Donegal aim to make up for lost time when they open their Ulster Championship campaign this afternoon.

They are the last county into provincial action when they face an improving Fermanagh who last month accounted for Monaghan for the second successive season.

Last season though Fermanagh were unable to build on that success and the Monaghan victory was soon forgotten when they crashed heavily to Tyrone.

Ten years ago the Fermanagh faithful would have gladly settled for a championship win, but not anymore as the sense of expectation has grown with the passing years and especially with the emergence of Rory and Raymond Gallagher and Tom Brewster to complement the more senior players notably Paul Brewster and Paddy McGuinness.

That's the main challenge facing manager Pat King as he strives to conjure up another shock in a season already notorious for fallen championship favourites.

Ironically these same sides crossed swords eight years ago at the semi final stage. In the end Brian McEniff's men made it through, but only after trailing at half time.

Time has taken its toll on that particular Donegal side. Anthony Molloy, the man who that season would ultimately lift both the Anglo Celt and the Sam Maguire has long departed the scene.

But another hero from that never to be forgotten and historic season Tony Boyle continues to defy the passing years and medical opinion and he will again be a hugely influential figure this afternoon.

Donegal's injury problems all last week have been fairly well documented so it will come as a welcome respite for Manager Declan Bonner when the action beings.

After losing a championship opener to Armagh after a replay last season he will be keeping the fingers firmly crossed for something better this time.

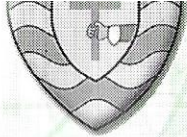

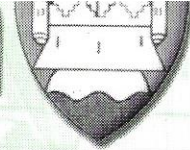

MacCumhail Park Ballybofey Ground Regulations

1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
2. Fireworks, smoke canister, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, air horns and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any person in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground.
3. The consumption of intoxicating liquor is permitted only in authorised places and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/arena.
4. The unauthorised climbing of stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
5. Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets, air horns and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
6. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
7. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
8. Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
9. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
10. The Ground Management reserve the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochána.
11. Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected from the ground.
12. The Ground Management reserve the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground/arena any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligation under Section 18 (3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to any one using the premises.
14. Patrons are not permitted to enter the field of play, before, during, or after the game.

Donegal's First Victory Over Fermanagh

1925: Donegal 3-6, Fermanagh 0-1

The first ever Ulster Championship clash of Donegal and Fermanagh counties was at Ballyshannon on Sunday 14th June 1925, when Donegal were decisive winners by 3-6, to 0-1. Scorers for the home side were :- Rooney (0-2), Whelan (1-0), Sharkey (0-1) and MacRory (0-1), in the first half, at the end of which they led by 2-4 to nil. In the second half, Warnock (1-1) and Carey (0-1) added their half time total.

Under referee G. McGovern (Cavan) the selected Donegal side was as follows:-
T Gallagher (Ardara), P Hannigan (Killygordon), B Whelan (Ballyshannon), C McDwyer, Captain, (Ardara), M McGroarty (Mountcharles), P Warnock (Ballyshannon), J Gallagher (Ballyshannon), P. Doyle (Ballyshannon), C Sharkey (Dungloe), T Williams (Ballyshannon), and J Carey (Lifford).

Subs:- F McRory (Kilcar), T McMullen (Ballyshannon), C Breslin (Ardara), C Kennedy (Ardara), M Carr (Kilcar) and J Dunleavy (Mountcharles).

Fermanagh's First Victory Over Donegal

1934: Fermanagh 2-5, Donegal 1-3

Fermanagh and Donegal did not meet in the Ulster Championship for another nine years (1934), but this time Fermanagh got revenge when they scored a hard-earned but well deserved victory over the Tirconnail men by 2-5 to 1-3. Fermanagh were very strong during the early thirties and had taken two Dr. McKenna Cup titles in 1930 and 1933, defeating Armagh and Monaghan, respectively, in the Finals.

In the 1934 Championship they met Donegal at Carrick (Co. Donegal) on Sunday 3rd June. The game was at 4.00pm; 3000 attended; and the admission was one shilling (5p to today's currency). Outstanding for Fermanagh were Gillen in goals, the McDonnell brothers, Eddie and Tom, J McTeggart, and the two-goal scorer J Monaghan. They led by 2-2 to nil at the interval and their scorers were J Monaghan (2-0), G McGee (0-3), J Bannon (0-1) and T Mc Donnell (0-1).

Fermanagh lined out as follows:- P Gillen, C McDonald, F McAuley, M Leonard, G Magee, J McTeggart, C McManus, Hugh Darcy, E McDonald, Thomas McDonnell, J Monaghan, J Bannon, Billy Maguire, Pat McGrane and Thomas McManus.

Donegal and Fermanagh in the Championship

Although they are the closest of neighbours and share a common border, Donegal and Fermanagh have met on less occasions in the Ulster Senior Football Championship than any other two northern counties. In fact, they have only met on eight occasions, and the dice is heavily loaded in Donegal's favour in the success ratings, as they have won in seven of those meetings against one victory for Fermanagh. Their last three meetings (1966, 1991 and 1992) have all been at the semi-final stage. The last clash was in the semi-final of 1992 when Donegal ran out rather easy winners on a final score line of Donegal 2-17, Fermanagh 0-7

HALF A CENTURY AGO IN DONEGAL (1950)

1950 certainly could not be described as a very successful year for Donegal. They travelled to Newcastle for the first round of the 1950 Ulster Championship and did very well to finish level with the home side on a score-line of Donegal 3-5, Down 2-8. They lost the replay at Letterkenny, however, going down by 4-3 to 1-7. In the Dr. McKenna Cup they had Tyrone at home (Letterkenny) in the opening round but bit the dust by 0-10 to 0-5.

