DREAMING THE IMPOSSIBLE DREAM

'He led Cavan to victory on that memorable day, in the final against Kerry in New York far away, The next year in Croke Park when our boys beat Mayo, once again they were led by the Gallant John-Joe.'

'Oh brave clan O'Reilly so proud is your name, you've reared many sons of great honour and fame, but not even the princes of long long ago, could compare with our sportsman the Gallant John-Joe.'

I don't have a note in my head and I'm not a native of Cavan but for some inexplicable reason I can recite the words of the above song virtually word perfect. Penned by Peter Albert McGovern from Swanlinbar, 'The Gallant John Joe' is a tribute to the legendary Cavan footballer, John O'Reilly, one of only eight men to have been presented with the Sam Maguire

Cup on two occasions. Tragically, he died in 1952 at the age of just 34.

Nobody knows what impact the death of such an iconic figure had on football in Cavan. But whether it is merely a coincidence, the fact is that Cavan, once the dominant force in Ulster football and still joint seventh in the All-Ireland roll of honour, hasn't won an All-Ireland since his death.

When word filtered through to Newbridge last Saturday night that Cavan had beaten Derry after extra-time to reach Round 4 of the All-Ireland Qualifiers the words of the song started circulating in my head again and they haven't left since.

This was a terrific result for Cavan football and also for the GAA because despite their lack of success, particularly over the last 40 years,

their county team has a massive fan base. This was demonstrated most recently when thousands travelled to Croke Park to see their U21 team contest an All-Ireland final against Galway in 2011.

In the event of Cavan overcoming the challenge of London, rest assured they will come in their thousands to Croke Park next weekend for their first-ever appearance in the All-Ireland quarter final.

The chances of Terry Hyland's side winning the All-Ireland in 2013 remain slim – when last I looked the bookies had them priced at 30/1. But in the words of Robert Louis Stevenson 'to travel hopefully is a better thing than to arrive, and the true success is to labour.'

But regardless of how the season ultimately pans out for Cavan they have been one of the success stories of the football campaign, even if what they have achieved so far pales into insignificance when set against Monaghan's Ulster final triumph against defending title holders and All-Ireland champions, Donegal.

Monaghan's first Ulster title win in 25 years together with Cavan's progress in the qualifiers gives real hope to those teams in the second tier of the rankings list who are bidding to improve their rating and dream of challenging for a place at the top table.

Up until last Sunday, Dublin, Kerry, Mayo and Donegal looked a cut above the rest. The football championship was rapidly becoming as predictable as the hurling series used to be when Kilkenny were at their peak.

But Monaghan smashed through that glass ceiling and debunked the notion that certain counties have exclusive rights to be members of Gaelic football's elite club.

Given their tradition, Kerry will probably always be members of that elite group, and despite their poor strike rate in terms of winning All-Irelands – one title in 16 years – given their

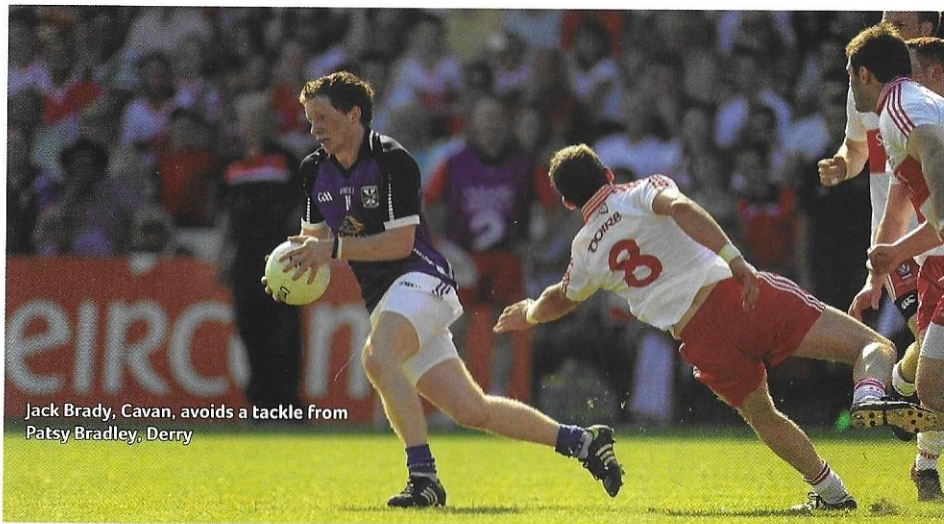
population base and financial clout, Dublin will probably always be semi-permanent members of that 'club' going forward.

Otherwise, it's open season as regards entry to the club: Mayo, for example, are seen as genuine All-Ireland contenders just three years after almost being beaten by London in the quarter final of the Connacht championship and four years after they lost to Sligo (in the Connacht championship) and Longford (in the All-Ireland qualifiers).

