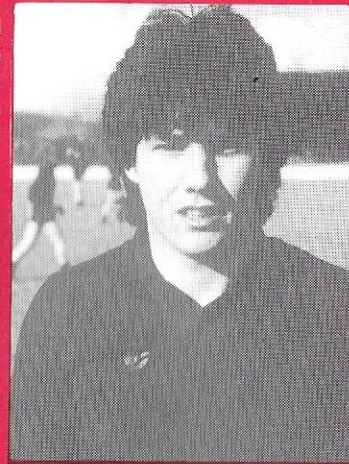
Won Ulster S.F.C. medal in 1981 when Down beat Armagh by 3-12 to 1-10. Ambrose lined out at centre-half-forward and scored four points. Down have not won the Ulster title since although they reached the final v. Tyrone in 1986 when Ambrose played at centre-half-forward. Rodgers also won a N.F.L. award in 1983 when Down defeated Armagh in the decider. The big Longstone man was at full-forward and scored 1-2 in Down's last national success.

He first played for his club in 1976 at the age of sixteen. Captained Longstone in the 1986 Down S.F.C. final v. Burren. A great servant of his club he has at various times managed underage teams, officiated as club referee and is on the club committee. Dogged by injury over the past two years, he is back again for the 1989 Ulster Championship hoping to add a second provincial medal to the one earned in 1981.

Brendan Mason: Aged 25. (Loughinisland G.A.C.). First played for his club's senior team eight years ago, he has one Down S.F.L. and numerous Feis medals to his credit. After Burren's Tommy McGovern, Mason has won a record number of Down All-Star awards for skilled, sporting and loyal service to his club. Has won U-21 and McKenna Cup medals with Down.

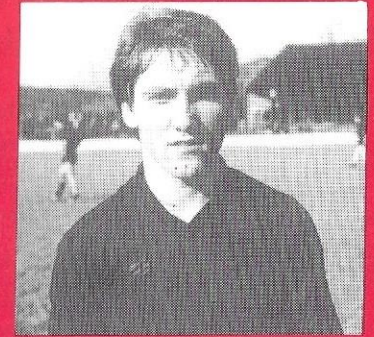
First played for Down in 1983 and scored 1-2 against the great Kerry team in Killorglin that year. Brendan also scored 1-2 against Kildare in the N.F.L. semi-final in that same year. Enjoyed an All-Star trip to America in 1988.

On his day, Brendan Hason can be a dazzling and devastating forward. Down supporters will be eager to see him at his best in this 1989 championship.



PROFILES

Michael Linden (Mayobridge)



When Mickey Linden collected the Ulster Brewery GAA writers merit award for the month of April we were inclined to think of the Mayobridge man as an overnight success. But nothing could be further from the truth. Mickey Linden has been working for nearly a decade to be that overnight success.

In the County Down village of Mayobridge where the sky blue supporters remember Mickey since he played for the U-12 team they recall with pride his performances in the club and county jersey.

In his early days, Mickey and the rest of the successful Mayobridge juvenile teams were coached by another of Mayobridge's famous sons, the most stylish of corner backs, Tom O'Hare.

The obvious natural talent blossomed under O'Hare's guidance in those early formative years and after sparkling performances at U-12, U-14 and U-16 level Mickey was one of the mainstays in the club team which won the county minor football championship in 1980.

Honours were now coming thick and fast and the young Linden was making a major contribution to club and county success. He was one of the youngsters in the team when Mayobridge won the county Junior football championship in 1981. In the same year they won promotion to the third division of the Down All County league and a year later they won the league to return to Senior football. His style, ability and sportsmanship in the club jersey were to be recognised in 1982 when he collected the first of his three Down GAA All-Star awards.

He made his county Senior debut in 1983 when he wore the Senior jersey nineteen times. In 1984 he was a member of the county U-12 team which won the Ulster championship. His team mates on that occasion included D. J. Kane, Ross Carr and Brendan Mason.

