

It goes without saying that the participation of our children in our games is not just hugely important to our association but also to society in general. Huge challenges face our organisation now and in the future. A recent G.A.A. survey of all the counties in Leinster showed Kildare having the largest underage population outside of Dublin. The population of the under 9 age group now stands at over 30,000 in Kildare alone, a figure that is greater than the entire population of some counties.

On one hand it is a positive position to find ourselves in, on the other hand it creates huge challenges in relation to facilities and manpower. Most clubs biggest concern is in the area of manpower or lack of it. How many times have we heard the cry from club officials that they don't have enough mentors to look after their various underage teams. I am asking any parents or adults with an interest or just a passing interest in our games to get involved in their local club and help us nurture and harvest the potential talent that we have within the county.









Kildare's James Kavanagh tries to get away from Damien Burke of Galway.

## Sam's for the Hills

In a well-known hostelry in the vicinity of Croke Park some hours and several beverages after the 1990 All-Ireland football final I listened attentively as a prominent member of the Donegal team boldly proclaimed that his county would win the All-Ireland within the next four years.

"What makes you think that," I asked. "If we haven't won it by then we'll never win it. I'm 28 years of age now and I've only got four more years left as a Donegal player," came the reply.

Silently, I wondered was the Steve Miller band's big hit of the time, "The Joker" inspired by this footballing prophet!

Donegal had won the Ulster title a few months previously for the first time since 1983. In the All-Ireland semi-final they performed heroically before yielding to a very experienced Meath team.

For Donegal to take Sam to the hills for the first time a very competitive Ulster championship, fraught with concealed trapdoors, would have to be surmounted once again. Then the Croke Park hoodoo, no senior championship victory there, would have to be exorcised.

After breaking that bogey how would they cope with the pressure, the nerves, the hype and the tension that football's greatest occasion is liberally laced with? Add in the ever-increasing number of new admirers singing (demanding!) Maria McKee's 1990 chart-topper "Show Me Heaven"! Donegal for Sam? It sounded incongruous.

In 1991 they reached the Ulster final for the third year in a row. But the "Great Expectations" of their fans had been replaced by "Hard Times" long before this contest petered out. It wasn't Charles Dickens that wrote the script! It was Pete McGrath.

The Down manager had his side superbly tuned. In delivering the best performance by any team from the Mourne county for several years they displayed skill, flair, drive and incisiveness. Their team-work was flawless and their long-range point-taking was immaculate.

At half-time with Down leading by 1-9 to 0-5 I observed several disgruntled Donegal supporters quietly departing the famous hill that in those days overlooked the Clones pitch. Dreams shattered. Sam Maguire, a forlorn reverie!

A mini-revival was staged by Donegal after the break which reduced the deficit to four points. A wonderful save by Down's netminder Neil Collins quelled the insurgence.

That stop started a procession as Down pulled out all the stops to regain control throughout the field. It finished with a comfortable Down success, 1-15 to 0-10.

It didn't shock any observers of this Down tour de force when the Sam Maguire Cup returned to the mountains of Mourne in September for the first time since 1968. It was to be the beginning of an unprecedented four year Sam and Ulster union.

Donegal almost fell by the Cavan wayside in the first round of the 1992 Ulster championship at Breffni Park. In a marvellous game against a spirited home side they, as is said in other codes, got a result!

A week later in Ballybofey they easily obliterated Cavan's challenge. In the semifinal Fermanagh were disposed of by a whopping sixteen points margin.

In the Ulster final at Clones a magnificent performance in front of 35,000 spectators restored Donegal's All-Ireland optimism and regained the Anglo-Celt Cup. Donegal came from behind and a man down (for all of the second half) to deservedly beat the National League champions Derry who had knocked Down out of the race.


On that same day, Sunday 19th July, at the Gaelic Grounds on the Ennis Road in Limerick, a shock of seismic proportions was registered by the footballers of Clare

who beat Kerry in the Munster final.

In Connacht, Mayo were crowned champions after experimenting with a radical training method, pushing cars! Mick O'Dwyer steered his Kildare charges to a Leinster final place but the great white hopes were dashed by Dublin.

Much was said and written about the influence of Dublin's half back line, not only on this victory but throughout the Leinster campaign. "We play as a unit" became the catchphrase of a certain Dublin defender. It was repeated ad nauseum. This naive attitude lulled the Dubs into a false sense of invincibility.

