




lucht leanúna is mian liom fáilte a fhearadh romhaibh go Páirc an Chrócaigh inniu do cluichí ceathrú cheannais na bliana seo. Um thráthnóna beidh gach peileadóir ag dul chun páirce fíor ullamh chun scileanna a thaispeáint is táimid ag tnúth go mbeidh cluichí ar fheabhas againn. Go n-eirí go geal libh go léir.

The best from Ulster and Munster meet in Croke Park this afternoon for the right to contest a Bank of Ireland Senior Football Semi-Final in a couple of weeks. The winner of our two games today play each other in that Semi-Final. I welcome the Players, Team Mentors, County Board Officials and Supporters from the four counties to Croke Park. I also welcome the two referees, their umpires and linesmen and I wish them well. Finally, I welcome the representatives of our sponsors Bank of Ireland and I thank them for their on-going support.

Armagh have impressed right from their opening game in the Ulster Championship and it is to the credit of the team management and the players that they have maintained their focus and commitment in all their games. Opponents Kerry returned to something like their old form in the game last weekend against Longford, but today's encounter is a definite step up in class as the Ulster champions will be stern opponents. With a semi-final place at stake expect a fiercely committed encounter from two great footballing sides.

Cork may have surprised many with their gritty display against Kerry in the drawn Munster Final, but they showed that this was no flash in the pan with a well-merited victory over their great rivals in the replay. Opponents Donegal have improved dramatically over the course of the season and the team's confidence will certainly have been boosted by last weekend's fine win over Fermanagh. Each side will feel they have the necessary credentials to reach the semi-final and perhaps another chance against their Provincial Final opponents.

While the four teams will undoubtedly be under a fair amount of pressure today, spare a thought for the two referees. Decisions have to be made in an instant with no time for a TV replay. Consider also the pace of today's modern game and the level of concentration required from our

referees which needs to be greater than ever. I attended a recent Referee's Seminar at which one of our most prominent referees gave a presentation on a recent game in which he officiated. The attention to detail involving prior consultation with the other match officials and the level of concentration required in what was a high intensity encounter was extremely interesting. Being fit and knowing the rules are a definite prerequisite for any intercounty referee but a strong personality and an ability to handle the most intense pressure is now more essential than ever.

Players and some officials now seem to challenge more and more refereeing decisions and it is not an easy situation for any referee handling these situations. I accept (as do referees) that match officials sometimes make mistakes, but no referee ever goes out to intentionally favour any team. There is an unbelievable level of scrutiny by match analysts on every referee's performance. It is very easy with the benefit of technology to show where a referee erred, but would these same analysts have made the correct call themselves if the decision had to be made in a split second?

The referee has his performance officially monitored in every championship game and a comprehensive performance report and rating card is submitted after each game. An analysis of refereeing performances to date in both codes is showing an overall improvement on last year. This is down to the increased attention to referee training and in particular to the big efforts being made by all referees themselves both on and off the field. So today, spare a thought for our referees because they will play as important a role as the thirty players.

Finally, I wish all patrons an enjoyable afternoon in Croke Park. Thanks for your support and please take special care on your way home.

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IT HAPPENED IN FOOTBALL

SCORING & SAVING

Mick O'Connell, generally acknowledged as one of Kerry's greatest ever midfielders, could also claim to have recorded a double that had nothing to do with excellence around the middle of the field, but everything to do with scoring and saving at opposite ends of the pitch.

The Valentia man's feat that is probably unique in the history of gaelic football took place, not in Croke Park nor even in an intercounty match, but in a club game in Kerry. The game was the final of the "Kerryman" Shield at Tralee between Mid and South Kerry in 1964. Early in the game when Mid-Kerry were awarded a penalty, Mick, who was operating at midfield, took over in goal and saved the shot. And when later in the game South Kerry were awarded a penalty, Mick, the team's placekicker, was the man to take it and duly obliged by planting the ball in the net.

It was almost certainly a unique 'double' as there is no record of that feat being performed by an outfield player in an intercounty or club football fixture before or since. A truly remarkable achievement by a truly remarkable man.

A RARE TREBLE

Kerry have recorded many remarkable feats in their long illustrious history – and at every level and stage of the championship. In this regard the All-Ireland semi/final draws of 1941 deserve mention, as their three teams – senior, junior and minor – were all involved in stalemate in the penultimate round.

