Thank you to all patrons for attending, our players are volunteer heroes, respect them. Let the games begin and good luck to all.



Maurice brings plenty of big match experience to his refereeing. He refereed the All-Ireland Senior Final between Kerry & Tyrone in 2008 as well as taking charge of the Ulster Final Replay in

the same year. Early in 2008, he took charge of the O'Byrne Cup final between Dublin and Longford, and the All-Ireland Club Senior Semi-Final between Nemo Rangers, Cork and Ballina Stephenites, Mayo. He walked into history in 2005 as the first Laois man to referee an All-Ireland Minor Final. That year he also controlled All-Ireland finals at Intermediate Club and Under-21 levels. He won two Senior Football Championship medals with Stradbally as a forward. Interestingly, Maurice also refereed last year's Ulster Senior Football Championship Preliminary Round clash, between Doíre and Ard Mhacha.

SOCIAL INITIATIVE

Encouraging Participation

The GAA Social Initiative has, since its establishment in August 2010, taken root within the clubs involved in the Pilot Club phase. The Initiative arose from an invitation by President Mary McAleese to the GAA to implement a scheme for men in the community, many of whom, from her observation, were finding it more difficult in recent years to engage fully in community life and identify suitable social outlets.

So far, 93 clubs have volunteered to participate in the Pilot Phase and have. already, organised interesting and worthwhile

social events for the men in their communities. The clubs' efforts have been greatly appreciated by those involved and have invariably led to more active participation by the participants and an interest in expanding the range of activities being organised.

While men are the main focus of the Initiative, the social activities organised by the clubs have included and, indeed, in many cases been organised by lady club members. Examples of club activities can be seen in the Social Initiative Newsletters on the website:

The objective for 2011 is to increase the number of clubs involved to 150 by August and we are therefore appealing to all GAA clubs to seriously consider participating in the Initiative in the coming year. 

GaelicLife MINOR MATCH PREVIEW Ronan Scott, Gaelic Life

WHEN it comes to minor football, nobody does it better than Ulster. In the past ten years, we've become experts at reaching the All-Ireland Final. On just two occasions in that time, the decider has not involved a team from the north, while four different counties have brought the Tom Markham cup home on seven occasions.

Today's meeting of Donegal and Antrim is an odd one as there are strong arguments, both for and against, for either team progressing. On the negative side, neither team covered themselves in glory during the Ulster Minor League. 'What does that matter, sure league means nothing' is likely to be many people's response, but those people are as wrong as a three pound note.

For the past four years, the Ulster teams that reached the Minor League Final - before last year when they let some lads from Leinster have a run



out in the competition - went on to enjoy stellar seasons. Tyrone got to the 2010 Ulster Minor League Final before going on to win the All-Ireland title. Armagh and Tyrone did the Minor treble (League, Ulster and All-Ireland) in 2009 and 2008 respectively.

But, as any underdog will tell you, records are there to be broken. While Antrim and Donegal finished at the foot of Group B, both can attest to having some excellent minor form this year.

At the start of the year. an Antrim team - Lamh Dhearg - won the St Pauls Minor Tournament, the top Ulster Club title at that level It was the first time that a team from the Saffron county won the title since the 80s. Unfortunately, a good part of that team included players who are over-age for Antrim's Ulster championship campaign. However, team management Danny O'Neill and Frankie Fitzsimmons - he managed Lamh Dhearg to that St Pauls' success - will have the St Mary's Belfast players that won the MacLarnon Cup on St Patrick's Day, Mark Jordan played on both the Lamh Dhearg team and the St Mary's side.

The Saffrons met Donegal in the last round of the Ulster

Minor League. That game ended as a draw, 2-9 to 1-12, which makes it even harder to separate the two teams. However, Donegal do have one advantage in that their number includes a group of players who earned All-Ireland glory at Vocational Schools level earlier this year.

Under the quidance of John Joe McShea, the Tir Chonaill boys finally beat Monaghan in the Ulster Schools provincial decider. before going on to beat Cork in the All-Ireland Final. It's fair to say that most of the credit for the success must be laid squarely at the feet of Kilcar's Patrick McBrearty who has burst onto the scene this year. His meteoric rise this season has meant that Jim McGuinness has called the teenager onto the senior panel.

However, Matt Gallagher and Charlie Mulgrew do have other influential players at their disposal such as John O'Malley and Martin Reilly who were also recipients of All-Ireland Vocational Schools medals along with McBrearty. The man who must predict the winner in this game has a hell of a job, but punter must be laughing as he is in for a very close game. At a push, I'll go for Donegal to end up on the right side of the result.








SENIOR MATCH PREVIEV A look ahead to Today's Senior Game

Today's clash sees a side that has just captured a League Title, gained promotion to Division 1 and revelling under their new manager take on opposition that has been decimated by injuries. been relegated to Division 3 and low in confidence. Surely the outcome is straightforward. Welcome to the unpredictable arena of the 2011 Ulster Senior Football Championship.

