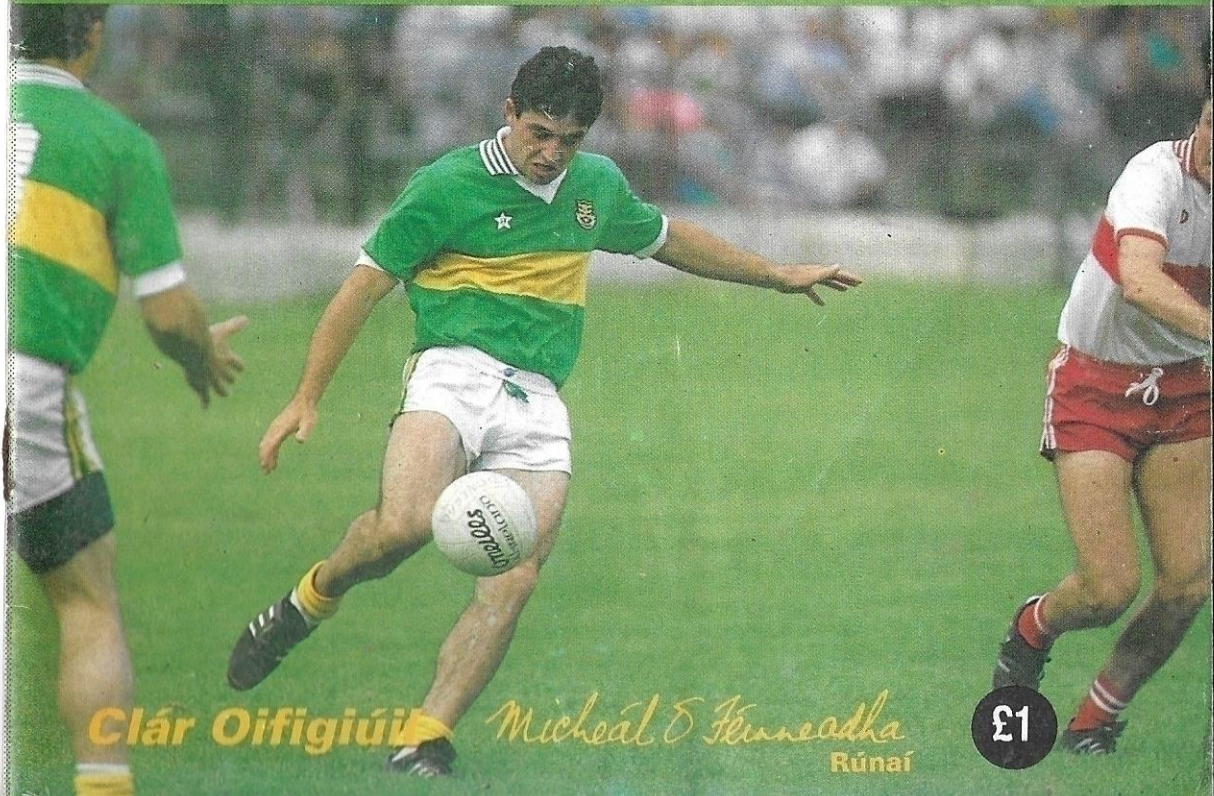

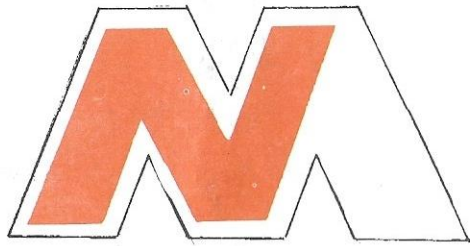

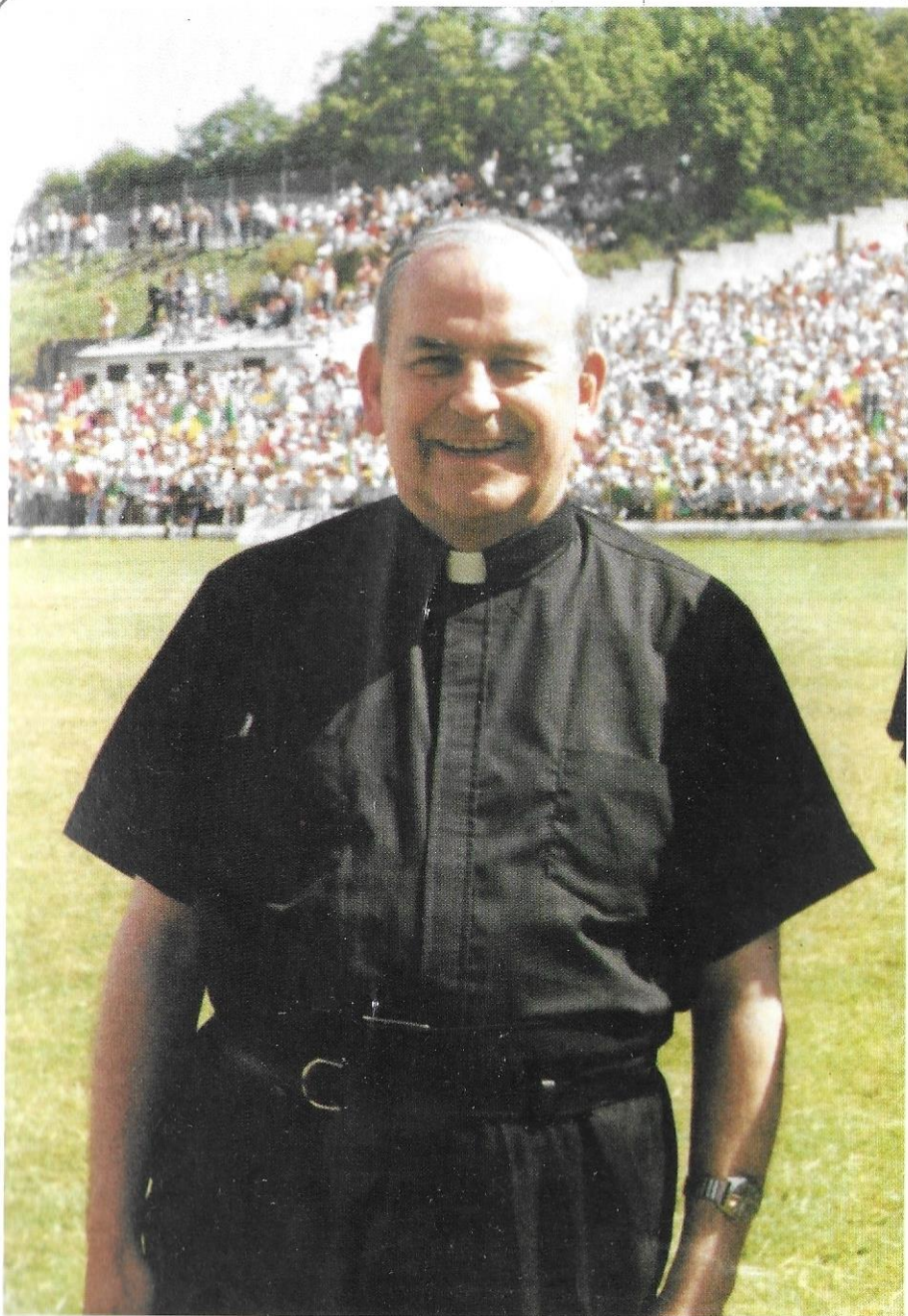

Tá Cara Linn as Lathair

On Tuesday, 8th May, the sad news that Cardinal Ó Fiaich was dead cast a shadow of gloom and a sense of helplessness on the people of this country.

A great, caring and charismatic figure left a terrible void that will not easily be filled. Most people in Ireland have their own personal memories of the Cardinal for most had come in contact with him on some occasion. For those of us involved with the GAA in Ulster, many of those memories revolve around Ulster Final Day. Long before our 1979 match programme proudly congratulated him on his elevation to the College of Cardinals, Father Tom had been an established figure on the Ulster G.A.A. scene. With his small group of Cullyhanna friends the annual pilgrimage to Clones became a ritual, and the meal in Riverdale on the way home gave the Maynooth-based Armagh man an opportunity to renew old friendships and to make new ones. For the Cardinal was never happier than among friends reminiscing on games and events past, telling yarns or joining in a boisterous chorus of the Boys from the Co. Armagh or the Ould Orange Flute. He had a word for everyone and everyone was treated with the courtesy and warmth of a close friend. Among his greatest traits was his ability to recognise people and call them by name even if he had met them but once in the distant past.