Not for the first time Kerry came through Munster with a clean sheet on all fronts, but there was to be no hat-trick of All-Ireland final appearances. The senior team did deliver when, having drawn their semi/final with Dublin (0-4 all) at Croke Park, they ran out easy winners of the second meeting – 2-9 to 0-3 at Tralee the following Sunday. The junior squad followed suit; finishing level – 3-9 to 4-6 – with Laois at Portlaoise and getting it right in the replay at Killarney on a 3-7 to 1-0 scoreline.

But the treble was not completed. Emerging Roscommon had a fine minor team on duty in the semi/final and Kerry did well to share the spoils – 3-4 to 2-7 at Tralee. The replay at St.Coman's Park was always going the home team's way and Kerry's treble bid failed on a score of 3-3 to 5-7.

However, 1941 – the year in which Kerry moved to the top of the senior championship roll of honour for the first time – also marked the only season in which a county, football or hurling, was involved in three drawn All-Ireland semi/finals. As Kerry went on to take the senior and junior titles it was a rewarding year as well for the Kingdom.

TWO REMARKABLE DECADES

Even the most casual glance at the championship records shows the remarkable achievements of Dublin in the last decade of the 19th century and the first of the 20th. In the years 1890 to 1909 capital teams set all kinds of records which none of their contemporaries came close to equalling.

Dublin's first ventures in the championship had not been impressive: a non-appearance in 1887 followed by defeats to Wexford (1888), Louth (1889) and Wexford again in 1890. But then in 1891 the capital's fortunes took off with the annexation of All-Ireland honours and that was the first of eleven titles they were to win by 1908. By the end of the century Dublin had won six titles with their closest rivals being Limerick and Tipperary with two apiece.

The new century opened with Dublin's first defeat in Leinster since 1895 (Wexford surprising the Metropolitans in the first round at Kilkenny), but the Liffeysiders resumed winning ways in 1901 with another All-Ireland title which was retained the following year.

Kerry and Kildare arrived on the scene to keep Dublin title-less for three years, but it was only a temporary interruption with Dublin taking a hat-trick of titles between 1906 and 1908 to take their All-Ireland titles total to eleven along with 13 provincial crowns. Tipperary with three national titles and Cork with nine provincial crowns were their closest rivals.

However, Dublin's greatest era came to an unexpected end when Louth beat them in the 1909 provincial semi/final and then followed an eleven-year barren period during which neither All-Ireland nor provincial honours were annexed. Dublin never came close to repeating the magnificent achievements of those early years and eleven titles in 18 years could well stand for all time.

Tá curaidh Uladh ag imirt peil den scoth faoi láthair agus Craobh Uladh buaite acu trí uair as a chéile. Tá neart, scil, taithí agus féin-mhuinín thar na beartaibh acu agus tá siad lándírithe i mbliana ar Sam a bhuachaint dona dara huair. Beidh sé fíor-dheacair iad a stopadh. Bhí an Ríocht go dona i gcraobhchomórtas na Mumhan ach seo an cluiche a bhí uathu le cúpla bliain anuas agus tá go leor le cruthú ag an bhfoireann seo freisin.

Braithfidh toradh an chluiche seo ar choimhlintí áirithe ar fud na páirce agus, gan amhras, ar an gcath thaobhline idir Joe Kernan agus Jack O'Connor. Ag an bpoinnte seo tá an lámh in uachtar ag Kernan ó thaobh cluichí cruaidh a bhuachaint. B'fhéidir go mbeidh athrú ar sin um thráthnona agus beidh lucht leanta na Ríochta ag súil go mbeidh. Beidh fíor-choimhlint i lár an ghoirt inniu - áit a bheidh leithéidí McGeeney, McGrane agus Ó Sé ar bharr a maitheasa. Beidh buntáiste faoi

leith ag an bhfoireann a bheidh i gceannas anseo mar tá tosaithe den scoth ag an dá dhream. Tá McDonnell, McConville agus Clarke ar na tosaithe is fearr sa tír gan amhras agus cuirfidh siad fíorbhrú ar línte cúil Chiarraí inniu. Chuir James Masters scanradh orthu faoi dhó i mbliana agus caithfidh siad bheith san airdeall ón gcéad fheadóg inniu.

