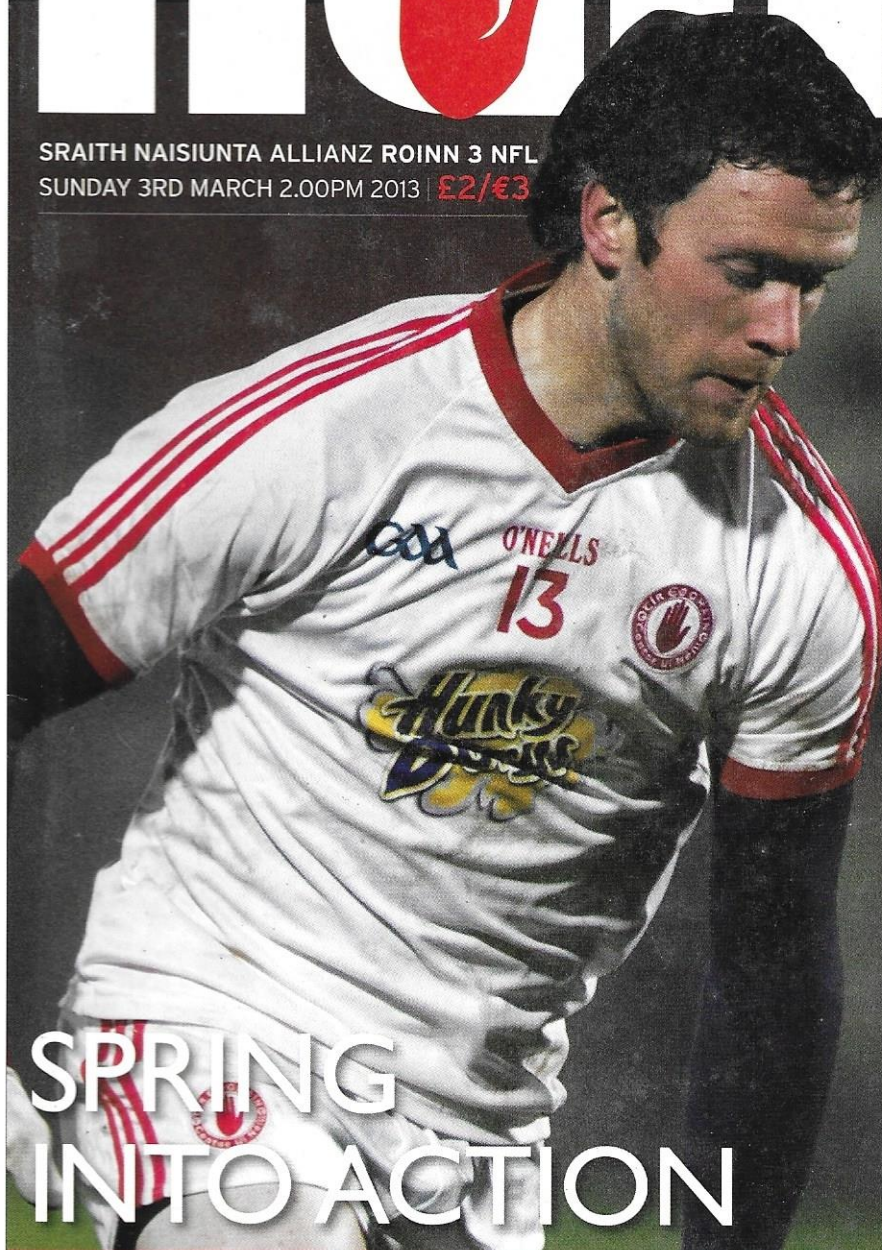

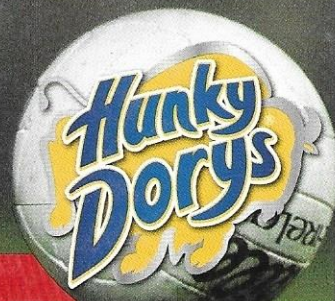

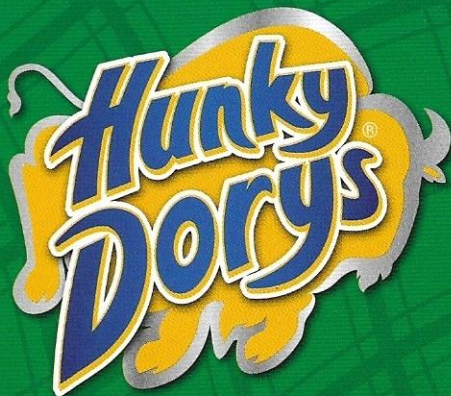

The Tyrone County Final of Scór Sinsear was held on 17th February. It was hosted by the Tattyreagh St. Patrick's club and drew a capacity crowd to St. Joseph's Hall Omagh for an afternoon and evening of high quality entertainment. Fifteen clubs provided acts for the final but Omagh St. Enda's proved to be the major winners on the night by claiming 3 titles.

There was also a "first" in this achievement, with the Omagh Ladies claiming the first Scór Sinsear title by any Ladies section of a club following their victory in the Instrumental Music category, to join the St. Enda's Ceili Dancers and Ballad Group as County Champions for 2013. There were also doubles for Killyclogher and Trillick, with each collecting 2 County Titles.

Killyclogher emerged victorious in the Novelty Act and the Set Dancing, while Trillick took the honours in the Quiz and the Solo Singing with Sharon Kelly. Castlederg also had a tremendous night, with Marie McLaughlin claiming their first Scór Sinsear title since 1977 following her victory in the Recitation.

The Gaels of Tyrone extend a hearty C ad M le F ilte to the reigning All-Ireland Champions Donegal and their supporters on their visit here to Healy Park, Omagh today for a Round 3 clash in Division I of the Allianz Football League. As always when the sides meet we anticipate a keenly contested affair between these great rivals and North West neighbours and I'm sure today's clash will be no different as the seasoned Mickey Harte goes head to head with Jim McGuinness.

The rivalry between the O'Neill's and O'Donnell's is legendary but whilst time has moved on there's still plenty of banter and craic right across the North Tyrone and East Donegal areas whenever Tyrone and Donegal clash. The Strabane, Urney, Castleterg and Aghyaran clubs are all near neighbours with the Lifford, Castlefin, Killygordon and Ballybofey clubs and added into the mix is the fact that many families and relations are intermingled and are working across the imaginary border line such is the geography of the area. For the Gaels in these areas winning is very important as it gives the bragging rights to one side or the other!

