DAMIAN'S DEDICATION

Damian O'Reilly's dedication and perseverance typifies the new and positive mood permeating Cavan football.

The 21-year-old Mullahoran clubman has regained full fitness after a serious injury threatened his participation in this afternoon's championship meeting with Donegal.

Injuries last July to his groin were bad enough, but before the season was out he had to undergo a hernia operation that kept him sidelined for six months.

That was a cruel blow for the promising defender who made his championship debut against Monaghan in last season's championship at Clones.

But Damian, circulation manager with the Cavan Leader, never lost heart even though he broke down in training after making the mistake of coming back too soon.

That, though, was only a temporary setback and it takes more than that to deter a Mullahoran man. "Because the injury flared up again it meant that I wasn't able to get back into training until February.

"But during that time I never gave up hope. I was advised by a specialist that the only cure was rest and I took his advice."

His first match back in the Cavan colours was against Donegal in the Dr. McKenna Cup and he retained his place for the subsequent league assignments against both Derry and Dublin in Croke Park.

Reflecting on the past 12 months he said: "My championship debut against Monaghan 12 months ago was a real baptism of fire and losing that day was a tremendous disappointment.

"But winning promotion and our two games in Croke Park has brought the team on considerably. Everywhere you go in this county the talk is all about football.

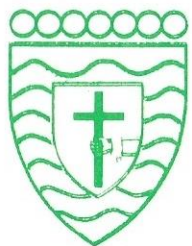
"There are times when you would be better off if you weren't on the team at all. I remember a year or two ago Cavan weren't expected to get to an Ulster final. We would have been doing well to get to a semi-final.

"But now our supporters are expecting us to win the Ulster championship and I suppose we should but it will be tough, especially against Donegal."

For Cavan playing in Breffni brings inevitable pressures and there's an air of expectancy which could yet have an unsettling effect on players.

But Damian O'Reilly is convinced that it's something he and his colleagues have learned to cope with. Their ability to do just that will have a crucial bearing on determining who marches on in pursuit of that elusive Ulster crown.

Gary Walsh : Goalkeeper. 24 years. 6'3", 14st. Has played for Donegal at all levels. Won Ulster Minor League 1982 and Ulster SFC medal 1983. Captained Sligo RTC to two Trench Cup successes. Has won U12, U16, U18, U21 and Senior Championship Medals with his Club Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon.

John Joe Doherty : Corner Back. 21 years. 5'9", 12st. Member of the 1987 successful All-Ireland winning U21 side. Ulster Minor Championship 1985 medal winner. He is noted in his native Glencolmcille as an excellent clubman. He captained his club Naomh Columba to win the Senior League in 1988, has won U14, U16, U18, U21 with his club.

John Connors : Full back. 22 years. 5'11", 12½ st. John came on the scene during Donegals U21 All Ireland winning campaign in 1987. First at corner back before making the full back position his own. He graduated to the senior team this year on a permanent basis after his debut in 1987-88 v Clare. Has won Intermediate Championship and Shield medals with his club Dungloe.

Brian Touhy : Corner back. 27 years. 5'11" 12st. Has had a distinguished career to date winning Championship

medals at U12, U13, U16, U18, U21, with Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon. Captained Donegal at U16 and U21 level and led the U21's to the Ulster and All Ireland U21 titles in 1982. Won Ulster SFC medal 1983. Captained his club Aodh Ruadh to senior championship success 1987.

Donal Reid : Half back. 27 years. 5'10" 12 st. Another member of the 1982 U21 team. won SFC Ulster medal 1983. Has won Senior and under age Championship hurling medals with Setanta and plays his football with Red Hugh's, Killygordan. Has played as a forward and defender for his county at hurling and football. Lined out for the rest of Ireland v Dublin in 1988.

Martin Gavigan: Centre half back. 26 years. 6'0". 14st. Has been in the team for the past 3 years and partners his big Ardara clubmate, Molloy at midfield. Has shown some tigerish performances this year in NFL Div. 1. Has won most honours with his club Ardara and the big schoolteacher would now like to do it with his county.