A physical fitness fanatic he has been a permanent fixture on the team since he made his debut. His performances in the Royal Liver National League and the Dr. McKenna Cup suggest that if Down are to make a championship breakthrough in 1989 Linden is likely to be one of the aces in Jackie McManus' pack.

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CHINKS OF BRILLIANCE

Television cameras have been at every Ulster championship match this season and they've captured some truly memorable moments.

A campaign which once again has seen its fair share of upsets with Cavan bowing out to Donegal the biggest yet.

And in all those matches special moments for players and spectators alike. In the opening round it was the re-appearance of the "one and only" Nudie Hughes which prompted Monaghan to hold on to their title that day.

With Fermanagh taking on Derry, Damien Cassidy, left on the bench and out of the original fifteen, emerged at Irvinestown to play a significant role for Derry . . . 5 superb points he scored that day.

Donegal, the side who are so unpredictable, produced three great goals at Breffni Park . . . the two from Joyce McMullan were worthy of winning any championship.

Tyrone against Armagh . . . what a day that was! I don't mean in the corridors but on the pitch. Kevin McCabe produced one of the greatest ever solo performances the Ulster scene has witnessed for a long time.

Several years ago it was Frank McGuigan who proved to be the scourge of the Orchard County . . . now he has an heir! But even in that match Armagh produced some great football. Shane Skelton will remember Omagh and that blistering goal which left Skelton gasping for air.

And then at Castleblayney, came Down, to try and get revenge for defeat in the previous year's semi-final. They got that and the most memorable effort that day for me came from Greg Blaney. That right-footed point in the second half from all of 50 yards would have inspired any team. Blaney is surely a class apart.

Then last Sunday the Costa Del Clones. With the temperatures in the 80's the players still managed to serve up some delightful football. McHugh's first goal would have to be a contender for goal of the year. For the beaten side that day Damien Barton was brilliant. A role model in how to play a match at full-forward.

So I think when we sit back and look at the championship and think of those instances then many would agree that just one on its own would justify the long trek to the games. Many will say its been a poor enough Ulster championship . . . that's probably right but there have been some real chinks of brilliance. And there will be more adventure before the Ango-Celt Cup finds its resting place this season!!!

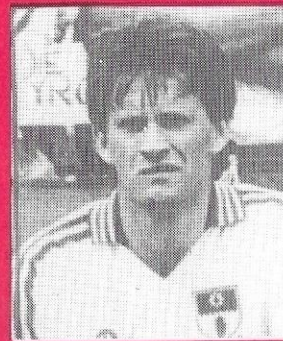
KEVIN McCABE: He's one man on whom Down will have to keep a close eye on today. He scored a superb 9 points against Armagh in the opening round and was rightfully proclaimed the Ulster G.A.A. Writers' Man of the Match. His presentation of Belleek now sits proudly on his mantelpiece. He's won everything in the game apart from an All-Ireland medal. An All-Star twice over, he's a keen boxing fan. He'll be hoping to deliver his own knock-out blow today. Barry McGuigan may be the King of Clones but McCabe is the King of Clonoe.



PLUNKETT DONAGHY: The Moy midfielder who has always been a classy performer. His father, Pat, was one of the great Tyrone players of the past. He has two Ulster Senior Championship medals and this year again will Captain the side. An All-Star, Donaghy will always stand out with his blonde locks. Don't expect him to score many goals... he's one of the play-makers.

Profiles

ENDA KILPATRICK: From the famous Hills of Pomeroy, Kilpatrick has developed into one of the strongest and most capable players in the Tyrone set-up. He was on the subs. bench when Tyrone beat Down in the Ulster Final in 1986. This season he started off against Armagh in attack but moved into defence in the second period and was one of Tyrone's outstanding performers. The way he's playing, Noel McGinn will have to produce something a little bit special if he's to reclaim his place at centre half-back.



PAUDGE QUINN: The striker from Ballygawley who will always be remembered for that magnificent second half goal in the All-Ireland Final against Kerry. A publican, don't expect his spirits to be low today, as he's on the bench. He's likely to come on at some stage. Always has an eye for a half chance and it was his late late point which eventually ended Armagh's challenge.

