02. Fireworks, smoke canisters, gas- horns, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground and any person in found to be in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground
03. The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
04. The unauthorized climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in this ground strictly forbidden.
05. Unnecessary noise from the use of radio sets, gas-horns and behavior likely to cause confusion Of nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
06. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object the pitch.
07. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
08. Any person who fails to comply with the instruction from a Garda or Steward may be ejected from the ground.
09. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
10. The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochána.
11. Any person who remains in or obstructs a gangway or circulation area may be ejected from the ground.
12. The Ground Management reserve the right for it's servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
13. All persons in the grounds are reminded of their obligation under Section 18(3) of the Fire Services Act 1981 to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger from fire to anyone using the grounds.

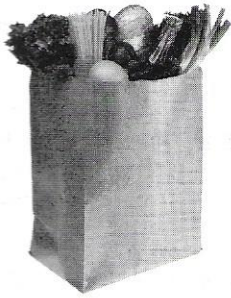

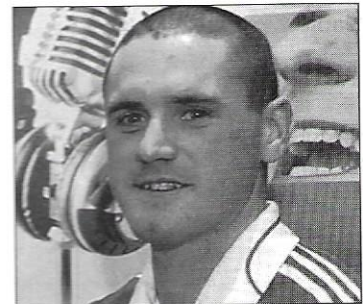

Finally, we wish to thank you all for coming to support the team today. We wish the team and management every success today in the final and hope it can be a proud and memorable day for Glenswilly.

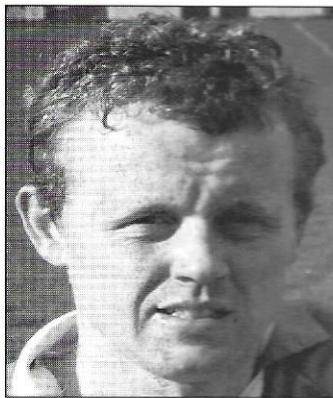

months. Both clubs are very rural in their makeup and this will give a great boost to other small clubs around the county when they see both clubs playing at this level.



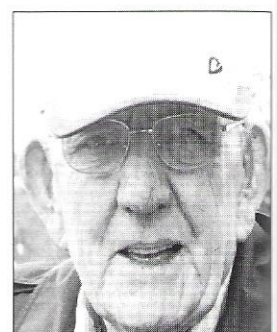

Cloughaneely man in the St. Michael's camp

Seanie Boyle, who has played all his football with Cloughaneely, is in the neighbouring St. Michael's camp for the county final.

Seanie, from Falcarragh, wore the blue and white of Cloughaneely for the best part of 20 years and also featured in the green and gold of Donegal at all levels from U-16 right up to senior.

In the past decade and a half he has worked with a string of teams in Cloughaneely and county teams at U-16 and minor level among them the 1999 county minor team who lost to Benny Coulter and Down after a replay in an Ulster final.

But for now he is the trainer/coach and along with manager Eddie Harkin has taken the men from the Bridge to an historic first Donegal senior championship final and within touching distance of the Promised Land.

"When Eddie was appointed manager at the start of the year he gave me a call and asked if I would train the team," explained Seanie.

"I had worked with Colm McFadden (senior) and Eddie three years ago and I knew all the players and the quality of the squad and it was an easy decision to make really. I knew the players and their potential and as a coach you always want to work with quality players.

"I know I'm a Cloughaneely man and always will and I will no doubt work with the club in the future, but for a coach it was too good a chance to pass up and now I'm with St. Michael's my total focus is on St. Michael's and hopefully winning the championship.

"They are a very dedicated bunch of players and want to

do well. They are ambitious and a pleasure to work with. They have put in a huge effort all year and it has now paid off."

Many modern coaches will blind you with science and bamboozle you with game plays and tactics. But not so the St. Michael's coach.

For him football is still a simple game and St. Michael's successful run has been built on hard graft and effort on the training field.

