**Encouraging Participation** 

The GAA Social Initiative has, since its establishment in August 2010, taken root within the clubs involved in the Pilot Club phase. The Initiative arose from an invitation by President Mary McAleese to the GAA to implement a scheme for men in the community, many of whom, from her observation, were finding it more difficult in recent years to engage fully in community life and identify suitable social outlets.

So far, 93 clubs have volunteered to participate in the Pilot Phase and have, already, organised interesting and worthwhile

social events for the men in their communities. The clubs' efforts have been greatly appreciated by those involved and have invariably led to more active participation by the participants and an interest in expanding the range of activities being organised.

While men are the main focus of the Initiative, the social activities organised by the clubs have included and, indeed, in many cases been organised by lady club members. Examples of club activities can be seen in the Social Initiative Newsletters on the website:



VALUING VOLUNTEERS



Iohn O'Reilly is a familiar face to the patrons of the Ramor Utd club. John is a very proud club man and while he never played for his much loved Ramor Utd he volunteered his time to the development of the club facilities and in 1999 on being elected as Chairman he set about undertaking much development within the grounds to meet the needs of a growing community for the next six years. John never spared his time, machinery or equipment to see out his dreams for the development of facilities at Ramor Utd. When the Ramor Utd club was formed in 1976 the playing field known as 'the football field' was rented and in 1983 it was agreed to purchase the field.

The development in Ramor Utd got a major boost in 1985 when they won the Senior Championship and Senior League under team manager Fr Tom McKiernan. More land was purchased and a

new club house and car park were a priority. For the next eight years the then finance committee embarked on fundraising to finance their dream clubrooms. The Ramor club achieved a great deal in eight years and in 1991, the club won the most improved grounds in Cavan.

In 1992 Ramor Utd won another Senior Championship under the management of John Mulvanny, John O'Reilly along with many executive members could see with more underage players and a greater interest in ladies football the playing facilities were under pressure. This \* led to the purchase of more land for a second all weather playing pitch. Following the completion of these developments in 2003 John accepted the Ulster Centenary County Award plague for the best pitch in Cavan and back then our present Co Chairman in Tom O'Reilly was on the adjudicating panel.

To finance the ongoing development and to meet club expenditure John launched a weekly lotto draw. Armed with a folder of information on statistics and odds, he took the idea to a Ramor Utd meeting in 1992. The motion was passed following a long discussion. John has recalled many times since - Jackpot starting at £500 and was to rise by £100

per week. In the event of the draw not being won five tickets for £20 each were drawn. The first Ramor Utd lotto draw took place on the 21st Feb. 1993. Disaster stuck! First night out the jackpot was won. Third night out the jackpot was won. Getting back on track and like many other clubs the lotto has been the clubs main source of fundraising. John still striving for better club facilities embarked on an all weather running track for use by all teams the local community, local teams and the facilities are always available to Virginia College free of charge for training, matches and sports day.

Coinciding with all the energy John was putting into the Ramor club he is an active member of the Virginia Agricultural Society. Dating back to April, 1980 John was elected President of the society. For the following twelve years John gave outstanding service to the society. John combined his busy schedule as an agricultural contractor with commitment and dedication to his position as President. When he retired from his position he was unanimously elected joint treasurer of the society a position he held until May of 2011. At present John is joint PRO of the society. No job is too big or too small for him to undertake and he has the ability to get others involved. The community of Virginia is all the richer for the voluntary time John has given so willingly.

Armagh and Antrim get today's action underway here at Kingspan Breffni Park, in what promises to be a very entertaining Ulster Minor Camogie Final.

For the former it is a rare appearance in a Minor decider, with the Orchard County qualifying for today's game by virtue of their 8-12 to 2-4 win over Tyrone in the Ulster Shield Final. Ulster Colleges All-Star Joanne Mullen. captain Orla Cairns and Rachel Merry, Kirsty Sheridan and Eadaoin Murphy are some of the Armagh players to watch out for this afternoon.

Armagh manager Miceal Murphy is looking forward to today's decider. "It will be a big day for us. It is a big deal for Armagh to get to the final," he said. "Today will definitely be a big step up for the girls against Antrim."

