

Danny Harkin has been involved in the affairs of the GAA for all his adult life. First as a player and later as a referee, team manager and also as a very able administrator.

As a minor Danny played with Sean MacCumhaill's and picked up a winners medal as County Minor Champions in 1957. Later playing as a corner back he won Junior League and Championship medals with Convoy in 1963.

When his playing days were over, Danny took up the whistle and was prominent in refereeing circles for guite a few years both within the county and at inter county level. He was honoured with taking charge of a Senior County Final but his proudest moment as a referee must have been when he was selected to take charge of the All-Ireland Minor semi-final of 1973. In addition to his refereeing activities, Danny was at this time also Treasurer of the Convoy club and made quite a name for himself as a fundraiser.

He ran marguees, bingo and numerous club draws to keep the club in a good financial state and was the driving force behind the effort to raise funds to take the club to the USA in 1978 to celebrate 50 years of the GAA in Convoy. He was also to the fore the following year when the club purchased what have now become very impressive club grounds. In 1981 the club undertook a walk from Cork to Convoy to raise funds which

helped to build a house for a local MS sufferer and again Danny was the driving force.

Danny has also at various times been Treasurer and Chairman of the County Board as well as being Donegal's representative at Central Council.

He has always had boundless energy and an amazing ability to combine a very busy working life with his GAA activities and other interests.

In addition to his refereeing activities, Danny was at this time also Treasurer of the Convoy club and made quite a name for himself as a fundraiser.

It came as no great surprise that when the County Board needed to raise 125,000 Euro for the further development of the Centre of Excellence that they turned to Danny Harkin to steer that operation. They couldn't have made a better choice. As usual Danny wasn't found wanting and together with his team delivered the required amount in just four months.



The County Board paid tribute to Danny at this year's Banquet to honour this great achievement and never was an honour more richly deserved.

Danny's greatest attributes are his sense of humour, his loyalty, his ability to make friends, a steely determination and an indomitable spirit which together enable him to bring to a successful conclusion almost any task that he undertakes.

Danny is currently recuperating following recent surgery and is showing his usual determination and resolve and will, no doubt, return to full health soon. Everyone involved in the affairs of the GAA in Donegal and much further afield will surely wish him well in his recovery.

Opinions from Ciaran Woods, Gaelic Life

For months now, it has been the clash of Donegal and Tyrone in the Ulster Senior Championship which has had football fans in Ulster licking their lips with anticipation.

The Tir Chonnail county have enjoyed the upper hand over their Red Hand neighbours at senior level in recent seasons, they sent them crashing out of the Ulster Under 21 Championship at the first hurdle earlier this year... can they now bring that same level of domination down to the minor ranks and get a massive day and huge occasion for Donegal football off to the best possible start?

Unfortunately the build up to this game has been more about who won't play for Donegal than anything else. Their star man, Stephen McBrearty, younger brother of senior star Paddy, will not feature as he continues his rehabilitation following knee cartilage surgery. He would normally have operated

anywhere up the spine of the Donegal team from midfield to fullforward. Influential wing-back Oisin Carr is also ruled out through injury.

However, Stephen Friel still has plenty of talent at his disposal, with a number of his players including Darrach O'Connor and Aidan Sweeney having featured heavily in their Under 21 campaign earlier this year. Callum Gallagher, son of All-Ireland winner Matt, is a solid defender, while Aodhan McGinley will attempt to influence things around the middle third. Ciaran Thompson from the Naomh Conaill club has also been recalled to the side in recent weeks to bolster their midfield options.


Elsewhere, Lorcan Connor of the Downings club will be Donegal's playmaker-in-chief at centreforward, with Colm Kelly the fulcrum of their defence at half back. Cian Mulligan of Gaoth Dobhair may be one of the youngest members of the Donegal panel, but he too will have a big say in the outcome of today's game.

Their opponents Tyrone boast a proud tradition at this level, with an annual expectation in the Red Hand county of a provincial minor title now the norm. It is certainly an unfair pressure to place on such young shoulders, but they tend to take it in their stride. Tyrone manager Mickey Donnelly is also without key personnel, Strabane's Liam McGillion the victim of a freak elbow injury during a club game is ruled out of a starting defensive berth, while Philly Donnelly, a member of last year's panel, is also out due to an ankle injury sustained while on duty with his Donaghmore club.

