



Can Roper break 147?

When he takes to field against Laois in Father Tierney Park today Brian Roper will clock up his 142nd senior appearance for Donegal. It marks another step on the road to passing a significant milestone in Donegal football. That milestone was set by Ballintra's legendary Matt Gallagher who lined out for Donegal on 147 occasions; the most by any player ever to wear the green and gold.

When Roper's began his county career in 1996 you wouldn't have put much money on him playing football into his thirties, never mind threatening the all-time appearance record. From the get-go he was an all-action performer, hungry for the ball. Then, as now, he was always ready put his body on the line to win possession he had no right to win.

But there was always more to Roper than fearless determination. His football intuition is startling. He has an uncanny knack of finding the man in space, spotting the unseen run. His passing is that of a man who believes every that ball is precious and has to be used to the utmost.

He's no mean score-taker himself either. It's a rare Donegal match report that doesn't feature his name in the scorer's column.

It shouldn't be overlooked that Roper is also a first class club man. Be it giving his all to Aodh Ruadh on the pitch, taking an under-age training session, giving out medals to the cubs, or just shooting the breeze up in Aras Aoidh Ruaidh with Pat Melaniff, he's Ballyshannon to the bone. It's his performances in the county jersey that define him though. He was central to an unbeaten league campaign for

Donegal last year. A campaign which was crowned by victory over Mayo in the final. Roper gave a sublime performance that day, tearing the Mayo defence asunder. You could see that this was one day Roper was damned if he was going to be on the losing side.

His immense contribution to the capture of the New Ireland trophy was recognised when he received the 'Player of the Year' award at the Annual Donegal GAA Banquet in February.

If all goes well for Donegal, Roper could clinch the appearance record at some stage in the 2008 Championship. With Brian McIver having built a Donegal team that finally looks like a realistic championship contender, who would bet against Roper celebrating not just securing the appearance record, but perhaps some of that long sought Championship silverware?

Laceys now behind Donegal

A man with Laois blood will play a big part for Donegal today in Ballyshannon - Karl Lacey - whose father, Joe, came to the county in the 1980s and has now become a 'Donegal man'.

From a tiny village called Luggacurran, near Stradbally, Joe is living and working in Donegal for over 20 years. And in those 20 years has contributed handsomely to Donegal football. And he continues to do so!

Living in Donegal Town, Joe is the current senior manager at Tir Chonaill Park. Having played for the club at senior level and having coached at various levels at the club since he first arrived in Donegal, he stepped into the top job at the beginning of the year.

"I moved to Donegal Town at the end of 1984, the year they won the championship and started playing with them the following season, and I played with the club right up to 1999," said Joe. Following his retirement he got involved in coaching and managed the reserve to team for a number of seasons winning a reserve championship before becoming a mentor to his brother-in-law, Michael Kelly.

His son Karl, who is a regular in the Donegal defence for the last four seasons already, has

been honoured with an All Star. His daughters Nicola and Kelly are All Ireland junior winners with Donegal with Kelly also picking up a replacement Ladies All Star.

The Lacey legacy does not end there either. The baby of the family, Josh, is in his second year in the county minors and is one of the players the Donegal underage boss, Martin Regan, is pinning his hopes on.

And like his brother Karl, Josh even at this early stage looks destined to follow his brother onto the Donegal senior team.

The Kelly side of the family will rightly lay some claim to the football blood lines. Joe's wife, Deborah, is a sister of Michael Kelly, a member of the first Donegal to claim All Ireland glory. Michael, who currently forms part of Brian McIver's backroom team, was the goalkeeper on the 1982 All Ireland winning U-21 team and later graduated to play between the posts for Donegal seniors.

But the Laceys and family connections have played their part too in Laois football.

Current Laois senior, Brian 'Beano' McDonald, Donie Brennan are all cousins of Joe's, while he played minor football for the county and his younger brother, Aidan, played minor, U-21 and senior with the county of the O'Moore's.

> "While all my brothers played with St. Josephs, one of the biggest clubs in Laois, I played my football with Ballylinan. Ballylinan was also a senior club," explained Joe.

"I played county minor for Laois, but that was all. I moved away from home shortly afterwards and I have spent more of my life here in Donegal than anywhere else. And Donegal is now very much my home."

But while this might be the case one the first result he listens for every weekend is that of Laois.

"Laois showed great promise for a number of years under Mick O'Dwyer and won a Leinster title. But things have gone down hill in the last year or so and they are already relegated with two games to go.

"This is very disappointing given they had so much success at minor level in the late 1990's. I'm not sure what's wrong and why the underage success cannot be repeated at senior level.

"Hopefully, they can turn it around in the championship. I don't think there is any great doubt but they have good young players coming through. They have young lads like O'Lochlainn

at centre back and young Tierney and Begley in the forwards and of course Donie Kingston and Donie Brennan. These are the lads that may eventually see them make the breakthrough."

But with his son Karl firmly installed in the Donegal seniors and young Josh tipped to join his bigger brother in the next few years Joe's bigger concern now is with the fortunes of his adopted Donegal.

But he will still continue to tune in for the Laois results and in particular how the clan members fare.







