





Armagh and Longford renew hurling league rivalry



he appealing Allianz National Hurling League Division III final brings Armagh and Longford into opposition for the second time in this season's competition The.

In their first meeting at Fay Park in late February the goal scoring flair of Gerard Enright, Martin King and Ciaran Christy proved decisive in earning the Orchard County a 3-11 to 1-12 win.

That was Armagh's initial appearance of the season and they went on to top the five team Division III "B" table with the perfect record

The Orchard County followed up that programme with a very workman like display when comfortably seeing off the challenge of Louth in the semi-final at Castleblayney two week ago.

They were well on the road to the final at the interval when they held a commanding 2-8 to 0-3 lead. Armagh continued to maintain the momentum after the change of ends and finished comfortable winners by 3-13 to 0-8.

Centre half forward Declan Coulter made an outstanding contribution to the success by scoring 1-7.

This was another efficient performance by the Ulster side, who impressed as a well-drilled team. well served in all departments.

Longford opened their campaign with a big win over Cavan at Ballyconnel. Then came that set-back against Armagh, but they have recovered well in the meantime.

They won their remaining two games in the divisional series and two weeks ago edged home by a point against Donegal in their semi-final at Kingspan Breffni Park.


Competition was very keen throughout. The teams were on level terms at 0-5 each at the break and the sides were on level terms four times after the change of ends.

However, Longford ha somewhat the better of matters in the closing stages to get through by 0-13 to 1-9.

Gareth Ghee, who has been consistently on the scoring target this season, again underlined his finishing technique by chalking up a superb 0-10.

Mark Cassidy in attack an Robbie Stakelum at right half back were other stars for the winners.

So, both teams have had much to encourage them, since their last meeting in February and look capable of providing a close encounter with spirited passages of good hurling.




COUNTER ATTRACTIONS

t may have been the fact that the campaign had been drastically shortened by the severe winter and the absence of the big names of the code, but the attendance at the 1947 league final between Derry and Clare was very poor indeed – a tiny 4,800, which was less than a quarter of the attendance at the previous year's decider.

The fact that the final was played on a Monday (Easter Monday) was undoubtedly a factor in the poor turnout, but on the same day there was an attendance of 16,000 at a tournament football game between Cavan and Kerry at Mitchum Stadium. That, of course, was a big occasion for the Irish in Britain, but even so the difference in the two attendances was truly remarkable.


But that wasn't the only occasion on which a National League final drew a smaller attendance than what would be considered a lesser event; the 1933 final between Meath and Cavan at Croke Park was watched by a crowd of 11,000 (then a record for a National League final) while on the same afternoon a crowd of 14,000 attended the Cork senior hurling final.

All of the above has a certain resonance with last weekend when the Heineken Cup Rugby clash had a profound effect on the attendances at the league finals. Indeed, the Division 2 final at Breffni Park attracted a considerably larger attendance than the premier decider at the Gaelic Grounds, but it wasn't the first time that the more prestigious event drew the smaller attendance.









The opening half belonged to Louth. They played good football, dominated the exchanges, scored two goals and were well worth their interval lead of seven points.

There did not appear to be anyway back for the North West County as they lined out for the second half. But the introduction of wily Adrian Sweeney brought about a big improvement.

His good work in the full forward line boosted the Donegal work-rate and they steadily whittled down their deficit to get on level terms near the end and deservedly earn a second bite at the cherry.

Louth were very impressive in the opening half. Boosted by two early points from Christy Grimes, and good midfield play by Martin Farrelly and Paddy Keenan, they moved with flair and purpose.

Goals by Aaron Hoey after twenty two minutes and Mark Stanfield from a penalty coming up to the interval gave them what many felt was a match winning interval lead of 2-7 to 0-6.

Donegal, inspired by Sweeney, set about saving the day from the start of the second

half. They steadily reduced their arrears and with the game fifty five minutes old they were right back in the title chase, just a point adrift.

Then, Louth got their game together again and a well-worked movement ended with Martin Farrelly collecting his side's third goal.

