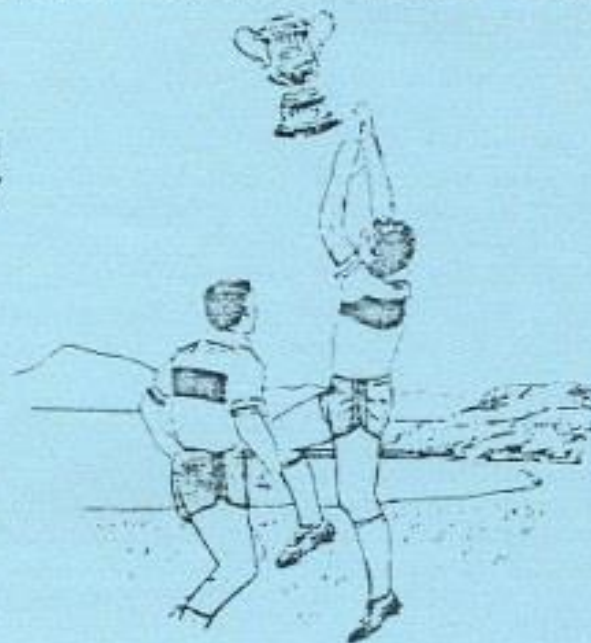

I think it would be fair to state that the G.A.A. in Cloughaneely was never as strong as it is at the present time.

Facilities have improved greatly in the club over the past decade. The club can now boast of three fine handball alleys, two of them covered. This is no mean achievement, and great credit is due to John Kelly and his hard working committee. The club enters nine teams in county competitions from under-10 to senior. A word of praise here for Fíabál Scolaí Chloich Geann Fhoila for their work in promoting Gaelic games in the school.

This year, the club organised Omurtag Peile na Gaeltachta in the county. The Charlie Greene Memorial Tournament is organised by the Club every year.

CARN DÓMHAIGH

The love of hurling by a young schoolteacher who obtained a teaching post in a rural school in the parish resulted in the first ever G.A.A club being established in Carn Dómhagh.

The teacher's name was James Reid, a native of Dunkeen, near Ballytobey, and the year was 1921. Gaelic football was introduced to the Carn Dómhagh club in 1938.

Carn Dómhagh's first breakthrough at county level came in 1960 when the footballers won the County Junior Championship by defeating Dingle on the score of 1-6 to 1-2. In 1963, Carn Dómhagh reached the Senior County Final (football) in which they lost to Geeshree on the score 1-5 to 1-4 in a thrilling game.

In later years, due to the lack of competition, apathy set in and it was only at under-age competitions that the club was really active.

Dedicated work by teacher Tom Mc Donerty, a native of Kilmac, kept the spark alive.

In 1983 it was decided to make an effort to get the team active in adult competitions and the club is now involved in all hurling and football competitions under the County Board.

ACOM RUAIDH (Coill Na gQuirridin)

Although the club has only been in existence six years since its re-formation in 1981, it has had the honour of competing in many finals in that time.

In 1981 it had the honour of winning the Junior Championship and the Division III League as well as finishing runners-up in the Division II Shield.

1982 saw the club reach the Intermediate final only to lose narrowly to Division I behind Dowings.

In 1983, the club found itself in both Division I of the Senior Championship.

1984 was a downward turn in the club's fortunes.

However, 1985 saw the club bounce back and after a good League campaign were narrowly piped for promotion back to Division I.

The 1986 season saw the club win the Division II shield and League Titles, and reach the county Senior Final where they were beaten by Ballyshannon.

Today, the Junior team play Kilmac in the 1st Round of the Junior B Championship.

From simple beginnings in 1884, The Gaelic Athletic Association has grown into one of the largest amateur sporting organisations in the world. It was a Clare man, Michael Cusack who brought about its birth.

