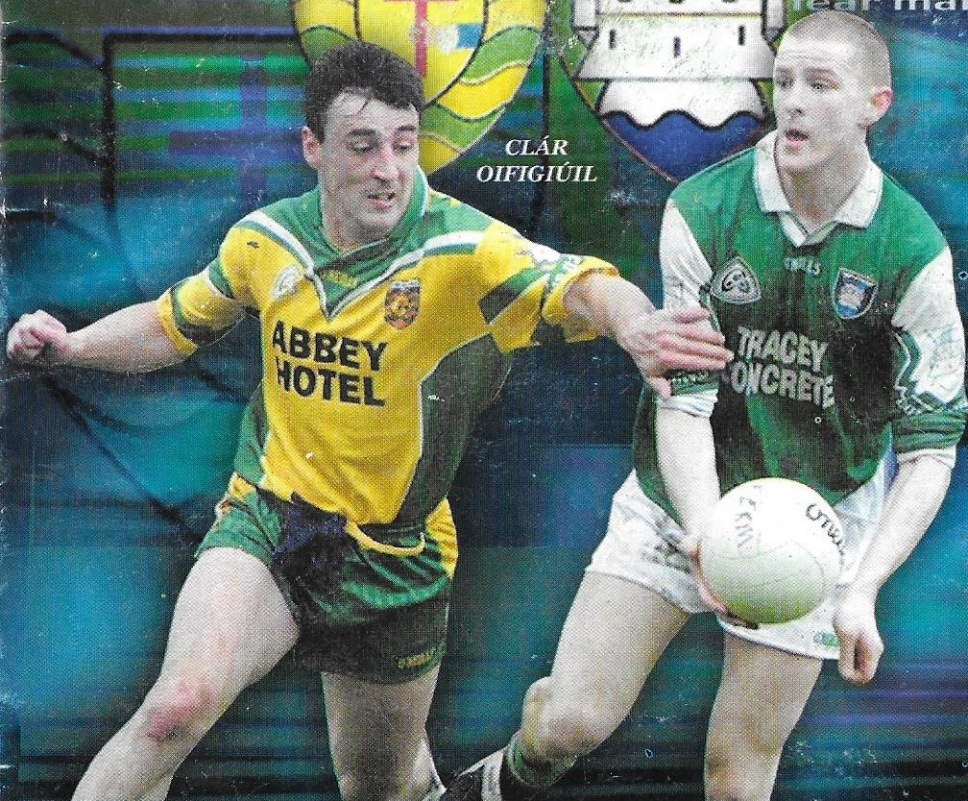

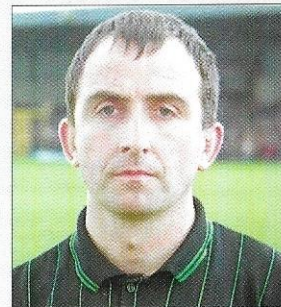

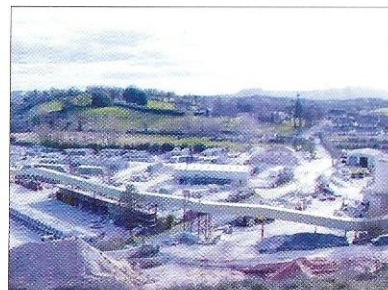

It's interesting to note that both teams contain players who have made an impact at Vocational Schools level. And in this respect Fermanagh might have a slight edge although manager O'Neill is quick to point out that Donegal invariably raise their game at minor level in the championship.

Indeed, both managers are united on one front - winning this year's Ulster title will not be easy. Derry's triumph last year in the decider against Tyrone was only gained by a one point margin and the feeling now is that whoever reaches the final will find it difficult to get their hand on the trophy.

