

### **GROUND REGULATIONS**

- 01. All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and regulations of Cumann Luthchcleas Gael. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- 02. Fireworks, smoke canisters, gas- horns, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or containers, including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground and any person in found to be in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground
- 03. The consumption of alcohol is not permitted within the ground and spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground.
- 04. The unauthorized climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in this ground strictly forbidden.
- 05 Unnecessary noise from the use of radio sets, gas-horns and behavior likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind, including foul or abusive language, is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object the pitch.

- 07. Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play.
- 08. Any person who fails to comply with the instruction from a Garda or Steward may be ejected from the ground.
- 09. In general, the right of admission is reserved to the Ground Management.
- 10. The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission to or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of the Garda Siochana.
- 11 Any person who remains in or obstructs a gangway or circulation area may be ejected from the ground.
- 12. The Ground Management reserve the right for it's servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the Ground Regulations or whose presence In the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.

### A Must Win Game for Donegal

Donegal welcome Dublin to MacCumhaill Park this afternoon with their Allianz Football League Division One status still under threat.

Jim McGuinness's side sit dangerously close to the relegation zone in sixth position, with four points, but their opponents Dublin have enjoyed a much more successful league campaign and sit joint top with Tyrone.

McGuinness has been adamant that Donegal's focus is on their Ulster championship clash with Tyrone, but relegation from Division One would not be ideal preparation for that game.

Indeed last year, Donegal found themselves in an almost identical position, needing to defeat Armagh at home to survive in the league's premier division.

Donegal rose to the occasion to defeat Armagh by three points, and that proved to be an important psychological boost on their way to All-Ireland glory in September.

Dublin have been in sensational form under the guidance of new manager, Jim Gavin, and they come to Ballybofey with a league semifinal spot already booked.

Their free-flowing football has seen them receive lots of plaudits, and many bookmakers have installed them as favourites to capture the Sam Maguire Cup this year.

With Bernard Brogan returning to form, Jack McCaffrey cementing a starting berth, and Paddy Andrews enjoying a second coming a in a sky blue shirt, the Dubs already look like a potential threat to Donegal's All-Ireland title.

Gavin was at the helm for Dublin U-21s when they defeated Jim McGuinness' Donegal in the All-Ireland U-21 final in Kingspan Breffni Park in 2010.

A last minute penalty from Michael Murphy struck the crossbar, and Gavin's side held out for a narrow two point victory.

The Dublin manager also won the All-Ireland U-21 title last year and has introduced a number of young players from both teams to the senior set-up, and competition for places is fierce.

This should ensure there will be no let up from Dublin, despite already having their place

in the semi-finals secured, as fringe players stake their claim for Championship playing time.

Donegal have not been at their best during the league campaign losing four times, but in Ballybofey they have been dominant, recording two comfortable victories over Down and Kerry.

They will also be buoyed by the Ulster Council's ruling to fix their Ulster championship quarter-final fixture against Tyrone in MacCumhaill Park.

The loss of the 2012 Footballer of the Year, Karl Lacey, to a groin injury, had been a big blow to Donegal, and they have missed the incisive runs out of the defence from their talismanic centre-back.

They also will be without All-Star full back, Neil McGee, who injured his knee in the defeat to Mayo in their last fixture.


Donegal-Dublin is a clash looked on fondly by Donegal people after Donegal won their first All-Ireland in 1992, with an 0-18 to 0-14 victory over the boys in blue.


However, in 2011, Dublin avenged that defeat in the All-Ireland semi-final, as their two-point win proved to be to be the catalyst for them to go on and beat Kerry and win their first All-Ireland in 16 years.

When the sides met in last year's Spring series league game in Croke Park, Dublin came out comfortable winners on a scoreline of 2-16 to 0-13.

Donegal will be looking for an improved performance on their least outing in the league when they lost to Mayo in Elverys McHale Park. Dublin, on the other hand, eased to a win against Down, with 19-year-old, Paul Mannion, putting in a stellar performance.

Despite, the prospect of relegation hanging over Donegal, there is also the possibility that they could join Dublin in the league semi-finals if results go their way. It should be a fascinating battle, as Gavin's free-spirited side meet a Donegal team, who cannot afford another slip up.

Colm A. McFadden made his Dún na nGall debut when he came on as a sub. against Baile Átha Cliath on 10 February 2002.

#### 1984

The first competitive Senior League or Championship game between Dún na nGall and Baile Átha Cliath was played here in Seán Mac Cumhaill Park on December 2, 1984 in Division 2 of the National Football League. The post-match shenanigans surrounding referee

Pádraig Gorman attracted as much publicity as the thrilling game itself. Brian McEniff's Dún na nGall led Heffo's Baile Átha Cliath all the way until one minute from full-time when Barney Rock's goal saw Baile Átha Cliath win by 1-6 to 1-4.