His honesty and fearlessness were often misrepresented by those who could not or would not accept his simple and forthright solutions to many of the great problems that face our country today. He believed passionately in a united and Gaelic Ireland, but he would never try to impose his beliefs on others. He worked tirelessly and selflessly for every cause he espoused, and they were many; and there is no doubt that if he had spared himself even a little he would be with us for many more Ulster Finals.

Whether in the presence of national or international dignitaries, of princes, secular or ecclesiastical, of presidents, diplomats or ministers of state, he would launch into a debate on the championship prospects of Crossmaglen Rangers or Armagh county team or, if their interest was terminated, the men from "among the bushes" became his favourites for he always retained a special feeling for his first pastoral appointment in the Moy.

On this day, when the team that he steadfastly and single mindedly supported for over half a century, proudly competes for the Ulster crown, it is the ultimate in tragic irony that the greatest Armagh man of all is missing.

History will record that at a most troubled period in this province and indeed in this country, he illuminated the gloom with a courage and integrity that are not yet appreciated. And when peace returns to this province as it inevitably will, Tomás Ó Fiaich will be accorded his rightful place as one of the great visionaries of this or any other generation.

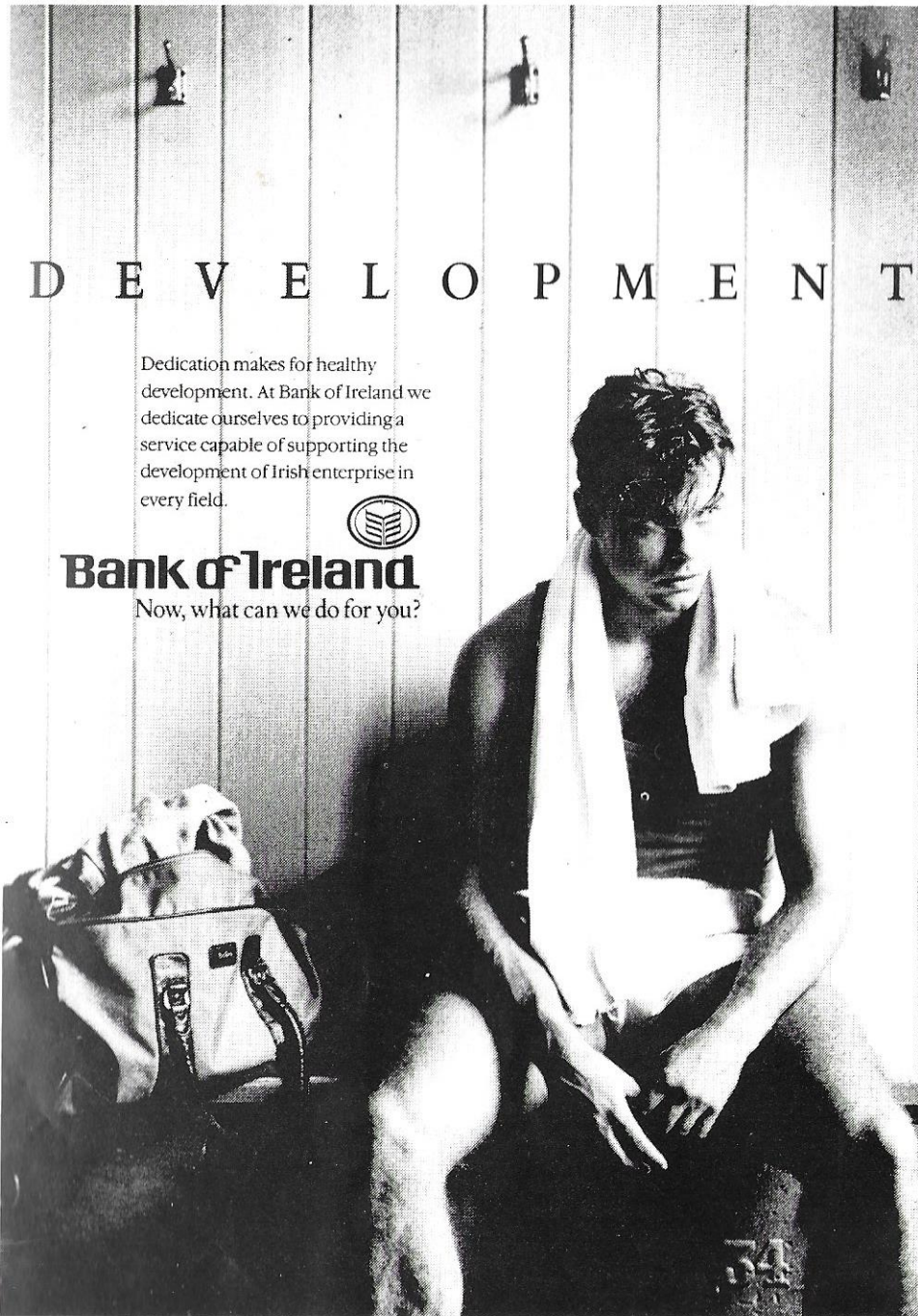

Respect for authority even when we don't always agree with the decisions of authority is essential to the survival of our association at every level. Our thanks, too, to our faithful stewards who have worked Sunday after Sunday in the interest of the efficient running of our games. They get more criticism than praise from the people they are trying to help. They can be taken for granted and forgotten in the after-match celebrations. I would ask our patrons to respect and co-operate with the stewards. They are doing a difficult job on a voluntary basis. They are essential to the success of the day.

Finally my warmest thanks and congratulations to BBC for their very fine coverage of our championship. This was an exciting new venture for us and our patrons here in Ulster and GAA followers wherever the programme is received are more than happy with their presentation of our games on Sunday nights. The BBC have made Ulster GAA the envy of the other provinces and have, as well, set a headline for other TV stations as to how Gaelic games should be properly presented.