In the first of the All-Ireland semi-finals at Croke Park on Sunday 16th August, Donegal created a surplus of chances but shot an inordinate number of woeful wides against Mayo. It was a very poor game but this didn't matter to Donegal who broke the hoodoo and advanced by four points to the All-Ireland final.

One week later Croke Park experienced one of its most colourful-ever days when the Clare footballers and their massive army of saffron and blue clad supporters came to town for the first time since 1917.

The disallowing of a perfectly legitimate Clare goal and the allowing of a dodgy Dublin goal probably decided this game. For the first time all year Dublin's half back line instead of attacking were retreating in the face of Clare's strong running at them. The "unit" looked vulnerable but the flashing blue lights were ignored in the euphoria of victory.

Donegal's shrewd manager Brian McEniff, who attended the game, observed the vulnerability of the "unit". He departed, convinced that the deploying of Clare's tactics by Donegal could destroy the Dubs in the final.

"You've seen the green and gold of Kerry, you've seen the green and gold of Offaly but you've never seen anything like the green and gold of Donegal." The immortal words of Mícheál O'Hehir when Donegal entered the Croke Park arena for the 1983 All-Ireland semi-final against Galway.

Sunday 20th September 1992 completely surpassed that '83 spectacle. Croke Park was a cauldron of colour, emotion and sound. The atmosphere was incredible. Was the prophecy of 1990 about to experience its fulfilment? The "prophet" himself was on the field and ready for a massive battle for supremacy.

Donegal started nervously and trailed by two points to one when Dublin were fortuitously awarded a penalty in the ninth minute. The sigh of relief from the huge Donegal following when Charlie Redmond blazed the kick wide at the Canal End could be clearly heard as far away as Malin Head!

The nerves disappeared and Donegal began to impose their will on the game. They ran at the Dublin defence in a Clarelike manner. The "unit" was torn to shreds, making a mockery of the pre-match, "comfortable Dubs victory" predictions.

At half-time the green and gold wearers led by 0-10 to 0-7.

In the second half Donegal were clearly the better team restricting their opponents to a meagre two points in the opening 25 minutes. Their lead had been extended to six points, 0-15 to 0-9 as the last ten minutes approached.

Three points in as many minutes had a previously subdued Hill 16 reacting in a typically boisterous manner.

Manus Boyle and Redmond exchanged pointed frees before the former landed his ninth point with four minutes remaining. Four long, agonising minutes away from football's greatest prize!

As the game entered its last two minutes the Dubs brought it back to three points again via a free. With thirty seconds still to be played Declan Bonner kicked the most applauded point ever in the history of Donegal G.A.A. The insurance score! A silent Hill 16! A scoreboard stating Donegal 0-18, Dublin 0-14.

From the kick-out Donegal take possession of the ball. Bonner seeks it but receives a heavy challenge. Referee Tommy Sugrue blows the final whistle. Donegal – All-Ireland champions, for the first time.



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### SAM'S FOR THE HILLS continued

Two years after it had been defiantly made the prophecy had been fulfilled. The prophet himself had an outstanding game. An All-Ireland medal was now his, to savour for ever more.

Amazingly every Donegal player performed superbly, which represented a unique achievement for a team appearing in a final for the first time. It was a brilliant attacking display. Eleven of their points, two of which could have been goals were scored from play.

The sheer outpouring of emotion that greeted the game's conclusion has rarely if ever been witnessed at Croke Park. It was the essence of sporting romanticism.

When captain Anthony Molloy concluded his deeply moving speech with the never to be forgotten words "Sam's For The Hills" the rapturous response sparked off a winter of wild celebrations.

Hours later in the Grand Hotel in Malahide, Daniel O'Donnell entertained the delirious gathering of Donegal players and supporters. But on this historic night, for a change, he was upstaged by the heroes of the day, the 1992 All-Ireland football champions.

Sam was heading for the hills!

## THE CUP

The National Football League winners receive the Irish National Insurance Cup. It was first presented to Kerry at the conclusion of the 1929 final. The recipient was Joe Barrett from Rock Street, Tralee, who was born on 17th July 1902. A member of the famous Austin Stack's Club he won a total of 4 National League, 9 Munster and 6 All-Ireland medals. He also received the Sam Maguire "Cup as the Kingdom's captain in 1929 and '32.