The main talking points of the game were four goalmouth incidents. After 12 minutes Martin McHugh was fouled in the square but managed to get the ball into the net. However, the referee awarded a penalty and John O'Leary saved Martin McHugh's kick. After 2 minutes of the second half Ciarán Duff flicked the ball into the Dún na nGall net but the goal wasn't allowed as Duff was in the square. With a minute to go Tom Cassin's cross was punched to the net by Barney Rock. The goal stood despite furious Dún na nGall protests that Barney was in the square. And deep into injury time a high ball into the Baile Átha Cliath goalmouth was fielded by John O'Leary, who was dispossessed by Séamus Bonner (whom we remember fondly to-day). The ball ended in the net but the goal was disallowed and there was great annoyance.

#### 1993 - THREE MEETINGS

Dún na nGall reached the National League Final for the first time in 1993. Their final opponents were Baile Átha Cliath, all-out to avenge the Championship defeat of 1992. Over 51,000 crowded into Croke Park on 2 May 1993 to witness a thriller. Baile Átha Cliath dominated the first half and led by 0-6 / 0-2 at half-time. Noel Hegarty's introduction re-invigorated Dún na nGall and they fought back to level it at 0-8 each. Vinny Murphy restored Baile Átha Cliath's lead but Noel Hegarty saved the day

Dún na nGall with a late equalising point. As in 1984, there was a square-ball incident with Manus Boyle's 53rd minute goal disallowed.

Nearly 60,000 spectators came to Croke Park for the replay a week later. The two Martins -Gavigan and McHugh - were flu victims and were replaced by Noel Hegarty and Joyce McMullin. Both Martins came on as subs along with Sylvester Maguire. Baile Átha Cliath had to field without the injured Charlie Redmond. Paul Clarke took his place and Jim Gavin was selected instead of John Calvert. Brian White refereed both games. Baile Átha Cliath had a whirlwind start and despite having Tommy Carr sent off after just 5 minutes, led by 0-8 to 0-1 at the interval. Although Dún na nGall staged another comeback the gap was too big and Baile Átha Cliath deserved their 0-10/0-6 victory and their eighth (and last) National League crown. Dún na nGall would return for the 1995 and 1996 League finals before winning it eventually in 2007. The League final results from 2007 were:

Dún na nGall and Baile Átha Cliath met again on the 7 November 1993 in the 1993-94 League -Baile Átha Cliath's last visit to Bealach Féich. It was Gary Walsh's 100th appearance for Dún na nGall, who won 0-11/0-7. The game marked Marty Carlin's return to inter-county football and a storming display by man-of-the-match, Mark Crossan. Baile Átha Cliath's Niall Guiden was sent off rather harshly half-way through the second half.

It is noteworthy that both to-day's managers played in the 1993 match, though Jim McGuinness had been replaced by John Duffy by the time Jim Gavin replaced Mick Galvin! Both have done their respective counties some service since!

### Right Decision Made On Venue - Now Let's Prove Them Right

AND so the old lady gets to stage the big dance after all.

Last week in Armagh, a meeting of the Ulster CCC decreed that Páirc Sheáin Mac Cumhaill was to be pencilled down to host this summer's day of days. Ulster will stand still on May 26th. The swords of Ulster's new 'big two', Donegal and Tyrone, will cross upon this hallowed sod by Finn's side.

The eyes of Ulster – and beyond – will be upon this proud little corner of ours seven weeks from today.

There were very real fears that, not only would Donegal lose home advantage, but that the Twin Towns would suffer the indignity of being termed not suitable to host a game of such magnitude.

This was after the controversial Slattery Report slashed MacCumhaill Park's capacity down to 12,250.

"If we were to draw say Tyrone or one of the big teams in the championship, there is no way we would be able to stage the game in MacCumhaill Park. It simply would not have the capacity," was the grim prediction of then County Chairman PJ McGowan in the lead up to last year's Championship.

Subsequent to that, Donegal won a trophy named Sam, a county went daft and the laws of fate decided it'd have a bit of fun. It seemed almost inevitable: the balls of Dún na nGall and Tír Eoghain were paired back in October.

Crucially, Donegal were drawn first – handed 'the home draw' for an eighth year in succession.

Slattery's findings appeared to rule out the prospect of Ballybofey getting the nod.

But then, an opening appeared. During a visit to Donegal in December – when he presented these players with their All-Ireland medals – Aogán Ó Fearghail suggested that he would pitch for Donegal to be given the game, provided that the ground was 'brought up to scratch'.

