





COSÁN NA SINSEAR

CIARRAÍ are today attempting to win their 27th All-Ireland championship, and their fourth in succession, a feat only twice before achieved – by Loch Garman (1915-18) and by Ciarraí themselves (1929-1932).

Ciarraí opened their campaign with a resounding 23-point win over An Clár at Listowel and captured their seventh successive Munster title by beating Corcaigh by 11 points at Killarney. Six weeks ago they qualified for their sixth final in seven years by overcoming the Connacht champions Maigh Eó by a margin of 16 points here at Croke Park.

Ciarraí, in their three matches prior to today's decider, scored a total of 7 goals and 47 points (68 points) while conceding a mere 1 goal and 15 points (18 points), giving them respective match averages of 22.66 and 6.00.

The Ciarraí tally of 7-47 was contributed to by ten players, with their individual returns being as follows: Mike Sheehy 1-17, Eoin Liston 4-6, Pat Spillane 0-9, John Egan 1-5, Denis 'Ogie' Moran 0-3, Ger Power 1-0, and Paud O'Shea, Tom Doyle and Tom Spillane 0-1 each.

UIBH FHÁILÍ, who are this afternoon making their fifth appearance in an All-Ireland senior football final and are seeking their third championship success, have played one game more than Ciarraí en route to this year's final.

Glibh Fháilí began their programme with a five point victory over An Iar Mhí at Mullingar, followed by a defeat of Loch Garman by a similar margin at Croke Park, captured their eight Leinster title by overcoming Laois at headquarters by three points, and qualified for their first championship decider since 1972 — when they defeated Ciarraí following a replay — by dismissing Ulster champions An Dún by six points just a month ago, again at Croke Park.

Uibh Fháilí, in the course of their four championship engagements prior to today, have scored a total of 3 goals and 60 points (69 points) while having 4 goals and 38 points (50 points) recorded against them, giving them match averages of 17.25 and 12.50 respectively.

Like Ciarraí, 10 players contributed to Uibh Fháilí's total of 3-60, and their individual returns were as follows: Matt Connor 1-26, Brendan Lowry 2-12, Gerry Carroll 0-6, Sean Lowry 0-4, Tomas Connor 0-3, Mick Wright, John Mooney, Pat Fitzgerald and Aidan O'Halloran 0-2 each, and John Moran 0-1.

LEADING SCORERS

QIBH Fháili's Matt Connor, who last year set an all time championship scoring record of 5 goals and 31 points, currently leads this year's scoring charts with a tally of 1 goal and 26 points, six points ahead of Laois's Tom Prendergast, who has recorded 6 goals and 5 points, thereby enjoying the distinction of being the championship's top goalscorer.


A G.A.A. Programme Collector's Club has been established at H.Q. Its aims are:

Na Réiteoirí



TOMÁS Ó CUINNEAGÁIN (Gaillimh), the referee for today's Cluiche Ceannais Mionúir, is widely experienced at all levels of the Association's activities as a player, referee and administrator.

As a player, he numbers three Gaillimh Senior Football medals and three Connacht Junior medals – 1961, '66 and '69 – among his collection. As a referee, he has handled two All-Ireland Junior Finals (1966 and 1967), All-Ireland Minor and Under-21 semi-finals, last year's Railway Cup final, this year's Connacht Senior Final and the minor semi-final between Áth Cliath and Doire.

As an administrator, Tom was chairman of the North Galway Board from 1969 to '73, was Gaillimh chairman from 1976 to '78 and is currently vice-chairman of Coiste Chontae na Gaillimhe and Comhairle Chonnachta.

With his club, Mountbellew, he is very involved with the training and coaching of under-age teams.



PÁDRAIG Ó COILEÁIN (An Iar Mhí), the man in the middle for today's cluiche sinsir was in charge of the Ciarraí v Maigh Eó semi-final and handled his third successive Leinster final in July.

One of the most respected referees in the game. Pat refereed the 1974 All-Ireland Minor final between Corcaigh and Maigh Eo and the Dún na nGall v Gaillimh senior semi-final. In 1976, after refereeing the Ciarraí v Doire senior semi-final, he handled the All-Ireland final between Áthe Cliath and Ciarraí.

