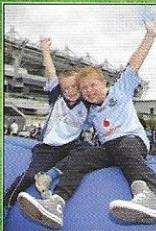

FOOTBALL REVIEW COMMITTEE WHAT'S YOUR IDEA?

GAA members and supporters are constantly debating and discussing aspects of Gaelic football and have many varied and interesting views on how it is played and organised. You now have a chance to express your views in a meaningful way and every form of communication will be considered.

GAA President Liam O'Neill established the Football Review Committee (FRC) to examine the state of Gaelic Football at all levels of the game today. The committee will present its findings to the Management Committee of the GAA later in 2012 in order to set in motion

a national debate on Gaelic football.

The President stressed that the FRC was to consult widely with ordinary GAA people from all over Ireland and abroad in an effort to establish what people involved in the game think about the state of football and what, if any, changes they would like to see.

FRC.ie provides a platform for everybody to do just that so have your say and take our Gaelic football survey. If you have deeper views on any aspect of Gaelic football that are not covered in the survey you can email us or write us a letter.

Every suggestion regarding the state of Gaelic football or proposals for changes will be studied by the FRC members in what is hoped will be the largest ever input of ideas to any sports body in Ireland up to now.

The major topics that will be discussed and analysed include Playing Rules, Championship and League structures, the balance between inter-county and club competitions, refereeing issues and many more.

I don’t think there is any doubt that the stand-out fixture of the draw that was made last Saturday evening was the first ever championship meeting of Donegal and Kerry today.

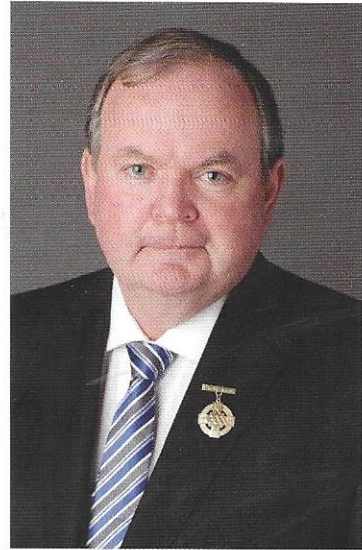
Kerry have reacted positively to

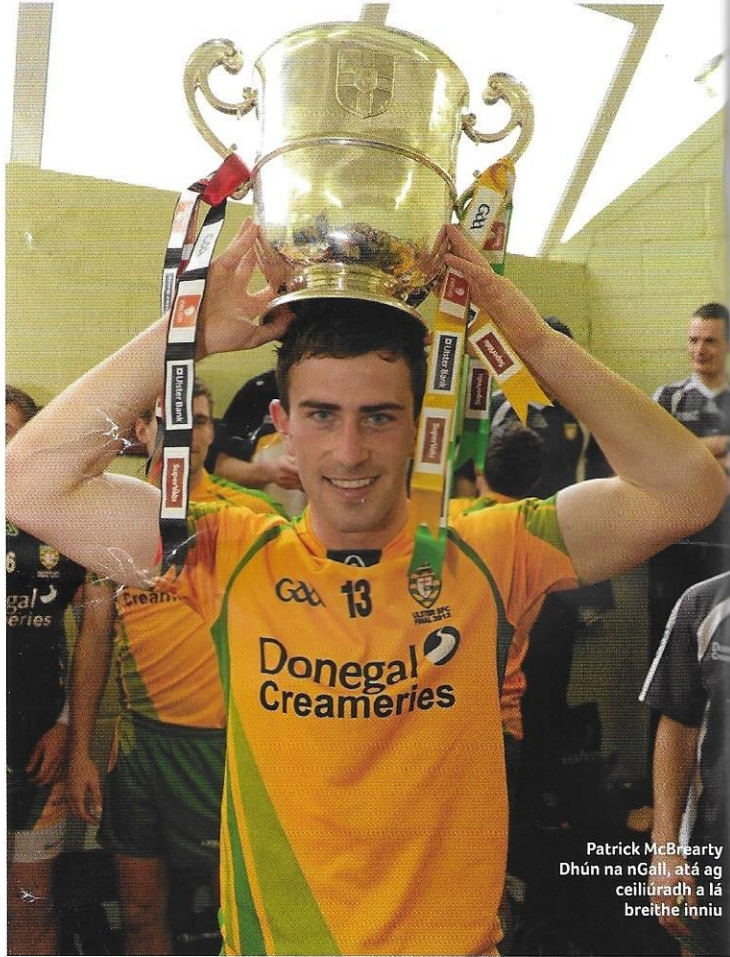

Ba as Contae Laoise duine de na peileadóirí óga ba cháiliúla riamh – Tommy ‘The Boy Wonder’ Murphy, a bhuaigh Craobh Laighean lena chontae dúchais i 1937 agus gan é ach 16 bliain d’aois. Níos gaire de láthair ní raibh Donie Kingston ach bliain níos sine ná sin nuair a tháinig sé ar an bpáirc agus nuair a scóráil sé 1-3 don chontae sin in aghaidh

Longfoirt sa chomórtas céanna i 2008. 16 bliain freisin a bhí Larry Tompkins nuair a d’imir seisean do Chill Dara don chéad uair – cluiche sa tSraith Náisiúnta in aghaidh Ros Comáin ar Pháirc de hÍde i 1979 .