Kildare then displayed their tremendous battling qualities with points by John Doyle and Pádraig O'Neill reducing the deficit to five

points

A tremendous save by Paul Durcan deprived the Lilies of a certain goal. Shortly afterwards Kildare's perseverance was rewarded when Doyle clinically netted a penalty. The Allenwood man then registered a point after his impressive clubmate, Mark Hogarty, provided the pass.





# GEEZER'S GLORY TRAIL PART I - TO HELL AND BACK

DESPITE the facile nature of Kerry's victories in the last two All-Ireland finals there is no quick, easy way of capturing the Sam Maguire Cup.

It requires the patience of a Bertieprobing Judge Mahon, the perseverance of a Derby-chasing Frankie Dettori and the passion of a perfection-seeking Roy Keane.

If any young or aspiring Kildare player thinks otherwise then he should have a chat with Kieran McGeeney. Alternatively having wisely invested less than the price of a pint in today's match programme he could at his leisure please read on!

It was a scorcher of a day in the city of Armagh. The Athletic Grounds was packed to its 14,000 capacity. The BBC cameras and commentators were there to provide live coverage.

It was the first round of the Ulster championship, an all ticket clash of the reigning All-Ireland champions Down and an Armagh side comprising of novices and thoroughbreds.

Armagh introduced four debutants. One of them wore the number 4 jersey. His name was Kieran McGeeney. Sunday 7th June 1992 was to provide him with a baptism of brimstone.

Prior to the throw-in he switched to the right half back positition to get to know Gary Mason!

Twelve hard-hitting minutes after the last strains of Amhrán na bhFiann had died away his championship aspirations lay shattered, like Brian Boru's ashes, in the bosom of Armagh city.

A head-on collision with the Down powerhouse, Conor Deegan, saw the Geezer depart for hospital suffering from facial lacerations, a damaged arm and a broken collar-bone.

A glorious James McCartan goal in stoppage time raised the sun-baked roof and sent the title-holders to the dressing room leading by 1-5 to 0-3.

In a ferociously contested second half Down picked off a further seven points while the home side added six to their tally. Gary Mason was chosen as man of the match after shooting eight points, seven from frees. It was only the second time ever that Down had recorded a championship victory on Armagh soil.

Six gruelling matches in the following year's championship proved fruitless for the Orchard County men.

On Sunday 16th May 1993 Fermanagh and Armagh scored 1-9 apiece at Irvinestown. A week later at the Athletic Grounds, Armagh came from nine points down to edge out their visitors on the amazing scoreline of 4-8 to 1-16.

If there is such a thing as an inspired substitution it was made after 55 minutes of this replay. On came a 22-year-old student, appropriately named Denis Hollywood, who stole the show by scoring two goals and one point. His starring role won the match for Armagh and for him the man of the match award.

Kieran McGeeney missed those encounters due to a hamstring injury picked up in training in Bundoran on Saturday 8th May while testing a previous hamstring problem under sprint conditions.

Next up, Tyrone. Another two game saga ensued. Episode one with the Geezer still an absentee, was a full-blooded thriller. The superb free-taking of John Toner denied Tyrone a first championship victory at the Athletic Grounds since 1904. Armagh had two points to spare in the replay at Healy Park, Omagh, with McGeeney entering the action in the 53rd minute.

A minefield lay in waiting in the semifinal at Breffni Park, the previous year's All-Ireland champions, Donegal.

It was an extraordinary inconclusive epic of fluctuating fortunes culminating in a last gasp levelling Donegal point. A fully fit McGeeney had the 1992 footballer of the year Martin McHugh in his pocket for the second half.

This game marked the 100th competitive appearance for Donegal of their charismatic full-back Matt Gallagher.

McHugh got his revenge in the replay by roasting McGeeney as Donegal asserted their 'independence' on Sunday 4th July with a magnificent display. Armagh were totally outclassed and also outscored by 2-16 to 1-7.

In torrential rain at the Athletic Grounds, Armagh began their 1994 championship campaign with a 1-6 to 0-6 win over Fermanagh. In their next outing, Tyrone ended Armagh's dream for at least another

The men from the Orchard County only got one bite at the championship cherry in each of the following three seasons. They lost dismally to Derry in both '95, when McGeeney experienced difficulties with Damian Barton, and '96. Tyrone completed a miserable three-in-a-row for them a year later

Derry again came back to torment them in the 1998 semi-final after Armagh had defeated Down in their opener.