Dún na nGall under new management of former player Jim McGuinness who is assisted by Rory Gallagher have been a revelation so far this year. They had an outstanding league campaign with notable victories over Doíre and Tír Eoghain, but it was their recent final defeat of Laois in the Division 2 decider at Croke Park that made alot of spectators sit up and take notice.

Team captain, Michael Murphy is in irresistible form and is being ably assisted by the likes of the rejuvenated Colm McFadden. The continued presence of Paul Durcan, Karl Lacey, Kevin Cassidy and Rory Kavanagh has been essential in providing an experienced base for this side in which the newcomers are showing real promise. Under 21 graduates Dermot Molloy



and Mark McHugh have been embedded into the side in a seamless transition from underage ranks.

Liam Bradley is now in his third year in charge of the Saffron County where he is assisted by fellow Derry native Niall Conway. 2009 saw them defeat today's opponents en route to a first Ulster Final appearance since 1970, where they fell to Tír Eoghain while 2010 saw them defeated at the Quarter Final stage by the same opposition. After two successive promotions in the League, 2011 saw Aontroim relegated back to Division 3 following one solitary win over An Mhí. It needs to be outlined that they have been ravaged by injuries, many of which have now cleared up.

Aontroim will hope that Kevin Niblock, Michael McCann and Andy McLean amongst others have adequately recovered from injury to mount a

serious challenge to the Tír Chonaill side. Their reliance on Paddy Cunningham for scores has not lessened and this is surely a concern for the management.

Dún na nGall have not collected the Anglo Celt since their famous year of 1992, when they went on to collect their maiden Sam Maguire, with Jim McGuinness part of the panel. The domination of Ard Mhacha and Tír Eoghain post 1998 leaves an intriguing sideshow to the Ulster Senior Football Championship in that someone has to step up and break this stronghold. Dún na nGall are one of the counties best placed to mount a serious challenge. The winners from today's Preliminary Round will face An Cabhan in the Quarter Finals. For the losers, the Qualifiers await.

Dún na nGall to progress with four to spare...

ALOOK BACK to the Last Championship Meeting

For the last championship meeting between these two sides we only have to go back a mere two years. That damp and dreary day in MacCumhaill Pairc will bring back fond memories for Saffron followers.

Dún na nGall were expected to overcome the visitors whose poor record in the Ulster Senior Football Championship was expected to continue. Dún an nGall were further buoyed by the return of Karl Lacey who had been away for a period travelling.

On the field, Aontroim had to overcome the early loss of experienced goalkeeper Sean McGreevey through injury, who was replaced by Peter Graham. What emerged will live forever in the memory of Aontroim gaels. Terry

O'Neill gave a masterclass of 'sweeping' in front of his full back line. A second half goal from Tomas McCann gave Aontroim further confidence and a late point from substitute Kevin O'Boyle ensured victory over a highly fancied Dún na nGall.

The scenes afterwards were memorable as Aontroim celebrated a fantastic victory as they followed this up with a victory over An Cabhán in the Semi Final before being defeated by both Tír Eoghain and Ciarrai. Teams and scorers on that day were as follows:







VALUING VOLUNTEERS

Roisin Lynch, Treasurer Club Aontroma, Asst Secretary Naomh Comgalls.



Ask Roisin Lynch what her motivation is for carrying out multiple tasks on behalf of club and county and the answer is very straightforward, "I want to see future generations of Antrim children having the opportunity and the facilities to play Gaelic Games."

It is that motivation which drives Roisin in her work as Assistant Secretary at the Antrim town club of St Comgalls, where she has responsibility for driving the clubs input on the Dunsilly Centre of Participation project, and as Treasurer for Club Aontroma.

Roisin came into both roles within a short time frame. A former county camog, Roisin has been living and working in England after she stopped playing. On her return to Ireland she wondered why there was no local club for her own children to become

involved in around the Antrim area. Roisin takes up the story,

"Then St Comgalls Chairman Tommy Crilly asked me to become involved with the club and to do a coaching course. I agreed and subsequently took on the role of club secretary. With the involvement of St Comgalls with the Antrim County Board and the Ulster Council in the Dunsilly project — a wonderful development right in the middle of our town and our county — that became almost a full time role.

"In November 2007 the newly formed Club Aontroma, which was set up to raise much needed fund to promote Gaelic games and culture in Antrim, issued an appeal for help and I was interested so I went along to a meeting. Very soon after that I became Treasurer of Club Aontroma. I think it was

within a week of volunteering to help!"

Club Aontroma has been involved in some high profile events such as the two Race Days, a night at Drumbo Greyhounds, the 2009 'Up for the Final' dinner and this week's inaugural golf tournament. At each event Roisin is there, making sure everything is running to order. But you can also see Roisin and her CA colleagues at every Antrim home game, hurling and football, selling the half time ballots. Even in the wind and rain which often accompanies early season fixtures in particular Roisin and her fellow volunteers will greet Antrim Gaels and visiting fans with a smile.