Incidentally, Cavan offered one of the best individual performances at Minor level in the Casement championship last weekend. Michael Lyng's display at centre three quarters in the 0-11 to 1-7 win over Antrim embraced skill, pace, vision and finishing power. It was a five star show by the young Cavan Gaels clubman that ultimately spelt the difference between winning and losing. It was a case of so near yet so far when Fermanagh reached the final of the Ulster Minor football league competition. The Erne youngsters lost by just two points to an Armagh side who dominated the first half and then held on to win in a tense finish.

Yet the experience gained in the League could prove a major bonus to Fermanagh, according to their manager John O'Neill. And the fact that they beat today's opponents Donegal in the competition could be construed as a psychological boost of sorts but O'Neill, proprietor of the Ashberry Hotel here in Enniskillen, is not putting too much store by this.

Instead, he's convinced that his Donegal counterpart Enda Nolan will have gleaned sufficient information from their league meeting to offer a more formidable challenge today. Donegal may not have been in at the death in the Minor League but they showed plenty of spirit and drive nonetheless. Since his side lost to Fermanagh, Nolan has added a few players to his squad and feels this will give his side a more rounded look for a match that has the potential to be one of the best in the championship.

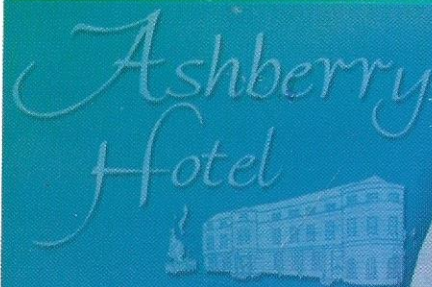

This year marks the centenary of the Ulster Council GAA. The GAA was founded in Thurles in 1884 and in 1886, a club was established in Ballyconnell Co Cavan, marking the birth of GAA in Ulster. The GAA flourished throughout the province over the next 2-3 years and then went into steep decline. Splits and rows marked a serious decline in the 1890's and then by 1900 the GAA was almost dead, not just in Ulster but throughout the country. In 1901 Jim Nowlan, Kilkenny and Luke O'Toole reorganised the GAA at National level and rescued it. They decided upon a provincial structure for administration and on 22 March 1903 the Ulster Council was born.

Prior to the inaugural provincial convention in 1903, the GAA was all but dead in Ulster. However the meeting on March 2nd, 1903 was to spark the reorganising of the association across the province. Cavan County Board was re-established a week after the Armagh meeting followed shortly after by Armagh and Down. By the dawn of 1904 the GAA was back on a solid footing throughout Ulster and the growth has continued ever since.

The first provincial convention mentioned above, was held in the Northern Hotel, Armagh city. This venue was to retain close links with the GAA and the Nationalist community for many years afterwards. Michael Collins, when MP for Armagh used to stay and hold meetings in the same venue. Five counties were represented at that inaugural meeting; Antrim, Armagh, Cavan, Tyrone and Derry. The meeting was held following a hurling match between Armagh and Antrim. T Redmond from Dublin refereed the game which was played at Pentonville Grounds. Antrim won the game on a scoreline of 6-6 to 2-2. Following the match the referee, Mr Redmond, took the chair at the provincial meeting in the Northern and delegates proceeded to appoint their first provincial officers. Luke O'Toole, Dublin secretary of central council attended and explained the purpose of the new provincial body.

Ulster's first provincial officers were then elected as follows: President Mr George Martin, Antrim; Vice President Mr M.V. Nolan, Tyrone; Secretary: Mr L.F. O'Kane, Derry; Treasurers Mr William Power, Antrim and Mr Paddy O'Reilly, Cavan. Mr Carlin from Derry was appointed onto the committee along with the officers. The meeting then proceeded to make arrangements for the Ulster football and hurling championships. The meeting agreed that the officer board would reform county boards in their own counties and inform all counties of the new structures now in place. All correspondence was in future to be directed to 6 Princes Street, Derry, home of the secretary Mr L.F. O'Kane. The meeting adjourned followed by refreshments.