Take for instance the Urney club which has its parish boundary straddling both sides of the Tyrone and Donegal border with two of their club players over recent years winning Dr McKenna Cup medals

with both counties respectively. Johnny Lafferty with Tyrone earlier this season and also in 2012 and Fergal McNulty with Donegal against Tyrone back in 2010. Not forgetting the late great Seamus "Congo" O'Kane who played with both Castlefin Robert Emmett's and Urney St Columba's where he was a stalwart for many years. Seamus also played Inter County football with both Tyrone and Donegal and in addition he also lined out with Westmeath and Leitrim during his time serving in the Irish Army. Not too many players can boast of that proud distinction!

When the great Strabane L mhn Dhearg team of 1945 won the Tyrone Senior Football Championship, several of the successful side hailed from Donegal with the likes of George McGill, Sean Small, Liam McDevitt, James McIntyre and Seamus Garvey all involved as at that time Strabane and Lifford were combined as the parish of Camus & Clonleigh. That was evident when Donegal won the All Ireland last season with the "Tyrone Tinneys" situated on the border between Strabane and Lifford were adorned in the green and gold of T ir Chonaill!

Tyrone go into this clash with an unbeaten record during 2013 having claimed the Power NI Dr McKenna Cup title and with two great away League wins already behind them



at the expense of Down and Mayo respectively. Donegal fielded a weakened side during that Dr McKenna Cup campaign and whilst they went down to Kildare in their League opener at Croke Park they reasserted their authority by defeating the men from Down in their last outing at Ballybofey.

