



On November 21, 1920 Gaels gathered in large numbers here at this venue as we do this evening to savour the best sport has to offer.



SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 21 1920 by Michael Foley

ICK HOGAN SAT IN THE TIPPERARY DRESSING-ROOM TORMENTED BY DUBLIN AND **NERVES AND THOUGHTS OF** FRANK BURKE

All around him and outside on the banks and stands of Croke Park, the talk was about the British agents killed by the IRA that morning in a set of attacks across the city. The numbers were uncertain. A dozen were dead. maybe more. The city was gripped by the fear of what might happen next. But Hogan's mind was miles away.

Marking Frank Burke spooked him. It was Hogan's second year with Tipperary at rightcorner-back. Burke was the shining star in a glittering attack. Hogan looked to Bill Ryan. He was starting in front of him at righthalf-back. He had been on the team longer. Maybe he might swap.

Ryan had his own troubles. His football boots had been thrown out the train window during a scuffle the previous day with some soldiers on the way to Dublin and his new boots were too big. Before they went out onto the field Hogan pulled a spare shoelace from his kitbag and gave it to Ryan for his boots. He kept Mick Hogan's shoelace like a precious relic for the rest of his life.

No one could imagine what was coming, even those who expected the worst.

There had been talk of the city being burned by gangs of Auxiliaries and Black and Tans. the new police forces installed that year to reinforce the RIC, in revenge for the agents

killed that morning by the IRA. The savage cycle of atrocity and reprisal that comprised the War of Independence left people expecting dire consequences. A group of IRA men came to Croke Park that afternoon imploring the GAA authorities to cancel the game. "Imagine if the machine guns opened fire," said one. "What an appalling thing."

No one truly believed it could happen. The crowd, starved by the drop-off in major matches, had swelled to nearly 15,000 for a simple challenge game. The police might disrupt the game, but the GAA saw greater difficulties trying to evacuate such a large crowd. They compromised. The turnstiles were closed to limit the numbers. Then, as the crowds gathering outside the ground got agitated, the turnstiles opened again.

Out on the field Jøhnny McDonnell stood in goal for Dublin, hiding from view in broad daylight. That morning McDonnell was among a group of IRA men in a house on Upper Mount Street awaiting the execution of two British intelligence agents. In the back bedroom their leader, Vinny Byrne, pointed his revolver at two men standing in their pyjamas on the bed, facing the wall. "May the Lord have mercy on your souls," he whispered. Then he shot them both.

Every IRA man involved that morning had been advised to disappear, but McDonnell had his

football match. The group scattered into the city. McDonnell got a boat across the Liffey and ran home to Seville Place, gathered himself and his football gear, and went to Croke Park. The authorities in Dublin Castle did target Croke Park that afternoon, but not for revenge. They went there looking for leads. A mixed force of RIC, Black and Tans and Auxiliaries were instructed to enter Croke Park, stop the game and search every man and boy. A military force encircled the ground to ensure an orderly exit of spectators.


Ten minutes had passed in the game before the first ball bounced towards Mick Hogan and Frank Burke. The first police trucks carrying over a hundred men were arriving on the Canal Bridge outside. With their commanding officers in trucks further back in the convoy, the police weren't ordered to fall into line for dispersal to different exits to perform searches.

Instead, they poured down from the bridge towards the ground, cocking their guns.
Some lined up along the bridge and took aim.

Sitting in the crook of a tree that stood between what is now the Davin and Hogan Stands, 11 year-old William Robinson turned back to see what the noise was. A shot rang out. A bullet ripped through his shoulder and chest. Robinson fell from the tree to the ground. He died the following day.

Police streamed onto the pitch, firing at the crowd. Spectators surged towards the main exits on either side of the current Hill 16 end. A crush quickly developed at both exits. A machine gunner in an armoured car positioned at the junction of Hill 16 and the current Cusack Stand fired into the air forcing the people back into the ground and caused another disastrous surge.

Others leapt over the low wall at the Canal End and escaped along the bank. Bullets ploughed up the pitch. One man had his heel shot off. One policeman was saved from a bullet by the cigarette case inside his jacket. People hid in the dressing rooms and escaped through back gardens, jumping onto passing trams outside injured and covered in blood.

The shooting lasted 90 seconds leaving dead and wounded scattered across the pitch, on the stands and banks and the streets outside. The Tipperary team were corralled by the police into a group at the Hill 16 end, fearing for their lives before being let go. They left with Mick Hogan lying dead on the field.

In the 95 years since, that afternoon in Croke Park has calcified in the nation's collective memory as an example of Britain's cruel inability to properly govern Ireland and made the GAA more than a sporting organisation, but an inextricable part of the country's political conscience. Fourteen civilians were killed. A question from Irish MP Joe Devlin at Westminster about the massacre the following week ended in a fistfight. The verdicts of two military enquiries that December into the killings at Croke Park roughly mirrored the official government statements of excessive force provoked by shots fired from inside Croke Park. Neither version of events ever fully stood up.

