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Tá fíor fáilte romhaibh uilig go Páirc an Chrócaigh inniu don babhta deireanach d'ár gcluichí cáilithe agus na foirne ar fad ag déanamh a seacht ndícheall áit sna ceathrú cheannais a bhaint amach.

The arrival of post-provincial championship football at Croke Park can only mean one thing at this time of the year – we are inching towards the eagerly-awaited latter stages of the season. The prize on offer for today's senior teams is a return ticket back to the same venue a week later against the waiting provincial champions of either Dublin or Tyrone. However the immediate challenges facing them today should preoccupy their thinking given the quality of players and teams involved.

Donegal arrive in the capital looking to atone for their Ulster final defeat. They will try to do so against a Cork side that has generated momentum with qualifier successes over Limerick and Longford.

Our other encounter sees a similar clash between Westmeath and Mayo. Stephen Rochford's side have also availed of the backdoor route claiming the scalps of Fermanagh and Kildare since their reversal to Galway. Whether they can add Leinster runners-up Westmeath to that list remains to be seen.

The minor stars of Cork and Donegal also start the day off and with both sides being serious contenders in the Electric Ireland All-Ireland Minor Championship, I am certain we will see an excellent exhibition of football.

All told, it makes for an intriguing afternoon -Guím gach rath ar na foirne, lucht tacaíochta, foirne bainistíochta is riarthóirí. Míle buíochas do gach duine a chuidíonn chun na cluichí a reachtáil.

Our 2016 championships have thrown up their share of surprise results and story lines. They are in essence the shop window for the GAA, shining a light on the reach and passion that underpin our games in villages, towns and cities across the island and further afield.



Having had the privilege of travelling across Ireland and engaging with our international network in recent months, it is difficult not to be impressed by the positivity and energy that fuels our Association.

I would also like to thank the ongoing support of our valued sponsors, AIB, eir and SuperValu in the senior competition, as well as minor sponsors Electric Ireland, for their energy and imagination in helping us to market and promote our games.

Finally I'd like to acknowledge the role of our match officials whose task is all important in our games, not least on days such as this; táimid an-bhuíoch.

Ba sa chéad bhliain den chóras nua a thit sin amach nuair ab éigin am-breise a imirt ar Pháirc de hÍde i gcluiche i mBabhta 4 idir an Iarmhí agus Maigh Eo.

Bhí fir an Iarthair chun cinn go luath sa dara leath, ach chuir teacht Dessie Dolan (a bhí gortaithe) chun páirce athrú mór ar chúrsaí. Fós, bhí na foirne gob-ar-ghob nó gur thug cúilíní a scóráil Ger Heavin agus Paul Conway am-breise i gceist .

Faoin am a dtáinig leathama san am-breise sin, bhí farasbarr dhá chúilín arís ag Maigh Eo. Laghdaigh Heavin an bhearna, chothromaigh an Dólánach as cic taobhlíne agus ba é Damien Gavin, captaen fhoireann mionúir 1995 a bhuaigh Craobh na hÉireann, a fuair cúilín an bhua. An Iarmhí 1-14, Maigh Eo 0-16.

Den cheithre fhoireann atá ag dul chun páirce inniu is ag an Iarmhí is mo atá cluichí imeartha sna Babhtaí Cáilithe – 26 ar fad. Tá 13 acu sin buaite acu, 12 caillte agus chríochnaigh siad féin agus Loch Garman ar chomhscór i 2001 (tar éis am breise) sa gcéad chluiche dá chineál a mb'éigin athimirt a dhéanamh air.

Ar an taobh eile den scéal os rud é go bhfuil Craobh Chonnachta buaite acusan 6 huaire le seacht mbliana, níor imir peileadóirí Mhaigh Eo aon chluiche cáillithe ón mbliain 2010 go bhfuair siad an ceann ab fhearr ar Fhear Manach agus ar Chill Dara le cúpla seachtain. San iomlán níl imeartha acusan ach 12 Cluiche Cáilithe le 16 séasúr.