"Obviously, we have a very talented squad of players. But our success this year is all down to hard work on the training field. It has not been so easy with so many of the players involved with the county team and away at college.

"But we have overcome that and while the boys were away with the county, the rest of the squad have put in a huge effort. And when the county lads came back to us they were naturally in great shape but so too were the rest of the boys because they had done the work and put in the effort. And I think that has been our big strength this season and has where we are now and with a bit of luck we can complete the job on Sunday."

An unfortunate back injury suffered playing in an National League game against Dublin, in Croke Park, in the autumn of 1994, cut his county career short and for a number of years greatly curtailed his playing days with Cloughaneely.

Success with Cloughaneely for Seanie was confined to two All-Ireland Gaeltacht titles. But now as a coach with a growing reputation he has set his sights on greater glory and come 6 pm this evening he could very well have masterminded his first major win.

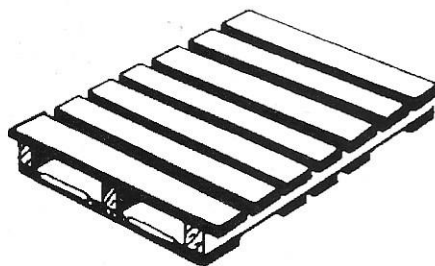

The inseparable twins

There's a considerable age difference between St Michael's and Glenswilly but this afternoon will provide the latest chapter in the tale of the inseparable twins.

St Michael's came into existence in 1953 and Eamon Cannon, a schoolteacher and county footballer who came from Kilcar, is considered the founding father. Constantly battling emigration, St Michael's reached four county junior finals in the sixties but having lost the lot, soon fell into a generation of inactivity.

It took until 1983 for the slumber to be awoken from, when the club won its first junior championship. The curve had begun to take an upward slant. And it continues to do so. A second followed in 1992 before the clinching of an intermediate title in 2003.

Then, the townspeople of Creeslough and Dunfanaghy roared their team all the way to a county and Ulster intermediate championship win before losing out in the All-Ireland final against Ilen Rovers from Cork in Ratoath.

But the run enabled St Michael's to sample the delicacy of the senior championship, having previously only did so when they joined forces with their neighbours from Falcarragh, reaching the county semi-final in 2006, losing out to St Eunan's in heartbreaking fashion after the concession of a last minute Ross Wherity goal.

The manner of that defeat hadn't been lost on the contemporaries and current captain Michael Gallagher said last week it was one of the last things discussed in the O'Donnell Park dressing room before their first semi-final since, the 1-15 to 1-6 defeat of Glenfin last month. The club

now finds itself in a senior county final for the first time. It took five years but the ghosts were finally exorcised.

Glenswilly, who will be celebrating their 30th birthday next year, could considerably add to the occasion of their pearl anniversary with the presence of the Dr Maguire Cup for the winter months. It was a 19-year-old Manus McFadden that in 1982 drew in those from Glenswilly, who had been playing their ball with the likes of St Eunan's, Termon and Glenfin until then. From humble beginnings in McGinley's field in Breenagh, the club moved down to its current location at Pairc Naomh Columba in Foxhall in the

mid-nineties.

Like St Michael's, they enjoyed some quirky moments down the years but the investment in time has seen the team evolve. In 1984, Glenswilly tasted victory in the junior championship for the first time, which was a year after St Michael's. And in 2005, two seasons after St Michael's success, they won the intermediate championship when they defeated Cloughaneely at O'Donnell Park.

Just like St Michael's, Glenswilly were eventually defeated by the team who would be crowned All-Ireland champions, in their case at the Ulster final in Enniskillen against Inniskeen. Glenswilly led 0-10 to 1-5 in stoppage time, only for the Monaghan champions to break their hearts when Pearse McSkeane grabbed a late goal. From that day until this, Glenswilly have rubbed shoulders with those in the top bracket of county football.