In time Mick Hogan's death was commemorated by the Hogan Stand but Bloody Sunday continued to play a role in the GAA's identity and how it shaped its future. The Croke Park killings and the prospect of English teams playing on the ground that bore Hogan's blood were regularly aired as compelling argument against opening Croke Park to other sports, but Croke Park eventually opened and the English rugby team played there in 2007. The Queen visited Croke Park in 2011. Bloody Sunday in Croke Park slowly eased into a different historical context.

"So much of this visit reminds us of the complexity of our history, its many layers and traditions," she said at a banquet in Dublin Castle, "but also the importance of forbearance and conciliation...with the benefit of historical hindsight we can all see things which we could wish had been done differently, or not at all". Those words rang true for every death and atrocity, including Croke Park on Bloody Sunday.

Her words also pointed towards the victims of Ireland's troubled history with Britain. For all the years of outrage and anger, those killed in Croke Park were buried under decades of politics and historical debate and analysis, their names forgotten. Some still lie in unmarked graves.

But their spirit still lies unknown in every concrete block, seat and step of Croke Park. Look to the Cusack Stand, a few rows up on the halfway line and see Jane Boyle holding her fiancé Daniel Byron's hand until a bullet in her

back and the crush of the crowd sweeps her from his grasp. Drift further up towards the back of the lower deck to where Patrick O'Dowd sat atop a high wall that separated Croke Park from the Old Belvedere Sportsgrounds helping people over to safety before he was shot and killed, falling on top of the last person he dropped to the other side.

See William Robinson in his tree where the Hogan Stand meets the Davin Stand. See Mick Hogan lying near the Cusack Stand sideline between the 65 and 45 metre lines. See Tom Ryan slumped beside him, shot while whispering an Act of Contrition in Hogan's ear.

See the crushed, broken bodies of James Teehan, James Matthews and James Burke. See the men carrying the stricken Joe Traynor past the body of 10 year-old Jerome O'Leary along the canal to a house on Sackville Gardens where he will die before night time.

Walk back to the city centre over the bridge onto Russell Street, where Daniel Carroll was fatally hit by a bullet. By the bridge lay Michael Feery dying in a pool of blood having impaled his leg on a spike when trying to clamber over a wall. Go by Fitzroy Avenue where 14 year-old John William Scott grew up with Croke Park at the end of his road, hit by a ricocheted bullet

and died on the kitchen table of a house on St James's Avenue. His father was directed to Mrs Colman's house. His son's body had already been taken away by ambulance. He pleaded with Mrs Colman. Was it definitely John? Was she absolutely sure? She placed a tie pin and a pair of glasses in his hands. He knew them as his son's.

Behind the politics and the cold history of dates and numbers, those stories tell of an unimaginable tragedy in a stadium built and celebrated as a place of joy. Occasions like Ireland-Australia are an example of how the GAA always wished to see itself: open and international with a progressive, enquiring attitude towards making the organisation accessible to more people in any culture and community. Nurturing the compassion to remember the Bloody Sunday victims also has its place in that outlook. Remember the dead today. Forever.

SIX KEY HISTORICAL EVENTS

HIS MONTH MARKS THE 31ST ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST OFFICIAL INTERNATIONAL SERIES BETWEEN IRELAND AND AUSTRALIA.

Since then, 18 series have taken place and the countries are level on nine wins each.

The international concept dates back nearly 50 years when the pioneers of the links between Australian Rules and Gaelic football organised matches on an ad hoc basis but the official coming together can be traced to the report of a GAA sub-committee established to investigate the possibility of a permanent collaboration.

That was in 1983 when the GAA and the Australian National Football League (NFL - now the AFL) took the first steps towards formalising a hybrid game to be played between the best Australian Rules footballers and their Gaelic football counterparts in Ireland.

As well as being among the great indigenous sports of the world, the two football codes had much in common in a combination of handling and kicking skills with an emphasis on high fielding and man-to-man contests for the ball.

The following six tests were significant milestones on the continuing journey of a remarkable project.

BEGINNINGS

-1984

The inaugural series took place in 1984 as part of the GAA's Centenary Year celebrations. Although cartoonish violence marred the first official test, played in Cork in October 1984 there was enough excitement and cleanly contested football in the second test to enthuse the organisers. Dr Allen Aylett, president of the NFL, had this to say before the decisive third test:

A football game in the 1860s.

"In this game we have a space-age spectacular if we continue to work on it, a game twice as fast as any other form of football in the world."

