



A somewhat fortuitous second half goal put Galway on the road to victory in a closely contested game played at Pearse Stadium in atrocious conditions before less than 300 people.

The goal came midway through the second half when referee John Cosgrave awarded a penalty after Hugh Bleahen was taken down in the Clare square. Stephen Joyce's penalty kick was parried by Clare goalkeeper, Martin Flynn, but before the goalkeeper could secure possession, Joyce followed through to force the ball to the net.

Clare had the edge in the first half exchanges with Ger O'Keeffe, Frank McInerney, Ger Killeen and Pat Burke showing some splendid accuracy from play and frees. Frank Griffin, Noel Roche, Michael Comyns gave Clare the early edge in possession but Galway points from Fergal O'Neill (2), Gay McManus, Jimmy O'Dea and Kevin Walsh left them trailing only one point at the interval, 0-6 to 0-5.

Donegal got their league campaign off to a fine start when they hammered a poor Kildare side at MacCumhaill Park, Ballybofey.

The Lilywhites failed to register a score in the tirst half in which Martin McHugh goaled from a penalty and converted two frees, with Joyce McMullan getting the other score as Donegal led 1 3 to 0-0 at half-time.

One of the biggest cheers of the afternoon came in the 10th minute of the new half when Kildare finally scored a point.

Martin McHugh (3), Donal Reid, Declan Bonner and Joyce McMullan (2) added further points for Donegal and only a lucky goal two minutes from time spared Kildare's blushes.

A draw was the fairest result between Clare and Cavan at Cooraclare. Playing with the storm in the first half Clare led by 1-7 to 0-1 at half-time and if they had taken all the chances that came their way, they could have added another six or seven points.

The only goal of the game came five minutes before half when Pat Burke breached the Cavan defence.

In the second half Cavan moved Ronan Carolan from left full forward to centre forward and he played a marvellous game, scoring six of his side's points. The equaliser came three minutes from the end and it was a tribute to the stoutness of the Clare defence that Cavan did not take the lead in a storming finish.

Within a minute McHugh had tied the scores with a free before Tommy Ryan put Donegal ahead with what was Donegal's only score of the game from play. Three times in the closing stages Donegal hit the woodwork.

Roscommon, who lined out with Harry Keegan and Paul Earley, began the game in magnificent fashion with three points from Tony McManus and one from Tom O'Brien to lead by four points and they were seven points clear approaching half-time.

There are those, who while acknowledging the merit of what this young Donegal team have achieved so far, now say that it will prove a case of "so far and no further." Whatever about that one has got to admit the Royal Liver National Football League campaign is proving something of a fairytale-like story for the side.


The dark days of the championship have been forgotten with three impressive results to date and the promise of more to come. They have squared up to the experienced, established side and answered them with wholehearted and workmanlike performances. Nor should we overlook the fact that under a new backroom team, the outfit has done as well, if not better, than any county side in recent years. That is an achievement in itself.

But the real challenge is only now upon us. Barring a major disaster the side can move forward in their remaining games to contest the league quarter-finals. Naturally Tom Conaghan will not say this, even the players will not commit themselves but nevertheless expectations are high. Such statements invariably revive memories of past disappointments and, of course, we've had our fair share of those.

Today's opposition have a lot to prove. They would consider themselves most unlucky to be propping up the table. They lost their opening game against Galway (1-8 to 0-9), drew with Cavan in the second (1-7 to 0-10) and last Sunday were just pipped by the minimum margin by Kildare (1-10 to 2-8). It's make or break time for manager Noel Walsh and his team.

The last time they played Donegal they were hammered by nine points in Ballybofey (2-8 to 0-5). Interesting to note it was also the last game in the league series before "Christmas. Although the final scoreline suggests otherwise, Donegal had to fight all the way for the points. It won't be any different today.

But the challenge is there and is formidable but not by any means impossible. 

UNDER-10 CHALLENGE GAME





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HAPPY BIRTHDAY NOEL

Clare's most distinguished footballer, Noel Roche, today celebrates his 28th birthday. Top honours may have eluded the county but the image presented by the quiet spoken Kilkee man, the achievements that have been his over the past decade or so at all levels of the game, have provided Clare people with ample cause to rejoice.