In 1977 he was in charge of the All-Ireland semi-final, draw and replay, between Ard Mhacha and Ros Comáin and the following year he refereed his first Leinster final. In 1979 he was again in charge of the Leinster final and the All-Ireland semi-final between Ciarraí and Muineacháin.

Last year he handled the All-Ireland semi-final between Ciarraí and Uibh Fháilí and this year he refereed his third successive Leinster final and the Munster final, when he was called in to substitute for the injured Pat lane (Luimneach).

A native of Athboy, Co. na Mí, he has been living in Mullingar since 1960 where he is a Psychiatric Nurse in St. Loman's Hospital. Pat is also Rúnaí, Coiste Chontae na hIar Mhí.

AN BHFUIL FHIOS AGAT?

Four Front

WHEN Uibh Fháilí knocked in four goals against Ciarraí in the 1980 All-Ireland semifinal they became the first Leinster county ever to record four goals against the 'Kingdom' in a championship game.

Uibh Fháilí's total of 4-10 on that occasion was also the highest score ever recorded by a losing team in a senior championship semi-final and it was the biggest score ever conceded by Ciarraí to any county in a championship encounter at Croke Park.

Greatest Rivals

ON THE score of actual meetings, Ciarraí and Ath Cliath have been the greatest All-Ireland final rivals as they were in opposition on no fewer than nine occasions. Second in this respect are Ciarraí and Gaillimh who clashed in six finals between 1938 and '65. Other 'regular' final meetings were Ciarraí and Cill Cill Dara' (5 finals) and Ath Cliath and Gaillimh who also met in five deciders.

Defenders on Top

UIBH Fháilí defenders certainly came into their own in this year's semi-final. After some uncertain displays in Leinster, the Faithful County rearguard came into form against An Dún and in restricting the opposing

forwards to the meagre tally of six points, they helped to make a small bit of history in that An Dún's 0-6 was the lowest score ever recorded by the wearers of the red and black in a championship game at Croke Park.

Ciarraí Missing

A MUNSTER football team without a single Ciarraí representative is scarcely conceivable, but it did happen on one occasion that Ciarraí was the only county missing from the Munster team that did duty in the Railway Cup.

This was in 1936 when Ciarraí, who had withdrawn from all competition the previous year, were still inactive the following spring, so a strange-looking fifteen lined up in Munster's blue for the semi-final tie with Connacht at Castlebar.

Considering the handicap the Southern representatives did not do at all badly as they lost by only two points (2-2 to 1-7) to the team that eventually won the cup.

Senior and Minor

JOHNNY Mooney, the Rhode midfielder, is the only Uibh Fháilí player ever to have featured with the county senior and minor teams in the championship in the same year.

This was in 1976 when he came on as a sub on the senior team in the second-round tie with An Mhí and later he was to the fore in helping the under-18 side reach the Leinster final. Strangely, he failed to gain recognition from the under-21 selectors in the season.

Monopoly

IF Ciarraí retain their title today it will complete a unique monopoly situation in that since 1974 all eight finals have been won by just two counties – Ciarraí and Áth Cliath. It has never happened before that the titles in any eight-year period were confined to two counties.

The only comparable monopoly occurred some 50 years ago when Ciarraí won the 1926 title, Cill Dara won in '27 and '28 and then came Ciarraí's four-in-a row to make it a seven-year monopoly for the Lily Whites and the Kingdom.

Roice did Play

ONE OF the hoariest pieces of G.A.A. folklore is that Barney Roice of Loch Garman gained four All-Ireland and six Leinster medals without playing a single game during the Slaneysider's great run between 1913 and 1918. Like so much folklore it's not quite true. It is true, of course, that Roice spent many hours languishing on the substitute's bench in that period, but it certainly is not true that he never once 'made' the first fifteen. In fact, in the very first year of Loch Garman's dominance in Leinster (1913), Barney Roice played in the provincial semi-final against Laois at Croke Park on August 10 of that year.



AS Ciarraí bid today for a fourth successive All-Ireland title, it recalls the only previous occasions on which the feat was accomplished, in 1915-1918 by Loch Garman and in 1929-1932 by Ciarraí.

Inevitably, efforts will be made to compare, not alone the present Ciarraí team with their illustrious forbears, but the respective merits of those Ciarraí and Loch Garman teams of the distant past. While such efforts can be no more than an exercise in nostalgia, at least the statistics of the four-in-a-row campaigns bear some scrutiny and are listed hereunder.