Cliseadh, in aghaidh Longfoirt, ab ea an cluiche cáilithe deireadh sin i 2010 agus bhí seachtar a d'imir an lá sin ar an bpáirc ag Maigh Eo nuair a thosaigh an cluiche in aghaidh Chill Dara coicís ó shin – David Clarke, Keith Higgins, Séamus agus Aidan O'Shea, Dónal Vaughan, Kevin McLoughlin agus Andy Moran. Tháinig Alan Dillon, Barry Moran agus Alan Freeman isteach mar ionadaithe agus dar ndóigh bhí Tom Parsons agus Chris Barrett gortaithe.

Fágann Craobh na Mumhan a bheith buaite acu féin 5 huaire agus iad a bheith ina dtáinistí 7 n-uaire ón mbliain 2001 nach bhfuil imeartha ag Corcaigh ach 14 cluiche cáilithe. Ach tá leas maith bainte acu astu sin. Níor buadh orthu ach i 4 chluiche cáilithe le 16 bliain anuas agus Craobh na hÉireann tugtha leo acu dá mbarr i 2010. Go deimhin ba anseo i bPáirc an Chrócaigh a d'imir siad babhta cáilithe don chéad uair, cliseadh 1-14, 1-10 in aghaidh na Gaillimhe i mBabhta 4. i 2001.

Le blianta beaga d'imir Corcaigh agus Dún na nGall a chéile i gCluichí Leathcheannais (2012) agus Ceathrú Ceannais (2009) na hÉireann, ach seo an chéad uair acu a chéile a imirt i mbabhta cáilithe.

Inniu an 24ú cluiche acu sin imeartha ag na Conallaigh. Nuair a d'imir siad an chéad cheann riamh acu ar an 16ú Meitheamh 2001 ba é an chúis ba mhó ar thug siad an bua leo as Páirc Brewster ná gur bhfuair príomhscórálaí na craoibhe i gCúige Uladh i 2000, 01' & '02 ach dhá chúilín d'Fhear Manach. Rory Gallagher ab ainm dó, is é atá ina bhainisteoir inniu orthu.

Níor buadh ar Dhún na nGall i gcluiche cáilithe ó fuair Ard Mhacha an ceann ab fhearr orthu i gCrois Mhic Lionnáin i mBabhta 1 sa bhliain 2010. Fágann an rath atá orthu i gCúige Uladh nach bhfuil imeartha acu ach péire ó shin – in aghaidh na Gaillimhe anseo anuraidh agus in aghaidh Laoise i gCora Droma Rúisc i 2013.



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

#### Cork v Donegal (Minor) Jerome Henry, Mayo

It's been just under a year since Henry last took charge of an Electric Ireland Minor Championship fixture which was the All-Ireland semi-final between Kerry and Derry at Croke Park last August. However, the Castlebar Mitchels man (who's been a member of the inter-county panel for six years) had a more recent assignment at GAA Headquarters which was in April when he handled the Allianz League Division IV final between Louth and Antrim. That match was one of four games the 35-year-old was assigned in that competition this year while he also had an outing in the EirGrid Connacht U21 Championship.



#### Cork v Donegal (Senior) Paddy Neilan, Roscommon

This will be Neilan's second championship assignment with Cork this season as the St Faithleach's whistle-blower was in charge of the Leesiders' match against Tipperary at Thurles last month. The 35-year-old also has an outing in the qualifiers under his belt as he controlled the Derry-Meath Round 2A fixture at Owenbeg three weeks ago. In his fifth year as a member of the inter-county panel, this will be his first match involving Donegal, although Paddy is no stranger to Croke Park and was the man-in-the-middle for the Dublin-Cork Allianz League tie at the venue back in March.



Mayo v Westmeath
Rory Hickey, Clare

A member of the Éire Óg club in Ennis, Hickey is an experienced referee who has been on the inter-county panel for 12 years. This will be the 39-year-old's third championship outing at Croke Park this year as the Kildare versus Wexford and Dublin against Meath Leinster ties came under his plussdiction. Earlier in the year the Banner whistler handled three matches in the Allianz League, one of which was Mayo's game against Kerry at MacHale Park, Castlebar. His last assignment featuring Westmeath was back in 2013 when the Lake County hosted Fermanagh in the opening round of the qualifiers.

# SONG REMAINS THE SAME FOR CORK AND DONEGAL

f the eight counties that reached the last round of the qualifiers this summer, only two have lifted Sam Maguire in the modern era.