Many felt that score would put paid to the Donegal revival, but to their credit they continued to play with assurance and determination to earned a well-deserved draw -0-17 to Louth's 3-8

GOOD PERFORMANCES


There were many good individual performances in the game. Sweeney deserves special mention as he brought new direction and power to Donegal and also finished their top scorer with four points.

Brendan Boyle and Neil Gallagher also contributed to the revival with their performances at midfield in the second half.

Farrelly led the way in the scoring review for Louth, while Hoey and Stanfield also made the most of their goal opportunities.

There were good performances in defence as well. Paddy Campbell at full back and Damien Diver did well for Donegal, while John O'Brien and Colin Goss had their moments for the Wee County.

This replay has the makings of a close encounter that should provide full value for money, and with the issue in doubt until the end.



TWO LEAGUES

ne league campaign is considered enough – sometimes more than enough – for any county nowadays. But slightly more than 70 years ago Louth was one of a small number of counties that were involved in two league campaigns. This remarkable activity took place in the 1933/34 season when the Wee county, Meath, Cavan and Monaghan decided to organise what was called a four-county league, though not in opposition to the national competition. And it was hardly because of a lack of activity as Louth, Cavan and Meath were in the same National League group with Mayo and Galway. But Louth's endeavours reaped little reward as they failed to make an impression in either competition, recording just two wins in eight matches.

THE FIRST

t has long been forgotten by even the most diligent observer of the National League that the first draw and replay in the competition took place in the very first campaign – 1925/26 – and Donegal was one of the teams involved. Their opponents were Tyrone, and at Omagh on February 28th the teams finished level - Donegal 4-3, Tyrone 3-6. A fortnight later the teams met again at the same venue with Donegal emerging victorious by 4-4 to 2-3.

Although they failed to qualify for the final of the Ulster section of the league that year, the 1925/26 campaign saw Donegal record one of their most significant victories to that date - a first ever win over Cavan at Ballyshannon on a final scoreline of 0-6 to 0-3.

SIMILAR FOE...DIFFERENT OUTCOME

rior to today's replay, it has been a number of years since Donegal and Louth have been involved in second meetings as is the nature with the National League. The Ulster side has to go back to the 1993 final with Dublin for their last replay as, having drawn with the Metropolitans at Croke Park (0-9 each), Donegal succumbed in the replay by 0-6 to 0-10.

Dublin also provided the opposition when Louth had their last replay in the league. In the 1969/70 season the counties, although not in the same division, were in the same section and a sectional play/off (semi/final) was set up as the method to see who would advance. At Croke Park the sides could not be separated (1-12 apiece), but when the action moved to An Uaimh a fortnight later the Wee county advanced by 0-10 to 0-8.







A RARE OCCURRENCE

ast weekend Louth became just the third county to score three goals in a National League final and fail to win the title. The first occasion this happened was in 1932 when Cork took on Kerry with the Leesiders notching 3-3, but still lost to the Kingdom's 5-2. Cork were again the victims when it happened for a second time in 1948. As with Louth last week, the Rebels scored three goals in forcing a 3-8 to 2-11 draw with Cavan, but lost the replay by 2-8 to 5-9. And the most recent occasion this rare phenomenon occurred was in 1958 when, despite scoring an impressive 3-8, Kildare were still five points shy of Dublin's 3-13. Of course, should the Wee county prevail in this afternoon's replay the three-goal statistic will be little more than that.

POINTING THE WAY

n just four occasions in this year's league was the 20-point barrier breached with Donegal managing it twice and Louth once. The Ulster side hit Carlow for 1-21 at Dr.Cullen Park on February 12th while they recorded the exact same total when defeating London at Ruislip a month later. On the fifth of March at Dundalk Louth registered 0-20 when defeating Sligo by eight points. The only other occasion the 20-point barrier was breached was when Westmeath notched 3-23 against Waterford at Mullingar on February 5th.

Twelve months ago the 20-point barrier was breached on five occasions with Monaghan managing it twice while Tyrone, Roscommon and Leitrim achieved it once.