Tyrone have won the Division I League title on just two occasions with their last crown coming exactly ten years ago in 2003 with only a handful of that squad still involved today, John Devine, Pascal McConnell, Conor Gormley, Sean Cavanagh and the current team captain Stephen O'Neill are the survivors. Donegal under the leadership of Tyrone native Brian McIver and Tyrone trainer Ryan Porter claimed their one and only title back in 2007 with the likes of Paul Durcan, Karl Lacey, Colm McFadden, Rory Kavanagh, Neil McGee, Eamon McGee and Neill Gallagher all on board and these players are still fulfilling important roles as they showed in winning last seasons All-Ireland title.

Tyrone first contested a Division I League final away back in the

1991/92 season when they narrowly lost out to Derry whilst the following year Donegal went down to Dublin after a replay in their first ever decider. Donegal also lost out two years running in 1994/95 and 1995/96 on both occasions going down to strong Derry sides.

Yesterday (Saturday 2nd March) marked the ninth anniversary of the late Cormac McAnallen. Coincidentally Cormac's last game with Tyrone was to captain them to a Dr McKenna Cup title against Donegal at MacCumhail Park, Ballybofey just nine days prior to his untimely passing.

BECOMING A 'TEAM' THE KEY TO TIR CHONAILL'S GLORY

SIR Alex Ferguson last year gave an insight into how he helped prepare his teams when he said:

"When players stay together, they become a team very easily.

The words rang in Jim McGuinness's ears.

After taking on the Donegal job in July 2010, McGuinness's first task was to lift a downbeat group from the floor.

He met with the players for the first time on November 6th 2010. A function room in the Rosapenna Hotel in Downings fell silent as McGuinness insisted that there was an Ulster Championship in the squad that was before him.

Donegal were ranked 19th in a national newspaper's 'State of the Nation' column that week:

McGuinness asked the squad why that was so. He talked of the 'honesty' that prevailed in the room and, after lunch, a second session followed on the theme 'how to get to number 1'.

From that day forth, there was something special within what McGuinness refers to as 'the group'.

Forging that bond seems to have come easy, but it's something that will have developed on those nights in the Slieve Russell before games, on the team holiday to Dubai in January, or at their training camps in Johnstown House and Carton House.

The night of the homecoming from the 2012 Ulster final, there was a touching moment that outlined the spirit of their group.

Barry Dunnion was a year and a half out of football with injury at the time. Back in training and a part of the group, Dunnion took centre stage as a Four Masters man at a homecoming in Donegal town.

"Hi, I don't deserve this..." he mentioned to Murphy.

The captain's response was telling: "You deserve it more than anybody else."

When the Donegal squad arrived back into the dressing room after the All-Ireland final win over Mayo, they had a moment by themselves.

The door of 'Dressing Room 1' in the Hogan Stand was shut tight. Sam Maguire sat in the middle of the group as players, management and backroom team belted out a chorus of a song that became an anthem in 2012.

From in the bowels of the Hogan Stand there came a thundering noise: "So rock me mama like a wagon wheel..."

Like everything else about this group, they've been carefully selected. 'Wagon Wheel' has been adopted for a reason.

The journey in the song could be closely tied with Donegal's rise from the ashes.


With their bond and spirit has come a belief, too.

McGuinness is a natural believer, who always focuses on the positives.

He led Donegal to Paradise, but their manager never believed that they'd stay in their Purgatory on September 23rd. The gates to their Heaven on the steps of the Hogan Stand was something he visualised from the moment they toppled Cork in the semi-final.

"Losing was never an option... I just couldn't go there," he said.

There was something poetic almost about the goals that sealed the glory: Murphy, his talismanic skipper saving his best wine 'til last with the goal of the year; and McFadden, castigated the day Donegal lost to Armagh in 2010 that could have ended his inter-county days, sealing the top scorer's accolade with a clinical second.