Ar an dtaobh eile den bpáirc, cad faoi thosaithe na Ríochta agus cúlaithe Ard Mhacha? Bhí feabhas mór ar na Muimhnigh in aghaidh Longfoirt le leithéidí Gooch agus Brosnan ag teach chucu féin faoi dheireadh. Rinneadh athruithe sontasacha agus d'aimsíodar na cúil. Tá clú agus cáil ar chúlaithe Ard Mhacha faoin am seo agus ní ghéillfidh siad faic os chomhair an chúil. Má bhíonn Donaghy ar imeall na cearnóige i ngleic le Bellew nach orainn a bheidh an tadh bheith i láthair don choimhlint áirithe seo. Cluiche fíor-shuimiúil a bheidh ann agus tá sé fíor-dheacair buaiteoir a phiocadh. Beidh na Tuaisceartaigh mar rogha an údar agus tá sé sin iontuigthe ach níl deireadh leis an Ríocht go fóill. Bhí dhá ath-imirt ag Ard Mhacha i mbliana - cad faoi ceann eile?

Ta borradh faoi leith faoi Reibiliúnaigh Chorcaí i mbliana faoi stiúir Billy Morgan. Tá Craobh na Mumhan buaite acu agus tabharfaidh siad aghaidh ar neasóirí Uladh um thráthnóna. Bhíodar go dona ar fad in aghaidh Luimní ach tháinigh feabhas orthu don chluichhe ceannais. Is cinnte go bhfuil siad ag brath ro-mhór ar James Masters agus má eiríonn le Brian McIver plean a chur le chéile chu srian a chur ar Masters beidh na Deargaigh i dtrioblóid. Tá cúlaithe Thír Chonaill thar bharr faoi láthair cé go bhfuil a lán-chúlaí in easnamh orthu go fóill. Bhí Neil McGee thar bharr ar Stephen McDonnell i gcluiche ceannais Uladh agus bhí an dá líne cúil ar fheabhas in aghaidh Fhear Mhanaigh an tseachtain seo chaite.

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
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
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THE ARMAGH SQUAD WHICH WON THE ANGLO-CELT CUP.

That success was also a tribute to the consistently high standard of play that the Orchard County have maintained over a lengthy period.

Paul McGrane struck a decisive blow for Armagh in the Ulster final by collecting the only goal of an enjoyable and competitive game immediately after the start of the second half. That score separated the sides at the final whistle.

The exchanges were keen all through the match. Donegal led three times during the first half. However, McGrane's goal after only

fifty seconds of the second haf put Armagh 1-4 to 0-4 ahead. However, Donegal did not buckle and by the forty-fifth minute were just a point adrift.

But the defending champions continued to play with a cool and purposeful approach. And, helped by a splendid save by goalkeeper Paul Hearty near the end, finished worthy winners by 1-9 to 0-9.

While McGrane's goal was a match-winning highlight for Armagh, there were many other strands to the success story.

Francie Bellew was a tower of strength at full

back, turning in one of his best-ever displays in the county colours. Aaron Kernan also did much to mould the defence into a solid unit with his clever play in the half back line.

McGrane and Kieran McGeeney teamed to good effect in midfield, while Ronan Clarke masterminded matters up front, with John Mc Entee and Oisín McConville proving very able aids.

The win-Armagh's sixth Ulster title in eight years—leaves little doubt that the Orchard County remain a formidable power and a team that is also hungry for further successes.

addy was Armagh's first All Star when selected at left full forward in the second-ever team in 1972 and went on to be a versatile footballer.




He scored a splendid goal from the full forward position in the 1977 Ulster final win, Armagh's first title in 24 years

Moriarty lined out at centre half back in the All-Ireland final against Dublin, scored a goal from a penalty and had another penalty saved by Paddy Cullen in the Metropolitan goal at the expense of a "50".

A member of the Wolfe Tones club, he won a second All Star in 1977—but at centre half back—and interprovincial medals in 1979 and 1980 as a defender. Paddy also wore the Armagh jersey in hurling and won a National League Division II medal.

1953 Kerry 0-13 Armagh 1-6

With Armagh making their All-Ireland final debut and Kerry without a title for seven years, there was huge interest in this first-ever meeting of the counties and that was reflected in the attendance of 86,155 - the largest for a final to date. The Kingdom were favourites to cure their 'seven-year itch' and started correspondingly with points by Jim Brosnan and Tom Ashe. Appearing nervous, the Ulster champions had to wait until the 15th minute to open their account when Gerry O'Neill pointed, but they swept into the lead shortly after when Mal McEvoy goaled.

