



For the second time in seven days the players, coaches and backroom team members of Ireland and Australia will pit their wits against each other when the two countries meet in Croke Park this evening in a game that will decide the destination of the Irish Daily Mail International Rules Series for 2010.

Last weekend's first Test was a wonderful occasion played in a memorable setting that was Páirc na nGael in Limerick and I would like to acknowledge everyone who had a role in its organisation.

If we needed evidence of the potential of this Australian team, we got it in spades last Saturday night and it was difficult not to be impressed by the athleticism and versatility of a group of players who looked at home with the round ball.

Thankfully a spirited finale from the host team means Anthony Tohill's side will arrive in Croke Park this evening with realistic aspirations of retaining the Cormac McAnallen Cup which they won in such style Down Under two years ago.

There is no doubting that they will have to raise their game considerably and show more of the passion that has made so many of them household names on the back of their exploits in their county jerseys.

A seven-point deficit after the first game means the 2010 Series is well and truly up for grabs and I hope we are treated to a spectacle to rival some of the more memorable encounters between the countries in this hybrid code.

Night time games create a special atmosphere of their own and we all recall the Tyrone-Dublin Allianz GAA National League games for both the unveiling of the Croke Park floodlights and the 125 celebrations. A spectacle similar to those two games would be welcome.

While I extend a warm welcome to our AFL colleagues I also welcome members of the Camanachd Association who over the course of the weekend will participate in three encounters against our Senior and U21 hurlers and a camogie line up, with the two latter games taking place in Ratoath GAA Club earlier today.



The international outlet that these games provide our hurlers with is as valued as that offered to the footballers and I would hope to see a further strengthening of ties between our two games.

Finally, I would like to thank our competition partners the Irish Daily Mail and TG4 for their support and we look forward to your continued co-operation.



THE CORMAC MCANALLEN CUP

he cup which will be presented to the winners of the Irish Daily Mail International Rules Series is named in honour of the late Cormac McAnallen, who featured in three Test Series for Ireland, making six appearances for his country.

The Eglish clubman was one of the great stars of Gaelic Games and captained Tyrone to All-Ireland success at both Minor (1999) and U21 level (2001). His initial appearances for the Tyrone Senior team were as a midfielder, but in 2003 he was moved to fill a troublesome full back spot for the O'Neill County and excelled as the county won its first GAA Football All-Ireland Senior Championship title.

Cormac won virtually every honour the game had to offer in his short career, including Allianz GAA National League titles, a Sigerson Cup medal with Queen's in 2000, the Young Player of the Year award in '01 and a GAA All Star in '03.

He appeared in three consecutive International Rules Series for his country, helping Ireland to victory on his debut in 2001. He was also an integral part of the team that played Australia in Croke Park in 2002 and Perth and Melbourne in '03.

Cormac slipped quietly from this world on the night of March 1, 2004 but his memory will live on for everyone that knew this great person, for the countless thousands who admired and respected him on the football fields of Ireland and in the trophy for the International Rules which proudly bears his name.

LATE RALLY KEEPS IRELAND AUSTRALIA IRISH HOPES ALIVE

moment of inspiration from Footballer of the Year Bernard Brogan kept Ireland in the 2010 Irish Daily Mail International Rules Series and saved the home side from potential disappointment in the first Test at Páirc na nGael, Limerick last Saturday night.

Having been outplayed for most of the game, Brogan's intervention came with five minutes left on the clock, when he cut through the Australian defence and buried the only goal (six points) of the game.

At the time, Ireland trailed 47-29 and appeared to be on the verge of taking an irredeemable deficit into this evening's second Test at Croke Park.


Brogan's goal, however, breathed new life into the Irish challenge and energised the 30,117-strong crowd. Further scores in the closing stages from Kevin McKernan (over) and Steven McDonnell (behind) left just seven points between the sides ahead of today's renewal of rivalries.