Michael Cusack, the founder of the G.A.A. was born in September 1847 in the Burren in Clare, and died in Dublin in December 1906 shortly after his 59th birthday.

The first All-Ireland Football Final 1887, was played at Beech-Hill, Clonsilla, Dublin (at the present C.J.E Dorrystown C.I.E garage). Limerick (Commercials) were victors on the occasion as they defeated Louth (Dundalk Young Irelanders) by 1-4 to 0-3 in a fine sporting game on April 29.

The land at Jones 's Road was bought in 1906 by the then Vice-President of the G.A.A., Frank D. because the organisation did not have the money to buy it at the time. Subsequently, the ground was named Pearse an O'Connell after the great Archbishop Croke, first patron of the Association.

The foundation of the Hill 16 terracing was laid from the rubble of buildings shattered during the 1916 Rising. The first stand was built in 1924 for the Tailteann Games revival and was named Michael Hogan. Hogan was shot dead while playing football for Tipperary against Dublin in November 1920 in a reprisal attack by British forces. A total of thirteen people died and no one was wounded.

In 1937, the great new Cusack Stand was opened, named in honour of Michael Cusack, a Clare school teacher, and founder of the G.A.A. In the same year, concrete terracing was constructed on the East End. The Oval End was terraced in 1949, and three years later the new corner stand was dedicated to the memory of Patrick W. Nally, a Tipperary man who had influenced Cusack to found the G.A.A.

The field now known as Croke Park was the venue for two All-Irelands on the same day in 1886.

The size of the playing area is 156 yards by 92 yards (142m x 84m).
The goalposts are over 42 ft. (12.8m) high.

The highest - ever attendance at Croke Park was in 1961 when 90,556 people watched the Down v. Offaly Football Final.

PAUL KELLY

James Patrick McGinley was born and raised in Uniskin, Kilkear. Uniskin produced many fine footballers and James was one of six brothers who played for Kilkear. Johnny, Joseph, Eddie, Francis and Leo are all hale and hearty and residing in Scotland, England, America and Ireland. His youngest brother, Leo and an Sean, also played for Dun na nGall.

He now resides on his farm at Uniskin and still takes a great interest in county and club football.

Paul Kelly is Cloughaneely's best known footballer. Between 1956 and 1966, he accumulated a most impressive collection of medals that bear witness to his outstanding prowess.

Paul was a fiercely competitive red-headed wing half-back. His father had won an Ulster Senior Hurling Championship medal with Donegal in 1923-24. Paul followed in his footsteps.

Paul's brothers, Tony and Louis, all from Ardsbeg outside Gartabrock, played for Cloughaneely, and Donegal footballing scene.

MAN in the CAP

Peter McDermott of Meath is the only man (hurling or football) to have won an All-Ireland medal before (1949) and after (1954) he had refereed a senior final (1953).

KILCAR NOT FLATTERED BY 16 POINT VICTORY

Kilcar illustrated the chasm in class which divides them from some of the other senior teams in the county when they accounted for a directionless Cloughaneely side last Sunday in the first round first leg senior championship tussle at a beautiful Towney pitch in Kilcar.

They were not seriously flattered by the final score and it could have been more but for some slack finishing.

As for Cloughaneely they had their chances but failed miserably to take them. They allowed the home side to scuffle and settle and finally enjoy the confidence that brought about the victory. The North-Westerners are capable of better but they will have to fire on all guns if they want to make any impression in the second leg.

One could not say the match was evenly balanced in the first half but it was then, and only then, the visitors could have made an impact. They exposed an 'out of form' Kilcar defence but did not make enough use of possession in front of goal.

Sean McGinley, Kilcar's left corner forward, had an outstanding game. He carried the ball deep into Cloughaneely's half and either made or took scores at crucial times.

The first fifteen minutes belonged to the home side. Michael Molloy opened with a point after the throw-in and Cloughaneely's Denis Doohan finished a good run from midfield to level the scores.

