Not too many would have predicted the pairing for today's Bank of Ireland Leinster Senior Football Championship Semi-Final but there is no doubt that Westmeath and Wexford fully deserve to meet in the penultimate stage of our football championship. We are witnessing a seismic change in the Leinster Senior Football Championship this year and much of this is due to the attention underage structures and games development is receiving in the emerging counties. I extend a warm welcome to the players, team officials, County Board Officers, match officials and supporters from the participating counties to Croke Park this afternoon.

Following their impressive dismissal of Meath on Sunday last, Laois are now sitting patiently waiting to find out whom they will face in the final on the 18th July. The reigning champions may well be favourites to retain their title but they should certainly not disregard the real challenge, which both Westmeath and Wexford will pose.

Dismissing Dublin in the Quarter-Final and neighbours Offaly in the first round is likely to make Westmeath favourites in today's big game. Right from the start of the year when Paidí Ó Sé took charge of the midlanders the confidence in the side has blossomed and there is now a real belief that this team is on the verge of a major breakthrough. The experience of playing in the top grade of the National Football League has helped the players to cope with the competitiveness of the current championship.

Wexford on the other hand have been no less impressive. A good win over Louth in their first round game was followed by a comprehensive win over a fancied Kildare side in their Quarter-Final. The model county remain on course for a championship double with the hurlers already through to the Leinster Final. Like their opponents, Wexford too have benefited from playing in the top flight of the National Football League and it should not be too much of a surprise therefore that both of today's teams have enjoyed a successful championship campaign to date.

I am sure the supporters from both counties will recall the last time the sides met in the championship. The occasion was a qualifier replay in Mullingar following a breath-taking

draw in the newly developed Wexford Park. The first meeting in Wexford was particularly memorable with a late point in extra time drawing the game. A repeat performance from both sides today will leave patrons on the edge of their seats for the entire duration of the game.

In your match programme for this afternoon's game details are given of the Summer Camps, which will be held in both Wexford and Westmeath and also in Dublin in the coming weeks. In excess of 25,000 young boys and girls will attend this year's Comhairle Laighean Summer Camps. There is still time for boys and girls to register but you should enrol on a local camp as soon as possible. Inter-county players in all counties are assisting Comhairle Laighean with the promotion of our Summer Camps in the local media.

The first game on today's programme is the Leinster Junior Football Championship Semi-Final between Wexford and Dublin. It is a big occasion for these players to play in Croke Park and I hope they enjoy their visit. The last two winners of the Junior Football All-Ireland Championship (Wicklow and Meath) have come from Leinster, so the standard in this grade in the Province remains high and a competitive game is again expected this afternoon.

Cumann Luthchleas Gael recently launched a scheme in association with Gaelic Telecom, which will generate significant funding for participating G.A.A. clubs. Full details were recently sent to all County Boards, so clubs should contact their County Secretary for the necessary application forms. Apart from offering a very competitive price for all types of fixed line calls and a reduction in line rental charges, the real benefit for all clubs is a 15% rebate on the revenue generated by the club's own participants.

Finally, every good wish to all the participants in today's games as we look forward to more exciting championship action.





High-profile players keeping a low profile

Please forgive me for burdening you today with the woes of a GAA Correspondent. There is a perception out there that we have the best job in

the world. We have the plushest seats in the stadium, we're paid to watch something we love and we don't get the sack when we get our predictions wrong!

But all is not as it appears. Perhaps you haven't noticed, but over the past decade there has been a gradual decline in the number of interviews with players which appear in the national press in the runup to big games. Sure, there is a lot more publicity about the game itself - profiles, features etc. But less and less players are willing to put their head above the parapet on the morning they don their county colours in the provincial or All-Ireland championship. Believe me, this is not due to lack of effort on the part of my colleagues in the Fourth Estate. The opposite is the case, indeed. We seem to spend most of our working lives chasing players who, it appears, would rather spend a few days in a salt mine than talk to us for five minutes.