Faoi cheann seachtaine tabharfaidh bainisteoir Chorcaigh, Jimmy Barry Murphy a chuid

iománaithe anseo go Páirc an Chrócaigh, ach i 1972 bhí sé anseo mar imreoir ar fhoirne peile agus iomána an chontae a d’imir i gCluichí Ceannais na hÉireann. Buadh ar na hiománaithe (Cill Chainnigh), ach thug na peileadóirí an chraobh leo (in aghaidh Thír Eoghain agus Mickey Harte mar lántosach acusan). An bhliain dar gcionn, in aois a 19, bhí Jimmy Barry Murphy ar an bhfoireann shinsear a thug Craobh Peile go Corcaigh.

I 1966 bhuaigh Maigh Eo ar Cho. an Dúin i gcluiche ceannais na mionúir, ach dhá bhliain dar gcionn bhí Craobh na Sinsear buaite ag an Dúin agus seisear de na mionúir sin ar an bpáirc acu – gan Peter Rooney, Brendan Sloan, Mickey Cole, John Murphy, John Purdy agus Colm McAlarney ach scór bliain d’aois.

Ní raibh Aidan O’Shea ach 18 bliain d’aois nuair a scóráil sé 1-3 do Mhaigh Eo in aghaidh Nua-Eabhrac i gCraobh Chonnacht trí bliana ó shin, mí sular shuigh sé scrúdú na hArdteistiméireachta. Agus tá rud le rá ag Joe McNally Áth Cliath nach bhfuil le rá ag aon ógánach eile, go dtí seo ar chuma ar bith – Craobh na Mionúir bliain amháin (mar bháireoir i 1982) agus Craobh na Sinsear an bhliain dar gcionn (mar lántosach ar chlé in aghaidh na Gaillimhe i 1983).

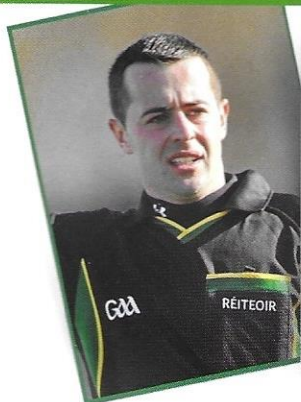

David was on duty at Newbridge last month for the Leinster penultimate round clash of Dublin and Kildare, which was his only outing in the 2012 Electric Ireland Minor Championship until today. However, a couple of Allianz League ties came under his remit in March while he did officiate at Croke Park in April when he ran the line for the Division II final in the same competition. The Offaly-Kildare tie in the Cadbury U21 Championship is part of his 2012 CV.

This is Joe's first match at Croke Park since last September's All-Ireland final clash of Dublin and Kerry, but the Breffni man has been anything but idle in the intervening period. Indeed, among the fixtures he controlled in this season's Allianz League was Kildare's meeting with Monaghan and Cork's outing against Mayo. The Sigerson Cup final and four Championship fixtures adorn his 2012 CV as he has plied his craft at Dr. Hyde Park (Galway v Roscommon), the Morgan Athletic Grounds (Tyrone v Armagh), the Ulster final at Clones between Donegal and Down and last weekend at O'Connor Park Tullamore for the Laois-Meath Qualifier clash.

One of the country's leading referees, Marty is no stranger to Croke Park and indeed was on duty here just a couple of weeks ago when Dublin met Meath in the Leinster final. Today's fixture is the Sligo referee's fifth of the 2012 campaign and he will be familiar with both protagonists as Kerry's clash with Tipperary at Thurles and the Ulster quarter-final between Donegal and Derry at MacCumhaill Park, Ballybofey came under his jurisdiction. Among the four Allianz League ties he controlled this season were Donegal's outing against Mayo and Kerry's fixture against Laois along with the AIB Club final replay.



