



Gaelic Life Dr McKenna Cup

A Review of the 2007 Competition

Tonight, Tyrone are aiming to win their fourth Dr McKenna cup title in a row, while Donegal are seeking for their first success since 1985.

Donegal have progressed to tonight's final after defeating UUI, Antrim and Down in the group stage. In their first outing of the year, Donegal edged out UUJ at Ballyshannon on a scoreline of 1-06 to 1-04 in a tight affair. On the 14th January, Donegal travelled to Casement Park, where they gained another narrow victory with a 0-09 to 0-08 win over Antrim. In their final group game, Donegal returned to Ballyshannon to record a comfortable 2-11 to 0-11 win over Down. They then went on to defeat Armagh

0-09 to 0-07 in the semi final, in the first ever live broadcast of a Dr McKenna Cup fixture. Donegal manager, Brian McIver will have been pleased with the form of newcomers such as Kevin McMenamin and Patrick McConigley in this year's competition, as well as collecting a rare victory over Armagh. This was also the third time in four outings that Donegal amassed a total of nine points, and remarkably emerged victorious.

Tyrone have been in fine form in this year's competition as they recorded impressive victories in their first two outings over Queens University and Derry on scorelines of 2-14 to 0-09 and 1-15 to 0-09

respectively. On 20th January, Tyrone travelled to Kingspan Breffni Park as they recorded a 0-14 to 0-10 victory over Cavan in a close encounter. Last Tuesday night, Tyrone recorded a comfortable 2-16 to 0-08 victory over Monaghan with encouraging performances from newcomers Kelvin Hughes and Tommy McGuigan to maintain their unbeaten start to 2007. In fact, Tyrone have yet to concede a goal in six games in the McKenna Cup and the National Football League in 2007.

Looking Back

The Origins of the Dr McKenna Cup Competition

When Dr. Patrick McKenna, Bishop of Clogher presented the McKenna cup to the Ulster Council in 1925, he was one of only a small group willing at that time, to be publicly associated with the GAA. Ireland in the 1920s was slowly emerging from war, unrest and change.

When the Ulster Council sought donors for trophies there wasn't a queue to their door with offers. From 1923 the council were actively looking for a donor for their senior championship and in 1925 the treasurer of the council proposed the establishment of a second competition to prepare teams for the Championship.

Two loyal GAA stalwarts came to the Council's rescue in 1925. JF O Hanlon, owner of Anglo-Celt newspaper presented a trophy to BC Fay, secretary of the Council. It was decided to use the trophy for the Ulster Senior Championship and it was first presented to Cavan who won the 1925 Ulster Championship. Treasurer O'Duffy was successful in securing a trophy from the bishop of Clogher and the new cup was presented to Council

in 1925 although it was not until 1927 that the competition got underway.

Patrick McKenna was born in the North Monaghan parish of Errigal Truagh in 1869. A pupil at St Macartans and Maynooth, he was ordained in 1894. He taught English at Maynooth and was appointed curate of Currin parish in 1896. He spent a period teaching in St Ciaráns Kilkenny before returning to Clogher as curate of Enniskillen. He was appointed professor of Theology at Maynooth in 1904 and in 1909 he was consecrated Bishop of Clogher.

The bishop provided a glowing reference for Eoin O Duffy to help him secure the position of assistant-surveyor in the Clones/ Cootehill district. Later in 1918 O Duffy was arrested in Clones and Bishop McKenna issued a lengthy statement condemning the arrest. When the Bishop McKenna presented the cup to Ulster Council in 1925 the council recognised an old friend.

The regulations for the new Dr McKenna cup were drawn up at Ulster convention in 1926 and the competition commenced in



1927. The first final was played in Clones on May 8, 1927 with Monaghan defeating Donegal 2-7 to 2-3.

The first and only trophy presented to the late Cormac McAnallen as captain of the Tyrone senior team was the Dr McKenna cup. It was fitting that Miceal Greenan as Uachtaran Comhairle Uladh presented that original Dr McKenna cup as a permanent memento to the McAnallen family. It resides now with pride in Brantry. The stories of our past heroes informs all our futures.

The Lights Are All On

The Dr McKenna Cup 2007

2007 has certainly got off to a bright start for the Gaels of Ulster, with the completion of floodlighting to some of the main County venues within the Province, namely Breffni Park Cavan, Casement Park Belfast and tonight's venue, Healy Park Omagh.

The Dr McKenna Cup, under sponsorship for the first time by Gaelic Life, has certainly took a new lease of life with the introduction of floodlit games, with tonight's meeting being the fourth encounter to be played under lights in this years competition, the previous three taking place at Breffni Park.

The Healy Park floodlights were officially commissioned on the 24th April 2006 and since then Minor and Senior Football Championship fixtures as well as the recent National Football League meeting of Tyrone and Fermanagh have already been played under the glare of the 850 lux level lighting.

Tyrone are certainly no new-comers to the occasion, as this is in fact their fifth consecutive game played under floodlights, after previous encounters with Cavan in the Gaelic Life Dr McKenna Cup at Cavan, Dublin in the National League in Croke Park, Fermanagh


in the National League at Healy Park and Monaghan in Tuesday's Gaelic Life Dr McKenna Cup semi-final.

The Ulster Council GAA's Project Manager Stephen McGeehan praised the work completed by the various people involved in the historic project by stating:

"To complete a project of this scale within the timescales set was a tremendous achievement by all of the people involved."

Stephen went on to comment: "Donegal and Tyrone supporters attending tonight's game will see the modern GAA at its best in terms of the physical improvements that have taken place in Healy Park in recent times and I wish to thank all those involved for their work in developing such facilities that are a credit to a voluntary sporting organisation."

The Floodlighting Project is just one of a number of capital developments throughout Ulster which will see the Ulster Council investing over €11m in Floodlighting and Coaching and Games programmes as part of a modernisation strategy supported by the Sports Council.

Previously in the day, Holy Family School pupils participated in a Gaelic Football session. The pupils had been working on their skills with teacher Eamon Donnelly. The coaches, teachers, class-room assistants and carers were then taken through their roles and responsibilities as a coach, and the various methods and styles of coaching. This was followed by a practical session in where everyone was put



into groups for a series of problem solving exercises. Each group was given a different task with the emphasis on different kinds of impairment. Una concluded the seminar by thanking everyone for not only attending but for joining in so readily, she added, "There is an obvious high standard of coaching and experience

among the participants, but it is very important that they get involved with their local G.A.A clubs and schools".


