


Eugene ended last year on a high note with two major finals. He refereed the Ulster-Connacht interprovincial decider at Enniskillen in November and in early December took charge of his first Leinster club final—the St. Brigid's (Dublin)-Round Towers (Kildare) summit at An Uaimh.

He has refereed finals at all levels in Longford and has been on the senior inter-county referees panel since 1994.

Murtagh is a member of the Sean Connolly club in Ballinalee and was on duty last year in the Allianz League. He also took charge of the Ulster senior quarter-final between Down and Monaghan at Casement Park.

He helped to usher in the new Allianz League season by refereeing the meeting of Armagh and Wexford at Crossmaglen in round one earlier this month.

Wind of change in club football scene

he AIB All-Ireland club senior football championship semi-finals bring a fresh wind of change to the competition. The four clubs engaged are all appearing at this stage for the first

The last time this occurred was in 1991, when Lavey, of Derry, Thomas Davis, of Dublin, Salthill, of Galway, and Dr. Crokes, of Killarney, all made their semi-final debuts.

Caltra and St. Brigid's won their respective county senior titles before Christmas for the first time. Loup are Derry champions after 67 years, while An Ghaeltacht won their second title in late October

An Ghaeltacht are striving to earn Kerry a direct interest in a final for the first time since Laune Rangers, Killorglin, beat Éire Óg, Carlow, in 1996.

Nemo Rangers, Cork, recorded the last semi-final win by a Munster club last February. They beat Errigal Ciarán, Tyrone, at Portlaoise and went on to win the final. Nemo, who were captained to last year's success by Colin Corkery, went out at an early stage in last year's Cork county senior championship.

St. Brigid's are hoping to record the first win by a Dublin club since the success of Na Fianna over Crossmolina, Mayo, at Longford in 2000.

Loup are in line for a second win by a Derry club in two years. Ballinderry beat Rathnew, of Wicklow, in 2002 and followed on by capturing the title. That was also the last year that the North had a direct interest in the All-Ireland decider. Ballinderry joined the title winning ranks for the first time.

A Caltra win would earn Galway a direct interest in the summit for the first time since Corofin ousted Dungiven, of Derry, in 1998. Corofin, captained by Ray Silke from centre half back, went on to win the title and so record the first final success by any Connacht club in the All-Ireland series, which was launched as far back as 1971.

Crossmolina, Mayo, won their semi-final last February against Dunshaughlin, of Meath, at Roscommon, but lost the summit to Nemo Rangers. Two years earlier they recorded he West's last final win.

The challengers were quickly into their stride with two early points that helped to boost morale. They built on that start and went on end that long, long absence from the Roll of Honour by finishing good winners by four points.

After a winning start in Ulster against Bryansford (Down), the Derry champions did well to beat the very experienced Crossmaglen Rangers, winners of three All-Ireland titles, next time out in a semi-final at Clones.

Loup also displayed plenty of character when seeing off the challenge of St. Gall's, Antrim, in the decider at Clones, by 0-11 to 1-5. They looked to be heading for a comfortable win when, spurred on by youthful full back Joseph O'Kane and midfielder and

But Loup were in no mood to allow another slice of history elude them.

They proved their character by starting the second half with renewed vigour and drive and after ten

minutes were on level terms. The exchanges continued to prove very keen after that but Loup finished the stronger to score three points without reply to deservedly take the title.

McBride played a real captain's part. He got his side off to a good start with their first two points and was an influential figure all through. The captain was well supported in the middle by John O'Kane.

Joseph O'Kane was a tower of strength at the back. John Young was also sound all through at right full back and near the end he brought off a great block that ended a great St. Gall's bid for a goal. Ronan Rocks and Shane McFlynn spearheaded the attack.

Loup have come a long way since their defeat in the 2003 county final. They are a side with football ability, self confidence and a real will-to-win to recommend them. They will certainly not fail in this game for lack of all out effort and class.

It had been 18 years since a Galway side had emerged victorious from the semi-final stage of the club football championship (St.Grellan's three-point win over Walsh Island in 1980) and with Corofin themselves having come a cropper at this hurdle in 1992 (Dr.Crokes) and 1996 (Laune Rangers), a lack of desire was certainly not going to be a problem for their meeting with Dungiven at Ballyshannon.