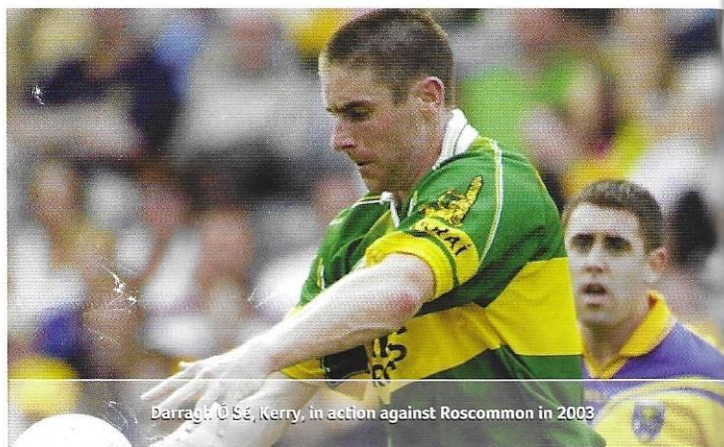
FROM THE ARCHIVES: THREE QUARTER-FINALS TO REMEMBER

Kerry 1-21 Roscommon 3-10 (2003)

An afternoon when attacks on both sides had the better of the argument. It's rare that a team can concede three goals and win comfortably but that was the case here as the Kerry attack more than atoned for the shortcomings of its defence. Declan O'Sullivan's early goal helped the Kingdom into a 1-7 to 0-3 lead early in the second quarter and the gap was still seven at the change of ends (1-11 to 0-7). By the 46th minute Roscommon faced a double-digit deficit but three goals in 13 minutes had them within six by the hour mark. Indeed, Roscommon could have snatched a couple of more majors, although you always got the impression that the likes of Dara Ó Cinnéide, Colm Cooper and Declan O'Sullivan would respond in kind at the other end if they had.

Not quite as close a contest as suggested by the three-point margin as the last four scores of the afternoon fell to the losers. However, initially Derry had the better of affairs and inside 15 minutes were three points to the good as Paddy Bradley starred but his effect was less pronounced when Paul Griffin was moved onto the Oak Leaf ace. Five unanswered points in the second quarter edged Dublin in front and they turned over still two to the good – 0-10 to 0-8. With Ciarán Whelan on top at midfield Dublin pushed on in the third quarter,

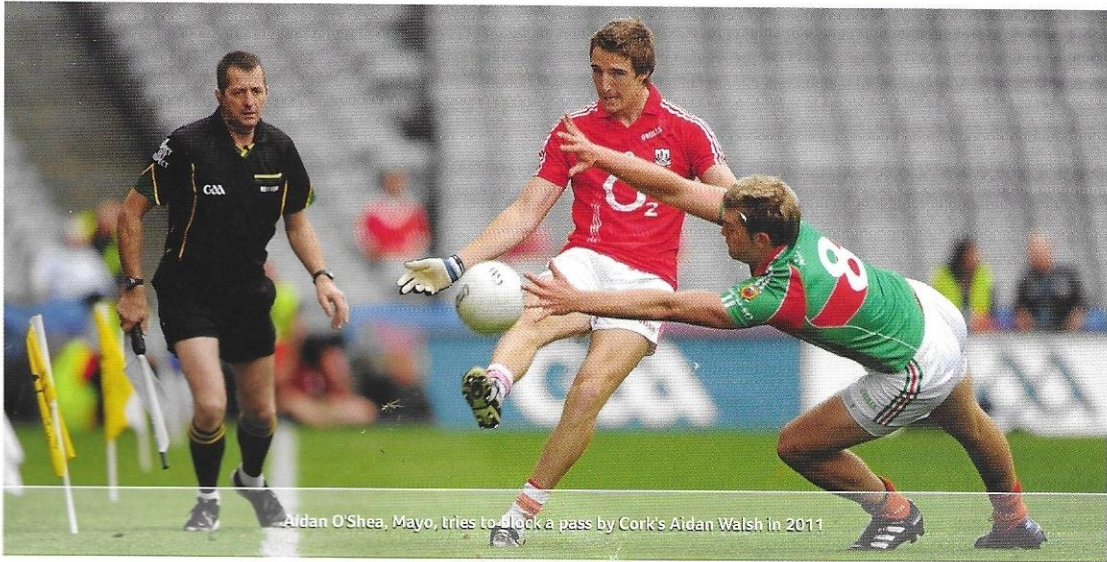
although it took a double save from Stephen Cluxton to deny Eoin Bradley a goal. By the hour mark the Metropolitan's looked home and hosed, but Derry's late revival did give them a few anxious moments before referee Aidan Mangán blew the final whistle.