I wish all our patrons a very pleasant afternoon and express the hope that this Ulster Final day will stay with you as a cherished memory.

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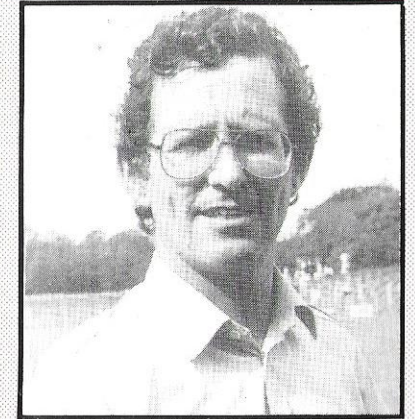
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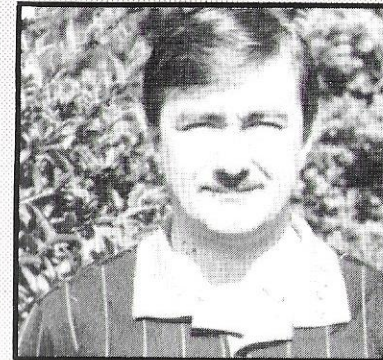
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SENIOR REFEREE Damien Campbell

Damien Campbell — Club: Tempo Maguires, played at wing half back and won three senior championship and three senior league medals during his club's golden era of the early 1970's. He represented his County at minor and under-21 level. He has been refereeing for the past 10 years and has been in charge of Fermanagh finals in all grades. At inter-county level, he has taken charge of two Ulster Club Championship finals, a Dr. McKenna Cup Final, a Railway Cup final and an All-Ireland Under-21 semi-final, ran the line in the All-Ireland Minor Final of 1984 and in the Senior Final in 1986. He won the award for the Ulster Championship referee in 1986. This is his second Ulster Senior Final, having refereed Armagh v. Tyrone in 1987. Married to Theresa Donnelly, he has five children, Kathryn, Declan, Eimear, Edel and Sorcha. He is a member of the G.A.A. Central Council, representing Fermanagh.



MINOR REFEREE Mick McGrath (Dún na nGall)

A member of the Aodh Ruadh Club, Ballyshannon. He lived in London from 1971 to 1987 where he was a player and eventual chairman of the well known Donegal exiles club, Tir Conaill Gaels. Took up refereeing in 1980 and refereed the London Senior Championship Finals of 1985 and 1986. Refereed the Donegal Intermediate Final and Senior League Final in 1989 and has been prominent in Donegal G.A.A. circles in the last few years where he has been County P.R.O. and Chairman of the Referees Board.

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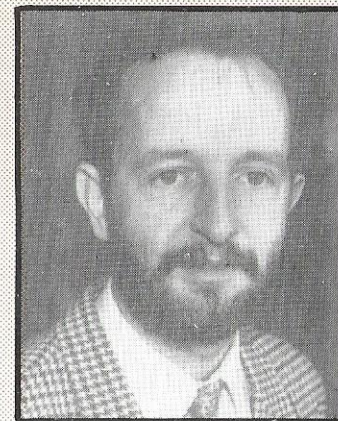
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Donegal . . . take two

They have had to wait a year, but today Donegal get the opportunity to erase from the memory a far from flawless Ulster final replay performance which saw Tyrone take Ulster football's equivalent of the Oscar — the Anglo Celt Cup.