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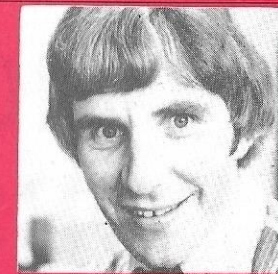
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A STERN EXAMINATION

Few teams enter the Ulster senior football championship each year under as much pressure as Down.

Successive Mourne outfits have found themselves competing not only against the opposition but again tradition as well.

After all, isn't Down the only county to have carried the coveted Sam Maguire Cup across the Border.

Those three triumphs in the sixties still mark a significant milestone in Down's history but since their last success in 1968 Down teams have embarked on the championship campaign with the challenge ringing in their ears — prove you are as good as the men of '68!

This year is no different. Hardly had the sweat dried on the faces of Jackie McManus's men following their win over Monaghan here at St. Mary's Park a fortnight ago, than people were comparing the present outfit to the team that carved their names with pride all of 21 years ago.

Just how good is the present Down side? And are they capable of following in the footsteps of that '68 team that swept all before them?

Part of the answer will be provided today. Only part, mind you, because even success against Tyrone will not exactly earn immortality for the men in red and black.

What it will do, though, is give a further pointer to the real pedigree of the current side and perhaps make comparison with those sixties heroes somewhat easier.

There is talent, skill and commitment within the Down side — of that there can be no doubt.

But winning Ulster titles and All-Ireland crowns calls for many additional qualities.

Character, temperament, confidence, poise, a hint of arrogance — these are just some of the prerequisites for success at the highest level.

Down have experience, vigour and dedication in their ranks but the side has yet to be fully tested.

They face a stern examination today and if they pass then the odds on their rekindling the glory, glory days of the '60s will shorten considerably.

They could hardly have a greater incentive to succeed, therefore, could they?

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AN BHFUIL FHIOS AGAT?

Down have never beaten Tyrone in the championship in the '80's. In 1982 they lost in the first round, in '84 they lost the semi-final at Casement Park and in '86 they lost the final at Clones.

Down's last championship win over Tyrone was 1966. They beat Tyrone 2-9 to 0-4 at O'Neill Park in Dungannon. They went on to win the Ulster title beating Donegal 1-7 to 0-8 in Belfast.

Tyrone have won 5 Ulster titles. Their last win was over Down in 1986. The score was 1-11 to 0-10. Down have won ten Ulster titles. Their last win was 1981. They beat Armagh 2-13 to 1-10.

In the win over Monaghan, every Down forward scored. Liam Heaney of Carryduff was the top scorer on 1-2.

In the '80's the highest number of scores in the Ulster Final has been fifteen. Down score 2-13 in '81 while Tyrone scored 15 points in the '84 final.

In the past two seasons Down have beaten the reigning champions. Last season they beat Derry at Ballinascreen and this year they beat Monaghan two weeks ago at Castleblayney.

In the opening championship match against Armagh, Tyrone had an All-Star full-forward line in Kevin McCabe, Damien O'Hagan and Eugene McKenna.

Tyrone and Down have only met twice in the Ulster Championship Final. Tyrone won both in 1973 and 1986.