18,000 was the magic number. The clubs of the county gave their blessings to the upgrade work and construction began almost immediately. New County Chairman Sean Dunnion vowed that 'no stone would be left unturned'.

When Slattery's figures appeared hours before the Armagh meeting, they were slightly beneath the magical mark. 17,520 patrons can now be accommodated. It did not deter the delegates.

It was not only a minor feather in the cap for Donegal, but it was perhaps a victory for good, old-fashioned common sense.

For these towns, it is certainly a coup.

Ballybofey is a town, like many others of its size, in decline in many ways. It has suffered from the closure of many establishments that seemed at one time to be 'part of the furniture' and now the absence of



Championship Sunday would come as a telling blow to many of its remaining businesses.

Ballybofey on Championship Sunday is a heartening sight, which outlines on so many levels the goodness that sport can bring to a town. It is a boost, too, for the business community of the Twin Towns.

Tommy Gallen of the Villa Rose Hotel on Ballybofey's Main Street says that Championship Sunday when Donegal are in MacCumhaill Park is their 'biggest day of the year by a mile'.

He says: "It is the biggest for bar trade, the biggest for food, everyone gets a turn out of it – that is the beauty about it. No matter what team comes, Derry, Tyrone, Armagh, whoever, there is no doubt that it's the biggest day of the year."

The prospect of big Murphy emerging from that dusty tunnel to a heaving mass of 17,520 passionate fans in seven weeks time is enough to make the hairs on the back stand.

Step one in securing the game has now been achieved. Michael McMenamin, the Development Officer, made a very salient point at Tuesday's County Committee meeting when he remarked: 'The next part of it is actually running and managing the game...we need to rise to the occasion'.

Necks will be craned here on May 26th; eyes will be upon us from all corners.


Donegal made the pitch to play at home. Now, our Ulster and All-Ireland champions will begin their next odyssey on their own turf.

Let us all ensure that those present in Ulster Council blazers do not wake on the morning of May 27th and regret the decision of last week.

The old lady must waltz her finest if she is to stage this dance again in the future. Otherwise, the curtain could fall and getting a swell of support again from Ulster be an impossibility.

### **Martin Griffin a legend of Donegal football**

Donegal has produced many great footballers down the years. Legends and characters some more decorated than others with the awards and accolades from the game.

One such former Donegal great that fits into the category of the lesser laden down with awards and honours but none the less his name will always be etched in Donegal history and folklore.

That player is Martin Griffin, a local man, from the Twin Towns here and a former Sean MacCumhaills and Donegal great.

Martin Griffin's Donegal career spanned two decades, the 1970s and 80s, and he was an accomplished footballer. One of his big attributes was his great pair of hands and high fielding.

He was one of those players that had the ability to raise the crowd and his team mates with one of his spectacular fetches when he would latterly pluck the ball out of the clouds.

The holder of two Ulster Senior Championship winning medals from 1974 and '83; Martin made his championship debut in the summer of 1975, as Donegal began the defence of their Ulster crown

A real character at the time he was also know as the man with the sweatband and is reputed to have famously on one occasion have worn a feather in the sweatband.

That was against Cavan, in the championship of '75. His first start was at fullback as he took over duties on the edge of the square from the legendary Pauric McShea.

In all he played in 11 championship campaigns from '75 to '86 – he missed out on the '81 championship through injury - before he walked off the county stage after being sprung

from the bench against Down, in 1986, in Newcastle.

While his debut was in the number three shirt and fullback was arguably his best position, he also featured at midfield from time to time and had many fine days too in the number eight shirt.

In the squad when Donegal won a second Ulster Championship, in 1974, he was firmly established as the first choice number three by 1983, when his club colleague Mickey Lafferty became the third Donegal captain to raise aloft the Anglo Celt, in St. Tiernach Park.

Martin Griffin was also a gifted hurler and played hurling for both his club and Donegal at all levels and came from a family steeped in Gaelic Football and the Gaelic tradition.

His late father Gerry was recognised as a leading coach of his time and managed Sean MacCumhaills to championship success and also managed Donegal, both men and ladies teams at a time. And his grandfather Ben Griffin is synonymous with Sean MacCumhaills and in particular the development of Sean MacCumhaill Park.

As well as his two Ulster champions winners medals Martin is also the proud holder of a Donegal U-21 and senior championship medals. The U-21 won in 1975 and the senior three years later, in 1977, when MacCumhaills defeated Gaoth Dobhair in the final to claim the last of the clubs six titles.

After calling time on his Donegal career, Martin played on for a few more years for MacCumhaills before hanging up the boots for good.

A native of the Twin Towns he still resides on the banks of the Finn, in Ballybofey, and still attends games here in MacCumhaill Park.