Those teams collide this afternoon in Croke Park hoping to make inroads on September, without being rated as serious contenders. Despite their flaws, Mayo are considered more likely champions than Cork or Donegal.

The Rebels' status has fallen to the degree that a win would not only be an upset but a highlight of the past four seasons. While they should have beaten Kerry in last year's drawn Munster final, they haven't defeated top-class opposition in the championship since 2012.

Donegal, of course, have taken their share of scalps in the interim, most notably Dublin's in 2014, while reaching a creditable six Ulster finals in a row. The issue is they've lost three of the past four provincial deciders and were soundly beaten after by Mayo in the 2013 and 2015.

There's a feeling in Donegal, Cork and beyond that for many of their talented players the opportunity to collect a second All-Ireland medal has gone.

In Donegal's case that chance was the 2014 decider against a Kerry outfit lacking the self-confidence you'd associate with the county. For Cork you've to go back to 2012 when they had the beating of Donegal in the first half of that year's All-Ireland semi-final, and the momentum of Munster and league victories.

Who knows how many more trips to Croker

the likes of Alan O'Connor, Colm McFadden, Christy Toye, Pa Kelly, Donncha O'Connor and Neil Gallagher will make, or whether their fitness or form will even hold up on this occasion.


Of course any Mayo man would bite your hand off for an All-Ireland medal. Yet elite sportspeople are by their nature greedy, and you can be sure members of the Cork and Donegal camp often rue their failure to nail down their legacies with second Celtic Crosses.

Could a major display today spark an unlikely triumph? Tyrone were the last team to do it, back in 2008, but if you had to pick dark-horses now they'd surely be preferable to Cork or Donegal.

It's a mystery in keeping with the enigma that is Cork football, how gifted athletes who shone at U21, like Mark Collins – Cork's player of the year to date – Ian Maguire and Brian Hurley, who is sadly out injured for the summer, haven't lit up GAA Headquarters. Managers have been blamed, especially Brian Cuthbert though Peadar Healy is now copping the same flak. And the degree to which dual demands are a distraction can be seen by the presence of two hurlers in the training panel, Aidan Walsh and Alan Cadogan, since the loss to Wexford.

Yet the song remains the same. Cork's problems are more complex and the history of football on Leeside is one of underachievement and missed opportunities.

Only a win here and at the very least an



impressive quarter-final showing, if not another victory, would change the tune.

There's no doubt that Donegal have more key players at their peak. Michael Murphy turns 27 shortly, Paddy McBrearty is only 23 in early August, while Ryan McHugh is just 22.

McHugh has been electric this summer again and his incisive runs, tireless energy and ability to split the posts from distance offers hope to all young footballers who don't fit the 'rugby league' mould we're told is critical for the modern game. With speed and a neat sidestep he's able to avoid tackles while others plough into contact.

If Donegal fulfil their billing as bookies' favourites expect McHugh's contribution on and off the ball to be match-winning.


Murphy and McBrearty are more than capable of hitting the decisive scores against a Cork rearguard that was leaky in the league and in the loss to Tipp but tightened up in the qualifiers. This was down to the weaker opposition, the selection of a natural cornerback in Noel Galvin, and the team's increased work-rate. It'll be a different sceál today you feel.

You'd imagine Michael Murphy in particular will relish a break from the cauldron in Clones, even if Eoin Cadogan has shackled him before. Murphy only managed three points from play in six Ulster finals, but he's too often asked to be the N'Golo Kanté of the Donegal midfield when he should be their Jamie Vardy.

It hasn't reached Joe Canning levels, but there has been an ongoing debate about Michael Murphy's best position. A goal and a couple of points from play today against Cork would be huge, provided Odhrán Mac Niallais can be the linkman at centrefield.

There are two major factors that will swing what should be a fascinating contest.

Firstly, the desire and sharpness of the veterans. Cork wouldn't have even beaten



Longford without the power and aerial dominance of Alan O'Connor and the nous and deliveries of Pa Kelly.

Injuries have plagued Kelly, but there were flashes the last day of his Pirloesque playmaking, the sort which guided Ballincollig to a longshot county title two years ago. Colm O'Neill, whose edge has been blunted by three cruciate knee injuries, was Cork's other impact sub against Longford and he remains a goal-poacher supreme.

