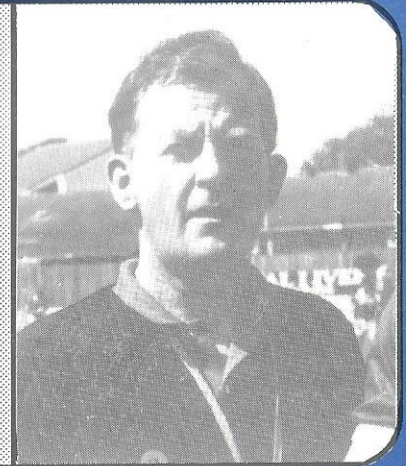

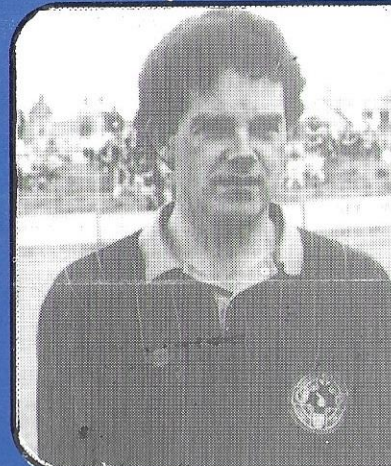

GARY WALSH: Goalkeeper. Club: Aodh Ruadh, 25 years, 6'3", 14 st. Has played for Donegal at all levels. Won Ulster Minor League, 1982; Ulster S.F.C. medal '83; Captain Sligo R.T.C. to two Trench Cup successes. Has won U-12, U-16, U-18, U-21 and Senior Championship medals with his club, Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon.



JOHN JOE DOHERTY: Club: N. Columba. Corner-back, 22 years, 5'9", 12 st. Member of the 1987 successful All-Ireland winning U-21 side. Won Ulster Minor Championship in 1985. Would like to complete the hat-trick.



SEAN BONNER: Full-back. Club: Na Rossa. Age, 28. 5'11", 12 st. Won All-Ireland U-21 in 1982. Tough tackling defender who has fought off a back injury to get back into inter-county football.



MATT GALLAGHER: Corner-back. Club: Naomh Brid. Age, 28.

5'11", 12½ st. Won All-Ireland U-21 in 1982. a close marking defender who has been in tremendous form in recent National League games in 1990.



DONAL REID: Half-back. 28 years, 5'10", 12 st. Club: Red Hugh's. Another member of the 1982 U-21 team. Won Ulster S.F.C. medal in 1983. Played for the Rest of Ireland v. Dublin in 1988 and was a replacement All-Star in 1990.



PAUL CARR: Centre half-back. Club: Et. Eunans. Age, 27. 6'1", 12½ st. Another U-21 All-Ireland medal winner in 1982, Paul has had an outstanding season in the National League and is settled in at centre of defence. A cool reader of the game.



MARTIN SHOVLIN: Half-back. Club: Naomh Ultan. Age, 28. 5'10", 11 st. Another member of the U-21 '82 panel. Has won Donegal Player of the Year award. His commitment never comes under doubt and is rated as a solid tackling defender.

ANTHONY MOLLOY: Midfielder. Club: Ardara. Age, 28. 6'2", 13 st. A big favourite with Donegal supporters. Has won numerous under-age with his club and Senior Championship. Won All-Ireland U-21 in 1982. Ulster Championship in 1983. One of Ulster's top midfielders.



MARTIN GAVIGAN: Midfielder. Club: Ardara. Age, 27. 6'0", 14½ st. Has been a regular for four seasons in the senior panel. Partners his clubmate, Molloy, at midfield. Has shown some tigerish performances in the green and gold since coming into the team. A solid performer. Has won most honours with his club, Ardara.



JAMES McHUGH: Half-forward. Club: Kilcar. Age, 25. 5'9", 12 st. Has been a very important part of the success of the Kilcar club's dominance of club affairs in Donegal over the past number of years. Brother of Martin, who misses today's game through injury. His first Ulster Championship match today.