Mayo 1-13 Cork 2-6 (2011)

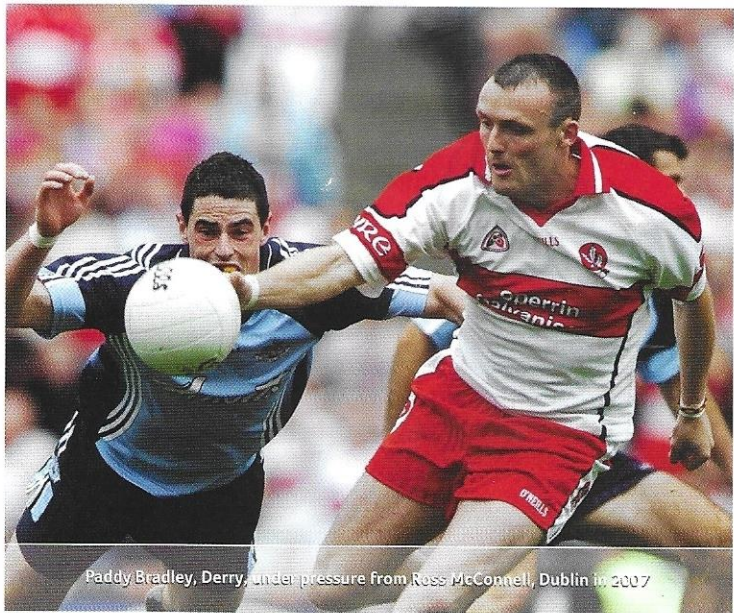
One of the most memorable quarter-finals as the reigning All-Ireland champions were dumped out of the championship. Such a scenario appeared to be in the realms of fantasy as the Leesiders moved smoothly into a 1-4 to 0-1 lead and even when the challengers rattled in 1-2 early in the second quarter, Cork responded with a Paul Kerrigan goal to move four points clear. However, by the change of ends the Connacht champions had halved that deficit and they kept the momentum on the restart and were on terms by the 43rd minute. The anticipated Cork surge never materialised as the Mayo rearguard held a vice-like grip on the Rebel attack as indicated by the paltry two points the Sam Maguire Cup holders managed in the closing 45 minutes.

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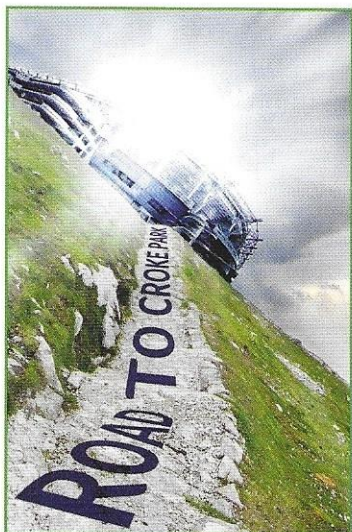
AN CAPTAIN - JOHN DOYLE

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CREAM RISES TO THE TOP

This is it. Gaelic football's great inter-county stock take. The weekend the real picture emerges.

After a manic month through the thick forest of some 30 provincial and Qualifier games that produced shocks, controversies and ultimately departures, finally there is a clearing and a pathway ahead.

The August Bank Holiday weekend has become the plateau for the inter-county game.

Like the Olympics, reaching it entitles you to a certain elite status.

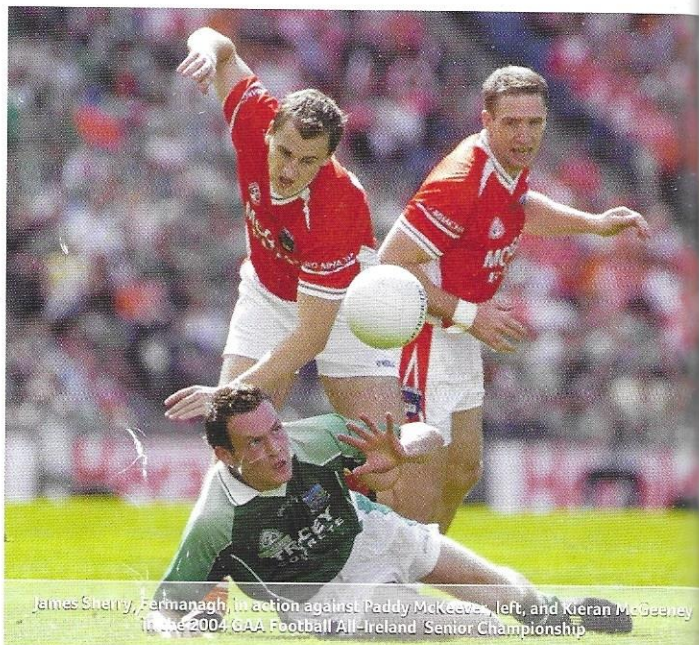
Fall short and you'll feel an emptiness to the season. Even a team like Tipperary who know they have made progress, will feel they left something behind last weekend by not making it.

