh on the mark. Tyrone's opener was hit by Conor McAliskey and Morgan's score brought Tyrone to within McFadden pushed Donegal two ahead, but Tyrone led for the first time after Stephen O'Neill majestically shot over from the stand side and then two in a minute by Matthew Donnelly and Colm Cavanagh turned the tables.

THE murky world of the All-Ireland qualifiers is no place for demanding perfection.

What Donegal gave on Saturday evening in claustrophobic Carrick-On-Shannon was a performance that was far from perfect, but at least there were plenty of signs of improvement.

Most especially when faced with the dreaded six-day turnaround following a provincial final defeat comes the focus to the bottom line: the result.

Here, Donegal were never in any real trouble, but there were moments when there were wobbles, but the All-Ireland champions regained composure and managed to close out the game well to send them hurtling back to Croke Park for an All-Ireland quarter-final meeting with Mayo.

There were times when the huge Donegal support had to peer through the gaps in their fingers, but they woke yesterday looking forward to Croke Park.

The perfection can wait. First, Donegal just had to win and get the

Ulster final defeat by Monaghan out of their system.

"The best thing that ever happened us was a six-day turnaround," said an encouraged Jim McGuinness afterwards.

"We didn't 14 days and we didn't want to be licking our wounds for three weeks. We wanted to get back at it. we know what's in the dressing room. We know what they've done over the last couple of years and we

over the last couple of years and we just wanted to get back playing football."

Four late scores from Colm McFadden, Patrick McBrearty, Neil McGee and Leo McLoone polished the scoreboard for Donegal while Laois' evening ended sourly with Conor Meredith sent off. Marty Duffy right-

ly giving him a straight red card for what was a needless and dangerous hit on Rory Kavanagh.

While the end scoreline did flatter Donegal, the way they picked off those last four points was one of the bright points on an evening when 11,125 - the vast majority of them from Donegal - packed into compact Pairc Sean MacDiarmada.

McFadden was back with the deadly shooting boots on again, the St Michael's man kicking six points, while McBrearty added three points to a fine performance that saw him return to his determined best with the McGees back to their best in defence, too. Neil Gallagher stood tall at centrefield, David Walsh was busy, while they had real platforms in Ryan McHugh and Frank McGlynn.

McHugh was making his first ever Senior Championship start and he was far from fazed, more than justifying his selection in fact. His inclusion was one of four changes to the side from that which was beaten by Monaghan. Gallagher, Declan Walsh and David Walsh were all in from the off here with the injured Mark McHugh joined in having a watching brief by Martin O'Reilly, Leo McLoone and Karl Lacey, who came on for the final 16 minutes.

After seeing Monaghan toy with Donegal in some departments, Laois came into Carrick-On-Shannon eyeing an upset. Justin McNulty set up a defensive wall inside his '45 that was deigned to frustrate and restrict Donegal in their attempts. To a degree, it worked, but only for a while.

Just two scores - one apiece - were posted in the opening 22 minutes with Colm McFadden's eleventh-minute free cancelled out by a Ross Munnelly point that was Laois' only score of the first half.

As an art, it was not pleasing to watch, but this was Laois' plan. Laois themselves had opportunities, but they were left looking to the sky when a fortunate loose ball spilled away and

into the path of a Laois man with a sight of goal. With a goal chance presenting itself, full-back Mark Tim-

mons snatched at the effort and it was gone.

David Walsh fired Donegal in front - and this time it was a lead they wouldn't give up for the remainder of the contest. Walsh popped over after a patient piece of build-up from his side while a mighty point from Michael Murphy out on the right put two between them. Murphy operated at centre forward here and while it was another evening when he was off-colour, the hope remains that he'll be ignited by the sight of Croke Park.

McFadden (free) curled over another during a period when Duffy's pencil was tested as a glut of yellow cards appeared. In stoppage time, McBrearty angled over a magnificent score from an acute position. It was a deserved point for the Kilcar man after a first half display of high workrate and willingness to take responsibility beyond his years.