Martin Shovlin: Half back. 27 years. 5'10" 11st. Another member of the 1982 U21 panel. Has won Donegal player of the year award. His commitment is

rated at 100%. A very dedicated and hard working player. Plays his club football with Naomh Ultan, Dunkineely.

Anthony Molloy : Midfielder. 27 years. 6'2". 13st. A big favourite with the Donegal supporters. Has fought off injuries for today's game. Has won most under-age Championships with his club, Ardara. Won All Ireland U21 in 1982; Ulster SFC medal in 1983. A match winner on his day one of Ulsters top midfielders.

Michael Gallagher : Midfielder. 27 years. 6'2". 14st. Played U21 in 1983 for Donegal before emigrating to USA. Played for Donegal New York winning American Championship medals. Moved to London in 1987 and played with the Tir Conaill Gaels Club and has just recently returned to his native Glenties and has been outstanding for his club, Naomh Conaill.

Martin McHugh : Half forward. 28 years. 5'9". 11½ st. On so many past occasions been Donegals matchwinner. His freetaking is known to every Gael in the land. Has played, captained and managed his native club, Kilcar to most Donegal Club honours. Won All Ireland U21 1982. Ulster SFC 1983. Has also won an All-Star. Won numerous Railway Cup honours, has served his county well despite injuries and has been top marksman for Donegal on many occasions.

Charlie Mulgrew : Half forward. 28 years. 5'11". 13st. Has college and club honours with St. Eunans, Letterkenny.

Won All Ireland U21 in 1982. Ulster SFC in 1983. Is recognised as being at his most dangerous when running at defenders from the half forward line. A lively forward when on form.

Joyce McMullan : Half forward. 27 years. 5'9" 11½ st. Tremendously skillful and not afraid to take on defenders. Has just recently recovered from a serious injury. But looks back to his best in recent matches. Another 1982 U21 medal holder. Has Ulster SFC medal from 1983 and Senior Championship medal with his club, Donegal town.

Tommy Ryan : Corner forward. 22 years. 5'11". 12st. A very exciting forward who proved his worth in winning an U21 All Ireland in 1987. A popular scorer from the Termon club and can score from any angle.

Brian Murray : Full forward. 25 years. 6'3". 14st. Won Ulster and All-Ireland Colleges with De La Salle, Ballyshannon and U12, U14, U16, U18, U21 and Senior Championships with Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon. Captained Donegal at minor and U21 level. Has played for his county at all levels. Won an All Ireland medal with Garva in 1986. Has recently transferred to Civil Service in Dublin.

Marty Carlin : Forward. 27 years. 6'2". 12st. All Ireland U21 and McKenna Cup medal holder. A sharpshooter who is accurate from play or frees. Has won Senior Hurling Championship medals with Setanta and like half back Donal Reid, plays his football with Red Hughs, Killygordan.

HUDY BEAG — AN ALL-TIME GREAT!

Is beag an ghlóir a ghnóthaigh foirme Chontae Dhún na nGall i gcúrsaí peile sna daicheadaí. Bhí cuid fear Bhreifne in ard a réime, iad caithréimeach, dochlóite. Ach is dócha gurb iad spéartha na ndaicheadaí a chonaic an peileadóir ba chumasai dár rugadh riamh i nDún na nGall. Ba é sin Hiúdaí Beag Eoghain Éamoinn Ó Gallchóir as Gaoth Dobhair a d'imir dá pharóiste, dá chontae agus dá chúige i rith na ndaicheadaí. Bhain Gaoth Dobhair Craobh Peile Dhún na nGall ocht n-uaire idir 1935 agus 1948. Bhain Hiúdaí na hocht mboinn. Ach ba é Comórtas an Bhóthar Iarainn a thuill clú náisiúnta do Hiúdaí Beag. Bhain Cúige Uladh an Comórtas i 1942 agus 1943 agus bhí Hiúdaí ar an fhoireann an dá uair. Sáarthosach tapaidh cliste ab ea é. Fuair sé bás antráthach i 1974.