"The goal might just have saved the series. I think if we hadn't got it we were in a pretty bad position," conceded Tohill, the Ireland manager.

In near perfect conditions, Ireland struggled to match the fluency of the Australians' movement and their transfer of the football. The home side trailed at the end of the first three quarters - 12-9, 21-16 and 32-22 – the margin gradually increasing as Mick Malthouse's men got to grips with the round ball.

Their top scorer and star man on the night was captain Adam Goodes, who scored 12 points (0-4-0) from full-forward.

Brogan led the way for Ireland with nine (1-1-0), while captain Steven McDonnell chipped in with eight points (0-2-2).

ícheál is on the road. From his home in Dún Sion just outside Dingle, he makes the short drive to Killarney - the first of many journeys in a busy day. Mike Frank Russell is a teacher in the town and he made a promise to the former Kerry footballer that he'd dole out medals at a celebration of the school's sporting achievements.

From Kerry he'll set off in his car to James Stephens in Kakenny via Cork - "It's a slight detour but I'm used to taking detours all my life," he jokes - for another medals presentation to the Club's underage stars. It was Brian Cody who asked him to do the honours.

He's in demand, but happy to oblige, especially for the players and managers that he has developed a special rapport with over 61 years of commentating on and broadcasting Gaelic Games.

It means he clocks up more miles than a travelling salesman; 40,000 a year, he reckons. Radió na Gaeltachta hums gently in the background, the soundtrack of his journeys around the parishes and GAA Clubs of the island fulfilling engagements and ensuring promises are never broken.

It may seem like a punishing schedule for a man who celebrated his 80th birthday last summer and recently announced his intention to call time on his broadcasting career, but the idea of retirement is one that he has never fully embraced.


He was in Limerick last week for the first Test of the 2010 Irish Daily Mail International Rules Series and last night he commentated on the final of Celebrity Bainisteoir at Parnell Park. He's also the chairman of 'Cáirde Coláiste Íde', the last all-Irish girls' boarding school in the country. He's been asked to act as Grand Marshall of the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Toronto next year. It's an offer he plans to take

up. Promises made and all that. Combined with his duties as the unofficial goodwill ambassador for the GAA, it scarcely counts as a retirement.

He loves it all too much. Amid the outpouring of emotion that surrounded his last All-Ireland final commentary on the third Sunday of September, Micheál appeared with his son and daughter on the RTÉ Radio One show Miriam Meets. His daughter, Doireann, who accompanies him around the country all summer, taking notes, doing research, totting up scores and supplying the details that enrich his spellbinding commentaries, recounted a story of a previous All-Ireland final morning. She



awoke to find her father jumping impatiently at the end of her bed yelling 'Action'. It was 6.30am, nine hours before throw-in! It was as wonderful a vignette as you could imagine and a portal into the mindset of the man. He is still enthralled by the GAA, its rituals and its myriad of characters. His enthusiasm, after all these years, remains undimmed.

In the days before the final, he was like a pre-election politician doing the rounds of the chat shows, shaking hands and signing autographs. Had there been a baby's head to be kissed he'd have obliged. His arrival in the Croke Park press box that day was greeted with a lightning flash of cameras. Supporters called his name from the stands and he reciprocated with a wave of the hand and a megawatt smile. Hardened journalists broke from their duties and were melted by the warmth towards a bona fide legend of their game. Some even queued up to have their match programmes signed.

"I was really grateful," he says with typical modesty. "The amount of people and the different types of people. I got a sack load of cards. It's very difficult to know how you would reply to them all. I'm very grateful for different people at home and abroad."

Tonight's second Test between Ireland and Australia, of course, will be his last-ever live commentary for RTÉ. He intends to enjoy the occasion rather than get caught up in the emotion. Emotion will only cloud the job at hand.

"I'm not into emotion. I always look upon broadcasting a match as going to a match, describing it to people like you would be describing it to somebody after you would be coming home from the match – somebody that wasn't at it," he says.