However, the Kingdom were soon on terms thanks to a brace of points from Tadgh Lyne, but O'Neill and McEvoy added to their personal tallies before Brosnan finished the first-half scoring to leave the Orchard county leading by 1-3 to 0-

Three minutes after the resumption Brosnan brought Kerry level and the sides were still deadlocked following an exchange of points between McEvoy and Lyne. Shortly afterwards Lyne edged Kerry in front, but at the 50th minute Armagh were presented with an opportunity to grab the lead when they were awarded a penalty. However, Billie McCorry's shot went just the wrong side of the post and Kerry swept upfield for a J.J.Sheehan point. The same player added another before Lyne had the insurance score, with Brian Seeley's late point of little consolation to Armagh. Kerry scorers: T.Lyne 0-6,

1982 Kerry 3-15 Armagh 1-11

Reigning All-Ireland champions for the previous four years, Kerry were heavily favoured for their second meeting with Armagh in this year's semi/final. The Kingdom had been taken to a replay by Cork in the provincial final but their nine point win in the replay was impressive. Armagh just edged out Donegal before defeating Antrim and Fermanagh.

However the underdogs' tag didn't bother the challengers and they made an impressive start with John Corvan's opening-minute shot coming back off the crossbar with Fran McMahon on hand to point the rebound. But Kerry responded in kind and Jack O'Shea rattled the crossbar at the other end much to Brian McAlinden's relief. Shortly afterwards though, the Armagh net-minder was retrieving the ball from the net as Tom Spillane, Ger Power, "Ogie" Moran and O'Shea combined to set up Mikey Sheehy for a goal.

Joe Kernan had a goal for Armagh at the 20th minute, but Kerry still looked the part as they turned over leading by 1-10 to 1-5. On the resumption John Egan grabbed a quick 1-1 to dim Armagh hopes considerably and they were ended at the 44th minute when Eoin Liston fired home goal number three. The leaders relaxed somewhat after that and Armagh had late points by Kernan, Noel Marley, Corvan, Brian McGeown and McMahon to make the final scoreline respectable.

fter six minutes a draw looked Athe unlikeliest of outcomes to this semi-final as Kerry led by 1-3 to nil. A Dara Ó Cinnéide penalty was preceded by a Mike Frank Russell point and followed by minors from John Crowley and Ó Cinnéide. Amazingly, after a quarter of an hour's play the sides were level as Paddy McKeever's point preceded Barry O'Hagan's goal and was followed by a brace of minors from Cathal O'Rourke. Then Kerry took it up again to move four points clear before Armagh had the final two scores of a hectic opening half to leave it 1-7 to 1-5.

Within four minutes of the restart Tony McEntee and Oisín McConville had Armagh on terms and further exchanges saw the sides deadlocked at 1-9 apiece with quarter of an hour remaining. A point by Noel Kennelly and a Maurice Fitzgerald goal apparently set Kerry on the road to victory before O'Rourke reduced the deficit to three at the 63rd minute. 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
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



Prendan was one of the outstanding forwards of the late sixties and seventies, yet he was goalkeeper in the Kerry team that lost the 1965 All-Ireland minor final to Derry.

He moved out to midfield for the 1966 minor championship and was in attack in the team that won the Sam Maguire Cup in 1969. He collected another such award a year later.

"LOOK OUT FOR DUNNION AND LYNCH BURSTING FORWARD..."

NE man's misfortune is often another man's gain. And so it is with Donegal's Barry Dunnion - one of the outstanding performers in the 2006 Bank of Ireland football championship. Supporters in the North-West were aghast when former Allstar wing back Kevin Cassidy was one of two players dropped from Brian McIver's panel prior to the Allianz NFL Division 2 final clash with Louth last April. Eamon McGee has since returned of course but Cassidy did not, deciding to spend his summer in the US. Cassidy was seen as a huge loss to the Donegal side as he was consistently one of the team's best players over the past number of seasons.

But ironically, Cassidy's departure opened the door for dynamic Dunnion and now he owns the number seven jersey on merit. From the Four Masters club in Donegal, Dunnion is one of the most accomplished defenders in the county. The 23-year-old won a senior club championship medal in 2003 and his father Danny is a current selector. Barry won county minor and U21 championships with Four Masters and it was only a matter of time before he progressed to the senior Donegal panel, such was his fine form at club level.

This is Dunnion's third full season with the Donegal seniors but after McIver handed him the chance to nail down a permanent place in the side, he hasn't looked back. Dunnion may be small but what he lacks in size, he more than makes up for with sheer tenacity and natural football ability. He has often been described as the Brian Roper or Martin McHugh of the Donegal defence - high praise indeed.


