The ASAP manual, DVD and website www.gaa.ie/asap are just three resources available that help ensure your club develops a responsible culture around alcohol and substance use. 

Frank Boylan has been treasurer of the Kingscourt Stars GAA Club since 1974. Frank has lived all his life in the Corlea area which lies between Shercock and Kingscourt within the Parish of Kingscourt.

Frank, a farmer, has farmed actively at home most of his life and takes great pride in his land and farm animals. Frank never played the game but excelled in his administrative duties as Club Treasurer for all of the 38 years up to the present day.

Frank replaced the late Tommie Price who also held the position with distinction for many years before Frank's introduction to the treasurer's role. Frank still continues to remind us when the club was financed on £50 per year.


Frank has seen the club grow from junior ranks to becoming the top Senior club in Cavan for long spells up to the present day. In 1985 the club commenced an extensive development plan to improve the facilities in O'Raghallaigh Park. Over a ten year period major improvements were undertaken and completed and as club treasurer much of the financial responsibilities fell within Frank's remit. The club hold the distinction of being the secondary County ground in the county, hence the requirement to improve the facilities. During this development Frank and the club development team raised and spent in excess of £700,000.

Frank firmly believes that all projects large or small should be financially recoverable within a short time frame. Frank's

philosophy is simple if you cannot afford what you intend to do leave it until you are. The pipe smoking Frank can often be seen sitting in the car waiting for his fellow officers and club committee to gather before games or club meetings. Frank is also a teetotaller and firmly believes that alcohol is too readily available to our youth and is having a detrimental effect to their lives both inside and outside of our games.

Frank Boylan's contribution to the Kingscourt Star's Club and to the GAA epitomises the volunteer ethos associated with so many great Gaels.

We are all aware of the huge responsibility that club treasurers now have with every cent having to be accounted and on this note Frank always acknowledges the financial help and assistance that our main sponsors Kingspan have made to the Kingscourt club over the past thirty years and in particularly to the Murtagh family. Frank has seen the day when club accounts were filled into a book and then addressed and discussed at the club AGM at year end, to the present system of software packages that provide all the various expenditure and income accounts on lap-tops that are now presented at monthly club



meetings. On this note the club have not given up hope of Frank introducing the new recommended accounts package called "Yendo" into the club.

His contribution to the Kingscourt Star's Club and to the GAA, epitomises the volunteer ethos associated with so many great Gaels. His ever presence at club meetings, at club games and at the weekly lotto over the 38 years as club treasurer makes him the most outstanding club member within the history of the club. For all of his years in office Frank has made many great friends, both players and supporters through his involvement in the GAA. He brought a rare gift of understanding and experience to the club during the halcyon days. The Kingscourt GAA Club and the Association thank you for all the years of dedicated service.

# Minor Preview GaelicLife

#### Opinions from John Hughes, Gaelic Life

AND so the champions of 2011 take on a team dumped out ignominiously in the Preliminary Round last year. It has been boom times for Cavan football at underage. Backto-back Ulster Under 21 titles sandwiched the possibly more notable success of the minors.

Armagh were massive favourites for the Ulster Final last year, but Gary Donohoe and Dermot McCabe sent out a side quietly confident in their ability who simply outclassed their more vaunted opponents on the day, a final score of 0-12 to 1-6 telling its own story. It should be a source of assurance for Cavan folk that Donohoe and McCabe are once more behind the chalk.

While most of last year's Ulster winning side have gone on to pastures new, returnees include half forward Michael Argue, Gerard Smith at half back and corner forward Andrew Graham. Meanwhile Jonathan McCabe, Vincent Coyle and Conor Madden have graduated from the 2011 Ulster Final bench to the starting 15, McCabe berthed at centre half back, while Coyle has come into the half forward line. However Madden, a heavy scoring Gowna man, is probably the most important returnee.

But thankfully for Donegal, one of the great things about underage football is that each year presents a tabula rasa. Every season presents fresh hope and an opportunity to start anew.

In Donegal's case that slate is cleaner than is usually the case. Only corner back Conor Parke, and half forward Ryan McHugh have returned from last year. Conversely they have lost massive talents such as Paddy McBrearty, Martin O'Reilly and John O'Malley.

In past times the line would be trotted out that minor football is notoriously hard to predict. That truism no longer holds. We now have an excellent weather vane of minor form in the shape of the Ulster Minor League. The league champions went on to claim Ulster titles in 2009 and 2010, while Cavan won the 2011 title on the back of a win in the Shield Final. Success in this competition is a good indication of future fortunes.

