HIGH INDIVIDUAL SCORING A FEATURE OF OPENING ROUND

The first round of the All-Ireland senior football championship last week-end was marked by a number of very impressive individual match returns.

Top of the chart in splendid style is Ian Ryan's superb 3-7, a goal from a penalty and three points for Limerick in their win over Meath at Limerick. He scored a goal from a penalty

and three points from frees.

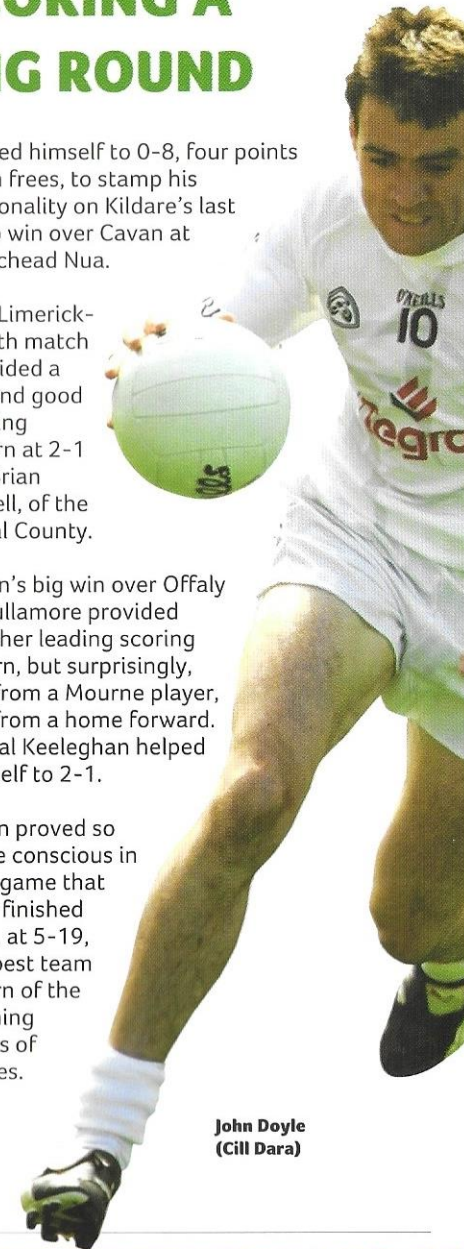
Sharing second place are Donegal teenager Michael Murphy and Kildare's well established marksman supreme, John Doyle. Murphy hit 2-2, a goal from a penalty, to prove an ace in the North West victory march over Roscommon at Ballybofey, while Doyle

helped himself to 0-8, four points from frees, to stamp his personality on Kildare's last gasp win over Cavan at Droichead Nua.

The Limerick-Meath match provided a second good scoring return at 2-1 for Brian Farrell, of the Royal County.

Down's big win over Offaly at Tullamore provided another leading scoring return, but surprisingly, not from a Mounse player, but from a home forward. Pascal Keeleghan helped himself to 2-1.

Down proved so score conscious in that game that they finished with, at 5-19, the best team return of the opening series of games.

