

VALUING VOLUNTEERS

COLM HIGGINS





At around six o'clock this morning, a bus will pull up in the sleepy village of Gulladuff in rural South Derry. Twenty-four newly track-suited youngsters, aged from ten to fourteen, will embark on a journey to Kildare's Hawkfield complex for the regional finals of Féile na nÓg. No matter what life throws their way, the boys will always remember the simple act of travelling those 160 miles together as Derry champions.

Such memories are just part of the gift of legacy given to the young players by their club, Erin's Own, Lavey. It's like that because people have made it that way, and perhaps none more so than club stalwart, Colm Higgins.

In such a tightly-knit community, most of the youngsters will probably know Colm Higgins, but some may not. For those that don't, and for everyone else, he is a man who has given a lifetime of service to the GAA in Derry and Ulster.

Recruited by the late Jim
McGuigan in 1998 to the role of
turnstile operator, or 'gate-man'
to use a more familiar term,
Higgins continues to this day
to perform the task all-yearround at Derry club games, as
well as provincial club and
county games.

It's his contribution to his club which is utterly jaw-dropping though.

When the Kildare-bound bus pulls out onto Quarry Road, its rear-view mirrors will frame a view of some of the finest sports facilities in Ireland. The indoor 3G centre - its white roof-covering, even visible from the top of Glenshane – is just one of the ultra-modern facilities which have sprouted up around 'The Hall' at the heart of the club.

A former county hurler, club senior footballer and hurler, and a brick-layer by trade, the club's core structure and focal point was one which Colm Higgins helped put in place with his own hands throughout the construction of the original pavilion during the years 1978-79 (his first two of nine years spent as Chairman). 1980 came and went as Higgins continued to oversee developments off and on the pitch. The seeds had been planted and during his second spell as Chairman, 1986-91, Lavey began to reap the harvest.

1985 saw the first Derry hurling title to be won by the club in 23 years. It was the first of thirteen Fr. Collins Cups to follow. Four Senior Football Championships also arrived (88, 90, 92, 93) as the good times rolled.

How fitting it was, therefore, that on 17 March 1991, Colm Higgins had the honour of welcoming the Andy Merrigan Cup into the hall - which he himself had laboured over thirteen years previous - as Chairman of the All-Ireland Football Club champions.

It's certainly a rich heritage and is one to inspire on any road trip. But if you think about it, it's not just the youngsters who have benefitted from Higgins' time, effort, sweat and tears - it's his entire community.

MINOR PREVIEW

DONEGAL are ticking along just nicely at senior level.
Okay, maybe that's a bit of an understatement – Rory
Gallagher's men looked back to their very best in disposing of Armagh almost a fortnight ago.
They are heavy favourites to see off north-west rivals Derry this evening and book their place in a fifth straight Ulster decider.

With some justification, the voices talking up their chances of lifting Sam in September appear to be increasing in volume by the day.

Their minors represent a similarly formidable prospect at the moment. Of the 20 games played

since the start of 2014, they have lost just once – and that was in the All-Ireland Final against Kerry. The likes of Paddy McBrearty and Odhran Mac Niallais are proof that rapid progression through the ranks is a distinct possibility. In Donegal, if you're good enough, you're old enough – and Declan Bonner's current crop play like men on a mission.

They have moved through the gears in Ulster thus far, accounting for Tyrone (1-11 to 0-8) at the preliminary stage before – like the seniors a few weeks later – battering Armagh into submission (2-14 to 0-7) in the last eight.

Against Armagh, there were four survivors from the starting 15 that came up short against the Kingdom last September – 'keeper Danny Rodgers, Stephen McMenamin, captain Michael Carroll and Ethan O'Donnell – but Bonner has also unearthed a few new gems.

Cloughaneely's Jason McGee made his debut against the Orchardmen and looked impressive around the middle of the field, while Rory Carr despite starting the game at midfield - was used to good effect at full-forward. Carr and Conor Doherty were a major handful for the Armagh back line, scoring 0-9 between them, and both were involved in manu more. The O Baoills from Gaoth Dobhair - Daire and Naoise provided the Donegal goal threat at the Athletic Grounds. There is undoubtedly a wealth of talent coming through in the hills, but this evening's opponents are hardly under-stocked on that front themselves.