A crowd of 8,000 made their way to the Donegal venue for this clash and it was the Derry side with household names like Emmet McKeever, Brian McGilligan, Geoffrey McGonigle and Joe Brolly that were favoured to advance. But the foundations for the Westerners' success were laid at midfield where Aidan Donnellan and 39-year old Gerry Burke got the better of McGilligan and McCloskey.

However, the first two scores of the hour fell to Brolly, but they were quickly cancelled out and by the end of the opening quarter the Galway champions led by 0-5 to 0-2. Their prospects brightened further when Dungiven cornerback Seoirse McGonigle was ordered off at the 18th minute for an off-the-ball incident and, using the extra man wisely, Corofin built up a five-point interval lead (0-8 to 0-3).

Within 40 seconds of the restart Michael Donnellan extended Corofin's advantage and within a minute Derek Reilly almost snatched a goal. However, now backed by the wind, the Oak Leaf outfit narrowed the gap to three before Aidan and Michael Donnellan increased it to five by the end of the third quarter. The Northerners did have the better of the closing period, but never looked like overcoming the deficit.

Ballinderry were making their second appearance at the semi-final stage of the club championship when they took on Rathnew two years ago at Pearse Park, Longford, and were hoping to atone for their loss to Garrymore of Mayo two decades previously. Both sides had some mileage on the clock before this encounter with the Wicklow side making their eighth appearance of the campaign and the Oak Leafer's taking to the field for the fifth time.

The Ulster champions made the perfect start and were four points to the good after just five minutes. The first score arrived when Gerard Cassidy was fouled in the square and Conleth Gilligan expertly dispatched the penalty before following up with a point from play. With treacherous underfoot conditions that early advantage was a huge bonus to Ballinderry, and the rest of the opening half was an even affair with each side adding four points to leave it 1-5 to 0-4 at the break.

On the restart Rathnew set about trying to get back on terms but with Enda Muldoon edging the midfield exchanges and man-of-the-match Gilligan brilliantly leading the attack, their opportunities were few and far between. And even when they did make it deep into Ballinderry territory, they found Niall McCusker in dominating form as Ronan Coffey struggled to make an impact on the full-back. Leading by I-6 to 0-4 at the 40th minute, the leaders were more than happy to trade points for the last twenty, and were comfortable winners.

HISTORY ON THE DOUBLE IN THE WEST FOR CALTRA

an Caltra, who made history on the double in the West before Christmas, add another memorable chapter to their latest exciting success story? That's a key question as the Galway side step into the AIB All-Ireland club senior football championship semi-final action for the first time.

Caltra displayed plenty of ability and skill in an impressive march to a first Galway senior title, climaxed by a decisive fifteen points win over favourites Killererin in the final at Pearse Stadium, and maintained the momentum in fine style on the way to the Connacht grown.

The Galway champions had some anxious moments in their Connacht championship debut against St. Mary's, Carrick-on-Shannon at Cloone. Late in the game goalkeeper Kevin Kilroy bought off a tremendous save to play a big part in ensuring a 1-6 to 0-8 win.

They had a more convincing success over St. Kevin's, Castlerea, next time out and maintained the momentum by beating Curry, of Sligo, in a keenly contested Connacht final by a goal at Pearse Stadium.

The Galway men laid the foundations for that provincial success with a bright start. They dropped a

point behind two minutes into the first half, but bounced back so well that they led at the interval by 1-5 to 0-2.

BROTHERS

Their goal came just before half time and was fashioned by Noel and Michael Meehan, two of five brothers in the side. Noel put Michael through and he made the most of the opportunity by expertly drilling the ball to the net for a crucial score.

Curry came more into the picture in the second half as the Galway men squandered some good opportunities and their scoring rate dropped greatly on that of the opening half. Fifty one minutes into the game, the Sligo champions were just two points adrift.

However, Caltry did not panic. They continued to play with plenty of skill and all out effort and did not conceded a further score.


The Galway standard-bearers' only score of the half was recorded by Matthew Killilea after fifty-three minutes and, while they had some anxious moments in the concluding stages, they held out for a well-merited win.

Declan Meehan, winner of All-Ireland senior medals in 1998 and 2001, Enda Meehan and Brian Kilroy, efficiently marshaled the defence into a tight and unvielding unit.