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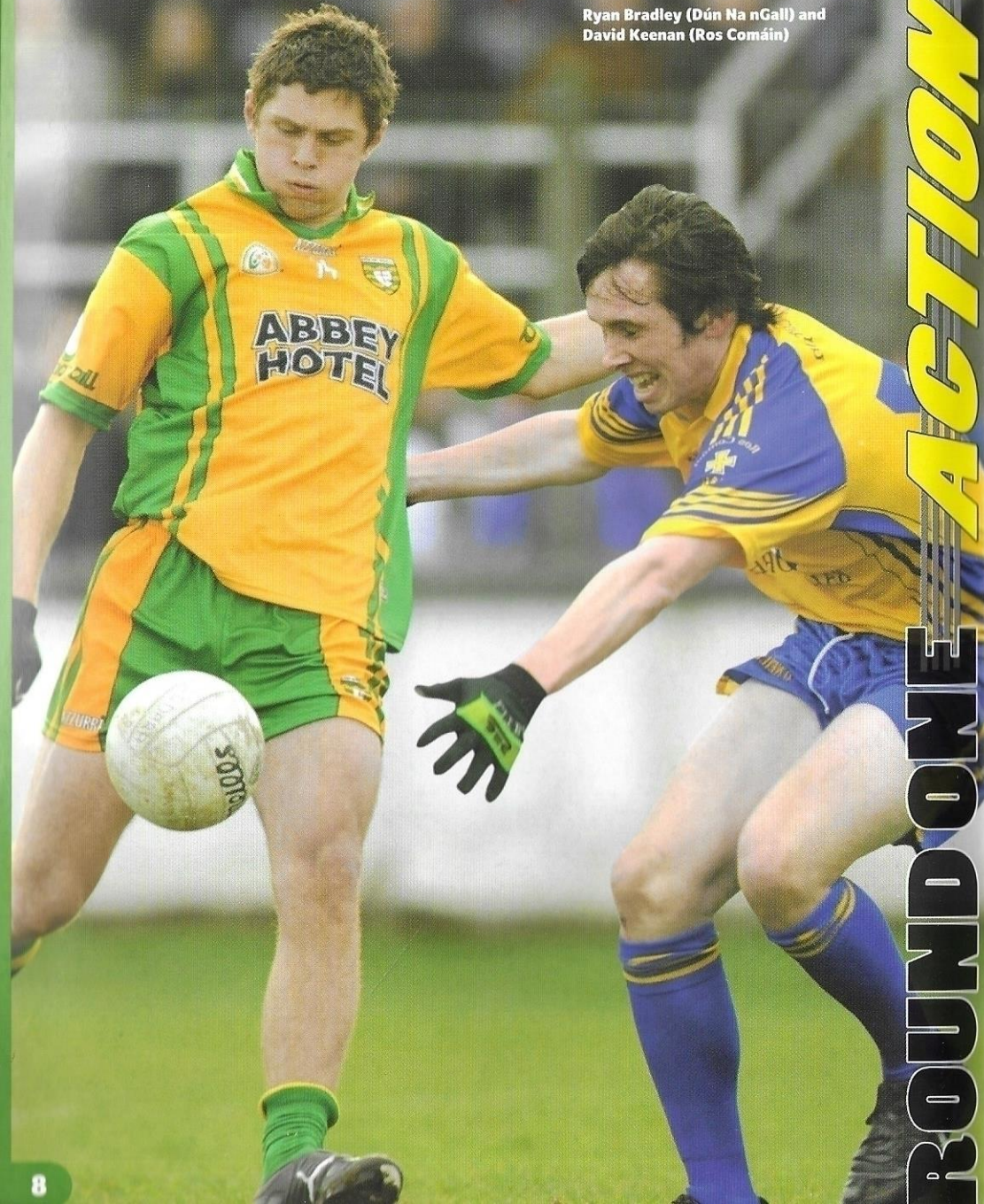