In Donegal's case they'll be looking for a season's best from the McGee brothers in the full-back line, and Frank McGlynn and Karl Lacey raiding from deep. Colm McFadden could also pilfer a score from the bench, especially in a squad that clearly lacks depth.

Cork don't have significant resources either anymore, hence the call-ups for Cadogan and Walsh. Cadogan is less known than two-time football All Star Walsh, but he won three successive Munster U21 medals, first as an elusive wing-forward then as a deadly No. 13.

He might provide the X-factor today, though it seems Donegal have a more stable, coherent team and system than Cork.







# WHAT CONSTITUTES A GOOD SUMMER?

have a friend who I often think believes it is his mission in life to be the first to declare a major soccer tournament to be of such damnably poor quality that it offends his very eyes.

He is not a soccer hater by any means; rather, his love for the game is so ardent and so pure as to make him mortally offended by the first dull 10-minute spell in a nondescript group game.

The absolute apogee of this tendency of his came a mere three days into the 2010 World Cup in South Africa. Australia were playing Germany and nothing was happening – as you might expect from such a fixture between a favourite and an outsider in the opening game of their tournament. And yet, sure as eggs is eggs, the phone beeped with a text shortly after half-time: "Brutal World Cup."

It was the seventh game of the tournament! Half the teams hadn't even played yet. No Spain, no Brazil, no Holland had passed across our screens. Yet there it was, so certain, so dismissive. Brutal World Cup, my man says so.

We do this quite a bit in the GAA too. From early May, you can feel your antennae twitching for the first grumbles at the horror

of it all. Often even before that, in fact. It used to be you'd get to mid-June before someone would say the championship could do with a good game. Not now – how often over the past few years have we seen the league end with the blithe declaration that, apart from a few Ulster Championship games, there'll be nothing to see this side of August?

Well, here we are on the last weekend this side of August and already the football championship has seen the following: New York coming within a kick of a ball of their first-ever win; Tipperary beating Cork for the first time in 72 years; Galway beating Mayo for the first time in eight years (you had to go back to the 1950s for a winless stretch of that magnitude); Westmeath making consecutive Leinster finals for the first time in their history; two drawn Ulster semi-finals and an Ulster final decided by outlandish scores in injury-time; Clare and Tipperary making their first-ever appearances in All-Ireland guarter-finals.

Ah yeah, says you. Novelty is all very well but the football has been rank. Has it, though? How are we measuring that? If we're talking about scoring, well, the excellent Rob Carroll of Gaelic Stats has some news for you. This has been the second-highest-scoring

championship ever – at an average of 34 points per game. It's running a full 7-10 points per game ahead of the championships of the mid-1980s and 6-8 ahead of the 2000s.

That's not down to a preponderance of one-sided games either – or at least no more than usual. Of the 55 games so far, 42 have ended with less than 10 points between the sides. The average margin of victory stands at 5.85 points per game – which is more or less what it was in 1950, 1960, 1970, 2000 and 2010.

Defensive football is a scourge, goes the cry. Yet we've just seen the highest-scoring game in the history of the Ulster Championship. Across the board – and especially since the dawn of the ultra-counter-attacking style in 2011 – scoring has spiked in a manner never seen before. And still we complain.

Sometimes it's hard to know what people want from the championship. Beyond the obvious ache for your own crowd to do well, what constitutes a good summer? Close matches? Of the 15 games it took to decide the provincial semi-finals and finals, eight

were in the balance (a goal or less between the teams) in injury-time. Take out Kerry and Dublin and that number becomes eight out of 11.

Good football? Well, surely that's down to your own personal taste, predilections and perversions. If you don't like the heavy blanket defence stuff, you'll be happy to know that seven of the nine Ulster teams are gone. If you do, then Tyrone and Donegal are still standing, ready to pit the best of what they do against the best of what the rest do. Styles make fights, and all that.

So here we are, August bank holiday weekend and no closer to knowing what to do with ourselves. We can be reasonably sure there's no great team this year – Dublin without Jack McCaffrey, Rory O'Carroll and now, by all accounts, James McCarthy are still pretty good but, by definition, they will hardly be great. So we're left with an open enough All-Ireland series in prospect, one that arguably has more serious contenders now than we would have given it credit for at the start of the summer.

Like my friend with the soccer, we have little to be giving out about.