A first appearance in the senior final landed in 2007, perhaps sooner than Glenswilly's own expectations, but St Eunan's, appearing in their third successive showpiece were that little bit longer in the tooth and ran in a 0-12 to 1-3 victory. The success whetted the appetite, though, although a little like St Michael's, Glenswilly had a tormenting semi-final loss to use as their driving force this term.

Glenswilly's *annus horribilis* was last year's defeat to Naomh Conaill, a match in which they led by two points with two minutes to play only for the Thompson brothers, Anthony and Leon, to grab a goal apiece and complete the most remarkable of turnabouts. It was a devastating loss. But from turning a negative into a positive, Glenswilly have used that defeat to drive themselves to the final once more. And St Michael's lie in wait. The term 'novel pairing' has been frequently bandied about over the last three weeks or so but when the end of day's tills are totted this evening at the earliest - or after a replay if required - Donegal will have a new county champion.

The fact neither St Michael's nor Glenswilly has taken home the Dr Maguire Cup merely adds to the level of intrigue. In a way, it'll mark a definitive point of differential between the two progressive clubs.

And the twins will finally be separated.

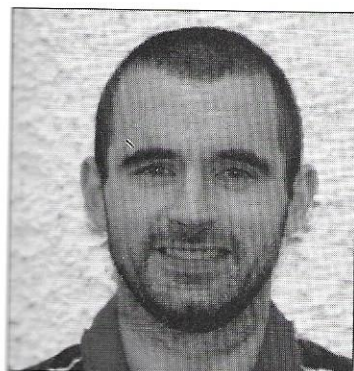

"Like the rest of the (Donegal) panel this year, he put in a massive shift of work, and it paid off. He was one of our most consistent performers all campaign. The job of a score-getter isn't always easy, but he seems to make it look that way sometimes.

"Saying that, we'll be determined that he has an off day on Sunday! It's going to be very hard to stop him the

way he has been going. But if we want to come out on top he's someone that we're going to have to keep an eye on from the word go."

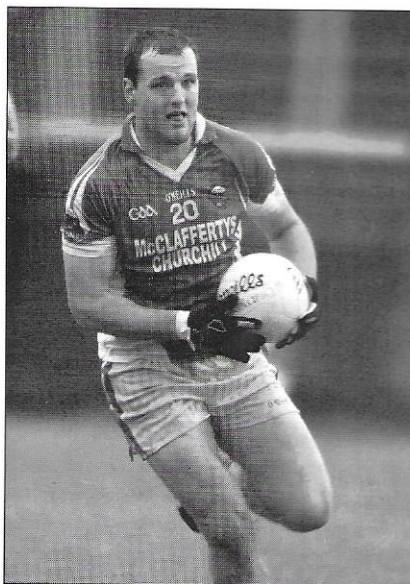
Both sides provided a considerable backbone to 'Machine McGuinness' throughout the summer and, their collective efforts, bore big fruit in the form of a Division 2 championship, and, more importantly, a first Ulster SFC crown in 19 years. Still, there is one more big and elusive prize still up for grabs – the Dr Maguire Cup.

Murphy, without any hesitation, heralds it as one of the biggest prizes out there for Donegal footballers. Packed houses at Croker and Clones are great, but parochial pride is a hard bond to sever.

"It's a massive medal," he added. "Ask any club player. They'll tell you how much it means to them. It's one that you'll always cherish. These opportunities don't come along that often, especially for a club like ourselves. We have to try and seize this chance. But it's not going to be easy. You

just have to look at the pedigree of St Michael's.

"It's a massive game for both clubs and indeed both parishes and it's one I'm really looking forward to."

THE MAVERICK HEARTS

Where have all the good maverick hearts gone? I'm talking about the guys who come at things from the "Kildare side" real lateral thinkers and real free spirits who can sport an occasional unexplained black eye and then turn the match in a heartbeat. These are the men who really live in the moment. Mick O'Dwyer is probably the most successful of them and is brilliant at gently ruffling plumage and Brian McEniff once played for Sligo Rovers under the name John Rooney when the ban was in force.