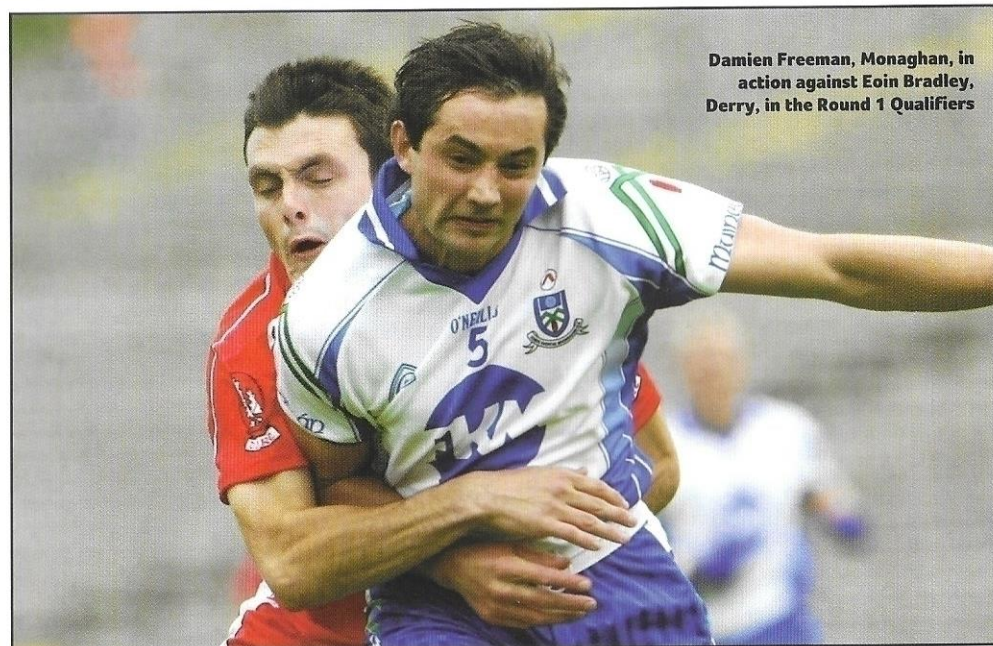

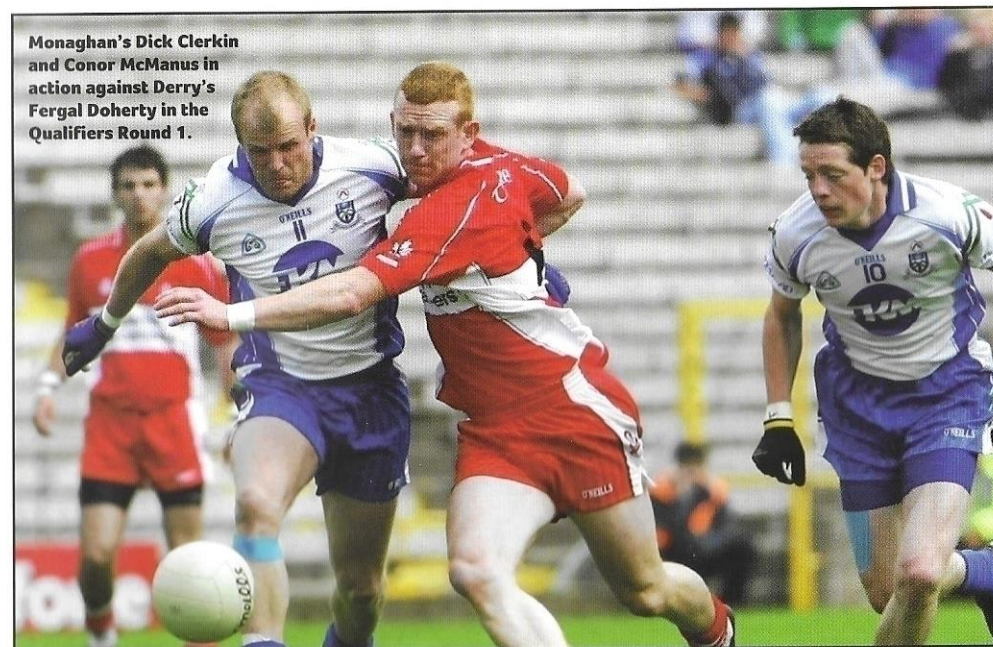

DONEGAL BACK TO WINNING WAYS

Donegal are bidding to record a second round win in the All-Ireland senior football championship Qualifier for the second successive year. Last year they followed up their first round win over Leitrim at Carrick-on-Shannon by beating Westmeath by 1-13 to 1-8 at Mullingar.

In 2006 as runners-up for the Ulster title they did not make their debut until the third round when they beat Fermanagh at Enniskillen.

Although Donegal go into this second round tie under the shadow of a somewhat disappointing performance when losing heavily to Monaghan in the 2007 Qualifiers, they are unlikely to be in the least over-awed by the task ahead.

Last week-end they put the disappointment of their Ulster championship first round loss to Derry at the start of last month firmly in the shade when seeing off Roscommon at Ballybofey.

Teenager Michael Murphy, who displayed a flair for goal scoring, and Colm McFadden, on the points scoring standard, did much to fashion a display that set the scene for success with a blistering start.

Donegal were two goals to the good in the early stages, the first from Murphy and were moving well. However, Roscommon got back into the hunt with a goal from a penalty to reduce their arrears to a brace of points.

Donegal, however, raised their game and another goal in the second half from Murphy—that one from a penalty—sent them

on their way to a comfortable 3-11 to 1-9 win.

Murphy finished with 2-2, while McFadden contributed five points. Midfielder Rory Kavanagh got through much valuable work, while Frank McGlynn and Karl Lacey did well at the back.