John Galvin and Oliver Hennelly got through much valuable work in midfield, while teenager Michael Meehan starred up front and his goal was a priceless score.

Tomás Meehan, another link with Galway's Sam Maguire Cup winning sides of 1998 and 2001, team captain Noel Meehan, who led by example, and Matthew Killilea were others to the fore in attack.

Calra have shown that they are a well-drilled side, with potential match winners in all sectors and their winning run will have boosted confidence and teamwork.





HOW THEY REACHED THE SEMI-FINAL

Ithough Loup won their second Derry senior football title in October, they only made their Adebut in the Ulster senior championship in 2003. Their first county crown was won in 1936. Their three game programme on the way to the Ulster crown included a semi-final win over experienced Crossmaglen Rangers, Armagh.

Caltra made a noteworthy break-through in early October by beating a fancied Killererin to capture their first-ever Galway senior title. They had three games in the West.





...SEMI-FINAL RECORDS... **DERRY AND GALWAY**

hen it comes to experience at the semi-final stage of the club football championship there is little to choose between Derry and Galway as the Oak Leafs' representatives are making their 10th penultimate appearance this afternoon, with the Corribsiders edging matters as Caltra contest the Westerners' eleventh semi-final.

In terms of taking to the field, the sides are tied at ten appearances each as, when Father Griffin's qualified in the inaugural year in 1971, they conceded a walk over to Bryansford of Down. Twelve months later Bellaghy made a successful debut with a narrow win over Portlaoise, while Father Griffin's returned in '73 only to lose to Nemo Rangers.

In 1977 the champions of Derry and Galway clashed at the semi-final stage for the first time, but it was a bit of a mis-match as Ballerin hammered Killererin by 5-9 to 1-4. And things didn't improve for the Corribsiders two years later, although at least on this occasion they battled well before succumbing to Nemo Rangers by six points.

The eighties finally brought the Westerners their first semi-final success as St. Grellan's defeated Offaly's Walsh Island in 1980, and just two years later Derry suffered their first penultimate defeat as Ballinderry lost by the narrowest of margin's to Mayo's Garrymore. However, the rest of the decade

saw no more appearances by the representatives of Galway and Derry as Roscommon's Clan na nGael virtually monopolised the western crown and Burren (Down) did likewise up north.

In 1991 both counties returned to semi-final action and it was a winning return as Salthill overcame Dr.Crokes of Kerry and Lavey got the better of Dublin's Thomas Davis. But the Kingdom representatives gained revenge just twelve months later when they defeated Corofin and in 1993 Lavey were easily beaten by O'Donovan Rossa of Cork. In 1995 the champions of Galway and Derry met for the second time at the semi-final stage with Bellaghy getting the better of Tuam Stars.

Galway's luck hadn't improved a year on as Corofin lost to Laune Rangers, but the third, and most recent, meeting at the penultimate stage of the Galway and Derry champions in 1998 saw Corofin defeat Dungiven by 0-11 to 0-9. That was the last occasion on which the Galway champions have emerged from the West, but Derry's representatives have had two outings in the current decade with Bellaghy losing to Crossmolina in 2001 and Ballinderry defeating Rathnew the following year.

In all, Derry's representatives have appeared in nine semi-finals with a record reading five wins and four defeats. Galway's representatives have also "played" nine 'semi's with a record of three wins and six defeats.

The New Order

For the first time in 13 years and only the fifth time in the history of the club championship, all four of today's semi-finalists are making their debut at this stage of the competition. Needless to say when the first semi-finals of 1971 were played all four clubs – East Kerry, Gracefield (Offaly), Bryansford (Down) and Father Griffin's (Galway) - were new to the 'last four'. A year later U.C.C., Claremorris (Mayo), Bellaghy (Derry) and Portlaoise (Laois) qualified for semi-final action, but for the next five years at least one of the penultimate qualifiers had previous experience at this stage of the competition.

In 1978 Thomond College (Limerick), St.Mary's (Sligo), St.John's (Antrim) and Summerhill (Meath) all became provincial champions for the first time, but 13 years were to pass before four more debutants made the All-Ireland series. That was in 1991 when the four counties represented were Galway (Salthill), Kerry (Dr.Croke's), Derry (Lavey) and Dublin (Thomas Davis). It is interesting to note that today is the first time since that those four counties' champions have reached the penultimate stage, with all again being first-time semi-finalists.