In the recent history of the championship very few teams have been afforded the opportunity to try again. Having failed their first audition, Donegal will be anxious to ensure that 'take two' is perfect.

For many of the Donegal players time is running out. Often referred to as the 'babes' the description is no longer apt. They are a mature squad, most of whom have played at this level throughout the '80s.

They are very much a complete panel. This may be partly by accident rather than design. Because of an incredible series of injuries practically all members of the panel have played an active part in the championship run.

The fight for places has never been so keen. The result is self evident with so many sparkling displays from 'new' and established players alike. Add to that the experience gained by reaching two Ulster finals back-to-back and you have a formidable concoction.

Today, Donegal will remember the lessons learned from last year's drawn final and the replay and are expected not to repeat the mistakes that resulted in failure.

Donegal's league form has been well documented. Of particular significance was their performance against Armagh in Ballybofey. Armagh went into that game at odds with the experimental rules. Donegal, using them to perfection had a facile win. However, the modifications to the rules, the re-introduction of the standard free-kick in particular allows Armagh the room to exploit their perceived aerial superiority.

Also in the league we saw Donegal's tendency to fade in the final minutes. Against both Cork and Meath they were caught in the final minutes. It remains a cause for concern.

Already in the 1990 championship Donegal did allay those fears when they finished strongly against Cavan. In the final ten minutes of a to then poor game Donegal strung together fluid football, which, if reproduced today, will destroy Armagh.

In the semi-final Derry's expected challenge never materialised and Donegal had a comparatively easy victory with Martin McHugh making a welcome return and Brian Murray in superb form in the Tir Conaill midfield.

From the lessons learned in both victory and defeat it is long past time for Donegal's footballers to graduate from pupils to tutors. Today, however, is the final test and Armagh will pose some tough questions.

This time Donegal can't afford to fail.

A Game of Chance

Producing the aces that could turn today's head-to-head will occupy the thoughts of Armagh's footballers as, like the gambler waiting for his luck to change on the cards, a better final fortune is long overdue for the boys from the Orchards.

Fortune, it's said, favours the brave, and many a bold and calculated risk will have to be made if Armagh's losing streak is to be broken against an impulsive Donegal side, packed with punch, as well as pace.

For Armagh, a long losing sequence, stretching back to their dim and distant Ulster final victory of 1982, is the pattern of play they'll risk everything to break this afternoon.

During the past seven seasons the Orchard crew have contested two Ulster finals, the epic Frank McGuigan final of 1984, and against Derry in 1987, as well as two National League showpiece matches, both against northern opposition in Down and Monaghan, blowing the lot!

An intriguing game of chance, and one that may be shaped considerably by the tactical battle waged on the sidelines between the managerial minds of Moriarty and McEniff, a stroke of good fortune could be sufficient to give one or the other edge.

The unforeseen clash of heads incident last summer, the penalty that never was the "one that got away", the crossbar, and the stunning save, helped to deny Donegal, and perhaps some strange twists of fate will separate today's contest of wits and will.

That always seems to be the way, the scores and decisions that "turned the game". I wonder what talking points, what great bar debates, will puncture the colourful atmosphere of Clones this evening.

It's said that teams make their own luck, all the same, through their enterprise and effort. Enough pressure will encourage error. One serious misjudgement may be all that's required to fashion victory and defeat — that is if this pairing of starkly contrasting football styles runs as close as expected.

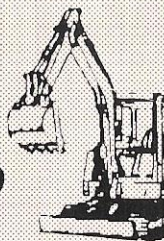
Will two opposites prove a magnetic attraction to quality of performance in quantity to sign off this year's championship in breath-taking style? I would like to think so.

The "classic" is what everyone hopes for. Donegal, their short and swift running game, and one flawed by a tendency to try and take too much out of their possession; Armagh their new direct approach, which, without Martin McQuillan, was shown to be worryingly short of creativity and clout in front of goal against Down.