They will look to the likes of Rian McHugh at midfield, as well as Ardboe's Michael Lynn up front, with Trillick's Lee Brennan assured from dead balls. Shea Hamill from Donaghmore is another influential figure at wing-back, with Clonoe's Rhys Quinn keeping things solid from the edge of his own square.


Donegal people would tell you that if they were playing anyone other than Tyrone today, then they would fancy their chances of victory. With the swelling crowd in MacCumhaill Park as this game progresses, if the home side can keep within touching distance for the last quarter then we're in for a rousing conclusion.



After over a decade of sharing the Anglo-Celt Cup with Armagh, Tyrone have found themselves in a tug-of-war with a new nemesis for the famous old trophy.

The Red Hands and Donegal have won the last four renewals of the Ulster Senior Football Championship and these two thoroughbreds seem to be stretching further ahead of the field each year.

Donegal haven't lost an Ulster Championship tie since 2010 when Down beat them in Ballybofey and the Tir Chonaill men are the only side to have defeated Tyrone in the race for the Anglo-Celt since a 2008 replay defeat to the Mournemen.

Remarkably, considering one county could be out of the running by this evening, Donegal and Tyrone are the first and second favourties respectively



with the bookies for the Ulster Championship.

Donegal's hopes of winning three provincial titles in-a-row won't receive a sterner test than this afternoon against one of the country's in-form teams.

Tyrone's march to the National League Final was in stark contrast to the Ulster and All-Ireland champions' campaign which saw them relegated from Division One.

It's not just the respective outcomes of the spring campaigns which have many tipping to the Red Hands to end Donegal's eight-match unbeaten Ulster SFC run. Mickey Harte has freshened up his panel, bringing a dynamic and physical edge while retaining the street smarts of seasoned campaigners such as Sean Cavanagh and Stephen O'Neill.

There aren't many counties who can add to their scoring prowess by changing their goalkeeper, but Niall Morgan's introduction between the sticks this season has seen him become one of Tyrone's key assets with his accuracy from the dead ball.

Frees and 45's could hold great importance today as Donegal are likely to attempt to contain a Tyrone team which were the second highest scorers in the League behind Dublin.

That has been an encouraging development for the Red Hands this season as they

lacked the power to dethrone the Ulster champions in last year's semi-final.


Stephen O'Neill may remain their main scoring threat, but with Jim McGuinness likely to have devised a plan to contain the mercurial Clan na Gael man, Tyrone may be forced to look elsewhere for the scores that will bring them over the line.

O'Neill ran into a rampaging Frank McGlynn in last year's Ulster SFC semi-final, with his influence curtailed by the Donegal defender who made matchingwinning impacts at both ends of the field.

Sean Cavanagh missed last year's Championship through injury and has been playing in a more advanced role this year while Mark Donnelly, Peter Harte, Matthew Donnelly and Conor McAliskey can also chip in with scores and incisive passes.

Former minor stars Kyle Coney and Ronan O'Neill have yet to make the mark at senior level their youthful promise suggest, however, injuries has frustrated their efforts in that regard and as both work towards full fitness, Mickey Harte's pool of talent grows deeper.

The Tyrone boss remarked recently that he felt his side were much stronger than 12 months ago and it's not inconceivable that a win today could set them on their way to a long and fruitful summer.



For Donegal, their season starts today. Jim McGuinness used the National League to add depth to his thin squad by giving gametime to some fringe players. It could be argued that experiment back-fired as they ultimately suffered the drop from Division One thanks to Paul Mannion's injury time point for Dublin to ensure a draw in Ballybofey on the last day of the campaign.

However, the Tir Chonaill camp have argued that everything has been built towards today's Championship opener at Sean MacCumhaill Park.

The venue itself has been the source of hot debate, with Tyrone arguing that more spectators could have been accommodated in Clones - the scene of the last two Championship meetings between the teams which Donegal won.

But Donegal were adamant that they wanted to retain home advantage and that may be seen as an early psychological victory for Jim McGuinness's men.

Although the Red Hands have freshened up their attack this year, Donegal shouldn't be found lacking in that department either. Michael Murphy proved in last year's All-Ireland Final that he can rise to the

big occasion and although today is only the first round of the Ulster Championship, it is a game of massive significance.

A defeat for the Tir Chonaill men would send them into the Qualifiers where their questionable strength-in-depth will be tested to the limits. Colm McFadden and Patrick McBrearty join Murphy in a potent attack and Donegal's starting 15 remains one of the most fearsome in the country.