BRIAN MURRAY: Half-forward. Club: Civil Service, Dublin. Age, 26. 6'3", 14 st. Won Ulster and All-Ireland Colleges with De La Salle, Ballyshannon and U-12, U-14,

U-16, U-18, U-21 and Senior Championship medals with Aodh Ruadh, Ballyshannon. Captained Donegal at Minor and U-21 level.



JOYCE McMULLAN: Age, 28. Half-forward. Club: Four Masters. 5'9", 11½ st. Skilful attacking forward who has won Ulster S.F.C. medal in 1983 and All-Ireland U-21 in 1982. Has won two Senior Championship medals with his club, Four Masters, Donegal Town. A potential match winner when on form.



DECLAN BONNER: Corner forward. Club: Na Rossa. Age, 25. 6'0", 13 st. Brother of full-back Sean. A player who enjoys enjoys his football when attacking. A potential matchwinner who has not shown his true capabilities to date.



CHARLIE MULGREW: Full-forward. Age, 29. Club: St. Eunan's. 5'11", 13½ st. Has College and Club honours with St. Eunan's, Letterkenny. Won 1982 U-21 All-Ireland and 1983 Ulster S.F.C. medal.



MANUS BOYLE: Corner forward. Club: Killybegs. Age, 24. 6'0", 12½ st. Has won all championships from U-12 to Senior with his club, Killybegs. U-21 All-Ireland in 1987 and an explosive forward when on top form. Has fought his way back from injury for today's game.

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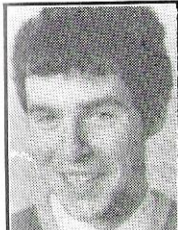


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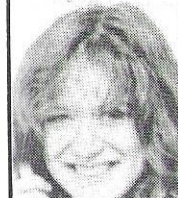


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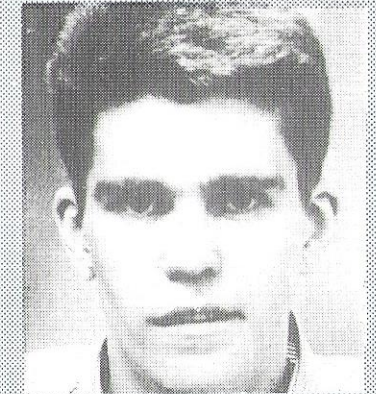

Donegal to Win

The change in fortunes experienced by Cavan in 15 short months has been remarkable. Going back to March '89 they were Dr. McKenna Cup holders, had secured promotion to Division One, almost beat Dublin in the National League semi-finals and were tipped to win the Ulster Championship.

But look at them now! Just two wins in those 15 months, relegation straight back to the second grade and morale at a low ebb going into the lion's den today.

How this run has affected their mental approach will determine Cavan's performance. If they fall behind early on and the little self-doubts come to the surface, then Cavan may crumble, yet if they can put the past behind them then the Breffni men could be very dangerous.

Fitness will not be a problem. I hear Gabriel Kelly has been training his men five days a week and they will, of course, be keyed up to avenge last year's defeat by the same opposition.

They'll also be boosted by the absence of Donegal's best-known player, Martin McHugh.

Indeed, Donegal's display will very much depend on how they cope without the wee man. He was a vital cog in the revered attack which took Cavan apart last year.

It was a physical contest then and I expect the same again but in the end it was this forward thrust that made the difference. Without McHugh, Donegal may have difficulty in recapturing such form, especially with Joyce McMullan apparently losing the confidence and flair which brought him two goals last year at Cavan.

However, Brian McEniff still has capable attackers such as Mulgrew, Boyle and Murray, while a vociferous home support will give Donegal a head start.

Talking of McEniff, here Donegal have a born winner . . . a former All-Star and player-manager when they won Ulster titles in 1972 and 1974 and manager when they won again in 1983.

Many see him as the man to take Donegal a step further than last season. His players will also be motivated by the opinion held by many that time is beginning to run for many of the 'senior' men and now it's time to make a real impact.