A GOLDEN MEMORY FROM THE QUALIFIERS

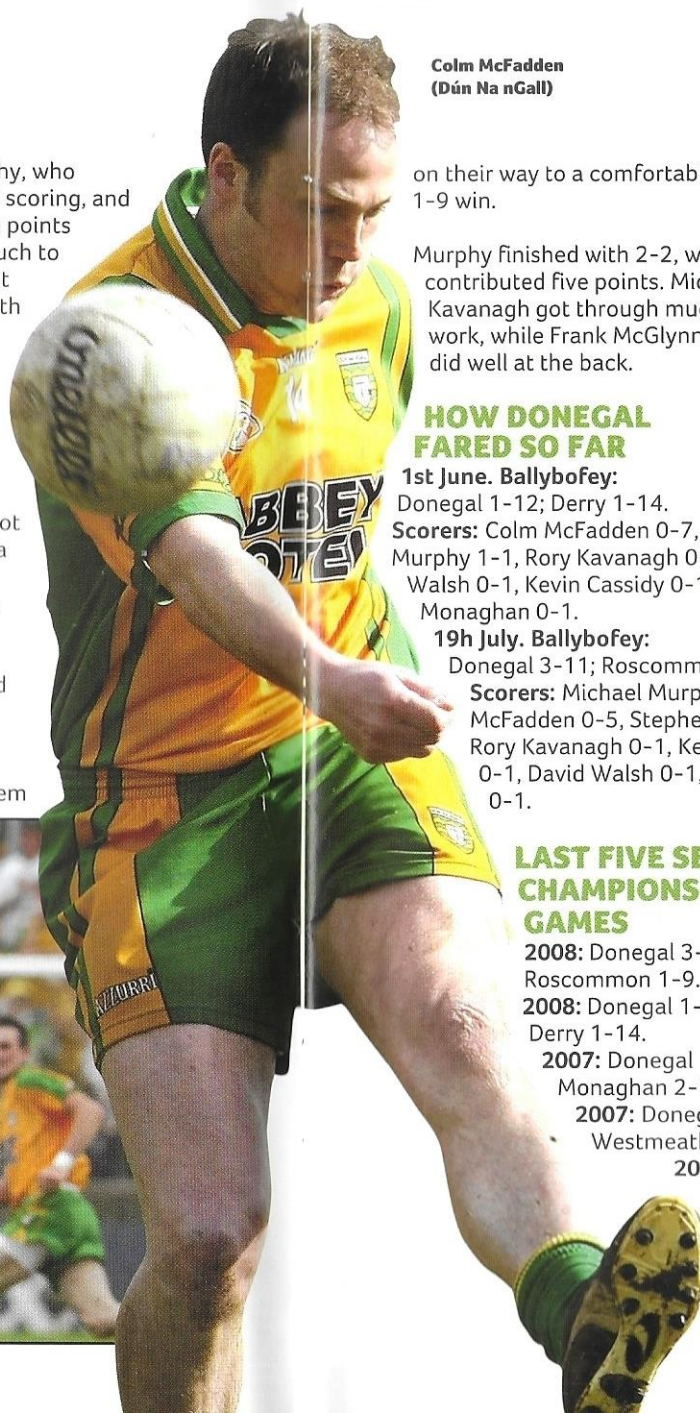
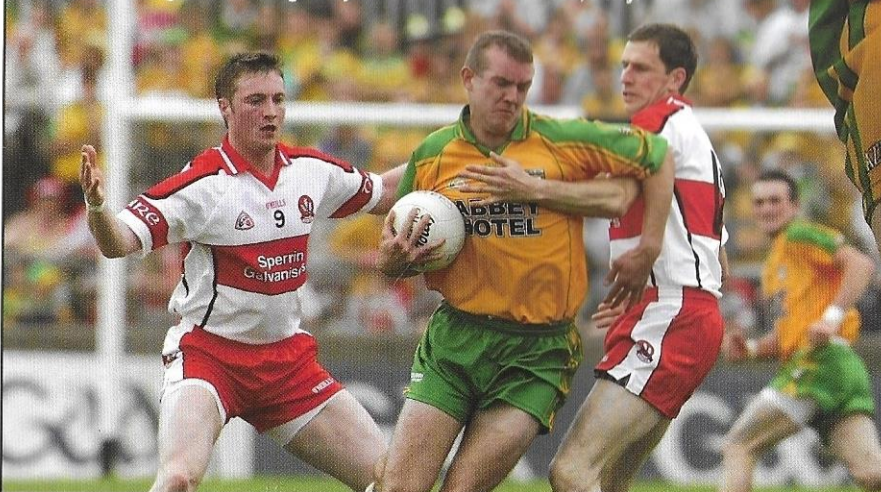

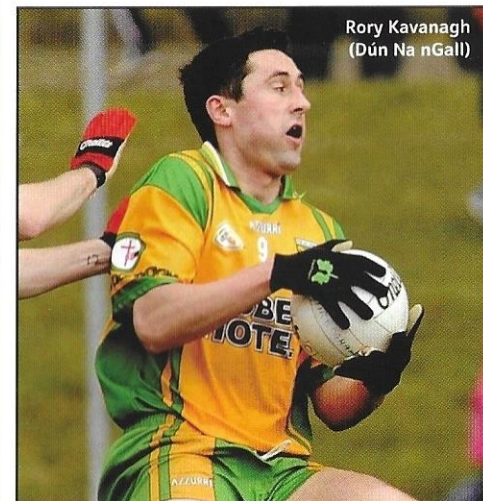

Rory Kavanagh (Dún Na nGall)