Murphy is pleased with the performance of his side to date this year. "They have done well, but exams have got in the way also and it has been hard to get a full attendance at training in recent weeks because of that."

It is a big deal for Armagh to reach any final, but to play it before a big attendance here at Kingspan Breffni Park is something special.

a busy day of action on Saturday June 25th as the Senior, Intermediate and Junior Camogie Championship finals take place.

Last year's Premier All-Ireland Junior Champions Antrim will take on Derry in the Senior final, Hosts Armagh will be hoping for silverware when they face league champions Cavan in the Intermediate Final.




86% of GAA income is reinvested in Grassroots Development

The 2010 Central GAA Accounts show a 2% increase in the investment of Association revenue to Clubs and Counties up to 86%. The figure is up from 84% in 2009 and currently 14% of income is being reserved for GAA administration Costs.

This makes the GAA unique and something we should be very proud of as no other sporting, cultural and community organisation returns this level of revenue or makes the significant social and economic contribution that the GAA does to Irish life.

When you attend a match during the 2011 Championship series the majority of your entrance fee goes back to the development of your Club and your County.

# SENIOR MATCH PREVIEW A look ahead to Today's Senior Game by John Hughes



This is one of the rarer species of Ulster Championship encounter. The teams haven't met in the championship proper since 2002, and the only time they've met since then was in the qualifiers in 2005, which we take a look at opposite.

There are obvious links and affinities between the counties though. Mick Higgins was a sure and measured hand behind the scenes as Donegal charged to their first ever Ulster title in 1972. Meanwhile the peerless Martin McHugh enchanted Ulster with Donegal on the playing field before going on to exalt Cavan from the sideline. A compliment repaid.

This year many Donegal fans were quietly content to see Cavan clinch a deserved Ulster Under 21 title. The Tir Chonaill men had defeated Cavan in the 2010 decider in Brewster and developed an appreciation of that Breffni side's qualities at close quarters. Indeed, many of the leading talents from Cavan and Donegal's recent Under 21

tussle will be decorating today's contest. And so to today's contest in Kingspan Breffni Park always one of my favourites amphitheatres, the Slane of Gaelic football, Donegal have been subjected to one of the most comprehensive pannings of any sides to have laced boots in anger in the championship.

In some respects that's easy to understand. The Preliminary Round game against Antrim was one of the few times I've ever seen 29 men standing behind the opposition 40 outside of a training session. And this was in a game were Donegal were winning comfortably. As the second half ground on I kept asking myself, 'What are Donegal afraid of?'.

Having mulled it over for quite a while now, the only explanation that seems to hold water is fear of failure. Perhaps getting that first Ulster Championship win in Ballybofey since 2007 really was as important as the Donegal a younger Cavan outfit gave heads kept telling us in the lead up to the game.

Still, the reason I was asking why Donegal were afraid was because Antrim certainly weren't offering much to fear. Donegal could have put Antrim to the sword, but chose to park the bus instead. The appearance of ultra-defence in such benign circumstances is not a cheerful portent. However, the performance was uncharacteristic of Donegal's

football so far this year, so we may justifiably hope it was an aberration. Looking back, it's hard to even think of that day in Ballybofey as a championship game. The thin crowd, the slanting rain, the lack of passion. Hopefully today the weather will be kind to us and both sides will give us a game worthy of the Ulster Championship.

In that respect it might more helpful to look back to 2010 and the Ulster Under 21 Championship Final between these sides. There are many echoes between the days. Terry Hyland and Jim McGuinness were both on the sideline and a number of players have made the transition to senior football for both sides. Cavan had a powerful midfield in Gearoid McKiernan and David Givney and it took Michael Murphy coming back to disrupt their rhythm. Donegal might have won by 2-8 to 0-7, but them a hell of a game.

Cavan come into this battle as outsiders, with nothing to lose. Psychologically speaking, there is no more dangerous team in gaelic football. Donegal have hopefully shaken the monkey off their back and will approach this game in a more positive spirit. If those two stars align, we could have a great contest. But, whether it's a clunker or a clinker, it's hard to see past a Donegal win.

