Fr. Tierney Park - The 60th Anniversary & 2014 Development Project "For the good of all"

This year marks the 60th Anniversary of the Official Opening of the Fr. Tierney Memorial Park which took place on Sunday May 9th 1954. The event was marked with a game between Donegal and Armagh for the Erne Cup and a set of silver medals which had been presented by the Traders of Ballyshannon. The game was refereed by former Cavan great, the late John Wilson who made a major mark subsequently in civic and political life as a T.D., Government Minister and Tánaiste.

The Aodh Ruadh Club on the occasion of the Official Opening paid this tribute to

the late Fr Tierney: - "Today we honour the memory of a great Priest and a great Irishman, the late Rev. Cornelius Tierney, B.D., whose burning devotion to the ideal of an Ireland Gaelic and Free, marked him as a man among the leaders of the National Resurgence Movement. A President of the local Craobh of the Gaelic League, during the years when hundreds of Irishmen made the supreme sacrifice for freedom, he inspired the youth of the town to be loyal to the language, games and traditions of Roishín Dubh.

Volunteering for the Foreign Missions he was appointed Director of St. Columban's Mission in Kien Chan (Nan Cheing) in the Province of Kiang Si, China. He was captured and imprisoned by the Communists and after four months detention he died for the Faith"

On that day in 1954, the starting Donegal line-up included Aodh Ruadh man Jackie McDermott who played in goals. Jackie's son, Tommy, went on to play for club, county and province with distinction in the 1980's.

With regard to the dedication and effort required to construct the Fr. Tierney Park, at a time when there were no Sports Capital or other funding Programmes, the Club had this to say: - "The provision of this Park has been a heavy task but it was a work which was tackled enthusiastically and courageously by a few for the good of all. We are proud of the achievement, but we are not boasting, for there is a long road to travel to the realisation of our ideals as an Association and our aims as a club."

The references to the efforts "of a few for the good of all" and to the "long road to travel" were somewhat prophetic.



After the 1954 Official Opening the task of developing the Fr. Tierney Park continued with modest progress in the 1960's and 1970's; significant works in the 1980's — first spectator stand in the County and new dressing rooms and Club Shop; "Munday's Field" purchased in 1987 and work on land-filling spectator embankments progressed; Aras Aodh Ruadh and new changing rooms built with a Community Employment Scheme and Officially Opened as the Cubs Millenium Year Project in 2000.

Widening and lengthening of Fr. Tierney Park playing field took place in 2007

when development works at the grounds ceased for the next seven years in order to implement Aodh Ruadh's decision to undertake a €.5m re-development of "Munday's Field" which was the venue for the club's first games in 1909; the latter re-opened in 2009 with a Prunty championship standard enclosed playing field and a Prunty sand-based Training Field which was flood-lit to competition standard in 2013

To coincide with the 60th anniversary of the Official Opening, a major redevelopment of spectator facilities at the Fr. Tierney Park is now underway. This focusses on restoring the capacity of the grounds towards the 12,500 target set for the Fr. Tierney Park in the County Board's Strategy.

Significant progress towards that capacity figure has already been made in the current phase of works and will be further advanced by year end.

All of these works are aided by Aodh Ruadh's 30 + years involvement as a Sponsor of Employment Schemes with just under 30 participants at the grounds and in the wider community currently.



Donegal have bone to pick with Louth

When Donegal and Louth last met, the Wee County were underdogs, but over two games they proved too strong for Donegal.

The meeting was in the Division Two League decider in 2006 - Brian McIver's first year in charge of Donegal. Back then Division Two was divided into Division 2A and Division 2B and when they

met in the decider in Kingspan Breffni Park on April 23rd, the first game ended in deadlock.

Indeed, it took the introduction of Adrian Sweeney at half-time to spur Donegal into action as Louth, under Eamon McEneaney, led by 2-5 to 0-6 at the interval, thanks to goals from Aaron Hoey and a Mark Standfield penalty.

A large crowd of some 12,000 was present to witness the Donegal comeback in the second half with Sweeney central. The Donegal side hit six unanswered points and seemed to be on their way to victory only to be hit with a third Louth goal from Martin Farrelly. The tie ended - Donegal 0-17, Louth 3-8.

If anyone thought that Louth

had blown their chance, they were mistaken as the Wee County tore into Donegal early on with three quick points from John O'Brien, Martin Farrelly and Darren Clarke before Barry Dunnion and Michael Doherty responded for Donegal.