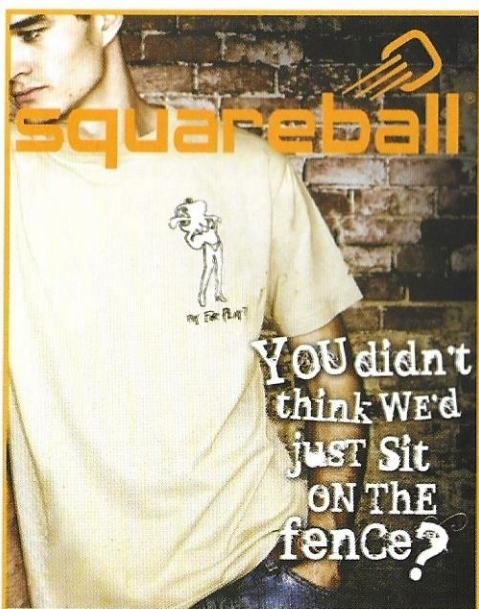




THE LONG WAIT

When a county has to wait for almost half a century to record its second provincial title it would appear that it had spent decades in the doldrums with little to show for a lot of effort, and that was certainly the case with Armagh when, in the wake of their Ulster final success in 1902, they sustained a succession of defeats in provincial finals that sounds almost incredible. In the period between 1903 and 1950 Armagh lost the finals of '03 (Cavan), '12 (Antrim), '17 (Monaghan), '20 (Cavan), '27 (Monaghan), '28 (Cavan), '31 (Cavan), '32 (Cavan), '34 (Cavan), '37 (Cavan), '38 (Monaghan), '39 (Cavan) and '49 (Cavan).

The defeat by Cavan in 1949 was the 13th successive final loss suffered by the Orchard county. Finally, the win over Cavan the following year ushered in a new era for Armagh.



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THE FIRST SIX

Many of the most celebrated teams through the years have won six successive provincial titles with the likes of Dublin, Kerry, Cavan, Kildare and Wexford coming to mind. However, the honour of recording the first-ever six-in-a-row belongs to none of the above, but to a county that has failed to win a provincial title for more than half a century...Antrim. The Glensmen laid the foundations for hurling in Ulster in the early years of the last century, but they did not neglect the big ball game. In 1908 the footballers came through to beat Cavan in the provincial final by 1-8 to 0-4. A year later they retained the title with another victory over the Breffni men as was the case in 1910 and 1911 before Armagh were final victims in 1912. In 1913 Antrim made in six-in-a-row with a 3-1 to 1-2 victory over Monaghan. Other counties would in time emulate Antrim's achievement, but the honour of bringing off the first six-in-a-row rests with the Glensmen.

GOLD! GOLD! GOLD!

When a team gathers to celebrate the presenting of All-Ireland medals it is a great occasion for everyone concerned. But it might be said that such a presentation had an extra dimension to affairs when the Dublin players received their awards in 1908. For it wasn't just one set of medals that was presented at the Banba Hall, Rutland Square, Dublin, but two All-Ireland awards and several sets won in various tournaments.

The All-Ireland medals were for the winning of the titles of 1906 and 1907; in fact, the Metropolitans were well on their way to a third successive title when this gala evening took place. However, All-Ireland medals were not the only awards presented that evening. The Dublin players had, over the previous two years, won no fewer than seven gold medals at various tournaments.

Inevitably, some Dublin wag made a comment to the effect that there was more gold in the Banba Hall that night than had been excavated in the Klondike in the 1890s.

MONAGHAN TOPS IN LAST YEAR'S QUALIFIER

Monaghan 2-12 Donegal 1-7

It is exactly twelve months since Monaghan and Donegal last met in the All-Ireland qualifiers, although on that occasion at Omagh a place in the All-Ireland quarter/final awaited the winners, unlike today's contest when a place in round three will be the victor's reward. Monaghan had lost to Tyrone narrowly in the provincial final a fortnight before this encounter while Donegal lost to the same opposition a round earlier by eleven, so the Farney men were slight favourites in front of an attendance of 15,639. Availing of the wind Monaghan made the ideal start when Vincent Corey punched home a goal after three minutes.