However, Jim McGuinness was relatively fortunate on the injury front during last year's All-Ireland -winning campaign. This year, he has already had to contend with the loss of Footballer of the Year, Karl Lacey and although several up-and-coming players such

as Ryan McHugh, Luke Keaney, Odhran MacNiallais and Ross Wherity were handed their chance to shine in the Dr McKenna Cup and National League, it remains to be seen how they can handle the pressure of Championship football.

Although they may be green under the surface, Donegal still possess a formidable and experienced defence which will have had their confidence bolstered further by last September's All-Ireland success. For all Tyrone's attacking flair, they will be made to work hard for their scores today, while guarding against a potentially devastating counter-attack from the reigning champions.

On their way to bringing Sam back to the Hills, they defeated today's opponents in a pragmatic Ulster Semi-Final with a dramatic climax. Paul Durcan's late save to deny Martin Penrose a goal become one of the defining moments of the summer for the Tir Chonaill men.

Today is likely to follow a similar chess-like battle between two of the game's most tactically astute minds, but whatever masterplans Jim McGuinness and Mickey Harte might devise, there still remains an enticing element of unpredictability about any Championship tussle. Form dictates that fortune should favour the Red Hands today.

PROVINCIAL FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP.

DONEGAL DEFEAT

SPLENDID CONTEST AT

Dougal defeated Tyrone on Sunday last in the first round of the Ulster Provincial Football Championship. The game

Never before has Dún na nGall beaten Tír Eoghain at home in the Ulster SFC. This stark fact is somewhat deceptive, for only three of their previous championship meetings have taken place on Tír Chonaill soil. Overall, Tír Eoghain has won nine of their clashes, Dún na nGall has triumphed seven times, and once (in the 1989 provincial final) they drew.

Eighty-four years ago yesterday, on 25 May 1919, Strabane hosted the maiden knockout encounter between the two counties.
Séamus Dobbyn, the Ulster GAA president, held the referee's whistle, and a crowd of some 1200 attended.

'Home' advantage counted for little, for the north-western Tír Eoghain town was as familiar to Dún na nGall men as to their Red Hand counterparts. In fact, just one month earlier, Strabane had hosted a reorganisation convention of the Dún na nGall county board – a very rare example of a county going outside its own borders for a major

domestic meeting. This match was in fact Dún na nGall's first in the championship since 1907.

While the Tír Chonaill county was entering a new era of hope. Tír Eoghain was in disarray. O'Neill's of Omagh, the leading club in the west of the county, and several teams to the east, had reportedly seceded to soccer of late, stated the Ulster Herald: and the 'now practically defunct county committee' was being blamed for a state of apathy in the county. The West Tyrone League was left to select a county team comprising five Fintona men, five Trillick men, four Augher men and one Strabane man.

The Dún na nGall side, similarly, included quartets of Buncrana and Bundoran players. It was, however, a Ballyshannon man, B. Loughlin, who emerged as the key figure of the tie. After Pat McGee (Augher) goaled early in the second period to halve Dún na nGall's six-point interval advantage (1-3 to nil), Loughlin fired in his second goal of the day and from then on Tír Chonaill did not look back. Dún na nGall went on to score two further goals and win by 4-3 to 2-0.

Dún na nGall faltered at the next hurdle, losing by eleven points at home to An Cabhán in the semi-final. Nonetheless, the 1919 season can be seen as the beginning in earnest of the county's championship odyssey – for the county had returned at last, and has contested Ulster Championships ever since. Yet another fifty-three years would pass until Dún na nGall would beat Tír Eoghain again in the senior championship, in the 1972 Ulster Final.

Jimmy McElhatton has often affectionately been referred to as "Mr Carrickmore" as he has been involved with his beloved "Carmen" for a lifetime

Married to Rose (Donnelly) who hails from the neighbouring Parish of Beragh and they have five sons, Sean, Pearse, Plunkett, Ciaran, and Conor and one daughter Mairead.

Jimmy, a mechanic by trade could just about put his hand to anything. When you arrive at St Colmcille Park, there to greet you no matter what time of the day or night is Jimmy Mc Elhatton. For the past number of years he has been the club groundsman, come caretaker and general handyman. Jimmy treats the pitches and facilities like his own and endless hours are spent nurturing and preparing them for games, meetings and numerous events held in St Colmcille Park.