"I will enjoy the game at Croke Park. I will have a lovely view, it will be a spectacular scene and there will be great excitement."

A conversation with Mícheál tends to veer down the various boreens of his mind. There are detours and thrilling hairpins. He freckles his words with glorious

little anecdotes. Invariably, though, the conversation always returns to the players. The cast of characters who have peopled the Sunday afternoon dramas of our mind's eye. The names Mícheál brings to life with his words.

Seán Óg Ó hAilpín, the Cork hurler, has just retired. Seán Óg was made for Mícheál's commentaries. And Mícheál's gifts were surely bestowed with the likes of Sean Óg in mind. Mícheál is a romantic and from the first time he saw the Rotuman-born Rebel wearing the blood and bandage he fell a little in love with his story. The athleticism and the colour. The passion for a game as alien to the Pacific Islands as palm trees and sun-bleached beaches are to the north side of Cork city. The son of a Fijian mother and a Fermanagh-born father lifting the Liam MacCarthy Cup on the steps of the Hogan Stand in 2005 and delivering his winning speech as Gaeilge in his musical Cork

"I remember Seán Óg when he was at DCU, going down to Cork to play and would you believe it if he had time he would walk from DCU to Hueston Station. He did that regularly and he told me one time 'there is no point in going down to Cork to train when you can do a bit of it on the way.'

I can see Sean Óg next spring. It's not a setback really, but it is a jolt. It might get him training and he might appear in the spring playing brilliantly and if he does Denis Walsh will be the first to knock at the door.

"He has been a great player: Minor, All-Ireland, two U21, three Senior, National League. Everything. All Stars. The lot. He played in an All-Ireland football final. He's admired all around him agus is carachtar iontach é. He has a great welcome every time that you meet him, you feel that he has a great welcome for you."

And we'll know where to find Mícheál. No longer colouring our summer Sundays, but he'll continue to spread the GAA gospel with the sort of benign zeal that would rid the cynicism from the most strident non-believer. And he'll always have a great welcome for you.

HURLING/SHINTY PREVIEW

he battle of the Celts provides the curtainraiser here today at Croke Park with a keenly contested encounter between Ireland and Scotland expected in the annual Senior Hurling-Shinty International.

Current Offaly manager and former Senior All-Ireland winner Joe Dooley is again back to manage the Ireland side, with Drew MacNeil taking over from Fraser MacKenzie as the Scottish manager.

For the first time ever in the long history of these games, this year's winner will be decided over a two-leg series, with Ireland set to visit Bught Park, Inverness on Saturday, November 13.


Like the International Rules code, the Hurling/Shinty internationals are a hybrid game.


The composite rules of the sport are simple in nature with three points for a goal and one point for a shot over the crossbar.

There are, however, some exceptions. A score from a stationary ball taken straight from the ground is worth two points.

Players may not catch the ball unless they are the goalkeeper or a defender on the line for a penalty and this must be released within three steps.

Players may not kick the ball, but can drag the ball with their foot. This results in a mainly 'ground hurling' style game, with each half lasting 35 minutes.





The hybrid code has a long history, almost as long as the GAA itself, with the first-ever games taking place in 189 between London Scottish and London GAA sides.
Games followed in 1897 and 1898 between Glasgow
Cowal and Dublin Celtic, but the next games didn't take place until the 1920s.

The Second World War forced another break in games in the code, but university sides in both countries kept the link going, with international fixtures resuming in the 1970s.

Ireland dominated many of the encounters in the '70s, 80s and 90s, but there has been little between the sides recent meetings.

Just a point separated the teams when Scotland claimed victory in Nowlan Park in 2008, while Ireland won by just three points last year at Bught Park.

Just six of that Irish side remain for this year's encounter, with captain Tommy Walsh, Shane Dooley, Stephen Clynch, Paul McCormack, Gareth Johnson and John Rowney still involved.