Twenty years ago a media ban was news; now it's the norm. I don't blame the players. They're under more pressure to deliver on the field than ever before. I suspect, however, that it is the all powerful team managers who are primarily responsible for driving a wedge between the players and the media at championship time. They lay down the law. As one ex-manager reputedly told a high profile player a few years ago; "Plug out your phone next week."

Thankfully, not all GAA bosses view the Fourth Estate with such disdain. In his excellent 'Kicking Down Heavens Door Diary of a Football Manager', Tyrone boss Mickey Harte recalled the team's press night prior to last year's All-Ireland final; "I love seeing the players being comfortable with the media. They have to think when they're talking to the press. I like the thinking player. If our players can think on their feet with the press, they can think on their feet in a game ... "Armagh boss Joe Kernan has similar views, as do two of the most successful bosses in the history of Gaelic football, Mick O'Dwyer and Sean Boylan. Presumably, most managers trust their players to perform before 80,000 spectators yet they don't trust them to spend twenty minutes in the company of a reporter a few days before the game. Strange.

It's not as if we expect the player to divulge the team's secret game plan. All we're looking for is a few anecdotes; a bit of background on their career and a few thoughts on the game. Not exactly Jeremy Paxman territory!

There was a time when hurlers behaved differently than their football brothers. They were more relaxed, more open and more accessible. Now it's the exact opposite. This summer, for instance, it has been nigh-on impossible to interview hurlers from Waterford, Cork, Kilkenny, Wexford and Limerick, with the exception of their team captain, T.J. Ryan.

Ironically, all this shyness comes at a time when GAA players are finally reaping some financial reward for their endeavours on the field through sponsorship and personal endorsement in the commercial world. Nobody begrudges them the few bob they earn from these sources. However, players cannot have it both ways. They can't expect to have their commercial activities highlighted in the media if they're not prepared to talk to us. We had the ludicrous situation at a recent press conference to



publicise a new commercial deal for players, where one of the high profile players present sprinted out the door faster than Marion Jones as soon as the formal announcement was over while another had to be virtually cornered before he reluctantly agreed to share a few words with us. Of course, we're not blameless ourselves. At press nights, for example, we tend to swarm around players and rust tape recorders into their faces. Even Bertie Ahern might be slightly intimidated by this. So imagine how a 20 year-old feels when he's suddenly confronted by a dozen reporters. As a lobby group, we're hopelessly ineffective. We tend to moan among ourselves but rarely, if ever, confront the real culprits, the team managers.

GAA Director-General Liam Mulvihill has raised the issue in several of his annual reports to Congress but nothing has changed. I'm surprised that the two major sponsors of the All-Ireland championships, Bank of Ireland and Guinness, as well as the individual county team sponsors, have not been more proactive on this issue. They're losing out as well and, one wonders, will it be long before companies insist on putting a clause in their contracts with County Boards insisting that players make themselves available for interviews before big matches? A few days before their 1993 All-Ireland semi-final showdown against Dublin, half a dozen members of the Derry football team actually travelled to Dublin to meet us in the Gresham Hotel for a few hours and answer all our questions. The trip was organised by the team's sponsor. I can't imagine that ever happening again.

However, every county should be obliged to hold a press night prior to their championship matches. Nominate half a dozen players to attend and the whole business could be over in a couple of hours. Players then wouldn't have to spend the rest of the week dodging phone-calls and turning their mobiles off. Of course, it's not the perfect solution but isn't it better to light a candle than continue to curse the dark?



1997 Bank of Ireland Leinster SFC WESTMEATH 0-11 WEXFORD 2-05 ate Flanagan point earns Westmeath replay

An injury time point from a 45' by Westmeath's Martin Flanagan, earned Westmeath a second bite at the cherry in a disappointing Leinster Senior Football Championship 1st round clash with Wexford at O'Kennedy Park, New Ross on Sunday May 11th 1997. Trailing by five points going into the last quarter it looked as though Westmeath were going to make an early exit from the Championship, however, they put in a determined last quarter and slowly hauled back the deficit before Flanagan scored the all important equaliser.