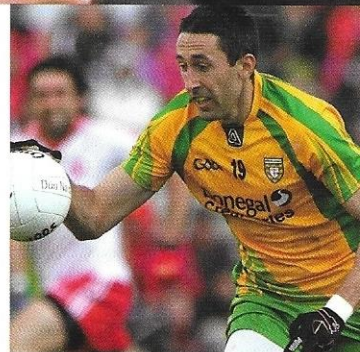

During the last decade, Donegal folk looked over the border as Sam Maguire thrice made his way to Tyrone. Those successes of 2003, 2005 and 2008 left us envious in Tír Chonaill.

Donegal have gone from 19 to 1 in McGuinness's short stint as manager.

Now they want to stay there. But there still stands in Donegal's way one of the GAA's other great masterminds: Mickey Harte. The May 26th Championship game will be the one they'll treasure most, but today's meeting shouldn't be a nevertheless intriguing prelude in which neither will want to lose.

Ciaran also doubles up as a Gateman, not only for his home Club but also the County where he mans the Turnstiles at all Championship and important League games In Tyrone.

What roles have you previously held within the Club?

I was Chairperson on two occasions, standing down at the recent AGM after my latest 3 years at the helm. I was Treasurer for a number of years, and also Assistant Secretary. On the coaching side, I helped with under 12's and more recently with the Minors. I was also a Club Referee for a few seasons. I am currently on the Club General Committee and chair the Grounds Maintenance Sub-Committee

What would you say was your earliest GAA memory?

My earliest memory of attending a football game was the 1972 Ulster Final, where Donegal beat Tyrone 2-13 to 1-10, and at Club level, the 1972 Tyrone Junior Club Final, where Clogher defeated Eglisish at Dungannon. This was Clogher's first Championship success.

What would you say was your best or most memorable Club Memory?

When Clogher won the 1985 Junior League. It was a very good team, that played consistently well all year, and winning the League title was a just reward for their efforts.

What would your best memory be from a County perspective?

All three of Tyrone's All-Ireland Senior titles have been special, but the 2003 All-Ireland campaign was very special, and in particular the win against Kerry in the semi-

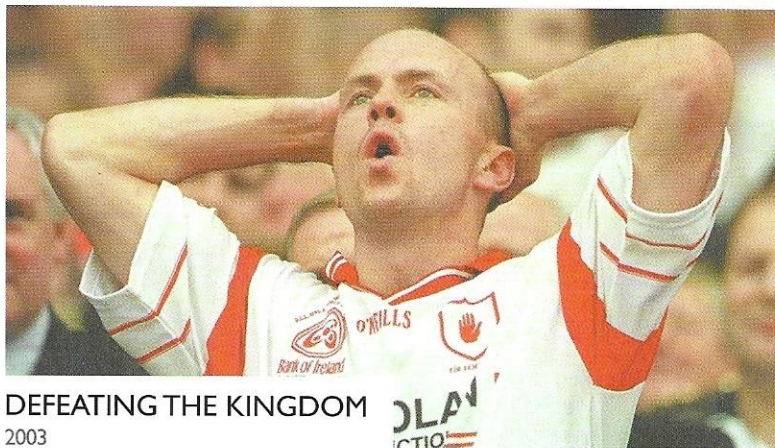
final. The work-rate and effort was phenomenal. It opened up a much greater appreciation of following the County teams.

What would you say makes the GAA unique for you?