Armagh's record against Donegal in the championship is exceptionally good, the one blot on their copybook during the 1980's being a loss to Donegal in 1983 — the year Brian McEniff steered a young side through to the All-Ireland semi-finals. They made amends the following year by stripping the champions of their title.

As Donegal plan to make it "third time lucky" after last year's marathon mishap, Armagh also aim for something similar after successive final losses. They'll be hoping for the winds of change to blow their championship craft back on course, as sporting seconds they don't want to be remembered as for the fifth major title power-play in a row.

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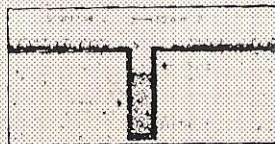
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A Word from the Captains

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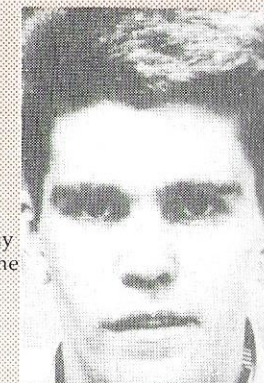
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“Blue Sweaters and Barry Norman”

Sunday nights took on a whole new meaning for me on May 13. That was the date when the first “Championship” programme was broadcast on BBC television.

Before then Sunday evenings meant a wind-down after producing Sunday Sportsround on Radio Ulster . . . put the feet up and watch a bit of telly. From May 13 onwards that all changed! By the time I had returned from studio 4 after Sunday Sportsround, Mark Robson was already beginning his script for the “Championship”, production assistants were busily typing it and video tape editors were well on the way towards compiling highlights of the afternoon’s action.

Before long the “on the site” team had returned to base from the championship venue and the call came from reception: “Sean McCague has arrived.”

In the midst of all this I attempt to gather a script, including news of club games featured on the radio show and, with more difficulty, games played that evening. Many others are obviously involved in the reporting of a match which has a 8 o’clock throw-in.

There can also be an anxious wait for pictures, for example, on the night of the Ulster Hurling Championship at Armagh between Derry and Down. They did arrive, at 10 o’clock, unedited and unseen by myself. It was my job then to select relevant points and talk over them for the programme which was little more than an hour away!

Soon it’s time to don the blue sweater and then it’s off to the studio where the cameras, the “Barry Norman” chairs and the blinding television lights are all in place. Then you’re on! Before you know it the senior game is on, followed by the analysis, and the minor game. Don’t ask me about the minors though . . . I was always next on and much too busy re-reading my script and worrying that I’ll make a mistake!

Within about three minutes it’s all over. . . “back to you Mark” and I can settle down and enjoy the rest of the show — the competition, special guests, etc. When the titles go up the adrenalin is still flowing so it’s back to the sports office to discuss the programme and even make suggestions for the following week.

Planning indeed is paramount. The ball is set rolling weeks in advance with on-site meetings to decide how best to capture the action . . . and in this area I think you’ll agree the camera work has been first-class.

It’s been a pleasure to have had even a minor role on the “Championship”. I see it as a significant development in the coverage of gaelic games. To be fair UTV upped the standard during last season as regards the overall package but never before have ALL the championship games been covered and produced in such a professional manner.

And that’s not blowing my own trumpet . . . it’s more a compliment to the efforts of several dozen others directly or indirectly involved in the broadcast. You seem to agree, judging by the response to the competitions. Averaging around 400 replies, from nine counties and beyond — for one football — we were stunned. But, it proves two things: one, that gaelic games have a massive following, and two, that their appeal reaches evenly to every corner of Ulster, unlike most other sports.

In short, it was high time gaelic games received the profile they deserve . . . long may it continue!

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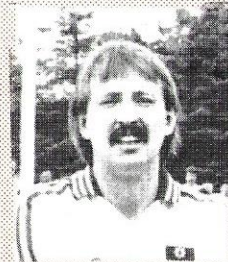