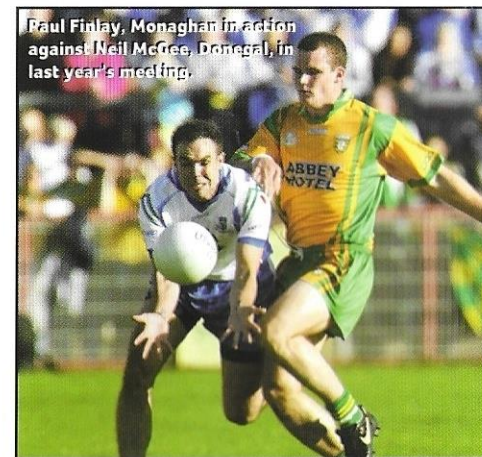
However, despite dominating possession-wise, that goal was all that divided the sides at the change of ends (1-5 to 0-5) as the leaders shot nine first-half wides to one for Donegal. When Rory Kavanagh rifled home a goal three minutes after the restart it appeared Donegal would make Monaghan pay for such profligacy, but then Corey turned provider as he set up Tomás Freeman for a like score at the other end. That major was a huge tonic to Monaghan and a body blow for Donegal and from that point on it was only a matter of what the provincial runners-up would win by. Eight points separated the sides at the final whistle.

