

Tyrone and Donegal met at Healy Park in the National League twelve months ago with the visitors winning on that occasion on a 2-11 to 1-8 scoreline. Donegal then went on to win the league title for the first time in their history while Tyrone returned to avenge that defeat in the championship, winning 2-15 to 1-7, before going on to claim the Anglo Celt Cup for an 11th time. Today marks another significant clash for the neighbouring rivals.



Red Hand Fan Viewpoint...

Under the Spotlight: Eamon McCann, Fintona

Fintona club stalwart and ardent Tyrone supporter, Eamon McCann, is the Tyrone fan under the spotlight this week

(Interview by Eugene McConnell, Secretary of the Tyrone Communications Committee)

Q. What is your current role with the Pearses club?

A. I am currently in my final year as club chairman of Fintona Pearses. This is my fourth 3-year term as chairman, having previously served in the same capacity from 1985-87, 1991-93 and1997-99. I have been lucky enough to be involved in the modernisation of the facilities at Pearse Park. We have developed a modern dressing room complex, a new stand with terracing, as well as upgrading to the pitch.

Q. Earliest GAA memory?

A. My earliest memory was as a lad attending the 1960 minor County Final, played between Fintona and Ardboe. It went to two replays. The first game was in Dungannon and the first replay was in Coalisland. The deciding game was staged in Pomeroy. I remember two packed Ulsterbuses leaving Fintona laden with supporters. I was one of those supporters. It cost 2 shillings to travel to and from the game by bus. I also remember the great Patsy Forbes hammering home the killer goal in the second replay, which Ardboe went on to win. It was a long, sad journey home.

Q. Favourite club memory?

A. The club has given me quite a few memorable days over the years. Probably one of the best was getting to the 1979 Tyrone Senior County Final when Fintona played An Charraig Mhór. I played corner back that day. This came on the back of three previous

Championship Final appearances. Fintona won the 1976 Junior Final and went on to reach the Intermediate Final in 1977, where they lost to Omagh but came back the very next year to defeat Killyclogher in the final. I played at midfield in both those finals. In 1980, we almost made it back to the senior final, only for Omagh to pip us at the semi-final stage. One of my bleakest memories playing for the club came in 1985. I had just turned 43, and I was playing against Aughabrack. I had played in the reserve game, before coming on in the senior game. I was going for a ball, one-on-one, with the 'keeper and we collided. In the clash, I shattered my leg. Thankfully, the ball somehow trickled over the line for a goal. It was to be my last ever score in a Fintona jersey and my last-ever touch in a competitive game. They wanted to abandon the game but I said 'No Way!' Fintona were in front at the time.

Q: Favourite county memory? A: Probably the sweetest victory I can recall as a Tyrone supporter was beating our neighbours Armagh to win the Sam Maguire for the first time. This was something I always longed to witness, and thankfully, I was there to savour the moment. I remember running on to Croke Park in 1986, when Tyrone beat Galway in the All Ireland semifinal. I thought back then that it was going to be Tyrone's year. I recollect carrying Pat McKeown from Galbally on my shoulders and me not that long off the crutches,

following that leg break I've already mentioned. You could say I got carried away with the occasion.

Q. What makes the GAA unique for you?

A. I feel that the GAA offers something special in the way that people give freely of their time and just want to be a part of their club. I also feel that no matter where you go, no matter what county or country you're in, you always meet someone you know from the GAA world. I have made friends all over, just from being a member of a great organisation.

Q. How do you think Tyrone will do in this year's championship? A. Tyrone are struggling somewhat

at present, but to be fair, we haven't had our strongest team out and I am convinced that once the championship comes around. you will see a different Tyrone side. I feel that only then will you see the Tyrone of old and we will not be too far away come September.

Waiting for Godot

For two counties with proud records of service to An CLG, it is remarkable that both Tír Eoghain and Dún na nGall had to wait so long for success in senior football competition.

Tír Eoghain won a first Ulster senior title in 1956, after years of frustration and then had to wait until 2003 to claim that elusive All-Ireland title. The All-Ireland triumph came in the wake of backto-back National League titles in 2002 and 2003.

In Dún na nGall's case, the first Ulster title came in 1972, and 20 years later, the supreme accolade, the All-Ireland senior title, was won (1992).

A first success in the National

League was achieved just last year – 2007.

Yet, in addition to these years of glory, followers of both counties can look back and enjoy the memories of great individual performances, and indeed great team performances, while they were waiting for the ultimate breakthrough.

A Decade of Promises

In terms of Ulster football, it would have to be said that the 1960's were dominated by Down and Cavan.

Down played in every Ulster final from 1958-1969, winning 7 Ulster titles and, even more spectacularly, winning 3 All-Ireland titles In that same period, Cavan played in 8 Ulster finals, winning 4 Ulster crowns.

So apart from the big two of Down and Cavan, there was little left by way of success for any other county. Yet Donegal promised much and challenged very strongly, reaching the Ulster finals of 1963 and 1966, but lost to Down on both occasions.

The strength of Ulster football in the 1960's can be gauged from the fact that Down won 3 All-Ireland titles and that Ulster won 6 Railway Cups, including 4 in-arow, at a time when the Railway Cup was at its prestigious best.

The strength of Donegal football in the 1960s can be gauged from the fact that players like Seamus Hoare, PJ Flood, Sean Ferriter, Frankie McFeely, Bernard Brady, Paul Kelly, Michael McLoone, Martin Griffin and Neilly Gallagher were selected for Ulster and all played starring roles.



...promises delivered

Donegal people can look back to the 1970s with some satisfaction, as 3 Ulster final appearances produced 2 Ulster Senior titles – a first-ever in 1972 and a second in 1974.

But it is the '90s when promises were really fulfilled. 5 Ulster final appearances in-a-row, 1989-'93, brought 2 Ulster titles – in 1990 and 1992. The 1992 victory goes down in history as the gateway to a first-ever All-Ireland senior title.

The promise was finally fulfilled – Sam was 'for the hills!'

In the case of Tír Eoghain, the 'no

better place' was finally arrived at in 2003. Before the supreme triumph, 10 Ulster titles were won between 1956 and 2003 and there was the glory of that first All-Ireland final appearance in 1986 and the sheer agony of the frustrating and controversial one-point defeat in 1995.

In both counties, promises finally delivered were sweetly savoured.


Bridging gaps ...the strongest links

When Tír Eoghain appeared in the Ulster senior final in 1972 for the first time since 1957, the winning Minor captain of that year, Frank McGuigan was also part of the senior team.

He was back the next year, 1973, as captain of the Tyrone team which won the Anglo-Celt Cup for the third time in the county's history. It was more than a decade later when the Ulster title was won for the fourth time in 1984. Frank McGuigan famously played such a leading role that the 1984 Ulster Final is often referred to as 'the McGuigan Final.'

Dún na nGall won the Ulster senior title for the first time in 1972. All members of the panel were revered as history makers and rightly so. One man who won himself a special place in the folklore of Dún na nGall football was the natural born leader on the field. Brian McEniff.

Twenty years later (1992), Dún na nGall dramatically won a first All-Ireland title and the natural born leader on the line,



successfully planning the downfall of the Dubs, was one Brian McEniff.




Making their mark...

one remaining player currently taking his chance in his debut season with the senior panel. In recent years, Martin Swift has developed into a rock-steady corner back and his qualities are






Last weekend saw Tyrone's superb run in the Suzuki mational league draw to a close, with a two point loss to old rivals Armagh, at Beragh.

Tyrone handball suffered a huge loss in the month of March with the sudden passing of Carrickmore stalwart, Paddy Grogan.


