

Senior: Martin Duffy (Sligeach)


Wartin is a member of the Emiscrone Kilglass club and is a former player. He won a county intermediate medal in 1991.

Past Meetings

IT'S three years since Fermanagh and Tyrone were last drawn together in the championship in Clones. Tyrone the defending Ulster and All Ireland champions struggled to impose themselves on the game. Fermanagh as game and resolute as ever made life difficult for long periods becore succumbing late in the match.

The Erne men were entitled to be satisfied with their overall effort if not the result, but for the winners there was the realisation that both their Ulster and All Ireland crowns were under serious threat. Those fears were borne out when next time around Mickey Harte's men were dumped out of the provincial championship by Donegal.

Ironically that defeat proved the making of Fermanagh and marked the beginning of a wonderul championship odyssey that saw them claim notable scalps such as Cork and Donegal.

It seemed as if manager Charlie Mulgrew could do mo wrong especially after they dumped hot favourites Armagh out of the All Ireland race at the guarter-final stage. Mayo eventually brought their exciting run to an end but only after a replay at the semi-final stage. Twenty five years ago the Erne men accounted for Tyrone at the semi final stage of the Ulster championship by a single point at Clones. Since then Tyrone have balanced the books with victories in All Ireland quarter final in 2003 and league semifinal that same season. Tyrone fared somewhat better in the league than a Fermanagh team that went through the campaign without securing a solitary point. But football can be cruel.


Mickey Harte was resigned to being without both Martin Penrose and Stephen O'Neill for today's game when news came through that Brian McGuigan had suffered a serious eye injury while playing for Ardboe Reserves. Everyone in the sport will wish him a speedy recovery, but in the circumstances

his future remains clouded in uncertainty. On the plus side Brian Dooher has returned after injury while Philip Jordan, another hugely influential figure, has recovered well from a double hernia operation as has Joe McMahon.

Tyrone's future well being will depend greatly on how well they fill the crucial full back berth. Conor Gormley remains the safest option. The four goals conceded against Mayo in the league at Omagh is another timely warning that nothing can be taken for granted. Right now the O'Neill county can afford no further injury setbacks. With Brian McGuigan and Stephen O'Neill sidelined indefinitely even greater responsibility will rest on the shoulders of players of the calibre of Conor Gormley and Sean Cavanagh.









Valuing Volunteers

Joe McGurn



Joe McGurn stepped down last December as Fermanagh County Chairman after holding the position for 14 years. A member of the Enniskillen Gaels club, Joe has been actively involved in the County Board stretching back to the 1960's.

Joe was involved in the setting up of a Street league in Enniskillen involving teams from many parts of the town. This was a massive boost to the Gaels club, as parents were more involved and some great players were blooded in the league.

As a former secretary of the Gaels club, Joe began his dealings with the county board and became a member of many committees, including Hurling and Ground committees. He also served as a gate man for Ulster Council and was actively involved in refereeing at the time.

Joe was a founder member of the Wolfe Tone's GAA club and was an administrator with the club. By the 1980's the Wolfe Tone's club and Enniskillen Gaels had amalgamated and Joe became known in County Board circles for his hard work. He became Vice-Chairman of the county Board for two separate

spells form 1974-84 and then again from 1990-92 before becoming Chairman in 1993.

Joe was instrumental in the development of Fermanagh's Centre of Excellence at Lissan, it was his drive and dedications to ensure that Fermanagh had the best facilities for the preparation of all it's county teams. Along with others at the time, Joe identified the need for Fermanagh to have their own training facilities and had the vision to acquire

the necessary land. Lissan is a testament to the hard work and vision of Fermanagh men like Joe McGurn.

Joe spends most of his time now looking after Lissan, opening the facilities for the many teams training and playing games there.

Joe is one of a few lifelong GAA volunteers, who work unassumingly in the background for the association and never asking of anything but giving their all.

Mickey Moynagh

Tyrone's arrival at the top table in 2003 ended years of frustration for many people in that part of the world, none moreso than for the doyen of the O'Neill county's backroom team, Mickey Moynagh.

The Clogher native has been involved in preparing Tyrone teams since 1988, when he first came on board during Danal Donnelly's tenure.

Mickey has enjoyed almost unbroken service over the last 19 years, toiling away dilicently in the background.



The affable Mickey always believed that Tyrone had the players capable of winning an All-Ireland, and thankfully, he was there at the heart of it to enjoy the greatest day in Tyrone's history.