Of the sides taking the field today Cavan have the meatier record. They drew with Armagh in their opener, lost to Down by a point before defeating Monaghan in the group stages. They took on Tyrone in the league semi-final and were only bested at the very death. When we consider

that the Red Hands romped the league final we have a good metric of the magnitude of Cavan's achievement. Conor Madden scored 1-6 in the semifinal, marking himself out as a man Donegal will need to make serious contingencies for.

Donegal won two and lost two in section B. Victory over Fermanagh was followed by defeat to Tyrone and Derry before a win over Antrim got them into the Shield semifinals. They beat Down comfortably, but were thrashed in the final by Armagh, although it must be acknowledged Donegal were short a few key players that day on Jim McGuigan Cup Under 17 duty.

Considering the evidence to hand, the verdict has to go with the homesters. They competed more consistently in the Ulster Minor League than Donegal. When you add to that the fact that they have more returnees, giving them a more stable core, then it is hard to look beyond the Breffni men progressing to the quarter-final stages.

# Senior Preview

DEFENDING champions
Donegal get the 2012 Ulster
Senior Football Championship
underway with a tricky
assignment against Cavan at
Kingspan Breffni Park
this afternoon.

Just over 10 months have passed since Ulster Council President Aogan Ó Fearghail proclaimed "Tonight, the hills of Donegal are alive" as he presented the Anglo Celt Cup to Michael Murphy.

The Tir Chonail men will, of course, be hoping to retain the Ulster title – something which no Donegal team has managed before.

To make their task all the more daunting, they have been placed in the tougher half of the draw.

Should they see off the challenge of Cavan today, they would face last year's beaten Ulster finalists Derry in the next round while the winners of Tyrone and Armagh would lie in wait in the provincial semi-final.

Despite the treacherous path Donegal have to navigate to return to the Ulster Final, they are the second favourites to win Ulster.

They also find themselves oddson for today's encounter against Cavan, although that is hardly surprising given that nine points separated the sides when they met at the same venue in last year's Ulster Senior Football Championship.

The result of the game was never really in doubt as Cavan struggled to break down Donegal's ferocious defence and create enough in the way of scoring chances to trouble their opponents.

Sligo referee Marty Duffy also dished out two red cards in last year's match – one to Cavan's Ray Cullivan and one to Donegal skipper Murphy.

However, Murphy's dismissal was later overturned but the Glenswilly ace will sit out today's clash between the counties after suffering knee ligament damage

during the Division One NFL clash against Dublin back in March.

The All-Ireland champions won that tie by nine points- handing Donegal their fourth league defeat of the campaign.

Going into the final round of the league, Donegal were in the bottom two and needed a win over Armagh to avoid the drop.

In Murphy's absence, Colm
McFadden stepped up to the mark
– scoring five points as Donegal
came from behind to retain
their Division One status at the
expense of the Orchard County.

McFadden and Kilcar's Patrick McBrearty will be expected to carry the scoring burden against Cavan this afternoon and the duo landed 1-08 between them in last year's encounter.

Cavan will also be minus the services of one of their most prolific forwards of recent years – but for very different reasons.



The Seanie Johnston saga remains unresolved. After being told he would not be part of Val Andrews' plan for 2012, Johnston sought a transfer from Cavan Gaels to St Kevin's of Kildare.

However, his latest application is currently being dealt with by the new CCCC who took over following last month's GAA Congress.

Under a new rule passed at Congress, any player who wishes to move to another county must first play championship for his new club – meaning Johnston must play for St Kevin's before he can possibly line-out for Kieran McGeeney's men in the Leinster Championship quarter-final against Offaly on June 17.

To compound matters, Andrews stepped down at the end of a league campaign which saw the Breffnimen flirt with relegation to Division Four. Only Tipperary's surprise win over Offaly in the final game spared Cavan.

Terry Hyland has since assumed the reigns after managing the county to unprecedented success at U21 level. Cavan won back-to-back Ulster titles for the first time in their history when they beat a heavily fancied Tyrone side in the final for the second year running.

Bizarrely, the scoreline was identical in both the 2011 and 2012 Ulster U21 Finals with Cavan winning 1-10 to Tyrone's 0-10.

Unfortunately, for Hyland and his U21 side, they lost their All-Ireland Semi-final to Roscommon by five points.

Nevertheless, several stars of the U21 ranks have done enough to impress their boss and have been promoted to the senior ranks, namely Kevin Tierney, Killian Clarke, Jason McLoughlin, Fergal Flanagan and Jack Brady,

The former is set to make his Ulster Championship debut this afternoon along with Kevin Meehan, Robert Maloney Derham, Niall Smith and Brendan Fitzpatrick while John McCutcheon has also been recalled.

Last year's U21 captain
Gearoid McKiernan returns to
the starting line-up having
missed the league through injury
and he lines up alongside David
Givney at midfield.