'Playing football in August' has become a slogan for the progressive, the absolute minimum low watermark for the most ambitious.

Just as the Saturday of a major golf tournament is considered "moving day" where competitors position themselves for the final round, the All-Ireland football quarter-finals have that orderly feel to it too.

It's hard to imagine, then, that such a landmark on the calendar didn't even exist 12 years ago.

Whatever opinions about the Qualifiers there are and the merits and drawbacks that the current system

has, no one can argue with the concept of a last eight fighting it out at the same venue over the same weekend.

Invariably it will produce at least six of the best teams around and significantly seven of the eight teams that made up Division I of the Allianz Football League earlier this year have reached this point.

Mickey Harte's contention that a team can't win from Division II or lower can only be disproved by Kildare over the next couple of months.

However, the structure of competition is likely to evolve over the next 20 or 30 years – whether it's eight groups of four on an open draw basis or four groups of eight with slightly looser geographical connections than the existing provincial system – the arrivals hall will still remain All-Ireland quarter-finals.

Statistically it is the time when All-Ireland champions are most likely to fall.

Since the inception of quarter-finals in 2001, the champions of 2001 (Galway), 2004 (Tyrone), 2009 (Kerry) and 2010 (Cork) have all been dethroned on this particular weekend. Only once have reigning champions failed to reach the plateau, Tyrone in 2006, when Laois ambushed them on a wet night in Portlaoise.

Strange things can happen on quarter-final weekend. Who can ever forget the drama and romance in 2000 when first Fermanagh toppled Armagh and then Mayo took out Tyrone on the one afternoon?

Or the phoenix from the flames that was Kerry on the 2009 Bank Holiday Monday on their way to a 17-point thrashing of an expectant Dublin. All-Ireland quarter-finals have

produced some of the most thrilling and fascinating games of the last decade. Tyrone's two dates with Dublin in 2005 finally began to cut them some slack outside their own county and province thanks to the quality of those games while Kerry and Armagh the following year was an epic duel between real giants.

In the deluge of that dark Saturday evening in 2008 when Jones's Road was submerged in three feet of water outside, Kerry and Galway delivered a free-flowing exhibition that defied the conditions.

All-Ireland quarter finals have rarely been less than fascinating and that's about the most apt word to describe this weekend's action.

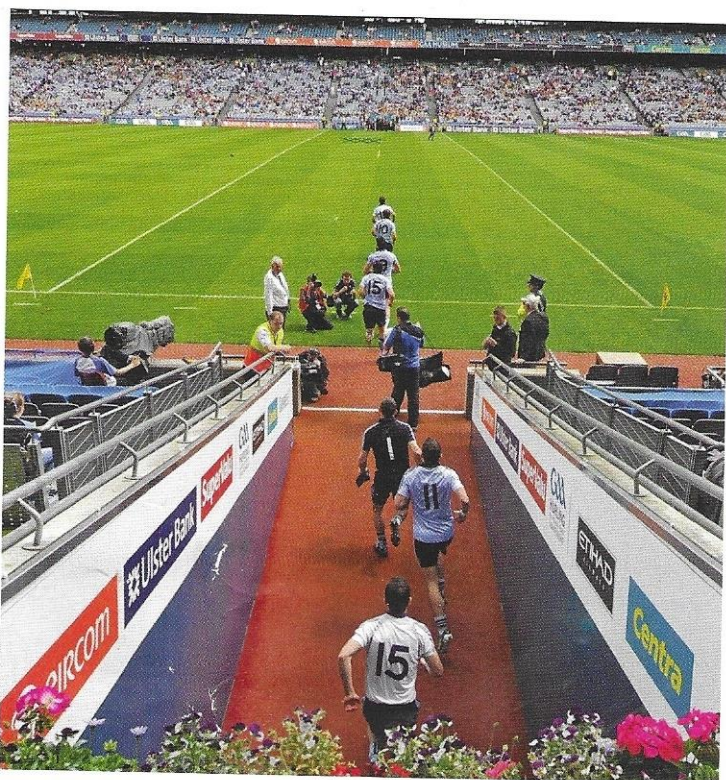
What we can be certain of is that no two teams will come to Dublin with the same formations and ideas. From Cork's orthodox lay out to Donegal's potential double sweeper system and Kildare's 2-2-2 attacking structure there will be no uniformity of approach.

Gaelic football's absolute elite has tended to exist in threes for the best part of the last decade and a half. From Kerry, Galway and Meath in the late 1990s and early 2000s to Kerry, Tyrone and Armagh as the last decade headed towards its midpoint.