That first series ended in front of an impressive crowd of 32,318 at Croke Park.
The game itself had settled down and the third test was the best of the series before the visitors triumphed 76-71.

In those early days of the three-test series, aggregate scores didn't count and so with the series level at one each, the third test would be decisive. Ireland, captained by Kerry's Jack O'Shea, were in contention all the way through. Meath's Colm O'Rourke – in a starting full-forward line with Eoin Liston and Leitrim's Michael Martin – top-scored for the home side with 24 points and the home side led by a point with two minutes remaining but late overs from Gerard Healy and Allen Daniels gave the visitors the first series victory.

ENGAGEMENT

-1986

The first official series in Australia had its share of controversy and maybe because of that, attracted huge attention back home. After violent brawling in the first test in Perth, where Australia won, Ireland responded to level the series in Melbourne.

Managed by Kevin Heffernan, who comprehensively rethought his tactics during the series, Ireland had to rise to the physical challenge before settling down to winning it.

The Australians were enraged at what they saw as Irish players going down too easily and their coach, the legendary West Australian John Todd, achieved instant fame in Ireland with his declaration that the Gaelic footballers were "wimps".

"They'd make great soccer players," he told

the press conference after the second test, "but wouldn't have a hope of making the grade in Australian Rules. They're not tough enough to handle a real game; whether that is ice hockey or marbles, it's all the same. We in Australia don't complain. We don't have cream cakes at 10 o'clock in the morning; we've been brought up in a tough school."

Administrators were singing from the same hymn sheet and President of the Australian National Football League Vince Yovich commented: "I don't wish to jeopardise the future of the international series but if they continue to do that they will provoke our players, who will hit them if they don't get up." Goals from Tyrone's Damien O'Hagan, Cork teenager John O'Driscoll, who was by a distance the top scorer in the series, his county man Jimmy Kerrigan, (whose son Paul is in the current Ireland squad), and Greg Blaney from Down fired Ireland to a comprehensive third-test victory.

Such was the interest at home that the decisive match in Adelaide was broadcast live on RTÉ on the Friday morning.

TURNING UP DOWN UNDER

-1999

After a gap of eight years, the series was resumed in 1998 with two tests in Ireland, both played at Croke Park. For the first time the Australian association, now the AFL, assumed a direct role in organising the tour. Ireland won the series on aggregate and a year later still under the management of Colm O'Rourke the Irish headed Down Under for the first time in nine years.

There was scepticism about how well the event had been promoted in Melbourne and despite assurances that the locals generally attended big events on a 'walk-up' basis, the presales of around 10,000 had prepared the

GAA and travelling media to expect the worst. Instead, Melbourne's MCG, illuminated by a fireworks display, was buzzing on the night of the first test, which attracted what was up until then the biggest crowd ever to attend an international, 64,326. It was an evenly contested match but a last-minute goal from Galway's Jarlath Fallon gave Ireland a 70-62 win, a lead they didn't let slip in the second test, which ended in a draw.

GETTING CLOSER

-2002

The series of 2000 and 2001 didn't really build on the momentum of the big crowds in Australia in 1999. The GAA hadn't been helped in 2000 by the All-Ireland final going to a replay, which became the first such final to be played on Saturday, the day before the first test. In the circumstances it was no surprise that Ireland weren't particularly effective.

A year later in Australia it was the home side's turn to be overrun, both in Melbourne and Adelaide. The second test in 2002 was nicely balanced. Before the start Australia captain Shane Crawford made a speech commemorating the AFL players who had

died in the Bali bombings, just a week before the second test.

Although the weather was ferocious, freezing with rain and sleet, the crowd record was broken again with an attendance of 71,552 and they weren't disappointed. The test and the series hovered in the balance until the very end. Ireland, seven down after the first test, led on aggregate in the final quarter only to get pulled back before the end but with seconds to go, the trophy was still there for either side. Australia prevailed.

WIZARDS OF OZ

-2005

Kevin Sheedy would go on to play a controversial role in the international series but his first test was a ringing endorsement of his tactical analysis. An experienced club coach, he framed his game plan watching videos of that year's All-Ireland between Kerry and Tyrone.

Having insisted on not being restricted to All-Australian award winners when selecting his team, he instead devised a fast, transfer game played by skilful players capable of adapting to the round ball.



At the final training session before the first test in Perth, onlookers were impressed to see the Australian panel, spread across the pitch and each with a ball, concluding their training session by kicking in unison over the bar from wherever they were on the field.

Their pace, ball handling and accuracy with the ball were far in advance of anything previously seen in the series. They used the interchange to rotate their fast-moving centrefield players and sustain the pressure on Ireland.

Australia became the first side in the history of the internationals to score 100 points. They were infinitely superior to a disappointing Ireland team.