The travel arrangements for that first meeting are interesting. The two Antrim delegates came to Armagh by train as did the Secretary O'Kane. O'Nolan came from Tyrone on a horse and brake while poor old Paddy O'Reilly rode his bicycle from Cavan town! This year on March 22nd, 2003, the Ulster Council held its centenary convention back in Armagh. A commemorative plaque was unveiled by President John O'Reilly at the Northern Bar.

FIRST AND LAST CHAMPIONSHIP CLASHES

Donegal and Fermanagh have met in the Ulster Championship race on ten occasions and the Donegal men are ahead with seven wins to Fermanagh's three.

Donegal's Winning Years: 1925, 1936, 1963, 1964, 1966, 1991, 1992.

Fermanagh's Successful Years: 1934, 2000, 2001.

FIRST MEETING - 1925: DONEGAL 3-6, FERMANAGH 0-1

Donegal and Fermanagh met for the first time in the Championship at Ballyshannon on Sunday, 14th June 1925. The home team ran out decisive winners on a final score-line of Donegal 3-6, Fermanagh 0-1. Donegal led at the half-way stage by 2-4 to 0-0 and their scores came from Warnock (1-1), Sharkey (1-1), Carey (1-0), Rooney (0-2), Whelan (0-1) and MacRory (0-1). The referee was G. McGowan (Cavan) and the teams lined out as follows:-

LAST MEETING - 2001: FERMANAGH 1-9, DONEGAL 0-11

The sides last met in the Championship in Enniskillen on Saturday 19th May 2001. They had ended all-square at Ballybofey the previous Sunday. In the replay, Donegal looked to have booked their place in the next round when they led by two points with time running out, but Fermanagh provided a shock goal by substitute M. O'Donnell with practically the last kick of the game and the Donegal men were left completely shell-shocked. It was this victory that really established Fermanagh as one of Ulster's top sides and they have never looked back since.

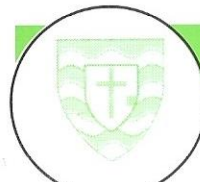

Brewster Park, Enniskillen Ground Regulations

1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
2. Fireworks, smoke canister, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, air horns and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any person in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground.
3. The consumption of intoxicating liquor is permitted only in authorised places and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/arena.
4. The unauthorised climbing of stands, seating or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
5. Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets, air horns and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
6. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
7. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play at any time.
8. Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
9. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
10. The Ground Management reserve the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched.
11. Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected from the ground.
12. The Ground Management reserve the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground/arena any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligation under Section 18 (3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to any one using the premises.

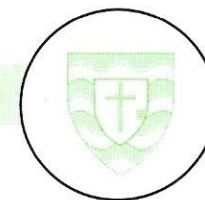

THEY MET AT BALLYBOFEY 40 YEARS AGO

1963: Donegal 2-12 Fermanagh 1-6

The advent of the twenty-first century proved lucky for Fermanagh in their clashes with Donegal, but in the latter part of the 20th century, Donegal were much in command. Forty years ago, on Sunday 16th June 1963, the counties met in the Championship at Ballybofey and the home side were much in command, winning by double scores, 2-12 to 1-6. Fermanagh got off to a great start in that game with a goal from PT Treacy in the opening minutes but Donegal soon settled and gradually asserted their authority. By half-time they were in front by 1-4 to 1-2 and were even more in command during a rather one-sided second half, scoring a further 1-8 to their tally as against four points for Fermanagh. Outstanding for Donegal were Frankie McFeeley and PJ Flood at midfield and Harry Laverty in the forwards, while Fermanagh were best served by Mick Brewster, Hugh Murphy and PT Treacy.