# ALOOK BACK TO 2005 The Last Championship Meeting by John Hughes

Donegal came into this game on the back of a 0-16 to 0-12 win over Wicklow. Played on a horrible day in Aughrim the visitors only secured the win thanks to an injury time flurry of scores. Donegal folk often refer to that as one of the worst games in recorded history and attendance at that match marks you out as something of a Tir Chonaill ultra. Cavan weren't coming in with much better form, they had been on the receiving end of a 3-19 to 0-7 stuffing by Tyrone in an Ulster Semi-Final replay.

Brian McEniff's Donegal, much like today, were fancied for the game in Kingspan Breffini Park. They were on a winning trajectory, while Cavan where on an eight day turnaround from a horrific spanking. But it was the Breffni men, under Martin McElkennon deputising for the ill Eamonn Coleman. who rose to the occasion


From the start it was clear that Cavan were more pumped for the game and putting some pride back in the blue jersey was priority number one. They tore into Donegal with a series of points before Larry Reilly struck a low shot past Donegal's teenage net minder, Michael Boyle, to put the homesters 1-4 to 0-1 up. Cavan maintained their superiority in the second quarter to go in at the break leading by 1-6 to 0-2.

Donegal pulled out all the stops to close the gap, but James Reilly gave one of those performances that rightly marked him out as the top keeper in the province, making save after save. Brendan Devenney was Donegal's most active threat. hitting a goal on 50 minutes to give the gold and green a lifeline in the game.

The decisive moment came with two minutes left on the clock and featured both Reilly and Devenney. Donegal were awarded a penalty with the scores at 1-11 to 1-8. Devenney stepped up to spot, but he was psyched out by Reilly who saved the Eunan's man's shot with his legs.

Emboldened by that save, Cavan saw out the game to take a surprise 1-11 to 1-10 win. Cavan went on to rekindle a historic rivalry in the next round, gaining a 1-8 to 1-6 victory over Meath, before going out of the championship in the final round of the qualifiers with a three point loss against Mayo in Hyde park.

### CLUB MAITH

How good is your Club?

Club Maith is an Ulster GAA Club accreditation scheme which aims to acknowledge, and reward, the unrivalled commitment and time invested by GAA volunteers to their GAA club. The GAA prides itself on its strong club ethos and excellent grassroots structures. This is not possible without our Club Volunteers. Tradition dictates that the work carried-out in our GAA clubs is of a standard which every GAA member can be proud of.

Club Maith is firstly a club development tool for clubs, identifying best practice and laying-down foundations for further club development. The completion of the process will result in clubs gaining a better understanding of how good their club is, as well as ensuring best practice is standard in all its business.

Club Maith is also an accreditation scheme, in

that successful clubs will be accredited through Ulster GAA, and Sport NI. Sport NI and the Irish Sports Council have each endorsed the scheme. Clubs in the six counties will receive the Sport NI Clubmark NI award on achieving the bronze level Club Maith award. Successful clubs will be awarded either bronze, silver, or gold awards.

Club Maith Facilitators have been trained to assess clubs through their Portfolio and Club Visit. The process is straightforward. The award is valid for three years, requiring a simple annual online health-check. After three years the club will have to go through the process again, however, all the spade-work will have been achieved by this stage!

Ulster GAA are assisting many clubs through the process currently. There is a raft of information on the Club Maith website, including examples of policies, template documents and so on. An "Applying For Club Maith" workshop has been delivered in all counties since the New Year and Ulster GAA staff are on-hand to answer any queries clubs may have. Although no time-frame has been set, Ulster GAA would recommend that clubs allow three - four months for completion of the process from start to finish. Obviously this is subject to how quickly clubs can submit their Club Maith Portfolio

Up until the end of April 2011 five clubs have been accredited with each having received a Gold award. They are: Eglish St Patricks GAC, Co. Tyrone: Lamh Dhearg GAC, Co. Antrim; Derrygonnelly Harps GAC, Co. Fermanagh; Moy Tír na nÓg GAC, Co. Tyrone; and Crossmaglen Rangers GAC, Co. Armagh. Involved in the pilot scheme were Donaghmore St Patricks, Kildress Wolfe Tones, Glenullin Mitchels, and Clonduff GAA. Comhghairdeas to all involved! A number of other clubs are in the assessment phase and should be accredited during the Ulster Championship.


