However, Ireland can also call upon players such as Antrim duo Neil McManus and Arron Graffin who were part of the successful U21 side last year.

Scotland have experience in abundance with captain Gar Innes one of many players worth keeping a close eye on. Kingussie player Ronald Ross has 20 years' experience playing for Scotland but continues to shine and was his country's top scorer with 1-2 in last year's encounter.

HURLING/SHINT ATCH OFFICIALS



TONY CARROLL (Uíbh Fhailí)

Tony returns to Hurling/Shinty international action today. He was the man-inthe-middle at the U21 game between Ireland and Scotland last year. This is his eighth year refereeing locally and he has taken charge of county Senior finals. He is in his fourth season on the inter-county panel. His programme this year included the Christy Ring Cup final between Westmeath and Kerry, and the Tipperary-Antrim Bord Gáis Energy GAA Hurling All-Ireland U21 Championship semi-final. Tony played hurling with Kinnity and won an All-Ireland medal with Birr Community School.

SHINTY/HURLING INTERNATIONAL RULES OF PLAY

1. FIELD MARKINGS

(a) Size

Maximum 160 x 100 yards / 145 x 90 metres (b) Penalty/Offside Area

A straight line parallel with the goal line at a distance of 10 yards / 9 metres out and length of 19 ft / 5.8 metres, joined by a quarter circle at both ends, with radius of 10 yards / 9 metres, taken from each upright and joining up to the bye line.

(c) Penalty Spot

21 yards / 19 metres from the centre of the goal line.

(d) 25 Yards / 23 Metre Line

Across the field of play 25 yards / 23 metres from the bye line and parallel to it.

(e) 70 Yards / 64 Metre Line

Across the field of play 70 yards / 64 metres from the bye line and parallel to it. (f) Centre Line

Across the field of play at the centre for a distance of 10 yards / 9 metres only and parallel to the bye line.

(g) Scoring Space

Upright posts to be 23 feet / 7 metres high and 19 feet / 5.8 metres apart. Both uprights joined by a crossbar 10 feet / 3 metres from ground level. Uprights and crossbar must be a maximum of 4" / 10 cm - minimum of 3" / 7.5 cm square.

Weight: 4 ounces / 112 grams Circumference: 9" / 23cm.

3. STICKS

Camán or Hurley.

4. DURATION OF GAMES

Under 21 - 60 minutes (2 x 30 min) Senior - 70 minutes (2 x 35 min)

5. PLAYERS IN TEAM

14 players and 4 interchange players provided all interchanges are approved by the 4th official i.e. where the player leaving the field of play - unless injured - it at the 4 official's desk before the replacement player enters the field of play. Teams may not make more than one interchange at the time.

6. START OF PLAY AND RESUMPTION AFTER GOAL

Ball thrown along centre line between two opposing players.

7. RESTART AFTER POINT(S) SCORED Hit / Puck out from penalty area. 8. SCORING

(a) Goal = 3 points

(b) Over the crossbar and between uprights: b.1 Free or sideline hit off the ground = 2

b.2 Roll or jab lift free hit = 1 point b.3 From general play = 1 point

9. BALL OVER SIDE LINE

Struck from the ground at a point where it crossed the side line, by a player from the opposite side that last touched the ball. Scoring.

10. BALL OVER END LINE BY DEFENDER

Free hit to attacking side from 70 yards / 64 metre line at point opposite where it crossed the end line. Scoring.

11. BALL OVER END LINE BY ATTACKER Bye hit / Puck out from within Penalty Area. 12. PENALTY HIT

Award for any infringement of rules, by a defender, within the Penalty Area. A free hit is taken from the Penalty Spot (21 yards / 19 metres). Three defenders are permitted on the goal line all of whom may catch the ball which then must be released within three steps. The free taker must not throw or carry the ball beyond the Penalty Spot. All other players must be behind the 25 yards / 23 metre line.