Qualifiers are a do-or-die breed. On nights like this, they are not for the faint hearted.

So puzzled are people by Donegal's recent form that the Kerry manager, Eamon Fitzmaurice, opted to head for Carrick-On-Shannon to eye up Donegal rather that take in three other potential opponents at the Croke Park triple-header. Such is the complexity, Fitzmaurice wished to view it for himself.

With the big crowd packed into a small, tight, provincial venue, the atmosphere simmered at times, not least when the management teams got embroiled in some jostling. After Michael Murphy was taken out by John O'Loughlin, Donegal were incenced. Managers McGuinness and McNulty and their henchmen, Rory Gallagher and Fergal Byron, exchanged views, before tempers finally tempered.

Meredith pulled one back for Laois, but there was a sense that Donegal were going to kick for home when Mc-Fadden won and pointed a free off Paul Begley and themn Murphy tacked on a free after full-back Neil

McGee burst up only to be fouled by Colm Boyle.

A pair of points from Munnelly, ever-dangerous and with the spark of old back again, ensured that Laois weren't surrendering, but again Donegal hit back, McFadden calmly finding the range with a free and McBrearty exquisitly pointing under stern pressure after David Walsh forced a turnover and McFadden turned provider.

Still, Laois weren't giving up. Donal Kingston and McFadden traded points and there were five between them. McFadden arched over a point that was down to Eamon McGee's brilliant defensive work and a majestic pick up by Anthony Thompson.

Karl Lacey's introdution in the 54th minute raised the roof from the Donegal faithful, but it was Laois who seemed to get a leash of life, as Kingston pointed from distance and David Conway got up to thump over. When Munnelly tapped over a free seven minutes from the end, there were rumblings of doubt sweeping across the park.

The richter scale felt another tremor when, just for a second, it seemed as if Kieran Lillis effort that dropped short had been fumbled by Paul Durcan, who recovered his balance to off-load again.

Donegal then found their gears to finish well. McFadden slotted over in style and McBrearty curled in to open up a four-point cushion.

Up came Neil McGee on one of those lung-bursting runs in the final minute to get a point while sub Leo McLoone applied the finishing touch, just after Meredith's red mist had descended.

The encouraging signs were here again, but there'll need to be another rung of progression found before they run out for the headline act on Sunday: a repeat of the All-Ireland final against Mayo in a last eight encounter should be enough to rise the mercury, though.

THE scoreline is one that will ring loudly in Donegal for quite some time.

Not since 1946 has a Donegal team felt the pang of a 16-point loss in Championship football. The scary thing here was that this could have been worse - much worse.

But for the 1-4 they scored in the final ten minutes, Donegal were heading for a defeat that was not too far away from their record Championship defeat - the 23-point hammering (5-12 to 0-4) by Cavan in 1939.

Under Jim McGuinness, Donegal had only conceded four goals previously in Championship football over three seasons.

Yesterday, Mayo sliced through them at will. Cillian O'Connor helped himself to a hat-trick and Donal Vaughan netted another on a day when James Horan's side ruthlessly exposed the frailties which have dethroned Donegal as Ulster and All-Ireland kings.

In the space of three weeks, Donegal have relinquished their hold on

the Anglo-Celt and Sam Maguire.

It wasn't the defeat that hurt here. but more so the manner of it. Mayo blew Donegal apart with Aidan O'Shea lord and master around the middle third and the deadly Cillian

Donegal are blown apart by Mayo O'Connor scoring 3-4. Donegal were somewhat fortunate

to have been 'only' 12 in arrears at the break. Mark McHugh prevented a certain goal when he blocked from O'-Connor, while Mayo really ought to have added a third in the final minute of the half.

Sub Cathal Carolan broke through and beat Paul Durcan with a welldrilled low shot that cannoned off the post. Kevin McLoughlin, somehow, skewed the rebound wide with the Canal End net gaping at his mercy.

O'Shea was sent off late in the day having collected a second yellow card, but it shouldn't take away from a topclass display. Donegal defender Eamon McGee was also sent to the line in the 52nd minute for a stamp on Enda Varley.