"There is lot going on in Antrim at the moment. across all of the codes and off the field as well as on. In the GAA you can really be as busy as you choose to be. There is always something which needs to be done or which can be made better. I'll stick at it - always - because like all the volunteers which run our association, I think we have a duty to make the GAA better before we hand it on to the next generation. I want to see Antrim teams winning All-Irelands, and I want to see local kids taking to the field every weekend. That's my motivation."


Jim McGuinness, Donegal Senior Manager

A word of thanks also to my backroom team, the medical staff, the strength & conditioning coaches, the county board, our sponsors




Donegal Creameries and the clubs around the county that have gave their facilities for the team to use over the winter months; we look forward to your continued support.

LIVE TO PLAY

Ulster Council Road Safety Initative

In early 2010, Ulster GAA launched 'Live to Play', a Road Safety programme. aimed at raising awareness among members and to educate them on how best to stay safe on the roads. Many **GAA Clubs and Communities** have been shattered by the loss of a life through a road traffic collision and this programme harnesses the various elements of the GAA in Ulster to make a difference. Live to Play is delivered in partnership with the County boards and numerous education events have taken place in Clubs throughout the Province.

Although still in it's infancy, Live to Play has already made a significant impact throughout Ulster as evidenced in a recent online survey instigated by Ulster GAA. The results showed overwhelming support for the campaign with the vast majority of respondents indicating behavioural changes on the roads as a result of the initiative. Fivelucky winners were selected from those who completed the survey and each will receive the Live to Play jersev.

The Programme has a particular focus on young people, and a range of GAA profile personalities have lent their support to the campaign to will act as role models

in poster and web-based promotion. The **Live to Play** posters are available to Clubs and schools through the County board and provide a reinforcement of the campaign messages.

The specially commissioned 'seat-belt' Ulster jersey is worn by all the players involved in this campaign, strongly reinforcing a Road Safety message through the design of the Black and Amber of the Province. The jersey is available at www.oneills.com and profits from sales will generously be returned to the programme.


In addition to the poster campaign, 2011 has seen the introduction of Live to Play pitchside signage for major GAA grounds, a live microsite at www.ulster.gaa. ie/livetoplay, freebie give aways of car stickers and air fresheners, competitions for primary school children as well as the complete rollout of the education across Ulster at Club level.

The primary / national school colouring competition involved over 25,000 children across Ulster, with 18 classes emerging as winners, 2 from each County. Winning classes will receive a **Live to Play** backpack, featuring the **Live to Play** campaign branding, the County GAA Crest as well as reflective piping so the

carrier is visible at night. The reflective piping is a hugely important safety element and will assist young people going to and from school, matches, training and other activities to do so safely. Awards days will take place in schools by the end of the school year.

Ulster GAA continues to reinforce the message of Live to Play at all it's events and asks that you lend your support by travelling safely to matches this summer and beyond. You can also support the campaign by attending events, visiting the website, buying a jersey and most crucially, taking care on the roads at all times. The collective effort of the GAA family can make a difference in reducing deaths on our roads.



TALKING BALLS

Ger Manus reflects on why he thinks Donegal will bate Antrim!

I headed up the road one night there during the bad winter to watch Derry playing Donegal in the league at Celtic Park. Wouldn't have bothered only for the new stand Derry's built.

It was just cold enough now to be sittin' watchin' football and the humour wasn't made much better after the throw-in when Jim McGuinness decides to pull two men back. "Ah fer Jaze sakes," sez I to the boy beside me, "might as well be at a tennis match now."

Every time Derry attacked there was the two boys, like traffic wardens, lingering around like a bad smell. It looked like I was in for a long night, and sitting there that long doesn't be good for the bad hip to tell you the truth. But - and it's not often I'd be admitting it - I was wrong.

Derry didn't know what to be at. They made a few subs here and there, usually the fella who happened to be nearest the sideline when the call came for someone to be taken off. Certainly none made that much difference to the game I thought.

Donegal launched a high ball in round the Derry 21. The big lad Michael Murphy was standing there with two Derry defenders beside him. Murphy caught the ball, and blew past the two boys, who looked like they were havin a smoke and a chat, he made it look that easy.

A couple of weeks back me I fell asleep on the sofa during their league final against Laois. When I woke up some big long haired posing galoot from Celtic was taking the worst penalty I ever seen. Meanwhile back in Croker, Murphy near broke another stanchion with one he took. He's the real deal.

And as for Antrim, sure they won here a couple of years ago. The Baker's still in charge. But, it won't happen for him today so it won't. But then, sure what do I know.

Children who have become separated from their parents/ guardians should be brought to ambulance locations.