Jimmy never made it on the playing side with his beloved An Charraia Mhór but did line out for the club minor side in his early days. What Jimmy didn't manage to achieve on the playing front he certainly made up for off the field. Jimmy joined the Club Committee in 1974 and has served in various officer roles down through the years. He was Club Secretary from 1976 to 1982. He was a team selector on the famous 3 in a row sides helping out the legendary Frankie Donnelly and Packie Ward.

He held the role of Chairman of the Éire Óg's Hurling Club for 6 years. For many years Jimmy faithfully acted as the An Charraig Mhór's club delegate at County Board meetings and League Board.

Another string to Jimmy's bow was his skills as a respected football Referee in all 3 codes, hurling plus ladies and mens football. Jimmy was the Club Referee from 1980 right up until 2003 when he was sadly forced to give up the whistle following a mild heart attack after officiating at a youth game in Killyclogher. Jimmy not only refereed club football he was also highly respected on the inter county scene at hurling level throughout Ulster. One of his big profile games was the man in the middle of the Ulster Junior hurling semi final between Down and Donegal during the 1980's.

Jimmy also refereed an Under 21 Tyrone Football final as well as many Championship games at adult level. Being the man that Jimmy was it didn't take him long before he was back in the thick of the action

Following the retirement of Harry Kelly as the main caretaker of St Colmcille Park, Jimmy took up the mantle and still plays a key role in the maintenance of the facilities.

In the modern era Jimmy would probably be referred to as an early day Mickey Moynagh having served as Tyrone minor kit man and transport officer under at least 4 different Tyrone minor managers namely Harry Brennan, Liam McGrath, Seamus Woods and Francie Martin.




On top of this Jimmy was the right hand man to Tyrone Senior Hurling Manager Brendan Harkin when Tyrone won the All-Ireland Junior Final in the mid 1990's defeating Hertfordshire. One of Jimmy's quiet pleasures is watching Scór be it either Junior or Senior Scór but not just in Tyrone. Jimmy and Rose are an ever present part of the audience at all the Scór venues up and down the country and Jimmy has never been know to miss the All-Ireland Scor Finals

At Club level Jimmy helps out his trusted club colleague Lawrence Kelly on the Cultural Committee. There is no doubt Jimmy is truly an all round GAA club volunteer who simply lives for the pride of his club and that of his county. I have known Jimmy for the past 30 years and he is certainly one of the most genuine Gaels at club level within the county and if a visitor arrives to St Colmcille's Park, Jimmy is sure to have the kettle on the boil and a welcome cup of tea will soon be put in front of you.







- 1. The aim of opt for life is to put in place a state of the art organ donation system North and South. Our friends and neighbours are dying needlessly. We can put a stop to this.
- 2. In the North, a good infrastructure for organ donation/transplantation is already in place. All that is needed to bring us into line with Europe's leading donor rate countries is the new law. In the South, a proper infrastructure is needed as well as the new law.
- On the 5th of February 2013, the Joint First Ministers announced that the Executive is moving towards the soft opt out proposal set out in this document. All of the parties in the NI Assembly support it. It is endorsed by the BMA (British Medical Association) and all of the NI patient groups. An all-party group comprising MLAs, doctors and leaders of the patients' associations has been formed to spearhead the move towards the new law. Public consultation is soon to begin and the Health Minister is keen to introduce the new law as soon as possible.
- 4. The Irish government has already held public hearings in relation to 'soft opt out' and is determined to bring in the new law. TDs indicated their overwhelming support for the proposal in the course of a Dail debate on the 1st of May 2013.

The proposed new law

- a. In future, we will all start out as donors. This reflects the fact that the vast majority of people believe donation after death is a good thing. One deceased donor can save seven lives.
- b. Those who do not wish to be a donor after death, can register their objection to donation by opting out online. Those who opt out will not be considered for donation after death.
- c. Even if someone does not opt out online, the next of kin will always have to give their consent at the hospital before donation can proceed. No consent, no donation.
- **d.** This is therefore a system based on family consent.
- e. The reason for the requirement of family consent is that we believe organ donation is a sacred gift from one family to another at a very difficult time. The new law will therefore enshrine the principle that donation after death is a gift freely given.
- f. This change will transform our organ donation system. Donation will become the norm and we will have a state of the art system similar to those in place in the world's leading donation rate societies.



- g. The North already has in place a state of the art organ donation infrastructure. The South would need to put in place a similar infrastructure in order to take full advantage of the new law.



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