Hopefully, Mickey will continue his association with the Tyrone team for many years to come, and he'll enjoy more days like 28th September 2003 and 25th September 2005 before he finally calls it a day with the county set-up.

Anyone who doubts the importance of people like Mickey Moynagh in the quest for success should reflect on the following extract from Mickey Harte's book, 'Kicking Down Heaven's Door' ... "Tonight, the hard work started. In Augher, in the cold, under the lights. Ulster and All Irelands can be won and lost on nights like these. Men like Mickey Moynagh and Francie Goulding will do their best to make sure they're not lost. I know that from tonight. Some players despise nights like this one; Francie and Mickey seem to relish them...

"I haven't worked directly with Mickey Moynagh before, but I know him... I also know previous Tyrone senior management teams appreciated him. Wherever the next station the boys are going to be at for a drill, he makes sure the water bottles are there. He makes sure we have 15 footballs there. He makes sure the cones that Paddy and myself have put out are taken away. He makes sure the boys have energy drinks when they hit the dressing rooms, because he pours those drinks into a beaker for every single one of them.

"Mickey must be about my age and must be more folically challenged than Peter or myself, but he's as energetic and enthusiastic as a teenager. Any man who respects and values his Tyrone jersey respects and values Mickey Moynagh!"
Today, we salute Mickey Moynagh, and all those people like him who devote so much time and energy to clubs and counties up and down the land.

Minor Football Preview

Some indication of the gulf between today's Minor opponents can be gauged by the result when they met earlier this season in the Ulster League.

On that occasion only one point separated them on a score of 1-12 to 2-8 for Tyrone. But they were missing many of their players whose attention at that time was firmly focused on the quest for All-Ireland honours in schools and colleges football.

The county's Vocational team won the national title for a ninth time and Omagh CBS created history by capturing the Hogan Cup for the first time ever. It's those two teams which quite obviously provide the backbone to the team that is being expected to make a strong bid for Ulster honours this year, although quite a number were not involved in either squad.

Team managers, Raymond Munroe and Cathal McAnenly, are in their second season at the helm. And, the squad that they have assembled looks well equipped for the challenges ahead. Two years ago the players involved made their mark by winning the Buncrana Cup. Now more progress in the real business of Minor football is the target.

Tim Harney did goals for Omagh CBS, while the likes of Aidan Girvan, Tiarnan O'Hagan, Kevin Mossey, Kyle Coney and Paddy McNeice are others likely to be to the fore. Under the circumstances Fermanagh manager, Cathal Murphy, can be forgiven for not getting too carried away about his team's chances. Nevertheless, they will be entering the game in a determined mood. The prospects of an upset may be slim, but that won't prevent Fermanagh from going all out. And, they have a number of talented players spearheading their challenge.

-The spine of the Fermanagh team is built around Rory Foy at full-back, Ryan Jones at midfield, Daryl Keenan at centre half forward and Kevin Connolly at full-forward. Good performances from them could potentially make

life difficult for the favourites. While the Tyrone players were lapping up their twin All-Ireland triumphs, the best some of the Fermanagh players could manage was a Rannafast Cup success with St Michael's Enniskillen.

It goes to highlight the wide gulf between the counties in terms of success, ability and prospects in this year's ESB-sponsored Minor championships.

Fermanagh are waiting in the wings hoping to cause the biggest of upsets. Such a scenario is difficult to imagine for anyone who has watched the respective players in action, but can't be totally ruled out either.

However, Tyrone are unlikely to be caught complacent. Their pedigree is too great to be just thrown away by a below par display in the curtain-raiser. Expect them to emerge comfortable winners as a result.


Did You Know?

Current manager Charlie Mulgrew won an All-Ireland SFC with his native county, Donegal in 1992.





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

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

Mulgrew is aware that Fermanagh will have to show a massive improvement on their league form where they failed to register a win during their campaign.

"We know we need to improve from the league showings, that is what we have been focusing on in our build up to this match. I hope we will be able to produce a big challenge. Whatever team on the day produces the best performance and maybe gets a wee rub of the green, and gets a bit of luck here and a

call from the ref, etc. All those wee things come into play.

What is in our control, is the level of performance we produce on the day. Thankfully, things have been going well. It's a first round championship match but the fact it is against our close neighbours Tyrone adds that little bit of spice to it.

There is a great team ethos within the camp, and that's a good strength we have. It is one of our key strengths that we have been working on, and the players themselves have bought into it very much. It means there is no distractions, there's nobody rolling against you, everybody has the same idea and we're

good performance.




names who have entertained us for more than a decade - sporting memories are created by such men and we, the sporting public should be for ever grateful.