RECOVERY

-2008


The series had fallen into serious trouble in 2005 and 2006 with violent scenes, particularly in the second test in Croke Park in the latter year. It was particularly disastrous timing as the match had attracted the biggest crowd ever to attend an international, 82,200. Neither AFL CEO Andrew Demetrious nor

Australia manager Kevin Sheedy could see beyond the size of the crowd in the postmatch media conference but there was deep unhappiness within the GAA over the unruly scenes – contributed to by both teams – and Central Council pulled the plug on the 2007 series, due to take place in Australia.

When the series returned in 2008, with the game tweaked in order to help keep Ireland competitive there was a heavy onus on both sides to make the series a success both on and off the field. Mick Malthouse the Australia coach proved a safe pair of hands in guiding his team.

The new rules appeared to provide the series with a decent handicap, as there was no more than a score between the teams after two tests whereas both Ireland and Australia played robustly without misbehaving. From a GAA point of view the sense of relief was embroidered with a first series victory Down Under in seven years.

Captain Seán Cavanagh, whose intense commitment to the series and competitive nature went hand-in-hand with a cheerful off-field demeanour that proved a major asset in the diplomatic offensive.






IRELAND MANAGEMENT TEAM

JOE KERNAN - MANAGER

Joe Kernan will forever be associated with the greatest moment in the history of Armagh GAA, having guided the Orchard County to their breakthrough All-Ireland win in 2002, which was his first year in charge of the county.

In addition, he landed four Ulster titles during his glorious spell in charge – from 2001 to 2007. Kernan also had one year in charge of Galway and a successful spell at the helm of the Ulster inter-provincial team. The 61-year-old made his name in management with Crossmaglen Rangers, where he won multiple county and provincial titles, as well as All-Ireland club honours a remarkable three times. An All Star in 1977 and 1982, Kernan also made his mark as a player with Armagh, winning three Ulster titles in a playing career that spanned from 1971 to 1987.

On the club scene, he won five Armagh SFC titles with



Pádraic Joyce - Selector

Pádraic Joyce is one of Galway's greatest ever forwards. The 38-year-old Killererin native was a central figure in Galway's two most recent All-Ireland senior football victories of 1998 and 2001, with his magnificent display in the 2001 final against Meath widely identified as one of the greatest final performances of all time.

A three-time All Star, Joyce captained Ireland in the 2004 and 2005 International Rules Series and earned 11 caps overall in the hybrid code.



Dermot Earley - Selector

One of the most successful midfielders of the modern era, Dermot Earley played for Kildare from 1997 until his retirement in 2013, winning his two All Stars 11 years apart, in 1998 and 2001.

A son of the legendary Roscommon midfielder of the same name (RIP), Dermot won Leinster senior medals in 1998 and 2000, and played in Kildare's 1998 All-Ireland final defeat to Galway. He won eight International Rules caps for Ireland.




Darragh Ó Sé - Selector

Widely acclaimed as one of the greatest midfielders of all time, Kerry's Darragh Ó Sé comes from perhaps the most famous GAA family on the island. The An Ghaeltacht clubman won four All Stars and was a member of the Irish International Rules squad for the 2001 and 2002 series, winning 4 caps.

ALASTAIR CLARKSON - COACH

The Hawthorn coach ensured his place in history by leading the Hawks to a third successive premiership in October and the fourth flag of his career with victory over West Coast at the MCG in the first week of October. Alastair has won the universal admiration of the football public by leading Hawthorn to success with multiple game plans over his time in charge.

He is now the second-longest serving coach in club history and the only man with four titles to his name. Clarkson led a revitalised Australian side to victory in the one-off Test match in Perth last year and now concludes his two-year stint as coach.

He played 134 matches for North Melbourne and Melbourne, primarily as a rover/onballer between 1987-97 and also coached in the SANFL before taking on the job at Hawthorn, winning Centrals its second-ever premiership in that competition, before finding AFL success. Alastair is a life member of the AFL



Chris Scott - Assistant Coach

Scott is the Geelong Cats coach who has led the club since 2011, winning a premiership in his maiden season in charge. He was a member of the all-powerful Brisbane side of the early 2000s, playing in two of the Lions' premierships in that era.

Chris played 215 games between 1994-2007, winning the competition's Rising Star award in his debut year, and is a life member of the AFL.



Ross Lyon - Assistant Coach

Ross is the Fremantle coach who led the club to its first-ever grand final in 2013, having previously led St Kilda to three grand finals in his time at the Saints. While Lyon is still chasing an elusive first premiership, he is recognised as the best defensive coach in the game with a career winning percentage of more than 65.

He played 129 games for Fitzroy and the Brisbane Bears between 1985–95. Ross is a life member of the AFL.


JOE McQUILLAN





And this time at Croke Park, it will be Australia's best battling Ireland.