Dark and gloomy days were replaced in 1999 by a shining light at the end of the tunnel.

It took two games to dismiss Donegal. A closing stages point by Diarmaid Marsden saw off Derry in one of the best games of the year.

On Sunday 1st August at Clones, a magnificent Armagh display illuminated by a 2-7 Óisín McConville contribution put down Down in the Anglo-Celt Cup decider. Armagh were now champions of Ulster for the first time since 1982 and Kieran McGeeney in his eighth successive campaign had finally won that elusive provincial souvenir.

The rocky road to Dublin had become smooth at last for Armagh. In the All-Ireland semi-final at Croke Park they led Meath by 2-4 to 0-8 at half-time but thereafter their challenge fizzled out, only notching one further point. However, a new ray of hope emerged when Meath went on to win the final.

With McGeeney now as captain Armagh made it back-to-back Ulster crowns in 2000. Luck deserted them in Croke Park against Kerry at the penultimate stage. On several occasions over the two games plus extra time their moment appeared to have arrived. It was not to be. Kerry survived and went on to win the All-Ireland.

Tyrone dumped Armagh out of the 2001 Ulster championship in round one. But for the first time a back door had opened.

Armagh defeated Down and Monaghan before losing in a round 3 qualifers match in Croke Park to Galway who subsequently won the All-Ireland.

With Joe Kernan as manager 2002 began with a drawn encounter with Tyrone. Armagh narrowly claimed victory in the replay before comfortable seeing off Fermanagh in the semi-final. They had four point to spare against Donegal in the Ulster final at Clones on Sunday 7th July.

Lady luck, a deserter from Armagh's armoury in previous years, returned for the remainder of the season. Her return was needed. A lively Sligo prevented them from gaining a victory in the All-Ireland quarter-final at Croke Park and only failed by two points in the replay at Navan. A thrilling one point victory over Dublin in the semi-final supplied Kieran McGeeney with the opportunity of a lifetime.

Could a torturous journey end in glory?

IT'S 5 a.m. on a Monday morning. The village of Saggart about ten miles from Dublin's city centre is the place to be. No thoughts of work. Not even a mention of bed.

A cacophony of sound greets a new dawn. Citywest Hotel can barely accommodate the delirious crowd. The uplifting and roof-raising singing of "The Boys from the County Armagh" wipes away the sorrows of 1953 and '77. Tears of joy are shed in the celebrating of a glorious achievement, the capturing of Sam for the first time.

Invited guests and 'guests' who invited themselves all savour a 'new dawn' in every sense. Bet Jim Mansfield never dreamt of

Monday mornings like this! Bet the composer of Armagh's greatest song never envisaged his words gaining such acclaim. Those standing idly by could hardly remain unmoved as rendition after rendition of the famous anthem passionately reverberated around the hotel.

Even a militant atheist like Richard Dawkins if he walked in would find it difficult not to say "to hell with begrudgers, thank God for such an occasion of pure

heavenly bliss!"

Had those nuns from Omeath who knitted Armagh's first set of orange and white jerseys in 1926 appeared, one wonders would they have been able to remain faithful to all of their vows! How times had changed fron an evening in September of 1942 when five members of the local Saggart club, St. Mary's, Paddy O'Connor, Paddy Bermingham, Gerry Fitzgerald, Caleb Crone and Peter O'Reilly (later a Kildare trainer) returned home after helping Dublin beat Galway in the All-Ireland final.

Armagh had now reached their footballing nirvana.

The party had begun about twelve hours previously when referee John Bannon signalled an end to the 2002 All-Ireland final with Kieran McGeeney fittingly in possession of the football. The prophecy on one of their many banners, "Thine is the Kingdom, Ours is the Glory", had been fulfilled.

Croke Park became an ocean of orange and white. The waves parted to allow their king ascend to the throne. Seán Kelly spoke. The disciples waited. And then the Sam Maguire Cup was handed over to the mighty Mullaghbawn man.

But at half-time on Sunday 22nd September 2002 fears of another crop failure for the Orchard County were being expressed by many in the 79,500 crowd.