13. FREE HIT / PUCK

For infringement in area between 25 yard/ 23 metre line and the end line, excluding the Penalty Area, by a defender. Free hit Puck to the attacking team from 25 yard / 23 metre line at a point opposite the infringement occurred. The Free Taker must not throw or carry the ball beyond the 25 yard / 23 metre line. All other players must be 20 yards / 18 metres from the free hit.

14. ALL OTHER INFRINGEMENTS

Free Hit / Puck taken by opposing team from where offence occurred. Scoring. 15. OFFSIDE

Free Hit / Puck awarded to the defending team if an attacking player, including his extended stick, is within the Penalty Area before the hall

16. FOULS AND MISCONDUCT

(a) The ball cannot be caught or handled except by the goalkeeper who must release it within three steps - or by defender as in

(b) The ball cannot be kicked, but may be stopped or controlled by use of one or both feet. A player may drag the ball with his foot but cannot pass to another player to gain an advantage.

(c) A player may not push, trip, kick or jump at an opponent.

(d) A player may not strike an opponent with stick, fist/hand, elbow, knee or foot.

(e) A player shall not obstruct an opponent from playing the ball or charge him in a reckless or dangerous manner.

(f) A player may not swing his stick in a reckless or dangerous manner.

(g) A player may only participate in the game with a stick in his hand which is in a condition not dangerous to another player.

For all Free Hits / Pucks, the ball may be hit from the ground or lifted onto the stick and then struck. All players must be 20 yards away until the ball is struck - if the ball is lifted and then struck, the strike must be completed from behind the appropriate field marking.

This year's Senior Series is being played on a home and away basis. The second test game is scheduled to take place in Bught Park, Inverness on Saturday, November 13. In the event of each team winning one game, the winners will be determined on the basis of bonus points. A bonus point will be awarded to a team which scores two or more goals in a game. In the event of equality of bonus points, aggregate score will be used to determine the winners.





RELAND MANAGEMENT ANTHONY TOHILL

NTHONY TOHILL was handed the job of managing the Ireland International Rules team in March of this year, having served as a selector under former manager Seán Boylan in 2006 and '08.

The 39-year-old Derry native has a long association with the hybrid game. He has been involved, in a variety of roles, in a number of Series since the competition was revived in 1998, winning the first of eight caps as a player that year before going on to captain his country on the victorious tour to Australia in 2001.

Following his retirement from inter-county football with Derry in 2003, Tohill was drafted in as a member of Boylan's backroom team for the '06 Series, before serving as a selector in '08, when he took charge of training sessions with Eoin Liston.

Tohill's association with the oval ball code, of course, goes way back to 1991, when he was recruited by AFL side Melbourne Demons after his outstanding performances for Derry's All-Ireland winning Minor team in 1989, as well as with St. Patrick's College, Maghera en route to Hogan Cup success.

The sojourn Down Under was cut short by a broken leg

and Tohill returned to Derry in 1991, where he made an immediate impact with the Senior inter-county team. He played a pivotal role in the Oak Leaf County's National League win the following year, scoring 1-1 late in the fina against Armagh. He was rewarded with the first of four GAA All Stars that year.

The highlight of his inter-county career came in 1993, wherhe secured an Ulster title with Derry. That September, under the stewardship of the legendary Eamonn Coleman, Derry won their first – and only – All-Ireland title, with Tohill outstanding at midfield. His second GAA All Star duly followed later that year.

Further National League success came in 1995 and '96.
However, it was in the former year that Tohill demonstrated his incredible prowess as a sportsman and athlete, when he was invited on a two-week trial with Manchester United.

The experiment was short-lived and Tohill won a second Ulster Championship medal in 1998, before being named Derry captain in 1999, leading his county to National League success the following year and landing his fourth and final GAA All Star. He called time on a storied inter-county career in 2003, leaving behind a rich legacy as one of the finest players ever to wear the red and white of Derry.