Towards the end of that decade, Armagh were displaced by Cork and in more recent years Dublin have gained 'top three' status at Tyrone's expense.

But three has now become four with Donegal's impressive defence of their Ulster title, making it the most open All-Ireland title race since the early to mid 1990s.

It is a measure of Kerry's enduring greatness that they have managed to preserve their record of reaching every one of the 12 All-Ireland quarter-



finals including this weekend. Dublin have been to 11 – missing out in 2003 – while Cork have been out of the elite circle on just three occasions.

In that sense Kildare's achievement in making the last five All-Ireland quarter-finals must be hailed.

Can they finally take out one of the big three? It is continually thrown at them that they don't have the ingenuity to score enough goals, that their robotic programming can't accommodate a creative spark to make those openings.

Yet over the five-year period of Kieran McGeeney's reign their goalscoring record runs almost parallel to Kerry's in league and championship games.

From 69 games now played, 38 in league and 31 in championship, Kerry have scored 62 goals, less than a goal per game (0.9 per game to be precise).


Kildare are operating around the same level, their 57 goals from 66 games giving them a 0.86 goal per game average.

Precise stuff but it paints a picture and tells you that what you think you see isn't always what's actually there.

But if goals were to decide matters over the next few weeks then it's Dublin who can draw most oxygen from the prospect of bulging nets. In 17 Croke Park league and championship matches since the "Spring Series" was conceived they have netted 29 times and the feeling that they have yet to go through the gears is more prevalent about them than any of the other seven teams.

Fascinating it is then, fascinating this part of the season has always been.

How did a championship ever exist without it?



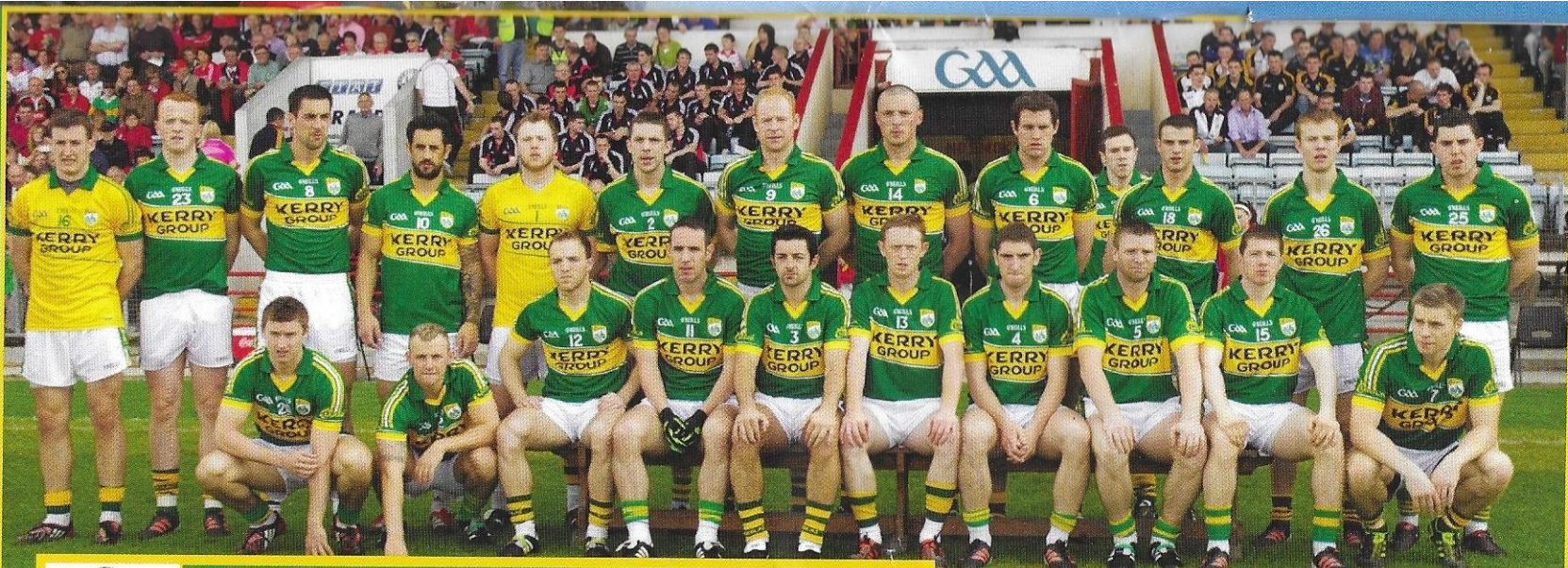
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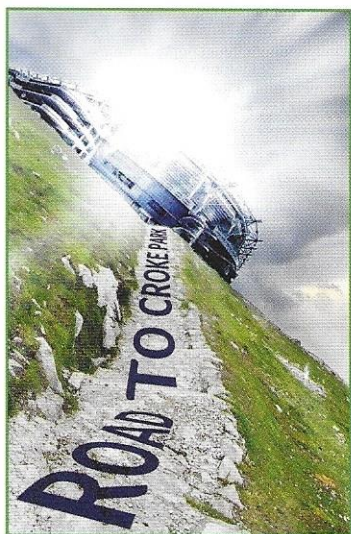