At the opposite end of the scale there has been just three occasions when all four All-Ireland semi-finalists have had previous 'last four' experience and they were 1975, 1986 and most recently in 1988 when Burren (Down), Nemo Rangers (Cork), Clan na nGael (Roscommon) and Portlaoise won through.

COUNTY FINALS

-STEPPING STONES ON THE WAY TO ALL-IRELAND GLORY-

he county senior championships open the way, of course, to the AIB Provincial Club senior championships. It is interesting, then, to take a brief look back at the county finals of 2003 in Derry, Dublin, Galway and Kerry.

DOIRE

Loup bridged a long gap when they beat defending champions Ballinderry by 0-11 to 0-7 at Celtic Park. That was their first title in 67 years and only their second over-all.

The challengers opened brightly and led at the break by three points. Late in the second half midfielder and captain Johnny McBride put Loup four points clear and well on the way to revenge for their defeat in last year's final.

McBride, forwards Ronan Rocks and Paul McFlynn and defender Padraig O'Kane were to the fore in forging out the rare success.

ÁTH CLIATH

A good start proved half the battle for St. Brigid's, Blanchardstown, in the county senior final against favourites Kilmacud Crokes at Parnell Park. Brigid's led at the interval by 0-11 to 0-3.

Crokes came more into the game after the change of ends and after about ten minutes a goal left them just two points adrift. But Brigid's took that set-back firmly in their stride and pulled away again for a well

merited 0-17 to 1-8 win.

Fermanagh cousins Rory and Raymond Gallagher and Declan Lally in attack, midfielders Ken Darcy and Jason Ward and centre half back Peadar Andrews were influential figures in the success.

GAILLIMH

The Meehan family had plenty of cause for celebration when Caltra beat favourites Killererin by 3-11 to 0-5 at Pearse Stadium for a first county senior final win.

Noel captained the side in fine style from full forward. His brothers Michael and Tomás, also in the attack and defenders Declan and Enda, were all very influential in opening the door to history.

Michael also finished as the team's leading marksman with a splendid 1-8.

CIARRAÍ

An Ghaeltacht had to go to a replay before regaining the title after a two year interval. They also showed plenty of character in their second clash with Laune Rangers at Austin Stack Park.

They trailed by five points at the interval, but rallied strongly in the second half and came out on top in a close finish by 0-12 to 2-4.

Tomás Ó Sé had a capital game at centre half, midfielder Darragh Ó Sé and Dara Ó Cinnéide and Aodán MacGearailt were other highly influential figures for the winners.

• TOP SCORERS

McCONVILLE SETS AN IMPRESSIVE TARGET

Although Oisín McConville's direct interest in the race for the AIB All-Ireland club senior football title ended in November with an Ulster semi-final defeat by Loup (Derry), he still sets the pace in the chart of leading individual scorers starting the semi-finals.

McConville played an outstanding role in getting Crossmaglen Rangers, of Armagh, off to a winning start in Ulster at the expense of Killyclogher (Tyrone) by scoring 2-7 at Crossmaglen in early November.

He scored his first goal from a penalty and hit six points from frees. His tally was all but three points of his team's total.

McConville has a lead of two points over his closest rival in the nation-wide chart, Adrian Marren (Currey, Sligo). He was in sharpshooting form with 2-5 in his club's surprise Connacht semi-final win over Ballina Stephenites at Markievicz Park on the same day as McConville was chalking up the scores in Crossmaglen.

Marren scored both of his goals from play and three of his points from frees.

Holding down third place is the only footballer in the top four still in the running for an All-Ireland medal—Michael Meehan (Caltra, Galway).

He had his big day in a
Connacht semi-final win over

Roscommon, where he finished
with 1-7.

Meehan, who is only 19, scored four points from frees and two from "45's".

Like the two footballers above him in the chart, he was impressively on the target on the first Sunday in November.

The footballer with the highest points tally, as distinct from goals and points combined, is Tommy Gill, who struck it rich in this regard with nine for Rathnew, Wicklow, in their win over Clara, Offaly at Aughrim at the end of October.