Then it was Westmeath who triumphed, 1-14 to 0-16, after an extra-time thriller in Dr. Hyde Park in Roscommon.

It was one of the many upsets in that year's championship. Mayo had won the Allianz Football League Division I final earlier that spring by beating a Galway team that went on to win the All-Ireland title that September.

Both those counties came unstuck in their Connacht campaigns against a Roscommon team that won the most competitive Connacht Championship in living memory.

They beat Mayo in a dramatic final in Dr. Hyde Park which left Mayo facing the Qualifiers if they wanted to kick-start their year.

They were drawn against a Westmeath side looking to deliver on All-Ireland minor and U21 successes in 1995 and 1999 respectively.


It would be another three years before their most famous breakthrough, their first-ever Leinster senior football title win, in 2004, so where Westmeath were at as a senior outfit was still uncertain.

They had been eliminated from Leinster by their near perennial conquerors Meath by just one point in the quarter-finals and looked in serious trouble when trailing Wexford in their Round 1 Qualifier game. But they rallied, drew the game and won out comfortably in the replay. Subsequent wins over Limerick and Louth gave them considerable momentum going into Round 4 but few predicted they would topple the Allianz League champions.

A sizeable crowd of 22,473 flocked to Roscommon for the game - an impressive attendance by today's standards - to see which team could find their way into the quarter-finals.

In what is regarded as one of his finest ever performances, Rory O'Connell led by example at midfield for the Lake County. He would end the year as his county's first-ever All Star.

The game went into extra-time and though Mayo led coming near the end, a marvelous sideline from Westmeath substitute Dessie Dolan (who did not start due to injury) drew the game.



With just two minutes on the clock another sub, Damien Gavin, raced forward to fist over a wondrous winner to give Westmeath arguably their biggest win in senior football history up to that point.

It secured them a place in the closing stages of the All-Ireland Championship for the first time ever.

But fate was not to be kind. They were yet again drawn to face their old nemesis, Meath, and could not reverse their Leinster defeat, with Seán Boylan's men winning by five.

Then and now.


This time around the roles have been somewhat reversed. While Mayo still go in as favourites, it is Westmeath who are the provincial final losers looking to bounce back while Mayo have the succour of a run through the Qualifiers to find themselves after a shock Connacht semi-final defeat to Galway.

Mayo manager Stephen Rochford will be hoping this run through the Qualifiers, their first time in the 'back door' since 2010, will allow his side the chance to get back on their feet.

With the nature of Dublin's dominance in Leinster, Westmeath finding themselves in the Qualifiers after that game is not the same hammer blow as it might be for other provincial losers.

Tom Cribbin's men earned their passage to the Leinster final with wins over Offaly and Kildare, with the nature of their comeback from six points down against the latter earning them plenty of admirers.

Mayo could do worse than ignore the fact that Westmeath are in Division IV next year. After all they have contested two successive Leinster finals, beating five different counties to reach those two deciders, including a



historic and dramatic first-ever win over Meath in last year's Leinster semi-final.

It cannot be forgotten either that it was as recently as 2014 that Mayo and Westmeath met in Division I. That game took on a life of its own. Mayo led by nine early on only for Westmeath to be a point in front at the break. Mayo, thanks largely to the returning Cillian O'Connor, eventually won by five.

Brothers Séamie and Aidan O'Shea both lined out for Mayo that day but if life had turned out differently they could have been wearing the maroon and white of Westmeath.

They both spent their first years in Mullingar where their father, Jim, worked as a bank official.

However, when Jim's work eventually took him to Mayo in 1993, their county allegiance was sealed.

Mayo will go in as very strong favourites today given their form in recent years. But a similar situation prevailed in 2001 too only for their dreams to be dashed in Dr. Hyde Park.

# CORK AND DONEGAL MEET IN MINOR CURTAIN RAISER

y a kind twist of fate, Cork and Donegal meet in both minor and senior games this afternoon at Croke Park, rendering this Electric Ireland All-Ireland minor quarter-final the ideal curtain raiser to the senior game.

To the Ulster champions first and Shaun Paul Barrett, in his debut season as Donegal minor manager, has continued the fine work of predecessor Declan Bonner.
Donegal swept all before them in Ulster this year, winning the Ulster Minor League back in April before an impressive Ulster Championship campaign.

