U21s power their way to final

REPORT BY CHRIS MCNULTY AT KINGSPAN BREFFNI PARK

WHEN the going got tough here, it was Donegal's tough who got going.

Spurred on by their big names, Maxi Curran's Under-21s overcame Armagh on Wednesday night to reach a second successive Ulster Under-21 final.

Eight points from Patrick McBrearty led the way for the Tír Chonaill boys who held firm when the unyielding Armagh refused to buckle and put it up to them.

At one stage in the second half, Armagh - managed by former senior star Steven McDonnell - had reduced Donegal's lead to a point, but it was here where they showed their worth and took a deserved win after emptying the tank in a hard-working display

With the excellent McBrearty pointing the way, with scores of some sublime standing, Donegal were aided by strong displays by senior panelists Martin O'Reilly, Ryan McHugh and Hugh McFadden. Between them, they hit thirteen of Donegal's tally. Ciaran Thompson, who had a fine game at centrefield. was also on the scoresheet and the busy Darach O'Connor - who raced from Buncrana to Cavan after sitting both Leaving Cert French oral and an Agricultural Science exam in the afternoon - added the clinching score after coming on as a sub for the last eleven minutes.

Eoin McHugh was another who was excellent with those direct, surging, probing runs of his causing Armagh no end of angst, drawing foul after foul in an industrious display.

Armagh had midfielder Aaron Findon red carded late in the night having been given a second yellow card, but there were few complaints from the Orchard following a game n

It was a night where the game was in the melting pot for longer than Donegal might have wished and a night where they could have had victory copper-fastened long before O'-Connor's late score, with three goal chances passed up over the course of what will be reflected upon as a useful hour at the office ahead of a rematch with Ulster Under-21 kingpins Cavan next week.

Ryan McHugh opened Donegal's account with only twenty-two seconds on the board, although the Kilcar man was entitled to his head-inhands reaction given that he'd found himself with a sight of goal and elected to aim for the uppermost point of David O'Hagan's target.

Three times in the opening eleven minutes the teams were tit-for-tat. McHugh, McBrearty (free) and McBrearty, this time from play, had given Donegal an edge, but each time Armagh responded with Michael McKenna, Joe McIlroy and Ciaron O'Hanlon on the mark.

O'Hanlon slotted over after Gavin Gallagher was dispossessed deep in his own backline, but Donegal were soon back in the ascendancy when Ryan McHugh slotted a 43-metre free into the bullseve.

A fine free from McBrearty, out on the right-hand side, made it a two-point game before another superb point by the Donegal skipper, facing away from goal and with Seamus Kelly breathing down his neck.

McBrearty collected after good work from Eoin McHugh and John O'Malley, and neatly tucked over the bar for a three-point lead. It was easily the pick of his night's work.

Donegal had made one change to the side that had beaten Fermanagh

two weeks previously in Ballybofey with O'Malley coming in for Brendan McNelis and a rejig of the personnel seeing Thompson join McFadden at centrefield.

Thompson pushed up to get on the scoresheet and put his side four in front before McBrearty got in behind with McFadden coming a whisker from finding him with a long ball over the top. The stretching McBrearty managed to get a hand on the leather, but it skidded away and the chance was gone.

A free from Paul McGeown reduced the arrears for Armagh, Donegal were 0-7 to 0-4 in front.

The Orchard were dealt a hammer blow when senior player Ethan Rafferty, their towering midfielder, was forced to withdraw because of an injury. Blaine Malone stepped into the void, but there could be no doubting the impact of Rafferty's absence.

That said, Armagh made a fair first of it around that middle third, but McFadden grew in stature as the game wore on and the Killybegs man had a big influence on proceedings while Joe Coll's booming darts some of which were going way over halfway - helped in those moments when Armagh threatened to make a real fist of it.

After McBrearty (free) and McKenna swapped points at the start of part two, Donegal got in for another goal chance. O'Reilly had an initial chance, but was caught in two minds. Eoin McHugh had a shot, but was blocked and the angles were always working against willie Gillespie when he connected for the rebound.

Armagh frees from Cummiskey and McGeown tested Donegal's jaw, but the response was commendable as O'Reilly and Ryan McHugh (free) gave Donegal a little breathing space again.

O'Hanlon and McBrearty hit quick-fire scores at either end and Armagh set up a tasty finish when Cummiskey drilled over ten minutes from the end.

O'Connor was summoned and but for his feet sticking in the glue-pot surface the Buncrana man could

have had a green flag hoisted.
McBrearty and O'Reilly pushed
Donegal four up and, even though
O'Hanlon did bring Armagh within a
goal again, the cherry was placed by
O'Connor with a fabulous lastminute score.
