





#### Ulster GAA and DENI **Curriculum Sport in Schools Programme:**

The GAA in Ulster continue to be committed to the delivery of the Curriculum Sports Programme, with outstanding support from the schools involved.

This very successful programme has been in operation since September 2007, when it was introduced by the then Minister of Education, Caitriona Ruane, as a pilot project to address the problem of inactivity among our youngest children and to give employment to young teachers and sport's graduates. The programme has been so successful it has been run out since, thanks to the demand from the teachers in most of our Maintained, Irish Medium and Controlled Primary Schools involving 319 schools, with 914 teachers and 17,500 (P.1 -4) pupils.

The main aim of the programme is...

- To develop the generic physical literacy skills of our youngest pupils through participation in enjoyable Physical Literacy activities during PE lessons.
- To help raise pupils' confidence and self esteem, their motivation to learn and their achievements in other curricular areas, particularly literacy and numeracy.
- To raise the confidence of, and provide support to, primary teachers in delivering PE.

The programme is run out throughout Northern Ireland by our 31 Department of Education & Physical Literacy Coaches who coach in the school for the entire school year in conjunction with the class teacher. The programme covers the first two stages of the Long Term Player Development Pathway i.e. Gaelic Start and the Fundamentals which are the building blocks upon which all other sport specific skills are built.

The challenge is to build the confidence and competence of teachers to help deliver the Physical Literacy skills into their PE programme.



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
# O'NEILLS AND ULSTER LADIES GAELIC REWARD CLUBS



Three deserving clubs were awarded with Coaching & Games **Development Equipment Awards** recently courtesy of O'Neills and Ulster Ladies Gaelic. The initiative was supported by Ulster GAA and was open to all clubs in the province with a Ladies Gaelic Football section. Its aim was to encourage clubs to focus on their coaching and games development side by showing the judging panel how they have developed their coaches and players and how they plan to develop in the future.

The application process began in February when all clubs were notified of the opportunity to apply. They then had until the start of April to get their portfolios into the council for consideration and after long deliberation, the judging panel selected their winners. Sheena Kelly, Ladies Gaelic Development Officer for Ulster GAA who was the instigator of the initiative said "We received some fantastic applications for the awards from clubs all across the province so picking winners was very difficult.

We are confident that those who have been selected are more than deserving. Applications ranged from clubs who have been playing Ladies Gaelic for twenty years to clubs who are not long established and are working really hard to get things off the ground. The encouraging thing about them all was hearing how, no matter what their size or success they still had aspirations to develop. That's what



this was all about - striving to be better and showing us how they planned to do it."

Newly re-established club Aghaloo O'Neills were awarded the first prize of a £500 O'Neills voucher to spend on coaching equipment. Although they folded previously in the mid 90's due to lack of players they now have a band of enthusiastic parents and coaches who are determined to make it work second time around. Their enthusiasm was evident throughout their application and their want to develop and grow was backed up by a plan of how they were going to do it.

The second placed club was Aodh Ruadh Dun Geanainn who have been up and running for 19 years. A town club with great structures in place, they showed how they provide coaching for all ages from 4 year olds in their nursery section to mums in the Gaelic4Mothers & Others programme. A standalone Ladies Gaelic club they have worked hard to ensure that they provide football for girls in the

town even though they have to rely on the good nature of the mens football and hurling clubs in the town for facilities.

And finally the third award went to Sperrin Óg Ladies GFC. Although this club had great success in 2011 in capturing the Junior All-Ireland Club title they are not prepared to sit back and admire their results. They work very closely with the mens section of the club and have developed a joint coaching plan to focus on things like volunteering, school/club links and coaching.

Speaking at the presentation of the awards Hugh Devenney, President of Ulster Ladies Gaelic thanked all the clubs who took the time to apply. He congratulated the winning clubs and encouraged them to continue to put development of players and coaches high on their list of priorities moving forward. # Ladies Preview GaelicLife

There's no doubt that Tyrone and Monaghan provide one of the greatest rivalries in the ladies game and this evening they will play out the latest installment of that enthralling battle here at Ballybofey.

The winners of today's clash will automatically earn their place in the provincial decider, with the loser meeting Donegal in two weeks time for a second chance at making the final.

Monaghan head into today's game very much as favourites. They have overcome every challenge presented to them so far in 2012, most recently having toppled the mighty Cork in the National League Division One Final to bring to an abrupt end Cork's five-in-a-row bid.

The Oriel girls are packed with quality, from goalkeeper Linda Martin through Sharon Courtney, Christina Reilly and Aoife McAnespie at the back. Amanda Casey is a top drawer midfielder, but it is up front where Monaghan will expect to really capitalise. They can call on the likes of Catriona McConnell. Ciara McAnespie, the evergreen Niamh Kindlon and young scoring sensation Caoimhe Mohan to get the scores which they hope will be enough to send them through.