Armagh started brightly but lost control after about ten minutes as Kerry's style and speed threatened to demolish their fullback line. Five unanswered Kerry points between the 18th and the 26th minute left Armagh trailing by 0-9 to 0-5. Diarmaid Marsden reduced the deficit to three points but another Kingdom surge opened up a gap of five, 0-11 to 0-6.

A boost came for Armagh after 34 minutes in the form of a penalty but Declan O'Keeffe saved from Oisín McConville. Marsden delivered another point to leave the scoreboard reading Armagh 0-7 Kerry 0-11 at the break.

In the second half Armagh got on top at midfield thus limiting the supply of ball into Kerry's danger men. Also their half-backs began to tackle superbly and then surged forward inspirationally. In fact all over the field Armagh showed tremendous character and amazing bottle as every man stood up and was counted. It was a fantastic display of team-work. Kerry had no answer and from play in that second 35 minutes of action could only muster one solitary point.

Armagh's most important ever goal was splendidly executed in the 54th minute. Andrew McCann soloed from the Canal End side in front of the Hogan Stand towards the Railway end before parting to Oisín McConville. He gave the ball to Paul McGrane who returned it to McConville. A great low drive by the Crossmaglen man to the corner of the Kerry net and Croke Park erupted.

Ronan Clarke four minutes later kicked a magnificent equaliser. In the 62nd minute Steven McDonnell sealed it with the game's last score. Armagh 1-12, Kerry 0-14.

Joe Kernan's troops had taken the spoils in their greatest battle. Their inner belief, heart and skill had made the shared dream of generations of Armagh supporters become a reality. And then they began to sing "The Boys from the County Armagh".

## Great White Hopes woods

## **Gary White**

Gary White made an impressive National Football League debut for Kildare under the Omagh lights on Sat. 2nd Feb. 2008 in the division one, round one, drawn encounter with Tyrone.



His many talents have been in evidence from an early age. In 2004 at the age of 17 he was one of the stars of the Kildare team that reached the Leinster minor final.

The following year he helped Sarsfields win the Kildare senior championship title. He scored two points, one of which was a brilliantly struck '45, in the replayed final against St. Laurence's. Gary followed this up in '05 with a county minor championship medal. In the final he gave an outstanding display which gained him the man of the match award. Seven months previously he lined out at left half forward on the Kildare side that defeated Westmeath in the Leinster minor league decider at Carbury.

Last year he was a county under-21 medal winner with the 'Sash'.

Gary has also represented Kildare at under-21 level in 2006, '07 and '08.

His grandfather, the legendary Paddy 'Boiler' White, was one of Kildare's greatest ever footballers. In 2000 he was chosen at centre half forward on Kildare's millennium team. He has also received the Kildare G.A.A. hall of fame award. With his club Sarsfields he won 5 S.F.C, medals.

When Mícheál Ó Muircheartaigh made his first live radio broadcast on St. Patrick's Day 1949 the 'Boiler' was the wearer of Leinster's number 11 jersey in the Railway Cup final at Croke Park against Munster.

Don't bet against Mícheál commentating on some big game at Croke Park in the not too distant future that features the 'Boiler's' grandson, Gary White in the Lilywhite jersey.

### **Alan Smith**

With 17 minutes remaining in Kildare's first league match of 2008 at Healy Park, Omagh. Kieran McGeeney revealed his trump card. It was Alan Smith.

The 21-year-old used his pace and intellect to set up what could yet be hailed as Kildare's most important league goal of 2008. This significant contribution in his first league appearance is just a further manifestation of the innate football class of the Sarsfields tyro.

Alan's playing career has followed a similar route to that of Gary White's, two years on the county minor team, three years on the county under-21 team.

He played in the 2004 Leinster minor final against Laois. In '05 he won a Leinster minor league medal before completing the senior and minor county championship double with the 'Sash'. Last year he added a county under-21 medal to his collection.

With more than a few drops of 'blue' blood in his veins (his father Tom hails from Laois), it is inevitable that Alan Smith will be a regal performer.

Alan is a cousin of the former Laois football star Tommy Smith.

## **Tom Corley**

Three days before his 22nd birthday Thomas Corley completed a notable Leinster treble. On Sunday 3rd December 2006 at O'Moore Park, Portlaoise, he donned the number 1 jersey in the Leinster club final.