In conclusion, the absence of McHugh gives me great reservations but I'll still plump for Donegal to win the day . . . but then again I went for Antrim last week!

CAVAN PEN PICS



DAMIEN O'REILLY (Killinkere): A very solid goalkeeper who rarely lets the side down. Aside from his consistency, his permanent place on the team is a reflection of his ability. He follows in the footsteps of the great Cavan goalkeepers of the past like Willie Young, Val Gannon and Seamus Morris.



PAT FAULKNER (Kingscourt): His vast experience and his quick, no-nonsense tackling is his forte in the defence. He has enjoyed success with Kingscourt, helping them to a number of senior championship titles and is a dependable player.



DAMIAN O'REILLY (Mullahoran): Has played in various positions in the defence but has settled into the full-back berth with considerable skill. His adaptability in the side is another bonus for the selectors.



GERRY SHERIDAN (Mullahoran): Team Captain, he is the inspirational figure and no matter in

what position he is chosen he will give one hundred per cent effort.



JIM REILLY (Kingscourt): Is now the veteran of the side in terms of period on the team. He has not lost any of his skills and has won practically every honour in the game from club championship to Railway Cup medals. The one medal which has eluded him in an Ulster senior medal.



PHILIP SMITH (Crosserlough): Is a strong, forceful player, either in midfield or in defence. His spirit and never-say-die attitude are attributes which could be vital in this important encounter.



BARRY McARDLE (Kingscourt): A versatile player, who can adapt to either defence or attack. He has settled into a defensive role and his turn of speed has been a considerable asset.



STEPHEN KING (Killeshandra): Has been hampered by injury, but

as he proved against a number of top-class sides, he can rise to the big occasion. There is nothing to touch him at midfield on one of his in-form days.



JOE DILLON (Kingscourt): Has been a great servant to the game both for his club and county and is playing better than ever. Despite his lack of inches, he can field the ball with the best of players in the country.



DESSIE BRADY (Gowna): Has been out of the side for a lengthy spell through injury but has been recapturing some of the form which brought him to prominence at Minor and U-21 county levels.



RONAN CAROLAN (Cuchulainns): His value as a freetaker is a vital part of Cavan's hopes of getting over this hurdle. Ronan is also a valued asset at either midfield or in attack, where his distribution will be important.



SEAMUS DONOHOE (Lavey): Made a big impact in last year's National League campaign and is

again showing the kind of form which made him a scoring forward of high stature.



DEREK McDONNELL (Ramon Utd.): Is the one forward who can help Cavan into the next round. His fast, strong runs, plus his ability to get past defenders are his strong points. Either when playing with his club or county, he could on his day be a match-winner.



SEAMUS GANNON (Mullahoran): Has been slotted into an attacking role and can equally play effectively in defence. This dedicated player from a famed club can be relied upon to play with plenty of heart.



JOHN BRADY (Laragh Utd.): Just recovered from a shoulder injury, is another key forward whose experience will prove invaluable on the day. He has the determination and the skill and both these features of his play should be the ideal boost to his colleagues.

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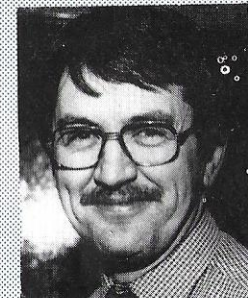
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Past Masters of Ulster Football

Cavan are in danger of becoming the Past Masters of Ulster football. Five Sam Maguires, the last in 1952, and an unprecedented domination of the Ulster championship for the best part of half a century set them apart. But history can often be cruel and the aforementioned glory has come back to haunt Cavan sides of the last two decades.

It's 21 years since they last lifted the 'Anglo Celt' trophy, a depressing and frustrating spell in the wilderness for a county with such unrivalled tradition.

Ironically their demise has coincided with the emergence of Donegal. For while Cavan, under a succession of different managers, have been licking their wounds,

Donegal captured their first Ulster senior title in 1972 by ousting Tyrone and two years later added a second at the expense of Down after a replay.