Dunnion is an extremely committed player who seems to excel in the face of adversity. In Donegal's two league final clashes with Louth, he was arguably his county's best player. And in the

early Ulster championship clash with Down, Dunnion ran Rory Kavanagh close for the man of the match award, kicking a point and setting up Kavanagh for a splendid goal. A Sigerson Cup winner with Sligo IT, he also chipped in with a point against Armagh in the recent Ulster final at Croke Park so Cork must beware of his running abilities from deep.


Dunnion is a clever player who is extremely difficult to pick up and blessed with a massive engine, he'll get up and down the park all day long. If Cork's Sean O'Brien continues in his half forward role having made the transition from corner back, he will be expected to perform a much more defensive role in attack for the Rebels as he attempts to keep a check on Dunnion's forward bursts.


But O'Brien himself has been in sparkling form for Cork this summer and is one of those players that you would call upon in a real tight battle. O'Brien is superb at picking up breaks and is one of the bravest men on the Cork panel when it comes to diving on a loose ball. He has made the switch from defence to attack with ease and is the epitome of the typical modern-day half forward, a player who will forage back to help out his midfielders while also picking up possession to instigate attacks.


Defence is seen as the best form of attack for this current Donegal side and deadly Dunnion is the prime example. Two points from four championship outings from wing back is a sign that he loves to get forward and he doesn't duck out of the physical exchanges either. With his low centre of gravity and high energy levels, Dunnion will naturally take plenty of punishment during a game but he's a wiry character and well able to tough it out in the physical stakes. Historically, Donegal fans tend to warm to small, enthusiastic





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

CORK COACHING AND GAMES DEVELOPMENT SQUADS

n keeping with the Grassroots to National Programme, Cork Coaching and Games Committee (Coiste Oiliúna) has been running development squads over recent months in both football and hurling.

These squads cater for the best club players at under 14 and 15 within their Divisions. The players are brought together and receive a higher standard of coaching than they may be used to at club level. Responsibilty for getting the Squads up and running has been given to full time personnel, Keith Ricken and Eamonn Ryan

No players are turned away and the idea is to develop all players skills over a minimum of 8 sessions. Some of these players will not play at county level but will certainly return to their respective clubs a more enlightened player. Those who have the ability to play at county level are detected at an early age and can be monitored and nurtured by the top coaches in the county.

Thus when they come to minors, they are not arriving as unknowns who, if they happen

to play poorly in the first trial game, lose out on the chance to play with their county. This is one of the reasons why the development squads are beginning to become so popular in counties.

The fruits of the Squads is to be seen in Cork at the moment with the Liam Lyne Cup (under 15 Divisional competition) showing up a very high standard of football. All teams involved showed cohesiveness that some clubs find hard to achieve and thus the football was a joy to behold. For example the Avondhu squad have trained together approximately 16 times in the past year, something that would be unimaginable for a Divisional team in the past. One thing that is certain is that these squads are sure to contain a large contingent of future intercounty players. The hard work of people such as Michael O Neill, Pat Spratt, Jim O Sullivan, Kevin Greene and many, many others will eventually result in Cork football finally returning to the glory days we so desperately

QUARTER-FINAL RECORDS

SOUTHERN TEAMS HAVE 100% SUCCESS RATE

f the Ulster representatives in today's double-header at Croke Park peruse the quarter/final records of their respective opponents, they will not be enthralled by what they observe as both Kerry and Cork have a 100% success rate at this stage of the championship.

Since their introduction in 2001, the Kingdom have been involved at this stage of the campaign every year and have defeated Dublin twice (once on a replay), Galway, Roscommon and Mayo, although today will be their first 'last eight' meeting with Ulster opposition. The Leesiders have made two quarter/final appearances to date defeating Mayo by three points in 2002 and Galway by the same margin twelve months ago.

However, Armagh also have an impressive record at this stage of the championship and have been defeated just once in four outings. The Orchard county missed out on the first quarter-finals in 2001, but have been everpresent since. They defeated Sligo on a replay in 2002 and Laois by two points the following year. Fermanagh upset them by the minimum margin in '04, but Laois were again overcome (this time by nine points) last season.

Donegal's record isn't nearly as impressive as their Ulster counterparts. A quirk of their record shows that on the two occasions they have made the 'last eight' they have yet to win, or lose, first time out as in both years so far Donegal have drawn the initial encounter – with Dublin in 2002 and Galway a year later. Defeat to the Metropolitans resulted but the Corribsiders were overcome at the second time of asking.