In recording their four All-Ireland triumphs, Loch Garman went unbeaten for 19 games, one of which was drawn, while Ciarraí had a straight run through only 14, but as the 'Kingdom' did not have to qualify for the Munster finals of '30 and '31, the shorter route is easily explained.

Nocht Antaine Mac Taidhg a chumas peile go luath ina shaol agus ní hionadh mar sin gur roghnaíodh é i 1962 agus gan é ach cúig bliana déag ar fhoireann mionúr an chontae a bhuaigh Craobh Laighean. Bhí sé mar chrann seasta na foirne sin arís i 1964 nuair a thug siad leo ní hamháin craobh a gcúige ach craobh na hÉireann chomh maith.

I ngeall ar a fheabhas leis na mionúir bhain Antaine a áit amach go seasta ar an taobh sinsir i nDeireadh Fómhair '64 agus uaidh sin nó gur scoir sé i 1975 thug sé seirbhís fhóinteach fheartach do chontae a dhídine.

Bhuaigh sé dhá Chraobh na hÉireann as a chéile sna blianta '71 is '72 agus ba mhór an urraim dó gur threoraigh sé an fhoireann chun caithréime sa chluiche athimeartha in éadan Chiarraí i '72 leis an scór 1-19 in aghaidh 0-13. Blianta croídhílse a bhí sa dá bhliain seo do Antaine Mac Taidhg mar de thoradh a acmhainn oibre roghnaíodh é ar hÉireann fhoirne na All-Stars). Same Again

Lost Their First

FOR A county that was eventually to establish the most remarkable replay record in the game, Ciarraí got off to a less than promising start in their first-ever replay. This was in the 1890 championship when an unfinished encounter with Corcaigh at Limerick led to a replay at Kanturk where Ciarraí, represented by Laune Rangers, failed to Corcaigh (Midleton) by 1-4 to 0-1.

THE YEAR 1964 occupies a special place in Uibh Fháilí's football story - the year when the county won its first All-Ireland football title and sparked off the rise to eventual senior success. But on a wider canvas, 1964

marked the only occasion on which the winning teams in both senior and minor finals

failed to score a goal in the course of the hour and also the only occasion on which successful teams recorded the same score: Senior - Gaillimh 0-15: Ciarraí 0-10 Minor - Uibh Fháilí 0-15; Corcaigh 1-11.



AN BHFUIL FHIOS AGAT?

All But One

OF Ciarrai's 26 All-Ireland triumphs, all but one were won at Croke Park (or Jones's Road as it was known before 1913). Their only success away from the capital was in the 1904 final which was played at Cork and in which they beat Ath Cliath for the first time.

Strangely, Kerry lost all the finals they contested at other venues – at Clonturk in 1892, Thurles in 1905 and the Polo Grounds in 1947, as well as the 1908 'Home' final at Thurles.

One Representative

WHEN (Jibh Fháilí won the Leinster title for the first time in 1960, and retained it a year later, the county champions in both instances had just one representative on the teams – Donie O'Hanlon (St. Patricks, 1960), and Willie Nolan (Clara, 1961).

Eight years later (1969), when Offaly won its third provincial title the county champions (Ballycumber) and just one player, Pat Monaghan, the captain, in the line-out.

And when the '71 provincial crown was annexed the county champions, Gracefield, had no representative on the original fifteen, but during the course of the final against Cill Dara, John Smith came on as a sub to maintain the 'one only' tradition.

Aggregates

IN THEIR semi-final engagements of 1980-81, Uibh Fháilí have managed to contribute to establishing two records in respect of aggregate scores at this stage of the championship.

In the game with An Dún the aggregate score (18 points), was the lowest ever for a 70-minute semi-final and the lowest overall since the Gaillimh-An Dún 'semi' of 1965, which produced only 17 points.

It was 'the other side of the coin' in 1980 when an all-time record aggregate of 49 points was chalked up by Ciarraí and Uibh Fháilí.

Triple Triumphs . . . and Failures

ONLY three counties have won the All-Ireland senior football title with 21, 17 and 15 aside teams – Tiobraid Árann, Corcaigh and Áth Cliath. And there were two counties that had the opposite experience – that of losing finals with all three combinations. These were Lú and Corcaigh.