AN CAPTAIN - COLM COOPER

The beaten Ulster finalists have an imposing hurdle to clear this weekend facing a Dublin side intent

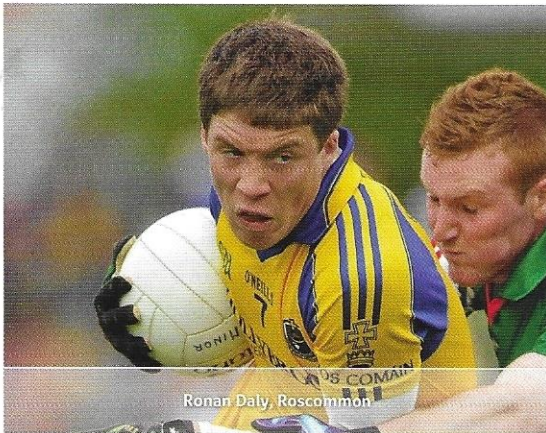
on making up for last season's surprise loss to Tipperary in the All-Ireland final. The manner in which Leinster honours were retained bestows the tag of favouritism on the Metropolitan.

However, favouritism is a tag that is not often placed upon the shoulders of Tipperary teams in any grade of the big ball game, but the reigning All-Ireland champions defeated Kerry twice, as well as Cork, as they retained the provincial title and will probably be fancied to edge past Mayo, even though the Connacht runners-up have a much stronger record at this stage of the championship.

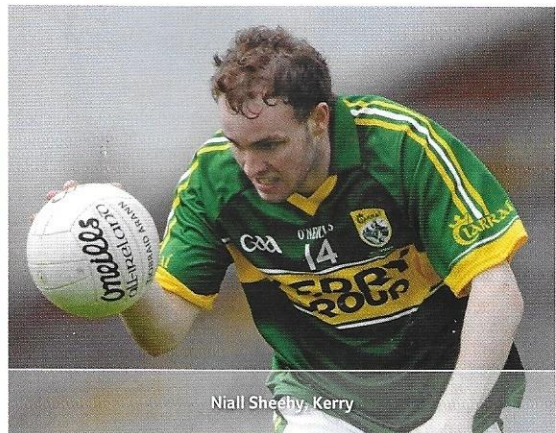
Tyrone (3-3) and Meath (3-1) face off in probably the hardest quarter-

final to call. The Royal U18s qualified for the provincial final comfortably before running into the capital buzz saw and suffered their only loss at this stage 12 months ago to eventual title winners Tipperary. Tyrone regained Ulster honours after a 12-month absence and have been victorious in their last two 'quarters', but a third successive victory will be hard won.

The Roscommon-Kerry tie is another one where the members of the fourth estate may well kick to touch. The sides met three years ago at this stage at GAA Headquarters where 60 minutes failed to separate them (2-9 to 1-12) before the Kingdom advanced to the penultimate stage with four points to spare. Expect a lesser margin either way today.

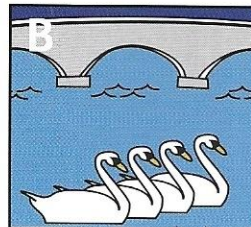

CROKE PARK SAFETY AND GENERAL INFORMATION

REGULATIONS Páirc an Chrócaigh

1. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Rules (which are designated to protect the Health and Safety of all entrants to the ground). Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all of these Rules.
2. The management reserves the right of admission.
3. The instructions of the stewards must be obeyed at all times.
4. All persons entering the ground agree to be searched by a member of the Garda Síochána.
5. Every person (including infants) entering the ground must have a ticket.
6. The following are not permitted:
 - 6.1 Entry upon the pitch or engaging in conduct that causes or is likely to cause injury or harm to, or otherwise interferes with, disrupts, hinders, or distracts a person playing in, refereeing or otherwise having a role in a match at this ground.
 - 6.2 Any unauthorised contact with the boundary wall surrounding the pitch or incursion on to the pitch. Any such unauthorised contact or incursion constitutes a trespass to property.
 - 6.3 The climbing of floodlights or other pylons, stands or other buildings. Such behavior constitutes a trespass to property.
 - 6.4 Throwing of objects onto the pitch.
 - 6.5 Remaining or loitering in any gangway or aisle.
 - 6.6 Behaving in an offensive or indecent manner.
 - 6.7 Bringing of alcohol into the ground.
 - 6.8 Bringing into the ground of fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, distress signals, laser pointers and similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon.
 - 6.9 Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets or other appliances and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language.
7. If a person commits a trespass, reasonable force may be used to prevent, restrain or terminate any trespass.
8. Where a person is in breach of any of these rules, or where the management believes that a person constitutes a source of danger to others, or to the ground, such person may be refused entry or ejected from the ground, and reasonable force may be used for that purpose.

