### LET'S HOPE FOOTBALL IS THE WINNER


A year is a long time in football. And every year Aodh Ruadh and Kilcar go without winning the County Senior Football Championship title seems like an eternity to those clubs. History has taught both sides to be cautious so while there may be an air of confidence in both camps for today's match, it is concealed by the reality of knowing things don't always go the way they're planned.

Over the past few years these two teams have dominated this competition. Each of them is making a third final appearance in four seasons and irrespective of today's result both teams have the necessary qualities to stay at the top for another few years at least. That won't be much consolation for the losers, however, so this game will be a make or break occasion.

Kilcar have been impressive to date and have defied all those who thought they were a team living on memories. Now in their third successive final and the last two having ended in defeat the club must feel that the pendulum which for so long swung against them has, this year, finally moved back in their direction. Their consistent and strong footballing displays this year should give them that extra bit of power to make sure this three-in-a-row is not remembered for all the wrong reasons.

By the time the championship came around last year the then outgoing champions, Aodh Ruadh, were everyone's favourites to complete a successful three-in-a-row. Instead they were ingloriously dumped out in the first round and found themselves having to scrape a team together mainly because of a spate of migration which hit most towns in the county.

Having re-built their senior team they embarked on the long hard slog to get to this year's final and even though they went about it in workmanlike fashion, it took a lot of blood, sweat and tears to get here today. Then again, isn't that the stuff champions are made of so the Ballyshannon men will also feel they have a rightful claim to the crown.



So you see all things considered both teams feel they have one hand on this trophy. Thinking is one thing, making it happen is another. We could wander into the realm of "if" and "but" and still get no further forward. No, at the end of the day it's down to one hour's solid football to separate these sides.

There are times in the development of a team when it's absolutely essential to win. Such is the case today. Both sides have an opportunity to discover if they are taking the right road to their ambitions.

This game promises to be the outstanding final of the decade, if only because there is more than a good chance both sides will produce their best football for years due to the fact there's so much at stake. Over the course of their absorbing previous encounters the players have more than lived up to expectations. Their respective styles should ensure a close tie with little separating them at the finish.

No one will be brave enough to say at this stage how the game will end. There's so much going for both teams, pitting the enterprise and elaboration of Aodh Ruadh's game against the tenacity, experience and seasoned skills of Kilcar. Let's hope like last Sunday's All-Ireland final that football will be the real winner at the end of the day.

### TWO GOOD FINALS IN PROSPECT

After a year of relative obscurity in championship football the qualification of Aodh Ruadh for today's final has caught the imagination of the whole county. The mighty Ernesiders are back. And they are back on merit.

Defeating Ardara and the reigning champions Killybegs en route to the final has instilled a new found confidence in their side, a mixture of youth and experience. For their opponents Kilcar it will be a case of hoping it will be third time lucky.

If league form is a good test of form then Kilcar will start favourites to clinch their fourth title, third in the 80's at this level. An All-Ireland Gaeltacht championship has been the ideal preparation for their quest on a title that has eluded them on the last two appearances.


They have been very confident in their league campaign. In stark contrast Aodh Ruadh's league form has been erratic. Kilcar are peaking at the right time, so are Aodh Ruadh which promises a tense, exciting and thoroughly enjoyable culmination to the championship.

Emigration has robbed Aodh Ruadh of the talents of players like Tommy McDermott while Brian and Alan Murray are now playing their football in Dublin. The footballing school of Academy at Fr. Tierney Park has nurtured some fine young players over the years. The fifteen that start today are there for a purpose.

Kilcar's rating as favourites is due to the wealth of experience in their squad. For their emphatic and loyal band of supporters nothing short of a convincing victory in today's final will suffice.

The meeting of Na Rossa and Naomh Ultan in the Intermediate final should be an interesting spectacle. It is real David and Goliath pairing. Na Rossa will start as red hot favourites. This is their first championship final appearance since they lost to Glenfin by a point in the '83 final. The teams have not met since Na Rossa beat Naomh Ultan in the junior championship semi-final of '82.

In Declan Bonner who scored nine points in their semi-final victory over Robert Emmets Na Rossa have a potential matchwinner on



his day. Brothers Sean and Donal who is adjusting well in the full back position lay the foundation for what should be another historic day for the Na Rossa club.

They also have talented players such as 16-year-old Martin McShane who is improving with every game and looks a name for the future. Vinnie Gallagher is strong at midfield and left half back Michael Gallagher thrives on coming forward.