It is being part of something in your own local community. 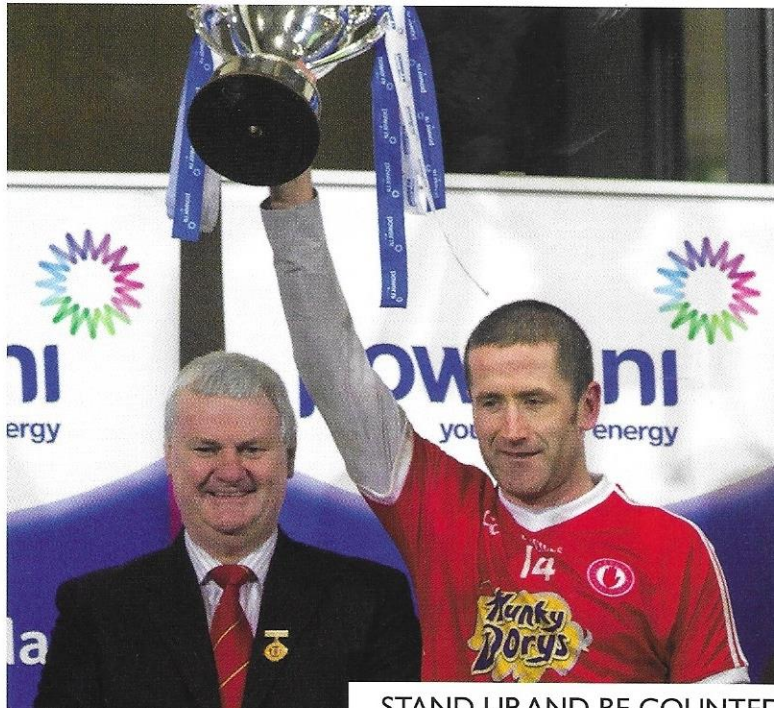

TYRONE LADIES SEEK FIRST POINTS

The Tyrone ladies face the challenge of Meath this afternoon in the Tesco Homegrown National League but its more than just a fourth league game for Mickey Rea's squad. It's a MUST win tie, if Tyrone are to give themselves any hope of avoiding relegation to Division Two. Three defeats in three outings leaves life difficult, but with three points for a win all can change so quickly in the ladies league.

Captain Gemma Begley has called on the new look squad to step up to the plate now and today's encounter does afford Tyrone an opportunity to get off the mark. Meath like Tyrone find themselves without a point albeit from just two games played.

It is of course a Tyrone team in transition, a raft of the minors from two successful Ulster campaigns and a 2012 All-Ireland loss are on board now under the guidance of Rea, while some of the more familiar names that graced many National League and Championship campaigns in the white and red of Tyrone have opted to stand down after long careers. Mickey Rea would be, for some associated more with mens football, he plied his trade not only in Tyrone but in Antrim too, yet as a manager he took charge of Dungannon Aodh Ruadh before throwing his hat in the ring with the county side of things at the end of last year.

Setting out his stall from day one Rea says he will give new players a chance, expectations for the league campaign were not earth shattering and there have been signs of improvement with the losses to Mayo and Laois narrow, however against Cork the Munster side looked impressive. But here too there were signs that Tyrone are getting their house in order; they outscored Cork in the second half and turned in a spirited display, displays though are not enough for the manager or his backroom teams and its all about getting results, he is confident they can do just that this weekend.

Tyrone will field a team in the new look Aishling McGing cup competition this May, the cup competition will allow teams to field U21 teams and this new approach from the Ladies GFA has to be welcomed. "There's a big gap between minor and senior football and this will be a great stepping stone especially for a county like Tyrone where we have so many young footballers on the cusp of coming through to the senior ranks" says Mickey Rea. The competition will be on a round robin group format with the knockout stages to follow.

Tyrone have of course confirmed their Minor squad for 2013, competitive action begins shortly and Tyrone will be keen to continue their great record at underage level.

The unauthorised climbing of any structure, walls or buildings or seating in the Grounds is strictly forbidden.

Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any objects onto the pitch.

Unnecessary noise and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul and abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the Grounds.

Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play at any time before, during or after the game.

A person may not obstruct a gangway, stairwell or circulation area at any time.

All persons entering the Grounds are reminded of their obligation to ensure that their behaviour does not present a danger of fire or other occurrence to anyone using the premises.

The Grounds Management reserve the right of admission.

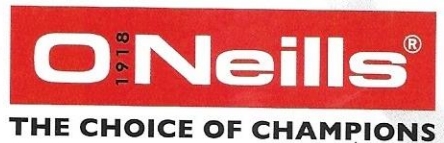
The Grounds Management reserve the right to refuse admission or eject any person who refuses to be searched where such a search is deemed necessary.