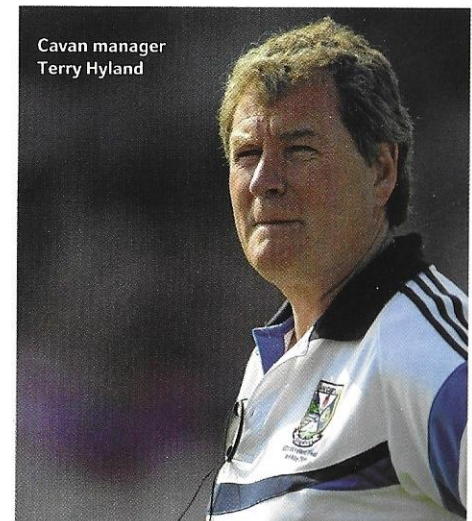
But it is up to all those counties with populations in excess of 100,000 to have aspirations of making that great leap forward. Even though Offaly proved otherwise in both football and hurling, for counties to have a realistic chance of even challenging for an All-Ireland title they need a population base in excess of 100,000.

There is no magic formula to achieving success. It is mostly about blood, sweat and tears. Patience and persistence – probably both – are required as well, together with a sprinkling of good luck along the route.

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Cavan hasn't won any silverware at senior level yet. But it is interesting to look at how they have reached this point. They have won one Ulster minor and three Ulster U21 titles in the last three seasons. So far they haven't claimed an All-Ireland title in either of the underage grades. But being contenders is arguably as important as winning titles.

They have a locally based team boss in Terry Hyland, and Gaelic football remains the only sport that truly matters in the county.

Of course, the other factor which has played a key role in their development is the qualifier system. For all its faults it has repeatedly provided a means for some of the so-called football minnows such as Westmeath, Sligo and Wexford to dream the impossible dream.

Now it's Cavan's turn to reap the rewards. Under the straight knock-out system Cavan would be forgotten by now. Thanks to their qualifiers it could be their best summer since 1997 when they won the Ulster championship and were unlucky to lose to Kerry in the All-Ireland semi-final.

As the ballad says 'there will never be another like the Gallant John Joe' but it is certainly time for Cavan to produce a new bunch of GAA heroes.

And the fact that their next door neighbours Monaghan are already one step ahead of them in the race for Sam, having narrowly defeated them in the Ulster semi-final, will only motivate them further. What odds on an all Ulster All-Ireland quarter-final between Monaghan and Cavan!

UPHILL CLIMB FOR BEATEN PROVINCIAL FINALISTS

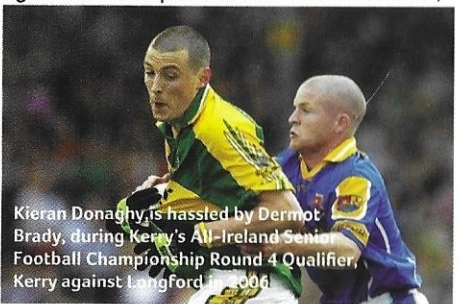
The final round of the qualifiers usually spells further misery for teams on the back of losing their provincial final, and sometimes unlikely indicators for counties who found All-Ireland winning form at later stages.

In the 12 years of the qualifiers, the Round 4 (or third round in 2007 and '08, when the qualifiers were reduced to allow 'weaker' counties compete in the Tommy Murphy Cup instead) has seen 48 matches prior to today from which the beaten provincial finalists have won just 15, a strike rate of 31 per cent.

Indeed, in 2003, '04 and '10, all four teams beaten in the provincial final also lost their next game.

On the face of things it's a curious statistic given that, having reached their own provincial decider, in theory these teams should be stronger than those that were consigned to the qualifiers at an earlier stage.

There are numerous factors militating against beaten provincial finalists however,

not least the fact that, in most years, two of them generally have to face into qualifier action six days later against a team that has two or three victories under their belt and, with it, renewed confidence and momentum.

It's been well documented that only two counties, Dublin in 2001 and Down last year, have managed to win a fourth round qualifier the weekend after failing to conquer their province.

It's a challenge that is being thrown down to two teams at opposite ends of the spectrum today as Donegal unexpectedly find themselves in Carrick-on-Shannon against a Laois side that dispensed with Meath in similar circumstances 12 months ago, while London make a welcome appearance at Croke Park facing a Cavan side on their best run in years as their opponents.

While the six-day turnaround is a difficult mental assignment for players to overcome, you'd have to wonder how much managers have talked their teams into a negative mindset in the immediate aftermath of losing a provincial final over the years.

Yes, it may not be fair, but all the whining in the world about its inequity won't force a change of heart from the fixture-makers days before the game is to be played and, moreover, on some level it surely gives players a ready-made excuse before the ball is even thrown in.

However, the good news is that, following

this year's Congress, the qualifiers will be split from next year to ensure that Donegal and London should be the last teams to have to face the dreaded quick turnaround in future.