Titleless

IN THE Golden Jubilee year of the Association (1934), Uibh Fháilí had the unenviable distinction of being the only Leinster county that had never won a provincial title in any grade of football.

In the country as a whole they shared that dismal distinction with Fear Mánach, but a year later the junior footballers brought the country its first provincial success when they beat Ath Cliath in the final at Birr.

Blank Half

CIARRAÍ are usually associated with the great achievements of Football history – events remarkable and outstanding; but the 'Kingdom' were involved in at least one event that wasn't one of their greatest moments, but which was nonetheless a landmark in the story of All-Ireland senior football finals.

And this was in 1927 when Ciarraí acquired the dubious distinction of being the last county that failed to score in the second half of a senior football final. Ciarraí, who led Cill Dara by 0-3 to 0-2 at the interval, were still stuck on that score when the final whistle sounded to give the Lily Whites the verdict by 0-5 to 0-3.

Score of Scores

WHEN (Jibh Fháilí defeated Ciarraí in the replay of the 1972 All-Ireland they recorded a score of 1-19 and those 20 scores constituted a record in that it was the only time Ciarraí, in a championship game at the All-Ireland final, or semi-final stage, had conceded 20 scores to any county.



CORCAIGH, who are today contesting their 11th All-Ireland Minor Final and are seeking their seventh success, had to play four matches to qualify for this afternoon's decider.

They began their programme with a resounding 38 – point defeat of Port Láirge at Fermoy and qualified for the Munster final by overcoming Luimneach by 13 points at Buttevant. Corcaigh dethroned the defending All-Ireland champions Ciarraí in the provincial decider at Killarney by the minimum margin possible, and they earned their passage into today's final by dismissing the Connacht champions Ros Comáin by 12 points in Croke Park.

In the course of their four outings prior to today, Corcaigh scored a total of 17 goals and 53 points (104 points) and had 8 goals and 16 points (40 points) recorded against them, giving them respective match averages of 26.00 and 10.00.

Corcaigh's tally of 17-53 was contributed to by the surprisingly small total of eight players, with their individual returns being as follows: John Cleary 4-14, Colm O'Neill 5-6, Paul Fitzgerald 3-10, Eoin O'Mahony 3-6, Tony O'Sullivan 2-8, Peadar Healy 0-4, Tom Mannix 0-3, and Tony Leahy 0-2.

DOIRE, who are this afternoon playing in only their fourth All-Ireland Minor football decider and are hoping to capture their second title, also had to play four games to qualify for today's final.

They opened their campaign by accounting for Fear Manach by 11 points at Ballinascreen, and a month later they pipped An Dún at Clones by a single point to qualify for the Ulster final. Just one week later Doire returned to the Monaghan venue to retain their provincial crown with a six point victory over Ard Mhacha, and at Croke Park they earned their ticket into today's decider by edging out the Leinster champions Áth Cliath by just two points.


Doire, in their four championship engagements prior to today, compiled scoring aggregates of 6 goals and 32 points (50 points) for, and 4 goals and 18 points (30 points) against, giving them respective match averages of 12.50 and 7.50.

A total of eight players managed to get onto Doire's aggregate scoresheet of 6-32, and their individual contributions were as follows: Liam McElhinney 1-7, Eamonn Rafferty 2-4, Terence McGuckian 1-6, Paul McCormack 0-7, Dermott McNicholl 1-3, John A. Mullen 1-2, Danny O'Kane 0-2, and John McErlean 0-1.

The Two Captains

THE YEAR 1946 was a milestone in Ciarrai's great championship march, the year in which an apparently well-beaten team fought back to force a draw with Ros Comáin and then beat them in the replay.

But it was also a remarkable year in that for the only time in the history of the championship a county had two captains in an All-Ireland final. This unique situation arose when Gus Cremin, who had led the 'Kingdom' in the drawn game was dropped for the replay and with no other representative of the county champions. Shannon Rovers, in the line-out, Paddy Kennedy was chosen to lead the team for the second game and became the eight Ciarraí man to receive the Sam Maguire Cup.

But 1946 will be principaly remembered as the year in which a county had to All-Ireland captains.

Sean Walsh (Kerins-O'Rahillys): Age 24. Member of 1975 winning Minor team and on winning Under-21 team for three seasons. Senior medalist in '78, '79 and '80. University Student.