Tyrone's story in the build-up has been more about absences than those who are present, with eight of the side which lost to Laois last year unavailable to boss Gerry



Moane. Defender Eimear Teague underwent surgery last week for a hand injury, midfielder Sarah Donnelly has gone travelling. while a number of others are also on the treatment bench or absent from the side.

They still have a quality side to call upon, with Cathy and Joline Donnelly as well as Gemma Begley once again set to be scorers-in-chief for the Red Hand outfit. At the other end of the field young defender Tori McLaughlin has made the corner-back slot her own, while Shannon Ouinn will also have a key role to play in proceedings.

Tyrone have had a much longer break to contend with than the Oriel outfit due to Monaghan's extended National League run, and that extra big game experience will certainly stand to them in this encounter. Clashes between Tyrone and Monaghan have proven over the years to be notoriously unpredictable, with

some of the biggest upsets in the championships tending to come when this pair meet.

What may well prove to be the difference is that Monaghan have an extremely settled and wellestablished side to call on, and the sort of strength and depth in their squad which injuries and absences have robbed Tyrone of.

In Gregory McGonigle, Monaghan have a manager for whom everything he has touched has turned to silverware in recent months. With the Farney girls he has claimed the Dowd Cup and the National League title in guite some style already this year, and in recent weeks also led Ulster to inter-provincials glory.

Although nothing can be taken for granted, barring quite a substantial upset it looks like McGonigle will be starting to prepare his side for an Ulster final appearance when the Final whistle blows this evening.



In his life time Seamus managed various teams within the club winning county titles and Ulster titles along the way. He will be sadly missed by all.

# Senior Preview

THE IRISH NEWS

After waiting patiently on the sidelines, it's now Derry's turn to put their Ulster Championship credentials up for scrutiny.

In what has been perceived by many as the tougher side of the draw for this year's Ulster GAA Championship, reigning champions Donegal have already dispatched the challenge of Cavan while the main keepers of the Anglo-Celt Cup for the past part of the last decade, Tyrone and Armagh played out what has already gone down as a Championship classic at the Morgan Athletic Grounds last week.

The Red Hands await today's winners in the semi-final and a date with either county should be enough to whet the appetite. But before that, Derry enter the fray today with revenge very much on their minds.

New manager John Brennan led them to their first Ulster Final appearance in 13 years in

2011, only for Jim McGuinness's Donegal side to end their own 19-year wait for provincial glory. Derry can point to the absence of the Bradley brothers, Eoin and Paddy, as mitigating factors in their final challenge last year. Indeed, the 0-8 posted by Brennan's men in that match suggests a lack of firepower in the Derry forward line ultimately cost them.

However, a packed Donegal defence may also have had something to do with that paltry return. In securing the Anglo-Celt Cup for the first time in nearly 20 years, McGuinness's ultra-defensive tactics came for sharp criticism. There were glimpses that the Glenties man has attempted to be a bit more positive in this year's National League, but the prospect of facing the Bradley's may force McGuinness to focus again on limiting their opponents chances.

While Derry go into the game with a greater attacking threat than last year, Donegal have also

been boasted in that department by the return of their talisman Michael Murphy. The Tir Chonaill captain scored a crucial 1-2 in the Ulster final in Clones last year, although Derry felt aggrieved at the penalty awarded to Donegal forward which he himself dispatched to the net. The Glenswilly man missed the Preliminary Round victory over Cavan in Kingspan Breffni Park on May 21.

Donegal still managed to chalk up a healthy 1-16 that day, with Colm McFadden in sparkling form, bagging 1-6 of his side's total. Indeed, for all the focus on their defensive prowess, Donegal still possess a wealth of attacking threat.

McFadden and Murphy may be expected to weigh in with the bulk of the scores, but the precocious Paddy McBrearty, the rejuvenated Leo McLoone and industrious Mark McHugh can all keep the umpires busy while Dermot Molloy is a potent option from the bench.

Likewise, Derry will not rely solely on the Bradley's for scores. Conleith Gilligan is an accurate free-taker, Mark Lynch has a ruthless eye for goal and the McGoldrick brothers, Barry and Sean Leo have been known to take raiding scores from deep.

Derry's problems, however, could lie at the other end of the field. The retirement of defensive stalwarts, Kevin McGuckin and Kevin McCloy has prompted Brennan to experiment with his full-back line and a sketchy National League campaign is evidence that he has still to find the right formula.

The Derry manager was also hampered by injuries to emerging defenders Eugene Scullion and Mark Craig during the Division Two campaign which almost ended in relegation to the third tier of the National League.

The Oak Leafers had to rely on Tyrone's final day win over Monaghan to consolidate their Division Two status after themselves suffering a thumping defeat at the hands of Westmeath. There were few highs during the League for Derry with their two wins come against the two teams who eventually dropped out of the division, Monaghan and Meath.