More importantly, in the context of today's game, they lifted their third provincial senior title in 1983 by overcoming Cavan.

Twelve months ago at Breffni Park, Donegal, shocked the footballing world by overcoming a fancied Cavan side on their way to an Ulster final appearance where they only lost to Tyrone after a replay.

Donegal, buoyed by an impressive league run, are determined to enhance their reputation still further and there's a growing sense of anticipation within the county.

Cavan supporters haven't had much to cheer about in recent times and relegation to division two after only one season in the premier division was a savage blow to players and supporters alike.

But the absence of Martin McHugh from the Donegal colours, coupled with Monaghan's win over Antrim last week, has offered a beleaguered Cavan fresh hope.

For a number of their side today could well prove to be their last hurrah. That, coupled with the desire to avenge last season's defeat in the corresponding match in Breffni Park, can provide us with a match to recall and savour in the weeks and months ahead.

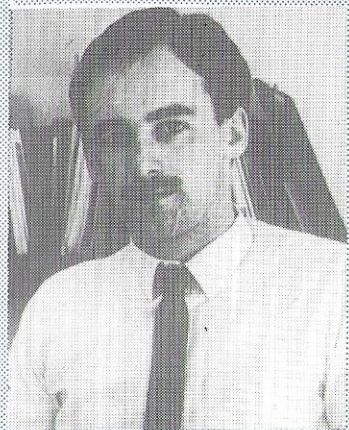

No Guarantee in Gaelic Football

Both Cavan and Donegal left last year's Ulster Minor Championship empty-handed as they discovered there is no such thing as guarantees in Gaelic football. Twelve long months have passed in between times so it will be interesting to see just how both camps approach today's game with what they've learned in the meantime.

Everyone was a bit down in the dumps last year when the Donegal team failed to cross the first hurdle at Breffni Park but after the initial disappointment team manager, Sean Ward, and his mentors picked themselves up and started all over again. Now, with home advantage and valuable experience gained through the Ulster Minor League, the McLarnon Cup and Ulster Herald Colleges' competitions, they should be ready for this occasion.

Cavan, for their part, have had a mixed year. The bright note was their success at County Vocational Schools' level in reaching the All-Ireland final some weeks back. Kerry proved too strong for them on that occasion, but the players gained a tremendous amount from the experience. Sadly, however, the Ulster League was a big disappointment with defeats at the hands of Fermanagh, Monaghan and Donegal! Their consolation prize was their victory over outgoing champions Derry.

Last Sunday showed the unpredictable nature of the championship as Ulster League finalists, Monaghan, were unceremoniously dumped by Antrim at Castleblayney. Donegal finished runners-up to Monaghan in their section of the league so they will be a little wary of depending on good performances in that competition to boost their confidence.

Like it or not, that well worn adage — it depends on what happens on the day — really comes into its own in the first round. Donegal should start slight favourites with their direct style of play and the confidence gained from having a settled side. They will also avail of the motivation factor in front of a home crowd at the newly re-developed MacCumhaill Park. They will want to prove themselves, particularly against Cavan.

Cavan manager, Tony Brady, is playing his cards close to his chest but there is a strong undercurrent of determination to succeed. He figures his main problem is the fact he has a team full of individual players, talented in their own right but perhaps struggling to find a togetherness to make them a competitive unit. There is little doubt, however, that once the ball is thrown in here today they will gel as a team. Playing away from home on a big occasion usually has that effect on a minor side.

Both sides are probably looking beyond this game and would not like to have their championship plans upset. Each have shown they possess the character, talent and know-how to advance but also feel it will take something special, something out of the ordinary to win this one. The competition for places on both sides have kept the players motivated but will it be enough to carry their team through.

Many feel it would be something of a fairytale if either side were to make it to this year's Ulster final, given the strengths of sides like Derry, Down and Tyrone, to name but a few, but didn't I say at the outset there is no such thing as guarantees in Gaelic football and maybe, just maybe, the fairytale for one side begins today.