USTRALIA NOW KNOWS ONLY THE

Any questions around Australia's intent were dismissed as soon as news filtered out that coach Alastair Clarkson had put goalkeeper Dustin Fletcher through a fitness test in early September to ensure he was right to play.

Fletcher, a veteran of four International Rules Series, is aged 40 and played his last AFL game in May.

But Clarkson wanted him because, as he explained later, he was still the best goalkeeper the country had, "with those long Inspector Gadget arms".

So the coach found time out from his premiership campaign with Hawthorn to put Fletcher through a secret fitness test under the watchful eyes of the selectors.

Satisfied with what he saw, Clarkson picked Fletcher to be a part of the Virgin Australia International Rules squad.

The coach knew nothing could be taken for granted because, as he said when the team was announced on October 16, the Irish will be tough to beat on their home turf.

"They're such competitors, the Irish," Clarkson said.

"I'm sure they will be smarting a little bit after lowering their colours to us last year."


Last year the margin was just 10 points as 38,262 Australians got behind their team in Perth.

This time, a big crowd in Dublin will be backing their Irish stars to get the job done.

With that in mind, Clarkson selected two of Hawthorn's best veterans, triple premiership captain Luke Hodge, 31, and his team's former captain Sam Mitchell, aged 33.

Hodge, the Jim Stynes Medal winner as Australia's best player last season, is tougher than teak with a competitive spirit unrivalled in the league. Off the field he is down to earth and the game's most respected player.

He is also like an extra coach on the ground



and he knows how Clarkson thinks. In the cauldron of Croke Park, that experience will be an invaluable asset for Australia.

Mitchell is a genius with ball in hand and he knows how to manage a round ball too. With quick hands and good decisions, he is likely to be the pivot for the team.

Both know their coach loves to attack. He wants a score on the board and he likes the ball to be flicked around. Last year Clarkson's team made it happen early and Ireland recovered too late to overhaul the Australians.

That trio - Fletcher, Hodge and Mitchell - are not the only experienced hands entering the contest, with the Australians fielding a team with an average age just above 28.

Up forward is Nick Riewoldt, 33, one of four captains in the squad, and someone who takes a marathoner's approach to playing.

He runs harder in the warm-up than most do in a game, with his gut busting running up and down the field and then back and across, forcing most opponents to drop off and sleep for a week after the battle.

Riewoldt will be the central figure in a forward line populated with pace.

Eddie Betts, 28, is mercurial, Hayden Ballantyne, 28, in the opponent's face and then out of there while Luke Breust, 25, has a lateral step and fend-off learned in rugby and applied ruthlessly in the AFL.

Robbie Gray, 27, and Jake Stringer are midsized forwards who somehow explode from the standing start and can also mark the ball.

Stringer, the team's youngest player at 21, had not kicked a round ball before mid-October but he should adapt quickly as he grew up on a diet of basketball. Born on Anzac Day, 1990 he will bring youthful spirit to the group.

With Riewoldt creating space and drawing the ball, those other five speedsters will turn the forward line into something chaotically productive.

Australia rarely scores six-pointers, having managed just one since 2008, relying on playing the percentages rather than risking the Irish goalkeeper defending, but this bunch is unlikely to set limits on what they can achieve.

'Big Roughy' is what they call 28-year-old Jarryd Roughead.

He is one of just five Australians not to have played an International Rules game but he has a heart as big as champion racehorse Phar Lap. He is 98kg and 193cm but somehow he still manages to get around the ground like a flighty stallion. His booming left foot can be deployed anywhere.

In the middle is where Australia's class resides.

Youngsters Andrew Gaff, 23, and Dyson Heppell, 23, won't have to worry about being first time International Rules representatives.

They can run all day and will have a terrier-like appetite for the ball.

Gaff's team, West Coast, was runner-up in this year's AFL Grand Final and he won the club's best and fairest award, some indication of his talent while Heppell won his club, Essendon's, best and fairest in 2014 aged just 22.

Leigh Montagna, 32, and Brendon Goddard, 30, used to be teammates with St Kilda in the AFL but now Goddard plays for Essendon.

Both love to grind their opposition into the ground with their running and they hit targets like an archer.

Cheeky and tough on field, they want to share a significant win together.

Patrick Dangerfield, 25, is arguably Australia's most exciting player. He has that rare combination of being tough and explosive on the field, genial and smiling off it.

Known for team-lifting efforts in important moments of games, Dangerfield will take off at some stage and have the crowd roaring for him to get run down. If that does happen, the atmosphere is guaranteed to be electric.

Having the cheeky Brisbane Lions captain Tom Rockliff, 25, and the calm forever gliding David Mundy, 30, next to Dangerfield will help. Both know how to slide in next to superstars and lend support. Often they do the job so effectively they became the star attraction.