Glass, the Oak Leafs had little
problem disposing of Down (2-11
to 1-7) in the last round.

And although they have already lost to the men from Tir Chonaill twice this year – 4-18 to 3-7 and 2-14 to 1-11 in the Ulster Minor League (the second clash was the League Final) – playing in a provincial curtain-raiser in Clones before their own fans should provide extra motivation.

Indeed, speaking after their quarterfinal win over Down, McErlaine referred to that first defeat in Ballybofey, looking upon it as a turning point in Derry's season.


"We learned that the game is not just 15 against 15, that you have to have a defensive system," he said. "We have worked on that since then but it still needs a bit of fine-tuning."

Whether that defensive system will have developed sufficiently to deal with a potent Donegal attack remains to be seen.

In the first half of their preliminary round clash, Tyrone gave Donegal all they wanted. Even Armagh were able to turnover plenty of ball and cause the odd headache, despite suffering a heavy defeat. With so many new faces, both teams are works in progress – Donegal just look a little further down the road.












Áit ar bith ina bhfuil daoine buailte le chéile ag caint fá chúrsaí peil Ghaelach nó ar na h-imreoirí as an tréimhse idir lár na naoi déag caogaidí suas fhad le deireadh na seascaidí is cinnte go mbeadh Seán Ferriter ainmnithe i measc na réaltaí móra a d'mir ag an am sin. Cé nach raibh Dún na nGall chomh láidir sna seascaidí bhí Séan Ferriter as Dún Fionnachaidh ar cheann de na himreoirí ab bhfearr sa tír san ré sin.

Nuair a fuair Dún na nGall fríd go cluiche ceannais Uladh sa pheil sinsear sa bhliain 1963, bhí Seán Ferriter mar chaptaein na foirne is é ag imirt sa líne leath tosaigh i lár. Roimhe sin sa bhliain 1956 bhí Seán mar chaiptaein ar an chead foireann mionúir Dhún na nGall a bhain craobh Uladh sa pheil agus é ag imirt sa líne lán chúl. Ar an droch uair theip ar Dún na nGall craobh sinsear Uladh a bhaint sa bhliain 1963 nuair a chaill said cluiche ceanniais i n-éidean foireann láidir as Co. an Dúin.



Fear mór ard a d'imir an chuid is mó don a chuid peil i lár na páirce, thosaigh Seán amach ar a thuras le foirne faoi aois ar an Chraoslach agus Dún Fionnachaidh. (Seo an cheanntar ina bhfuil fo-chumann Naomh Michéal faoi láthair) Bhain Seán craobh peil mionúr na contae leis an Chraolach sa bhliain 1955. B'iad na h-imreoirí eile as an cheanntar sin a bhí ar an fhoireann a chuaigh ar aghaidh agus a bhain an chead craobh mionúr Uladh sa bhliain 1956 nó Mick McGinley, Hugh McGinley, Francie Carr agus Danny Langan. I measc na h-imreoirí eile a bhí ar an fhoireann mionúr sin bhí Paul Sweeney as an Chlochán Liath agus Eamon Monaghan a bhí mar pháirt do'n ghrupa cailiúil – The Capitol Showband.

D'imir Seán Ferriter do'n Chontae i gcraobh Uladh achán bhliain ar feadh ceithre bhliain déag ó 1957 go 1970 agus tháining sé ar ais ar fhoireann na contae arís sa bhliain 1975. Bhain sé trí bhonn i gcomórtas Corn an Iarnróid (The Railway Cup) idir 1963 agus 1965. Le cois sin bhí sé ar na foirne a bhain Corn an Lagáin (The Lagan Cup) i 1965, '66 agus '67. Bhí sé mar Chaiptaéin ar an chead fhoireann as Dún na nGall a bhain Corn Mhic Cionnaith (The McKenna Cup) sa bhliain 1963. Bhí sé ar na foirne as Dún na nGall a bhain an chorn seo arís sna bliainta 1965 agus 1967. Bhí sé mar pháirt do'n fhoireann bainistíochta nuair a bhain Dún na nGall Corn Sam Mhic Uidhir sa bhliain 1992.