JP Rooney put Louth clear but Michael Doherty had Donegal in front when he converted a penalty on 20 minutes. The sides exchanged points before Louth struck for their goal three minutes from the break. Christy Grimes was the engineer and he set up Mark Stanfield to fist to the Donegal net and give his side a 1-6 to 1-5 interval lead.

The second half saw Louth move four ahead, I-9 to I-5 with Darren Clarke getting two good scores. Michael Doherty with two frees and one from Adrian Sweeney reduced the gap to the minimum.

Aaron Hoey and Darren Clarke restored the Louth three point advantage before Donegal full-back Paddy Campbell receive a straight red card. They did have the chance of an equaliser when Adrian Sweeney was straight through but he was thwarted by the Louth 'keeper Stuart Reynolds and Louth celebrated a famous victory.

Louth's proud history

Even though they have not hit the heights in recent times, Louth have a very good pedigree of success in Gaelic football. They contested the first ever All-Ireland senior final and have won the All-Ireland title on three occasions - twice before the Sam Maguire was in vogue (1910 and 1912) - and in living memory when famous accordionist Dermot O'Brien, held aloft the Sam Maguire in 1957.

They made history when they were the first winners of the Tom Markham (All-Ireland Minor football) Cup in 1940. They had won the Minor Championship prior to that in 1936.

Aodh Ruadh Schools Coaching Initiative Fr. Tierney Park – 1954-2014

Just three weeks ago the Aodh Ruadh School's Coaching Initiative commenced. This is an initiative to mark the 60th anniversary of the Official Opening of the Fr .Tierney Park by putting the emphasis on gaelic games and youth development in the Club's area. All six National Schools in the Club's area. St. Catherine's NS: Kilbarron NS; Holy Family NS; Gaelscoil Éirnne; Creevy NS and Rockfield NS are participating. Experienced club coaches, Teddy Kane, Val Murray and Brian Roper (football) and Peter Horan (Hurling) are rostered to visit the schools and provide substantial coaching sessions every week. The objective is to give every boy and girl attending Primary school in the Club's area the opportunity to play Gaelic games and

to receive expert coaching. The club looks forward to sustaining this initiative for an extended period into the future and the possibility of adding a further hurling coach, such is the interest in the game, is being actively pursued.

The co-operation of the local schools has been magnificent and very encouraging. The co-operation and support of the Principals and teachers in all six schools is greatly appreciated. The Initiative will be reviewed shortly with a view to examining how it may be extended to support the teachers involved in coaching and managing school teams in Colaiste Colmcille who continue to field in hurling and football, and with increasing success, in the second level colleges competitions.

Our national anthem will be sung today by Farrah Bogle who is currently starring on TG4's Glor Tire programme.


The 21-year-old from Ballyshannon just launched her first album in September and is now in the

Donegal and Louth by numbers

Increasingly my Sunday evenings have been spent sifting through the numbers behind our games. They are like DNA. They might not dictate behaviour, but it is difficult to escape established patterns.

The most telling numbers as we look ahead to the meeting of Donegal and Louth can be seen on the Allianz NFL division two table. Donegal top with seven points, Louth bottom with two. That tells its own story, but dig deeper and you not only discover why the teams are in those positions, but also compelling reasons to believe this match is Donegal's to lose.

Let's start by looking at home and away form.

Surprisingly, Donegal have the third worst home record in Ulster this year. The running average for winning home games is 58 percent. Donegal's number is 50 percent, with the opening day loss to Tyrone in the McKenna cup and the NFL draw with Meath pulling them down on this metric. On the other side of the coin Donegal losses in Father Tierney Park are a rare thing indeed, 2009 against Dublin, 1-8 to 0-13, was the last one.

Louth have played three away games this year and lost them all, their lowest losing margin being four points against Dublin in the O'Byrne cup. Not only do they lose away games, they usually take a beating in the process. The only other sides yet to win on the road this year are Carlow, Offaly, Westmeath, Limerick, Galway and Sligo. That's not great company to be in.

One of the great boosts for Donegal this year has been the rediscovery of their scoring knack. Their average score for 2013 was 14.53 points per game (PPG). So far in 2014 it is running at 16.88 PPG. One of the key factors behind this is Colm McFadden's return to form. He was one of the central drivers in the 2012 campaign, outscoring Michael Murphy by 12 points that year and averaging 5.091 PPG. In 2013 his PPG rate dropped to 3.5, but already in 2014 his PPG rate is on the rise, up to 4.63, with 5-22 to his credit, 0-13 from frees. He is just two points behind Murphy who, it should be noted, has sourced over two thirds of his scores from placed ball this year.