KEVIN O'BRIEN (SELECTOR)

One of the finest footballers ever to play for Wicklow, Kevin O'Brien won a GAA All Star in 1990 and went on to represent his country on the successful International Rules tour Down Under the same year. O'Brien is a legendary figure in Wicklow GAA circles and won a remarkable nine Senior County Championship titles with his Club, Baltinglass, in the 1980s and '90s. He was picked on 'Team 25' last year, which rewarded the best 15 players in Leinster over the last 25 years as part of the GAA's 125 Anniversary celebrations.

EOIN LISTON (SELECTOR)

Nicknamed the 'Bomber', Eoin Liston was a member of the Kerry Senior football team for 15 years, from 1978 to 1993, and is widely regarded as one of the finest ever full-forwards to have played the game. The Beale clubman amassed eight Munster titles, seven All-Irelands and four GAA All Stars in that time. Liston has appeared for his country on three occasions, winning two caps in 1984 and a third in 1990. He guided Kerins O'Rahilly's to the Kerry Senior Championship title in 2002 and served as a selector under Ireland International Rules manager Seán Boylan in 2006 and '08.

BEN CLANCY (DOCTOR)

SEÁN ÓG DE PAOR (SELECTOR)

Seán Óg de Paor was a key member of the Galway team that won two All-Ireland titles under John O'Mahony in 1998 and 2001. De Paor was rewarded with GAA All Stars for his influential displays from wingback in both years. The Carraroe native called time on his inter-county career, which yielded six Connacht titles, in 2005 after a long battle with a knee injury. He represented Ireland in four successive International Rules Series, from 1998 to 2001. He was considered one of the country's finest exponents of the hybrid game.

MIKE MCGURN (TEAM TRAINER)

Regarded as one of the world's top strength and conditioning coaches, Mike McGurn returns to the Ireland backroom team for a second Series, having served as fitness and tackling coach in 2008. McGurn's pedigree is unrivalled, having spent six years in charge of conditioning and fitness with the Irish rugby team. In the past, McGurn has worked with former world boxing champion Bernard Dunne. He was a member of Paddy O'Rourke's backroom team in Armagh last year and also helped out with beaten AIB GAA All-Ireland Club finalists Kilmurry-Ibrickane.

ENDA KING (PHYSIO)

Cavanagh captained Ireland to the Series win in Australia in 2008, scoring 27 of Ireland's 102 points total over two Tests, including a goal in the first Test in Perth. AUSTRALIA MANAGEMENT MICK MALTHOUSE

eteran coach Mick Malthouse takes control of the Australian International Rules squad for the second time having first managed his country in the last Series Down Under in 2008.

Malthouse, 57, is the current Premiership coach, having led Collingwood to Grand Final success at the start of the month, when the Magpies beat St. Kilda in the final replay, landing the club's first Premiership title since 1990.

It was a case of third time lucky for Malthouse, who had fallen short in his two previous attempts (2002 and '03) to guide Collingwood to the 'Holy Grail' of Australian Rules Football. It was Malthouse's fourth Premiership title in total. His first came as a player with Richmond and two more followed as coach of the West Coast Eagles in the 1990s.

Although Malthouse is better known for his coaching career in the AFL, he also enjoyed a successful playing career in the VFL (Victorian Football League). He had stints as a player with St. Kilda and Richmond in the VFL (officially renamed the AFL in 1990), where he amassed 174 Senior appearances and was renowned as a tough, no-nonsense defender.

The highlight of his playing career came with Richmond in 1980, when he was a Premiership player in the club's runaway win over Collingwood. He hung up his boots in 1983.


He wasted little time in moving into coaching and to charge of Footscray Football Club (Western Bulldog following year. Malthouse spent six relatively succes seasons at the club where he developed a reputatio strict disciplinarian.


In 1990 he was recruited to the West Coast Eagles, he enjoyed 10 seasons at the helm of the Perth-bas outfit. During his tenure, the Eagles made the finals single year and landed Premiership titles in 1992 and the seasons are supplied to the west Coast Eagles.