Jack O'Shea (St. Mary's): Age 23. Member of winning Minor team in 1975. Holds 3 All-Ireland Under-21 and 3 Senior medals. Allstar last year. Plumber.



The First Double OVER the past 60 odd years quite a number of counties have won two football titles in the one year, the most recent instance being Ciarraí's senior and minor double last season. But Ciarraí also has the distinction of being the first county to bring off a double and that was as far back as 1913 when, after regaining the senior crown by beating Loch Garman, they took the junior title by overcoming Ceatharlach in the delayed final at Cork on July 12, 1914.

For good measure Ciarraí brought off the second double also, with victories over Ath Cliath (senior) and An Longfort (junior) in 1924. And of course, the first senior/minor double was won by the 'Kingdom' in 1931.





Minor Musings

CORCAIGH were late comers to the minor honours list – they were even late comers to the All-Ireland final scene as and it was only on their fifth appearance as Munster's representatives that they reached the final. This was in 1960 when following a narrow semi-final win over An Dún, they were well-beaten in the final by a great Gaillimh team. A year later, however, they were back to record Corcaigh's first success in the grade.

Since that initial triumph the Rebel county teenagers have been remarkably persistent challengers for minor honours as the record clearly shows and since 1961 Corcaigh have contested nine finals, six of which they won. Their nearest rivals in this respect are Ciarraí who, from seven finals appearances over the past two decades, have emerged victorious on four occasions.

Doire were also late in making an impact on the minor championship scene, but, unlike Corcaigh, they were successful on the first occasion they came out of Ulster – in 1965 – to record a splendid win over Ciarraí in the final.

Since then they have been Ulster standard-bearers on three occasions, reaching the final of 1969 in which they lost narrowly to Corcaigh and last year when they were beaten by Ciarraí.

Beaten Finalists

DOIRE were beaten finalists in last year's Minor championship, and it's worth pointing out that in both 1979 and last year, the runners-up of the previous year came back to take the title, with Ath Cliath winning in 1979 and Ciarraí doing so last year.

Incidentally, of the seven losing finalists who've qualified for the decider of the following year, only one suffered defeat in that second final – Maigh Eó, who went down to Corcaigh in 1961 and to Ciarraí a year later.

CORCAIGH and Doire have met once before in an All-Ireland Minor Football Final – 12 years ago when the Munster side captured their third successive Minor championship (and their fourth in all) by recording a 2-7 to 0-11 victory over the northerners, who were appearing in only their second Minor decider.

Doire's Treble

DOIRE'S achievements at the All-Ireland stage of the championship in recent years, in any grade, have not been overimpressive, but over the years the Oak Leaf county has acquired a distinction that most counties would envy that of being successful in their initial encounters with Ciarraí in three grades of football. The Northeners won in senior (1958), minor (1965) and under-21 (1968). A proud record by any standard.

Remarkable Minor

BRENDAN Reidy of Tralee is the only player ever to win three All-Ireland minor football medals as a goalkeeper but he never managed to command a place on the Ciarraí senior team.

He demonstrated his versatility in Limerick in 1932 when, after helping the minor footballers defeat Luimneach in the opening game, he turned out, in goal, for, the senior hurlers against An Clár.

At the First Attempt

ALTHOUGH the minor championship was inaugurated more than 40 years after the senior championships commenced, 16 counties have taken All-Ireland honours in the grade as against 15 that have won the senior title.

Another 'minor fact' is that 11 counties have won the minor title on their first appearance in the final while only seven have lifted the senior crown at the first time of asking.

Double Specialists

THE ALL-Ireland senior and minor football double has been won on only seven occasions and of these seven, six have been won by Ciarraí. The years of achievement were 1931-32, 1946, 1962, 1975 and 1980. The only 'intrusion' in the 'Kingdom's double domain' was in 1958 when Ath Cliath recorded their only double success to date.

AN BHFUIL FHIOS AGAT?

Unbeaten

THE longest unbeaten run of any county in the provincial championships was that of Ciarraí who were unbeaten in Munster between 1929 and 1942.

But the Kingdom did not set up a record of fourteen successive provincial titles as they withdrew from all competition in 1935 breaking what would surely have been the most remarkable winning sequence in football history.

Would you Believe?

.... that the first county in Ireland to contest three provincial senior hurling finals in successive seasons was Ciarraí, who figured in the Munster finals of 1890-'91 and '92.