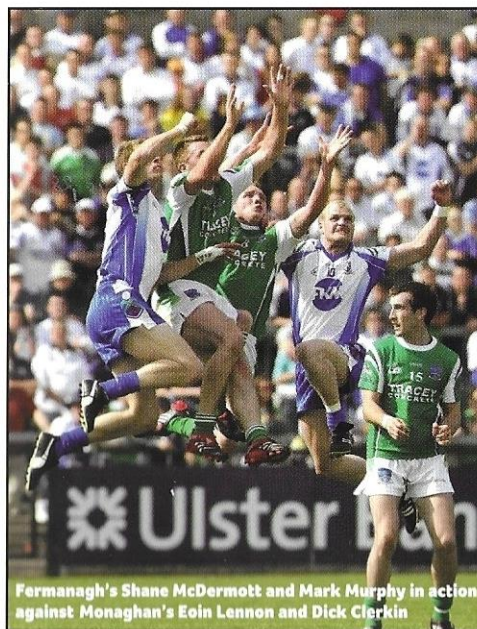

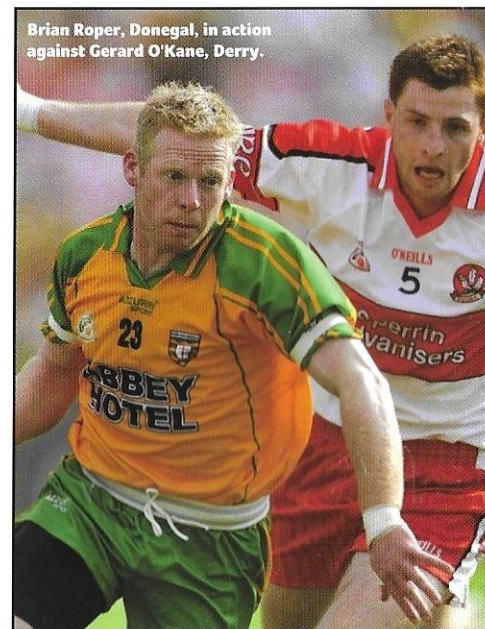

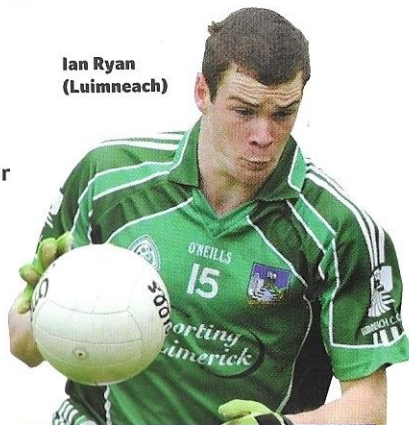
INDIVIDUAL FEATS

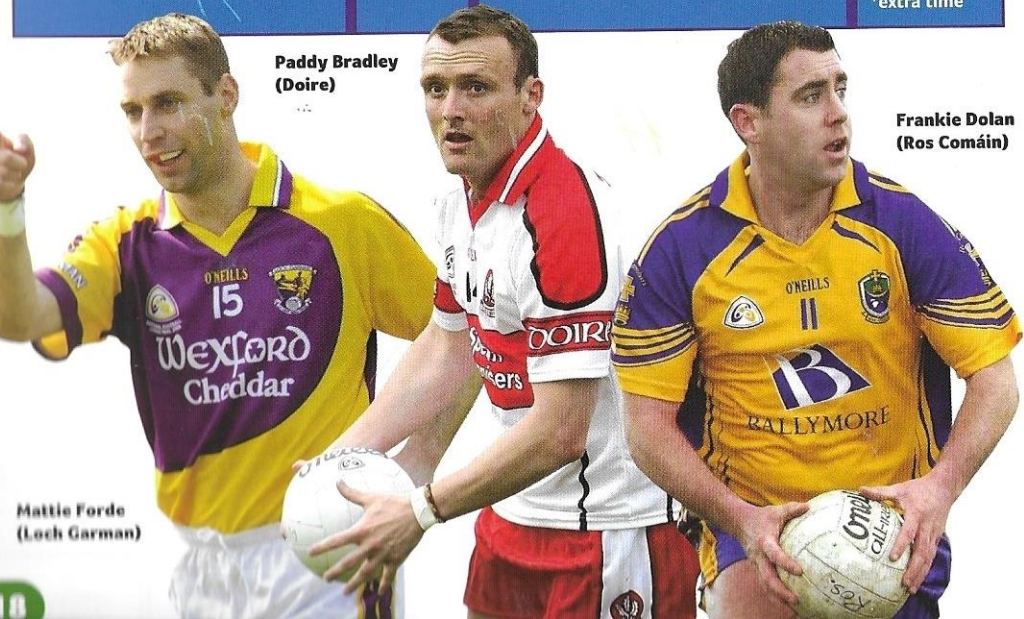

Last year as runners-up for the Ulster title they stepped into Qualifier action for the first time in round three when they outscored Donegal at Omagh by 2-12 to 1-7.

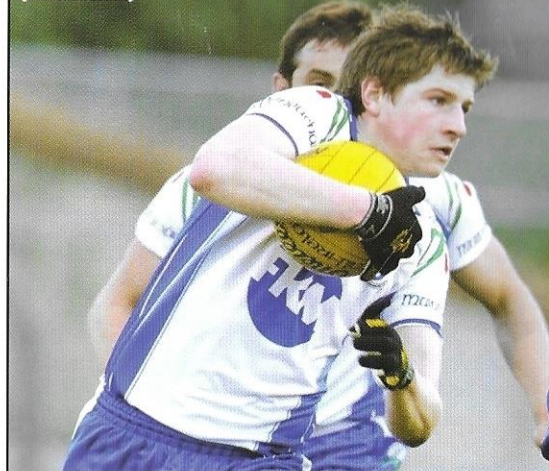

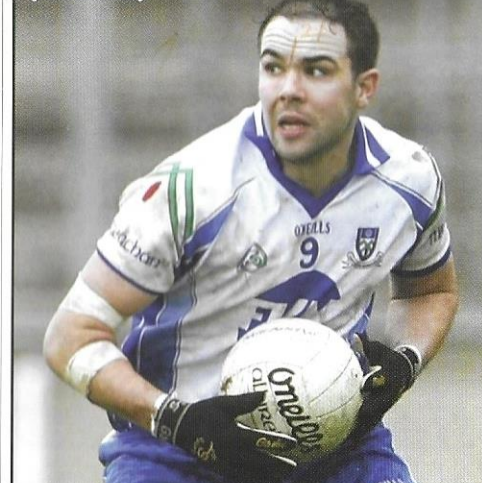

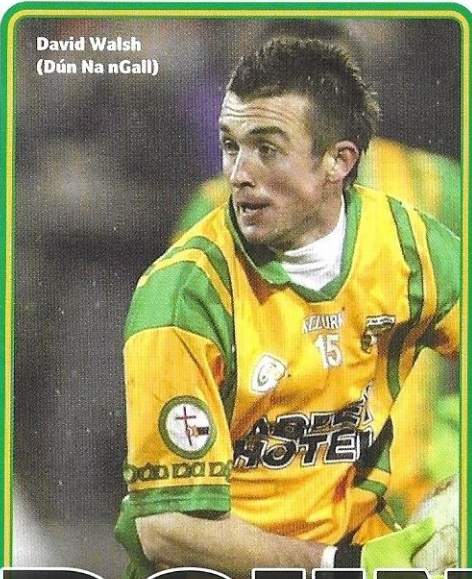
He was in fine form with his high-fielding and good general play at midfield. Monaghan had the edge in the first half and led at the break by 0-9 to 0-6.