Malthouse made the move to Collingwood in 2000 has led the 'Pies to finals in seven out of 10 seasons including losing Grand Final appearances in 2002 a He made amends this year, when Collingwood enjo 56-point win over St Kilda to land the Premiership to Malthouse was subsequently named 2010 AFLCA Coff the Year.

One of the most respected and experienced coache the game, he is second on the all-time list of most coached in the VFL/AFL (639) and ranks third in the most wins by any coach in the game.

Malthouse took over as coach to the Australian International Rules team in 2008 and was widely profer his positive approach to the game and the sportsmanship with which his side played in the Ser Once again, sportsmanship played a key role in his selection.







MATTHEW LAPPIN

Matthew represented Australia against Ireland in 2001, '05 and '06, while playing 251 games with St Kilda and Carlton to the end of 2007. He was an All-Australian player in 2004 and has worked as an assistant coach at Carlton since his retirement, both in development roles and as a forwards coach. Lappin made his debut for St Kilda in 1994 and quickly made his name as a solid running half-back flanker. He played 17 of 22 matches in the 1997 Premiership season in which the Saints qualified in first place for the AFL Finals Series.

Nicknamed 'Skinny' because of his slight frame, Lappin moved to Carlton in 1999, representing the Blues 196 times over the next eight seasons. The highlight of his time at Carlton came when he won All-Australian selection in 2004, when he was consistently amongst the club's best players.

Following an injury, Lappin announced his retirement at the end of the 2007 season, just four games short of his 200th club game. He has been involved with Carlton as an assistant coach since then, as well as a playing assistant coach with the Northern Bullants.

GLENJAKOVICH

Glen represented Australia as a goalkeeper in the 2003 Series, helping the hosts to a 101-94 aggregate win over Ireland. The former West Coast Eagles man remains the club's games record holder (276) and was centre half-back in its two maiden Premiership sides in 1992 and '94. He also won four club and best fairest awards in 1993, '94, '95 and 2000.

Jakovich made his AFL debut in 1991 and soon established himself as one of the strongest centre half-backs in the game and was selected as an All-Australian in that position in 1994 and '95. He underwent reconstructive knee surgery in 1996 and struggled to reproduce the form that marked the early part of his career, although he was still able to win his club's best and fairest award for the fourth time in 2000.

Jakovich retired from the game in 2004 and was inducted into the AFL Hall of Fame four years later. He now works as a commentator with Fox Sports.

SCORES

Scores will be registered as follows:

GOAL – 6 points: A goal is scored when the ball passes completely between the goal posts and under the crossbar.

OVER - 3 Points: An over (three points) is scored when the ball passes between the goal posts and completely over the crossbar.

POINT (behind) - 1 Point: A behind is scored when the ball passes completely between the goal and behind posts.

POSSESSION:

Where a player is moving whilst in possession of the football, he must bounce or touch the football on the ground at least once every 10 metres or six steps (whatever the greater), irrespective of whether such player is running in a straight line or otherwise.

Mark: A mark is taken if, in the opinion of the referee, a player catches or takes control of the football within the playing field after it has been kicked from the hands or off the ground by another player not less than 15 metres distant. Having been awarded a mark a player may move back behind the spot where the mark was made and take a free kick. Alternatively, the player may play on immediately after taking the mark, kicking or hand passing the ball.

THE CLOCK:

At the end of each quarter a hooter will sound. A score resulting from a ball in flight at the start of the sound of the hooter, i.e. when no other player of the same side touches the ball, shall be allowed. If the ball is played over the end line and outside the goalposts by one of the defending side, a 45m free kick shall be awarded. This must be scored direct.

When a free kick or mark is awarded before the hooter sounds, the free kick or disposal from the mark may be made after the hooter and the player may score directly from this kick. If the ball is touched by another player on the attacking team then any resulting score will not count.