Captains Three

IN THE past 20 years Leinster has won just three Railway Cups in football and on all three occasions the teams were captained by Uibh Fháilí men – Willie Nolan (1961), Greg Hughes (1962) and Martin Furlong (1974).

One Up

IT MIGHT seem an impossible task to discover some aspect og gaelic football in which any county could be said to be 'one up' on Ciarraí, but (libh Fháilí have finally done so.

When Glibh Fháilí overcame An Dún in this year's semi-final they had accomplished a task that Ciarraí teams have so far been unable to bring about – a senior championship win over the Mourne county.

An Occasion

WHEN Uibh Fháilí beat Lú in the 1955 Leinster football championship it was something of an occasion for the Faithful county as that victory marked – the first-ever win of an Uibh Fháilí football team over Lú in any grade of football. And Uibh Fháilí's first meeting with the Wee county had been 59 years earlier, in the first-round of the 1896 championship!

SINCE the introduction of the large parallelogram in 1974, penalties have become a prominent feature of gaelic football and this overall pattern has been faithfully reflected in the All-Ireland finals of the past seven years.

Not that penalties were unknown in the finals of earlier years, but 'spotkicks' were undoubtedly much rarer in the days when only infringements inside the small 'square' were penalised by the 14yards kick against the lone 'keeper'.

Just how rare penalties actually were can be gathered from newspaper reports of early finals and it was as late as 1948 before a goalkeeper had to face a penalty shot in an All-Ireland final. That was the day when Maigh Eó's great second-half rally forced An Cabhán to concede the penalty which Padraic Carney sent past J. D. Benson to earn a special niche in football history.

Mhacha's Bill Ard McCorry blazed his 'spotkick' wide of the Ciarraí posts at a vital stage of the '53 final, but Paddy

Doherty made no mistake when he took An Dún's penalty against Ciarraí in 1960.

As An Dún retained the

There was a 'moritorium' on 'spot-kicks' for the next 11 seasons until the year of 'the big square' brought Paddy Cullen's dramatic and vital save from Liam Sammon in the secondhalf of the '74 final and two Jimmy later. vears

Keaveney left Paudie O'Mahony helpless with his penalty shot - the only one ever taken by the Ath Cliath sharpshooter in a

The second appearance of Ard Mhacha in a final saw Paddy Moriarty entrusted with two penalties in '77. He scored from the first, but Cullen's reflexes deprived him of a unique distinction - of being the

only player to score from two penalty kicks in a final.

The towering Ath Cliath 'keeper was again involved in the most recent penalty incident when Mikey Sheehy became the only Ciarraí player ever to take and convert - a penalty in an All-Ireland final.

Of the nine penalties awarded in finals, six were converted, two were saved and one was sent wide.

AN BHFUIL FHIOS AGAT?

Sole Survivor

THE first championship meeting of Ciarraí and Uibh Fháilí was in the 1969 all-Ireland final. Of the 30 players who took part in that game only one still survives senior inter-county

football – long-serving goalkeeper, Martin Furlong.

Long Time

WHEN (libh Fháilí beat An Mhí in the Leinster senior football championship at Croke Park on July 4, 1915, it marked (libh Fháilí's last success at the venue for quite a long time.

In fact, 40 years were to elapse before an Uibh Fháilí team won a senior championship game at Headquarters, which was in 1955 when Lú were overcome in a second-round

A Few Words

IT WOULD be impossible to calculate the number of words written about today's final, not the least about Ciarrai's attempt to equal the four-in-a-row record.

But newspapers were not always inclined to give such massive coverage to a final even in days when the All-Ireland final had already become established as a major sporting event.

For instance, when Loch Garman met Tiobraid Árann in the 1918 final – the game that was to bring them their fourth successive title the "Irish Independent"


previewed the final thus:

"The All-Ireland football final will be played tomorrow at Croke Park, starting at 3 p.m. Wexford and Tipperary should furnish a match worthy of the occasion as both have trained hard. They will arrive in Dublin this evening. Whilst Tipperary K.Od. Mayo by a point, Wexford readily accounted for Louth in the other semi-final by four points and are awarmly fancied to retain All-Ireland honours. The teams will be selected from the following".

Apart from the list of players, the preview ran to a total of 76 words!