Naomh Ultan have defeated Termon and Bundoran to reach today's final. They will seek inspiration from county star Martin Shovlin who relished the big occasion. Their last appearance in the county final at this level was in 1984 when they defeated Kilcar.

Emigration too has hurt the Dunkineely based club, Brendan McCready being the most notable now playing with Tir Conaill Gaels in London. There are eight survivors of the '84 team with Dermot Alvey, Seamus McNern, Liam Meehan, Martin Shovlin, Colm Shovlin, Liam Kennedy, John Quigley and Willie Mackey.

It promises to be a good final with a victory for Na Rossa.

## Watching us ... watching you, the GAA and the media in Donega

Ten years ago it would not have been that unusual if a staff reporter from any of the local papers in Donegal covered only the Co. Senior Final and home games in the National League. Most other match/meeting reports were furnished by an obliging official or PRO from the home club.

In the intervening period there has been an explosion in the amount and the method of coverage the GAA in Donegal receives from both the print and broadcast media in the

county.

An ever increasing amount of detailed coverage, the expending of more and more money by newspapers such as the Donegal Democrat in an effort to cover all the major games — not just finals or home National League games — has resulted in a new objectivity, a new independence from GAA PROs and the like which GAA administrators in Donegal have, at times, struggled to appreciate or fully understand.

Despite the quite considerable costs in having a Democrat reporter and photographer at, for example, last year's Royal Liver League game against Kerry in Tralee, it was decided that they should be assigned to cover the game independently and objectively. Week in, week out there is a similar expension of resources to bring unbiased reports to

readers.
In the past, when games were 'picked up' by 'phoning the local PRO it was inevitable that on occasion the home side might get more favourable mention, even if they lost.

It was a cheaper system of getting games covered and is by no means on the way out but will not be used as often by papers such as the Democrat. With the luxury of a professional reporter at matches one can report on unsavoury incidents. In the past controversies had to be ignored or were rarely reported on for legal reasons if a reporter was not actually present. The likelihood now is that games, meetings, etc., will be reported — warts and all. Problems are highlighted not for the hell of it but to draw attention to them in the hope that they will be resolved. We, too, have a responsibility.

GAA President, Mr. John Dowling, in his inaugural address at Congress in Bundoran referred in a national context to the ever increasing depth of media coverage of national games. He spoke of the importance of improving the GAA's image. That aspiration holds true for the GAA at local as well as national level.

In the case of the Democrat quadrupling of GAA coverage and seconsiderable increase in comment of games and administration of the GAA other sports. Why not? If you cover the victories, the triumphs — does follow that the failures, the errors the mix are also examined?

The GAA and other sporting organism will have to get used to the probing of the media. Just look over at the Prestoday. The drawing power of these two and their ability to sell papers is under by the number of reporters in that same Box. There should, I estimate, be at least reporters/columnists there from local national newspapers and Raidic Gaeltachta. Add to that up to half a control photographers.







# Changes for the better or just for the sake of it

By Kevin Sharkey, Donegal People's Press

The proposed rule changes to Gaelic Football which are to be effected on an experimental basis in the forthcoming National League campaign have generated very keen discussion among ordinary members of the Association since they were approved by Central Council a couple of weeks ago.

Opinion is very much divided on whether or not changes are needed at all at this particular point in time. On the one hand there are those who will argue that the game has survived for over a century without any drastic changes and that the present proposals are nothing more than a dressed-up version of Australian Rules. On the other hand there is a groundswell of players and supporters alike who believe that the game has now reached a stage where pulling, dragging and time wasting have become the dominant features at the expense of skill and natural talent.

The re-introduction of the hand-pass should certainly pave the way for the return of the flowing game which was so much a part of the scene during the 70s when both Dublin and Kerry led the way in perfecting this particular skill. It's difficult to see what distinct advantages the other proposed changes of playing four quarters and the taking of free kicks, goal kicks and side-line kicks from the hand will have on the game.

However, we ought not to dismiss them out of hand before we see them in



operation. This is, after all, only an experiment and after the League campaign the part of that experiment which do not benefit the game should be discarded with the positive elements, if there are any, being retained.

What the outcome will be time alone will tell. However, when decision time does arrive it will be a critical juncture for the game's future. With this in mind it is essential that only changes which will have a very distinct advantage for the game be considered. The game must not now, or indeed ever, be put at risk by the implementation of new rules for no reason other than for the sake of it.