When Ulster made the historic breakthrough in 1942 and brought the Railway Cup to Ulster for the first, and again when they retained it in 1943, one of the stars of the team was the legendary Hudy Beag Gallagher of Donegal. Hudy won eight senior championship medals with his native Gweedore, but in an age when the fortunes of the Donegal county team were not as spectacular as in later years, the only outlet for a player of his quality at national level, was the Railway Cup competition. That Hudy commanded a regular place on the Ulster team of that era testifies to his ability; that he was a most effective member of a forward division that is recognised as having revolutionised Gaelic football explains why he is acclaimed as one of the all-time great forwards. Two of those legendary forwards, Alf Murray of Armagh and Kevin Armstrong, of Antrim, have been nominated as Bank of Ireland Hall of Fame winners in the past five years; there is every reason to believe that had Hudy Beag not died an untimely death in 1974, he would have been similarly honoured.

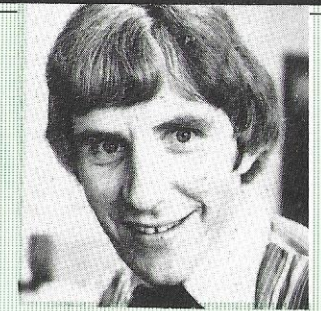

GROUNDS FOR SATISFACTION

Just over two decades have elapsed since the Sam Maguire Cup last found a resting place in Ulster.

But if football's ultimate accolade has been conspicuous by its absence, then the province can rightly claim at least one unofficial honour.

It's the not insignificant distinction of having what I would, with due deference to the other provinces, suggest are the best playing surfaces in the country.

Nor am I referring specifically to the bowling-green like arenas on which major championship matches such as today's are contested.

No, rather I am dwelling more on the scores of magnificently manicured grounds that now dot the Ulster countryside.

Go down any obscure laneway and the chances are that you will come across a recently-laid GAA pitch or, at worst, a well-maintained long-established playing arena.

The plethora of new grounds that now embellish the landscape have their origins in a single source — sacrifice.

Sacrifice, that is, in terms of time, labour and, perhaps most importantly, cash.

There is no greater proof of the commitment of the rank and file members of the GAA to their clubs and indeed to the Association as a whole than the sea of grounds that have sprung up particularly over the past decade.

It is now almost a case of what one club can do, its neighbour can do better. And if competition is the lifeblood of trade, then it surely is being seen to outstanding effect in terms of the provision of playing facilities just now.

I believe it is true to say that even Ulster county teams who have occasion to venture outside the province to fulfil National League commitments in both hurling and football return suitably comforted in the knowledge that their own club grounds are superior in many instances to what are regarded as county arenas in other areas.

The Ulster Council has played no small part in the rehabilitation of a host of grounds but the efforts at grassroots level, if you'll pardon the pun, are of crucial importance.

The plotting and installation of new pitches must be viewed as something more than merely providing a suitable field on which thirty contestants can pit their skills against each other.

No, the construction of these arenas provides a legacy for future generations to inherit — they cement the GAA in different areas and ensure, as far as is humanly possible, that the Association will continue to flourish even after the men of vision and enterprise who conceived the grounds have passed to their Eternal reward.

It is for this, if for no other reason, that Ulster folk can derive considerable satisfaction from the unbridled progress which has been made in the construction of new grounds.

Of course, there are still deficiencies — I am not suggesting for a moment that we have arrived in Utopia.

But if the achievements of the past decade are to be taken as a gauge, then I have no doubt that the Association will have even more "grounds" for satisfaction in the future.

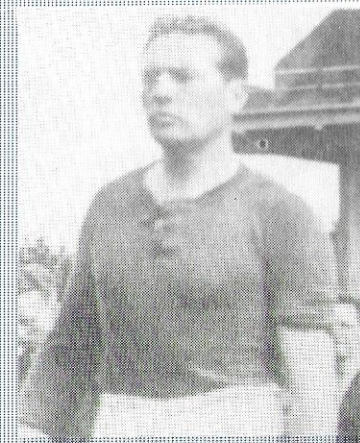

BIG TOM



Big Tom O'Reilly, or Tom of Cornafean, was a son of John O'Reilly of the Derries, near Killeshandra, who was in goals for Cavan in the early decades of the century.