Brennan has admitted a certain ambivalence towards the spring competition, but if he has been able to hone a new defensive system and bring a greater overall sense of discipline to Derry's play, then it will have proven fruitful.

Craig and Scullion will be fit and raring to go while John McCamley and Chrissy McKaigue, who this year returned from a short stint Down Under with AFL side Sydney Swans, will have benefitted from valuable senior inter-county game-time. Despite their relative inexperience in defence, Derry can also call on Championship know-how of Gerard O'Kane, who will have the added motivation of missing out on a starting spot in last year's Ulster Final.

Derry will also hope to hold the upper hand in midfield where there are question marks

over the fitness of Donegal's Rory Kavanagh, Joe Diver can add considerable presence in that department, while Barry McGoldrick was also used at centre field during the National League and PJ McCloskey is another emerging talent who can make his mark on the big stage. Despite Kavanagh's potential absence, seasoned campaigner Neil Gallagher can prove a formidable opponent while McGuinness has options in the form of Martin McElhinney and Christy Toye.

Donegal will not look back on their National League campaign with much fondness either. They too escaped relegation on the last day, although they decided their own fate with a win over Armagh in Letterkenny to preserve their top flight status for another year. There were highlights too with encouraging wins over Division One finalists Cork and Mayo, although Kerry and Dublin gave the Tir Chonaill men a reminder of the work they still have to do with comprehensive wins.

Recent history certainly favours Donegal when it comes to the Championship. Last year's Ulster Final triumph over their neighbours was their fourth in the last five outings against the Oak Leafers. A First Round win in 2008 is all Derry have to show from their summer clashes with Donegal during the last decade, a period which has seen the Tir Chonaill men reach four finals.

Last year's decider may not go down as a classic and with some of the province's finest attacking talent on show today, maybe the Derry and Donegal can take their cue from Armagh and Tyrone and throw off the shackles for another memorable Championship derby.

# Talent Academy Football Squads

Originally known as
Development Squads, Academy
Squads have been up and
running for a number of years in
the 9 Counties in the province.
All Counties have squads from
Under 15 to Under 17 which lead
into the County Minors.

The Ulster Council have put together a template of sessions (Theory & Practical) which are password protected on their website. All Academy Squad coaches can obtain all the information off the website.

Included in these sessions are ideas on how to improve players knowledge in different areas such as strength & conditioning, nutrition, hydration, injury management & prevention,

lifestyle management, performance analysis, rest & recovery, running mechanics, fitness, speed & flexibility.

There are also a number of field sessions which include attacking play, ball retention, cefensive play, kicking for possession & scores and goalkeeping.

On top of that the Ulster Council organise competitions in central venues around the Province for all our counties to take part. At Under 16 level, counties compete for the Buncrana Cup with the later stages played in Donegal. Counties compete for the Jim McGuigan Cup at Under 17 Level while at Under 15 level all counties have two squads and the Ulster Council organise two blitzes during the year for the counties to take part

Good structured coaching and games will most definitely improplayers at whatever level they are capable for, so in doing so it improves the standard of footbal in our schools, clubs and counties.

Academy Squads over these last few years have produced players who have gone on to represent their counties at senior level. Just a sample of players to evolve through the Academy Squad structure onto county senior level include Patrick McBrearty, Charlie Vernon, Michael Murphy, Kyle Coney, Peter Harte, Andy McClean, Ronan Flanagan, Kieran Hughes, Mark Lynch, Conor Laverty and James Sherry.





### Miceal Ahern

The voice of the announcer at Celtic Park is definitely not of Derry, it is the voice of a West Cork man who has been making quite an impression in Derry GAA circles.

Miceal Ahern came to live in Derry City a decade ago and being a GAA man to the core he soon found a warm welcome for his talents in the Oak Leaf County. team along with Michael Collins and Sam Maguire.

He became a member of the Club Derry fundraising committee and four years ago was elected treasurer. His accountancy skills see him produce a bi-monthly balance sheet and he is always on the look out for new members.

When former County PRO Sean Gunning asked him to take over the PA duties at Celtic Park for big matches Miceal saw it as an opportunity to keep his Irish toned up. He also was scoreboard operator for some time but now young Emmett and Diarmuid McKane have taken over that role. Miceal admits that his hardest task on the old numbers score board was the County Under 14 Hurling Final when Slaughtneil beat Kevin Lynch's 5-17 to 3-21 which left him breathless.

He is passionate about Club Derry and pays tribute to the members who have contributed but like any good treasurer he invites others to join and get the 'feel good' factor.

He is amazed that a small county like Derry has such wonderful facilities with particular



reference to Owenbeg where up to 700 children can take part in blitz tournaments at the one time. He also respects the manner in which the county looks after its finances while others are struggling.