DISCIPLINE:

Order off for the Remainder of the Match (Red Card):

Any player guilty of a red card offence will automatically be sent off for the remainder of the game with no replacement allowed and a penalty kick awarded to the opposition.

THE MARK

One of the outstanding features of the Australian Rules game is the 'mark' whereby the player making a clean catch of a kicked ball from another player not less than 20 metres distant cannot be tackled and is allowed to take a free kick.

The mark is incorporated in the International Rules game and there have been many suggestions that its introduction would greatly improve Gaelic football.

Like most suggested changes there is much to be said for and against; many followers of the Gaelic code would be surprised to learn that more than a century ago when the rules were still at a developing stage with different interpretations in various parts of the country, in one area at least the mark was a feature of the game. This was confirmed by the well-known writer John Joseph O'Kelly, known as 'Sceilg', in the 1940s when he recalled that in the game being played in the Ring of Kerry in the 1880s:




In addition to awarding a Free Kick, a Referee shall order the Player from the Field of Play (Sin Bin) for 10 Minutes. A replacement is not allowed. The player shall remain in the Order Off (Sin Bin) Zones for 10 minutes. A player guilty of a second infraction involving disruptive conduct in the same match is shown a red card and is sent off


"When one player fielded the ball, he stood back and no member of the opposition was permitted to approach beyond the mark thus made until the man in possession had kicked off".

Other interesting features of the game was that a player was not allowed to catch from a hop, nor was lifting with the toe allowed, except when it was done without bending the body. And when a goal was scored the teams changed sides.

However, the 'mark' eventually disappeared as the rules became more unified, but the fact that it did exist represents an interesting connection between the Irish and Australian games.





CHILD SAFETY

s Ireland's largest sporting organisation, the GAA is very conscious of our responsibilities as we provide all sections and members of the Association with the highest possible standards of good practice in the delivery and promotion of our games. This onus of responsibility particularly applies to our work with children and vulnerable adults and has been one of the key developments within the Association in recent years.

With more than 14,500 underage teams throughout Ireland, plus thousands of children as young as four and five years of age who attend weekly fun-oriented coaching academies, this aspect of work has never been more important.

Our new Code of Best Practice in Youth Sport has proven to be of great assistance to all sections of the Association in creating a meaningful, developmental and safe environment for all young people who play or attend our Gaelic Games. The Code itself not only highlights our child and player welfare responsibilities but also addresses the manner in which we promote and play our games at underage level.

Within this Code we have outlined a specific Code of Behaviour* to assist all of our mentors when working with underage players. This publication addresses the minimum levels of acceptable behaviour, practice and conduct required from our coaches, mentors, supporters, parents, guardians, referees, Clubs and of course from our young players as well,

and has proven to be a tremendous success at all levels of the Association.

The appointment of Children's Officer at Club and County level and the creation of a National Children's Office within the Association have all been key to the successful implementation of this initiative. The support structures provided now include the monitoring and implementation of good practice by Children's Officers at Club level, delivery of the Irish Sports Council/GAA Child Protection Workshops for all underage mentors, the vetting of all persons working with children and vulnerable adults and the integration of child welfare good practice in all underage activities including the training of coaches, the organising of VHI GAA Cúl Camps, the GAA Go Games programme and our work at school level through Cumann na mBunscol.

It is our aim to assist our mentors in promoting and ensuring our Gaelic Games comply with the highest possible standards in our work with children and young people.

We wish to see this Code developed, promoted and implemented as an initiative that encourages fair play, respect, equality, safety and no discrimination in all aspects of our work with children and young people.

The Code of Behaviour for working with underage players has been agreed as a joint initiative by the Gaelic Athletic Association, Ladies Gaelic Football Association, Camogie Association, Irish Handball Council and the Rounders Council of Ireland)



- 6.7 Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
- 6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
- 6.9 Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
- If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any trespass.