THE FIRST 60

When 68,950 spectators flocked to Croke Park to see the Kerry-Galway All-Ireland final of 1938, it was generally believed that this attendance was the first time more than sixty thousand people attended an All-Ireland decider or any other competition. However, that belief was incorrect. The 60,000 mark had been passed seven years earlier, but not in an All-Ireland final or even a championship game...or even in this country. In 1931 Kerry were in the United States playing a number of games in the New York and Boston areas and a match against a New York selection was fixed for Giants Stadium. It was a huge success with just over 60,000 spectators turning up, most of them Irish emigrants. Admittedly, no other touring side ever got close to that figure again, although for the remainder of the decade attendances at games with teams from the "home" country were very satisfactory.

IN THREE DECADES

Mick O'Dwyer has achieved so much as a team manager in recent decades that it tends to be forgotten that he was also a high achiever on the playing field in his time. Apart from the All-Ireland, National League and Railway Cup achievements, he is also among a very exclusive band of players that have won National League medals in three different decades. Not surprisingly, three of the four are from the Kingdom with O'Dwyer joined by his team-mates Mick O'Connell and Johnny Culloty who were all present when the 1959, 1961, 1963, 1969, 1971, 1972 and 1973 titles were annexed. The gate-crasher to the Kerry trio is Meath's Joe Cassells who was part of the Royals' successes in 1975, 1988 and 1990.

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CARDIAC SCREENING QUESTIONNAIRE

The Medical Welfare Committee of the GAA recommends that in the context of cardiac screening all participants over the age of 14 should complete a cardiac screening questionnaire. Anyone answering **yes** to any of the questions should discuss the findings with their family doctor.

Of all the cardiac screening tools, the best predictor of sudden death risk is a positive questionnaire. There is a lack of scientific consensus on the overall value of further screening. Those who choose to pursue further screening however should be aware of the following:

- Testing should be done in a centre where ECGs/ECHOs are being reported by experienced sports cardiologists.
- There is a significant percentage that will have an abnormality which may require further evaluation.
- A small percentage may end up uncertain as to whether it is safe for them to participate or not.

EXTRA TIME & THE QUALIFIERS

Since their inception in 2001 every year has seen at least one match require extra time before being resolved, and in three cases even the added 20 minutes failed to separate the protagonists. Indeed, in the opening round of 2001, extra time failed to separate Wexford and Westmeath at Wexford Park as, when finishing at 1-13 apiece after 70 minutes, a further 20 minutes saw each side add six points to force a replay at Mullingar. The Lake county were also required to play extra time in the fourth round of that seasons' campaign when, having tied with Mayo (1-9 to 0-12) at Hyde Park, they advanced to the All-Ireland quarter/final after extra time by 1-14 to 0-16.

The following year the only game that went to extra time was the meeting of Limerick and Cavan at the Gaelic Grounds. After 70 exciting minutes the home side had 2-10 to their credit with the visitors registering 1-13 and 20 minutes later each side had added a brace of points to send the game to Breffni Park for resolution.

Like Westmeath two years previously, Roscommon were the extra time "kings" in 2003 when they won both their third and fourth round ties after playing additional time. Against Offaly at Cusack Park Mullingar it was 1-13 each at the end of normal time, but the Connacht side pulled away in extra time to win by 1-20 to 1-15. It was tighter against Kildare at Portlaoise where Roscommon won by 1-18 to 0-19 after finishing level 1-12 to 0-15.

The 2004 campaign saw the most games go to extra time as four matches required additional minutes before the outcome was decided. At Drogheda Louth and Antrim finished level (1-9 to 0-12) before the Wee county won out by 2-13 to 0-14. Longford and Monaghan played out an exciting 70 minutes at Pearse Park (2-12 to 1-15) before the hosts advanced by 4-15 to 1-17. Fermanagh (0-16) and Meath (2-10) were tied at Enniskillen before the Ernesiders edged it by 0-19 to 2-12, and in what was to date the most amazing period of extra time, Derry and Cavan tied at 0-15 to 2-9 before the Oak Leaf shot ten points without reply in 20 minutes to win comfortably.

Just one contest required extra time in 2005 with Meath defeating Leitrim at Carrick-on-Shannon by 1-12 to 1-8 after drawing 0-9 to 1-6 after 70 minutes. The following season Louth and Tyrone couldn't be separated after 70 minutes (2-13 each) nor did an additional 20 minutes make any difference (2-16 apiece). Westmeath's fine extra time record was maintained at Markievicz Park as having held the hosts 0-11 each, they qualified for the fourth round on a 1-12 to 0-14 scoreline.

Last season only one qualifier required extra time to yield a verdict as Donegal overcame Leitrim by 1-16 to 1-14 at Carrick-on-Shannon after it finished 1-11 each at the end of normal time.

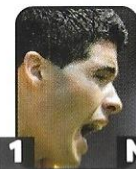