Since the inception of the qualifiers, only two teams have lost their provincial finals and gone on to win the All-Ireland, Tyrone in 2005 and Kerry the following year. Eight years ago, Tyrone were hardly insecure about themselves despite losing a replayed Ulster final to Armagh. There was little in those two games and Tyrone had every right to feel that if they got another crack at Joe Kernan's side that they would have every chance of beating them.

So it proved as they overcame Monaghan in Round 4 and Dublin after a replay in the quarter-final before beating their conquerors in an epic semi-final.

Round 4 provided the backdrop for one of the most influential, yet simple, tactical innovations of the last decade as Kerry posted Kieran Donaghy at full-forward for their clash with Longford in 2006 after their attack had lost its way in a Munster final replay defeat to Cork.

Eoin Brosnan may have scored a hat-trick in Kerry's nine-point win but it was all about Donaghy afterwards. He was the focal point up front for the remainder of Kerry's successful campaign and ended the season as Footballer of the Year.

In 2009, Kerry's struggle to victory over Antrim in Tullamore was in keeping with a

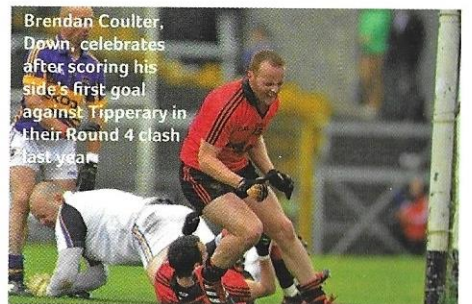
qualifier run that suggested a great team was on its last legs having already rode their luck against Longford and Sligo.

But, in almost identical fashion to Tyrone 12 months earlier, they returned to their blistering best in the quarter-final against Dublin and went on to win the All-Ireland with Jack O'Connor later identifying the last 20 minutes against Antrim as a turning point.

Conor Counihan made similar comments in September 2010, reflecting on when his Cork side came through extra-time against Limerick in Round 4.

Thankfully, there doesn't appear to have been much, if any, moaning from Donegal and London about their schedule this week. Indeed, Donegal captain Michael Murphy pointed out on Tuesday at the launch of the All-Ireland series in his native Glenswilly that getting straight back up on the bike was the best remedy for their Ulster final loss to Monaghan.

Let's see how the games pan out, but quite often the final round of the qualifiers is what you make of it.



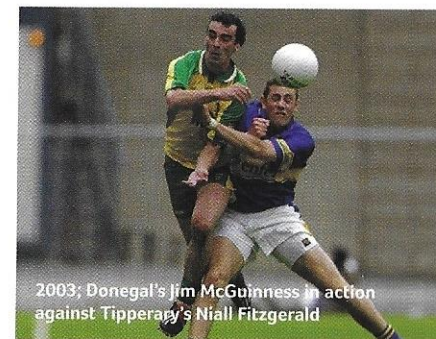
Brendan Coulter, Down, celebrates after scoring his side's first goal against Tipperary in their Round 4 clash last year



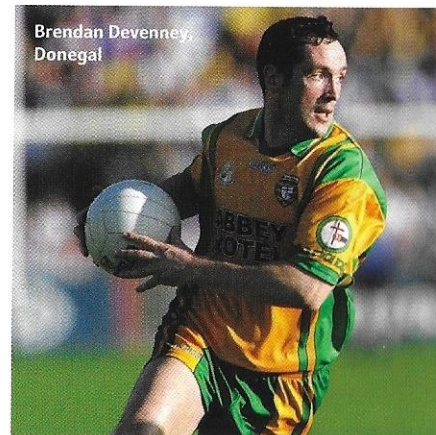

STADIUM REGULATIONS

- All persons entering this ground are admitted only subject to the following Ground Regulations and to the Rules and Regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Entry to the ground shall be deemed to constitute unqualified acceptance of all these Rules and Regulations.
- Fireworks, smoke canisters, bottles, glass, cans, flags, banners, poles and other similar articles or canisters including anything which could or might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground and any person in possession of such an article or container may be refused entry or ejected from the ground.
- Spectators are not permitted to bring alcohol into the ground/area.
- The climbing of walls, stands or other buildings in the ground is forbidden.
- Excessive noise such as that from the use of radio sets and behaviour likely to cause confusion or nuisance of any kind including foul or abusive language is not permitted in any part of the ground.
- Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.
- Unauthorised persons are not permitted to enter onto the field of play and may be ejected from the ground.
- In general, The Ground Management reserves the right of admission.
- The Ground Management reserves the right to refuse admission or to eject any person who refuses to be searched by a member of An Garda Síochána.
- Any person who remains in a gangway may be ejected.
- The GAA event promoters reserves the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the ground regulations or whose presence on the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.
- Smoking is forbidden in enclosed areas of stadium.
- Security Cameras are in operation throughout the stadium.