A slight concern for Donegal is the fact that 56.3 percent of all their scores this year have come from the boots of Murphy and McFadden. But then again, they did win an All-Ireland on a not dissimilar number.

Louth's scoring returns make a sorry contrast. Sitting at 12.13 PPG in a season when scoring is up generally is poor going. Last year their scoring sat at 15.8 PPG and their top



scorer was Shane Lennon. The Kilkerley Emmet's man hit 6-45, getting a quarter of all Louth's scores. Lennon hasn't featured this season through injury and the current top scorer for the Wee county, Brian White, has only managed 0-15. White was second highest scorer in 2013, but Aidan O'Rourke just hasn't able to replace Lennon's scoring power. Only 16 players have got on the score sheet for Louth this year, one of the worst figures in the country. By way of contrast Donegal have had 23 scorers in 2014.

Things don't get much better for Louth on average concession per game. Their number this season is 16.63 PPG as against Donegal's 12.38 PPG.

Broadening it out a bit, one of the noticeable aspects of the advent of the black card has been the generalised increase in scoring. The average total PPG last year was 29.51. This year it is running at 31.54, a seven percent increase in scoring year-on-year. However Donegal (29.25 PPG) and Louth (28.75 PPG) aren't among the sides sharing in the scoring bonanza, so we shouldn't be expecting a particularly high scoring game today.

Of course, one of the main talking points this season has been the introduction of the black card. So far 117 have been doled out in senior inter-county football, an average of 0.41 per game. Donegal are well below the average at 0.25, but Louth's discipline has let them down quite a bit this year. Their black card average of 0.63 is decidedly on the high side, while they have also been giving up a lot of yellow cards, and reds too with Dessie Finnegan sent off against Monaghan and Brian White getting the line against Down.

On the basis of the numbers it's a gloomy outlook for the visitors. But every game is an opportunity to amend the trend. Just look back to Ulster championship 2013 when Donegal reversed pretty much every metric going in the season up to that point to dispose of Tyrone.

It's hard to look past another two points for Donegal, but there's always a but...



time for the Leinster Championship at play from Aidan O'Rourke and his backroom team is not an unreasonable suggestion.


Still, the league is important to a county like Louth. Playing Division Two football guarantees good opposition and the end result will inevitably benefit any future championship run.

Also the news that Shane Lennon could make a return for Louth in these crunch matches is, of course, a massive plus for O'Rourke. But the Kilkerley man has been blighted with injury for the last few league seasons and to risk him in this relegation dogfight is to potentially lose him for the championship.

It's a big decision for O'Rourke and co. and it's only heightened by the fact that Louth have been so inadequate between the posts thus far.

Today in Ballyshannon is another big ask indeed for Louth and time now to make some lasting decisions which could have a bearing on how 2014 shapes up for the Wee County.

Donegal - where are we right now?

Seeing as we're the selfproclaimed forgotten county in Ireland, some might accuse Donegal folk of being a little paranoid.

Good times and bad have seen voters in the county continually act against the national trends. Away from the polling stations, Donegal embraced their Ulster and All-Ireland triumphs of 2012.

It brought much-needed joy to the county and also plenty of attention,

which of course was treated with an element of suspicion in some quarters.

When Donegal failed to retain those titles the theory bandied about was that it was due to a lack of hunger, a flash in the pan, a system meltdown.

Although Down, in last year's Ulster semi-final, were the first team to really find a chink in the Donegal armour, it was Malachy O'Rourke's Monaghan who floored them, winning handsomely, 0-13 to 0-7, in the provincial final.

It was the loudest cheer heard at St Tiernach's Park in Clones in quarter of a century. Donegal, with barely a pulse to be felt, were then obliterated by Mayo, 4-19 to I-10, in an August Bank Holiday Massacre at Croke Park.

Seeing only Kerry in 2007 have defended the Sam Maguire since 1990, Donegal didn't really buck a national trend as their retention fell short. But the manner of the defeat and the continual reference to what might've caused it didn't sit easily with the progressive Donegal manager.

"Last year, we were managing a situation and not a team," McGuinness said recently on Charlie Collins' Talking Sport podcast. "We never really got off the ground at all."

Collins and podcasts with McGuinness, as well as the volumes of written press in the county, provide the Donegal footballing fraternity with a 'State of the Nation' type appraisal of where the contemporaries stand - like those ones on the



flickering television sets from RTE when Jack Lynch spoke about the escalating troubles in 1969 or when Charlie Haughey warned us that "we were living above our means" in 1977.