Big Tom played in goals for Cornafean juniors when he was still a schoolboy at Corlis school. He was then thirteen years of age. He joined Cornafean seniors in 1932 and played for them until 1948, winning nine county championships, and captaining the team on seven occasions. He played minor and junior for the county in 1932 and the following year he partnered Hughie O'Reilly at centrefield in Cavan's first All-Ireland win in 1933. He played in five All-Ireland Finals, 1933, 1935, 1937 (draw and replay), 1943 (draw and replay) and 1945. He was on the panel in the Polo Grounds in 1947.

He captained Cavan from 1937 to '45. He holds two All-Ireland's and fourteen Ulster championships. He was on the first Ulster team to win the Railway Cup

in 1942. He was 6'2" and weighed fourteen stone.

Along with Jim Smith and his brother, John Joe, Big Tom remains one of the big three of Cavan's football glory.

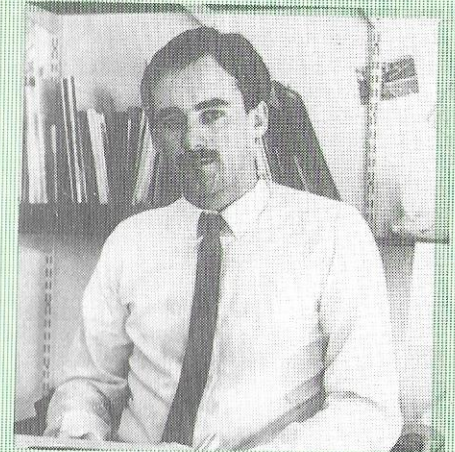

MINOR PREVIEW

Cavan and Donegal renew their championship rivalry today after a break of four years and like their senior counterparts the last time they played each other was in the provincial final. It's worth noting that several players from both teams have made their way to the senior ranks for the main match this afternoon which goes to prove there's nothing like a bit of continuity to build good teams.

The home side will no doubt be hoping this continuity applies to the short as well as the long term as it was exactly one month ago they recorded a narrow but deserved win over Donegal in the last game of the Ulster Minor League series. Their 1-8 to 1-7 victory at Pairc MhicDaibhid, Killybegs, should give them the psychological boost if such a thing is needed in front of a home crowd.

Team manager, Tony Brady, himself a member of the last Cavan minor team to win the Ulster title back in 1974, calls on the services of twelve of the players he used on that occasion in order to ensure success on this occasion also. It would have been thirteen but for an injury sustained by Paul Staunton recently. His side's League run saw a second victory against Derry, a draw with neighbours Monaghan and defeat at the hands of Fermanagh.

One could argue that Donegal have their work cut out for them at Breffni Park but that's not the way manager Sean Ward would see it. He has refused to concede defeat at any stage this year and has been positive throughout despite his side's poor league showings. They lost to Monaghan, Fermanagh and, of course, Cavan, while drawing with Derry. He has named thirteen of the side that lost to today's opponents which proves he does have faith in them.

By any standards this clash promises a feast of football and the Ulster championship, being the lottery that it is, well anything could happen.

A county which has not won the Ulster title for 15 years can hardly be lacking in ambition and with no fewer than four of the squad that reached but were beaten in last year's final in their ranks, this year again Cavan must feel they hold all the aces.

Donegal have nothing to lose. To everyone but themselves they are the underdogs but that's the way they like it. They've got a point to prove. It is said their poor league run has generated enough frustration to generate limitless ambition. The eighties have been good to underage football in the county, it's a tradition they're proud of and not one they will allow fade too easily.

Leadership, team effort and a dash of star quality will win the day and whoever emerges from this cauldron will know they have got what it takes to go all the way.