REFEREEING MATTERS

REFEREING MATTERS IN 2006

Time Added-On

The question has been raised again, not often, but a few times this summer - should time-keeping be taken away from the referee? The reason for raising the question is, of course, the allocation of the amount of time to be added on at the end of each half. Before any discussion, as of now, the rules state that the referee alone is the arbiter of time:

Powers of the Referee: Rule 1.(i) The referee's decision on any question of fact and in regard to time shall be final.

Duties of the Referee: Rule 1.(v) To record playing time, and to extend time in each half for deliberate or incidental delay or to allow for a free - awarded before time had expired - to be taken.

A few years ago nobody knew, except the referee himself, how much time was to be added on. Would he add 2,3 or 4 minutes? Not even the other officials knew. Then, for the sake of transparency, the current practice was introduced - shortly before the allotted time in each half the referee passes the information on to the sideline official who displays it on the board for all to see and it is announced over the public address.

To prevent referees making a mistake and blowing the final whistle before the announced time he is now told to wait until the sideline official has told him the announced time has elapsed. Despite these efforts at transparency many find it difficult to accept that if two minutes has been announced the referee can still allow further time if he has stopped his watch for a delay as in Rule 1. (v) above.

To sum up - for a separate Official Time-Keeper, whether by way of clock or not, needs a change of rule. That should only come after an informed debate on the pros and cons, the practical implications for intercounty game venues and the direct input of experienced referees.

Referee Reaction. Not Recommended!

Macau Referee Choi Kuok- Kun was seen live on television punching a Hong Kong player who objected to being sent off by kicking a ball at him. They started fighting and had to be separated by other players. Kuok-Kun's assessment was to be banned from refereeing for life!

Assessment of Referees

I hesitate even to use the word 'assessment' at all because the word 'assessor' has, in some quarters, been seen as somebody nit-picking the performance of referees. The assessors are people who have played the game, know the rules and are there not only to point out if the referee made mistakes but also to commend his good decisions and hopefully help him to be a better referee. No, he's not an unknown in the stand. He signs his name and phone number to the assessment form which the referee gets as well as the members of the Referees and Appointments Committees.

Difficult Games

One of the first questions on the assessment form is - Was this a difficult game to referee? Some of the trends in modern possession football make them difficult games to referee - a lot of short lateral handpassing, players crowding the player in possession. The game has changed so much. Colm O'Rourke in the Sunday Independent of July 29th says: "The ratio of handpasses to kicks seems to be running in the order of four to one."

Who are the Assessors?

As I said, they are former officials, former referees and all have played the game at some level. To be appointed they must be neutral not from one of the competing counties or the county of the referee himself. Let's face it and admit it - none of us is objective where our own county is concerned. Some of us are totally biased and loudly condemn any free given against us as we cannot see any fault in our own team. This is particularly true when a referee is not blowing all the fouls, we see the ones we should have got and dismiss the ones the other team should have got. So too we differ in what we want from referees - should they blow all the fouls or use the famous 'commonsense' and blow some?

The great clamour for refereeing is general in consistency but we don't all agree on our judgement of what that is. I would argue there is no consistency among analysts, journalists, commentators, officials, spectators on what they require from a referee. But to expect a manager of a defeated team to be objective in his post-match comments is asking alot. One of

the criteria for being a manager is not sainthood! One notable exception this summer was Mickey Harte of Tyrone. Within minutes of the huge disappointment of being defeated by Laois he was asked a rather pointed and leading question by a TV commentator - "What did you think of the referee?". Mickey answered that the referee did fine in difficult circumstances and went on to pay a very gracious tribute to Laois.



BULLETIN BOARD

Health and Safety Rules - Páirc an Chrócaigh

- All persons entering this ground are admitted subject to the following Rules (which are designed to protect the health and safety of all entrants to the ground). Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all of these Rules.
- 2. The management reserves the right of admission.
- 3. The instructions of the stewards must be obeyed at all times.
- All persons entering the ground agree to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochana.
- 5. Every person (including infants) entering the ground must have a ticket.
- 6. The following are not permitted:-
 - 6.1. Entry upon the pitch or engaging in conduct that causes or is likely to cause injury or harm to, or otherwise interferes with, disrupts, hinders or distracts a person playing in, refereeing or otherwise having a role in a match at this ground.
 - 6.2. Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.
 - 6.3. The climbing of floodlight or other pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behaviour constitutes a trespass to property.
 - 6.4. Throwing any object onto the pitch.
 - 6.5. Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.
 - 6.6. Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.
 - 6.7. Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
 - 6.8. Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
 - 6.9. Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
- If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any trespass.
- 8. Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry to or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that purpose.