In the test match in Perth, they combined well. Clarkson is hoping for a repeat performance.

"The playing line-up speaks for itself with the reputations they have established in our game, and we know what to expect in the speed and the skills required to succeed with a round ball under different rules," Clarkson said.

The training camp in New York consisted of a practice match and three training sessions to prime the group physically and mentally.


As soon as the squad touched down in Ireland, it was game on, with beating formidable opposition the main objective.

That's why behind all this midfield class is a defensive unit that has the balance to defend and attack.

Robert Murphy, 33, played International Rules for the first time in 2002.

This season he was named All Australian captain, in his first season as club captain at his beloved Western Bulldogs.

Murphy plays the game with a frenetic style suitable for International Rules. When he takes possession he runs, working out his route on the way. He has courage, pace and an understanding of the occasion, which will help him lift for his country.



His younger teammate Easton Wood. 26, took the most intercept marks in the game in 2015 and won his club best and fairest. Wood tumbles back into packs of players heading towards him like he has lost his rear vision mirror and then takes overhead marks

It's a skill his parents probably wish he hadn't inherited, because of the danger attached to it, but that doesn't worry Wood.

Particularly when he knows Harry Taylor, 29, will be around. Taylor has a funny gait and a lanky left foot but his judgement of the ball in flight is better than any defender in the game. If he sits under a high ball he won't flinch and will be ready to hand it off to runners such as Grant Birchall and Nick Smith.

Both Birchall, 27, and Smith, 27, run with the sort of hunch-backed ferocity only possessed by players who are used to putting their head over the ball.


Both are left footers who somehow never find trouble on their right and manage to find 10 metres of grass in front of them to take before kicking. They hate conceding points and will give the Australian goalkeeper unimaginable support.

Ireland is a great team, tough and spirited and ready for the contest.

That's why Australia is throwing its best and most experienced at them.

This will be a game for the big crowd to admire.

"They will have looked at the quality of our players and the way that we played and trying everything they can to win this game and get the trophy back in Ireland," Clarkson said.

LAWS OF INTERNATIONAL RULES

Match Duration:

A match shall be played for a period of 72 minutes, divided into four quarters, each of 18 minutes duration plus any additional time allowed by the referees for undue delays in play. There will be an interval of six minutes at the end of the first and third intervals and 15 at the half-time interval.

Players:

Each team panel shall consist of up to 23 named players, 15 of whom shall take part in a match at any time. The remaining eight players are the interchange players.

Interchange:

An Interchange Coordinator and two Interchange Stewards, one from each country, will oversee the interchange system. Upon being satisfied that a replacement is permitted, the Interchange Coordinator shall approve the replacement.

A team may interchange the player within three minutes from the time approval is given. Players concerned shall leave and enter the playing field through the Interchange Area. Only one replacement may enter the Interchange Area at a time and each team is permitted to make a maximum of 15 interchanges per quarter.

Runner:

One person per team who is permitted to

enter the playing field to deliver messages or make team changes. He must not attempt to coach during play and must leave the field of play immediately after delivering the message.

Football:

The football shall be the regulation Gaelic Football.

Scoring Area:

The scoring area will be two goal posts with cross bar and goal net, and two goal behind posts positioned 6.5 metres from the goal posts on the end line.

Timekeeper:

Two or more persons shall be appointed to act as the timekeepers for the match. The officials shall be responsible for keeping time for each quarter, sounding the siren at the end of each quarter and stopping the clock for undue stoppages in play as directed by the referee.

Possession:

Where a player is moving whilst in possession of the football, he must bounce or touch the football on the ground at least once every 10 metres or six steps (whatever the greater), irrespective of whether such player is running in a straight line or otherwise.

Mark:

A mark is taken if, in the opinion of the referee, a player catches or takes control of the football within the playing field after it has been kicked from the hands or off the ground by another player not less than 15 metres distant. Having been awarded a mark a player may move back behind the spot where the mark was made and take a free kick. Alternatively, the player may play on immediately after taking the mark, kicking or hand passing the ball.

The Clock:

At the end of each quarter a hooter will sound. A score resulting from a ball in flight at the start of the sound of the hooter, i.e. when no other player of the same side touches the ball, shall be allowed. If the ball is played over the end line and outside the goalposts by one of the defending side, a 45m free kick shall be awarded. This must be scored direct.

When a free kick or mark is awarded before the hooter sounds, the free kick or disposal from the mark may be made after the hooter and the player may score directly from this kick. If the ball is touched by another player on the attacking team then any resulting score will not count.

Discipline:

Order off for the Remainder of the Match (Red Card):


Any player guilty of a red card offence will automatically be sent off for the remainder of the game with no replacement allowed and a penalty kick awarded to the opposition.