It was that sort of day

Donegal's injury problems have

been mounting for some time now. Mark McHugh started yesterday and contributed two points, but Karl Lacey had been kept to a watching brief, though the 2012 Footballer of the Year was called upon with just 23 minutes gone here and the Four Masters man was showing clear signs of a man who remains some way off his optimum.

Jaded Donegal came in on the back of a qualifier win over Laois that they'd hoped had ignited the spark. Being drawn against Mayo for a repeat of the All-Ireland final was a surefire thing to get the blood boiling - and after a week of slogging in the media the camps were set for a real war of attrition.

But Mayo did unto Donegal what Donegal had inflicted on them in September - and worse. O'Connor and Donal Vaughan scored two goals inside the opening 13 minutes and from there Donegal were facing a moun-

Michael Murphy landed a free in the 16th minute that was Donegal's fourth score of the day, but Donegal wouldn't register again until the 48th minute - by which time Mayo were twenty points to the good.

Murphy was Donegal's top marksman with six points as Mayo's tenacious tackling was suberb and they kept Patrick McBrearty scoreless and held Colm McFadden blank until he finally hit a goal in the 69th minute.

By contrast, Mayo had thirteen different scorers and only three points of their impressive tally came from placed balls.

Mayo meant business.

Vaughan was everywhere in the early exchanges and it was he who provided the assists for the opening two points, scored by O'Connor and Alan Dillon. The warning signs were posted to the floor in the third minute when Mayo went in search of goal, a long ball into Alan Freeman cut out by the deftest of touches by Paul Dur-

In the fifth minute, Mayo bagged the opener as Eamon McGee was forced into a turnover and Kevin McLoughlin fed O'Connor who was cool, calm and collected as he rolled into the bottom corner.

Freeman added a point and, with six minutes gone, Mayo held a sixpoint lead. It was a start akin to that of Monaghan in the Ulster final. Like then, Donegal didn't recover.

Murphy scored two frees either side of a Mark McHugh point to get Donegal underway, but Mayo hit the sucker-punch when Donegal were cut open in the 13th minute. Durcan had to come well off his line, but was beaten to the ball and Vaughan smashed home.

Donegal just couldn't get going and they were rattled as McLoughlin, Andy Moran, Freeman and two from O'Connor widened the margin by the minute before wing-back Colm Boyle got up to put twelve between them at the short whistle (2-10 to 0-4).

The interval will have been an interesting time between the four walls of the Donegal dressing room. Mayo's was a whirlwind that Donegal just couldn't live with, as the tired legs and weary minds began to show.

Seamus O'Shea arched over the opening score of the second half and any hopes of a Donegal comeback were jolted within ten minutes of the re-start. Vaughan broke again in the 40th minute and lifted past the advancing Durcan for O'Connor to fin-

Durcan might have been beaten four times, but he was one player who could hold the head high here with a fine save denving Lee Keegan another Mayo goal a minute later.

It wasn't long before Mayo were in for a fourth, though, O'Connor smashing home after Moran was denied by a strong-handed save by Durcan, It was the Ballintubber man's second hat-trick in as many games having also netted three times against London in the Connacht final.

When Eamon McGee saw red in the 52nd minute it was perhaps the epitomy of the frustrating afternoon that

Mayo continued to turn the screw. subs Richie Feeney, Enda Varley and Kevin Keane scoring with Chris Barrett also on the mark.

David Walsh stemmed the tide momentarily with a point and it was only late on when Donegal found a way through. It was much too little, much too late, however.

Murphy, twice, McHugh and Lacey hit points, but Lee Keegan capped a fine afternoon when he clipped over to complete Mayo's scoring. McFadden powered home a goal in the final minute, but it was scant consolation for a side who were dethroned in some fashion.

For the third year in a row, Mayo have taken the scalp of the All-Ireland champions - but here was their credentials for a first All-Ireland since 1951 laid down.

For Donegal, the defeat will surely