The duo must at least break even around the middle if the

Breffnimen are to pull off a shock but the home side's defence must also improve.

Cavan only won two of their seven Division Three games and conceded four goals against both Antrim and Wexford.

Ironically, Donegal's rigid defence drew sharp criticism last year in the wake of their All-Ireland semi-final defeat to Dublin

Jim McGuinness and his team found themselves under the spotlight for their use of the infamous 'blanket defence' However, it is hard to argue with results although Donegal have, so far, struggled to replicate their 2011 form this season.

The Tir Chonail men lost their three games in the Dr McKenna Cup – including a 1-14 to 2-08 defeat to Cavan – and suffered four defeats in their Division One campaign.

Admittedly, Cavan were operating in a lower division but Cavan fans should have reason to believe they can witness a home victory at Kingspan Breffni Park today. In order to do so, Cavan need to play with the same fearless drive and determination their U21's have shown over the past two years.

In Championship football, anything is possible and a win would give Cavan their first victory in the Ulster SFC since their 2009 win over Fermanagh.

For Donegal, they must put to bed the notion that they are over-reliant on Michael Murphy, who said earlier in the week that the defending champions will the necessary firepower to succeed in his absence.

It is up to his teammates to prove him right this afternoon.

# How Hard Are The Players Really Working?

Kevin McGuigan is the Sport Science Support Officer with Ulster GAA. Kevin's role involves provision of sport science support to county teams around Ulster, ranging from the underage Academy teams right up to Senior County teams. Kevin provides a range of sport science services, such as GPS analysis, heart rate analysis, fitness testing and video analysis.


# Its science

### Staying ahead of the Game

Kevin is currently working extensively on establishing how much work players put into matches through the use of highly advanced live GPS and Heart Rate technology. You may see Kevin located in and around the press box at the back of the stand with his antennae attached to his laptop.

This technology allows Kevin to report back to managers and selectors as the match progresses and to players at half time. Kevin provides coaches and players with stats and figures about how much work they are doing on the pitch. At half time the coach will take a report to the players detailing how much distance they covered during the half.

The information will even allow the coach to see when during the half the players worked hardest and how that affected the scoreboard. They can also see how far each player had to sprint in the half. At the start of each half each player will have been given some targets and half time provides a great opportunity for coaches to let players know if they need to work harder.



Based on results gathered so far senior county players will, on average, cover around 4,500 metres during a 35 minute half of football. On occasions, some players have covered over 6,000 metres during a 35 minute half. That works out at a massive 155 metres per minute!


On average a top player will have an average heart rate between 85% and 90% of their maximum heart rate. Or, to make that simpler to understand, during a 70 minute game a player's heart will beat approximately 12,500 times...180 times every

minute...3 times every second!

As the Ulster Championship progresses in 2012 Kevin will continue to provide support to various teams, while compiling a bank of information that can be used to guide coach and player preparation going forward towa 2013. Over time, Kevin hopes to develop a better knowledge of GAA players need to be trained to survive the physical demands when they take to the pitch on Championship Sunday.








# **Head to Head**

# Disability Inclusion

Ulster GAA's Disability Inclusion programme is growing from strength to strength over the last number of years. Ulster Coaches have taken a two fold approach by educating the coaches and giving children and adults with disabilities an opportunity to play our games.

Every club will have somebody with a disability in their area but many feel uncomfortable or don't know what to do if someone wants to join the club. The 'GAA 4 All' project is an important part of the Ulster Council GAA's coach and volunteer development programme. These interactive workshops are aimed at club coaches and parents who have an interest in delivering adapted Gaelic games and activities to children and young adults with disabilities and special needs.

These workshops involved a short theory session where the audience are asked to consider how we can introduce Gaelic games into our clubs and the various barriers that may have to be overcome. This is then followed by the main part of the workshop where the audience take part in various practical games and activities using a wide range of specially adapted equipment. In this practical part of the course the participants are challenged to adapt various games to include people with various learning difficulties and disabilities (wheelchair users, visually impaired etc...).



Regional Development Officers have been delivering coaching sessions in Special Schools around the province and have been hosting Fun Activity days where they have invited Special Schools to a regional venue to do some skills and conditioned Gaelic Games.

Tuesday the 10th of April was a big day for the Disabled Gaelic footballers of Ulster as they participated in a provincial blitz in Croke Park. 150 players (men & women) and 60 helpers got a tour of the famous stadium and then pulled on their county jerseys to play a series of games on the pitch.

This was a follow up to the indoor and outdoor blitzes that were organised in the province recently. This was a great day and a fantastic opportunity for the players to show off their skills and promote their games.

The participants all received a prestigious Ulster medal as a

memento of their special day and judging by the smiles on all of their faces they really enjoyed the experience.