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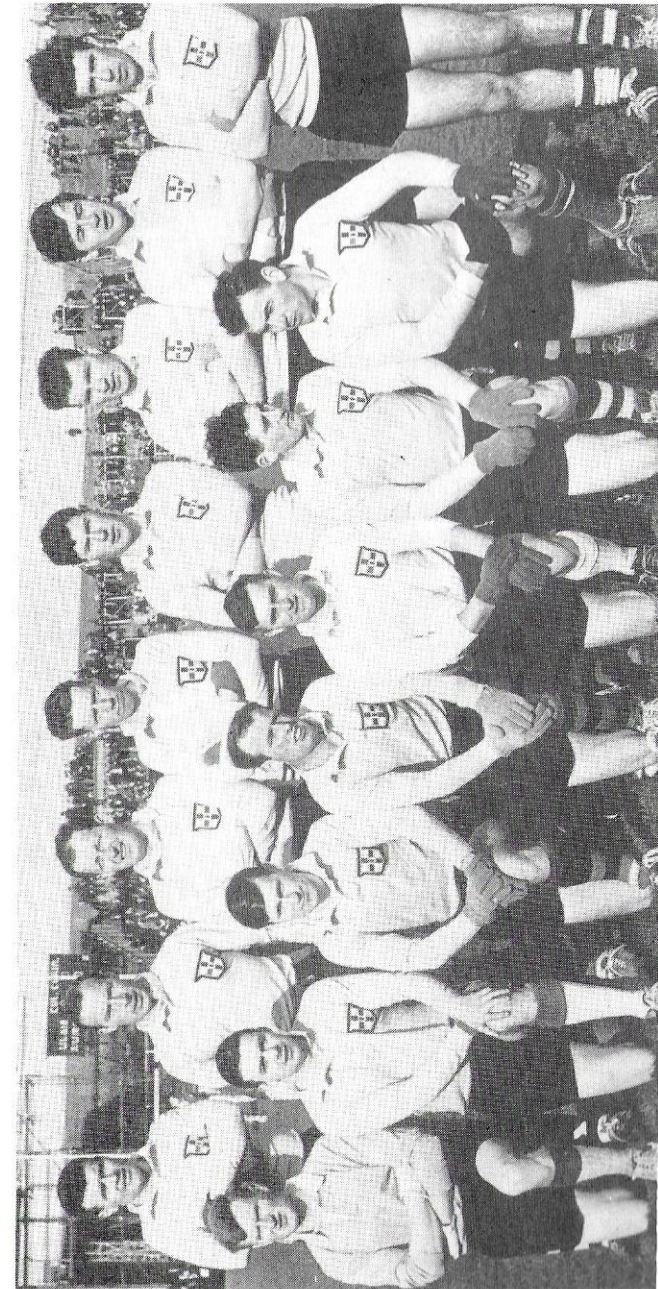
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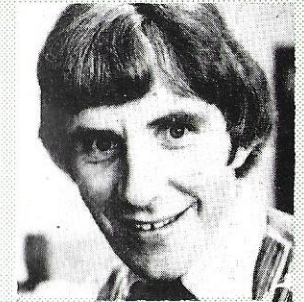
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MINOR FOCUS

Just over twelve months ago the Derry Minor football team captivated Croke Park when they triumphed in the All-Ireland Final. It was a success that spoke volumes for the dedication, skill, ambition and spirit of the side. And while the players basked in the euphoria, a modest, reticent man walked slowly away from the touchline satisfied that he had completed his task.

John Joe Kearney had proved himself a master of motivation, a technician supreme and, above all, a sportsman of the highest order. Far from extolling the virtues of his team from the rooftops, he had quietly went about the task of preparing his charges for the most important game of their lives, relying on them to do all the talking for both themselves and his on the park.

This is how it turned out with Derry emerging as the dominant force at Minor level. Their high skill factor and fluency earmarked them as a special side and even before the sweat had dried on the players the prediction was being made that they would be back in action on the All-Ireland stage again this year.

Well, they have certainly come down part of the road already and are naturally hopeful of taking a giant stride in the direction of Croke Park when they meet Down today. If they succeed then players and management can claim due credit but Down, too, have some of the qualities which have propelled Derry into the limelight.

And just as is the case with Derry their assets stem from the not inconsiderable influence of team manager, P. J. McGee. Indeed, being in charge of a Minor side could hardly be described as one of the most glamorous jobs in the championship arena. After all, television crews are unlikely to be beating down their doors or media personnel disturbing their peace at every hour.

But their role is vitally important not just in the context of the well-being of their own teams but in the wider context of ensuring the continued growth and development of Gaelic football. The lessons absorbed at Minor level invariably stay with players during their senior careers and the good habits acquired can ultimately help to embellish standards in the future.

And if P. J. McGee's side display the same resilience and spirit as they did in their two matches against Tyrone then we will have a real game on our hands.

Whoever wins, it seems certain that the image of the Minor championship will receive a shot in the arm.
