


I hope that the Gaelic Athletic Association will continue to vigorously enrich the sporting life of the city for the next Millennium.

keeper. Ann made the big breakthrough last seaon when she caught the eye of the senior selectors with some sterling displays for her club. Ann previously played with St. Finbarr's and Austin Stacks. Holder of a Junior All-Ireland medal and also a club championship medal, Ann is a member of the Crumlin team who won the county championship honours.

Mairead Cronin (Celtic) - One of the younger players on the team, Mairead has only been playing at this level of camogie for the last 2 years. Has won medals with Maria Assumpta College in Walkinstown and is a member of the Celtic team which will contest the county final next week. Previously played with An Caisleáin. Carmel Gray (Na Fianna) - Carmel, daughter of well-known G.A.A. administrator, Jimmy, and also of Gretta, chairperson of the Dublin County Camogie Board, was given her chance to stake a claim on the county team when she was selected to play against Wexford and she retained her place against Cork a week later. She captained the Dublin junior team to victory in he the National League in 1987. A very versatile player, Carmel has won Ashbourne Cup medals with U.C.D.

Ann Colgan (Celtic) - A wonderful ballplayer, Ann was the captain of the Dublin senior team that won the All-Ireland championship in 1984 after a lapse of 18 years. Has also won All-Ireland medals with her native Cork. Her positional sense and ability to lead a game are first class. She previously played with Presentation, Terenure, and holds county championship and league medals with her present club, Celtic, Also holds Leinster senior championship honours.

Denise O'Leary (Marino) - A member of the Marino team that will vie with Celtic for county championship honours next week. Denise had a brilliant game at left-back against Kilkenny in a recent league fixture. Has won an All-Ireland colleges' medal with Maryfield

Ann Cooper (Celtic) - Ann has won All-Ireland senior and junior colleges' medals with St. John of God, Kilmore Road, and captained the Dublin team which brought the only All-Ireland minor title to the county. Has also won Clonbourne Cup medals with U.C.D. and led them to their triumph this year as well as captaining the combined Universities team.

Ann Byrne (Crumlin) - Captain and goal- | Louise Lynch (O. Plunketts) - Although not playing camogie all that long, Louise has settled in nicely to this grade of the game. A very fast determined player, Louise has years of camogie to look forward to in the future. Has won Senior 'B' Championship and League medals with her club and Leinster Championship honours with the county. Has also played G.A.A.

> Toni O'Byrne (Celtic) - Toni is a very good goalkeeper but unfortunately for her has had to stand in the shadows of former custodian Yvonne Redmond and current 'keeper Ann Byrne. Nonetheless, Toni has never faltered in her lovalty to her club or county and is an example to all aspiring young goalkeepers. Has played for St. Patrick's training college. Mary Keane (Crumlin) - A native of Galway, Mary decided to throw in her lot with Dublin last year and won a Leinster senior championship trophy. A very enthusiastic player. Mary has amassed championship and league medals with Crumlin and also holds an All-Ireland Club championship trophy.

Suzanne Doyle (Celtic) - A very fast and direct player, Suzanne has won All-Ireland senior and junior colleges' medals with St. John of God. Kilmore Road. She was also a member of the minor team that won the only All-Ireland title for Dublin at this grade.

Michelle Donnelly (O. Plunketts) - A very fast and industrious player, Michelle has boundless energy. She made her debut on the senior county team last year and also managed to remain there since. She previously played with the Erin's Isle club and has won Senior 'B' championship and league medals with her present club, Oliver Plunketts. Plays G.A.A. for Dublin.

Geraldine Dunne (St. Monica's) - Geraldine has played all her camogie with her present club and is currently a member of the junior county panel. She is very fleet of foot and is very accurate from frees and line-ball situations. Will lead her club in the Senior 'B' championship final against Ballyboden St. Enda's next week.

Maggie O'Reilly (Ballyboden St. Enda's) -The newest member to the county senior panel, Maggie has yet to make her debut at this level. A member of the current junior panel, Maggie, a native of Galway, will be hoping to earn a senior 'B' championship medal next week against St. Monica's.

ANGELA DOWNEY (St. Paul's, Kilkenny) –Will go into camogie annals as the player of the decade. Texaco award 19813, 3 B&I awards, 7 All-Ireland senior championships, 6 National Leagues, 5 club championships, 6 Gael-Linn medals, Gradam Táilte winner 1984, '85 and '86.