Nuair a dfhág Seán Colaiste Naomh Adhamhnáin i Leitir Ceanainn, bhug sé go Baile Atha Cliath an áit a raibh post aige sna Gardaí. D'imir sé le Na Fianna i mBaile Atha Cliath sular phil sé ar Dún na nGall arís agus bhain sé an Corn Democrat (The Democrat Cup) leis an Chlochán Liath i 1962. Indiaidh sin d'imir sé le Naomh Adhamhnáin agus bhí sé ar foirne as Baile an Ardeaglais (The Cathedral Town) a bhain craobh na contae sna blianta 1967, 1969 agus 1972. Mar a tharlaíonn le cuid mhór imreoirí, chríochnaigh Seán a shaol mar imreor lena chlub dhúchais, Naomh Michéal. Tá sé anois ina chonaí i mBaile Átha Cliath ach tá Seán le feiceál go foill ag cluichí ina bhfuil Naomh Mícheal nó Dún na nGall páirteach.



TOMMY DIAMOND

Bíonn achan tús lag a chantar agus is mar sin a bhí ag peileadóirí Dhoire ar an ardán mór. Go dtí 1965 nuair a thóg an contae Craobh Mionúr na hÉireann den chéad uair riamh. Ciarraí a bualadh sa chluiche ceannais (2-8/2-4) agus ba ar Tommy Diamond as Baile Eachaidh a bronnadh Corn Tom Markham an lá clúiteach sin i bPáirc an Chrócaigh agus é mar cheannaire agus mar cheannródaí i lár na páirce i rith na bliana.


Nuair a thóg Doire Craobh na hÉireann faoi 21 den chéad uair riamh fosta trí bliana ina dhiaidh sin, i 1968, bhí Tommy mar cheannaire agus mar chaptaen go fóill. Fán am sin, ba leathchúlaí ar dheis é ar an fhoireann. Bualadh Ciarraí arís sa bhabhta leathcheannais (3-11/0-10) agus táthar ann a déarfadh gur baineadh an choimhlint a luaithe is a cuireadh Tommy ar laoch Chiarraí san am, Breandán Ó Loinsigh. Uíbh Fhailí a bualadh sa chluiche ceannais (3-9/1-9) agus arís, ba ar Tommy a bronnadh an corn.

Tommy Diamond an chéad pheileadóir in Éirinn riamh leis an éacht sin a dhéanamh – bheith mar chaptaen ar fhoireann a thóg Craobh Mionúr agus Craobh faoi 21 na hÉireann.

Agus ar leibhéal club bhí sé mar chnámh droma ag foireann iomráiteach Bhaile Eachaidh a bhí i réim sna seascaidí agus sna seachtóidí. Tá póca lán bonn craoibhe aige leis an chlub, dhá bhonn Uladh agus sa bhliain 1972 bhí ina leathchúlaí ar an fhoireann a bhain Corn Aindí Uí Mhuireagáin i bPáirc an Chrócaigh – an chéad chlub riamh as Doire ná as Cúige Uladh leis an éacht sin a dhéanamh. Ceannródaí arís.

Ba mhinic a dheartháir Learaí leis ar na foirne sin agus bhí seisean mar chaptaen ar Bhaile Eachaidh an lá mór thuas. Seachtar mac atá ag Tommy! Agus thóg mac acu, Karl, bonn Uile-Éireann le Doire sa bhliain 1993.

WHO WILL FACE MUINEACHÁN?

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FÉILE NA NGAEL 2015



On the weekend of 19th – 21st June, Ulster hosted the Feile na nGael for the second consecutive year. Over 4,500 players participated throughout the province. It was a fantastic occasion which will live long in the memory of all those involved.

If Derry were to win this game it would represent the biggest shock of the Ulster Championship for quite some time.

The Oak Leafers are not the worst team in Ulster by any stretch, yet the form which Donegal has shown so far suggests that it would take an act of God to beat them.

Their win over Tyrone proved that they can eke out a result when up against a hungry team while not playing their best. Then against Armagh, they showed a steely resolve to make sure of the result. Having perhaps been a tad ponderous during the first half, after Paddy McBrearty's early goal, they took a firm grip of the game thanks to a tight defence allied with economical scoring. The game was over as a contest midway through the second half.