He won his first Leinster medal at the same venue on May Day 2004 when guarding the net for the Kildare team that defeated Dublin in the replay of the under-21 final. A second was secured two months later, as the reserve keeper, on Kildare's

junior team that overcame Dublin at St. Conleth's Park in the provincial decider.

Tom was also between the posts at Croke Park when Kildare failed by two points (0-13 to 0-11) to the city side in the replay of the 2005 Leinster under-21 final.

He has also splendidly protected the Moore's net in their county senior final triumphs of 2006 and '07. In 2002 he was a panel member when Moorefield beat Sarsfields in the county final.

Tom delivered the goods, yet again, in his league debut in Omagh last month.

## **Mark Scanlon**

Eighteen days before celebrating his 18th birthday, Mark Scanlon was in sparkling form for his club Round Towers in their county senior final victory over Kilcock on Sunday 21st September 2003 at St. Conleth's Park, Newbridge.

In that same year's Leinster minor league decider he partnered James Kavanagh at midfield on the Kildare team that beat Laois who subsequently won the All-Ireland crown.

Mark, who is a final year degree student of Exercise & Health at Waterford I.T. represented his county at under-21 level in 2004, '05 and '06 before making his National League debut against Armagh at Newbridge last year.

His exploits in the under-21 grade were rewarded with both Leinster (2004) and Kildare (2006) medals.

On Sunday 25th February 2007 Mark scored his first league point for Kildare after a fantastic solo-run from his wing back berth against Derry at St. Conleth's Park.

This Kildare colleges senior championship medal winner with St. Joseph's Academy, Kildare town, experienced his first taste of Leinster senior championship fare when sprung from the bench against Meath at Croke Park last May.

## **Ken Donnelly**

Ken Donnelly made his National League debut and also scored a point after replacing Johnny Doyle at St. Conleth's Park in the 60th minute of Kildare's round six game against Waterford on Sunday 21st March 2004.

The previous year he made four senior championship appearances for the Lilies. His first was at Mullingar on Sunday



25th May when he came on against Longford in the Leinster quarter-final. He also came on against Meath in the semifinal and Laois in the final. He got his first start in the subsequent All-Ireland qualifiers match against Roscommon at Portlaoise.

Ken scored 1-2 in Ellistown's 1999 Junior A championship final victory over Ardclough. A year later he was top scorer with a 1-4 return when Ellistown had one point to spare against Ballyteague in the 2000 county intermediate final at Sarsfields Park. To complete a memorable afternoon he was also awarded the man of the match trophy.

Other important medals in Ken's collection include Jack Higgins Cup (1999) and county under-21 B (2000 and 2001).

His father Martin and his uncles Paddy, Brendan and Jack all played for Ellistown against Carbury in the 1972 Kildare senior final

Jack Donnelly will go down in history as one of Kildare's greatest ever footballers. This 1965 All-Ireland under-21 medal winner received public acknowledgement of his wonderful service to the Lilywhite cause when being chosen at right half forward on Kildare's millennium team in 2000.

Yes, Ken has got the perfect pedigree.

## Morgan O'Flaherty

With a county senior final winning captain as father, a Leinster club medal winning uncle and a Kerry grandfather it was always a strong possibility that Morgan O'Flaherty would distinguish himself as a footballer.

His father Denis captained Raheens to

victory in the 1978 Kildare county senior football final. He also sampled success in the deciders of '73 (panel member), '76 and '79. At minor level Denis won back-to-back county titles (1971 and '72) while in the under-21 grade he captured



a county souvenir in '74. He also helped the Caragh-based club win 3 Leinster Leader Cups.

Morgan, a brother of Denis, was a member of the Raheens panel that took possession of the Dermot Bourke in 1981. He lined out at centre half forward in their Leinster club final victory over Portlaoise in 1982 at Athy.

Young Morgan, who made his league debut in Omagh on 2nd February 2008, impacted hugely on Carbury's Aldridge Cup final victories of 2003 and 2004.

## Pádraig Mullarkey

Featuring in his 24th National League match and his first since being introduced as a substitute against Laois in round 7 at Porlaoise on Sunday 9th April 2006,




Pádraig Mullarkey scored his first-ever league goal for Kildare against Tyrone. Its significance could yet assume a more elevated status. Irrespective of future happenings this Omagh three pointer on Saturday 2nd February 2008 was a tremendous point earner for Kildare.