Safety and General Information

Supporters are asked to respect the fact that they are entering and leaving the stadium through residential areas.



Safety Notice

In the interests of safety, patrons will not be allowed to enter the playing area after the games.

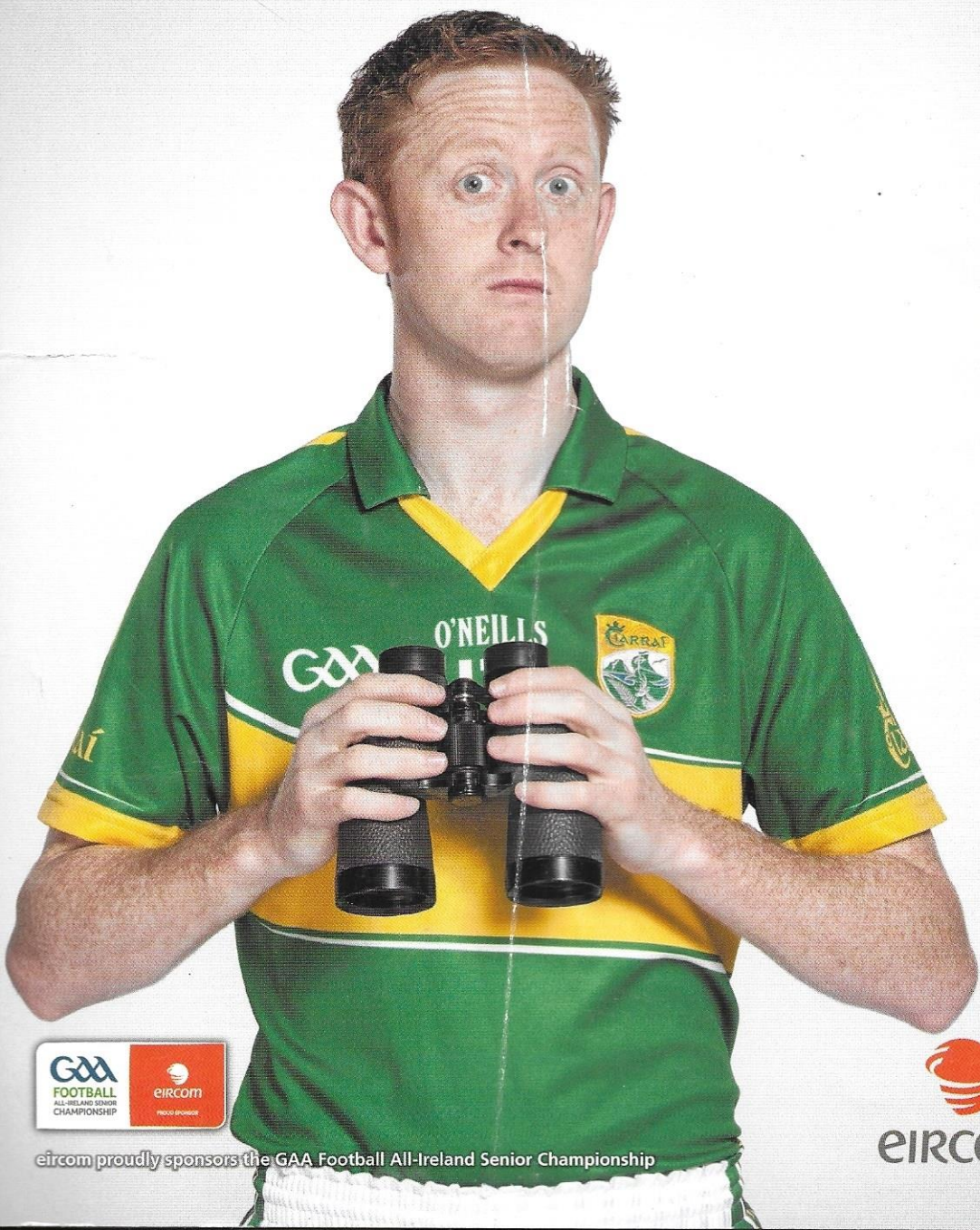