The message is clear, Donegal are moving through the gears, and there is nothing to suggest that Derry will be anything other than

another stepping stone towards the Tir Chonaill men's third Ulster Final clash in a row against Monaghan.

Since Donegal's 2009 All-Ireland Qualifiers win over Derry in Ballybofey, an extra time victory of 2-13 to 0-18, Derry have not beaten Donegal in League or championship.

If Donegal win, then it would be their seventh win in a row, in league and championship football against their rivals. There are a good few of the Derry team who were playing when they beat Donegal last, in the 2009 NFL campaign. Chris McKaigue, Patsy Bradley, Enda Lynn, Sean Leo McGoldrick, Eoin Bradey were all playing that day. But to emphasise how long ago that game was, Enda Muldoon and Sean Marty Lockhart lined out that day; a long time ago.

Since then Donegal has become the dominant force of Ulster football, and they have done so by adopting and fine tuning a counterattacking system that Derry just can't seem to break down.

Last year, Brian McIver's troops came as close to beating Donegal as they ever have in the past five years, when they adopted a cautious strategy.

The plan was to hold possession passed across the field along the 45 and wait for opportunities to present themselves. The strategy worked, and Derry led at half time. However, the loss of Fergal Doherty to injury, and a brief lack of concentration in defence meant that they conceded an early second half goal, and when Donegal hit the front, they just squeezed the life out of the game.

The optimists in Derry will certainly believe that because they came that close to beating Donegal last year, the Oak Leafers can get closer again this year. But a year is a long time in football. Since then Derry have changed their strategy, instead opting for

a defensive counter-attacking game. And the strategy didn't work when the two teams played each other during the league, when Donegal won comfortablu 1-15 to 0-12.

This year Derry have seen the departure of James Kielt and Barry McGoldrick, and they needed senior players like Fergal Dohertu, Mark Lynch and Eoin Bradley to get them over the line against Down in the last round.

In contrast, Donegal are much better in an Ulster Semi-Final than they were in last year's first round. Rory Gallagher's team are playing with obvious confidence, and despite having such a small pick. they are resplendant with stars.

They may have one of the best players that the game has ever seen in Michael Murphy, but he is far from their only star, Paddy McBrearty, Martin McElhinney, Christy Toye, Odhran MacNiallias. Mark McHugh, Ruan McHugh and that's just the guys in attack.

It is Donegal's defence that is their bedrock. They have a massed defence which expertly turns over possession as theu showed against Armagh in the last round.

Considering that Derry haven't scored a championship goal against Donegal since 2008, the odds of them getting one this weekend are justifiably slim. We are currently watching a Donegal team who have a realistic





chance of winning the All-Ireland title, they just have to stay fully fit and focused.

Perhaps the only threat to them winning is complacency. And this weekend's game is one in which that over-confidence may creep in. They have beaten Derry so many times since 2009 that they may believe that it is a foregone conclusion.


But even if that were to happen, if they were go out and allow Derry to get ahead, they have already proven this season that they know how to react in tight situations. The opening round game against Tyrone gave us proof of that, as Donegal reacted perfectly under pressure and ground out a result.

15 participant places are up for grabs and the application process is **NOW OPEN** to young GAA club



Ulster GAA's 'Blood Sub' Campaign Launched on World Blood Donor Day

For GAA patrons attending the Armagh v Donegal championship match on Sunday 14th June, the action on the pitch wasn't the only thing to grab their attention. The Senior Football match was preceded by a balloon release to mark World Blood Donor Day, and to launch the Ulster GAA's 'Blood Sub' campaign.

The momentous occasion was celebrated by the release of 300 red balloons in the middle

of the Athletic Grounds pitch. Ulster GAA Vice President Michael Hasson was joined by Emma Sloan from the NI Blood Transfusion Service who, alongside the Irish Blood Transfusion Service, are the professional services which the GAA family can support through their response to this campaign.

The message of the Blood Sub Campaign is simple - support blood donation and help save lives. Each year throughout Ireland, nearly 100,000 people receive a transfusion but less than 4% of the population across the island give blood regularly.