Order Off for the Remainder of the Match and Replacement (Black Card)

In addition to the awarding of a Free Kick, any player who commits a black card offence shall be sent off for the remainder of the game, with a replacement allowed from among the interchange players.

Hawkeye:

A Referee or Umpire may seek and/or obtain clarification that a ball has gone between the Goal Posts for an Over or outside the Goal Posts for a Behind, from the Hawkeye Score Detection System. For the avoidance of doubt it should be noted that the Hawkeye system will not adjudicate on shots close to the Behind posts.



HISTORY OF THE MARK

One of the outstanding features of the Australian Rules game is the 'mark' whereby the player making a clean catch of a kicked ball from another player not less than 20 metres distant cannot be tackled and is allowed to take a free kick.

The mark is incorporated in the International Rules game and there have been many suggestions that its introduction would greatly improve Gaelic football.

Like most suggested changes there is much to be said for and against; many followers of the Gaelic code would be surprised to learn that more than a century ago when the rules were still at a developing stage with different interpretations in various parts of the country, in one area at least the mark was a feature of the game.

This was confirmed by the well-known writer John Joseph O'Kelly, known as 'Sceilg', in the 1940s when he recalled that in the game being played in the Ring of Kerry in the 1880s: "When one player fielded the ball, he stood back and no member of the opposition was permitted to approach beyond the mark thus made until the man in possession had kicked off".

Other interesting features of the game was that a player was not allowed to catch from a hop, nor was lifting with the toe allowed, except when it was done without bending the body. And when a goal was scored the teams changed sides.

However, the 'mark' eventually disappeared as the rules became more unified, but the fact that it did exist represents an interesting connection between the Irish and Australian games.



INSPIRATION AND VISION

As he pulls on the Australian shirt in the Croke Park dressing-room Riewoldt will think of his sister Maddie and the pride she would have taken in this latest chapter of his record-breaking career with St. Kilda and Australia.


Maddie was just 26 when she passed away in February this year after suffering from Aplastic Anaemia, a deficiency of all types of blood cells caused by a failure of bone marrow development.

To honour her memory Nick, his brother Alex and their parents Fiona and Joe, along with friends, set up Maddie Riewoldt's Vision, a foundation which will help people with bone marrow syndromes such as aplastic anaemia. Maddie Riewoldt's Vision is raising money for adolescents and young adults with bone marrow failure syndromes.

The Vision will support those who are suffering from Bone Marrow Failure Syndrome (BMFS) and their families and will also help to fund new treatments.

Maddie was first diagnosed in 2010 with the illness and underwent treatment. She was in remission in 2013 but the illness returned and after spending seven months in hospital fighting the illness Maddie lost the battle earlier this year.

In a powerful interview with the Herald Sun in June Nick talked about his sister and her illness. "She hated the illness. It took everything from her in her prime of her life. It took away her ability to travel, to work, have relationships, have fun, so when she got out she wanted to help people in a similar situation.



"She's done her part. She couldn't have fought any harder and we now have an opportunity to help other people.

"We have a responsibility to do that. We have to find a positive out of this huge negative in our lives, otherwise what was the point? We owe it to her."

Nick and his family have received enormous support from the St. Kilda club, his teammates and the wider AFL community in support of the foundation and fundraising will continue and intensify in the future.

In the Herald Sun interview the grieving brother explained; "I don't want anyone else to sit there and watch their sister, watch their daughter go through hell. It's horrific to watch it slowly take her life. It's extremely underresourced and we want to raise money to find a cure."

Nick, now 33, was born in Hobart but moved

with the family to Gold Coast when he was nine years-old. He was the Number 1 pick in the 2000 AFL draft and made his senior debut for St. Kilda in 2001.

Since then he has played more than 300 games in the AFL and scored over 600 goals. He won the Leigh Matthews Trophy in 2004 when chosen by the AFL Players' Association as the Most Valuable Player in the AFL.

In that year he also made his debut in the International Rules series. An Australian team coached by Gary Lyon travelled to Ireland and played two tests in Croke Park. It was the first series for which the Cormac McAnallen Trophy was awarded and despite Riewoldt's efforts, especially in the first test, Ireland were victorious.

Ten years later, in 2014, Nick returned to international duty when Australia defeated Ireland in the one-off test in Perth.

IRELAND SEEK TO OVERTURN SCOTS

F THE BEST WAY OF PREDICTING THE OUTCOME OF A GAME IS BY LOOKING TO THE PAST, THEN THERE IS NO REASON WHY IRELAND SHOULD BE DISHEARTENED BY LAST MONTH'S 10-POINT FIRST TEST DEFEAT TO SCOTLAND IN BUGHT PARK.

It may have been the heaviest defeat Ireland have suffered at the hands of their Celtic cousins since 2007, but the 24-14 reversal was only one point worse than the margin in the equivalent game last year.