Donegal's present state is difficult to pin-point precisely from the outside looking in. All we know for sure is that the panel have been and are being well trained, while there's only a fraction of the injury concerns of last year.

McGuinness, aided by their new backroom team of Paul McGonigle, Damien Diver and John Duffy oversaw an earlier pre-season than usual in dimly-lit Castlefin or the windswept Dunfanaghy.

Away off in the overlooked north-west, it was a fair distance from Croke Park in terms of mileage even more so metaphorically.

For some, Donegal's intense approach to 2014 is considered as a final throw of the dice from McGuinness, who sought a four-year term when initially appointed in July 2010. However, McGuinness has never said that the conclusion of year four necessarily means the end for him. Now, though, the focus is on the panel and not the manager.

"We've taken a different approach this year," he explained. "A lot of the lads were out through injuries for a long time so we've been trying to take care of them. It's about trying to bring them steadily forward and not have any setbacks. We feel we are at a decent level now. We want to win games."

Division Two in March isn't a place where too many juries sit to make their verdicts. Donegal, though, were plotting along well, winning 2-19 to 1-9 in Laois and then 1-16 to 0-12 against Galway in Salthill.

Aside the results, even at that embryonic time of year, there were little signs of 2012 – hustling and breaking, scurrying and scampering - back in Donegal's play.

If there was one team, historically and presently, who have never stood in any sort of trepidation of Donegal, then it's Monaghan. Last year's Ulster final - as big a shock as it was at the time to many - was not the exception, it was the rule.

Only a battle-hardened Tyrone's more advanced stage of cuteness denied Monaghan a place in last year's All-Ireland semi-final.

Monaghan were more experimental than Donegal when both arrived at a crammed O'Donnell Park on March's first Sunday. A bit like the 2012 All-Ireland final against Mayo, Donegal's early goals - this time through Odhran MacNiallais and Colm McFadden - provided the wriggle-room that was never relinquished. Donegal won 2-11 to 0-10.

Whilst those six points provided for a commendable start, since then it's not been so clear-cut. Michael Murphy had to chip in from the bunker with the last kick of the game to scramble a I-I2 apiece draw with Meath in Ballybofey before Down sank a wasteful Donegal I-9 to 0-10 when the talk of an uncharacteristic lack of composure in the forward line dominated the post-match interviews.

As tepidly as Donegal performed, though, it did boil down to a mountain of missed chances resulting in one missed opportunity.

The scare-mongers are out in force again after Newry but the Allianz League only provides semblances of evidence that can be taken into account prior to the championship ball being thrown in the air.

The last time Donegal appeared here at Fr Tierney Park, on St Patrick's weekend 2012, McGuinness had seen his team pick up only two points from four Division One encounters prior to their meeting with Mayo.

He admitted recently Donegal "haven't pressed the button yet" and they hadn't back then. Summer will tell a tale of its own. It's not too far now. Hopefully you remembered to put your clock forward the hour last night.

There's a claustrophobia developing in the higher regions of Division Two right now, but the best thing for all the mathematicians to do today in Ballyshannon is to get behind the team against Louth and leave the calculations till supper. The picture in Division Two will soon become much clearer.

A win today means there will hopefully be no need for paranoid notions or looking unexpectedly over our shoulders. Two points today and Donegal will have their destiny in their owns hands.

Ground Regulations for Fr Tierney Park, Ballyshannon

All persons entering Fr Tierney Park, Ballyshannon are admitted only subject to the following ground regulations and to the rules and regulations of the Gaelic Athletic Association. Safety: The unauthorised climbing of any structure, walls or buildings in the ground is strictly forbidden. Under no circumstances is it permitted to throw any object onto the pitch.

Access: A person may not obstruct a gangway, stairwell or circulation area at any time.

Field of Play: Unathorised persons are not permitted to enter upon the field of play at any time, before, during or after the games.

Ground Control: The Ground Management reserve the right for its servants or agents to remove from the ground any person who does not comply with the ground regulations or whose presence in the ground could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to other spectators.

Smoking: Permitted only in designated areas of Ground - Signposted in each of the 4 corners of grounds. Please respect this policy.

Stewards: All spectators are asked to co-operate with Stewards at all times.

Defibrillator: Located & signposted at changing rooms.

Exits: New exit to main road at stand side of grounds; Exit behind "old" scoreboard will bring you in direction of town centre & Belleek road & N15/by-pass.