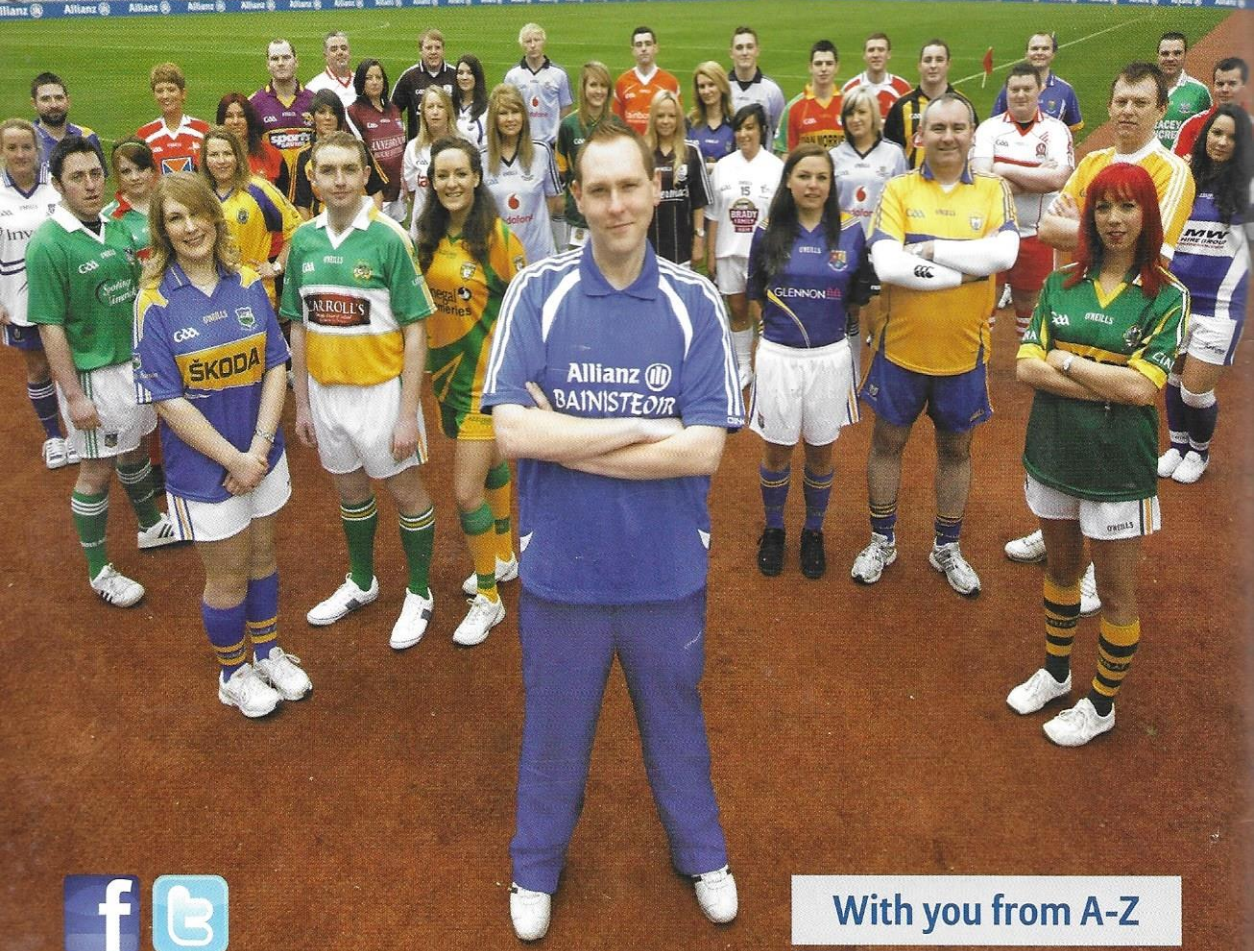