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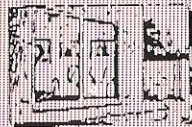
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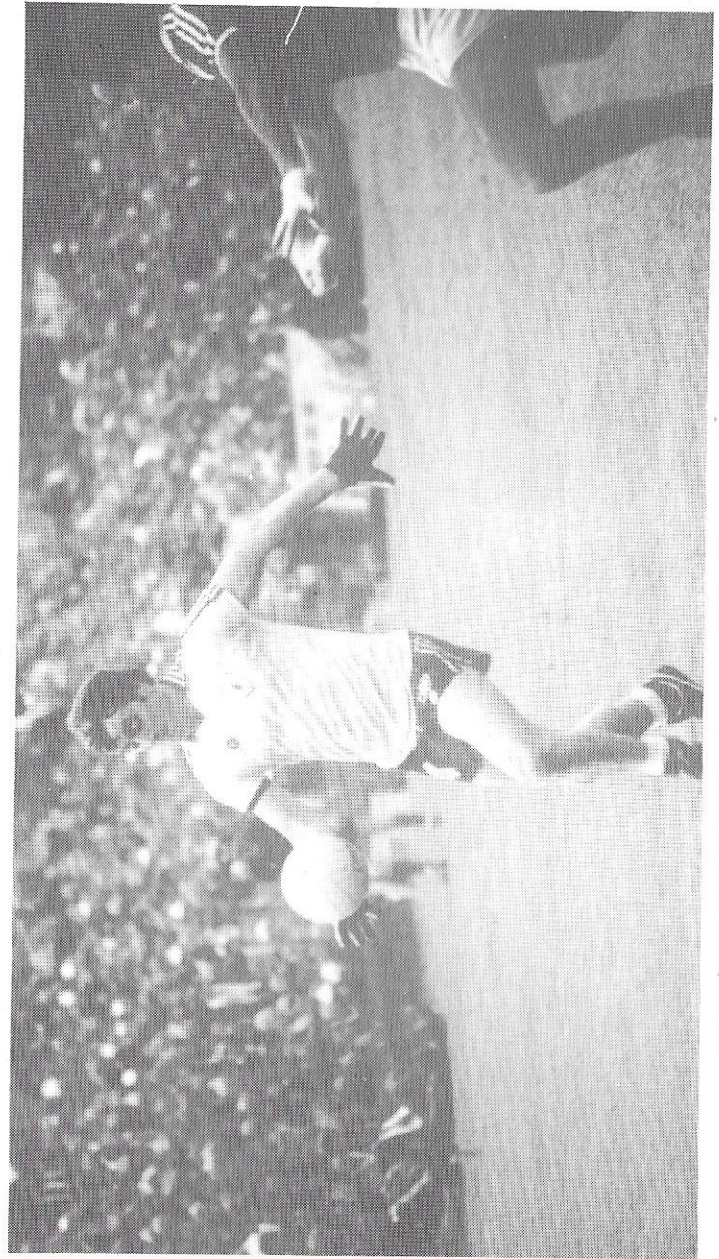


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A Tyrone All-time Great . . .

MINOR PROFILE

Whatever the outcome of today's intriguing second semi-final, one set of supporters will go home from St. Mary's Park harbouring high hopes of their minors bridging a yawning gap since their last Ulster title triumph.

Can Brother Ennis wave the magic wand for Armagh, who have been waiting since 1968 to hold aloft the Under-18 Championship trophy? Or will Tony Loughman be acclaimed the natural successor to Sean McCague by steering the Monaghan lads to their first championship in 44 years?

I suppose it's fair to say the Derry teenagers might subsequently put a spanner in the works of the winners but that's a bridge to be crossed on another day about three weeks from now. Today, though, dreams of glory will edge a little closer for one or other of these neighbouring rivals.

Armagh began the year with little expectation yet after a poor start they have really sprang into life following an authoritative win over a Tyrone team that was bristling with experience and potential. The title-holders were no match for a better-organised Orchard side.

Despite a marvellous Ulster League triumph, Monaghan were still rated outsiders in the championship by the so-called experts. Perhaps that was because their initial victory over Antrim at Casement Park pitched them in with a Down side that was expected to be hungry for revenge after their one point defeat in the league final.

In a match that lacked the quality of their earlier meeting but was every bit as exciting, Monaghan showed great spirit and character to weather the storm and again get the better of Peter McGrath's charges by the minimum margin.

Armagh will look to centre half-back Kieran McGeeney to provide the lynch-pin with Peadar Owens, hopefully recovered from hamstring problems, maybe supplying vital scores, while Monaghan could have match-winners in top scorer Stephen McGinnity out on the right corner and lanky midfielder Patrick Hesnan.

I'm normally not a favourites man but on this occasion I can't pass Monaghan, especially with the benefit of home support.