DONEGAL, HALF A CENTURY AGO – 1953

Donegal had just the one outing in the 1953 Ulster Senior Championship series when they met Tyrone at Ballybofey on Sunday 14th July. Under referee J. O'Reilly from Cavan, the game was played in a continuous drizzle, which left the underfoot conditions in a treacherous state and made ball handling extremely difficult. The home side were eventually beaten by double scores – Tyrone 0-12, Donegal 0-6. Tyrone had opened the scoring but HT Boyle equalised. Tyrone went ahead again but Boyle once more made it level pegging. Boyle and Brennan then put Donegal ahead to the delight of the home crowd and at half time it was: Donegal 0-5, Tyrone 0-3.

The second half was a lot different however, as Donegal seemed to leave their first half form behind them in the dressing room. On top at midfield, Tyrone had a succession of points and it was left to C. Breslin to score Donegal's solitary second half point, leaving them trailing 0-6 to 0-12 in arrears at the final whistle.

Despite this defeat, good performances were still turned in by P. Dawson, L. Nangle and J. Gallagher in defence, MJ Gallagher and J. Carroll at midfield, and HT Boyle, Frankie Brennan and C. Breslin in the attack. They were unfortunate in that they ran up against a rampant Frankie Donnelly whose accuracy from frees was uncanny and who scored no less than eight of Tyrone's twelve points. Not surprisingly, Donnelly also took the man-of-the-match award.

1953 was something of a dismal year for Fermanagh. The county did not take part in the Ulster Senior Football Championship but did participate in the Junior Championship, the Dr. McKenna Cup and the Dr. Lagan Cup (NFL - Div 1). Their first outing was against Down in the Junior Championship at Irvinestown on Sunday, 22nd March but they were defeated by 1-9 to 0-4. The only Fermanagh players who shined on the day were Jim Cassidy, Hugh Murray, J. Lee, Ignatius O'Neill, T. McDermott and J. McCormack. Against the breeze in the opening half they failed to score and Down led by 1-9 to nil at the break. There was a marked improvement in the second period, however, and Deveney (2), McCormack and O'Neill had their points.

The side selected for that game was: J. O'Neill, T. Diver, J. Durnien, E. Duffy, J. O'Hanlon, F. Maguire, J. Cassidy, J. McCormack, D. McCormack, M. Mahon, M. Regan, T. Deveney, T. McDermott, P. Fermanagh's best performance of 1953 was against Tyrone in the Lagan Cup (NFL - Div 1) at Irvinestown on Sunday 6th September. Tyrone were to meet Cavan in the delayed Dr. McKenna Cup Final the following week and fielded a strong team but they were surprised by a grim Fermanagh side that held them to a draw – Fermanagh 1-8, Tyrone 2-5. Fermanagh lined out as follows: B. Love, F. Maguire, W. Charlton, E. Duffy, J. McCormack, E. McQuillan, J. Cassidy, M. Regan, J. McCann, J. McCormack, T. Deveney, J. Maguire, T. McDermott, K. We all know and remember what happened to those other two well backed favourites, Armagh and Cavan.

Early Milestones in Ulster GAA

1903:

First provincial convention in Armagh held on 22 March at the Northern Hotel. Paddy O'Reilly Cavan rides his bike to the convention, a journey of 4 hours each way.

1904:

Monaghan County Board reorganised with Phil McGorish, Carrickmacross as chairman and John Tiernery NT as secretary. Antrim beat Donegal in the Ulster hurling Final, no reports anywhere indicate the score.

1905:

Cavan beat Monaghan in the Ulster Football semi final and Armagh defeated Tyrone. The Cavan v Armagh final was fixed for Abbey Park, Armagh on Easter Sunday, Great Northern Railways refused to put on trains for the game. The Cavan county chairman and editor of the Anglo-Celt was incensed and in his paper he attacked the GNR calling them 'The Great Northern Anti-Gaelic Railway Company of West Britain'. The final was eventually won by Cavan following a second replay.

1906:

The football final was played at Clones between Cavan and Monaghan. Cavan won 0-7 to 0-4 but Monaghan objected to Ulster Council won their appeal and confirmed champions that year. Also in 1906 the governing body of Irish soccer feared that Gaelic Games were becoming too strong in Fermanagh and they granted 50 pounds for the promotion of soccer in the Erne county.