This was a dour struggle during which referee Seamus McCormack booked no less than seven players from each side with Westmeath's Anthony Coyne and Wexford's Leigh O'Brien both receiving their marching orders. Coyne was first to go following an off-the-ball incident with Wexford's Richie Purcell after only eight minutes, while O'Brien was dismissed in the 21st minute following a foul on Paul Conway.

Wexford started in bright fashion with Leigh O'Brien firing over two points in quick succession, before Martin Flanagan opened Westmeath's account in the 10th minute with a pointed free. Four minutes later Wexford stretched their lead to four points when Michael

Mahon scored his sides opening goal. Thomas Cleary and O'Brien then swapped points, before O'Brien received his marching orders. O'Brien's dismissal seemed to knock Wexford off their stride and Westmeath hit four unanswered points to leave the side's level at 1-3 to 0-6 at the break.

Wexford started the second half in a rejuvenated manner and after adding two points to their first half tally, hit Westmeath for a second goal in the 52nd minute, Jason Lawlor evaded his marker to fire home from 10 metres leaving the score 2-5 to 0-6. 

Today Wexford and Westmeath cross swords for only the ninth time (excluding draws) in the Leinster Senior Football Championship and for the second time in a provincial semi-final. The balance of power favoured Wexford until comparatively recently, with the Models coming out on top from 1893 to 1989 when Westmeath finally turned the tide with a 3-9 to 1-7 win in Cusack Park, Mullingar. The last three outings have favoured Westmeath and they completed the treble seven years ago when they had five points to spare in a replay in Mullingar. The sides had finished all square a fortnight earlier in New Ross. The only other semi-final meeting between the counties was in 1917. Wexford, Leinster Champions for the previous four seasons, opened their campaign with a 6-4 to 0-2 win over Wicklow in Wexford, while Westmeath had nine points to spare over Longford (4-5 to 2-2) when they met in Edgeworthstown. That semi-final was played in Croke Park on Wednesday, August 15th and Westmeath had no answer to the reigning champions who returned 1-7 to 0-1 for the challengers. It is difficult to understand the necessity for a mid-week semifinal as the final was not played until October 14th when Wexford captured their fifth of six successive titles with a 1-3 to 1-1 win over Dublin. The Purple and Gold went on to beat Monaghan (6-6 to 1-3) in the All-Ireland semi-final and took the third of four successive All-Ireland crowns with a four points victory (0-9 to 0-5) over Clare.



he replay of the Leinster Senior Football 1st round tie between Wexford and Westmeath in Mullingar on Saturday May 17th proved to be a much more entreating and competitive affair than the drawn ame six days earlier. Westmeath were forced to line-out without injured full-forward Kenny Lyons but Mark Staunton proved a very able replacement. Mullingar Shamrock's Tom Ormsby was also recalled in an effort to bolster the midfield sector. Captain Anthony Coyne was an absentee because of suspension. Scott Doran returned to the Wexford line-up after missing the drawn encounter but tee-taker Leigh O'Brien had to sit out the replay after his dismissal the previous Sunday.

Westmeath held the upperhand throughout and never once fell behind, but Cyril Hughes' team was always in contention and came within three points of the home side on no less than four occasions in the last quarter. Wexford simply refused to show the white flag and this contributed to a riveting encounter. High-fielding; some text book points; three goals and numerous lashes of brilliance. particularly from Westmeath's Ger Heavin, Ollie Keating and Mark Staunton, and Wexford's Scott Doran, im Byrne and Jason Lawlor, were just some of the Ingredients that made this such a high quality game.