Noel has always epitomised the spirit of one who is immersed in football and despite the fact that provincial or national honours have never been experienced, his determination has never waned and whether it be in the colours of Kilkee St. Senans, Clare, Munster or in the Ireland strip in the Compromise Rules games against Australia, it is all out effort from Noel Roche.

He has been a regular on the Clare team since the late '70s and for the past five seasons has readily found his place in the Munster Railway Cup team. In 1984 when the Australians came over, Noel threw his hat into the ring and his fierce determination won the admiration of Kevin Heffernan who selected him for all games. A vear later it seemed his career was in tatters when, in a game with the Southern Command against the Air Corps, Noel broke his leg, thus confining him to crutches while his beloved Kilkee set out in defence of the county title they had regained after four decades, in Centenary

But back he bounced to win a Munster place in '86 and with his sights firmly set on a trip to Australia, the old Roche drive was soon in top gear. That trip was won and, of course, a few months ago, when the Aussies came over here the self same Noel was an automatic choice for selection and played in the three tests.

The Kilkee army man has captained Clare in several seasons. Defence is his preferred role but he has seen duty in attack also and lined out at midfield for the opening two games of the current league. Certainly a man for all positions, but it is only symptomatic of the pride which Noel takes in his game. He loves football. Football has been good to him and the Clare cause is dearest to his heart. Nothing would please him more than to see the Banner county make the breakthrough.


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THE LEAGUE IS CLARE'S BREAD AND BUTTER

Could there be anything more contrasting than the preponderance of the Kerry/Cork syndrome in Munster and the glorious uncertainty that hangs over the Ulster championship each year? It is inevitable that Kerry or Cork will come out of Munster. Between them they have won a whopping eighty seven provincial senior titles and one has to go back as far as 1935 for a break in the Kerry/Cork sequence. In that year, Tipperary came through. Clare won their one and only provincial title in 1917. They failed to Wexford in the All-Ireland final.

So, is it any wonder that Clare take to the league with far greater confidence than the championship? At least they will be avoiding Cork and Kerry in the earlier rounds. Such was in fact the case last season when Division III (South) honours were at last won. It was a welcome relief in Clare to have moved up a step. Promotion had eluqed them narrowly in previous seasons and an all out effort was made to rid themselves of the shackles of the lower regions of the league.

Having achieved their aim, they were in far better mood to take on Kerry in the quarter final and at the end of a hectic hour in Cusack Park, Ennis, only a Ger Power goal separated the sides, 1-10 to 0-10.

Clare are under no illusions whatever about what faces them in Division II. Standards are so much higher than they have been used to but they will know that if they are to become anything in the football scene, they must make a bold bid to, at least hold their own in the division for a season or two.

They travelled to Galway for their first game and even the most partisan of Galwegians will admit the Connacht champions were very fortunate to take both points. It was 1-8 to 0-9 at the finish, Galway's goal the result of a very dubious penalty. Next they faced Cavan in Cooraclare and shared the spoils, 1-7 to 0-10. Kildare came to Cooraclare last Sunday and Clare paid the penalty for defensive errors as Kildare held on to win by a point, 2-8 to 1-10.

Under Dave Weldrick's guidance, the team has shown remarkable spirit and they will realise that the league is their bread and

butter. They realise, too, that the road ahead is long and fraught with all kinds of problems. However, they are willing to give it everything in the knowledge that it is only by coming up against strong sides, that they will ever amount to anything.

Back in the early 70s, when the league had a different format to that which now pertains, they reached the quarter finals and suffered agonising defeats at the hands of Armagh and Monaghan. Indeed in the same year that Dublin made the breakthrough back in 1974, Clare defeated them soundly in the League in Croke Park.

To-day, Clare make the long journey to the North West knowing just how vital every game is. They will make a bold effort to take the ponts. For them, the league means so much. Having achieved promotion from Division III, the last thing they want is to be consigned there again next season. It would have the effect of undoing a lot of hard work.