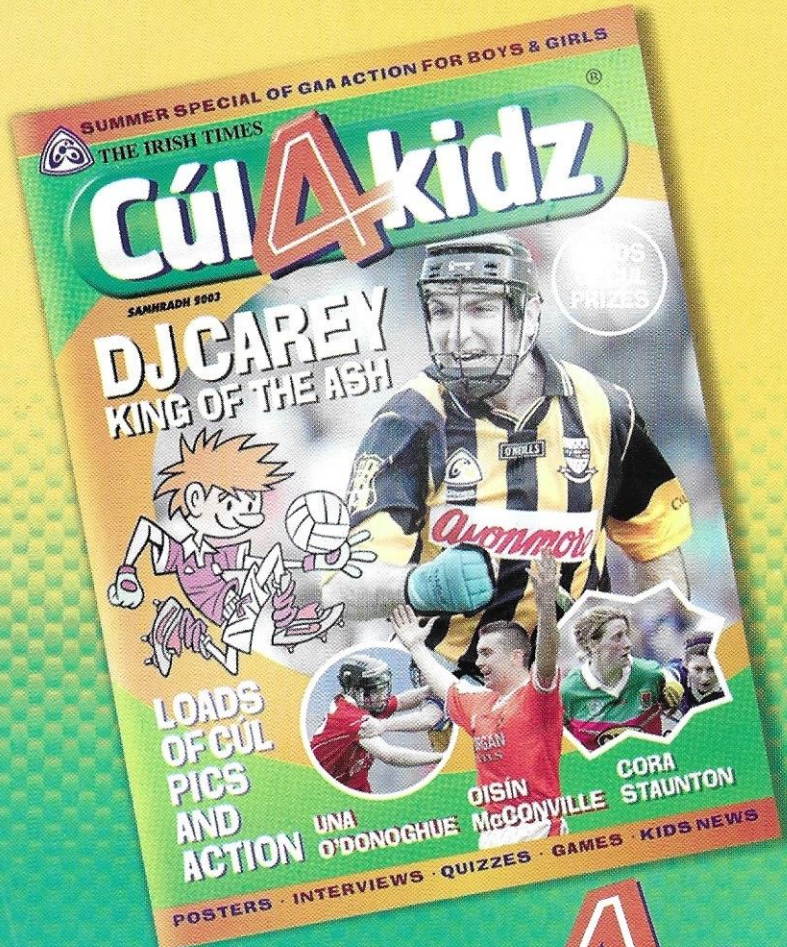
1907:

7,000 attended the Ulster football semi final held at Cootehill in Co Cavan. Monaghan beat Cavan on a score of 2-4 to 0-5. A stall seller at the game was arrested for selling intoxicating liquor hidden under a tray of fruit. At the subsequent court case, Inspector Rocks, RIC stated that when arrested the defendant stated that 'it was only a wee drip to keep away the smothering'. Monaghan went on to win the Ulster final at Clones and the Ulster Council collected 13 pounds at the gate. Burt, Donegal won the hurling final in 1907 beating the Antrim champions, Carey Faughs.

1908:

At the provincial convention held in Hibernian Hotel, Clones Patrick Whelan, Monaghan was elected president and George Martin, Antrim elected secretary. In his secretary's report Martin condemned the many appeals and objections stating 'we in Ulster have enough to do fighting the common enemy without fighting among ourselves'.

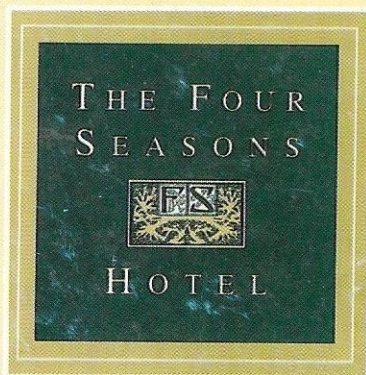