Ger Heavin scored the opening two points of the game for Westmeath and it was loking good for the Midlanders when midfielder Paul Conway got through for a well-taken goal after 11 minutes. Wexford drew level for the first and only time in the game when Scott Doran converted a penalty after 14 minutes' play. Westmeath regained supremacy once more and outscored the Slaneysiders by 1-6 to 1-3 in the closing twenty-one minutes to lead at the interval by 2-8 to 1-5. Westmeath had increased their lead to seven points by the 46th minute but again Wexford fought back ourageously. By the end of the third quarter, Wexford had reduced the deficit to three points and Westmeath appeared vulnerable. However, despite some gallant efforts, Wexford failed to score that all-important goal and Westmeath finished the stronger with late points from John Murray and Ger Heavin.



Bloomsday Centenary it may be, but when it comes to the GAA. An Fear Rua wonders "Is nothing sacred to James Joyce?"

OK, maybe you could imagine John McGahern punting a rain-sodden football around a boggy field in the bowels of Leitrim or ducking out from Saint Pat's teacher training college in Drumcondra to a game in nearby Croke Park, hoping to spot a good looking girl on the terraces. Patrick Kavanagh, certainly. Didn't he reminisce of playing in goal for his native Inniskeen in some Monaghan junior championship or other and allowing his opponents to score the winning goal in the final minute in controversial circumstances?

Ah, but not Mr Jemmy Joyce, the darlin' of the American academic circuit. Young Joyce was, by all accounts, a pale, sickly youth. His early schooling was with the Jesuits in Belvedere College, at that time more renowned for cricket than any other sport. Later, while attending Clongowes, surrounded by 'Lilywhite' country, his eyesight was deemed too poor to even try out for one of the rugby teams. His father, the Cork-born John Joyce, may well have been familiar with Gaelic games, but he determined that his son would not be exposed to these sports by attending a Christian Brothers' School, like, say, O'Connell's Schools, "with Micky Mud and Paddy Stink . . . "

Yet, in his famous celebration of Dublin - the novel 'Ulysses' - the main character in one of the book's central and most extended sequences is none other than Maurice Davin, one of the founders of the GAA. In what the academics call 'The Cyclops Sequence', the scene is set in Barney Kiernan's pub in Little Britain Street. Holding court in a corner of the bar, accompanied by his "mangy mongrel", Garryowen, is a character called 'the citizen'. This is, in fact, a representation of Maurice Davin.

Round after round of drink ensues - whiskey and Allsop's Ale. One of the drinking company, a man called Joe, tells 'the citizen' of a number of Irish Nationalist MPs heading that night to the Westminster Parliament for a debate. 'Nannan's going too', says Joe, "The league told him to ask a question tomorrow about the commissioner of police forbidding Irish games in the Park. What do you think of that, citizen?" Joe then gives us the clue to 'the citizen's' identity: "There's the man", says Joe, "that made the Gaelic sports

revival. There he is sitting there. The man that got James Stephens away. The champion of all Ireland at putting the sixteen pound shot . . ." And as Joyce then puts it: "So off they started about Irish sport and shoneen games the like of the lawn tennis and about hurley and putting the stone and racy of the soil and building up a nation once again and all of that .. A most interesting discussion took place in the ancient hall of Brian O'Ciarnáin's in Sráid na Breataine Bheag, under the auspices of Sluagh na h-Éireann, on the revival of the ancient Gaelic sports . . . "

Joining in this discussion is the book's central character, the cuckolded, wandering Jew, Leopold Bloom. Sparked by Bloom's temerity in offering a view on anything, Joyce controversially portrays Cusack as narrow-minded, opinionated and argumentative. Soon, 'the citizen's' comments become derogatory of Bloom's origins, degenerating finally into a physical assault where he throws an empty Jacob's biscuit tin at the unfortunate man.

Bloom, however, stands his ground and cites the names of many famous Jews in his defence. Now, in all fairness, An Fear Rua recognises that neither the Old nor New Testaments are works that many GAA followers would be overly acquainted with. All of us, however, have become familiar with the decent Limerick man who stands behind the goals with the black-on-yellow placard 'John 3:7', but that's probably as far as it goes.