The launch was also attended by members of Coiste Chúrsa Cuimhneacháin Shéamuis de Faoite. members of the Downings GAA club executive, members of the Downing GAA football team who have qualified for the All-Ireland finals of Comórtas Peil na Gaeltachta which will take place in Ardara over the June Bank Holiday weekend and Máire de Faoite.

This year's course will run from Monday 20th July until Friday 24th July. The course which has been renamed after one of its original founders is now known as Cúrsa Cuimhneacháin Shéamuis de Faoite. This year is the 27th consecutive year for this course which is designed to improve the level of Irish for adult members of the GAA. There are three levels ranging from the Bun Rang for beginners to the Meán Rang or Intermediate level for those who have a reasonable degree of Irish and Ard Rang for those who are proficient in Irish and simply want to brush up on their language skills.

Classes are run each day by qualified teachers from 10.30am until 3.30pm and this is followed each day by singing and céilí dancing classes from 3.30pm - 5.00pm.



Entertainment which is provided each evening includes a drama by the local Aisteoirí Mhíobha a concert by An Crann Óg, lectures, Ceilí Mór with the Duntally Ceilí Band and on the final nic there is a banquet and music in the Síbín Ceo Downings. All classes are free of charge and are open to members of an Chumann Lúthchleas





ON FARMS THIS SUMMER

The Farm Safety Partnership is reminding GAA farming parents and families to take extra care on the farm over summer

Safety is always important, but it is particularly important at this time of year when children are off school and when there's a huge amount of work to be done on the farm.

Like out on the pitch playing Gaelic games, farms can be great places for children, full of fun and excitement, but they can also be an extremely dangerous - especially for our young ones.

Please read the following checklist and take any action necessary to make sure that our children are not injured on our farms this summer.

CHILD FARM SAFETY CHECKLIST

- Do you have a safe and secure play area for young children?
- Do you prevent children from playing in or around farm yards and livestock?
- Do you prevent all children under 13 years from riding on tractors and farm machinery?
- Do you restrict the use of the quad and provide suitable safety equipment?
- Do you secure all heavy wheels, gates, heavy equipment and stacked materials to prevent them from toppling over?
- Is your slurry lagoon securely fenced to prevent children from gaining access and do you make sure tank covers are always in place?
- Do you always keep children well away when mixing slurry?
- Do you keep track of where family members are playing or working and when they are expected back?
- Do you make sure everyone washes their hands before eating and drinking?
- Do you keep chemicals locked in a secure store when not in use?
- Do you make sure that guards are in place to prevent access to dangerous parts of machinery?
- Have you made sure all family members know what to do in an emergency?
- Have you prepared a list of emergency contact telephone numbers?

If children are old enough, tell them about the dangers they should look out for and where they are not allowed to go. Encourage them to be responsible.







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HEALTH AND WELLBEING IN THE GAA CLUB

For the past eight years the GAA in Ulster has led the way in promoting health initiatives, developing campaigns and delivering events. Ulster GAA has developed a number of programmes to enhance the wellbeing of it's membership including Live to Play (road safety), Head's Up (mental health), Stand Out from the Crowd (drugs & alcohol awareness), Drink, Drugs & Sausage Rolls (student health), the Healthy Hamper (school health) and the soon to be launched Blood Sub Campaign (blood donations). The Council's Health & Wellness programme continues to grow and evolve to meet the needs of it's members. New programmes are being developed for delivery alongside the successful ones already in existence.

The importance of Health and Wellbeing was recognised as being critical across the Association when delegates at Congress 2013 in Derry voted on a motion from Tyrone on the establishment of Health & Wellbeing sub-Committees at County level. These new county committees are now fully operational, identifying and responding to the wellbeing needs of its members. They have been tasked with implementing action plans which support the health of the GAA family as well as signposting to and partnering with relevant agencies who can provide services that may be of use to members. Many of the Ulster County Committees have held impressive events to better inform their members on issues such as addiction, mental health and wellbeing, cardiac screening, nutrition and hydration and general health issues.

A mirroring structure of volunteers is currently being implemented at

Club level with the appointment of a Club Health and Wellbeing Officer. This officer will liaise with the County Health & Wellbeing Sub-Committee to ensure that their club is availing of the supports, programmes, partnerships, training, and resources available to them.

