Competition Rules

- 1. All games except the final will be of fifteen minutes each way with an interval of five minutes. The final will be twenty minutes each way. Each group is played on a league basis with one team from each group qualifying for the quarter finals.
- 2. Each team must register a panel of ten players for use during the championship and may not go outside this ten without written permission from the committee.
- 3. The complete panel may be used for any particular game with no limit on the number of subs during the game. The full list of 10 players must be handed in to referee before the start of each match.
- 4. Substitutions may only be made with the approval of the referee, from the centrepoints of the sideline and not from the endlines.
- 5. In kickouts after a score the ball must be played FORWARD i.e. the ball may not be played backwards from the 21-yard line. In other kickouts the ball cannot be played, apart from the actual kickout, until it has passed the 21-yard line.
- 6. In the event of teams in a group finishing level on points, the team whose total score within the group is the greater will be deemed the winners. Drawn knockout games will go to extra time. (5 minutes each half).
- 7. Two points shall be awarded for any placed ball, free, 'fifty' or sideline kick, which goes directly over the crossbar without being touched by any player of either side.
- 8. Any team not ready to take the field of play five minutes before the appointed starting time will be given a final time warning and should they not have appeared on the field at the starting time they will be disqualified. This rule will be enforced regardless of how far the team has travelled.
- 9. Should there be a clash of colours between any two teams one side shall, on the toss of a coin, wear the U.C.D. club jersies (St. Patrick's Blue).
- 10. Players will not be allowed pass the ball backwards while they are in their own half of the field of play i.e. up to the halfway line.
- 11. No hand-passed or fisted scores will be allowed. The only exception to this rule is where a ball is added to in mid-air with the fist.
- 12. The personal foul rule will apply (whereby a player on being sent off for two fouls is suspended for two weeks).
- 13. Any outstanding points not covered directly by these rules will be subject to the rulings of the Organising Committee whose decision on all matters shall be final and binding on all participating teams.