Wins over Antrim (2-11 to 2-7), Monaghan (3-15 to 2-12) and in the final against Derry two weeks ago (2-10 to 1-11) saw them reclaim the provincial crown last won in 2014, a season in which they also reached the All-Ireland final.

So far this summer, Donegal's stand-out talents have been midfielders Kieran Gallagher and Jason McGee, both of whom were outstanding in the win over Monaghan. Niall O'Donnell and Eoghan


McGettigan have performed well up front while half-backs JD Boyle and Aidan McLaughlin possess notable attacking spirit.

Munster runners-up Cork are managed by Dunmanway native Brian Herlihy, and today's game is their first since losing the provincial final to Kerry (3-14 to 3-8) back on July 3.

Cork haven't won a Munster minor title, or indeed an All-Ireland minor quarter-final tie, since 2010 but they have two championship wins under their belt so far this year. They defeated Tipperary - last year's All-Ireland runners-up - back in April (1-14 to 1-11) and routed Limerick in the Munster semi-final in May (1-19 to 0-6).

The defeat to Kerry has understandably dented morale but this group of young Rebels, managed by Herlihy at development level for the past four years, have plenty of quality, particularly in attacking duo Mark Buckley and Damien Gore. Between them, they have scored an impressive 2-29 in three games.







# Donegal minors power into All-Ireland semi-final

Goals win matches as a somewhat mercurial Donegal side showed when they eventually disposed of the Cork challenge in a classic game of two halves.

The winners found the net when they badly needed to, against a Rebel side that dominated for long periods of the first half, but were rocked by a superb solo goal from towering Tir Chonaill midfielder Jason McGee in the 26th minute.

McGee's strike, totally against the run of play, hauled a shaky looking Donegal back into the match as Cork led by 0-6 to 1-1.

But the real heartbreaker for the Rebels was Donegal's second killer goal from substitute Shane McGrath who cooly drilled the ball low to the net after he was superbly by Donegal's talismanic Niall O'Donnell in

the 54th minute.

By that stage Cork were reduced to 14 men as corner back Alan McCarthy was lined for two yellow cards.

However this was a thoroughly deserved victory for the winners who recovered form a nervous opening half and outscored their opponents by 1-10 to 0-3 in the second half.

But they will be concerned with hitting 14 wides to Cork's eight in a match where they were also awarded 25 frees to 15 for the young Rebels.

Donegal took a firm grip on proceedings in that half as Cork were forced to rely on sporadic raids.

The young Rebels relied excessively on the tiny but extremely

talented full-forward Mark Buckley who finished with a creditable 0-5.

He gave Donegal full back Aaron McCrea a most uncomfortable half hour but substitute Aaron Deeney fared much better on the clusive Buckley.

Cork settled quicker with Damian Gore cooly slotting a 30 metre free after a swift move that opened the Donegal defence after just five minutes.

That set the tone for the entire half as the young Rebels dealt easily with Donegal's towering midfield duo of Jason McGee and Kieran Gallagher and attacked with great profit down the left wing.

Scores were at a premium in the early stages, until Donegal centre-back J D Boyle was fouled after tearing through the Rebel rearguard and Peadar Mogan levelled matters at 0-1 each.

But that was as near as Donegal were able to get to the rampant Rebels as electrifying full-forward Mark Buckley punched holes in the Tir Chonaill rearguard and the points flowed from Buckley, Tadhg Corkery and Gore. And Cork was not unduly fazed by the loss of keeper Mark White who was involved in accidental collision with a Donegal player in the 11th minute.

Donegal looked tentative and nervous with the usually accurate Neil O'-

Donnell hitting a few uncharacteristic wides.

McGee's goal turned a one-sided affair into a real contest, but the losers were well worth their half-time lead 0-10 to 1-3 half-time lead.

O'Donnell had left it at one point game from a free in the 26th minute.

But Buckley and Co pulled away again as seven minutes extra time was played at the end of the opening half.

However O'Donnell brilliantly led the charge for the winners in the third quarter as they carved out a valuable victory in an impressive second half display.

But, they will have some legitimate concerns about their second sluggish

start on the trot and those 14 wides, many of who were from pretty scorable positions.

They now meet Galway in three weeks time in the All-Ireland semi-final.