Yet, if you look carefully enough, you can see passages of the Testaments that are metaphors for aspects of the modern day GAA. Many a manager has had to stretch the resources available to him on a county panel in a way that would put to shame the miracle of feeding five thousand people with only five barley loaves and three fishes. And Seán Boylan's transformation of many's the mediocre player into an All-Ireland winner is reminiscent of the good Lord's convenient turning of water into wine in Cana of Galilee.

But who would we cast as Moses leading his people out of the captivity of Egypt into the Promised Land? Or the modern day David who slew Goliath? Who would be the candidates for such exalted positions? Would it be a Mick O'Dwyer leading Laois to their first Leinster title in fifty-seven years? Does Westmeath's forensic toppling of Dublin this year qualify them into the David class? In hurling, the names of Ger Loughnane and Justin McCarthy would have to be considered and if Waterford go all the way this year, McCarthy may even find himself as a candidate for early canonisation.

Whatever county you support in this year's championships, let's hope the appropriate scripture for them turns out to be not just John 3:7 ("Do not be surprised because I tell you, 'You must all be born again'") but maybe the one about the resurrection of Lazarus . . . (John 11:1- 44 inclusive)

















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Leinster Junior Football Championship 2003 WEXFORD 3-09 DUBLIN 0-13 First-half goals the key for Wexford

Two rather fortunate goals in the early stages put Wexford on the road to victory over Dublin in the Leinster Junior football championship semi-final in Dr. Cullen Park, Carlow, on June 14th, 2003.

They were helped in no small amount by their opponents, who only managed to find the target three times in a 17-minute spell of total dominance in the second-half. In that period alone, the 14-man Dubs hit a total of eight wides, while Wexford 'keeper, Jody Doyle, brought off a great reaction save.

When Wexford finally found their feet again, they were still two points to the good, thanks in the main to the three goals they registered in the first-half. The first arrived when Patrick Naughter curled in a free which Ciarán Deely touched to the net via a defender. Wexford's second piece of good fortune came directly from an embarrassing faux-pas by Dublin 'keeper, Alan Durnan, who kicked a clearance straight to John Doyle, and the team captain expertly booted it back into the empty net. Liam Murphy then set up Eddie Doyle for the third goal, leaving the Slaneysiders with an interval lead of 3-4 to 0-7.



Dublin were hit with a hammer-blow three minutes into the second-half when wing-forward and free-taker, Gareth Smith, was sent off for a second bookable offence.

However, despite the loss of a key player, it was around this time that the men in blue began to control the match. Even still, while Niall Crossan and Martin Whelan both pointed frees, Darren Foran was able to steal forward from wing-back and grab a great point under pressure from his marker.

For the next 12 minutes, though, the Dubs completely took over and following a

free from Niall Crossan, they somehow failed to land a single score for the remainder and this was to prove their ultimate downfall.

When Wexford eventually scored again through an Adrian Morrissey free, Dublin were spent. The eventual winners added two more scores through substitute John Mernagh and Morrissey (free) to book a final spot against Meath.

The winning team included Darren Foran who will be in action with the Seniors today, and Eoin Quigley who was one of the heroes of the hurling victory over Kilkenny on Sunday week last.






Wexford's Band of Brothers



And it's brothers in arms all the way for Wexford as the Junior bench will be manned by Brian and Mike O'Gorman from Taghmon-Camross.
















General Information

Ground Regulations at Páirc An Chrócaigh

- All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of Páirc an Chrócaigh. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- Fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground, and any persons in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground.
- Spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/arena.
- 4. The climbing of walls, stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
- Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language is not permitted in any part of the ground.

- Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any objects onto the pitch.
- Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play and shall be ejected.
- 8. Any person who fails to comply with the instructions from a steward may be ejected from the ground.
- 9. The stadium management reserve the right of
- The stadium management reserve the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of An Garda Síochána.
- Any person who remains in a gangway or aisle may be ejected from the ground.
- 12. Páirc an Chrócaigh reserves the right for its servants or agents to remove from the stadium any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence on the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.