### A WORD FROM THE TOP

# LEARNING THE GAME ULSTER GAA Launch Diploma Courses

The Ulster GAA in partnership with Open College Network Northern Ireland will be running two fully accredited courses in autumn 2011. These Diploma **Courses in GAA Performance** Sports Coaching and GAA Sports Management will be pitched at the same difficulty and complexity as A-Level or Leaving Cert.

The objective is to reward the hard work undertaken by many volunteers in clubs and schools and provide them with the opportunity to bring this into a formal qualification. In times of economic hardship and unemployment, the GAA Club environment can help people develop new skills and competencies that they can use when seeking employment.

Our long term vision is to have a number of mandatory units / modules that we Ulster GAA offer our volunteers. These will build into a Diploma in respective areas.

If the volunteer over time takes a number of these they can begin to build a qualification at Level 3/4 by taking these mandatory modules and then by accessing further optional modules that exist within the Oualifications Credit Framework. This we envisage would potentially build into a "Degree in GAA Related Studies".

### Level 3 Diploma in GAA Performance Sports Coaching

Preparation for performance in Gaelic Games has moved on considerable in recent vears to incorporate many new technologies and approaches to preparing players and teams. This programme pulls together the key components involved in planning and implementing a successful yearly plan.

This programme is being delivered to meet the increasing needs of coaches who want to coach at the top level within club, college and county team structures. It recognises that these GAA Coaches need to be skilled up in all aspects of coaching, mentoring and sport education.

The workshops programme is being delivered by GAA and Coaching Ireland Oualified Tutors and practicing managers and the subject areas will evolve around the topics above.

### **Ulster GAA Team** Management Programme

This programme is being delivered at the request of coaches who have made the transition from coach to manager. It recognises that coaching and managing have significant similarities but it also recognises that they are different. The series of

workshops will take the coach/manager through a programme that will help explore the critical managerial areas to help develop understanding, competencies and abilities to apply critical thinking, problem solving and decision making skills.

This programme can be offered to both team managers and club officers who have a management role.

The Diploma Course is being delivered by GAA and Coaching Ireland Qualified Tutors and practicing managers and the subject areas will evolve around the above topics:


It is envisaged that candidates applying for these two Diploma Courses will need to have a minimum of Award 1. be currently involved in a coaching role with their club/ county or be actively involved in a GAA administration role for a minimum of 3 years. The Ulster Council will strive to keep course fees to a minimum but in order to cover the accreditation process and subsequent tutoring and administration costs a course fee will be required.







Thomas is the longest serving referee in the county. Thomas began his career in 1970 and even today over 40 years later, the St Nauls club man still enjoys doing the occasional game.

He has refereed the Senior County Final on two occasions in 1977 and eleven years later in 1998. Thomas has refereed County Finals at all levels, Intermediate (1993), Junior (1991), Under 21 (1980 & 1981) and Minor (1994).

In hurling Thomas has set a record that is unlikely to be beaten, remarkably he has refereed the County Senior Hurling Final on twelve occasions. When one considers the great rivalries between Burt and Setanta during them years this is indeed a staggering feat.

He refereed numerous Inter-County hurling games during his years on the Inter County Hurling Panel (1989-1997). Thomas was unique in that he was also on the Inter County Football Panel (1975-1981) and refereed many games in the National League, Ulster Under 21 and Minor Championships.

However, it was not just on the field of play that Thomas made such a contribution but also in administration. Thomas was Secretary of the Referees Board in 1976 and again served for nine years in a row from 1987-1995.

No doubt but for his role as Secretary he would have refereed more finals.
Currently Thomas is still very active in administration both with his club St Nauls and is also a member of the Referees Forum and this year has taken up the role as Chairman of the forum. As he says himself it now gives him great pleasure in seeing young referees coming through due to the great work done by the Forum. With such a highly respected referee at the helm his knowledge and experience is invaluable to these young referees.

Thomas lists the qualities needed in a good referee as knowledge of the rules, common sense, a cool head, a high level of fitness, a good sense of humour and self-confidence. No one will argue that he himself has all six qualities in abundance.