This was the first and last time the sides were so close. Kilcar broke away and points from Neilly Cannon, Martin McHugh, Roger McShane and McHugh again left four points separating the sides after twelve minutes.

A high ball from Sean McGinley found young Mark McShane loose on the edge of the Cloughaneely square. McShane caught the ball on his chest, turned and rattled the net. Michael Molloy added another point a minute later to leave them well clear.

Cloughaneely made a substitution at this stage taking Martin Kelly off and put Joe Kelly on. Several positional switches later and Cloughaneely began

to show what they are capable of. Points from Joe McGarvey and Terence Gallagher caught Kilcar out but the real surprise came when full-forward, former Ballina player, Tom Feeney, sent in their first goal. Feeney played an important role up front for his side.

Just when Cloughaneely looked like coming into this game a goal in the 20th minute from Roger McShane following a Martin McHugh pass snuffed any hopes or aspirations they had out like a candle.

Cloughaneely had the luck with them, however, and when Eugene McGarvey fired in a powerful line ball a minute later from 35 yards little did he think it would end up in the back of the net. Unfortunately for Kilcar full-back James Carr, he stepped back when he caught the shot and went over his line. Referee Thomas McBrearty was very sharp to spot this as his umpires remained motionless. This was Cloughaneely's last score of the half but Kilcar added a point from Sean McGinley and another goal.

Two minutes from the break Michael Carr showed a touch of his true class when he collected a fumbled Cloughaneely ball in his own defence, ran 40 yards and pumped it into Martin McHugh who tapped it on to the intruding Sean McGinley who hammered home another great goal to leave the half time score Kilcar 3-7, Cloughaneely 2-3.

What an exciting first half, full of action and good open football. Despite their seven point advantage Kilcar did look like they could do more. They certainly squandered one if not two goal scoring opportunities while at the other end some tough defensive work from Seamus Gallagher and Neilly Byrne had to curb Cloughaneely's confidence.

The second half was so one sided it

does not do either side justice. Cloughaneely's one and only point came in the 18th minute from Michael McCallion.

Martin McHugh and Sean McGinley dominated the scoring for Kilcar in the third quarter where they added five points for their work.

Michael Molloy was quick to snap up a loose ball at the end of this period to smash in Kilcar's fourth goal. Michael Carr and Martin McHugh linked up well for a second attempt but McHugh's effort was blocked and Molloy came to the rescue.

Mark McShane and Gerard McBrearty added points to wrap this game up.

Kilcar were much too strong for Cloughaneely but it must be said the visitors did not play up to their true potential. They will have to change course dramatically if they wish to sustain interest in this competition.

Four goal Gallagher hammers Carndonagh

Carndonagh's ambitions of providing the surprise of the Championship were swept away by a flood of goals at Towney on Sunday.

Hero of the day was undoubtedly Kilmacshane's Francis Gallagher who hammered in four goals for his side. It proved the way for victory over a slightly disorganised inanimate side.

The visitors got off to a flying start with a point by Paddy Farnon but Manus Brady soon levelled matters.

The visitors kept it south and in the sixth minute were ahead again with a goal from half-forward Mickey Doherty.

The lead was short-lived as Gallagher put away his first goal for Kilmac in the tenth. He added a second on the 13th after scorable chances were sent wide by Timmy O'Donnell, Eada McHugh and Mark O'Donnell.

Both sides battled hard for control in the third quarter but the visitors could only manage two points from Tony Corry and Tony Foley for their troubles.

Kilmac, on the other hand, got stronger and two goals and a point from Francis Gallagher and a point from John O'Donnell and Mark O'Donnell by the 22nd minute ended this game as a coroner.

Carndonagh tried hard and had good

Up front they capitalised on Carndonagh defensive errors and took their scores. They will have to change their game slightly when they travel to O'Doherty Park for the second leg as it is not as big as Towney.

A good win nevertheless for the home side.