A lady once told me that the late great Eamon Coleman from Derry looked like a bold wee boy in need of a skelp. Whatever about skelps, Coleman loved taking lumps out of the "establishment" and that included Dublin and Cork when he guided Derry to All-Ireland victory in 1993. No PLAN, but buckets of charisma and he gave me a mighty exclusive one time by revealing that he had asked the Derry county board for £150 per week and they were only prepared to give him a £100.

A man with a big heart like that demands respect and there were loads of weeping women at his wake on the shores of Lough Neagh. As an unreconstructed maverick it gives me a great kick when I see really talented members of the species performing at their best. When Martin McHugh hit THAT 55 metres against Cavan in 1992 he KNEW he could do it's . . . the rest of us were wondering.

When Rory Gallagher floated the ball over Tony Blake's head in 2000 when Fermanagh beat Donegal with 14 there was no doubt in his mind. Rory has just won his third Antrim county club title on the trot (all above board) with St Galls and he has been living in Killybegs for the past two years but then we never bothered too much about frontiers around Belleek. And when Brendan Devenney bulled his way through the Aodh Ruadh defence and hit 0-14 in 1999 it was a victory for all free spirits.

But that was partly because Aodh Ruadh tried to compete with him honourably and failed.. today Brendan would be smothered in an ould blanket. For the real maverick heart relies on instinct talent or that little pulse that beats slightly faster than the norm. and like the chameleon he/she always knows where there is light and heat.

And he will always beat the man with a plan when things get really crappy. The great Galway hurler Sylvie Linnane told Cyril Farrell (who was great at handling mavericks himself) that he always had two pints of Guinness on the night before a club match. Now that would not happen in today's robotic diet obsessed game.

Sylvie had the wrists of an angel and Brendan Lynskey was known to have a quiet puff of two but he always delivered. When Donegal's own Martin Griffin scraped the stars for a ball nobody was wondering if he had done seventy nine press-ups and broke a few bleeps tests the previous night.

He hadn't but was Donegal's most gifted full-back ever and then there was a Fermanagh club player who told his manager to f..k off when their team was nine points down at half-time in a county final in the 1980s.

The manager was a wise man and told motormouth he had ten minutes..so this real maverick went out and scored ten points and they won.

Now that took cojones on both their parts. My first cousin Seamus Congo O'Kane was probably one of the biggest mavericks of them all, having played for Tyrone, Westmeath, Leitrim and Donegal. He scored half a dozen points playing in a county final for Sean MacCumhailis in 1971 but hitched home because he believed he should not have been taken off. As for today's final if Ciaran Bonner strikes form then you never know what might happen.

A glorious first awaits the winners

SIXTEEN clubs have had their names etched on the Dr Maguire Cup. Barring a draw this afternoon, a new name will be engraved upon Donegal football's most sought after prize.

Neither Glenswilly nor St Michael's have ever savoured the sweet scent of victory in a senior final, but today will see one of them take their place among the elite roll of honour that lists the winners of the good Doctor.

The romantics love the breakthrough wins, that special occasion when success is tasted for the first time. More often than not, it's against the odds. This of Donegal winning Sam Maguire in 1992 and the county drunk on euphoria for months; it was a similar tale in Derry a year later; and the wins for Armagh and Tyrone in 2002 and 2003 were celebrated with no less zeal by them as they landed the big prize having waited the long wait.

While Glenswilly and St Michael's were among the names mentioned as possible candidates as Gaels debated the possibilities following the draw earlier in the year, a victory today would still represent a real coming of age of sorts for the winners.

Either Gary McFadden (Glenswilly) or Michael Gallagher (St Michael's) will place their name in their club's annals were they to become the first men from their parish to hoist aloft the famous trophy before their joyous people.