Home ground was obviously proving of no advantage to them as there was a similar tale of woe for their Junior footballers, who exited in the first round to Derry, 4-4 to 1-2, at Ballybofey. The minors were also defeated in the first round, this time by Tyrone, 1-7 to 0-3, at Omagh.

The ill-luck that had dogged them all year finally came to an end towards the end of the year, however, when the senior side had a very successful run through the Dr. Lagan Cup (National Football League - Division One), winning out their section, and only losing by 3-3 to 1-5, to Monaghan, in the Final at Irvinestown in November.

HALF A CENTURY AGO IN FERMANAGH (1950)

Neither could 1950 be described as a very successful year for Donegal's opponents of today, Fermanagh. The Erne county was still absent from the Ulster Senior Football Championship, being re-graded to Junior ranks. They did, however, take part in the Dr. McKenna Cup competition, but this proved to be a rather chastening exercise as they were swamped, 7-10 to 1-6, by Antrim in the opening round at Irvinestown, then one of the most popular venues in Ulster.

In the Junior Championship hopes were high, but again they made their exit in the opening round, losing by 2-4 to 1-4 to Monaghan at Clones. There was a little ray of hope in the performance of the minors, however, as they scored a 1-1 to 0-3 victory over Tyrone in the opening round at Irvinestown, but fell to Armagh by 5-5 to 0-4 in the semi-final at Lurgan.

On the home front 1950 marked the presentation of the magnificent New York Gold Cup, a superb trophy donated by the Fermanaghmen's Association of New York, through the good offices of Joe Maguire.

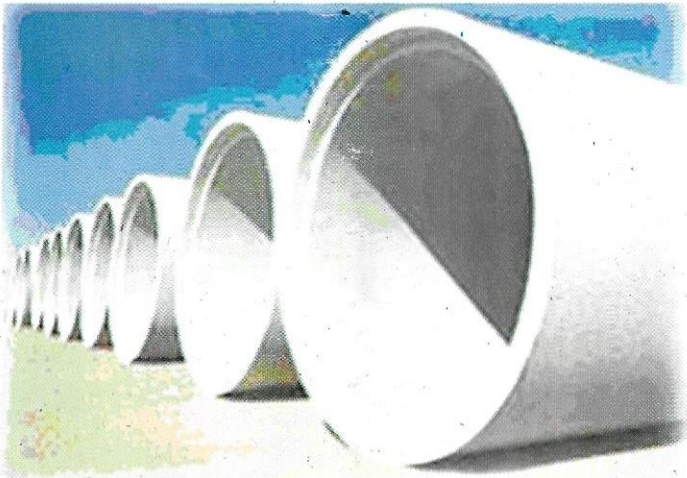

QUALITY IN ACTION

It's not often that Armagh, in any sector of GAA activity, are presented with an opportunity to land two trophies within a week.

Yet that's precisely the scenario that confronts the Orchard county representatives in today's Ulster Under-21 Hurling Championship Shield Final here at the splendidly appointed MacCumhaill Park.

Tyrone form the opposition to Armagh-just as they did in the big football showdown at Clones last week-and both counties are particularly keen to enhance their hurling pedigree. In this respect, Armagh have something of a head start.

John Lennon, Pat Toner, Jim McCormack, Vincent Magee and Damien McArdle all played a part behind the scenes in masterminding Armagh's rather unexpected success but only Jim McCormack is involved in today's confrontation with the Red Hand county.

He forms one half of the Armagh management team with Derrynoose clubman and current senior player Matty Lennon forming the other half and together this pair have helped to nurture a lot of talent within the orchard county.

Ger Enright and the McCormack brothers Paul and Barry-sons of Jim, incidentally-will all be involved today as Armagh chase that second trophy and bid to improve their status within hurling in general after a rather

depressing campaign in Division Three of the Church and General National League when injuries and unavailability thwarted their progress.

Last year Armagh collected the U-21 Shield when they beat Tyrone and naturally they will be hoping to repeat their success over their neighbours. But Tyrone have quite a few talented players in their ranks and although Armagh may start slight favourites they will find the going tough. Armagh scored a merited win over Antrim in their only outing in the competition to date, subduing the Saffrons

attack with some polished defending and picking off a series of scores up front with clinical efficiency.

Tyrone are renowned battlers especially when the chips are down and like Armagh they have been striving to gain hurling recognition. One man who will be delighted to see Armagh in action today is their County Hurling Board Vice-chair-

man. He missed last Saturday's triumph over Down because of business commitments two of his sons KP and Vinny were in action-but today he will give his full-throated backing to the men in orange as they bid to make it a rather memorable week for a county which has been starved of hurling success.

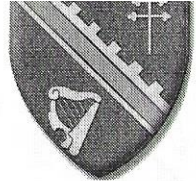

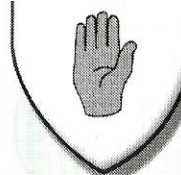

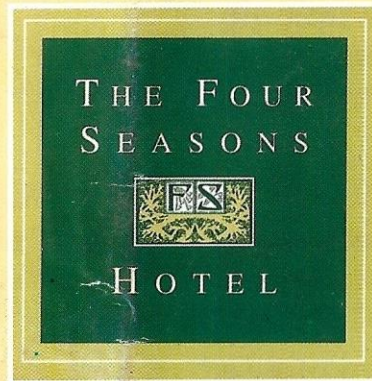