Pádraig obtained his first league start against Meath on Sunday 9th April 2000 in a round 7 match at Newbridge when he donned the number 4 jersey. His first point in the league was scored in Ballina against Mayo on Sunday 9th March 2003.

Also in '03 he produced a massive display for Round Towers in the Kildare county senior final against Kilcock. Although operating at midfield he made the entire arena his stage. A feature of this performance was his powerfully struck goal after a dazzling solo run straight through the Kilcock defence. He went home victorious with the added bonus of the man of the match trophy.

In his pre-Towers days, Pádraig won a Jack Higgins Cup, county junior A, county intermediate and 2 county under-21 B championship medals with Ellistown. With Kildare he has won Leinster senior (as a panellist) and O'Byrne Cup medals.

In recent years Ken and Murt have attained senior inter-county status follow ing promising underage careers in the Lilywhite jersey.

Mary's youngest son, Michael, represented Kildare in the 2006 Leinster minor championship.

All Kildare gaels wish both Murt and Michael a quick return to full health following recent injuries.

# Pat Buckley's Finest Half-hour!

In their first ever competitive clash, Kildare defeated Donegal by 3-7 to 0-11 at St. Conleth's Park, Newbridge, on Sunday 23rd October 1966 in the



Gaelic Weekly tournament semi-final.

With Ollie Crinnigan absent through injury the new Kildare selectors, Matt Murray, Art Aspell, Ollie Reilly, Larry McCormack, Toss McCarthy and Jim Clarke picked Straffan's Tony Kane as goalkeeper for this match.

At half-time they replaced him with Pat Buckley, a son of the three times All-Ireland medal winner Mick and an uncle of All-Star 'Nuckser'

The Sarsfields man was Kildare's hero in the second half against a goal-hungry Donegal attack. Displaying alertness, agility and anticipation, he made numerous vital saves that Gordon Banks would have been thrilled with, three months previously in the World Cub final at Wembley Stadium. In his first five minutes alone between the posts Pat brilliantly saved three rasping shots that seemed destined for the back of the Kildare net. Thereafter he continually denied the Donegal strike-force.

Kildare's goals were put away by Leo Long, Brian Judge and Pat Nally. Kevin Kelly was top scorer with five points while Jack Donnelly raised the Lilies other two white flags.

In the Gaelic Weekly final two weeks later at Croke Park, Mayo, the conquerors of Kerry in the other semi-final, comfortably defeated Kildare.

However, the semi-final will always be remembered as Pat Buckley's finest half-hour.

His son Fintan captained the 1987 Leinster title winning Kildare minor team.

## **Jobs For The Boys!**

When Kildare beat Cavan in the 1928 All-Ireland final all of the umpires and linesmen were members of the G.A.A.'s Central Council. The chosen six were Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan (Kerry), W. P. Clifford (Limerick), J. J. Callinan (Tipperary), S. T. O'Brien P.C. (Mayo), P. Brennan (Sligo) and C. Flynn (Leitrim).

The referee was Alderman Tom Burke from Drogheda.

Most Rev. Dr. Cullen, the Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin, greeted the players before the throw-in. The rival captains, Bill 'Squires' Gannon and Jim Smith, then had the privilege of bending their knees to kiss the episcopal ring!

## On A Train Bound For Croker!

On Sunday 30th September 1928, 26 special trains departed from all parts of the country for that afternoon's All-Ireland football final. A total of 12,778 fans availed of the 'specials' which served Dublin's four railway stations, Amiens Street, Broadstone, Westland Row and Kingsbridge.

At Newbridge 382 people boarded one of the trains but the record was set in Cavan town where 800 fans managed to get on board.

## **Donegal's Kildare Medal Winner**

Donegal's Rory Kavanagh is the holder of 2 Kildare county football championship medals. In 2001 he lined out at midfield for NUI Maynooth who defeated Confey by 5-11 to 0-5 at Leixlip's Radley Park in the county under-21 A final. Also on that successful college side were Marc Ó Sé (Kerry), Alan Dillon (Mayo), Ross Munnelly (Laois) and Dublin's Barry Cahill and Alan Brogan.