Six years ago, Paddy Campbell experienced that feeling when he captained Naomh Conaill to their maiden co final win - beating St Eunan's in a replay. "It was an unbelievable moment," Campbell said. "There was relief there too because the club had been trying to win it for so long and we felt that we had finally fulfilled the objective, so from that point of view it was just fantastic to win it.

"I remember grown men were crying, men who had put their whole life into the club in coaching, training or just running the club in general. It was a victory for all of them.

"It was great to get that monkey off our backs. They had contested one final before that, way back in the 60s or so, so it was an unreal feeling for the people in the club to finally get a wee bit of success.

"I was very lucky that Hughie Molloy had asked me to captain that team. It was a special moment to accept Dr Maguire, I'll never forget it. It was such an enjoyable moment

and such an honour to be the first man to do it from the club. "Even now looking back, it's a great feeling."

Even six years ago, you can sense the pride swelling in the former full-back as he remembers the sea of blue and white that engulfed Sean MacCumhaill Park that afternoon.

The Naomh Conaill of 2005 really broke the mould as a team of youngsters took the summer by storm on their way to taking Dr Maguire back to Davy Brennan Memorial Park. While it returned last year, it's still 2005 that they remember in Glenties.

To think about possible scenes in Glenswilly, or even Creeslough and Dunfanaghy would be criminal in the build-up says Campbell. "You can't think about what comes after the game, because the stakes are too high - there is too much riding on a county final.

"As players, you have a job to do and in a final you can't be distracted from that job. It means everything and you have to give everything - it's no good coming away from a county final saying that you didn't give it your all."

As they march behind the band this afternoon and the flags are fluttered in the terrace and in the stand, the sense of occasion will really fill the air. The TG4 cameras are rolling and for many of this

afternoon's participants this will be the biggest stage upon which they have strutted their stuff.

"Nerves can't be a factor," warns Paddy Campbell, however.

"You'll always have the butterflies in the stomach. I remember us gathering in the town that Sunday, leaving on the bus and when you see all the bunting, the flags and the 'good luck' messages out, you realise how much it means to people."

is your club sorting things out ASAP?

The positive influence the ASAP programme is having on the lives of our members is not easily quantifiable.

In the five years since its inception the GAA's Alcohol and Substance Abuse Prevention programme (run in conjunction with the HSE) has reached almost every club in the country. Its aim is simple – to reduced the potential harm caused by alcohol and substance misuse.

The majority of Irish people enjoy a sociable drink responsibly. However, there is no denying that as a nation we often engage with alcohol in a way that exposes us to potential harm. The facts are there for us all to see (taken from www.alcoholireland.ie):

- The Irish drink about 20% more than the average European
- In 2010, the average Irish person aged 15+ drank 11.9 litres of pure alcohol, according to provisional data. That's the equivalent of about 44 bottles of vodka, 470 pints or 124 bottles of wine
- More than one in four of those attending accident and emergency departments have alcohol related injuries, almost half of which occurred to people aged under 30 years
- One in three crash deaths is alcohol-related

The GAA has always seen itself as more than a sporting organisation, and, as such, extends the duty of care it has to its members beyond the playing pitch. The ASAP programme is just one example of this. The

programme continues to offer advice, information, and support to clubs, counties, and all GAA members in and around matters pertaining to alcohol and substance abuse.

ASAP county coordinators and ASAP club officers are doing tireless work to promote messages, material and activities that encourage healthy interaction with all potentially harmful substances. They are also there to offer help and direction to anyone who may find themselves in need of assistance around alcohol and drug issues.

Opening lines of communication about once taboo subjects is the first step in engaging with problems in a meaningful way. That is what the ASAP programme is all about. The ASAP manual, DVD and website www.gaa.ie/asap are just three resources available to your club in tackling the issue of drug and alcohol misuse. County coordinators, in conjunction with the National Coordinator, Colin Regan, are at your disposal at any time for information and education sessions with teams and/or mentors.