Thomas was given the ultimate award by the Donegal County Board when he was inducted into the Hal of Fame and joins the 1992 All-Ireland winning team in this exclusive category. You can also find Thomas with a steward's bib in MacCumhaill Park at games, and this more than anything epitomizes the commitment and dedication Thomas has for the association on a voluntary basis.



### **FOOTBALL ANALYSIS**

Ulster GAA have carried out some statistical analysis of the Ulster Senior Football Championship 2010. The study looked at the passing trends of all the matches in last year's USFC. The type of


each pass was recorded as well as the success of each pass played. The purpose of the study was to establish the extent to which the hand pass and kick pass were used in Gaelic football.

The study was also expected to establish the success rate of each form of pass in the competitive setting.

The average results per games were as follows;

### Summary:

Across the 8 USFC matches in 2010, hand passes account for 2 from every 3 passes. Of these hand passes, only 1 in every 17 resulted in possession being lost;

However, of the kick passes 1 in every 4 resulted in possession being lost;

Of all turnovers caused by unsuccessful passing 74% (just under 3/4) are the result of unsuccessful kick passing, with only 26% due to unsuccessful hand pass attempts.

Of all the successful passing attempts only 31% came as a result of successful kick passing, with the remaining 69% as a result of successful hand passing;

Of all the passes played in the USFC 2010, there was a success rate of approximately 86%, with the other 14% resulting in possession turnover.



### TALKING BALLS FILE

A Fortnight Spent in Cavan One Sunday Afternoon

Cavan is a place with many redeeming factors, not least the wonderful roads and the soft lilt of an accent, the best exponent of which is Sean Gallagher of Dragons'

In football terms Cavan is of course up there at the top of the Ulster Roll of Honour with 39 Ulster titles and five All Irelands. They won an amazing seven in a row Ulster Championships from 1939 to 1946. Everyone else was concerned with the Emergency, rationing and contraband ladies stockings. Cavan were busy hoarding Anglo Celts.


To the younger reader, obsessed with Tweeting, Facebook and making a horlicks of themselves on YouTube, the idea that Cavan may have enjoyed success is Gaelic Football is an entirely preposterous suggestion. But it is true. They may have racked up a savage amount of managers since Val Andrews was last in charge but they can point to the record books and a legacy second to none in Ulster.

So dismissive are the youth of today, few of whom can read for long enough to view the history books, that the achievement of the Cavan Under 21 team in reaching this year's All-Ireland decider was a flash in the pan. The same people are less dismissive of Donegal's achievement in losing the 2010 decider mainly because of the involvement of the ManBoy Murphy who is busting a dash onfield for the senior team.

But recent losses on the highest possible stage at Under 21 level aren't the only thing the two counties have in common. There is the wee man from Kilcar who single handedly bestrides the GAA legacy of both counties. If you can bestride anything single handedly that is. Yes Martin McHugh. Almost enough said.

Back in the nineties, Martin was walking the walk rather than talking the talk as he does now. Taking on the Cavan job he led them to a solitary and unlikely Ulster title in 1997. Martin now of course plies his trade as a pundit on BBC television where he looks every bit the Donegal man going out to a dance with his extremely fashionable dress sense and immaculately gelled hair.

Anyhow, we digress. Back to Cavan, as the emigrant said when his goat died. In the early days Cavan frequently fell out with Ulster, trying to play in Connacht where they were



rebuffed and sent packing with the famous cry ringing in their ears "To hell or Cavan."

They have the distinction of playing in the longest All Ireland Semi Final on record. In 1925 they encountered Galway in Tuam. Obviously the immaculate stewarding arrangements in place nowadays were absent, for the spectators were ten deep round the pitch perimeter with people encroaching fifteen yards into the field.

With the crowd making a shamble of the whole affair, the ref gave a sideline throwin every time the ball hit a spectator. Despite protestations by Cavan, Galway prevailed after a game that lasted two hours and four minutes.

The match included the famous end of game announcement, "there will be twenty seven minutes of additional time."

It confirms that I am not the only one who gets lost in the space-time continuum when Cavan GAA is involved.
























First Aid is provided at today's venue by Order of Malta and ambulances are located behind the covered stand and behind the main terracing.