Flashback to 1982

Donegal make the big break through

LAOIS	0 -4	

That was the scoreline at Pearse Park, Longford when Donegal defated Laois in the U-21 semi-final on their way to a first ever All-Ireland title.

It was a miserable day for football. The rain, which came down in the proverbial bucketfuls before the match and during the first half, left the pitch a quagmire, with water lying in pools in several places.

But the teams strove manfully to over come the environment and succeeded at times in turning out football of a quality that one would not expect in the circumstances. Of course, a lot of it was also scrappy, with players slipping and sliding all over the place and misplaced passes and wasted scoring opportunities in abundance on both sides.

Given the conditions, it was a pity that either side had to lose, but Donegal deserved their victory. Both sides ended up with eight wides at the end, but overall Donegal had more of the play and missed better chances for goals. This was particularly true in the first half when Donegal had what bit of advantage there was from a diagonal breeze. They did most of the attacking and on a number of occasions split the Laois defence wide open with well worked moves but more often than not the last pass or last shot went a stray and so at half-t ime they went in with just a 0-3 to 0-2 lead, having shot five wides and missed two or three chances for goals.

The sun came out for the second half, but in the early part of the half things did not look bright for Donegal; in fact this was their worst period. They were completely out of it at midfield and for the first fifteen minutes, Laois kept them fairly well penned into their own half as they set up a blockade at midfield which Donegal found difficult to get past.

The drafting in of Donal Reid to combine with Sylvester Maguire, who had come on at half-time, stopped the rot in the middle of the field and it was Reid who got the winning point. From there until the end the play swung from end to end without either side managing a further score.

Joyce McMullan won the throw-in to setup the first attack for Donegal but it was Laois who had the first score when Christy Maguire took advantage of some laxness in the Donegal defence to point in the second minute.

The scores were level two minutes later when Charlie Mulgrew was fouled and Martin McHugh converted the free. Paul Carr shot hastily and wasted a good chance in the 6th minute and three minutes later the Laois' keeper smothered a close shot from Charlie Mulgrew.

Donegal went in front in the 10th minute when Joyce McMullan was fouled and McHugh pointed the free.

It was all square again two minutes later when Christy Maguire did likewise at the other end of the field.

SPLENDID POINT

Anthony Molloy shot wide before Donegal again took the lead in the 17th minute. Centre half-back Tommy McDermott carried the ball downfield, played a one-two with Pauric Gallagher, and then kicked a splendid point. Pauric Gallagher missed a chance three minutes later when he was set up by a brilliant move involving Joyce McMullan, Charlie Mulgrew and Seamus Meehan. Two minutes from half-time he was involved in the situation when the ball landed in the pool of water and just before half-time Joyce McMullan shot wide.

For the second half Sylvester Maguire came in to the game with Anthony Molloy moving

from midfield to full-forward and Paul Carr moved from there to corner forward in place of Patrick McGroarty who went off.

Laois ,who also reshuffled their side, attacked from the throw in and shot four wides in the first ten minutes of the half as they subjected Donegal to alot of pressure.

Their pressure finally brought results in the 11th minute when John Ramsbottom pointed to bring the scores level again.

The same player put Laois in front with a point from a free in the 14th minute and at that stage Donegal seemed to be on the slippery slope to defeat as almost every clearance from defence seemed to go to a Laois player.

But substitute Donal Reid began to make his presence felt and Donegal re-estblished themselves once again in the middle of the park. In the 16th minute he had a shot deflected for a '50' and from it Martin McHugh sent the ball straight and through between the posts to once more tie it all up.

Encouraged by that score, the Tirconaill boys pressed forward and a minute later Charlie Mulgrew worked his way up the left wing. He lost the ball as he tried to cut in side but it fell to Reid who promptly put it over the bar for what proved to be the winner.

Two minutes later Anthony Molloy failed to take advantage of a good chance brought about by another good Donegal move and three minutes later Paul Carr shot across the face of the goals and wide.

Donegal's last shot at goal came three minutes from the final whistle when Eunan McIntyre linked with Tommy McDermott and Charlie Mulgrew before shooting wide from long range.

Donegal-Laois meetings

Donegal's last meeting with the men from Laois was thirteen years ago in Portlaoise in the 1995/1996 League season. In all they have met nine times with Donegal winning five, losing three and one game was drawn.

In the mid-nineties they met four times in the space of eighteen months between April 1994 and November 1995 including two games in Portlaoise and two in Croke Park - a quarter-final and a semi-final.

In their last meeting in late 1995 Donegal had defeated Clare and Tyrone respectively before travelling south and they they returned victorious by 1-10 to 0-8.

It was the occasion of Manus Boyle's 99th game for the county and he celebrated with five points. The goal came from MacCumhaills Eamon McMenamin.

April 30th 1995 - Croke Park Donegal 1-14, Laois 2-8

Donegal had to overcome a very strong Laois team in the National League semifinal in Croke Park. Laois twice took a one point lead in the second half before Donegal eventually prevailed.

They met Derry in the final, losing out by 0-12 to 0-8, in what was a very difficult time as they were out in the championship the following week after the league final against Down in Clones.

The Donegal team in that semi-final was: Gary Walsh; John Joe Doherty, Matt