Senior Preview

SO much has changed in the past few weeks to make this latest Ulster Championship clash just a little less clearcut than many have been expecting.

Now there's a definite air of caution in stark contrast to the hot tips being placed on Tyrone to sweep aside their neighbours. The reasons for most expecting a big win for the favourites were, of course, very simple and entirely understandable

Back then all the indications were that Mickey Harte would be able to call upon the services of top forwards like Stephen O'Neill, Owen Mulligan, Martin Penrose and even Brian McGuigan. On the other hand, Charlie Mulgrew was struggling to stay afloat following an absolutely disastrous National League campaign.

Make no mistake that Tyrone are still the favourites to win and progress to a high profile semi-final against either Donegal or Armagh. But the difference is that fewer are completely writing off Fermanagh's chances of causing some problems along the way.

While the news has not been entirely good for them with James Sherry and Barry Owens among those rated doubtful, they will still relish the role of underdogs.

Everyone remembers 2004 for the All-Ireland semi-final appearance, but often forget how they entered the first round against Tyrone as rank outsiders.

If Fermanagh are to repeat that feat, then it's going to take the same level of commitment. A lot will depend on Shane Goan, Martin McGrath, Eamon Maguire and Mark Little reaching a far higher level of intensity than has been the case this season and the possible deployment of Jonathan McGurn at full-forward will need to be fully utilised.

Both counties are vulnerable to demoralising results, although Fermanagh's situation is more acute. It's easy to reckon that a repeat of their terrible league form would most probably herald a premature end to their championship season and the departure of their manager.

Tyrone don't have just as much riding on this game. However, they will want to show that the mixed form displayed in the league is now behind them. An emphatic win would indicate that they are ready to make a



strong bid for championship honours no matter about the unavailability of some of their major players.

It should also be remembered that Fermanagh caused plenty of problems when the counties met in round two of the league.

So, time to get off the fence. Fermanagh are in a last chance saloon, and the trap door is open if they lose by more than seven or eight points. It's damage limitation to an extent for Tyrone's fringe forwards who must compensate for the loss of their more illustrious colleagues.

25 years ago in 1982 Fermanagh won by 1-8 to 0-10 at Cavan. This time the result should be reversed.



Why play Go Games?



Terence McWilliams, Ulster Gaelic Games Development Manager

This year we are playing smaller sided games during half time at our championship games. The rules for Go Games are summarised here:

- The Age, Number of Players, Pitch Dimensions, Zones progress gradually as the children's skill level improves.
- The equipment such as balls and goal posts have been modified to suit the physical development of the players and the rules of the games.
- Research shows that children enjoy these games much more than the full sized 15 aside games as there is more contact with the ball, many more

- scoring chances and higher heartrates were achieved.
- · The Go Games also allow for the development of young referees. It is recommended that Referees as young as 12 can referee Go Games. A course is currently being designed based on the Young Whistler initiative run by Cumann na mBunscol and our county development games managers, to help provide . these young referees with the capabilities to referee . Go Games in an non competitive environment and with positive support and mentoring there is no reason why they cannot.
- The Young Whistlers who will be refereeing our half

time games are an example of the good work being done at all levels by our games managers.

Conclusion:

- The Go Games are about values, which should be at the heart of underage games development
- They value Full Participation to a child
- They value Fair Play to a child
- They value Achievement to a child
- · They value Fun to a child
- If we can provide these we will produce a much more enjoyable and fulfilling experience for our young Gaelic Games players












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Ground Regulations

St. Tiernach's Park





All persons entering St.
Tiernach's Park are admitted
only subject to the following
Ground Regulations and to
the Rules and Regulations
of the Gaelic Athletic
Association. Entry to the
ground shall be deemed
to constitute unqualified
acceptance of all these Rules
and Regulations. Any person
who fails to comply with these
Ground Regulations may be
refused entry or removed
from the ground.

Fireworks, smoke canisters, gas-horns, bottles, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything, which may be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the stadium.

The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not

permitted to bring alcohol into the stadium.

The unauthorised climbing of any structure, walls, building or seating in the ground is strictly forbidden.

Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets, gas-horns, and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted within the ground. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.

Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play at any time before, during or after the games.

The Ground Management reserve the right to refuse admission or to eject any person who refuses to be searched where such a search is deemed necessary.

A person may not obstruct a gangway, stairwell or circulation area at any time.

All persons entering or in the ground are reminded of their obligation to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire or other occurrence to anyone using the premises.

The Ground Management reserve the right for it's servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the ground regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