With the support of their Club Chairperson and Executive, they willensure that their club has a Health & Wellbeing Project team in place, that appropriate GAA policies are implemented and monitored, and that the club fosters a culture that promotes health and wellbeing amongst all club members and, where possible, the local community.

Many clubs have made this appointment already and training was delivered in each of the 9 Counties for all newly appointed Club Health & Wellbeing officers. It is anticipated that the majoritu of Clubs have completed their Club health and wellbeing officer appointment by the end of this year. For many clubs the filling of a new volunteer role can be something of a challenge but given the uniqueness of this officership it may be worthwhile targeting someone in the wider club familu who has a knowledge of and interest in the health agenda. Consideration may also be given to someone who works professionally in a related role, such as the health service, youth work, teaching, etc. These persons will therefore have a desire to promote this topic at club level.

The National GAA Community & Health Department is also working tirelessly on this agenda, and among it's initiatives are leading the Association's way, in partnership with the HSE.



on the Healthy Club Project. Five Ulster Clubs are involved in phase one of this project, St. Peter's Warrenpoint, St. John's Drumnaquoile, St. Mary's Rasharkin, Castleblaney Faughs and Culloville Blues, all of whom are undertaking exemplary work which will help inform the future rollout of this programme across the Country.

These Clubs, and the many others who have responded to the needs of their members by initiating work in the area of Health and Wellbeing, are to be commended for their efforts in contributing to a healthier population, to the betterment of both the GAA and the wider communitu!

GAA PHYSICAL LITERACY SPORT IN SCHOOLS PROGRAMME

The Programme has now been running from September 2007 and feedback from principals and teachers has shown it to be one of the most successful programmes introduced into the primary schools over the last number of years.

We have just win an international award from the UK Sports
Council for the benefits of our programme to sport in schools and the community. With obesity levels increasing it is vital that we encourage our young children to get involved with physical activities and eating habits as early as possible. We take this message into schools with our healthy eating projects as well as targeting parents through our club Gaelic Start programmes.

Ulster GAA President Martin McAviney commented on the receipt of this prestigious award: "It is a significant honour for the Ulster GAA and Irish FA Curriculum Sports Programme to be recognised at the UK Coaching Awards, and it is also clear recognition of the success of this project over the last 6 years. The award highlights the importance of collaboration amongst sporting bodies in the promotion of physical literacy to young children. I want to thank the Minister of Education John O'Dowd MLA and his Department for their continued support for this essential programme."

The aim of the programme continues to be to support the statutory Physical Education curriculum and link into other areas of the revised curriculum. The main programme objectives are to:

- Develop the generic physical literacy skills of pupils in Foundation Stage (P.1/2) and Key Stage 1 (P.3/4) through participation in enjoyable physical activities;
- Help raise pupils' confidence and self-esteem, their motivation to learn and their achievements in other curricular areas, particularly literacy and numeracy through physical activity and
- Raise the confidence and competence of teachers by providing support to help them deliver PE.

The programme is evaluated and monitored regularly where the 31 coaches are inspected and receive in service on all the curricular subjects and cross curricular themes like numeracy and literacy etc.

Delivery:

The GAA coaches work with the class teacher in delivering the programme to primary classes during curriculum time in support of the PE curriculum.

We now cover all the main POS (programmes of study) i.e. movement to music (dance), especially in smaller halls, where space is limited during in climate weather as well as body management (gymnastics) and athletics during the summer term all of which has added variety to the programme.

The class teacher engages in planning and review with the coach and must be present and participate during all sessions to support their own development and follow up for future teaching. Teachers are left sample lessons for all the different programmes and can also log on to the new Fronter Schools IT system to view videos or download additional information.

Delivery:

Our coaches are spread over six counties and cover most of the maintained as well as the Irish medium sector, Integrated, Special Needs and a few Controlled schools. This means that nearly every child i.e. 22,045 receive the GAA PL programme, while supporting 600 teachers in 313 schools. They also help to run out our new club coaching programme lead by Dairmaid Marsden, Club coaches should contact their county games managers if they wish to have programmes such as the Gaelic Start programme implemented in their clubs.