MARY KELLY (St. Mary's Club, Galway) –Mary, from Kilmore, Ballygar, is 26 years, and is a past pupil of St. Mary's College, Ballygar. She is employed as secretary in a veterinary surgeon's office in Ballygar. She joined St. Mary's Club in April 1983 and since then has been consistently one of the club's outstanding players. As a player her greatest qualities are her dedication to training, sportsmanship, ability to get her shot in — even in the tighest situation — her remarkable stamina, ability to read the game and be where she is most needed. These qualities have combined to make her one of the best centrefield players in camogie.

Whither hurling in Dublin?

T IS now almost 50 years, 4th September 1938, to be exact, since the Dublin Hurlers won their last Senior Hurling All-Ireland. Their last appearance in an All-Ireland before that was 1934 when they were beaten by Limerick, in a replay. In 1938 they met Waterford, who had beaten Cork in the semi-final. It was Waterford's first senior appearance in a Croke Park final. Reports of the game say it was a disappointing final, both teams seemingly being obsessed by the big occasion. Dublin were in front at half time and a good spell in the third quarter saw them increase their lead. Waterford by staging a late rally saved the game from mediocre but in the end Dublin were deserving winners on the score 2-5 to 1-6. There was only one native born player on the Dublin side. Jim Byrne (R.I.P.). The rest were drawn from several of the other counties.

From a glance at the records, Dublin's best years in hurling were from 1900 onwards to 1927 and during the years that followed they were not far below the highest championship standard. Yet they always seemed to lack that little bit of extra punch which distinguished the great Cork, Kilkenny, Limerick, Tipperary and Galway teams of that era. While the records of the latter counties continued to rise somewhat, Dublin

stood still. This is not to say they were idle.

Following their success in the 1938 final they contested five All-Irelands in the years 1941, '42, '44, '48 and 1952. While it was a source of great disappointment to have lost all the finals, we must not lose sight of the fact that in each of those years they had won the Leinster Provincial title to reach the final.

It was nine years, 1961, before they reached their next All-Ireland, and last to date. This time their opponents were Tipperary and after one of the best hurling games seen for years, which a fair share of critics say could have and should have been won by Dublin, Tipperary carried the day. Although beaten on the day, great satisfaction was derived in Dublin hurling circles from the fact that the teams that day comprised of fourteen native players plus one nonnative. Paddy Croke. Something to look forward to at the time. What a difference this was to the Dublin hurling team who won the 1927 All-Ireland, defeating Cork the holders by the remarkable score of 14 points.

The composition of the Dublin team on that occasion indicated how the "Resident" or "Declaration" rule was being availed of, there were nine from the Garda Club, all non-natives of Dublin,

including Mick Gill (Galway), Matthew Power (Kilkenny), three from Army Metro, Clareman Tommy Doyle and two from Faughs, one a Kilkenny man. The "Resident Rule" meant that players from other counties coming to work or study in Dublin had to declare for Dublin.

It would appear that the greatest threat to hurling in any county is football. The same however can conversely be said about football. However, take hurling for the present. Counties like Galway, Wexford, Offaly, Tipperary who were strong in football at one stage or other, are now apparently going through a lean period due to the upsurgence of their hurlers.

Therefore, taking cognisance of the remarkable success of the Dublin Inter-County Footballers at all levels over the past fifteen years the hurlers slow and long overdue return to a place in top flight hurling can be readily understood.

The G.A.A. is reckoned as not having made much progress in Dublin in the early years of the Association. "Metropolitan's" was the first hurling club in Dublin, having been founded in 1885 by Michael Cusack who said he would bring hurling back to Ireland. It


included many Civil Servants and students who were attending Cusack's Academy at Gardener's Place.

Clubs quickly followed in Inchicore and Drumcondra and records show that the following hurling clubs were in existence in 1886: Metropolitans, Faughs, Michael Davitts, Grocers, Dalkey and Dunleary. With the commencement of the Inter-County matches most of the finals were played at Dublin venues, Phoenix Park, Clonskea, Elm Park (Merrion), Terenure, Inchicore, Clonturk Park and N.C. Road. This latter ground was situated where the now defunct Dublin Cattle Market and Abbatoir were sited.

Progress in Dublin, therefore, was on the return. It will be seen therefore that since the early foundation of the Association hurling has been played in Dublin and is still extensively played and encouraged there. It still thrives but maybe the standard is not as high as we woud all like it to be. However, there is no need for complacency or fear of it dying. One of our past Presidents, Dr. Keenan, during his term of office is reported to have said "If we allow hurling to die it would mean the death of the 'Association'." And Dublin of all counties does not want this.