And Ireland dominated the return leg in Newry 12 months ago – Westmeath's Eoin Price hit 2-5 in a 16-point win - to maintain their overall dominance of the series.

Ireland joint manager Jeffrey Lynskey, who led Galway to the All-Ireland minor title in September, had predicted before the first Test that it would take his players time to adapt to the rules – not handling or kicking the size four ball is particularly alien to the Irish players – but he and Gregory O'Kane can't have expected to concede three first-half goals.

However, Glen MacKintosh, Liam MacDonald and Fraser Heath all struck for the Scots in the opening period in Inverness to give them a 3-14 to 0-4 lead at the break.

"That was probably the best first-half performance I've seen from a Scotland team ever," said Scotland manager Ronald Ross afterwards.

With players of the proven pedigree of Patrick Maher (Tipperary), David McInerney (Clare), Shane Moloney (Galway) and Matthew Whelan, Eoin Reilly and Zane Keenan (all Laois) in their squad, an Ireland fightback was inevitable, and it was Laois man Keenan who led the way with 0-8 while Shane Nolan struck both goals.

"We have no excuses," Lynskey said after the game. "In the first half the Scots got the three good goals and we were at sixes and sevens. Usually in this type of game it takes a while for our lads to adapt, particularly when in the rules we can't catch the ball, and can't kick it."

Lynskey and O'Kane will use most of the same players they brought to Inverness last month, but Galway's Shane Moloney has been replaced by three-time All Star TJ Reid (Kilkenny), who is one of the best stickman in the country, and would appear ideally suited to the hybrid code.

Ireland had their bedding-in period in the first Test, but will be expected to get proceedings underway in Croke Park with a second test win, something they have proven adept at in recent years.

Ball thrown along centre line between two opposing players.

7. RESTART AFTER POINT(S) SCORED

Struck from the ground or from a tee by the Goalkeepers from the 13 metre line.

8. SCORING

- a. Goal = 3 points (Green Flag)
- Over the crossbar and between uprights:
 b1. Free or sideline hit off the ground
 = 2 points (Red Flag)
 - b2. Roll or jab lift free hit
 - = I point (White Flag) b3. From general play

= I point (White Flag) 9. BALL OVER SIDE LINE

Struck from the ground from the point where it crossed the side line, by a player from the opposite side that last touched the ball.

10. BALL OVER END LINE BY DEFENDER Free hit to attacking side from 65 metre line at point opposite where it crossed the end line.

11. BALL OVER END LINE BY ATTACKER Bye hit / Struck from the ground within the Penalty Area.

12. PENALTY HIT

Award for any infringement of rules, by a defender, within the Penalty Area. A free hit is taken from the Penalty Spot (20 metres). 3 defenders are permitted on the goal line all of whom may catch the ball which then must be released within four steps. The free taker must not throw or carry the ball beyond the Penalty Spot. All other players must be behind the 20 metre line.

13. FREE HIT / PUCK

For infringement in area between 20 metre line and the end line, excluding the Penalty Area, by a defender. Free hit / Puck to the attacking team from 20 metre line at a point opposite the infringement occurred. All other players must be 20 metres from the free hit.

14. ALL OTHER INFRINGEMENTS

Free Hit / Puck taken by opposing team from where offence occurred.

15. OFFSIDE

Free Hit / Puck awarded to the defending team if an attacking player, including his extended stick, is within the small rectangle before the ball is played into that area.

16. FOULS AND MISCONDUCT

- (a) The ball cannot be handled except by the goalkeeper who must release it immediately or a penalty will be awarded.(catching the ball is prohibited)
- (b) The ball cannot be kicked, but may be stopped or controlled by use of one or both feet.
- (c) A player may not push, trip, kick or jump at an opponent.
- (d) A player may not strike an opponent with stick, fist/hand, elbow, knee or foot.
- (e) A player shall not obstruct an opponent from playing the ball or charge him in a reckless or dangerous manner.
- (f) A player may not swing his stick in a reckless or dangerous manner.
- (g) A player may only participate in the game with a stick in his hand which is in a condition not dangerous to another player.

17. PITCH INDENTATION

Where a player makes a Pitch Indentation for the purpose of taking a free, sideline or penalty puck, the puck shall be cancelled and play will recommence with a free puck to the opposition where the offence was committed.

18. VIDEO MATCH REFEREE

A Video Match Referee shall be appointed who may be called upon by the referee to clarify if a goal has been scored, or to assist adjudication on whether a foul was committed inside or outside the Penalty Area.

19. HAWKEYE

The referee or umpires may seek and/or obtain clarification that a ball has gone between the posts for a point or outside the posts for a wide or 65m free, from the Hawkeye Score Detection System.








a parchment for the Foundation Diploma in Training and Education.