Rory added a county under-20 medal to his collection when the students beat Clane by 2-14 to 1-8 in the 2002 decider. Once again his talents were deployed in a midfield berth. Dillon also collected his second Kildare medal when operating at right half forward for the 'blow-in' side. Bernard Brogan, a brother of Alan, featured at left half forward.

Last year Rory Kavanagh helped Donegal win their first ever National League title. On the losing Mayo team in the final was his old college mate Alan Dillon.

## **A First For Columba**

The first Donegal man to win an All-Ireland senior football championship medal on the field of play was Columba McDyer who played on the winning Cavan team against Kerry in the famous Polo Grounds, New York, final of 1947.

Columba's father, Alex, lined out in Donegal's first ever championship game against Derry in 1906. It was a disappointing start for Donegal who lost by 0-18 to 0-2 in Derry. Donegal didn't participate in the Ulster S.F.C. again until 1919.

In 1940, '41 and '42 Columba McDyer represented Donegal in the Ulster senior football championship. Ironically, the former St. Eunan's College student had his championship aspirations dashed in each of those years by Cavan.

He won back-to-back Railway Cup medals with Ulster in 1942 and '43 when his teammates included John Joe O'Reilly and Simon Deignan. The Glenties man in the course of his working life spent time in Sligo, Cavan, Dublin and Mayo before returning home to take up a teaching post in the late 1950s.

His spell in Cavan saw him declare for his old adversaries. He teamed up once again with O'Reilly and Deignan. All three were on board when Cavan won the only All-Ireland senior football final staged outside of Ireland. The employment opportunity that materialised in Cavan for Columba McDyer granted him the chance of a lifetime. He accepted it with both feet in the Polo Grounds.

## **Kildare's Greatest Scoring Season**

Since the G.A.A.'s Centenary Year of 1984, Kildare's best National Football League scoring season was 1989/90 when they amassed the massive overall tally of 28-134 from ten outings. This represented an average of 21.8 points per game.

The chief marksmen were Declan Kerrigan (8-31), Jarlath Gilroy (4-20) and David Fennin (6-8). The highest total score recorded in any one game was 4-25 against Kilkenny at Nowlan Park on Sunday 4th February 1990. The best individual feat was 3-5 by Declan Kerrigan against Carlow at Athy on Sunday 4th March 1990.

In the league quarter-final Cork beat Kildare by 4-10 to 4-5 at Portlaoise with Shay Fahy (2-2) and Larry Tomkins (1-5) emerging as the rebel's chief strikers!

## **Manus Boyle's Final Flings!**

The scoring of nine points by Manus Boyle in Donegal's 1992 All-Ireland final victory over Dublin maintained his incredible final day scoring tradition.

In the All-Ireland Vocational Schools final of 1984 he notched 2-1 as Donegal beat Longford by 3-9 to 2-3 to take the crown for the first time.

When Donegal drew with Kerry at Tuam in the 1987 All-Ireland under-21 final (1-7 to 0-10) Manus sent over four points.

At Hyde Park in Roscommon town in the replay the Killybegs man was in majestic scoring form. He accounted for 1-7 of Donegal's 1-12 tally. Kerry could only muster 2-4 in reply.

Also on that Donegal All-Ireland under-21 winning team were John Joe Doherty, John Cunningham (captain) and his brother Barry, Tommy Ryan and Barry McGowan, all of whom were members of the 1992 All-Ireland senior winning panel.

## It's Derry Next

Kildare's next league outing will be away to Derry on Saturday night 15th March. It will be the 15th meeting of the counties in the National League. Derry have emerged as victors on eight occasions while Kildare have taken the points from four encounters. The other two matches finished level.

In their last league meeting a year ago at St. Conleth's Park, Kildare won by 0-10 to 0-7. Their last league clash on Derry soil saw the home boys record an 0-11 to 0-9 victory at Celtic Park on Sunday 5th March 2006. In the only other Celtic Park showdown, on 4th February 1996, Derry narrowly overcame the Lilies by 1-6 to 0-7.

Ominously for Kildare a victory on Derry soil has never been achieved despite travelling to the Oakleaf county on seven occasions. The best result was an eight points all draw at Ballinascreen on Sunday 15th November 1998.

In championship football the counties have met only once. It was an All-Ireland qualifier match at Celtic Park two years ago which also saw Derry gaining the verdict on a scoreline of 1-17 to 0-11.
